No other copy of this edition appears to be known, though another edition, published in 1619, is described at length by Arthur Lotz, *Bibliographie der Modelbücher*, Leipzig, 1933, p. 102; he remarks that Bretschneider's work is far above the average level of German ornament of the period. 



** The charming bindings with these arms and the motto EXPECTATA NON ELVDET ("She whom I am waiting for shall not fail me") have long been a puzzle to bibliographers. About one hundred of them have come down to us altogether, all on squat sextodecimos or duodecimos of uniform height, uniformly tooled and well preserved. Though the decoration is the same on all, the colours are different according to the subject of the book: red for religion and philosophy, citron for poetry, olive-green for prose. They appear to have been discovered all together somewhere in France or Italy and to have been brought over to England at the time of the French Revolution. They begin to appear in English sales soon after 1800 and some specimens are in the Cracherode collection in the British Museum, bequeathed in 1799. From the pedigrees of most volumes, as far as they can be traced, it can be deduced with some confidence that the entire library must have been brought to England and dispersed here.

Their owner was discovered by Bouland ten years ago, and in his article in the "Bulletin du Bibliophile" (1920, pp. 68-80), he has fully solved this mystery. He has found a bookplate engraved in 1648 for one Pietro Duodo with the same arms (*gu. on a bend or three fleurs de lys azure*) and the same motto (*Expectata . . .*). This Duodo, a member of a Venetian Patrician family, was the nephew of another Pietro Duodo who was Venetian Ambassador in Paris, 1594, and died in 1611; in 1603 he was on an embassy to the English court. All the books in these bindings are printed before 1600 and most of them in the 1580's and 90's. It thus can be considered proven beyond any doubt that these bindings were made in Paris for Duodo from 1594 onwards until about 1600.

A requisition from Buonaparte to the Elector of Baden to seize the Bishop of Châlons has been executed.

GARDINER (Richard) *Vicenza*, 2 Mar., and *Venice*, 3 May, 1804 :

" If England meant to extricate herself and Europe from the inevitable Yoke which Buonaparte is forming . . . Buonaparte does, and he does right ". Buonaparte executes . . . we know no more of the Politics of Europe than the Hottentot.

GARDINER (Richard) *War Office.* A. L. s., *by his wife*, 19 May, 1802 :

Bonaparte was forming an army of 360,000 we have our Botany Bay why refuse the French convicts the deserts of Guiana the vast extent of the power of Bonaparte measured coastwise from Amsterdam to Venice with the exception of Gibraltar. Pitt is the soul of Treasury Politics.

GENTZ. 4 A. Ls. s. (1803 or 4) :

" Bonaparte left Paris on the 30th it seems to me that he must do something soon or abandon everything ; I await great news ". Everybody spoke yesterday of the departure of Bonaparte for the coast. Cobentzel believes it is the signal for the expedition. All the French & Spaniards think the same. Bonaparte seeing his admirers diminish is embarrassed and desires Peace so much so that he has made overtures. Sends gazettes containing *The atrocious life of Bonaparte* in which it is stated that he killed 80,000 on the 10th vendémaire & that he stole from Venice a collar of diamonds to give his wife.

We are all occupied in the reduction of Expende, and War Establishment under an impression that Buonaparte is sincere in his desire for Peace.

About Bonaparte and Talleyrand and the entry into Baden to "lay hold of the guilty". The sensation which this infamous business has created against Bonaparte is beyond all description.

JACKSON (Hon. Thos.) *Minister at Turin. 14 A. Ls. s., Rome, Berlin, 1803-4 :*

About "checking the boundless ambition of the usurping tyrant of France". Bonaparte's refusal of Russia's mediation terms. *In cypher but deciphered by Stuart*: doubtful if Bonaparte will leave the Continent long in the present state of ease; if he fails in his attempts on England he must pick a quarrel elsewhere, he scowls at the Danes with ever longing eyes. Bonaparte is not afraid of notes. The attack upon Markoff is the Consular version of what passed between him & Bonaparte. *Partly in cypher but deciphered by Stuart*: The Government's proposal for guaranteeing is unacceptable to Bonaparte he is very anxious to get out of the scrape without fighting. If Malta were the only obstacle to Peace the first Consul would yield. Bonaparte has ventured to leave arms, therefore next accounts may be interesting. About inducing the French to leave Hanover but is very doubtful about Bonaparte agreeing. Bonaparte intends to get complete possession of the South of Italy & hopes to do so by big words alone, he hasn't sufficient force otherwise; Bonaparte's aide, Caffarelli, has arrived at Turin and another at Milan. The King of Prussia has rejected Bonaparte's urgent solicitations for a Treaty of Alliance. Arrest of General Moreau has caused satisfaction as a symptom of the instability of Bonaparte's Government. The King of Sweden may not have gone deeply into the scheme from which Bonaparte thought he could draw a partial advantage if he quarrelled with Russia; has given a copy of Napoleon Bonaparte to the Messenger for Stuart, it ought to be circulated as much as possible; Baykoff is obnoxious to Bonaparte; the Reign of Terror has been restored at Paris and 2000 people arrested. Speaks of a great and decisive victory over Bonaparte by the Archduke Charles.

