** A BEAUTIFULLY WRITTEN AND DECORATED BOOK OF HOURS IN VERY FINE CONDITION AND WITH WIDE MARGINS. THE HANDWRITING IS ONE OF THE FINEST POSSIBLE EXAMPLES OF ITALIAN SCRIPT. The following entry in the Calendar at the end of March, "adi xxiiii icōmincia el Jubileo in sancta maria del fiore" (i.e. the Cathedral at Florence) makes it almost certain that the manuscript is of Florentine execution.

The full-page miniatures are as follows:

- i (Folio 13-14). Christ in the garden of Gethsemane. In the fore-ground three disciples sleeping. On the opposite page a large initial D, with a miniature of the Betrayal. Full borders.

A remarkably similar manuscript, of which the miniatures at any rate are probably from the same hand, was sold at these rooms on May 21, 1928 (lot 34, illustrated in the catalogue).

** The seven full-page miniatures are of exceptionally fine quality, and are the work of a miniaturist of first-rate rank. The subjects are as follows: (1) Christ, depicted half-length, in act of blessing; (2) The Crucifixion; (3) Virgin and Child; (4) The Annunciation; (5) King David; (6) A Burial Service; (7) Mass of St. Gregory. On fly-leaves at end are the names of some early 17th Century owners.

Blank leaves at the end contain inscriptions and signatures, after the manner of an Album Amicorum, of distinguished persons to whom the book was shown during the 17th Century. They include Leopold, Archduke of Austria (1585-1632), and his wife, Claudia de' Medici. An interesting and very unusual feature.

On one of the blank leaves at end is an analysis of the life of St. Wilfrid, Archbishop of York, which suggests some local connection with this manuscript; bound in original wooden boards, covered with doeskin, leather defective* (6 $\frac{3}{4}$ in. by 4 $\frac{1}{8}$ in.). ** MANUSCRIPTS OF THE ENGLISH VERSION OF MANDEVILLE'S TRAVELS VERY RARELY OCCUR FOR SALE BY AUCTION, AND NONE SEEMS TO BE RECORDED FOR OVER 40 YEARS.

Of the three known English versions, two are represented by single manuscripts, both in the British Museum (Cotton and Egerton collections). This present manuscript belongs to an abridged version which was the basis of all the printed texts up to 1725 when the Cotton manuscript was edited. The Egerton version was not published till 1889 when it was edited for the Roxburghe Club by Sir George Warner.

Mandeville's Travels is one of the first attempts to bring secular subjects within the domain of English prose. "The success of the 'Travels' was remarkable. Avowedly written for the unlearned, and combining interest of matter and a quaint simplicity of style, the book hit the popular taste, and in a marvel-loving age its most extravagant features probably had the greatest charm. No mediaeval work was more widely diffused in the vernacular, and in English especially it lost nothing, errors apart, by translation, the philological value of the several versions being also considerable."—D.N.B. ART. MANDEVILLE.

At the foot of the first leaf of text appears a shield of arms, *azure a maunch ermine debruised by a bendlet gules, an annulet for difference*, being those of a member of the ancient Yorkshire family of Norton. It seems probable, therefore, that this manuscript has been handed down in the Brockman family since the time of Sir William Brockman of Newington (d. 1654), whose sister Margaret married Valentine Norton (*cf. Berry's British Genealogies*).

** THIRTEENTH CENTURY GERMAN ILLUMINATED MANUSCRIPTS OF THE FIRST CLASS ARE OF THE GREATEST RARITY. IN MOST COLLECTIONS THEY ARE VERY POORLY REPRESENTED, IF AT ALL, AND THEY VERY SELDOM COME INTO THE MARKET.

In the Year Book for 1930, published by the Walraff-Richartz Museum in Cologne, Dr. Hanns Swarzenski in comparing the present manuscript with the Evangelarium in the Aschaffenburg Schlossbibliothek, remarks of the miniatures that their artistic whole, their proportion, the style of dress of the figures, and the colour characteristics show an obvious connection with the Aschaffenburg manuscript, even though it cannot at present be directly connected with the same artist (art. cit. p. 9). A study of the eight illustrations there reproduced proves the superiority of the decoration of the present manuscript over the Aschaffenburg codex.

THE FOUR FULL-PAGE MINIATURES ARE AMONG THE FINEST SPECIMENS OF GERMAN ART OF THE PERIOD. The faces and figures are executed with greatest artistic feeling and skill, and the realistic treatment of the intricate folds of the drapery is remarkable. They are painted in brilliant colours on grounds of burnished gold, within rectangular frames of bands of pink or blue, enclosing a patterned band of the opposite colour. The gold backgrounds are somewhat rubbed. The subjects are as follows:

1. THE ANNUNCIATION. The Virgin is seated beneath a cusped roof. The Holy Spirit is descending in the form of an eagle.

2. THE HOLY FAMILY. The Virgin is seated nursing the infant Christ with Joseph standing by leaning on a crutch. His hair is encircled with a wreath of roses. Behind are two angels holding lighted candles.
3. THE CRUCIFIXION. By the cross are the Virgin Mary, Mary Magdalene and S. John. The Virgin is supporting Mary Magdalene, who has a sword in her breast. The face of Mary Magdalene is rubbed.
4. CHRIST ENTHRONED WITHIN A MANDORLA. At the corners the emblems of the four Evangelists.

THE FULL-PAGE INITIAL B IS AN EXCEEDINGLY FINE EXAMPLE OF GERMAN DECORATIVE WORK. It is of spiral design with interlacing foliate ornaments painted in brilliant colours on a ground of burnished gold. The remaining ten larger and four smaller initials are all exceptionally fine and decorative examples of similar work.

The side or bottom margin of about five leaves cut away, otherwise in good condition throughout.

** The Document proceeds to give an account of the first meeting at which were present Generals Knox, Huntington, Hand, Steuben, and Captain Shaw, and sets forth in great detail the principles, purposes, and methods of organization and other data connected with the proposed Society, of which Washington was to become the first President on its actual establishment shortly afterwards. Baron von Steuben, the famous 'Prussian drill master,' author of 'Regulations for the Order and Discipline of the Troops of the United States,' and member of Andre's Court Martial, signs as President provisionally and doubtless as the senior officer present; no official President of the Society, prior to George Washington, being recognised. The name of the Society is explained, and the qualification for membership. No reference appears to the system of hereditary membership which later attracted criticism. The Preamble runs as follows:

LOT 90—*continued.*

"It having pleased The Supreme Governor of the Universe, in the disposition of human affairs, to cause the separation of the Colonies of North America from the denomination of Great Britain, and after a bloody conflict of eight years, to establish them Free, Independent, and Sovereign States, connected by alliances, founded on reciprocal advantages, with some of the great Princes and Powers of the Earth . . . The following principles shall be immutable; and form the basis of the Society of the Cincinnati.

An incessant attention to preserve inviolate those exalted rights and liberties of human nature, for which they have fought and without which the high rank of a *rational being* is a curse instead of a blessing."

The badge of the Society was a figure of Cincinnatus as symbolising Washington and other patriots, who had left their rural affairs to fight for their country.

On fly-leaves at end are the names of some early 17th Century owners.

Blank leaves at the end contain inscriptions and signatures, after the manner of an Album Amicorum, of distinguished persons to whom the book was shown during the 17th Century. They include Leopold, Archduke of Austria (1585-1632), and his wife, Claudia de' Medici. An interesting and very unusual feature.

** MANUSCRIPTS OF THE ENGLISH VERSION OF MANDEVILLE'S TRAVELS VERY RARELY OCCUR FOR SALE BY AUCTION, AND NONE SEEMS TO BE RECORDED FOR OVER 40 YEARS.

Of the three known English versions, two are represented by single manuscripts, both in the British Museum (Cotton and Egerton collections). This present manuscript belongs to an abridged version which was the basis of all the printed texts up to 1725 when the Cotton manuscript was edited. The Egerton version was not published till 1889 when it was edited for the Roxburghe Club by Sir George Warner.

Mandeville's Travels is one of the first attempts to bring secular subjects within the domain of English prose. "The success of the 'Travels' was remarkable. Avowedly written for the unlearned, and combining interest of matter and a quaint simplicity of style, the book hit the popular taste, and in a marvel-loving age its most extravagant features probably had the greatest charm. No mediaeval work was more widely diffused in the vernacular, and in English especially it lost nothing, errors apart, by translation, the philological value of the several versions being also considerable."—D.N.B. ART. MANDEVILLE.

At the foot of the first leaf of text appears a shield of arms, *azure a maunch ermine debruised by a bendlet gules, an annulet for difference*, being those of a member of the ancient Yorkshire family of Norton. It seems probable, therefore, that this manuscript has been handed down in the Brockman family since the time of Sir William Brockman of Newington (d. 1654), whose sister Margaret married Valentine Norton (*cf. Berry's British Genealogies*).

In the Year Book for 1930, published by the Walraff-Richartz Museum in Cologne, Dr. Hanns Swarzenski in comparing the present manuscript with the Evangelarium in the Aschaffenburg Schlossbibliothek, remarks of the miniatures that their artistic whole, their proportion, the style of dress of the figures, and the colour characteristics show an obvious connection with the Aschaffenburg manuscript, even though it cannot at present be directly connected with the same artist (art. cit. p. 9). A study of the eight illustrations there reproduced proves the superiority of the decoration of the present manuscript over the Aschaffenburg codex.

