

I received your loving ltrs. by Mr. Addington, who took ship at Bristol for N[ew] E[ngland], who tould me the same which your ltrs. did import, viz. and those several yards of linen cloth comited to his hands fro yourselfe, to me, for the Indian work, but faith be they came so late, viz. a very little spare before the ship set sail, in so much that there was no liberty nor roome for them in the ship...

The Lord's work (through his grace) goeth on among the Indians, & wheras the last year we had but one towne on foote, viz. that of Natick . . . now we have 3 more, & the furthest not full 30 miles distant from me & sundry do come in & submit themselves unto the Lord. I hope you have found the confessions wh. they made before the Lord, & before many of his people (some of them) and this yeare I have not again attempted this work, because I desired first to hear what acceptance the Lord gave unto their confessions, but now we purpose (if the Lord will) the next spring to attempt the work again. We are not without very great discouragements . . .

I greive it is difficult for such as dwell in the country to get anything transported to N. E. & therefore I have toke this course that Mr. Butcher at London & Mr. Pym at Exon. will take that care for any that mind to send unto us, but I desire privatly to avoyd offence, for the publik collectors in England & our Commissioners here, are not well pleased with such things, though I think

it is their infirmity, for the Lord hath appoynted private as well as publik charity, & hath blessed, in this Indian work, private charity ...

\*\* Eliot translated Baxter's "Call" into the dialect of the Massachusetts Indians, 1664; the only copy of this translation was sold in the Royal Society's sale, May 4th, 1925, for £6,800; his translation of the Bible into the same dialect was issued in 1663. He also published "The Indian Grammar Begun," an "Indian Primer" and "The Harmony of the Gospels." He narrated the progress of his work in "Indian Tracts." His letters are of EXTREME RARITY; we cannot trace the sale of another in this country.

Writing in June, 1813, he says:

know of my disposition—when I meet a kindred soul, I (like Hamlet) "wear him in my heart's core, aye in my heart of hearts." Distress me then I beg of you no more with such unjust suspicions. In 1814, he has a long and favourable criticism of the poems of Stuart Lewis, the Scottish poet, who died in 1818; and an interesting description of the successful examination he underwent for the position of Mathematical Master at Annan Academy. Speaks of the

critique on Byron in the Edinburgh Review, and that he is waiting for an account of "Waverley"

In the following year he writes:

I went to Dumfries on the fifth of June to witness the laying of the foundation stone of Burns' mausoleum. There was, as is usual, an infinite deal of parade and fuss: but notwithstanding this—it was an interesting scene—unfortunate Burns! the man who views thy lowly grave, and thinks on the soaring Spirit that once animated thy now slumbering dust, who considers, that "that mouth from which flowed eloquence and persuasion, is now filled with clay; and that heart with all its generous arteries, compressed into a clod of the valley"—and still dares to "draw thy frailties from their dread abode."

"With him, Sweet Bard! may fancy die, And joy desert the blooming year!"

It is a superb monument; I am only sorry it is not over his grave —much ought to have been sacrificed to gain this point.

In 1819 he writes gloomily concerning his future:

As to my own prospects ... I can give no satisfactory reply to your friendly inquiries. A good portion of my life is already mingled with the past eternity; and for the future—it is a dim scene... The probability of my doing any service, in my day and generation, is certainly not very strong...

In 1824 he speaks of Charles Lamb and Coleridge:

Charles Lamb is a rickety creature in body and mind, sprawls about and walks as if his body consisted of four ill-conditioned flails, and talks as if he were quarter drunk with ale and half with laudanum. Coleridge is a steam-engine of a hundred horses power — with the boiler burst. His talk is resplendent with imagery and the shows of thought....

In 1840 and 1841 there are mentions of the founding of the London Library, wherein he played a prominent part, and in the final letter, dated *Nov.* 1865, he refers to his election as Lord Rector of Edinburgh University. Each letter is accompanied by a typed transcript.—Carlyle (John Aitken) physician, younger brother of Thos. Carlyle, A Series of Six A. L. s. to Dr. Murray (26)

health was failing, obtained permission from the Admiralty for him to take a voyage in one of H.M. Ships and accompanied him to Portsmouth to see him off. In an Auto. Memorandum inserted in vol. I, Capt. Hall describes this incident, and continues:

I happened to mention that I had become the possessor of the Manuscript Copy of the Antiquary in his, the Author's, own handwriting. Upon which he was pleased to say, that he was glad it had fallen into my hands—As IT was the novel which he himself preferred to any other he had written; "and," continued he, "if you will let me have it for a few minutes I shall be happy to write in it for you the reason of my preference." I sent immediately to London for this 1st volume of the MS. & next morning placed it in his hands; when he sat down and wrote the following two pages; adding, at my request, his signature and the date. I have reason to believe that this is the last thing he wrote in England, & when he returned his health was entirely gone & he wrote no more.

The very fine letter referred to, signed and dated Portsmouth, 27th October, 1839, follows; in it Scott goes into

details as to the original of the Antiquary:

Among the numerous creatures of my imagination, the author has had a particular partiality for the Antiquary. It is one of the very few of my works of fiction which contains a portrait from life and it is the likeness of a friend of my infancy boyhood and youth -a fact detected at the time by the acuteness of Mr. James Chalmers, solicitor-at-law in London. This gentleman ... when he read the Antiquary, told my friend, William Erskine, that he was now perfectly satisfied that Walter Scott, of whom personally he knew really nothing, was the author of these mysterious works of fiction; for that the character of Jonathan Oldbuck of Monkbarns, was drawn from the late George Constable of Wallace Craigie of Dundee, who dined, when in Edinburgh, twice or thrice with my father every week & used to speak of my sayings and doings as a clever boy ... I owed him much for the kindness with which he treated me ... he taught me to read and understand Shakespeare ... The sort of preference which I gave and still give this work is from its connection wt the early scenes of my life, etc.