LEARD (Jn.) *Vice-Consul at Ragusa. 14 April, 1809 :*

Stuart's return to Vienna which will hasten the commencement of a War for the delivery of afflicted Europe from the Tyranny of Buonaparte and his Banditti of Robbers and Assassins.

MASSERING (Ph.) concerning Bonaparte's offer of a regiment of Swiss Grisons

MORIER (J. P.) *Consul-General in Albania and the Morea Constantinople, 12 Feb., 1802 :*

Referring to "the Equity of bonaparte's intention in reducing a people so inimical to the Turks as the *beys*".

AMERICANA

A Collection of Water-colour Drawings of Buildings and Streets in some of the principal Eastern Cities of the United States of North America. The Artist, Thomas Wakeman, was a Scenic Artist who was in America about 1850. He is represented in the New York Public Library, in the recently acquired Stokes Collection of American Prints, etc., by one drawing only. Three or four other drawings of his are in the Dominion Archives, Canada.

The drawings are executed in a very bold style, in water-colours, pleasingly coloured; they are full of figures and form a most interesting record not only of the architecture, but of the life and costume of the streets. They are in excellent condition and still in the original mounts, all signed and inscribed with the titles.

The earlier copies of the combined issue of "Songs of Innocence and Experience" show great lack of uniformity in the arrangement of the plates, but by 1815 Blake had standardised the order and kept to it for all copies issued after this date, with the exception of the present copy. This exception is peculiar in that Blake seems to have taken the trouble to write out a MS. index, but only to reject it after having used it in this single copy. This index written on a double leaf of quarto size is preserved at the end of a MS. copy of Cunningham's "Life of Blake", formerly in the possession of Mr. William Muir, who published a lithographic facsimile of it at the end of his edition of "The Marriage of Heaven and Hell" (see *Keynes*, p. 116 and p. 126 footnote).

PROVENANCE. This copy was originally in the possession of Thomas Butts "whose long friendship with Blake commenced (about 1794). For nearly thirty years he continued (with few interruptions) a steady buyer, at moderate prices, of Blake's drawings, temperas, and frescoes; the only large buyer the artist ever had".—GILCHRIST, *Life of Blake*, p. 111. Frequent references to him are made by Gilchrist in vol. 1 of his *Life of Blake*, and many letters from Blake to him are printed there.

It was acquired by Richard Monckton Milnes, first Baron Houghton (1809-1885), and on his death passed to his son, the 2nd Baron Houghton (*cr.* Earl of Crewe, 1895, and Marquess of Crewe, 1911). It was Lot 1 in the sale of the Blake Collection belonging to the Earl of Crewe at Wellington St., 30 March, 1903, coming then into the possession of its late owner, by whom it was lent to the Loan Exhibition of Works by William Blake (Oct.-Dec. 1913), held at the National Gallery of British Art. It is no. 87 in the catalogue of the Exhibition.

After the death of Butts this copy passed into the possession of the first Lord Houghton and then to his son, the first Lord of Crewe. It was lot 30 in the Crewe sale, 30 March, 1903.

Mr. Keynes writes (*op. cit.*, p. 202): "One copy of the *Night Thoughts* was richly coloured by Blake for Thomas Butts, and others coloured by him are said to exist, but several that I have seen are feebly tinted, and were probably done by Mrs. Blake".

Gilchrist in his *Life of Blake* (edit. 1863, vol. 1, p. 141) says: "The absence of colour, the use of which Blake so well understood, to relieve his simple design & heighten its significance, is a grave loss. I have seen one copy of the *Young*, originally coloured for Mr. Butts, now in the hands of Mr. Monckton Milnes, much improved by the addition forming a book of great beauty".

This copy has not got the leaf of "Explanation of the Engravings" bound up at end. Although a large copy with some rough edges, a few of the engravings have been slightly cut into as usual.

Coleridge in a manner gave us up when he was in town, and we have now lost all traces of him. At the time he was in town I received two letters from Miss Wordsworth, which I never answered because I would not complain to her of our old friend . . . Do not imagine that I am now *complaining* to you of Coleridge. Perhaps we are both in fault, we expect *too much*, and he gives *too little*. We ought many years ago to have understood each other better. Nor is it quite all over with us yet, for he will some day or other come in with the same old face, and receive (after a few spiteful words from me) the same warm welcome as ever . . . pray do not mention it to the Wordsworths nor to Coleridge, for I know he thinks I am apt to speak unkindly of him. I am not good tempered, and I have two or three times given him proofs that I am not . . . Charles joins with me in affectionate remembrances to you all, and he is more warm in his expressions of gratitude for the turkey because he is fonder of good eating than I am, though I am not amiss in that way.

A 14-line signed postscript is added by Charles Lamb :

We have this moment received a very chearful letter from Coleridge, who is now at Grasmere. It contains a prospectus for a new weekly publication to be called *The Friend* . . . a weekly paper . . . to come out, the first number, the first Saturday in January. Those who remember *The Watchman* will not be very sanguine in expecting a regular fulfillment of this Prophecy. But C. writes in delightful spirits, & *if ever*, he may now do this thing, etc.