THE FOUR FULL-PAGE MINIATURES ARE AMONG THE FINEST SPECIMENS OF GERMAN ART OF THE PERIOD. The faces and figures are executed with greatest artistic feeling and skill, and the realistic treatment of the intricate folds of the drapery is remarkable. They are painted in brilliant colours on grounds of burnished gold, within rectangular frames of bands of pink or blue, enclosing a patterned band of the opposite colour. The gold backgrounds are somewhat rubbed. The subjects are as follows:

1. THE ANNUNCIATION. The Virgin is seated beneath a cusped roof. The Holy Spirit is descending in the form of an eagle.

2. THE HOLY FAMILY. The Virgin is seated nursing the infant Christ with Joseph standing by leaning on a crutch. His hair is encircled with a wreath of roses. Behind are two angels holding lighted candles.
3. THE CRUCIFIXION. By the cross are the Virgin Mary, Mary Magdalene and S. John. The Virgin is supporting Mary Magdalene, who has a sword in her breast. The face of Mary Magdalene is rubbed.
4. CHRIST ENTHRONED WITHIN A MANDORLA. At the corners the emblems of the four Evangelists.

THE FULL-PAGE INITIAL B IS AN EXCEEDINGLY FINE EXAMPLE OF GERMAN DECORATIVE WORK. It is of spiral design with interlacing foliate ornaments painted in brilliant colours on a ground of burnished gold. The remaining ten larger and four smaller initials are all exceptionally fine and decorative examples of similar work.

The following principles shall be immutable; and form the basis of the Society of the Cincinnati.

An incessant attention to preserve inviolate those exalted rights and liberties of human nature, for which they have fought and without which the high rank of a *rational being* is a curse instead of a blessing."

The badge of the Society was a figure of Cincinnatus as symbolising Washington and other patriots, who had left their rural affairs to fight for their country.

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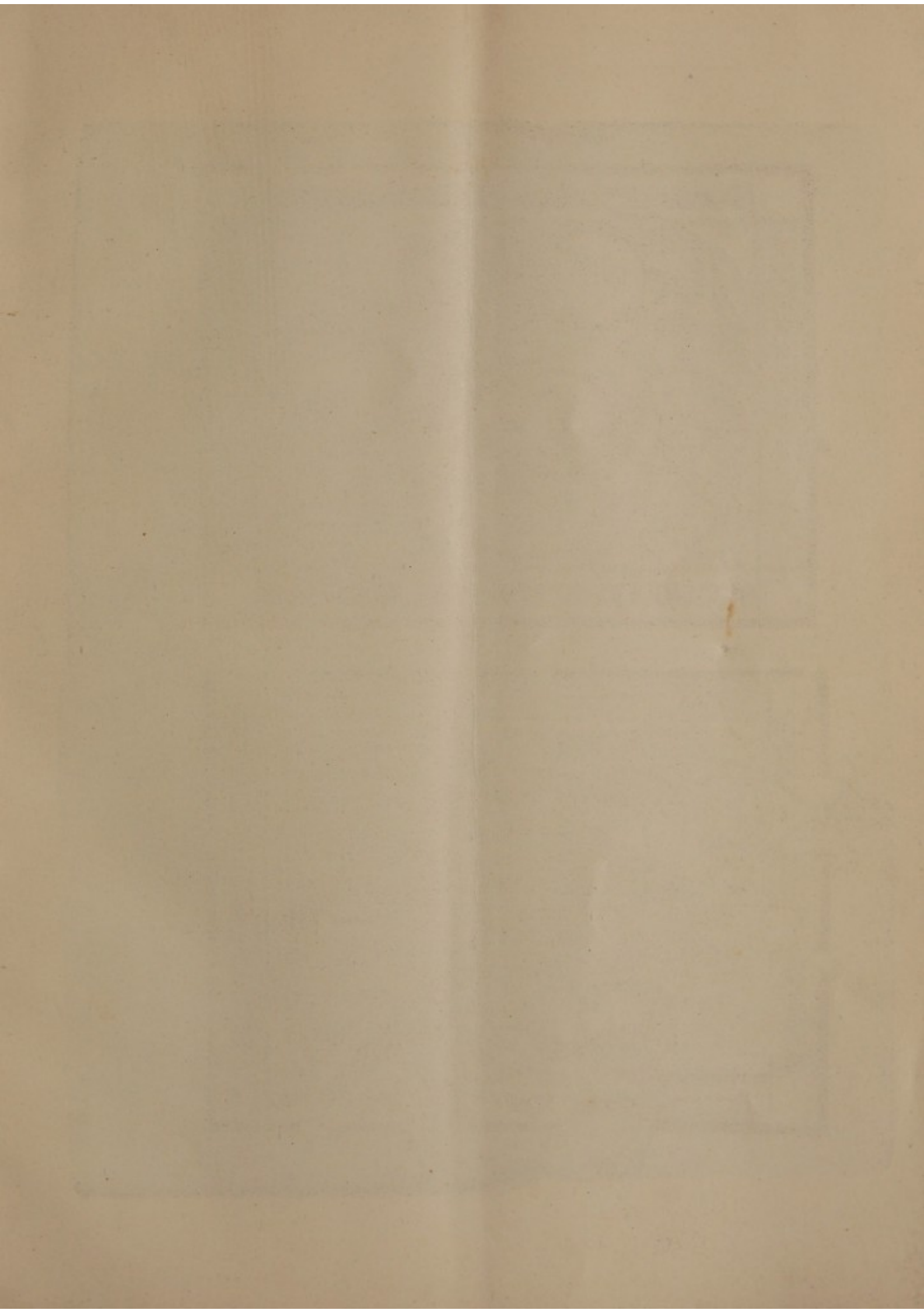

