- 5 An Armorial part Tea Service, enamelled with the arms of Dallas within gilt arabesque borders, comprising: a Tea Pot and Cover, a Milk Jug, two Cups and three Saucers, and another Cup, Ch'ien Lung (cf. Tudor Craig, p. 48)

#### ENGLISH PORCELAIN AND POTTERY.

- A Bow Plate, painted in underglaze blue with so-called Image pattern, an executioner-like man followed by a boy, within wavy blue rim, 7\(\frac{3}{4}\) in., blue painter's numeral 12; a Bowl, 7 in.; and a cylindrical Mug with spreading foot in Japanese Imari style, foot with nick of "scratch-cross" type, 4\(\frac{5}{2}\) in. 3

9 A Leeds creamware Puzzle Jug, of ornate design, painted with flower sprays in colours, the oviform body inscribed "Robert Harwin" flanked by masonic insignia within a shield and a man standing on a platform with an auctioneer's hammer, uttering "Speak quick or it's gone," 10\(\frac{5}{2}\) in.

#### LOWESTOFT PORCELAIN.

This collection was started by the present owner's father in the year 1887, and was to a great extent completed in the subsequent two or three years. Its foundations were laid in 1887 at the sale of the effects of Charles John Mann Curtis, a son of Thomas Curtis, a painter at the Lowestoft China Manufactory. The collection was subsequently greatly developed two years later at the Reeve sale in May, 1889. A few important pieces with inscriptions from the well-known collection of William Booth were added in 1906.

To most present-day collectors the inscribed and dated specimens in this collection have so far been known only through the medium of old standard works, such as Jewitt, Chaffers and others. In two or three cases, e.g. the Holt Trifle and the Teasel Tablet, they have hitherto been unrecorded.

- 10 Four Specimen Cups and Saucers, each with a different and rare pattern, painted in enamel colours; and three Cream Jugs and two Cream Boats with enamel decoration 13
- 11 A Tea Pot and Cover of typical form, painted with flowers, cornucopia and elaborate festoon and scale borders in enamel colours, by Thomas Curtis, 5½ in.
  - \*\* Purchased at the sale of Mr. Charles John Mann Curtis (son of Thomas Curtis, the well-known painter at the Lowestoft Factory), lot 188, 21st September, 1887, Lowestoft.

- A rare small Vase, of pear shape, with garlic mouth, pencilled in black and gold, with flower sprays and an elaborate diaper and festoon border round the mouth, 4½ in. (shape cf. Spelman, pl. 60, fig. 4); and a Mug with "famille-rose" decoration, 2½ in. (lot 195 in the Curtis sale, 21st September, 1887) 2

- 14 An interesting Lowestoft Tea Cup, painted with flowers within barbed medallions and diaper borders; a Chinese Cup with the same pattern; another Lowestoft Cup, painted with flower sprays in "famille-rose" enamels; and two Chinese Cups and three Saucers with the same decoration (part of lot 186 in the Curtis sale, 1887)
- A creamware pottery Mug, decorated in colours with a portrait of Philip Strowger of Normanston, carrying a rake, pitchfork and flask, in the background Burg Church and Marshes, 3½ in., faulty; a Lowestoft Tea Cup with "famille-rose" decoration; and two Chinese Tea Cups and three Saucers, with the same design (all from the Curtis sale, 1887)
- A bell-shaped Mug, painted in underglaze blue with flower sprays and butterflies, a lambrequin border inside the rim, painter's number 5, 3½ in.; a Cream Jug; a Cream Boat; two Cups and three Saucers; and nine leaf Pickle Trays, all painted in underglaze blue (cf. Spelman, pl. 65, fig. 3)
- 17 A blue and white Toy Tea Pot, painted with Chinese pagodas and river scenes, 3<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> in.; and a Sugar Basin, painted with houses and river scenes, 4<sup>5</sup>/<sub>8</sub> in. (Tea Pot cf. Spelman, pl. 62, fig. 4) 3
- A small Coffee Pot, with scroll spout and handle, painted in underglaze blue with a Chinese lady holding a sunshade, 6\frac{3}{4} in.; a bell-shaped Mug, faulty, 4\frac{1}{2} in.; and a typical Lowestoft Feeding Cup with watering can spout, 3 in, painter's numeral 5 (cf. Spelman, pl. 61, fig. 1)
- 19 A pair of interesting Delft Plates, decorated by Thomas Curtis, with a typical Lowestoft design of flower sprays and scale borders, 8\frac{3}{4} in. (lot 201 in the Curtis sale, 1887)

- 20 A pretty Lowestoft cylindrical Mug with turquoise rim, painted with scattered sprigs and bouquets of flowers in brilliant colours, about 1795, 4½ in.
  - \*\*\* From the Reeve collection sale, 1889, lot 166. Mr. Reeve inherited the collection of his sister Lady Smith, widow of Sir James Edward Smith, a Lowestoft magnate.
- 21 A pair of Newcastle creamware small Plates, painted with brown edge rims and inscribed "A Trifle from Cromer," perhaps by Absolon at Yarmouth, impressed mark "St. Anthonys";

(from the Reeve sale, 1889)

P. 1783," 6 in., with documents

    Tradition states that this print, which is the most ambitious transfer-print recorded, was supplied by Mr. Gamble, of Bungay. It was by no means the first effort as printing was in general use at Lowestoft before 1772.

    At this date it is hazardous to conjecture for whom the Mug was made, but the initials would certainly fit those of Joseph

179 A HIGHLY IMPORTANT BUST, by Jean-Antoine Houdon (1741-1828), of Marie-Adélaïde-Clotilde-Xavière de France, signed and dated 1774

In white marble, of life size; her head slightly at an angle, with hair tied loosely by a ribbon and locks falling gracefully over the neck; the face beautifully modelled, and with the semblance of a smile; the breast with lace corsage over which a cloak is draped, the right shoulder bare, height 33 in. (84 cm.)

This notable work of Houdon's best period was made to the order of the French Royal family and later was given to one of the equerries at Court, in whose family it remained until it was sold about twenty-five years ago. As far as is known no replica is in existence, though there is in the Versailles Museum a different bust of the same subject, neither signed nor dated, and only attributed to Houdon.

The bust of Marie-Adélaïde's sister Victoire, by Houdon, occupies a prominent place in the Wallace collection, where also may be seen the celebrated Inkstand of Sèvres porcelain modelled by Duplessis and believed to have been given by Louis XV to Marie-Adélaïde.

Marie-Adélaïde-Clotilde-Xavière de France was a daughter of the Dauphin, son of Louis XV, and therefore sister of Louis XVI and Charles X. She was born in 1759 and married in 1775 Charles Emmanuel, Prince of Piedmont, afterwards King of Sardinia. She died in 1802 and was beatified by Pope Pius VII in 1808.

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
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
