THIS IS THE EDITIO PRINCEPS AND OF VERY GREAT RARITY. It was printed by Ulric Zell, at Cologne, about 1468. [See Proctor, No. 890]. To Panzer it was quite unknown; Hain mentions it, but without having seen it; and to Brunet it was known only through Hain. Graesse appears to have taken it also from the same source. Cave gives a short account of the author, but knew of no earlier edition of this book than that of Cologne, 1591. According to Cave the author was a Cistercian monk of the monastery of Heisterbach in the diocese of Cologne, and subsequently Prior of the monastery of St. Peter, near Bonn. He lived at the beginning of the thirteenth century. A critical edition of the "Dialogus Miraculorum" was published at Bonn in 1851. It is of great interest for the History of the Crusades and is full of German Legends and Folk-Lore of the Period.

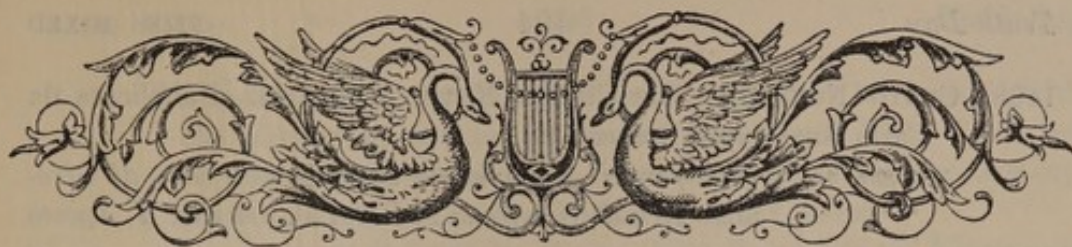

Chettle signs the address to the reader on the errors of the press, complaining of them: he was a good judge upon the subject, having himself been originally a printer."—Bibl. Heber. part iv. No. 350. A notice of the work, taken from the second edition, will be found in Collier's "Bibl. Cat." i. pp. 129-31. Chettle here alludes to Shakespeare under the name of Melicert, and seems to intimate that the great poet had received from the queen special marks of favour, which he ought to requite by some tribute to her memory. On the 7th June, 1603, Matthew Lawe was fined for issuing a surreptitious and unauthorized impression of this poem. As he stated that he had sold all the impression but a hundred copies, it is remarkable that not one with his name is known to exist. 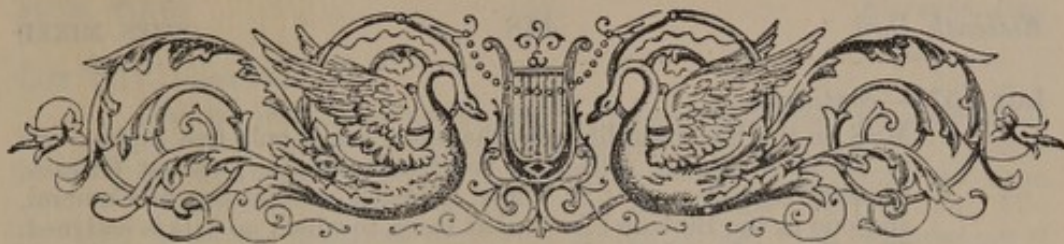

It might be supposed that the Chronicles of St. Denis would be frequently found in MS. collections. But the contrary is the case. In Paulin Pâris's catalogue of the "MSS. François de la Bibliothèque du Roi" only one codex is described, and that is of the fifteenth century. In the "Bibliothèque Historique de la France," by Le Long, two copies are mentioned as then in the Bibliothèque du Roi, and one in the Abbey of St. Victor. The treasures of that abbey fell to the Paris Bibliothèque at the time of the Revolution, and if the MS. had been still amongst them it would have been described by Paulin Pâris. MSS. in the European libraries there is a list of only five copies : one in Sir Th. Phillipps' collection, fourteenth century, one at Orleans, fifteenth century, one at St. Omer, fifteenth century, one at Cambrai, and one in the Bibl. de l'Arsenal at Paris, to which no date is assigned. The Chronicles of St. Denis end properly with the accession of Charles VI in 1380, but in this copy the annals are continued without any break to the year 1383, and close with the death of the Count of Flanders. Three leaves seem to be deficient in the volume. There have been many editions of the book, chiefly ancient impressions ; the latest and best is that edited by M. Paulin Paris. The miniatures in this grand MS. are of a superior character for architecture, costume, armour and general details. Some are in *camaieu gris* on chequered grounds, and there are many representations of the ships of the period. The first page of the text has four miniatures on it and is surrounded by a decorative border of spiked ivy-leaves.

It notices, also, the deaths of the Emperor's sisters, Maria of Hungary, and Leonora (the widow of Francis I) of France in the same year." [This note occurs at the end of the Chronicle of Don Alonzo Onzeno (*see last entry*)].