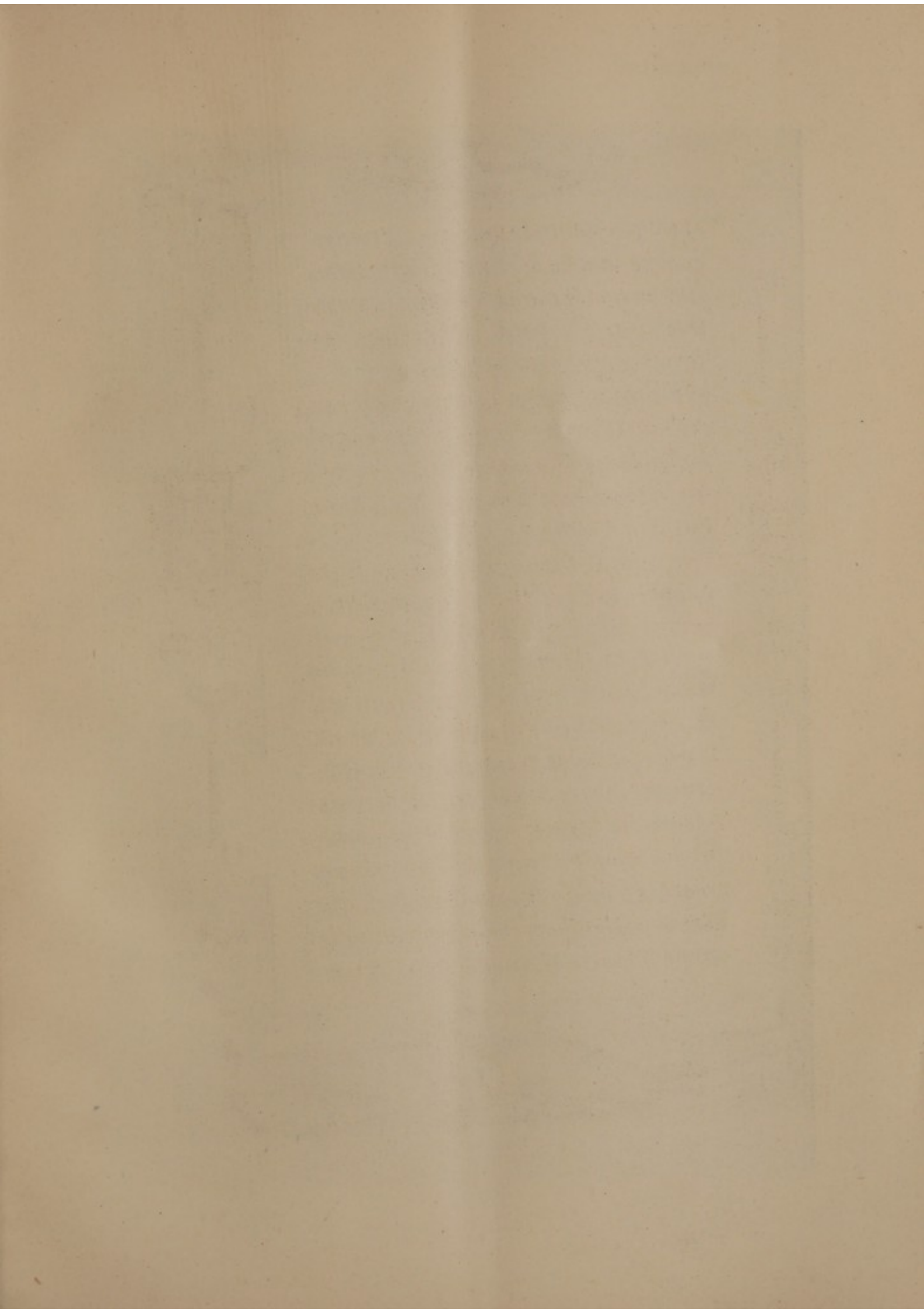

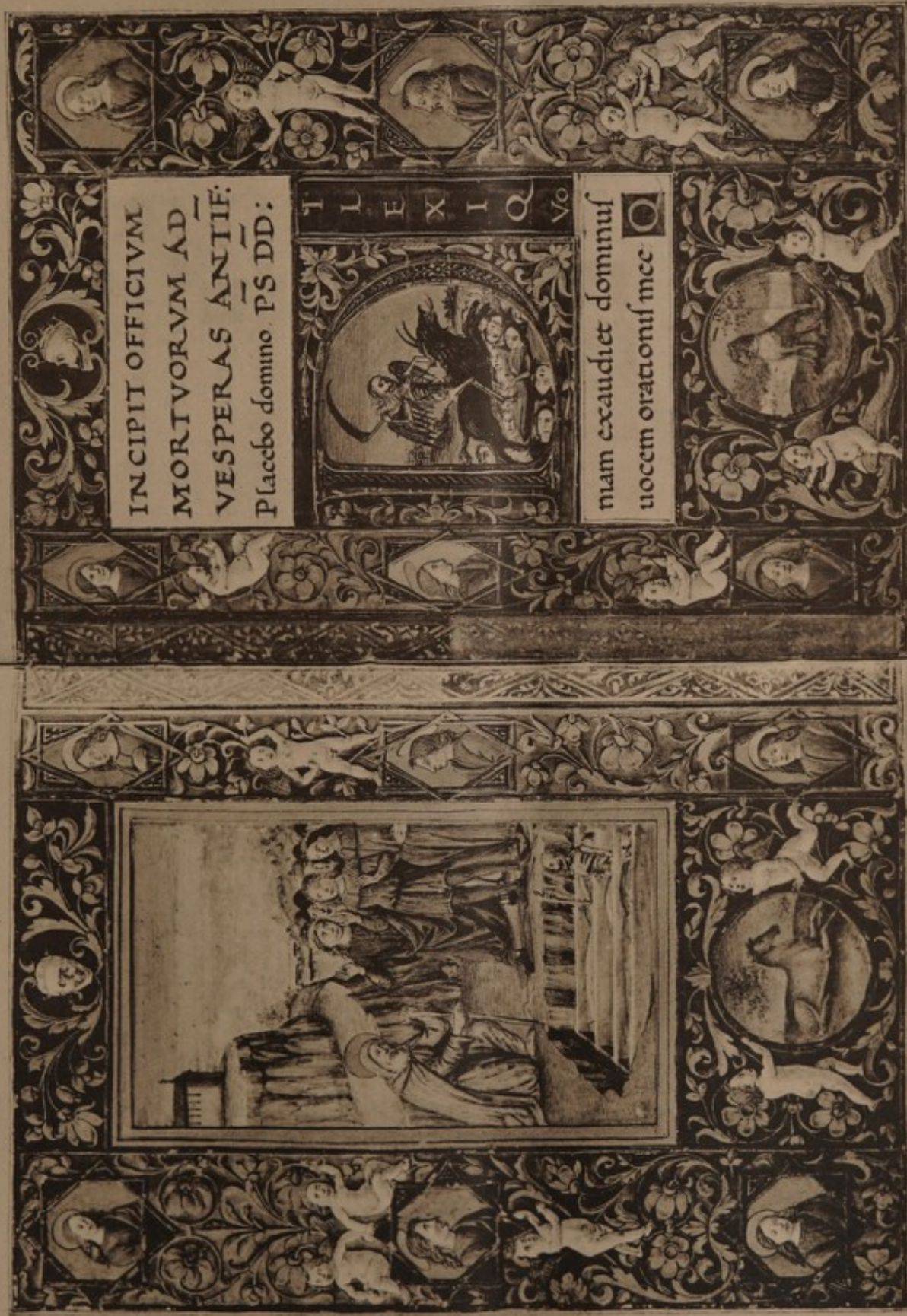
** A BEAUTIFULLY WRITTEN AND DECORATED BOOK OF HOURS IN VERY FINE CONDITION AND WITH WIDE MARGINS. THE HANDWRITING IS ONE OF THE FINEST POSSIBLE EXAMPLES OF ITALIAN SCRIPT. The following entry in the Calendar at the end of March, "adi xxiiii icōmincia el Jubileo in sancta maria del fiore" (i.e. the Cathedral at Florence) makes it almost certain that the manuscript is of Florentine execution.

