- I. The highest bidder to be the buyer ; and if any dispute arise between bidders, the lot so disputed shall be immediately put up again, provided the Auctioneer cannot decide the said dispute.
- II. No person to advance less than 1s. ; above five pounds 2s. 6d. ; and so on in proportion.
- III. All lots are sold subject to the right to impose a reserve ; and subject to the right to bid by, or on behalf of, the seller.
- IV. The purchasers to give in their names and places of abode, and to pay down 10s. in the pound, if required, in part payment of the purchase-money, in default of which the lot or lots purchased to be immediately put up again and re-sold.
- V. The lots to be taken away, at the buyer's expense, immediately after the conclusion of the sale ; in default of which Messrs. SOTHEY & Co. will not hold themselves responsible if lost, stolen, damaged, or otherwise destroyed, but they will be left at the sole risk of the purchaser. 

** EXCEEDINGLY RARE. The Bibliographical Society's Handlist of books printed by Pynson after 1500 records only two dated and three undated Year Books, none of the above being included; while under Robert Redman, no Year Books are entered. Mention should however be made of the very fine collection of early Year Books in the library of George Dunn of Woolley Hall, which, with the other early law books and manuscripts in that library, was sold *en bloc* in 1913. This included a set, Edw. IV, 1-22, printed by Pynson and Redman, but as the collations and colophons were not given in the catalogue, it is impossible to say whether it contained any of the issues in the present volume; but from the details given, three at least were different. Besides this set (lot 337), there was another (lot 329) containing Edw. IV, 1-8. In this case collations are given, showing that the years 3, 4, 5 and 7 were of different issue from those now offered, while 6 and 8 may have been the same. There were also three Pynson Year Books, Edw. IV, 9, 20 and 21, separately bound (lots 325-327), the collations of which agreed in each case with those given above. Herbert records the dated Year Book, xix Edw. IV (No. 17 in this lot), which has a particular importance as confirming the date of Redman's removal into St. Dunstan's Parish,

