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

Alcala Galiano entered the Spanish Navy in 1775 and on account of his special ability was sent on various scientific and exploring expeditions, one of the earliest being that described in this manuscript. Its purpose was for "making an exact survey of the Strait of Magellan and dispelling the many uncertainties that exist in regard to its inlets and unknown channels, a point of great importance to Navigation and Geography."

In 1789 Galiano accompanied the important South Sea Expedition of Malaspina. In consequence of his work during this voyage he was later given the command of the "Sutil" and "Mexicana" for the exploration of the Strait of Juan de Fuca. He was unfortunately killed at the Battle of Trafalgar when in command of the "Bahama."

Don Juan Ramirez was a Spanish General commanding in Peru. He was born in 1765 and died after 1823. He acted as Goyeneche's principal officer in Charcas, 1809-12, and was Commander-in-Chief of the forces used against the Rebellion of Pumacagua, being victorious at the Battle of Umachiri, March 11, 1815. This work contains the account of this campaign, written by one of the Lt.-Cols. of the Expedition. In 1816 Ramirez became President of Quito, and in 1822 he was defeated by Sucre at the Battle of Pichincha, capitulated and abandoned Quito, which was never again occupied by the Spanish.

A volume of exceptional interest. The capture of this rich Galleon by H.M.S. Centurion was one of the outstanding events in the eighteenth century. Anson evidently gave orders that a translation of the captured vessel's logbook should be made, and for this purpose an unused cash book found in the N.S. de Cabadonga was made use of. The log commences on July 22, 1742 and finishes on Saturday 29th June, 1743 with the remark, "Little Wind and Cloudy. All sail sett." According to his Journal, Anson made his great capture on June 20, but at that time the calendar in England was eleven days behind the revised calendar used in Spain, so actually the log goes up to the day previous to the capture. At the end are several brief extracts from the logs of other voyages.

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SECRET PLANS FOR THE INDEPENDENCE OF SPANISH AMERICA, AND AN ENGLISH
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The original Manuscript in the autograph of Bertrand-Moleville, of his Plans for the Liberation of Spanish America, with a covering letter from him to John McArthur, requesting the latter to communicate them to Lord Melville. Also an Autograph Letter from John McArthur to Lord Melville, enclosing the above, together with a Précis in English of the Plans.

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Bertrand-Moleville, the celebrated French Statesman, was the Minister of the French Royal Marine at the outbreak of the Revolution, and fled to England as a refugee. In his letter he requests John McArthur to bring the enclosed manuscripts to the notice of Lord Melville, and offers his services in the execution of the plan he proposes.

McArthur, in his letter to Lord Melville, states that he has had submitted to his perusal "a plan for alienating the Continent of South America from Spain, and establishing the Province of Mexico as an independent State," which he forwards on to Lord Melville, together with his own "Translation of the Substance of Bertrand de Moleville's plan." In a postscript he remarks that "Mons. de Moleville is preparing a plan to be submitted to Mr. Pitt through Mr. Long, relative to the means to be employed for effecting a Counter Revolution in France, on principles different from those hitherto proposed or attempted."

Bertrand-Moleville's plans for the Independence of Spanish America commence by discussing the futility of a defensive war against France, and state that, as war was about to be declared against Spain, the tool of France, we should strike at Spain's American possessions, and reap the glory of giving them their Independence. Mexico being the part of Spanish America most vulnerable to England, should be the first part to be attacked. The country should not be conquered as a part of the Empire, but rather as a dependency, and a Revolution would be the easiest method of bringing that to pass. The country should be "seduced," a leader chosen for the people to rally round, and the stated object of this Revolution be "the regeneration of the Natives and Empire of Mexico." The best leader that could be chosen for them would be the Duke of Orleans, seconded by his brother, and assisted by an English Army of 15,000 men, and an adequate Naval Force, together with the necessary pecuniary help. Bertrand-Moleville considers that the Spanish Forces in Mexico are by no means adequate for the country's defence, and that "the troops are badly disciplined and not at all warlike."

The Army might include 5 or 6,000 European troops in the pay of England, and English soldiers from Gibraltar, Malta, W. Indies, and India, who would be sufficiently acclimatized. Black troops from the English colonies, to the number of 6,000 might be added, as well as troops recruited in the Island of St. Domingo from the forces of Dessalines (the negro Emperor of Haiti who revolted from the French republic). England should lead Spain to expect an attack on Havana, and in the meantime land her forces at Vera Cruz, which place would soon be overcome. The Army should then march into Mexico as liberators, recruiting "free Corps" en route.