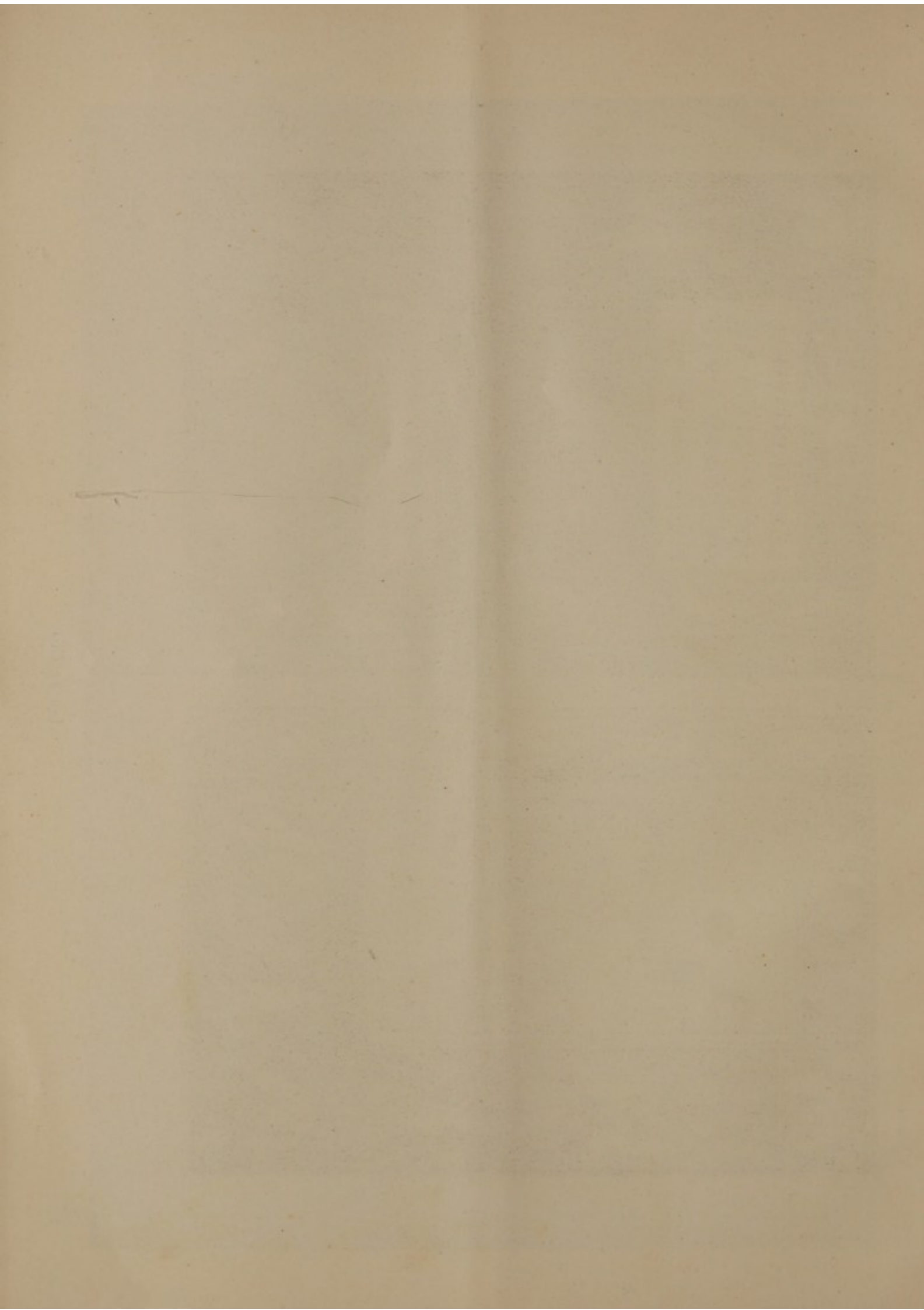

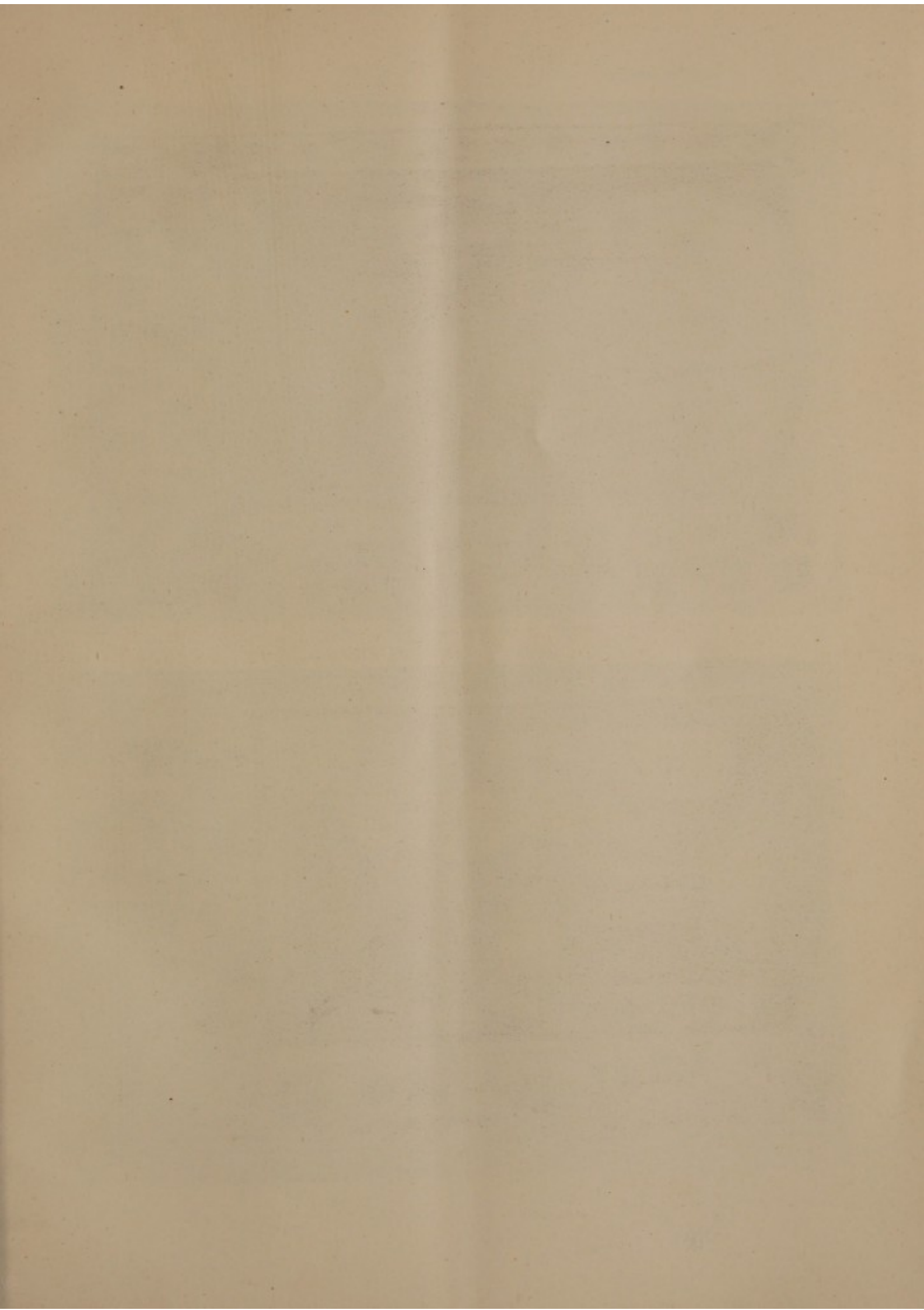

- iii (Folio 164-5). Death admonished by a Saint beckoning his victims towards the grave. On the opposite page initial D enclosing miniature of Death with scythe riding over the dead. Full borders. In the lower border of one page a tethered hind, of the other a tethered lion.

A remarkably similar manuscript, of which the miniatures at any rate are probably from the same hand, was sold at these rooms on May 21, 1928 (lot 34, illustrated in the catalogue).

* The seven full-page miniatures are of exceptionally fine quality, and are the work of a miniaturist of first-rate rank. The subjects are as follows: (1) Christ, depicted half-length, in act of blessing; (2) The Crucifixion; (3) Virgin and Child; (4) The Annunciation; (5) King David; (6) A Burial Service; (7) Mass of St. Gregory. On fly-leaves at end are the names of some early 17th Century owners.

Blank leaves at the end contain inscriptions and signatures, after the manner of an Album Amicorum, of distinguished persons to whom the book was shown during the 17th Century. They include Leopold, Archduke of Austria (1585-1632), and his wife, Claudia de' Medici. An interesting and very unusual feature.