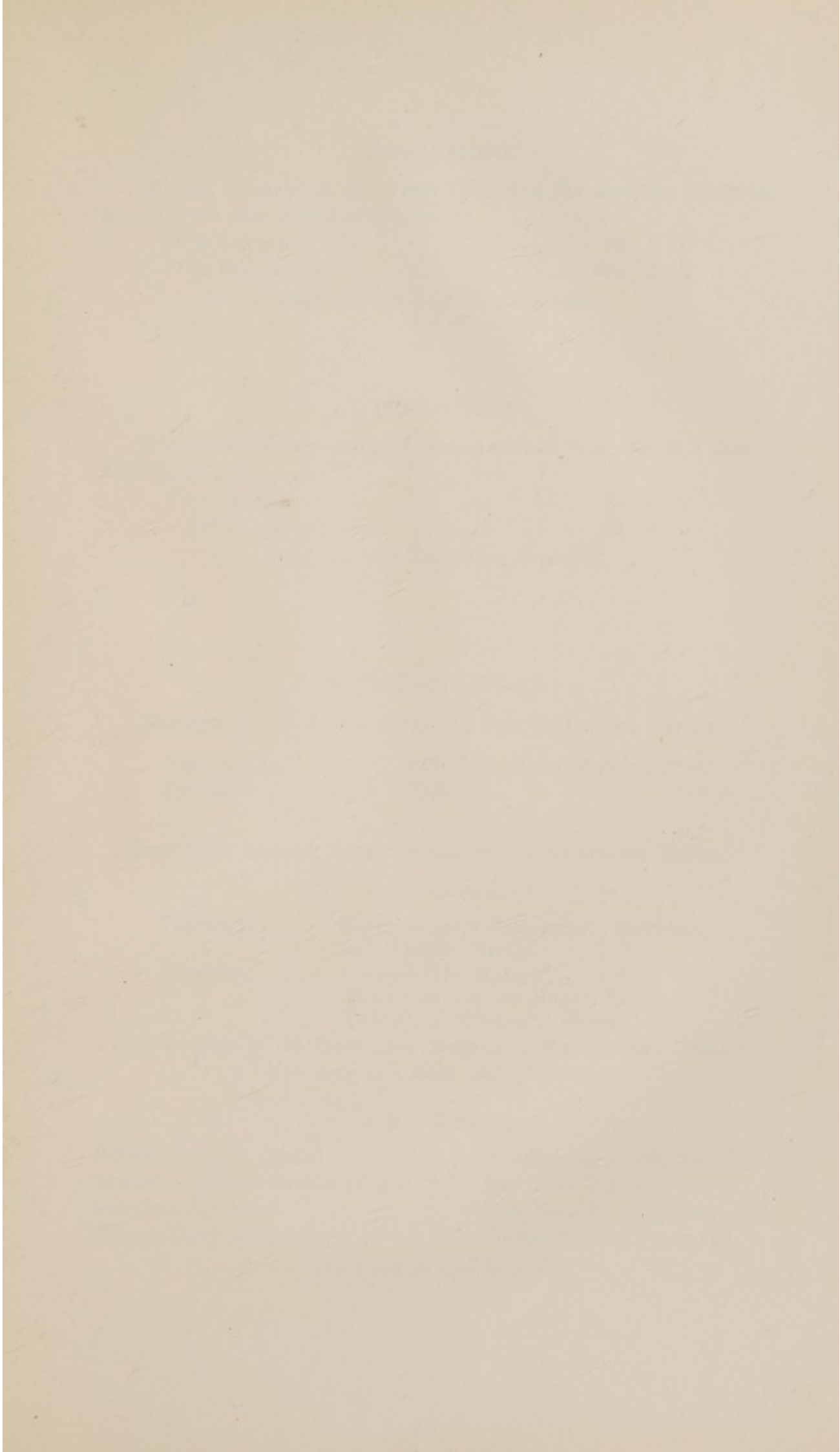

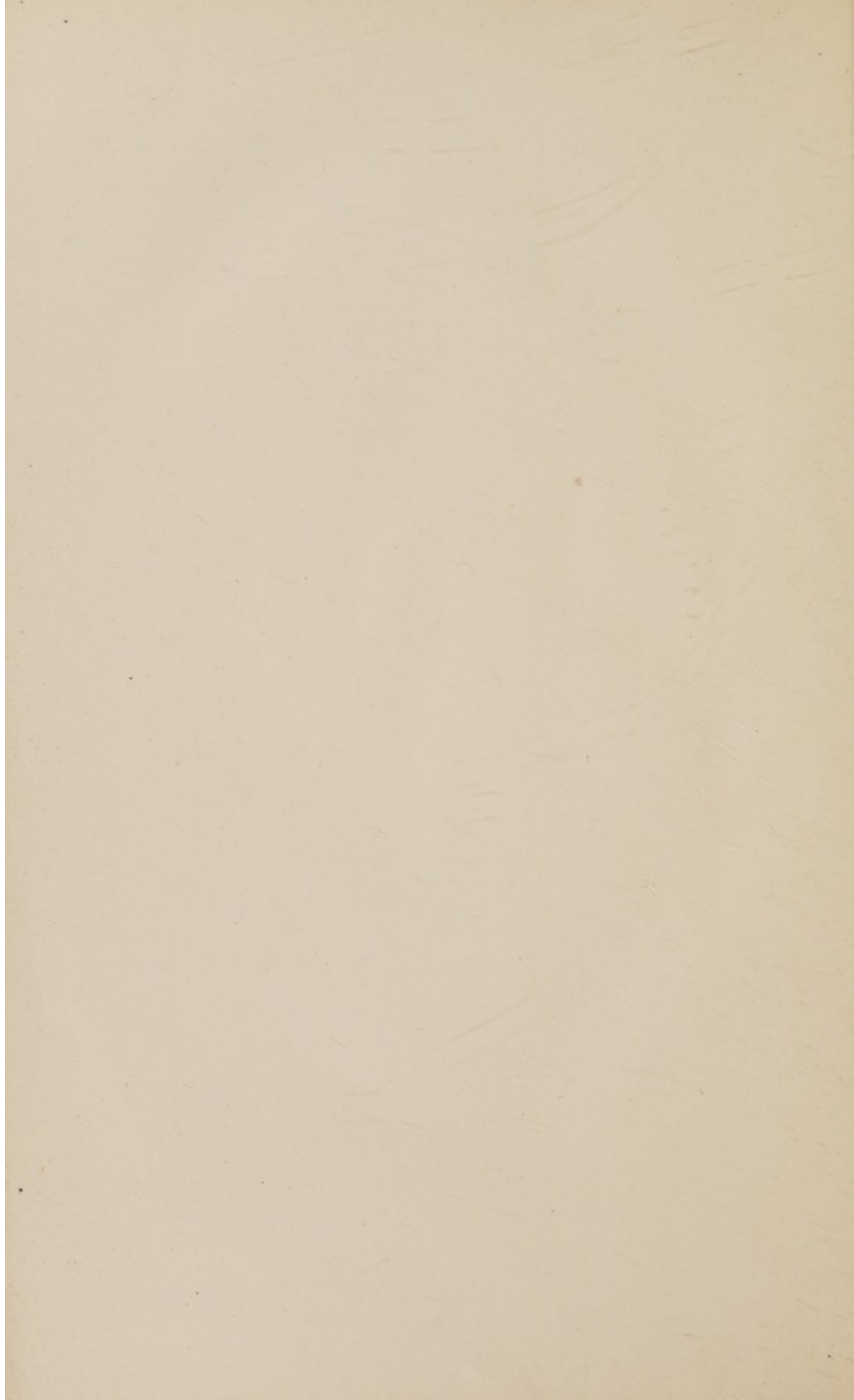