The manuscript is closely written in Scott's customary regular and rapid hand, with small inner and no outer margins. Numerous additions, some of considerable length, appear on almost all the blank pages opposite the main body of the text; erasures and interlinear and marginal corrections are as usual few. The condition is excellent throughout. Probably the finest existing Manuscript by Sir Walter Scott, the Manuscript of "Waverley" being incomplete.

the Continent in his youth, originally comprised Spanish, Dutch, Italian, French and German, as well as English literature, was more or less neglected for a considerable period after his death, until in 1761 a valuable portion was presented to St. John's College, Cambridge. Before this Col. Reymes' granddaughter had married the owner of Zeals, and the residue of the collection was eventually removed to Zeals, where it has remained until now.

The "Meneries" or Minories was a house of Nuns of the Franciscan order called the Abbey of St. Clare. The first of the order were brought to England by Blanche of Navarre, wife of Edmund, Earl of Lancaster ("Crouchback"). The Earl, in 1293, obtained leave of his brother, Edward I, to build an abbey for them on the east side of the street leading from the Tower of London to Aldgate-without. The Nuns were called Poor Clares or Minoresses, whence the name "Minories" of the present day. The last abbess, Dame Elizabeth Salvage, surrendered the abbey to Henry VIII in 1539. The saints in the Calendar point to an English origin. Among those in red are Wulstan, Agnes, Vincent, Agatha, King Edward, Cuthbert, Ambrose, George, Vitalis, Erconwald, Margaret, Edith, Wulfran, King Edmund, Clement, Lucy, Thomas à Becket.

(2) A miniature at the foot of the same page (33 in. by 11 in.) in eight small compartments illustrating incidents in the lives of saints. (3) The initial D (3 in. by 31 in.) of Ps. XXVII "Dominus illuminato mea" in four compartments showing Christ performing deeds of mercy. (4) The initial D (3,5 in. by 3,7 in.) of Ps. XXXIX "Dixi custodiam" in four compartments, each depicting a king or saint kneeling before a group of saints. (5) A miniature (17 in. by 3 7 in.) in three compartments illustrating Ps. LXIX, verse 1. (6) A miniature (21 in. by 31 in.) at the beginning of Ps. CX, "Dixit Dominus Domino meo: Sede a dextris meis," showing the Almighty subduing his enemies typified by the devil lying prostrate with his hands bound.

The borders, which are of slender columnar design, take in the middle as well as the four outer margins of the page. They contain an extraordinary variety of human figures, the details of costume and composition showing an amazing fertility of invention. Beside the human figures, which include men in armour, men blowing trumpets, archers, musicians, monks, beggars, fools and nude figures, there are centaurs and other demihuman creatures, animals and monsters with human heads, stags, monkeys, birds, an eagle eating a rabbit, a camel, etc. The borders are further decorated with thick pellets and leaves of gold. They belong to a very uncommon type in which the figures are worked in to form an integral part of the border. Borders with similar characteristics are found in three other MSS, with which the

present volume may be compared: (1) The Bible of Philip or Robert of Anjou, Princes of Taranto, in the library of Mr. Dyson Perrins( see the Catalogue by Sir George Warner, 1920, pp. 149-150 and Plate 58), probably from Naples, XIV Century. The figure of the man blowing two horns in the right hand border of the page there illustrated is strikingly like the figure of the man blowing two horns on folio 16 of the present manuscript. (2) The splendid manuscript in the Bibliothèque Nationale "Statuts de l'ordre du Saint-Esprit . . . institué à Naples en 1352 par Louis d'Anjouz" (reproduced in facsimile and edited by M. le Comte Horace de Viel Castel, Paris, Englemann et Graf, 1853), in which the borders are on the whole of a much more conventional character, but the same treatment of the human figure is noticeable and the artist was fond of introducing green parrots into the decoration, which is also a peculiarity of the present manuscript. (3) A Bible in the Imperial Library at Vienna, cod. 1191, "peint dans le sud d'Italie, probablement à Naples, dans le 2e moitié du XIVe Siècle," in which are found slender columnar borders with human figures used in a similar fashion (see Bulletin de la Société Française de Reproductions de Manuscripts à Peintures, 3c Année, No. 1, 1913, p. 51 and Plate 35.)

The borders of the present Manuscript are much more interesting and varied than those found in any of the three above mentioned. It seems probable that the artist was a native of Naples, as the other three Manuscripts referred to are all of Neapolitan origin.

Several shields of arms appear in the borders, including at f. 24, framed in the decoration, those of a member of the House of Anjou. The others, of which there are three, it has proved impossible definitely to identify, in view of the incompleteness of 14th Century pedigrees. Two of the coats appear in an impalement at f. 18 verso (arg. a lion rampant gu., a label az. impaling or a fess sa.); the third (gu. three lions rampant or) is separately depicted at f. 29. The former may be intended to represent a marriage of the great Neapolitan house of Cantelini, in which case the latter would be read as Branciforte. It is also possible, however, that the coats are of German origin (there was much movement into Naples from Central Europe during the reigns of Charles II and Queen Johanna I, whose fourth consort was Duke Otto of Brunswick-Gräbenhagen, 1376-93). In that the coat with three lions is probably that of the Wildgraves of Kyrburg, and the first coat of the impalement possibly that of the Wildgraves of Daun, who absorbed the Kyburg dynasty by marriage in 1406: the second coat of the impalement would be that of the Counts of Mörs.