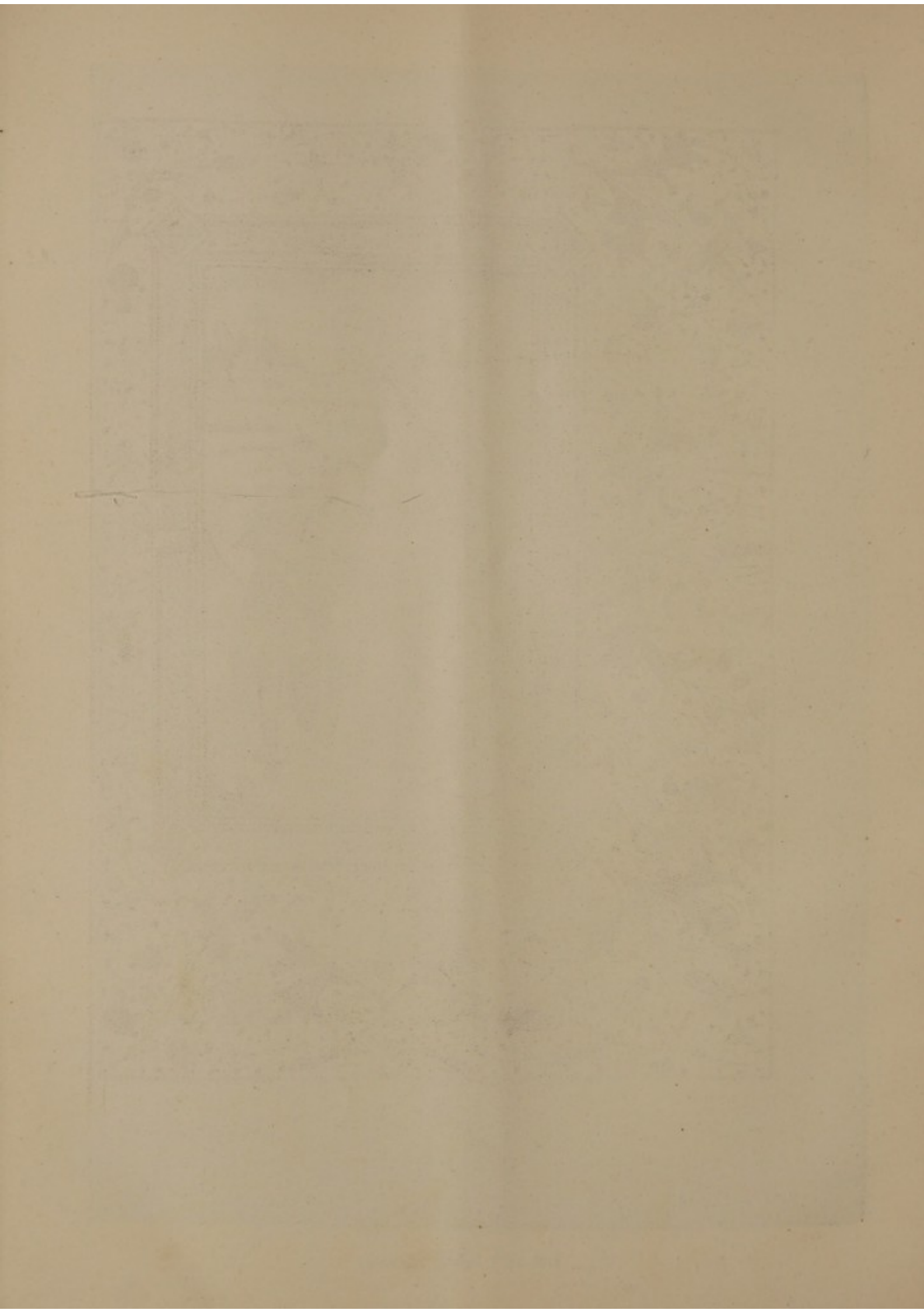

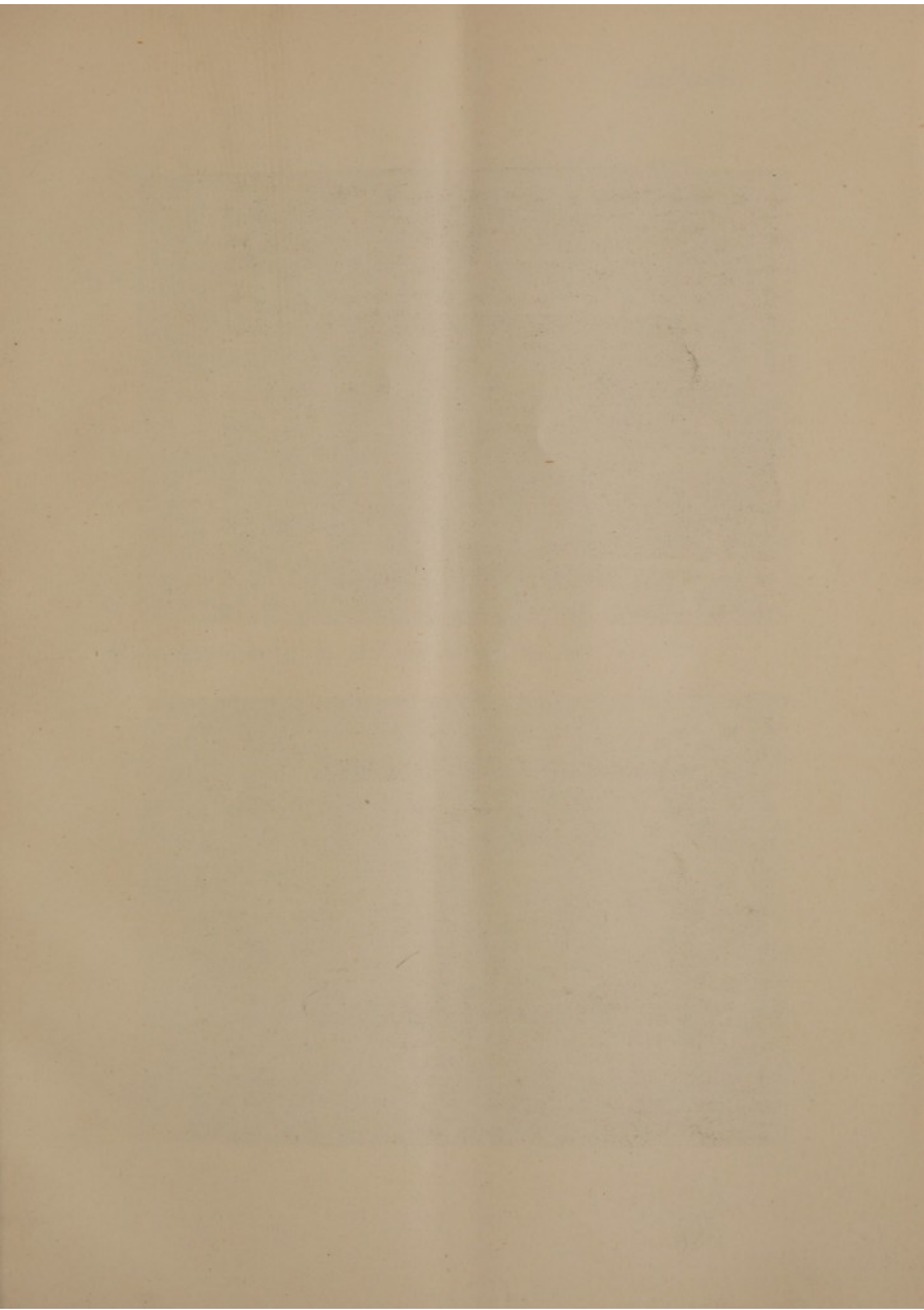

At one time the manuscript belonged to the Preston family, and a rebus on the name (a tun within a press) is found painted on the fly-leaf preceeding the calendar, with a coat-of-arms of a member of the Preston family, probably executed in the 16th Century.

On one of the blank leaves at end is an analysis of the life of St. Wilfrid, Archbishop of York, which suggests some local connection with this manuscript; bound in original wooden boards, covered with doeskin, leather defective* (6¾ in. by 4½ in.). 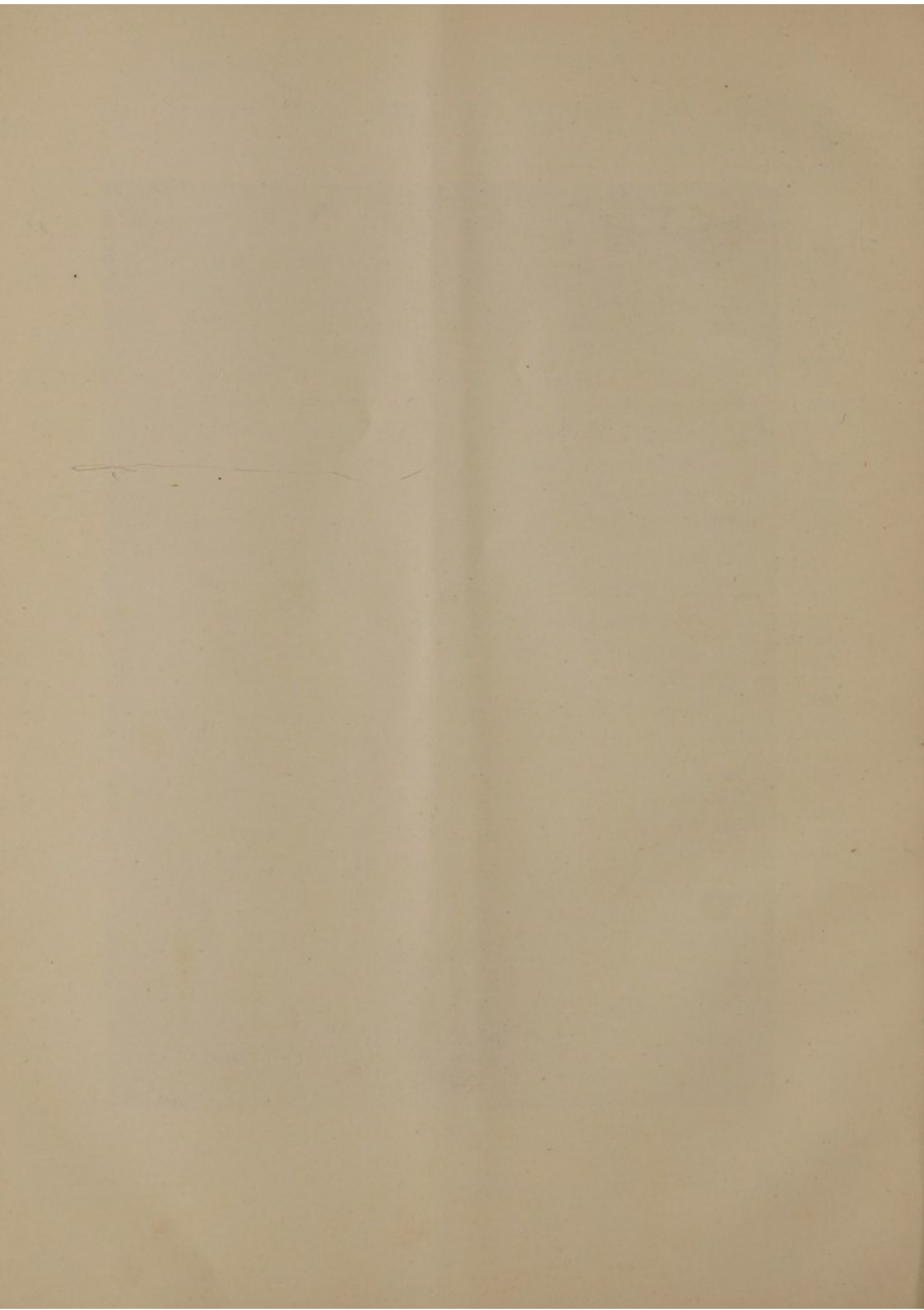
** MANUSCRIPTS OF THE ENGLISH VERSION OF MANDEVILLE'S TRAVELS VERY RARELY OCCUR FOR SALE BY AUCTION, AND NONE SEEMS TO BE RECORDED FOR OVER 40 YEARS.

Of the three known English versions, two are represented by single manuscripts, both in the British Museum (Cotton and Egerton collections). This present manuscript belongs to an abridged version which was the basis of all the printed texts up to 1725 when the Cotton manuscript was edited. The Egerton version was not published till 1889 when it was edited for the Roxburghe Club by Sir George Warner.

Mandeville's Travels is one of the first attempts to bring secular subjects within the domain of English prose. "The success of the 'Travels' was remarkable. Avowedly written for the unlearned, and combining interest of matter and a quaint simplicity of style, the book hit the popular taste, and in a marvel-loving age its most extravagant features probably had the greatest charm. No mediaeval work was more widely diffused in the vernacular, and in English especially it lost nothing, errors apart, by translation, the philological value of the several versions being also considerable."—D.N.B. ART. MANDEVILLE.

At the foot of the first leaf of text appears a shield of arms, *azure a maunch ermine debruised by a bendlet gules, an annulet for difference*, being those of a member of the ancient Yorkshire family of Norton. It seems probable, therefore, that this manuscript has been handed down in the Brockman family since the time of Sir William Brockman of Newington (d. 1654), whose sister Margaret married Valentine Norton (*cf. Berry's British Genealogies*).

