

ON October the 4th, 1935, Maggs Bros. Ltd. sustained an irreparable loss in the death of its senior Managing Director, Mr. Benjamin Dawson Maggs.

Mr. Maggs was born in London on the 10th of February, 1862. At that time his father, Uriah Maggs, was conducting a bookselling business at 41 Westborne Terrace North, Paddington. At the early age of 14 years, Mr. Maggs, who had inherited his father's love of books, entered the business, which by that time had moved to Church Street, Paddington Green. At the end of 1894, Mr. U. Maggs retired, and the business was left in the hands of his two elder sons, Benjamin Dawson and Henry. In 1901, the growth of the business necessitated a further move, this time to 109 Strand, within a few hundred yards of Holywell Street, commonly known as "Booksellers' Row". Henry died in 1905, and in the same year the two other sons, Charles and Ernest, joined the firm. Continuing to grow, it was later found necessary to take additional premises at 6 Maiden Lane, Strand, and these were retained until the firm, in 1918, moved to the West End, to its present premises at 34 & 35 Conduit Street, New Bond Street. Four years later Charles Maggs died, leaving as sole partners, his brothers Benjamin and Ernest, the eldest and youngest sons of the founder. A branch was subsequently

opened in Paris, at 93 & 95 Rue la Boëtie. In the early part of last year the firm became a Private Limited Company, when Frank and Kenneth Maggs, two sons of Benjamin, were appointed directors with the two surviving partners.

From an early date Mr. B. D. Maggs was chiefly concerned with the purchasing side of the business and rarely missed an important sale, either in London, in the provinces or on the Continent. He was present at the sale of the Hoe Library in New York in 1911. Even when in failing health towards the end of his active life, the sale-room seemed to hold a magnetic fascination for him and he was never really happy unless there were a sale to attend.

Mr. Maggs took a keen interest in the Antiquarian Booksellers' Association. He was the second President and a member of its committee until his death. He was also a Freeman of the City of London and a liveryman of the Stationer's Company.

The present Directors have been most sincerely moved by the hundreds of tributes to Mr. Maggs which have reached them from collectors and his confrères in the trade, both at home and abroad. They fully appreciate the esteem and affection in which he was held and earnestly hope that they may merit in the future a similar trust and regard.

THE RARE "EDITIO PRINCEPS" OF APULEIUS, edited by Joannes Andreae, bishop of Aleria. Chief of the writings of Apuleius is "The Golden Ass," a satirical and fantastic moral romance, the adventures of one Lucius, who is transformed into an ass as a punishment for his vices; under this guise he has the amplest opportunities for observing, undetected, the preposterous doings of mankind. Then, enlightened by this experience, and with the enchantment taken off him, he becomes quite a new man. Of the many episodes interwoven into the story, the most interesting is the beautiful allegorical fairy tale of Cupid and Psyche, so much used by later poets and artists.

A very fine copy of this important production of the first Roman press, of which only 275 copies were printed. (Hain 1314).

The "Trojan History" of Dictys and that of Dares, dating probably from the 4th and 5th centuries A.D., were the chief authorities followed by the mediaeval writers who handled the story of Troy.

This rare edition was printed at an early Sicilian press, the second at Messina. It is the first dated book in which Schonberger's name occurs. The total recorded output of this press is seven books, all of which are extremely rare.

Heliodorus wrote about the year 400. His work has been praised as one of the best of the Greek Romances. It is the parent book from which later writers derived those tales of sensational adventure and hairs-breadth escapes, on which much of the plot of such dramas as "Pericles of Tyre" turns and depends.

THE SECOND EDITION OF HERODOTUS, translated into Latin by Laurentius Valla.

In this great work Herodotus recounts the origin and progress of the war between the Greek and Persians; and at successive stages of the main story he introduces episodes and stories of great interest which contribute to the illustration of the principal subject.

It is significant that the history is written in prose. "The voice of Herodotus is the first talking voice which comes down to us through the ages: the first voice which tries, not to stir our feelings and imagination by the magic of poetry, but to tell us quietly and conversationally just what the facts were, so far as he could find them out."

A very early edition of one of the oldest Latin fable books of the Middle Ages. Its author, St. Cyril, born in Thessalonica in the ninth century, is known as the Apostle of the Slavs from his successful missionary work among the Tartar Khazars and the Moravians.

