In the last six years the Hospital of England which has received the largest number of medical cases into its wards has been the London Fever Hospital. The great endowed hospitals of London, which also minister to accidents, have, indeed, received larger total numbers, but not even these have equalled the London Fever Hospital in the number of persons whom sickness has driven to seek relief within their walls. When it is added that the Fever Hospital, in a peculiar degree, benefits those from among whom the patient is taken, and not only the sick person himself, the Institution must be regarded as in the very first rank for usefulness among the great charities of the country. With this sense of the magnitude and importance of their Hospital, the Committee claim attention for the following account of their recent work.

Since the present epidemic of typhus began in London at the end of 1861, the total admissions into the Hospital have been more than half those of the whole sixty years from its foundation up to that time. From 1801 to the end of 1861, 32,250 persons had been received. In 1862-67 the benefits of the Charity were extended to no fewer than 18,152 persons. Each year's admissions in the latter period has been,—

The 2,801 patients admitted in 1867 were not all suffering from specific fevers. In many, the fever was dependent on some local disease, or else the nature of the disease was obscure or had been misapprehended; deducting these, the patients brought for true "fevers" numbered 2,285.

Classified broadly, according to the nature of their illness, the number of patients received, and the monthly admissions, are shown in the following table, with the daily average number of patients under treatment each month:—

To refer more particularly to each class of disease, and first to TYPHUS FEVER, it is satisfactory to observe that there are signs of abatement in the epidemic that has so severely ravaged the metropolis. The total admissions for typhus were 1,383, a smaller number than in any of the three years immediately preceding. Fewer typhus cases were admitted in 1867 than in 1866 from each of the great divisions of London, with the one exception of the Eastern districts, where the fever has doubtless been maintained by the exceptional operation of one of its chief causes—destitution.

The deaths from typhus that occurred in the year were 275, or 19·8 per cent. of the number of admissions for the disease, the mortality of males being somewhat greater than that of females, viz. : 21·5 and 18·4 in the two sexes respectively. Of the 1,383 cases admitted in 1867, (which have now, at the date of this Report, all been treated to a termination), the precise number of deaths has been 273 at the ages that are shown below. As usual, typhus was most fatal to those who had passed the middle period of life.\*

\* The numbers in the third column are the actual deaths among the cases in the second, all of which are now terminated. At the ages marked †, one patient who died from phthisis after having had typhus is included.

The characteristic eruption of typhus was present in 95 per cent. of the cases (a large majority) in which a record of the circumstance was preserved. Various complications of the disease, largely increasing its mortality, appear on the Hospital registers. The following is a list of them, but in comparing the figures with those of former years, it must be noted that small degrees of certain complications do not appear to have been always recorded with the same constancy.

The admissions for ENTERIC FEVER, though not so numerous as in the two years immediately preceding the last, have reached the high number of 378. Throughout the second half of the year, this disease was much more frequently presented than in the first six months, and the largest number of sufferers from it came into hospital in October. The eruption of the disease was present with about its usual frequency—viz. : in 77 per cent. of the cases.

The deaths from enteric fever numbered 55, being 14·6 per cent. of the admissions, a smaller death-rate than is commonly observed. In females this rate was nearly double that of males; of the former 19·1 per cent. (33 out of 173), and of the latter 10·7 per cent. (22 out of 205) having ended fatally.

The subjoined table of the ages at which this disease made its attacks, with its fatality at each period of five years, shows several essential differences from the corresponding table for typhus:—

The cases registered as SIMPLE CONTINUED FEVER and FEBRICULA perhaps include some slight and ill-marked instances of the other forms of fever; they numbered 245, of whom 92 were males and 153 females. None of them were fatal.

SCARLET FEVER brought 240 patients into hospital, 102 males and 138 females. The mortality was very small, only  $6\frac{1}{4}$  per cent. of the admissions. It is common to observe this mildness of disease when an epidemic is on the decline. Eight patients died with malignant symptoms. The complications of Scarlet fever were few, and it is remarkable that only two out of the 240 had dropsy after their disease.

There has been no case of RELAPSING FEVER during the year.

Six cases of MEASLES, 29 of SMALL-POX, and 4 of CHOLERA were admitted during the year. The Measles cases all recovered. Of the Small-pox patients, 10 were removed before the termination of their disease, mostly to the Small-pox Hospital. Of the 19 cases which were retained at the Fever Hospital, six were fatal. Of the Cholera cases, two recovered and two died.

