ARNOLD (Dr. J.), Surgeon in the Navy, F.L.S. etc. noted Naturalist. Auto. Journal from August, 1810 to Decr. 1815, upwards of 500 pp. 8vo, half bound :

This interesting record commences with a day by day account of a voyage from Australia to England; they fall in with an American vessel, present them with two large pigs, two or three bags of potatoes and a large cheese. On arriving in London Dr. Arnold dines with Governor Bligh and throughout the diary he expresses a strong bias in favour of Bligh. He goes to Haslar and expresses bitter criticism against the excessive and indiscriminate bleeding of the patients. He visits Guy's Hospital Medical Society and hears a hot debate on the function of the spleen.

From March 1815 the diary commences with Dr. Arnold as medical Officer on a convict ship bound for Port Jackson. When only six days out from Rio, it is feared that the supply of bread for the convicts will not hold out. The Newgate convicts are served out with 2 suits of clothes—a gift of the Sheriffs of London. They reach Port Jackson on June 18th. He calls on Governor Macquarrie but is received with coldness, but elsewhere he is accorded a good welcome.

My reception from the Governor was cold and disgusting and equally frigid from Mrs. Macquarrie, both of whom I knew well when they arrived at this place. My reception from other persons was flattering and agreeable.

The State of society is very prosperous at present in Sydney. The Governor admits convicts to his table, & the Officers of the 46th do not. The Governor admits convicts to ye highest office, and seems to despise those persons who hold respectable situations not of his appointment. I myself was rather ashamed of being a guest at Mr. Redfern's table, although he is rich and a great friend of the Governors. The Colony appears to me to be really in a state of dissatisfaction Governor Macquarrie is hardly acceptable to anyone. I suppose the prime reason is that he appoints convicts to the most respectable offices and rejects the respectable settler. Two of the Magistrates at Sydney, Darcy Wentworth Esq. and W. Lord Esq. are convicts. The postmaster (Nickols) is a convict. Mr. Wentworth—Surgeon General was sent out on account of some highway robberies . . .

There are some twenty pages devoted to his impressions of life in Sydney

ARNOLD (Dr. Joseph), F.L.S., Surgeon in the Royal Navy, noted Naturalist. An interesting series of 19 A. L. s. 1812-14, written to his brother from *H.M.S. Alcmena* :

Describing the blockade of Corfu by the English Fleet, and gives a description of the Island; and of Lissa; From Port Mahon in August and October 1813, he describes the ravages of the Plague in Malta and says the King of Sardinia forbids the English from landing in Minorca, owing to the taking of an American vessel that was going into the Bay of Cagliari under the protection of a Sardinian Man o' war, for "though we are at war with America the Sardinians are not." An interesting letter from H.M.S. Hibernia, Mahon Harbour, Dec. 1813 describes Captain Cogan as one of the most violent men in the service and one of the greatest fighters. Is now serving under Capt. Brace also a great fighter but often takes his ship under French batteries and loses many men "So that it would be a sad mistake if a shot should come too near me,

with two Letters written in *H.M.S. America*, 1814

From the transport *Northampton* at *Rio de Janeiro*, March, 1814, he says :

This place is very large & things tolerably cheap, with great quantities of fruit as never are seen in England. We can buy fine apples for two pence each. We expect to leave this place about the 15th. of March and shall not touch at any place till we arrive at Botany Bay.

AUSTRALIA. Two remarkable A. L. s. from Dr. Joseph Arnold, written from *Sidney Cove* in *February and March*, 1810, 19 pp. folio (one page defective) :

He commences with a dramatic story of the privations of the voyage from the Cape to Botany Bay.

On our arrival we found that the deposed Governor Bligh was at sea, and Governor McQuarrie took charge of his dominions amidst the firing of guns splendid illuminations etc., about a month afterwards Commodore Bligh arrived . . . the people here are divided into two parties, viz. those who supported Bligh's Government & and those who opposed it which possess ye greater power and numbers.

Bligh is hated wherever he goes and people who dare hoot him, he however retains the honours of a Governor as long as he remains here. The officers of the 102nd. are at great enmity with him & he intends to hang some of them for rebellion & mutiny . . . Governor McQuarrie & his lady are both Scotch & consequently close fisted . . . he keeps a shabby table. Some of the convicts, their time having expired are now very rich . . . Mr. Wentworth who was highwayman, is now Surgeon-General of the Colony & is said to be worth, £30,000 ready cash. Wentworth bought 4000 gallons of Rum in Rio Janeiro at 2/- a gallon and sold it here at the enormous price of 8 & 10£ a gallon.

Dr. Arnold in his second letter, of some 14 pp. goes into the case of Governor Bligh very fully and for whom he displays a good deal of sympathy; he gives a full and descriptive account of Sydney and describes at length a visit to Paramatta and Green Hills

References to the common practise of caricaturing famous men and women on the stage; John Dryden and Ben Jonson's "Cataline"



But if the Paper should go by the board, then I shall be strongly disposed to do so, and to go abroad for another year. For I have engaged to produce a new story in twenty monthly parts, and I think I could write it more comfortably and easily, abroad, than at home ... Against my coming away at all, there is the consideration that I am (nominally, God knows), a Law Student, and have a certain number of 'terms to keep' before I can be called to the Bar; and it would be well for me to recollect, as there are many little pickings to be got—pretty easily within my reach, which *can* only be bestowed on Barristers. Again, there is the consideration that the good people of England seem to be fonder of their favourite (your humble servant and physician) now, than ever; and that it might be a pity to run away from them, when they are so very kind. On the other hand if these people *do* ruin the Paper, I shall be very much annoyed, and would rather not have to be questioned and condoled with, and of all sorts of things, in all Kinds of society. Now every day (to the exclusion of almost all other occupation) I have been discussing the pros and cons of all these questions with Forster ... I shall publish early next month, a little volume called "Pictures from Italy"—astonish the consul by telling him the title, and give him my regards. An early copy shall be got to you, by some means or other. You have been in my society these many days, for I have just finished Rome, and am now working back to Genoa. The greater part of the descriptions are written in letters to Forster, but the putting of them together, and making additions to them, and touching them up, is rather a long job. Etc.