The other papers include various profound political reflections on the motives and means for carrying the plan proposed into execution; also various topographical observations concerning Mexico, the civil and military administration, population, wealth, revenue, and manufactures, and the benefits which would accrue to England. He gives an outline of the Proclamation that the Duke of Orleans should issue in Mexico, and admits the advantage of attacking in South America, but thinks that it would be a much more difficult proposition.

At the end of his translation John McArthur suggests several amendments, among them being that there should also be co-operation on the Pacific coast; and he also makes several objections, among which are: The Great number of troops needed; the policy of giving a foreign Prince to a free Mexico, when they would want their own nominee; the using of black troops; etc.

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In 1651, a French company obtained from the French Government the cession of Cayenne, which had been abandoned since the death of Brétigny. Four or five hundred colonists left France under the leadership of Royville, and the spiritual direction of the Abbé de l'Isle-Marivault, accompanied by several young priests, among whom was Biet. The Abbé fell into the Seine at the departure of the expedition and was drowned, and Biet was persuaded to take his place, much against his will. The expedition stopped some days at Madeira. During the voyage to Madeira, and whilst there, Royville rather tried to ride the high horse over his associates, and after leaving Madeira, during an illness, whilst sleeping on deck, he was stabbed and dropped overboard. At Cayenne, the colonists and adventurers wasted their time building a new fort instead of repairing the old one and sowing grain for the next year. There was continual strife among themselves, aggravated by the attacks of the Caribbee Indians and the running out of provisions. Those of the colonists who remained embarked in a Dutch vessel for Surinam and so to Barbadoes, where the English gave them a good reception. Biet went on to Martinique to try and arrange for another expedition to Cayenne, but the French there treated him as an English spy. He sailed next to Guadeloupe, whence he returned to France. His work is well written, simply and with candour, and makes quite good reading. At the end is a dictionary of the Caribbee Indian language.

Apparently there was considerable rivalry between the publishers of Cooke's account of this voyage and the publishers of Woodes Rogers' account to be the first to get their edition on the market. Cooke's account was first out, but only in a single volume, the later part of the voyage being related in a few compressed pages at the end. The publishers almost immediately reprinted the work and extended it to two volumes, the later part of the voyage occupying the whole of volume two.

Edward Cooke was second captain on board the *Dutchess*, the ship which accompanied the *Duke*, both under Woodes Rogers, on a privateering voyage round the world. Captain Burney says that Cooke's journal and charts are inferior to those published by Woodes Rogers. Dampier, who projected the expedition, and prevailed upon some able persons at Bristol to venture upon the undertaking, went as pilot in the *Duke*. It is generally supposed that De Foe took his "Robinson Crusoe" from the account here given of Alex. Selkirk, as it was the first book containing it.

This expedition sailed across the Pacific Ocean from California to Guam, in the Marianas, in the early part of 1710. On arriving at Guam the author tells how Spaniards there told them that one of their vessels had discovered a group of islands which they called the Solomon Islands, which had not been seen for a great many years.

In March, 1741, Admiral Vernon, with a large fleet, and an army of 9,000 men under the command of Brigadier-General Wentworth, arrived off Carthagena. The divided command, the incompetence and self-conceit of Wentworth, and the natural antipathy between the two characters caused delays which proved fatal. The forts guarding the entrance to the harbour were reduced, and the fleet cut the boom blocking the Boca-Chica, and passed into the harbour. Wentworth delayed his attack on the forts dominating the City for four days, so giving the Spaniards time to recover. When he did assault, his attack was beaten off with heavy loss. The wet season set in, and of the force of 6,600 who had landed more than half were dead or dying. On April 17, the miserable remnant re-embarked, and the fleet returned to Port Royal.

This "Diary" is the official Spanish Account of this unsuccessful attack on Carthagena, drawn up from the accounts sent to the King of Spain by the Viceroy of Santa Fè and his Adjutant-General.

On June 5, 1799, Humboldt and Bonpland, armed with powerful recommendations, sailed from Corunna to the Canary Islands, where they stopped for a short time and made the ascent of the peak of Teneriffe. Thence they proceeded to Caracas in Venezuela, and in Feb., 1800, left the coast for the purpose of exploring the course of the Orinoco. "This trip, which lasted four months, and covered seventeen hundred and twenty-five miles of wild and uninhabited country, had the important result of establishing the existence of a communication between the water-systems of the Orinoco and the Amazon and of determining the exact position of the bifurcation. On 24 Nov. the two friends sailed for Cuba, and after a stay of some months regained the mainland at Cartagena. Ascending the swollen stream of the Magdalena, and crossing the frozen ridges of the Cordilleras, they reached Quito after a tedious and difficult journey, Jan. 6, 1802. There they ascended Picchincha and Chimborazo, and made an expedition to the sources of the Amazon, en route for Lima. At Callao Humboldt observed the transit of Mercury, and studied the fertilizing properties of guano, the introduction of which into Europe was mainly due to his writings. After a year's stay in Mexico, and a short visit to the U.S.A., they returned to Europe."