The following table shows the multifarious nature of the OTHER DISEASES that are sent to the Fever Hospital. It has always been the policy of the Hospital to take in "cases that are likely to become fever of a contagious nature," as well as the actually developed disease, in order to encourage the speedy removal of fever cases at their earliest stages. And the physicians acknowledge that there is often much difficulty in deciding whether a particular case is or is not "likely to become fever." Yet the following list would be less extensive if reasonable judgment had been used in the selection of patients by those who sent them. The mortality from diseases other than specific fevers was 20.6 per cent. of the admissions, and the deaths as well as the nature of the diseases are shown in the following page:—

Of the total number of patients, 99 were domestic servants or shopmen, for whom an admission fee was paid; 89 were admitted free, and, (except 10 police and 15 Jewish poor), the remaining patients were sent by the parishes in which they were resident. Of the typhus cases  $1\frac{2}{3}$  per cent., of the enteric cases 6 per cent., and of the scarlet fever cases 16 per cent. were admitted by payment, the actual numbers for each fever being 23, 23, and 38. The cases admitted free, or by Governors' orders, include 31 of typhus, 69 enteric, and 18 of scarlet fever. It will be observed that last year, as usual, typhus was almost exclusively a disease of pauperism.

Many of the attendants upon the sick in the Hospital have contracted fever in the course of their dangerous duties. On the first day of the year, there were 50 persons resident in the Hospital, whose functions brought them more or less into contact with the sick. Many of them had obtained immunity from fever by having already passed through an attack. During the year, 49 vacancies occurred in this staff, and 53 new engagements were made. Of the total 103 persons who have been thus employed, the Resident Medical Officer caught typhus, but is now happily convalescent, and 21 nurses also caught typhus, of whom 4 died; it was chiefly to the new comers that the fever spread. Two housemaids got enteric fever and recovered; a nurse died of small-pox contracted in the Hospital, and the cook also passed through an attack of this disease. It is some comfort to know that the total of these attacks and of these losses is less than usual.

The patients received in 1867 are classified on the following page, according to the several districts of London from whence they were brought, and the nature of the fevers that were contributed by each district is shown. The table gives instructive information of a kind that especially concerns the sanitary authorities of London:—

\* In the "Typhus," "Enteric," and "Scarlet" columns of this Table, Patients admitted free, by Governors' orders, or by payment, are classified, as far as possible; but the parish in which they had lived was often unknown. In the last column, those sent by the Parishes are alone considered, and the residual number 197 includes those admitted free or by Governors' orders, as well as police, parish poor, &c.

It has been shown that over 1,400 patients affected with the most contagious sort of fever were under treatment in the Hospital in 1867. Not to speak of the devastation they must have spread around them, if they had remained at their own homes, it is certain that if these cases had been taken to general hospitals, and there distributed among other patients, there would have been a formidable extension of disease from them, that hundreds of other patients (speaking quite literally) would have been attacked, and that scores of them would have died. This has been conclusively proved by a dismal experience often repeated. It is, therefore, very satisfactory to announce that of the 1,418 patients who came into the Hospital last year, suffering from other fevers, or other diseases, six only contracted typhus, and not one of these died. Two of these patients were admitted for enteric fever, one for febricula, and three for other disease that was not fever. Small-pox spread to two patients convalescent from scarlatina, and to two admitted for febricula, but in none of these cases was it fatal. It is matter of regret with the Committee that so many small-pox cases are sent to this Hospital, where there is no provision for their treatment.

The patients received into the Hospital may be thus classified: (1) members of private families; (2) clerks and other inmates of houses of business; (3) domestic servants; (4) working men and members of working men's families; and (5) the poor, who in sickness are compelled to seek parochial relief.

As a rule, those belonging to classes (1), (2), and (3) have a fee of two guineas paid for them on admission. Those belonging to class (4) are generally admitted free; in no instance is admission refused, because a fee is not paid. Persons belonging to class (5) are sent to the Hospital by the parish authorities who, until recently, paid 1s. per day only in respect of each patient.

Patients belonging to the pauper class have always out-numbered those of the other classes, and the proportion has been gradually increasing, until at present they form more than 90 per cent. of the inmates of the Hospital.