This copy belonged to Pedro Miguel Carbonell, the Catalan poet and author of Chroniques de Espana, and has rubrications and annotations in his hand, also his note of purchase dated 3rd April, 1483. (Hain 5906, 1).

Each part with separate title-page, bearing respectively the dates, 1694, 1681 and 1684. Extremely rare in uncut state.

This great beast-epic has been traced as far back as the 10th century. Its central idea may have been a travesty of real persons and actual events, or it may have been an expression of thoughts and experiences, which recur in every generation, now on the general vices and weakness of humanity, now on the usual corruptions in Church and State, now on the historical events which occupied public attention from time to time. The enormous popularity of the subjects is shown by the long vogue which it had.

An exhortation to sobriety and industry in the form of a fable, which tells how the members of the body conspired together to starve the stomach, whom they found a tyrannous master, making them work hard to supply food for his enjoyment.

This allegory was introduced by Shakespeare into *Coriolanus* (Scene I, line 94), where Menenius Agrippa, addressing the mutinous citizens, begins:

"There was a time when all the body's members Rebell'd against the belly."

In conclusion he compares the mutinous Romans to the members of the body rebelling . against the stomach, typifying Rome.

The author, John of Salisbury, was one of the greatest scholars and philosophers of the Middle Ages. He was born near Salisbury; educated at Paris under the famous Peter Abelard and Alberic of Rheims, and at Chartres. He returned to England, c. 1150, to be secretary to Theodore, Abp. of Canterbury, and was employed on diplomatic missions to the Pope; incurred the displeasure of Henry II for defending the rights of the Church, and like Thomas à Becket was obliged to leave England for a time. He was with Becket at the time of his murder at Canterbury in 1170. There are one or two little holes through the text.

THE FIRST DATED EDITION of the famous Gesta Romanorum, a Latin collection of stories, compiled probably about the beginning of the 14th century.

"The stories are drawn from very diverse sources; some of them are characteristically Oriental; some of them contain incidents of Roman history, refracted through the mediaeval imagination; some record only a witty response or wise saying, others again bear the mark of an original homilectic intent. All alike are applied, in the lengthy and violent "moralizations" that are appended, to the uses of pastoral theology and the illustration of Christian mysteries.

"To trace the history of the stories of the *Gesta Romanorum*, to chronicle their re-appearances in European literature, and to discuss their origin, would be an endless task. Some of the individual tales had honourable destinies in store for them."

An interesting and well illustrated manuscript of an extremely curious religious romance written originally in Latin towards the end of the fourteenth century, and known as "Consolatio Peccatorum, seu lis Christi et Belial."

"The Devil is represented as suing Christ for having infringed upon the rights of his ownership by descending into hell. At the first trial Solomon acts as judge, while Moses is counsel for Jesus Christ and Belial for the Devil. At the second trial the Patriarch Joseph is judge, Aristotle and Isaiah defend Jesus Christ, and the Emperor Augustus and Jeremiah defend the Devil. In both trials the decision is in favour of Christ, but at the second trial the Devil is granted the right to take possession of the bodies and souls of the damned at the last judgment." (*Cath. Encyc.*).

This work was first printed in 1472 and was immediately put on the "Index librorum prohibitorum" notwithstanding the eminence and favour enjoyed by its author, Bishop Jacobus of Theramo (died 1417), during his life time.

At the end of this Manuscript is the ownership note, 1448, of Mathias von Menshen of Heilbronn, architect of the Knights of the Teutonic Order; as this is the same writing as the rest of the book we may assume that von Menshen was the writer and possibly the illustrator.

EARLY MANUSCRIPTS OF MANDEVILLE'S "VOYAGES AND TRAVELS" ARE OF EXTREME RARITY. Of the three known English versions, two are represented by single manuscripts, both in the British Museum (Cotton and Egerton collections). This present manuscript belongs to an abridged version which was the basis of all the printed texts up to 1725 when the Cotton manuscript was edited.