In this famous expedition Humboldt may justly be regarded as having laid the foundation of the sciences of physical geography and meteorology in their larger bearings. His services to geology were mainly based on his attentive study of the volcanoes of the New World.

La Casas, the Apostle to the Indians and their great defender against Spanish cruelty, was born at Seville in 1474 and died at the great age of ninety-two at Madrid. This drew on him the animosity of his countrymen and was not successful in stopping the atrocities. This work relates principally to the new laws for the Indies drafted by Charles V in 1542, many of which were rescinded later, after the rebellion of Gonzalo Pizarro, as the clauses affecting land-tenure and slave-grants had led to bitter dissatisfaction on the part of the descendants of the first Spanish settlers and conquistadores.

The work was written at the request of Don Lorenzo Ramirez de Prado, of the Council of the Indies, to whom it is dedicated. Leon Pinelo was asked to suggest which of the old laws he considered should be maintained or revived for the common welfare of the Indians, and in doing this work contributed a valuable commentary on the contemporary social and economic history of America.

For many years the town of Pisco, about a hundred and fifty miles south of Lima, had been the centre for the distribution of innumerable examples of pottery, textiles, vessels and ornaments of gold, the records of an ancient civilization in Peru earlier than that of the Incas. The great part of this treasure trove was looted from the prehistoric cemeteries in the Peninsula of Paracas close to Pisco.

During recent years this indiscriminate digging has been forbidden, and excavations are now made in a careful and scientific manner under supervision of the Government. Not the least interesting of the discoveries made is that of examples of remarkable textiles strongly reminiscent of those of ancient Egypt, Persia, China, and India, and the earliest known of American manufacture, the decoration and colouring of which point to an advanced state of civilization, which, however, did not seem to have possessed any form of writing.

The work of Mme. Jean Levillier gives an account of these textiles, with numerous reproductions of special examples. The soil and climate of Paracas have been singularly favourable to their preservation. The former is impregnated with saltpetre, which has acted as a preservative, and the latter is almost entirely free from moisture.

This important Biography covers a period of twelve years in the early history of Peru, Panama, Quito, Charcas (Bolivia), Chili, Tucumán, Paraguay and Rio de la Plata. It is almost entirely based on original manuscripts found in the Archives of Spain and America and is profusely illustrated with views of places in Peru, and also reproduces for the first time many of the drawings contained in the original unpublished Chronicle written by Poma de Ayala in Cuzco between the years 1580 and 1620.

Don Francisco de Toledo, Viceroy of Peru from 1569 to 1581, worked unceasingly to ameliorate the condition of the Indians. Unfortunately his reforms worked against many of the interests of the Spanish settlers and brought him numerous enemies, who took every opportunity to attack him, both during his lifetime and after his death. The charges brought against him were, firstly, that he had unjustly executed Tupac Amaru, the last descendant of the Inca Kings; secondly, that he had used his position to illegally acquire a large fortune; and thirdly, that he had been accumulating incorrect data concerning the history and origin of the Incas.

A large part of the first volume relates to the execution of Tupac Amaru, and shews that the sentence, although severe, was just according to the laws of the time. The work also deals with Toledo's disciplinary reforms, his efforts to enforce justice, and to protect the Indians, to keep the Judges and the Ecclesiastical Authorities to their duty, and his endeavours to make the Government agents respect their obligations towards their King and towards the Indians. It also tells of the new cities he founded and of the schools and hospitals he created all over the Viceroyalty and of the many other examples of his colossal constructive and administrative work.

Francisco Lopez de Gomara was the Secretary of Cortes and the oldest of the proper historians of the New World. The works he produced, besides one or two of less consequence, were, first, his "History of the Indies," which, after the Spanish fashion, begins with the creation of the world and ends with the glories of Spain, though it is chiefly devoted to Columbus and the discovery and conquest of Peru; and the second, his "Chronicle of New Spain," which is the history and life of Cortes. A SMUGGLING EXPEDITION TO SOUTH AMERICA.