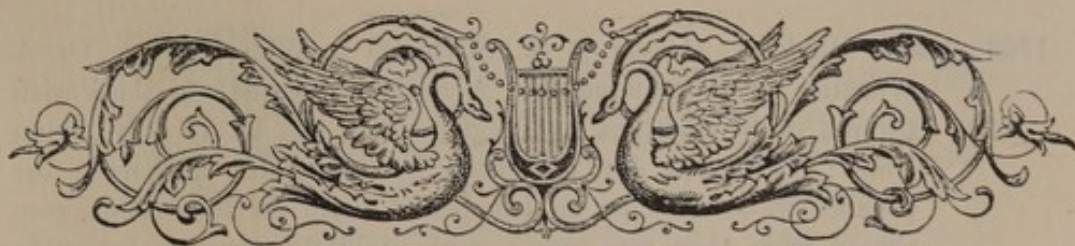

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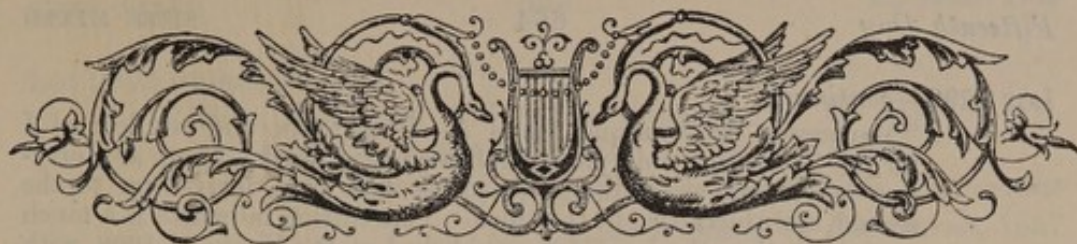

For the sake of distinction, we may call these editions Nos. 1, 2 and 3. No. 1 is that described above, and appears to be the prior of the two editions printed by R. Field. It has a line of errata on the last page. The first four maps are plain, the fifth coloured. IT IS EXTREMELY RARE. No. 2 is identical with No. 1, except that the words, "With Geographical Mappes," etc. are omitted from the title and there is no line of errata on the last leaf, the errata being corrected in the text. No. 3, of which there is a copy in the King's library in the British Museum, is an entirely different edition. It has the same wording in the title as No. 1, but with the addition, after the words "winning of them," "diligently made by Baptista Boazio," and the imprint is "*Printed at London by Roger Ward dwelling vpon Lambard Hill, neere olde Fish-streete.*" It is in a smaller type than Field's editions, and consequently occupies only thirty-seven pages instead of fifty-two, but the text is precisely the same, even to the line of errata on the last leaf; but there are only three words of errata instead of the four which appear in Field's first edition, the first word being printed correctly in the text. In both of Field's editions the following notice is printed at the back of the title: "The Reader must vnderstand, that this Discourse was dedicated, and intended to have bene imprinted somewhat before the comming of the Spanish Fleete vpon our coast of England: but by casuallie the same was forgotten and slacked for a time of some better leasure." But in Ward's edition this notice is on the recto of the leaf following the title, and below it is given: "The Order and maner for the true placing of the Mappes in this Booke.

S^t Augustine in fol. 31."

It is curious that all mention of the fifth and most important map is omitted, though that is the only one bearing the engraver's name, "Baptista B." which is given in full on the title to this edition. Mr. Grenville's copies are neither of them quite satisfactory. Having a very short and poor copy of No. 2, he took the title and following leaf from that to perfect his tall and clean copy of No. 1. So that, though this contains the plates, no mention of them is found on the title. From the catalogue of the Grenville library it would appear that the copy there described contained only four out of the five maps, but it has the fifth, which bears the following inscription: "The Famous West Indian voyadge made by the English fleete of 23 shippes and Barkes, wherin were gotten the Townes of S^t Jago: S^t Domingo: Cartagena and S^t Augustines, the same being begon from Plimmouth in the moneth of September 1585, and ended at Portesmouth in Julie 1586, the whole course of the saide Voidge being plainlie described by the pricked line. Newlie come forth by Baptista B." (Boazio). The other four maps are printed from the same plates as those in the Latin edition of the book printed at Leyden, 1588, but this fifth map appears to have been engraved for the English edition only.

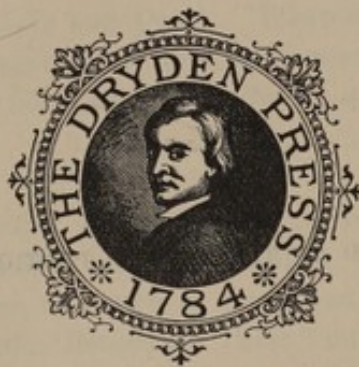