Jean d'Outremeuse, a writer living at Liège, states in his *Myreur des Histors* that he received the story known to us as "The Travels of Sir John Mandeville" in 1472 from the lips of a dying man, Jean à la Barbe, who alleged that his real name was Sir John Mandeville. Whether Jean à la Barbe was an invention of Jean d'Outremeuse or the inventor of the travels, it is certain that the book is a most amusing compilation of all that was known, believed, or fancied at that time about the Eastern world.

Avowedly written for the unlearned, and combining interest of matter with a quaint simplicity of style, the book hit the popular taste, and in a marvel-loving age its most extravagant features probably had the greatest charm.

The present MS. has probably a Yorkshire origin. The Arms at the foot of the first leaf appear to be those of a member of the ancient Yorkshire family of Norton. There is a list of the early Archbishops of York on one of the preliminary leaves at the beginning, and an analysis of the life of St. Wilfred, Abp. of York at the end. (The preliminary leaves also contain rules of health for each month).

This edition is so scarce that H. W. Davies (*Catalogue of German Books of C. Fairfax Murray*, p. 465) stated that it "appears to be unknown." Hain had not seen a copy and Campbell (*Annales*) called it "édition douteuse," though later (*Supplement IV*, p. 3) was able to give a full description after the copy in Wernigerode (the only other copy known according to the Kommission für den Gesamtkatalog der Wiegendrucke). This famous book of the "Lives of the Saints" was compiled by Jacobus de Voragine, Archbishop of Genoa, who composed it under the title of "Legenda Aurea," in the Latin tongue, about the year 1290. In the subsequent century it was translated into French by Jean de Vignay, and from this French translation it was converted into our own language by the indefatigable Caxton.

The work is rightly called by Warton "an inexhaustible repository of religious fable"; and such was the almost sacred light in which it was considered abroad, for upwards of two centuries, that the learned Claude Espence, in the year 1555, was obliged to make a public recantation for calling it Legenda Ferrea!

It is indeed no single achievement, but two very remarkable poems, written at two different periods, by two authors whose characters and gifts were not only alien, but opposed—two poems which reflect two different conditions of society. Of its twenty-two thousand octo-syllabic lines, upwards of four thousand are the work of Guillaume de Lorris; the remainder is the work of a later writer, Jean de Meun. Its subject is an allegorised tale of love, his own or imagined, transferred to the realm of dreams. The writer would fain win the heart of his beloved, and at the same time he would instruct all amorous spirits in the art of love. He is twenty years of age, in the Maymorn of youth. He has beheld his beautiful lady, and been charmed by her fairness, her grace, her courtesy; she has received him with gentleness, but when he declares his love she grows alarmed. He gains at last the kiss which tells of her affection; but her parents intervening, throw obstacles between the lovers. Such, divested of ornament, allegory, and personification, is the theme of the poem." (Dowden).

A complete set of all the twelve books of the French folio edition of Amadis is one of the greatest of rarities, and few only of the many great collectors who endeavoured to assemble the Romances of Chivalry have been able to boast a set like ours. Neither Firmin-Didot, nor Solar, nor Baron Pichon, nor Yimenez, succeeded, and Heredia only had the first ten books. Even the De Backer copy was imperfect, wanting a number of leaves.

In addition to the four books of Amadis proper, this set comprises Esplandian (the source of the word California), Perion, Lisuarte of Greece, Amadis of Greece, Florisel de Niquea, Rogelio of Greece, and Agesilan of Colchis.

FIRST EDITION. (Title-page in facsimile). This is the tenth book of the exploits of Amadis de Gaul, and the first of several editions of this book.

The Author, Feliciano de Silva is regarded by Hurtado (in his *Historia de Literatura Española*) as the greatest "continuation" author of the *Amadis;* and to him is attributed the ninth book also, which is notable for the introduction of the pastoral element, for the first time, in Spanish literature. This tenth book is a chronicle of the deeds of Florizel de Niquea and Anaxartes, sons of Prince Amadis of Greece, whose adventures recontinued in the eleventh book of Amadis, also from the pen of the indefatigable Silva. As page to the Duke of Medina Sidonia, Feliciano de Silva began his career of chivalry by saving the Duchess from drowning in the Guadalquiver. He afterwards became a knight, and by pandering to the public taste for romances of chivalry, won both fame and fortune. It is amusing to note that Don Quixote declared that his favourite books were those written by Feliciano de Silva. Accordingly, the astute priest who revised Quixote's library promptly condemned these romances to the flames, as being unduly stimulating to the imagination of his chivalrous friend.

