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PREFACE.

THE collection of Egyptian and Oriental antiquities gathered together by the late Lord Amherst of Hackney, F.S.A., and his daughter, the late Lady William Cecil, which were preserved at Didlington Hall, Norfolk, formed one of the most famous private collections in England. In 1861, Lord Amherst (then Mr. W. A. Tyssen Amherst) bought the collection of the Rev. W. Leider, of Cairo, which consisted of nearly 200 specimens. In 1865, he added many antiquities from the famous Galerie of Comte de Pourtalès-Gorgier, and later he acquired the entire museum of Mr. John Lee, of Hartwell House, Aylesbury. To the nucleus thus formed Lord Amherst added from time to time during his journeys to the East, and both he and Lady William Cecil carried out extensive excavations in the Nile valley, notably at Tell el Amarna in 1891-2, and at Assuan in 1902-4. Besides the antiquities gathered from these excavations, Professor Newberry purchased many important objects for the Didlington Hall Museum, which he always selected for their historical interest.

Many of the specimens are of great historic and artistic importance. Sculpture is represented by a fine series of reliefs of the Old Kingdom, mainly from Sakkara, and of the Later Empire from Thebes. Among the statues and statuettes, some are of exceptional artistic merit, in particular a limestone statuette of a dignitary, and two figures in wood of private individuals. There are a number of fragments of figures of members of the Royal family of Akhenaten, which were discovered in the *favissa* of the Great Sun temple at Tell el Amarna. These have a very special interest, as they are the only monuments from this particular part of the ancient city which have yet been brought to light. The series of glaze ware, glass, material for glass manufacture, and pottery moulds, is very representative.

In the collection of scarabs and cylinder seals, there are many that are unique. One cylinder seal — probably the most interesting example of glazed steatite that has come down to us—gives the full titulary of an otherwise unknown king. The earliest *dated* scarab of an official is also preserved in this collection, and there is a fine series of scarab-seals of Hyksos Kings and their officials. Among the shawabti figures are some of Seti I from the Salt collection, which were apparently found by Belzoni. There is also a good series of mummy cases, including a coffin which was brought to England in 1730. Among the bronzes is one bearing a bilingual inscription in hieroglyphs and Greek.

Several monuments bear names of little-known kings and queens —Tha-aa, the mother of Thothmes IV; Prince Amenhetep, of the Intermediate Period; Sen-Mut, the Prime Minister of Hatshepsut; and the Architect of her Mortuary Chapel at Deir el Bahari; Paser and Khay, Viziers of Rameses II; Bak-en-Khensu, High Priest of Amen, who was born in the reign of Seti I, and died under Rameses III; Paser, the Mayor of Thebes, who conducted the inquiry into the robberies of the Royal tombs under Rameses IX; are a few of the historic personages of ancient Egypt whose names occur in the antiquities now offered for sale.

The Cuneiform tablets range over a period of several thousand years, and many have been catalogued and translated by Dr. Pinches in his volume on *The Amherst Tablets*.

VI] 1
- 240 A round-topped limestone Stela of MARTI-HERU, a priest of Osiris and Amen, before whom he is represented offering. Ten lines of text, 12 in. by 19 in., *an interesting piece, broken and re-mended*; *XXX Dyn.* 1
- 241 Limestone Stela, in wooden frame, 17 in. by 13 in., of AYU and his sons IU-DI and PEDA-SET; the dedicator and his sons adore Osiris and Isis, *Lee collection*, 447, *good example*; *Ptolemaic period* 1

- 250 STATUE OF AN OFFICIAL, "The Royal Scribe, Superintendent of the Estate of Amen," NEKHTU; this figure holds in each hand a standard, wears a dignitary's wig, short beard, and long pleated kilt; incised on the sides of the pilaster behind is a figure of his wife whose name is unfortunately missing, 21 in. high, basalt; *though somewhat damaged it is a fine example of the XIX Dyn. Theban art* 1
- 251 A FINE HEAD AND TORSO, in green basalt, of a certain "Mayor, Royal Companion, Regulator of the Palace," etc., whose name is missing, 15 in. high, the nose damaged, but a very good and valuable piece; Saite 1
- 252 A limestone Head and Torso of a Queen, with drill-hole in forehead for uraeus, 7 in. high, a rubbed specimen; XXII-XXV Dyn. 1
- 253 A fine Head of an Osiride Figure, in greenish grey granite, 10 in. high; and three other Heads, in limestone and granite, much worn; the Osiride head is of the best XXVI Dyn. work 4
- 254 HEAD AND TORSO OF KING UAH-AB-RA (Psamtek I), in green basalt, with the prenomen and nomen incised upon the arms, and on pilaster at back, titles given and cartouche erased, the face fractured, but nevertheless a fine and rare piece, 11½ in. high; XXVI Dyn. 1
- 255 A SMALL LIMESTONE STATUETTE OF A HIGH OFFICIAL OF STATE, probably of KHA-EM-HAT (Vizier of Amenhetep III); this very charming figure, which wears the double wig, sleeved tunic, and long kilt of a dignitary, is portrayed in the squatting scribe posture, with head inclined down-

OBJECTS FROM TELL EL AMARNA.

The ancient City of Akhenaten, known to Europeans as Tell el Amarna, lies in a wide plain on the east side of the Nile, about one hundred and eighty miles south of Cairo. It was built about 1400 B.C. by Akhenaten—the son of the magnificent Amenhetep III—when he overthrew the worship of Amen and abandoned Thebes. Here he set up the worship of the Sun-disk Aten, and encouraged a new religion, art and ethics. Material from this site has, therefore, a very special archaeological interest, and the following sixty-one lots (Nos. 827-886) comprising objects discovered by Lord Amherst, 1891-2, in its town and temple, have been kept apart from the rest of the collection.
