

The Property of Sir George Duckworth=1king, 18t.

This large and important collection was brought together by Admiral Sir John Thomas Duckworth, Bt. He first served as a volunteer at the battles of Lagos and Quiberon Bays in 1759. He became Flag-Captain to Admiral Sir J. Rowley in Jamaica, 1780, officially mentioned by Howe after action off Ushant, 1794; Rear-Admiral of the White, 1789; took possession of Swedish and Danish Possessions in the West Indies; Commander-in-Chief at Jamaica, 1803-5; completely defeated a French squadron off St. Domingo, 1806; Governor and Commander-in-Chief of Newfoundland, 1810-13.

Foremost in the Papers is a very important series of Autograph Letters from Admiral Viscount Nelson to Duckworth, to whom he expresses himself very freely. Three of the letters contain mention of Bonaparte and four of them Sir William and Lady Hamilton. Other famous Admirals are well represented, Earl St. Vincent, Lord Collingwood, Earl Howe, and others, with interesting papers relating to Newfoundland, St. Domingo, etc.

The death of my friend Lord Nelson has been a severe affliction to me I have known him too long, not to have a genuine affection for him—but if he had chosen the manner of his death I believe he would have died as he died after he received his wound (which he knew to be mortal in the instant he was struck) he lived long enough to shew that his duty was predominant in his mind even in his last moments. . .

The Correspondence commences with a letter written from Deptford, H.M.S. Trent to which he had been appointed Lieut. for Buchan's Arctic Expedition, expressing his joy at his appointment and gives a list of the instruments on board that had been given by the Royal Society. Writing in Jan. 1824 he states that he is again to be sent on Arctic Discovery: "the party is to proceed down the Mackenzie River to the Sea Coast and thence Westward to Kay Cape if possible." "The commercial and political advantages of this course of proceedings is evident as it will if successful prevent the encroachment of Russia towards the establishments of the Hudson's Bay Company and secure the Country. The expedition will contribute towards the solution of the North West Passage."

In 1830 he writes that he has been appointed to command The Rainbow, and in a further letter from The Rainbow, Patras, 1st Aug. 1832, Battle of the Nile, Memory of Nelson for ever. In April, 1836, he announces his appointment as Lieut. Governor of Van Dieman's Land. From Fort Franklin, Great Bear Lake on 21 Oct. 1825, he writes of the tragedy of the loss of his Wife. Reports that they were very well received in New York and reports some of the attentions they received. In 1824 he mentions his old friend Parry: "My friend Parry has had very good winds for crossing the Atlantic, and I fancy him now to be westward of Cape Farewell and perhaps receiving visits from some of friends the Davis Straits Ice Bergs on their way to the South."