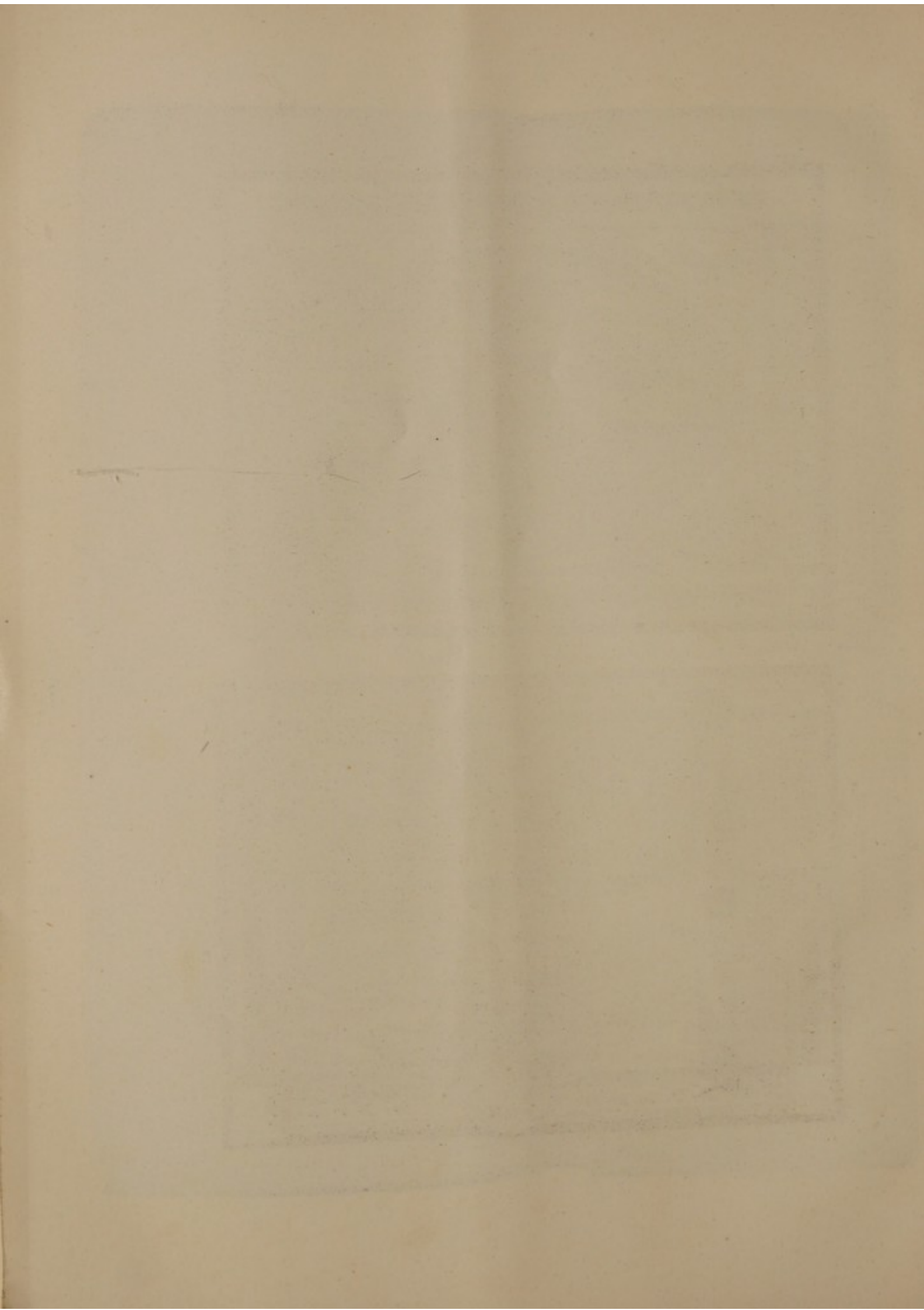
In the Year Book for 1930, published by the Walraff-Richartz Museum in Cologne, Dr. Hanns Swarzenski in comparing the present manuscript with the Evangelarium in the Aschaffenburg Schlossbibliothek, remarks of the miniatures that their artistic whole, their proportion, the style of dress of the figures, and the colour characteristics show an obvious connection with the Aschaffenburg manuscript, even though it cannot at present be directly connected with the same artist (art. cit. p. 9). A study of the eight illustrations there reproduced proves the superiority of the decoration of the present manuscript over the Aschaffenburg codex.

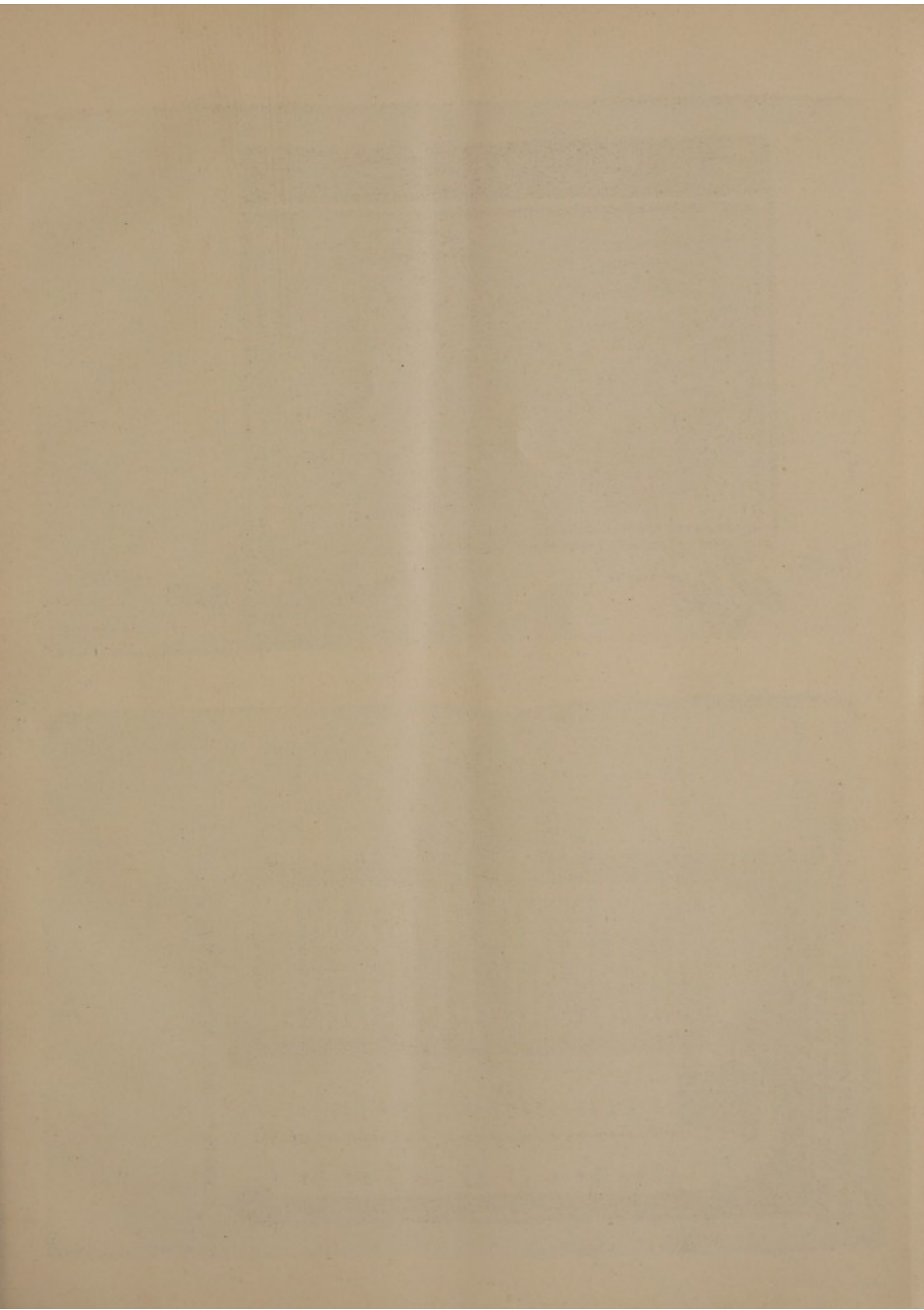
THE FOUR FULL-PAGE MINIATURES ARE AMONG THE FINEST SPECIMENS OF GERMAN ART OF THE PERIOD. The faces and figures are executed with greatest artistic feeling and skill, and the realistic treatment of the intricate folds of the drapery is remarkable. They are painted in brilliant colours on grounds of burnished gold, within rectangular frames of bands of pink or blue, enclosing a patterned band of the opposite colour. The gold backgrounds are somewhat rubbed. The subjects are as follows:

1. THE ANNUNCIATION. The Virgin is seated beneath a cusped roof. The Holy Spirit is descending in the form of an eagle.

2. THE HOLY FAMILY. The Virgin is seated nursing the infant Christ with Joseph standing by leaning on a crutch. His hair is encircled with a wreath of roses. Behind are two angels holding lighted candles.
3. THE CRUCIFIXION. By the cross are the Virgin Mary, Mary Magdalene and S. John. The Virgin is supporting Mary Magdalene, who has a sword in her breast. The face of Mary Magdalene is rubbed.
4. CHRIST ENTHRONED WITHIN A MANDORLA. At the corners the emblems of the four Evangelists.

THE FULL-PAGE INITIAL B IS AN EXCEEDINGLY FINE EXAMPLE OF GERMAN DECORATIVE WORK. It is of spiral design with interlacing foliate ornaments painted in brilliant colours on a ground of burnished gold. The remaining ten larger and four smaller initials are all exceptionally fine and decorative examples of similar work.

