The first half is "A Journal from Halifax, June 10th 1776." It comes to an end on Nov. 27th, 1777. It contains the detailed account of an eyewitness of the campaign centring round New York and Philadelphia.

Among the names mentioned are Brunswick, River Delaware, Trent, Newark, Sandy Hook, Statten Island, the Jerseys, Elk Town, Chesapeake Bay, the Ford at Brandywine, Chester, Philadelphia, Reading, Germantown, &c.

The Attack on the Heights of Dilworth is described, and the surprise of Gen. Wayne's brigade at Valley Forge, 21 Sept.

"Yesterday morning that Arch Traytor and Rebel, Genl. Lee was taken. He was surpris'd in a house almost within view of his army by the Honbl. Lt. Col. Harcourt, with a small party of Light Dragoons."

"Aug. 28th. We found a great quantity of Tobacco, flouer &c. which the Rebels had not time to take away or destroy: they are computed to be worth 1500£ sterg. Genl. Washington dined here yesterday."

The second Part is headed "A Journall from Philadelphia to Cork, on board the Notingham India Man, Lawrence Bowden Commander, April 16th, 1778."

Among the entries is:—"May 3rd. About 1 o'clock spoke to the Appollo Frigate; she informed us that she spoke yesterday to a Vessel from England which said that War with France was to be declar'd the day after she sail'd."

\* \* General Dix is the famous Union General, of the Civil War; and is the hero of the well-known incident "If any man attempts to haul down the American flag, shoot him on the spot."

LADY MARY WORTLEY MONTAGU (1689-1762), daughter of Evelyn Pierrepont, 5th Earl and first Duke of Kingston, married Edward Wortley Montagu, Ambassador to Constantinople, introduced the practice of inoculation for small-pox, became a leader of Society, was involved in a bitter and well-known quarrel with Pope, who had professed a special admiration for her. Went to Italy in 1739, settled in Avignon in 1742, moved to Brescia in 1746, afterwards to Venice, returning to England after her husband's death. Author of "Town Eclogues," first published piratically as "Court Poems," 1716, and "Letters from the East" posthumously published

Her daughter Mary married the 3rd Earl of Bute, K.G. George III's Prime Minister, and one of the statesmen principally concerned in the war of American Independence. Their daughter, Lady Frances Stuart, married the 2nd Earl of Harrowby, K.G. grandfather of the present owner

## MONTAGU (LADY MARY WORTLEY)

A REMARKABLE SERIES OF UPWARDS OF 450 AUTOGRAPH LETTERS ADDRESSED TO HER HUSBAND, HER DAUGHTER (AFTERWARDS LADY BUTE), HER SON EDWARD WORTLEY MONTAGU, HER SISTER (AFTERWARDS COUNTESS OF MAR), THE EARL OF BUTE AND OTHERS.

The Correspondence to her husband commences about 1715 and in the first letter she accuses him of treating her very unkindly, having left her in July, it now being the middle of November, and so seldom writing, she reflects with grief that a man that is ashamed of passions that are rational and reasonable is generally proud of those that are shameful and silly

Writing on April 1, 1717, she mentions that her son is past all manner of danger after being inoculated for small pox

A series of letters in 1739—when she was setting out for Italy—give an amusing description of Continental Travel

From Turin she writes that she is going to Venice, altho' Lord Carlisle had spoken highly of Rome, but she was prejudiced against that City owing to the difficulty in avoiding a meeting with the Pretender. On arriving in Venice she writes :—

" I find (contrary to the rest of the World) I did not think myself so considerable as I am : for I verily believe if one of the Pyramids of Egypt had travelled it could not have been more followed. . . . I am visited by the most considerable people of the Town, and all the Foreign Ministers."

Writes with considerable bitterness concerning her daughter Lady Bute. Gives a full description of a water gala with vessels built at the expense of the Nobles that have a mind to display their magnificence. Her son has contracted considerable debts in Italy, but as he kept himself altogether in low company he did not pass for her son in Venice, on being asked, she denied knowing anything of him

From Rome she writes very enthusiastically of its beauty but is journeying to Naples for the Winter. She likes the climate and does not find the people as savage as represented. Lady Mary then visits in turn Leghorn, Turin, Genoa—where she meets Horace Walpole—Geneva, Chambery, Lyons and Avignon. Mentions a magnificent entertainment given by the Freemasons to the Duke of Richelieu. Hears rumours that Alex. Pope is dead and in a letter dated July, 1744, asks why her husband has not mentioned it

From Brescia she writes in August, 1746, that Avignon became too disagreeable on account of the Scotch and Irish Rebels. She gives interesting notices of the many well-known English travellers she met during her long residence in Italy. There are numerous references to the escapades of her son, while some of the later letters addressed to Lady