This is believed to arise chiefly from the more enlightened view taken by parochial authorities of their duty in regard to the fever-stricken poor; who are now generally sent to the Hospital, instead of being treated in their crowded dwellings, or removed to the work-house. The payment made to the Hospital in respect of paupers was considerably less than half the sum which they cost to the institution. The Committee, however, abstained from requiring a larger payment for this class, fearing that if they did so, parochial authorities would, in many instances, from motives of apparent economy, retain their fever patients, unmindful of the calamitous consequences that might follow. In the interest of humanity, therefore, the Committee preferred to trust to a benevolent public to make up the deficiency in the payment made by parochial authorities. The Committee, in order to meet the demand made for accommodation on the part of parochial authorities chiefly, have, within the last six years, greatly enlarged the Hospital premises—adding two wings, capable of accommodating 120 patients. The Legislation of 1867 must essentially alter the future character of the Hospital; as under the Metropolitan Poor Act of that year, Asylums are to be provided for “Patients suffering from fever,” the expense incurred in their maintenance being borne by the “Metropolitan Common Poor Fund.” The Board of Management created under the Act are understood to be taking steps for providing asylums for paupers suffering from fever, and when these asylums are completed, the London Fever Hospital will no longer be used for the reception of this class of patients.

On the passing of the Act, the Committee deemed it right to require that, from the 29th September last, when the expense of maintaining fever patients chargeable to parishes was thrown on the Metropolitan Common Poor Fund, the parochial authorities should pay 2s. 3d. per head per day for the patients sent by them to the Hospital, being the actual cost of maintenance of the average patient, without including what may be termed the establishment expenses. This increased charge has been readily acquiesced in. It is probable that from one to two years must elapse before the new asylums are ready for the reception of poor fever patients; and in the meanwhile the parochial authorities will no doubt gladly avail themselves of the accommodation which the Fever Hospital supplies.

The Committee, in view of the early withdrawal from the Hospital of the pauper class, readily addressed themselves to inquiries from members of the Metropolitan Asylums Board as to the sale of the Hospital for the purposes of the recent statute. The negotiation was not, however, pursued on the part of the Board; and it will, therefore, be matter for the consideration of the Committee how best to adapt the Hospital to the altered circumstances in which it will shortly be placed.

The Committee are well aware of the fact that the patients consisted to so large an extent of persons from the lowest class of the poor of the Metropolis, has prevented other classes from resorting to the Hospital; and the Committee do not doubt that when the pauper element is removed, patients belonging to Classes (1), (2), (3) and (4), mentioned above, will be prepared in far greater numbers than heretofore to avail themselves of the special advantages which the Hospital offers for the treatment of contagious fevers. On these grounds the Committee appeal to the public for increased support to enable them to maintain the efficiency of the Hospital when the contributions from the parishes cease.

LAWS AND REGULATIONS.

---

OBJECTS OF THE INSTITUTION.

1. ALL poor persons (not being parochial paupers) and domestic servants of subscribers, labouring under contagious fever, and residing in the metropolis or its neighbourhood, shall be considered proper objects for this charity, and shall be admitted gratuitously, according to the next regulation. Parochial paupers, domestic servants, and non-subscribers, and all inmates of other public charities (except medical hospitals), shall be admitted on the payment of such sum for each patient as the Committee shall from time to time determine.

2. On application for the admission of any patient to the hospital, notice shall be immediately given to the resident medical officer, and the person after inspection may be admitted by an order signed by him, or on a certificate signed by any physician, surgeon, or apothecary, stating the disease to be *fever of a contagious nature*, or likely to become such. The order or certificate shall entitle the patient to admission, subject to the provisions contained in Rule No. 1, unless the case shall be deemed an improper one by the resident medical officer, or unless the hospital shall be full.

GOVERNORS.

3. All subscribers of one guinea annually, or of ten guineas in one donation, shall be governors of this hospital.

GENERAL MEETING AND ELECTION OF THE COMMITTEE.

4. A general meeting of the governors, of which ten days' previous notice must be given in three morning newspapers, shall be held every year, on the second Friday in February, or as near thereto as may be convenient for the purpose of approving or rescinding the proceedings of the Committee for the preceding year; for receiving an annual report of the state of the funds; and for electing a president, vice-presidents, treasurer, honorary secretary, and other members of the Committee for the ensuing year. At all meetings connected with the affairs of the hospital, a simple majority of the governors

present and voting shall bind the minority; and in case of equality of votes, the chairman shall have an additional vote or casting vote.

