* * * Gratian is reputed to have compiled in the monastery of S. Felix and S. Nabor at Bologna his celebrated treatise on Canon Law, which appeared in 1151 and which is said to have taken 24 years to write. The work includes texts of Holy Writ, Apostolic canons and the canons of about 500 Councils, decretals of the Popes, extracts from the Fathers and other ecclesiastical writers, and the Theodosian Code. He gave it the title of "*Concordia discordantium canonum*" to express the purpose he had in view of harmonising contradictory canons. His book soon became authoritative and the only text which professors of Canon Law used in their teaching and writings, and it is generally accepted as one of the finest contributions of the Middle Ages to the science of Canon Law. The first edition was printed in 1471, by H. Eggestein, the first book printed at Strasburg.

On the last leaf but one of the present manuscript is an incomplete proclamation of Innocent IV, promulgating decrees made at the Council of Lyons, 1246.

But really I don't think it much uglier than what I see every day in the looking glass, and I especially forbid you from answering this observation by any flattery.

At page 210, in a letter to B. R. Haydon, dated July 18th, 1825, she says :

When I last saw my portrait it seemed to me as like as what I see every day in the looking glass; and even if it were as ugly as Medusa I should always think it the greatest honour of my life that it was painted.

They were worn by Ducrow in one of his impersonations before William IV, and have remained in the family ever since. D'Orsay met Byron at Genoa (April–May, 1823) and became very friendly with him; he drew two pencil portraits of him, one of which is reproduced in the Letters and Journals (ed. R. E. Prothero, Vol. V, frontispiece), while the other was sold at Wellington St., June 13, 1913. Mr. Harold Nicolson (Byron, *The Last Journey*, 1924, p. 259) records that:

During the night of the 16th [April 1824] . . . he (Byron) became delirious and as a precaution Tita removed the pistols and the stiletto which he always kept beside his bed.