Palau's *Manual*, Vol. I, p. 64, could only trace the existence of one copy of this book. Salva (No. 1515) mentions, but did not possess this book.

THE MS. IS IN AN EXCELLENT STATE OF PRESERVATION, except as regards the end of Edward III's reign and the beginning of Richard II. Eight leaves of this part are mutilated and one or two leaves appear to be missing.

JOHN STOW, THE SIXTEENTH-CENTURY HISTORIAN, WAS AT ONE TIME IN POSSESSION OF THE MS., AS THERE ARE SEVERAL NOTES IN HIS HANDWRITING, particularly towards the close; he certainly made use of it in his *Annals of England*, but without specifying it. The MS. was afterwards used by John Speed, author of the *The History of Great Britaine*, 1611.

Salva (No. 1616) emphazizes its extreme rarity, stating that he had seen no other perfect copy but his own, and knew of no other besides that and the one in the library of the Instituto Asturiano.

In this medieval history, fabulous tales have been linked up with facts, including the chivalrous exploits of the *Knight of the Swan*, "a story full of enchantments, duels, and much of what characterizes the books of chivalry," for this reason *Salva* classifies it under the section of *Romances of Chivalry* in his bibliography.

The great history of "Overseas," was compiled at the instance of, if not actually by, Alfonso the Sage (Alfonso X), the highly cultured Spanish medieval sovereign who did so much for Spanish Literature and nationalized the Castilian language. It begins with the life of Mahomet and records the early Crusades in the Holy Land down to the year 1270. It is most valuable as a specimen of the earliest Castilian prose, indeed, as Ticknor declares: "Castilian prose can hardly be said to have existed earlier, unless we are willing to reckon as specimens of it the few meagre documents, generally grants in hard legal forms."

The Author gives an account of his visit to the Mountain of the Sibyl and describes the surroundings of the Cave of the Sibyl and its curious legend. The narrative is a variant of the story of Tannhäuser. A German knight and his squire enter the cave and are welcomed by "la royne" and her companions, and are prevailed upon by various inducements to remain, but they may not leave before eight days are passed. If on the 9th day they wish to stay longer, they cannot leave before the 30th day, if not on the 30th, they remain till the 330th, if not gone by then they stay for ever. The knight reports in time and leaves the subterranean abode on the 330th day. Like Tannhäuser, he cannot rest until he obtains absolution from the Pope. Absolution refused, he is prevailed upon by his esquire to return to the Mount of Venus, on the pretext that the Pope was seeking their death.

It has special American importance, for in the chapter on Geography, La Salle mentions Greenland on two occasions, and refers to certain rumours about this Northern land which caused him to pre-suppose a semi-civilisation in these American lands.

Otker or Olger, called the Dane, was a Frankish Markgraf who fought with the Lombards in 773, against Carl the Great, on behalf of the widow of Karlmann, the younger brother of the Frankish conqueror. Beaten and made prisoner, he transferred his fealty to Charlemagne, and became one of the Douze Pairs of romance. Around this historical personage, legends from many different sources grouped themselves and he became a hero of Fairyland. The Turpin Chronicle (about A.D. 1100) alludes to his wonderful deeds as renowned in ballads "sung to this very day." In the prose-romance compiled in the fifteenth century he is associated with Morgen la Fée who takes him to Avalon. The chess board incident is found in Ogier as well as in the Aymon; but here the slayer is Charlot, the Emperor's son, and the slain young Baudouin, Ogier's son.

Only two other copies are known, formerly in the Tufton and Didot collections.

This copy is from the libraries of Comte de Toulouse, King Louis Phillipe, Count Raoul de Lignerolles and de Backer.