5. A special general meeting of the governors may at any time be called, by direction of the president or of the Committee; or on the requisition of any twelve governors, provided the requisition be made in writing to the secretary, and the purpose for which the same is summoned be published in three morning newspapers at least ten days prior to the next meeting; but the proceedings of such special general meeting, though acted upon *pro tempore*, shall not be deemed final, until confirmed by another general meeting.

6. No new rule or law shall be made, nor shall any existing rule or law be repealed or altered, until determined upon at a general meeting by a majority of governors present and voting, and until confirmed at a subsequent general or special meeting.

7. The presence of seven governors shall be necessary to constitute a quorum at general meetings, and without that number no business shall be transacted.

8. At the annual general meeting, a Committee for the management of the Institution shall be elected, consisting of the president, the vice-presidents, the treasurer, honorary secretary, and twenty-four other governors; four of which governors shall not have been members of the preceding Committee. They shall meet on the last Friday, or on such other day of every month as the Committee may appoint; and three members shall be necessary to constitute a meeting, and to transact business. A special meeting of the Committee may be called by the direction of the treasurer, or by any three members of the Committee, on giving at least three days' notice of the same, and specifying the business for which it is called.

9. The Committee shall have authority to appoint sub-committees, whose reports shall be submitted to their consideration; they shall elect all the officers, except the physicians of the hospital and the honorary secretary, who shall be elected by the governors at large; and with the assistance of the medical officers, shall form regulations and bye-laws for the internal management of the hospital.

10. The resolutions of one meeting of the Committee shall not be rescinded by another, unless it be specially summoned for that purpose. All accounts, except such small sums as may be comprised under the item of petty cash, shall be submitted to the Committee at the monthly meetings, after having been duly examined by the secretary, the resident medical officer, and the house-directors; and such accounts, if approved, shall be paid by cheques payable to order, signed in Committee by the chairman and one other member, or, in case a Committee cannot be formed, by two of the house-directors, and in all cases countersigned by the secretary. All the larger articles of supply,

when practicable, shall be furnished by contract made after public tender. No expenditure for repairs of premises or any machinery shall be incurred, without a written order from the Committee or house-directors.

11. The Committee shall yearly publish a report of the state of the hospital.

12. No person being a member of the Committee, shall furnish for profit any goods, provisions, or other articles, for the use of, or on account of, the hospital, or be concerned in any contract for supplying the same, or be employed for hire, or wages, or profit, in any office or employment under the charity.

#### TREASURER.

13. The treasurer, if present, shall take the chair at all meetings of the Committee, in the absence of the president or vice-presidents. He shall keep an account at the bankers, and all moneys received for the use of the hospital shall be paid to such account; he shall honour all cheques signed, as provided in Rule 10; and the signature of the secretary shall be a sufficient warranty that the cheques purporting to be so signed are properly signed, and shall be an indemnity to the treasurer against risk.

#### AUDITORS.

14. Three gentlemen shall be appointed annually at the meeting of the Committee in November, who shall audit the accounts of the Institution for the current year, and approve an abstract of all receipts and disbursements to be prepared by the secretary, and laid before the annual general meeting in February.

#### MONTHLY DIRECTORS.

15. The Committee shall at each monthly meeting, appoint three members of their own body as Directors of the hospital, of whom two shall be a quorum, and who shall continue in office until the next monthly meeting of the Committee. The Trustees and the two senior physicians shall be *ex officio* Directors of the hospital, in addition to three members to be appointed at each monthly meeting, as provided by this rule.

16. They shall from time to time cause the beds, clothes, and apparel belonging to the hospital to be examined, and shall report thereon, if necessary, to the Committee. They shall inspect the tradesmen's bills, and take care that the provisions, bedding, clothing, furniture, and every article for the use of the hospital, be supplied on the most reasonable terms; they shall order in writing all permanent stores.

17. They shall be authorized in all respects to enforce the observance of the regulations of the hospital; they shall notice and report to the Committee

any irregularity or misconduct on the part of the officers, servants, or patients of the charity, and shall, at every meeting of the Committee, cause a statement of the house expenditure to be produced for the preceding month. They shall appoint the porters, nurses, and other menial servants of the hospital, and dismiss them for misconduct.

#### PHYSICIANS.

18. There shall be two physicians, and two assistant-physicians, who shall be Fellows or Members, (formerly called Licentiates) of the Royal College of Physicians of London; and also a consulting surgeon, who shall be a Fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons.