The "Colonel Allan," 332 Tons, was formerly a French Sloop of War, named "Le Bernie," mounting 18 guns. She sailed from Gravesend, August 19, 1817, on a voyage to South America. Her captain was Donald McLellan and the author of this extremely interesting journal was evidently the surgeon or medical officer on board. The total complement numbered thirty-seven.

After a voyage of fifty-five days, the River Plate was reached, and anchor finally dropped at Buenos Aires. The author tells how he stayed at the "Three Kings" there at inclusive terms of two and a half dollars a day. He gives a long description of the city which then had a population of 50,000. He remarks that "the streets are very narrow and formed into squares, and altho some are paved the generality of them are not, and so shamefully neglected that after heavy rains they are almost impassable and the horses often sink into the mud up to their bellies." Attempts had been made by some English settlers to cultivate some of the surrounding fertile country but the inhabitants drove their cattle into the plantations. They had no redress and if any opposition had been made would doubtless have been murdered. It was highly dangerous to walk the streets after dark for fear of being killed.

From Buenos Aires the ship sailed to Monte Video, then in Portuguese hands. The civil population was only from five to six thousand but some nine thousand troops were quartered there. The city was being besieged by the independent patriot General Artigas.

They next sailed through the Strait of Le Maire to Valparaiso, which they made in 39 days despite 11 days of storm. The previous trip they had made the passage in 28 days which was the fastest then on record. As it was they arrived some days earlier than boats which had left Buenos Aires days before them. The people at Valparaiso were daily expecting an attack from the Royalist Army at Lima and were preparing fortifications. Supplies were taken aboard and Christmas was spent at sea. On calling at Pisagua they were mistaken by the inhabitants for a pirate from Buenos Aires or Valparaiso. An account is given of the vast number of Indian Graves found at various spots along the coast. For a time the boat sails between the villages of Ilo, Moro de Sama and Pisagua carrying on an illicit trade. Whilst ashore at Pisagua with the Captain and the first mate the author was suddenly ambushed by a party of soldiers. After endeavouring to escape into the sea he was shot at and wounded and with his friends taken

prisoner and escorted inland by the military under Don Pedro Obligado to Tarapaca. Here they were kept prisoners awaiting the arrival of the magistrate or sub-delegate from Pisco. They were able to satisfy this gentleman that they were only on the coast for taking in water and supplies and were ultimately released on paying the expense of their capture, and giving some \$1200 worth of presents to their friends! A long account is given of Tarapaca and its neighbourhood.

The Captain managed to steer clear of several Spanish warships which he believed were on the lookout for him, and put in at Pacasmayo, to the north of Trujillo, where he was able to dispose of the best part of his merchandise to advantage. Whilst here he learnt that Spanish forces had just sailed to the south looking for him and that another vessel was at a short distance to the north. He therefore set sail for the Galapagos Islands. On the voyage one of the crew mutinied and on ordering some of the others to flog him they also refused and were put into irons. He feared a repetition of what had recently occurred on the "Liberty," whose crew had mutinied, set their officers on shore and turned pirates, and this determined him to get straight back to the River Plate.

The author gives a fairly long account of the Galapagos Islands and then describes the voyage back through the strait of Le Maire to Monte Video where the mutineers were paid off and set on shore on May 10, 1818.

This manuscript, written by an anonymous Jesuit priest, tells how in 1731 Father Francisco Antonio Gonzalez reported to the Spanish Government the great spiritual needs of the natives in the Orinoco Region, and in consequence Col. Carlos Lucré was appointed to the command in the districts of Cumana and Guayana with instructions to fortify the district against the incursions of the Carib Indians and other slave raiders, and to give all possible help to the Jesuit Missionaries. The first missionaries appointed were Father Joseph Gumilla, who afterwards achieved fame as the historian and explorer of the Orinoco, Father Bernardo Rotella and a companion. They set off down the Rivers Casanare and Meta, then down the Orinoco to the sea, where they were to await the arrival of Don Carlos Lucré. The Governor, however, failed to turn up, and Father Gumilla set off to obtain help from Trinidad which he secured only at great difficulty and personal expense. XII contains an appendix to the History of the Missions in New Spain, including a long account of the martyrdom of the nine Jesuit missionaries in Florida in 1566.

Of special interest is the chapter in which the writer mentions Admiral Pedro Porter Casanate's expedition. Philip IV. had ordered him to reconnoitre the Californian lands on the Pacific, "to seek for pearls, and colonize the unknown lands and spread the Catholic Faith," and he took with him some Jesuit Missionaries on his voyage of discovery.

Previous to this, however, a Jesuit, Father Jacinto Cortes, had already trodden on Californian soil, and a letter of his, quoted in this book, describes his meeting with the natives.