Primaleon relates the more complicated history of Palmerin de Oliva's sons, Primaleon and Polendos, with "Don Duardos," Prince Edward of England, whose name was given to a dramatized version of this romance, by Gil Vicente. The author of these two romances is unknown: some have attributed the work to a lady of Ciudad Rodrigo; others have cited Francisco Vasquez as the author. These romances were followed by Palmerin en Inglaterra, which is indebted to Cervantes for the perpetuation of its fame, being one of the works which Quixote was enjoined to preserve in his library. The three romances had a great European vogue in the sixteenth century. This fine and much sought after edition is mentioned by Salva in his notes to Palmerin de Oliva, but he did not possess a copy. The woodcut on the first titlepage represents Primaleon with Polendos and Duardos, facing the giant Gataru in the battlefield; while those on the second and third title-pages show a mounted knight, squire and page. The smaller woodcuts are quaint illustrations of the scenes in the story.

FIRST EDITION OF CAXTON'S TRANSLATION OF THE "FAYTTES OF ARMES AND CHIVALRY," WHICH WAS ORIGINALLY COMPILED IN FRENCH BY CHRISTINE DE PISAN (1364-1430).

THIS IS THE FIRST WORK IN ENGLISH ON MILITARY AND NAVAL WARFARE, AND ON THE LAWS OF WAR.

The translation into English and the printing was undertaken by Caxton at the express desire of Henry VII, who himself lent the manuscript, now in the British Museum, from which the translation was made.

A PERFECT COPY, COMPLETE WITH THE BLANK LEAF AT END. In fine condition with wide margins; it measures 265 x 184 mm.; a few slight marginal repairs and some insignificant wormholes stopped.

ONLY SIX QUITE PERFECT COPIES ARE RECORDED and of these, two have been made up with leaves taken from another copy.

AN UNRECORDED COPY. This copy was unknown to De Ricci when he compiled his "Census of Caxtons" in 1911, and is not listed in the Gesamtkatalog der Wiegendrucke.

This copy comes to us from a descendant of the "Magister Whalley," who about 1540 wrote on the blank leaf at the end of this copy a list of the works in his library. The book has thus been in the possession of the one family for about 400 years at least, and in all probability was purchased from Caxton by a member of the same family.

The contents of the book are as follows:

PART I: REASONS FOR WAR, TRAINING IN ARMS, COMMAND OF THE ARMY, AND ORDERING OF BATTLE. "The fyrst partye deuyseth the manere that kynges and prynces oughten to holde in the fayttes of theyr werres and bataylles after thorde of bokes, dictes, and examples of the most preu \mathcal{O} noble conquerours of the World, etc."

PART II: ASSAULTING AND DEFENDING CASTLES AND CITIES, AND NAVAL WARFARE. The second partye speketh of . . . stratagenies of thordre & manere to fyghte & deffende castellis & cytees . . . and to make warre & gyue bataylle in ryuers and in the See.

Inserted in this part is an account of the "modern" way of assaulting a castle or town by the use of guns. This information the author says was given to her by certain

"wise knights that be expert in the said things." It gives particulars of the guns in use at the time, and appears to relate to some particular siege.

(Extract from Chapter XX) . . . "Item four grete gonnes that one called Garyte, the other rose, that other Senecque, and that other Maye the fyrst castyng aboute fyve hondre pound weyght, the second castynge aboute foure hondre, and the other two aboute two hondre or moo. Item another gonne calle Mountfort castyng thre C pound weyght, and after the maystres the same is the best of all. Item a brasyn gonne called Artycke casting hondre pound weyght. Item XX othre small gonnes castynge pillettes of stone, etc."

CHAP. XXI: "Here deuyseth of the gonne pouldre that longeth to the sayd gonnes and of other stuffe."

CHAP. XXII: "Of the gonnes mantelles."

CHAP. XXVII: "Here folowe the gonne stones."

Naval matters are treated in Chapters 34 (Blockade), 38 (Naval Battles), 39 (Fitting out Warships).

PART III: LAWS OF WAR. "The thyrde parte speketh of the droytes & ryghtes of armes after the lawes & droyt wreton."

PART IV: LAWS OF WAR (SAFE CONDUCTS, TRUCES, ETC.), ALSO TRIAL BY COMBAT, AND HERALDRY. "The IIII partye speketh of the droytes of armes in the faytes of sauf conduytes of tryews, of marke, & after of champ of bataylle, that is of fyghtyng within lystes."

Parts III & IV are chiefly compiled from the "Arbre des Batailles" of Honoré Bonet. "The influence of chivalry on the laws of nations nowhere appears more clearly than here." (See Huizinga. "The Waning of the Middle Ages, pp., 92 & 93).

