CONDITIONS OF SALE.

- I. The highest bidder to be the buyer; and if any dispute arise between bidders, the lot so disputed shall be immediately put up again, provided the Auctioneer cannot decide the said dispute.
- II. No person to advance less than 1s.; above five pounds 2s. 6d.; and so on in proportion.
- III. In the case of lots upon which there is a reserve, the Auctioneer shall have the right to bid on behalf of the Seller.

with twelve miniatures with borders, over two hundred capitals, and a great number of initials in gold and colours. All are of very fine work, and in brilliant condition. The volume commences with the Calendar, on six folios, written in red and black, containing the names of an unusually large number of English Saints, viz. Edward the Confessor, Bishop Wulstan, Archbishop Oswald of York, Archbishop David of Wales, Ceadde or Chad Bishop of Lichfield, St. Patrick, King Edward the Martyr, Cuthbert Bishop of Lindisfarne, Elphege Archbishop of Canterbury, Brandan a Scotch Abbot, St. Dunstan, Adhelme Bishop of Sherborne, St. Augustine, St. Botolph, St. Alban, Queen Edeltrude, St. Kenelme King of Mercia, St. Oswald, St. Cuthbert, St. Edith, St. Edmond Archbishop of Canterbury, Hugues Bishop of Lincoln, King Edmond, St. Thomas à Becket. Under each month is shown the mean duration of the hours of the day and night. Following the Calendar are five leaves of prayers to various Saints, including one to St. Thomas (Becket); one leaf is transposed. The Hours follow, having a headline in red, "INCIPIUNT HORE BEATE MARIE VIRGINIS SECUNDUM USUM SARUM." On the forty-eighth folio occurs, "ORŌ VENĀBIL BEDE P̄SBITI DE SEPTĒ UBIS XPI PENDENTIS IN CRUCE," then come the Penitential Psalms. In the Litany are noticeable the names of St. Swithin, St. Viron (Scotland), and St. Edith; at the end are the Psalms of St. Jerome. The twelve miniatures represent (1) Jesus in Gethsemane, (2) The Taking of Jesus, (3) Jesus before Caiaphas, (4) Jesus scourged, (5) Jesus carrying the cross, (6) Jesus crucified, (7) Jesus taken down from the cross, (8) Jesus in the Sepulchre, (9) The Resurrection of the Dead, (10) Burial Service, (11) Jesus standing in the Sepulchre, (12) St. Jerome in the costume of a Cardinal seated and writing. The scenes in the miniatures are painted on varied back-grounds, and are surrounded with architectural frames; several are remarkable for the costumes and armour of the period. The fourteen large capital letters are very fine, being painted in colours on a gold ground; flowing from them is gold scroll work enclosing the text on three sides. The pages in which these and the miniatures occur have deep borders of foliage and flowers. This Manuscript, in which apparently one or two folios after the Calendar and two miniatures are missing, was taken to Spain in the XVIth century, and somewhat later re-bound. The binding is in fine preservation, and is a remarkable and beautiful specimen of Spanish binding in the Oriental style. - * * * The volume is remarkable for the beauty of the miniatures and also for the text which commences with a prayer to the Virgin in French, followed by various Orisons in Latin and Italian. The binding, brown morocco, known as "Reliure à la Passion," is one of the finest specimens of the period of Henri III, the sides are covered with the doubled M and Y, flames and tears, and is in perfect preservation. 

- * * * A MOST BEAUTIFUL MANUSCRIPT of the French School, written in round letters on fine vellum, embellished with sixteen miniatures of the full size of the page within architectural frames, twenty-two smaller miniatures in the text, and nineteen pages of text with rich borders of flowers, fruits, birds, insects, arabesques, architectural designs on blue and gold in the style of Geoffroy Tory. In the sale of the Hamilton Manuscripts from Berlin, no. 58 was very similar, though the miniatures in it may possibly be considered somewhat inferior to those in the present volume, which was written on the occasion of the marriage of Claude de France daughter of Queen Anne of Brittany and Louis XII with her cousin Francois Comte d'Angoulême (Francis I). In the miniature of Susannah and the Elders she is represented in her well-known grey costume sitting on the steps of the bath. La Cordelière (order of Chivalry founded by her mother) is found in the borders and is embossed on the edges. Sixteen pages are surrounded with Dolphins (Francis I was Dauphin for some months), three other pages are decorated with flowers on a gold ground recalling the borders of the famous Heures de la Reine Anne de Bretagne. with twelve miniatures with borders, over two hundred capitals, and a great number of initials in gold and colours. All are of very fine work, and in brilliant condition. The volume commences with the Calendar, on six folios, written in red and black, containing the names of an unusually large number of English Saints, viz. Edward the Confessor, Bishop Wulstan, Archbishop Oswald of York, Archbishop David of Wales, Ceadde or Chad Bishop of Lichfield, St. Patrick, King Edward the Martyr, Cuthbert Bishop of Lindisfarne, Elphege Archbishop of Canterbury, Brandan a Scotch Abbot, St. Dunstan, Adhelme Bishop of Sherborne, St. Augustine, St. Botolph, St. Alban, Queen Edeltrude, St. Kenelme King of Mercia, St. Oswald, St. Cuthbert, St. Edith, St. Edmond Archbishop of Canterbury, Hugues Bishop of Lincoln, King Edmond, St. Thomas à Becket. Under each month is shown the mean duration of the hours of the day and night. Following the Calendar are five leaves of prayers to various Saints, including one to St. Thomas (Becket); one leaf is transposed. The Hours follow, having a headline in red, "INCIPIUNT HORE BEATE MARIE VIRGINIS SECUNDUM USUM SARUM." On the forty-eighth folio occurs, "ORŌ VENĀBIL BEDE PSBITI DE SEPTĒ UBIS XPI PENDENTIS IN CRUCE," then come the Penitential Psalms. In the Litany are noticeable the names of St. Swithin, St. Viron (Scotland), and St. Edith; at the end are the Psalms of St. Jerome. The twelve miniatures represent (1) Jesus in Gethsemane, (2) The Taking of Jesus, (3) Jesus before Caiaphas, (4) Jesus scourged, (5) Jesus carrying the cross, (6) Jesus crucified, (7) Jesus taken down from the cross, (8) Jesus in the Sepulchre, (9) The Resurrection of the Dead, (10) Burial Service, (11) Jesus standing in the Sepulchre, (12) St. Jerome in the costume of a Cardinal seated and writing. The scenes in the miniatures are painted on varied back-grounds, and are surrounded with architectural frames; several are remarkable for the costumes and armour of the period. The fourteen large capital letters are very fine, being painted in colours on a gold ground; flowing from them is gold scroll work enclosing the text on three sides. The pages in which these and the miniatures occur have deep borders of foliage and flowers. This Manuscript, in which apparently one or two folios after the Calendar and two miniatures are missing, was taken to Spain in the XVIth century, and somewhat later re-bound. The binding is in fine preservation, and is a remarkable and beautiful specimen of Spanish binding in the Oriental style. On one folio two of the early Spanish possessors have written their names, titles and dates, 1536 and 1789. [*See ILLUSTRATIONS*]
