And a similar Implement, from *Hungary*, *1½ in. high*, bead-shaped and with the projections arranged in a deeply cut lozenge design 2

4/6/0 340 Two CHAPES from scabbards; each *about 1¾ in. wide and 1¼ in. high in the centre*; pouch-shaped, with a narrow projection around the mouth and a heavier one along the base; *near Cork, 1877*; *very rare and interesting* 2

- 1/2/0 341 A large and massive RING of bronze, $6\frac{1}{4}$ in. diam.; on the hoop six large bead-like ornaments, of depressed circular shape, set between narrow rings; of unknown use, and supposed to be unique; *Co. Londonderry; in very good preservation* 1

The sides decorated with continuous bands of interlaced strap ornament; on the front they enclose three long and narrow inlays of gold, the central one carrying an interlaced design.