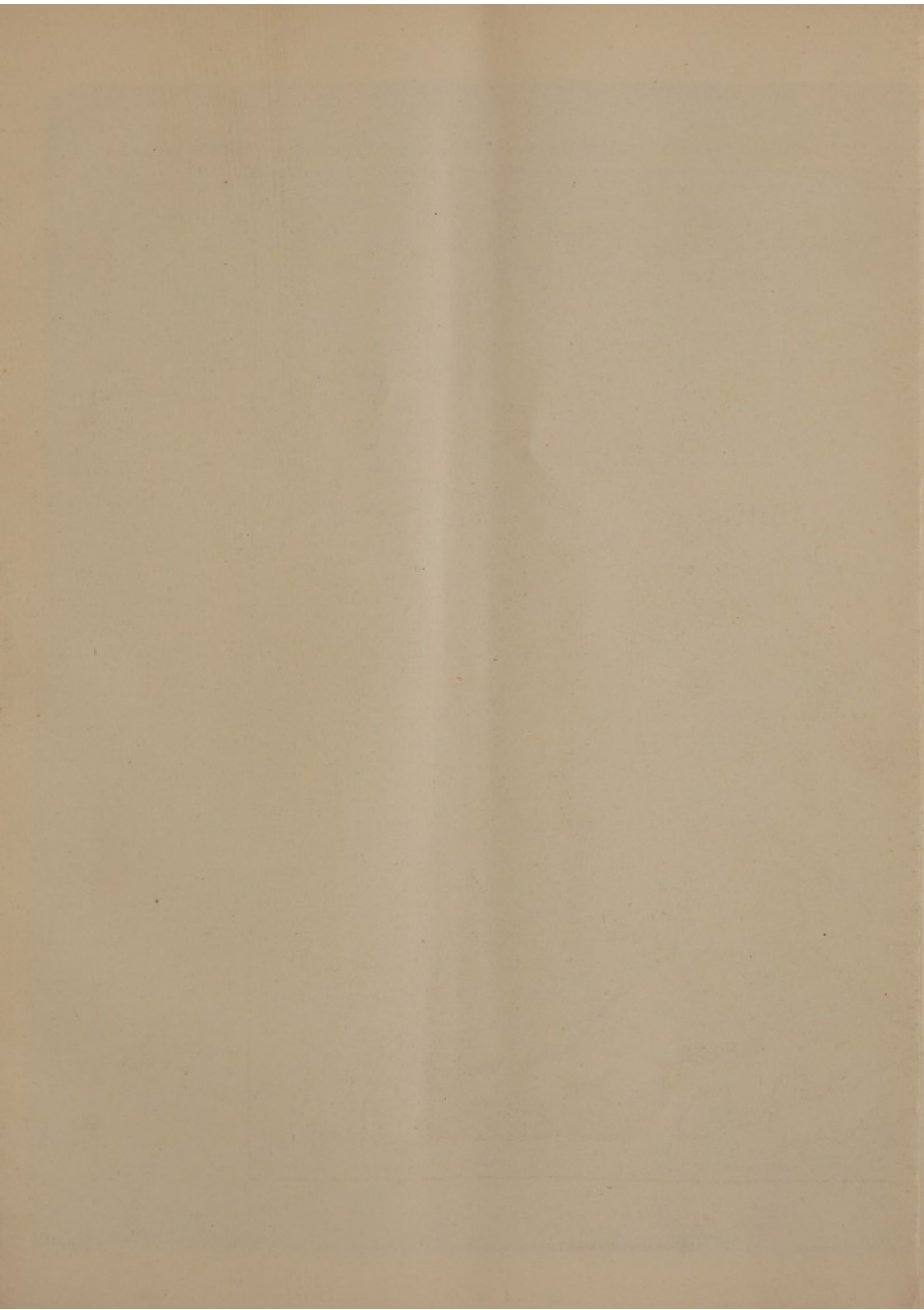

Two more fully illuminated pages commence the work, and the *Sarlouh* and opposing page are illuminated in the same elaborate style. The work is illustrated by twenty four full-page miniatures in the text, each with gilt floral *hashiya*, repeated on the opposing page, the two at folio 238 being double-page illustrations, and two others of hunting scenes at the end, in all twenty-eight miniatures, no scribe or date, but 16th Cent., gilt *sookhteh* binding (15 in. by 10½ in.) folio

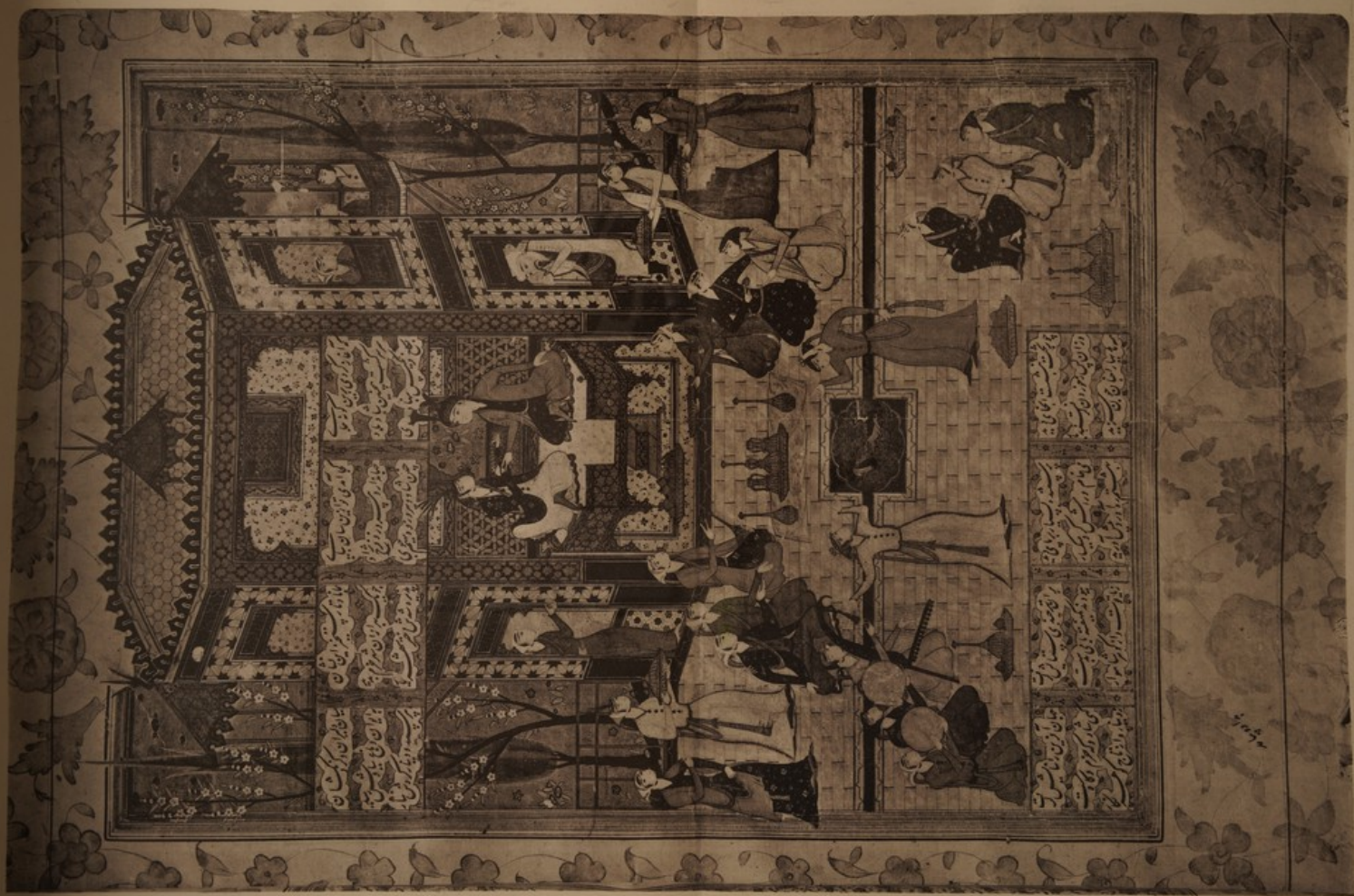

24A FIRDAUSĪ: *Shāh-namah*, a Persian MS. written in Ta'liq within red and blue rules on 331 leaves with illuminated Sarlouhs and other headpieces and 108 miniatures in the text, with two full-page miniatures at the commencement of the work; without scribe or date, but XIV [? XIII] Century; gold stamped leather binding; 4to.

A number of the leaves have been inserted with fresh writing to correct deficiencies in the work; some of the miniatures have been re-touched, others repainted, and the original miniatures are often defaced. An owner's note at the first fly-leaf puts the date of acquisition 753 A.H. = 1352 A.D.