This Draft differs considerably from the published version and has many references to Shakespeare, etc. It is divided into sub-headings: Manners and Occupations; Comfort, quoting the Poet Burns: Scepticism, Contradiction, Sympathy, Metaphysics . . . In Shakespeare it has a different sense from what it bears in the School, he expresses by ye word metaphysical anything beyond out of nature 'metaphysical aid,' in Macbeth is used to signify the magic of the Witches. Music . . . Johnson's Epitaph on Goldsmith expresses something like this. Moliere by far the greatest of French Comic Writers wants that sort of humour which his English rival (Shakespeare) gives to the Persons of his Dramas. Instances Falstaff, Malvolio, Jaques. Shakespeare, his power of marking 'the silent march of thought.' One might make a long list of what might be called the Puerilities of Shakespeare, which we never think of censuring, redeemed as they are by a thousand Beauties wh. it is singular are so much in their neighbourhood, that it seems odd how the same Author would have produced both of them. The Exuberance of his fancy revelled in this sort of indulgence which neither his own Taste nor that of his Age were sufficient to correct. "Pope dressed his shepherds in embroidery." Etc. Etc.

Young has the advantage of Shakespeare, that Zanga's motive is more strongly mark'd, the want of which in a certain degree is a fault, that all my partiality for the great Master of the part cannot make me overlook in the part of Iago . . . How do I envy Dr. Goldsmith his subject of the Deserted Village . . . I do not remember that you recommended Goldsmith's Deserted Village to me . . . There wanted only some thunder and lighting to make it (the night) a Lear's one." Quotes Julius Caesar: "There is a tide in the affairs of men . . . I, as well as The Vicar of Wakefield (Goldsmith) am particularly delighted with happy faces. The character of a female Pedant from Fielding downwards . . . About The Fool of Quality and Adventures of a Guinea. Allan Ramsay . . . I can only parodize the exclamation of Lear, 'Why should a Cat, a Rat, a Dog, have life?' . . . Rousseau's Pygmalion if it be really Rousseau's is such a performance as he might have written in his sleep . . . Mr. Nicholson Stewart lately exhibited his Richard III . . . His idea of the part was good and in some places very well express'd, but this outline wanted filling up, and the power of his voice particularly fail'd him in the execution of his conceptions, nor did he in general give to the mind a portraiture of the ferocious, sanguinary Richard . . . Since I wrote you I have been two or three times with Dr. Johnson. I found him possessed of all the powers of conversation . . . There is an accuracy in his style and a boldness in his figures (for he talks much in figures) wh. are the property of few: there is great morality in his

sentiments and force in his Decisions; but the first are often more originally expressed than conceiv'd and the last sometimes confidently pronounced without the deduction of argument. His wisdom is dogmatical and his wit unfeeling. After all however in vigor of Faculties and command of expression he is an extraordinary man; and tho' there is no winning quality about him, his company is well worth courting to enjoy his conversation being simple and clear. Johnson's *Tour to the Highlands* is now published, but no copy of it has yet reach'd Edinburgh, except one which Boswell got down by post. I understand it is just what I understood it to be with regard to Ossian, allowing no merit to the Poems at any rate, and strenuously denying their originality. The Gentle Shepherd (Allan Ramsay) is the chef d'oeuvre in its way. There never was perhaps inspiration equal to Shakespear's. We have had lately some of his scenes curiously interpolated with modern sings to give an opportunity for the display of Colley's singing, wh. met wt. a very favourable reception here. Your friend the Duchess was the great first mover of his and like Sir John Falstaff not only gay herself but the cause of gaiety in others. This only serves to introduce to Mr. Burns, the Celebrated Ayrshire Poet, of whom I have written more fully in a letter by Post wh. will reach you several days before this, as he and his fellow-traveller, Mr. Nicoll make a pretty long circuitous Tour. Not forgetting the two Nymphs of the Castle as Mr. Burns wd. say.

690 MACKENZIE (H.) Transcripts of Letters from Samuel Rogers, the Banker-Poet, to Mackenzie:

As to the verses written by Queen Mab [Shelley] (for I suspect the writer to be no less a personage), they are really wonderful . . . Grasshopper's song is worthy of Ariel himself . . . and Burns might have been proud of them. Columbus returns his best compliments, etc. . . . Mrs. Siddons from a discreet regard to her amplitude of person, begs leave to decline a comparison with this actor from Lilliput (Henry West Betty—the Young Roscius. Mentions Scott's *Lay of the Last Minstrel*, which is in the press. About the young Roscius' acting. His acting may now be compared to painting in water-colours—by and by it will acquire more force and body . . . Mrs. Siddons has retired to Hampstead for her health . . . I heard her read the trial scene in the *Merchant of Venice* the other night with great effect . . . Mr. Pitt has become a playgoer, and Mr. Jose, with whom I saw him (Betty) in *Hamlet*, thought his acting during the Play better than Garricks.