Particularly interesting are chapters in Part IV on the trial of right "by single combat within the lists," as allowed and ordained by the Imperial and Lombard Laws.

Three chapters are devoted to Heraldry: Chap. XV: The Fayte of blasonnying of armes. Chap. XVI: In what manere a gentylman may chalenge another mannys armes. Chap. XVII: Of the armes & penoncelles & of the colours moste noble that apparteyne to the fayte of blasonnying.

Camoens' influence on the Portuguese language was all important, and he so far fixed the written language that at the present day it is commonly and not inaccurately called "the language of Camoens."


The plays of Prestes throw interesting light on his times: the position of women, the bribery of judges and lawyers, the apeing of foreign manners, the mixed styles of architecture.

Ribeiro in his *Auto do Fisico* gives some farcical Vicentian scenes, with the inevitable hits against the doctors and lawyers.

Traces of Gil Vicente and the Celestina are apparent in Anrique Lopez' Cena Policiana.

In Pinto's Rodrigo Emendo Spanish romances are quoted with great frequency.


"Don Quixote" has two unique distinctions. Not only is it the greatest novel of all time, but it is the one example of a great book in which the sequel not only equalled the first part but actually surpassed it.

The second part was printed in 1615, its publication hastened by the action of another author, one Alonso Fernandez de Avallaneda, who in 1614 had the impudence to publish a work entitled the "Segundo Tomo del ingenioso hidalgo Don Quixote de la Mancha." (See No. 544). This intrusion caused Cervantes to concentrate on his own second part, which was duly published in 1615, and which had such immediate success that this part is now infinitely rarer and more difficult to obtain than its predecessor.

"Small wonder if the world received Don Quixote with delight! There was nothing like unto it before : there has been nothing to eclipse it since. It ends one epoch and begins another : it intones the dirge of the mediæval novel : it announces the arrival of the new generations, and it belongs to both the past and coming ages. At the point where the paths diverge, Don Quixote stands, dominating the entire landscape of fiction. Time has failed to wither its variety or to lessen its force, and posterity accepts it as a masterpiece of humoristic fancy, of complete observation and unsurpassed invention. It ceases, in effect, to belong to Spain as a mere local possession, though nothing can deprive her of the glory of producing it. Cervantes ranks with Shakespeare and with Homer as a citizen of the world, a man of all times and countries, and Don Quixote, with Hamlet and the Iliad, belongs to universal literature, and is become an eternal pleasaunce of the mind for all the nations."



"' The Novelas Exemplares,' twelve in number, are masterpieces which it has become a commonplace to say would have established Cervantes' lasting fame as a writer of fiction, even if he had never produced Don Quixote. Indeed they represent the highwater-mark of the short story in the Seventeenth Century, for as Cervantes overtops the earliest novelistas, so he remains superior to those who followed him. Not one of his successors reached the same level of attainment, none articulates his stories so well or writes with the same mastery of style, not one approaches him as a psychologist or observer; none compare with him in his power to depict life truly and to create character. It is doubtful whether the whole body of short stories after the 'Novelas exemplares' could yield a group of characters so living and so highly individualized."

MAGNIFICENT COPY OF THE RARE FIRST EDITION of this spurious "continuation" to Cervantes' masterpiece. The author, whose pseudonym is said to have veiled the identity of a Dominican monk, was a bitter enemy of Cervantes, and makes offensive remarks about him in this work. We owe to Avellaneda a clever, brutal, cynical, amusing book. Nor is this our only debt to him: he put an end to Cervantes' dawdling and procured the publication of the second part of Don Quixote. Cervantes left it doubtful if he meant to write the sequel; he even seems to invite another to undertake it. Eight years had passed, during which Cervantes made no sign. Avellaneda, with an eye to profit, wrote his continuation in good faith, and his insolent Preface is explained by his rage at seeing the bread taken out of his mouth when the true sequel was announced in the Preface to the Novelas. Had not his intrusion stung Cervantes to the quick, the second part of Don Quixote might never have appeared.

Many of the conversations give the author an opportunity to exercise his talent for satire, and he ridicules the use of affected language which was then prevalent.

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
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
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
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