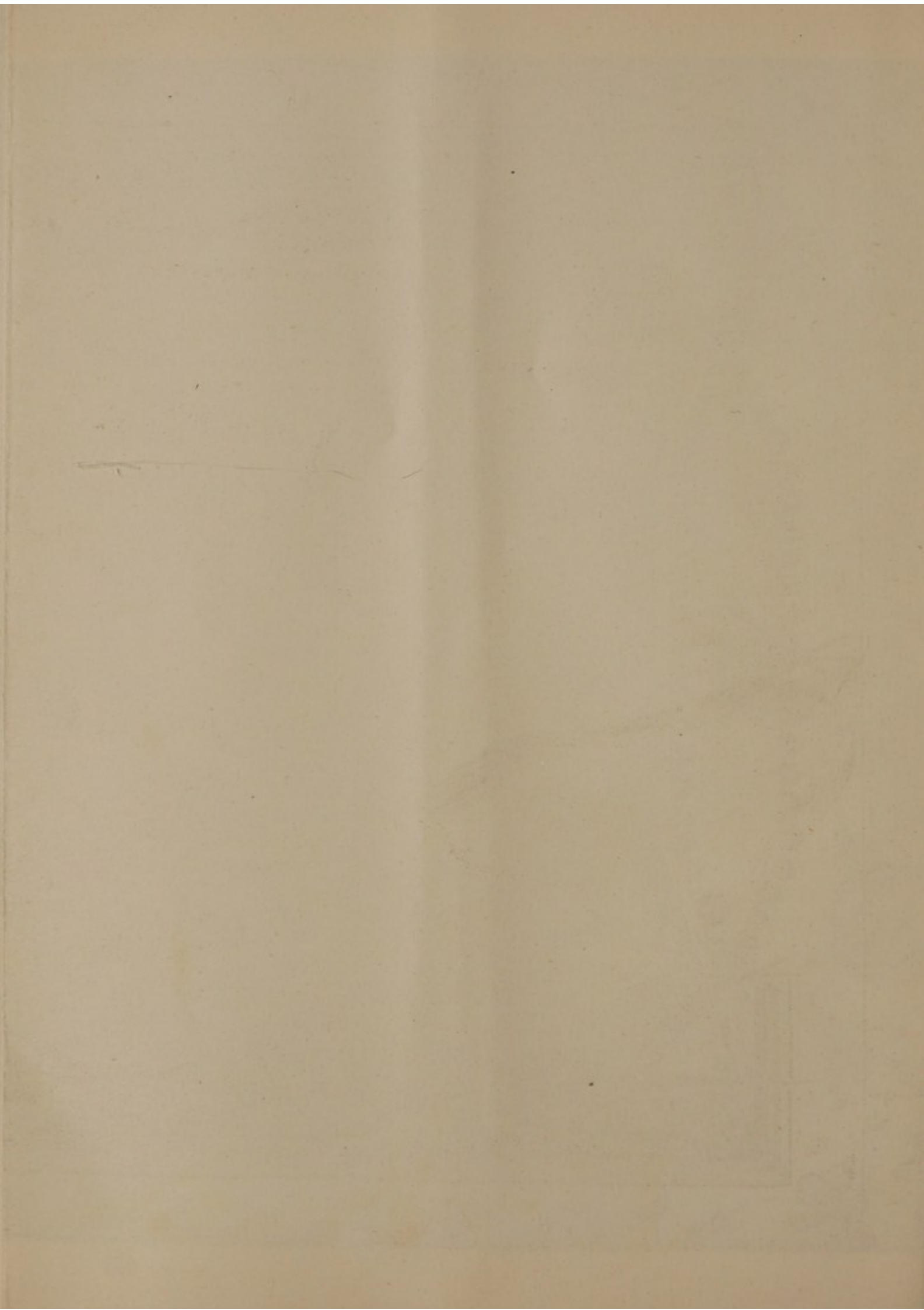

THE ORIGINAL "PROPOSALS FOR ESTABLISHING A SOCIETY UPON PRINCIPLES THEREIN MENTIONED, WHOSE MEMBERS SHALL BE OFFICERS OF THE AMERICAN ARMY" A HIGHLY IMPORTANT DOCUMENT SIGNED BY MAJOR GENERAL BARON VON STEUBEN, as President, setting forth the purposes and Principles of the Historic Society, 8 pp. folio, Cantonment of the AMERICAN ARMY ON HUDSON'S RIVER (NEW-BURGH), May 10th, 1783 (*a few weeks before the disbandment of the Revolutionary Army*)

** The Document proceeds to give an account of the first meeting at which were present Generals Knox, Huntington, Hand, Steuben, and Captain Shaw, and sets forth in great detail the principles, purposes, and methods of organization and other data connected with the proposed Society, of which Washington was to become the first President on its actual establishment shortly afterwards. Baron von Steuben, the famous 'Prussian drill master,' author of 'Regulations for the Order and Discipline of the Troops of the United States,' and member of Andre's Court Martial, signs as President provisionally and doubtless as the senior officer present; no official President of the Society, prior to George Washington, being recognised. The name of the Society is explained, and the qualification for membership. No reference appears to the system of hereditary membership which later attracted criticism. The Preamble runs as follows:

LOT 90—*continued.*

"It having pleased The Supreme Governor of the Universe, in the disposition of human affairs, to cause the separation of the Colonies of North America from the denomination of Great Britain, and after a bloody conflict of eight years, to establish them Free, Independent, and Sovereign States, connected by alliances, founded on reciprocal advantages, with some of the great Princes and Powers of the Earth . . . The following principles shall be immutable; and form the basis of the Society of the Cincinnati.

An incessant attention to preserve inviolate those exalted rights and liberties of human nature, for which they have fought and without which the high rank of a *rational being* is a curse instead of a blessing."

The badge of the Society was a figure of Cincinnatus as symbolising Washington and other patriots, who had left their rural affairs to fight for their country.

THIS IMPORTANT AMERICAN HISTORICAL DOCUMENT IS IN A VERY FINE STATE OF PRESERVATION. SINCE THE TIME IT WAS WRITTEN AND UNTIL RECENTLY IT HAS BEEN IN THE FAMILY OF GENERAL HAND (WHO WAS PRESENT AT THE INAUGURATION) AND FROM WHOSE DESCENDANTS IT WAS OBTAINED.

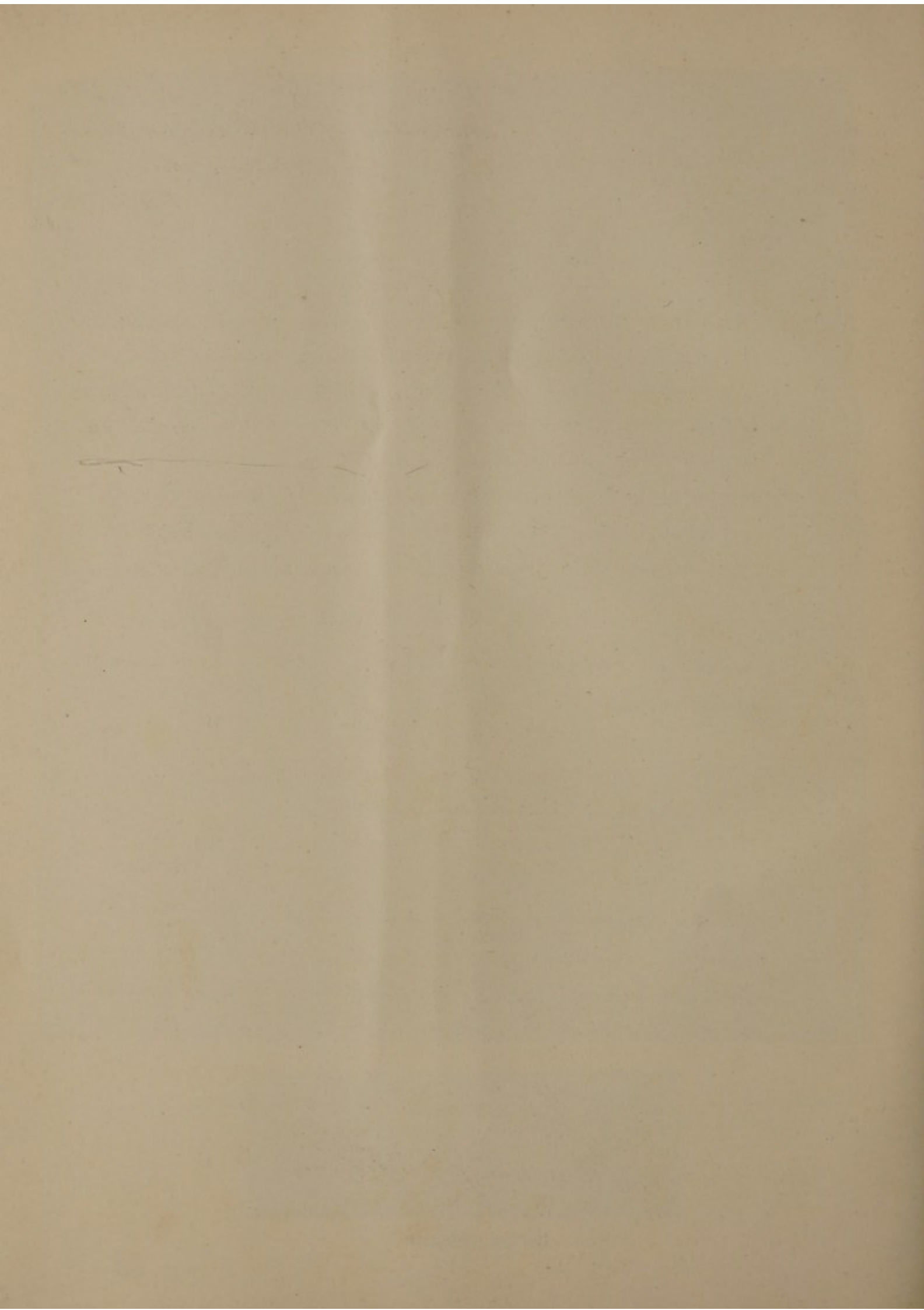