19. The physicians and assistant-physicians shall be elected by the governors at large; and no governor shall be qualified to vote, unless he shall have become a governor three months before a vacancy is declared.

20. One of the physicians shall visit the hospital at least once every day, and at such times as they may deem necessary. They shall have the power of dismissing any patient or convalescent for refractory conduct or disobedience of orders.

#### ASSISTANT-PHYSICIANS.

21. In case of the illness or necessary absence of either of the physicians, one of the assistant-physicians shall attend regularly in his stead. Such attendances are to be reported to the Committee.

#### HOSPITAL PUPILS.

22. No medical student shall be permitted to visit the hospital unless in company with one of the physicians, and unless he is regularly entered or registered as a pupil.

#### RESIDENT MEDICAL OFFICER.

23. The resident medical officer shall reside constantly at the hospital, and shall devote himself entirely to the duties of his office; and previously to his election, he shall be required to produce satisfactory testimonials to the Committee.

24. He shall superintend the patients between the visits of the physicians, and the dispensary shall be exclusively under his control. In the absence of the Committee and house-directors, he shall be recognised as the head of the establishment.

25. Accurate registers of the patients admitted, as well as of the remedies employed for their recovery, shall be kept—which registers shall be the property of the hospital; he shall produce a special report every month, to be laid before the Committee.

26. When the number of patients shall be great, a medical assistant shall be appointed by the House Directors, subject to the confirmation of the Committee, and he shall receive such remuneration as the Committee shall from time to time determine.

#### HONORARY SECRETARY.

27. There shall be an honorary secretary, who shall also be a member of the Committee, and chosen annually with them. He shall be at liberty to attend all deputations to public bodies and private persons. He shall communicate with persons concerning the affairs of the hospital during the intervals between the monthly meetings of the Committee, and shall report to the Committee, at their next meeting, all special or important events that shall have occurred within his knowledge during the month. He shall also assist the treasurer in the discharge of his duties when necessary.

#### SECRETARY AND HOUSE STEWARD.

28. The duties of this officer shall be to reside in the hospital, if required by the Committee, and—in the absence of the House Directors—to have the management of the domestic affairs of the hospital, under the general superintendence of the resident medical officer. He shall be required to enter into a bond, with sufficient sureties, for the due and faithful performance of his duties. He shall also perform the several duties specified in the bye-laws.

#### MATRON.

29. The duties of the matron shall principally relate to the wards, the kitchen, and the laundry. She shall exercise a strict superintendence over the nurses; shall have the charge of linen, bedding, glass, crockery, and ordinary kitchen and scullery stores, subject to the general supervision of the house steward; and shall visit every ward of the hospital at least three times in the day. She shall also perform the several duties specified in the bye-laws.

#### COLLECTOR.

30. The duties of this officer shall be—  
To call on subscribers and collect all donations and subscriptions of the hospital; to give only authorised printed receipts for the same; to attend all meetings, when required; to keep correct lists and duplicate lists of all donations and subscriptions, with the residences of the donors and subscribers made up from

day to day; to pay weekly all moneys he may receive to the bankers; to deliver weekly to the secretary reports in writing of all moneys received and paid, with the balance at the bankers; to keep the accounts regularly entered in the collector's cash book; to deliver a copy of the annual report to each subscriber; and to give such security, with sureties, for the due and faithful performance of his duties, as may be required.

## NURSES.

31. The head nurse in each ward shall attend principally to the patients; and to the keeping of the wards clean and quiet.

32. The under nurses shall be under the direction of the head nurses, and shall perform the more menial offices of the hospital.

## PORTER AND ENGINEER.

33. The porter and the engineer shall be employed as the Committee or directors may think proper. They shall not absent themselves without the permission of the house-directors or resident medical officer.

## TRUSTEES.

34. The legal estate in the lands, buildings, and premises of the hospital shall be vested in three trustees; new trustees being appointed when vacancies occur at a general meeting of the governors.

35. All legacies of £100. and upwards, unless otherwise directed by the testators, shall be invested for the benefit of the hospital, in the names of the three trustees.

36. No variation in the usual gratuities and fixed salaries shall be made, unless the Committee be specially summoned for that purpose, and unless the proposed addition, or diminution, be confirmed by a subsequent Committee.

## BYE-LAWS.

37. The bye-laws which shall from time to time be made by the Committee, shall be open to the inspection of any subscriber, and shall contain, among other things, a full specification of the duties of the resident medical officer, the matron, and other officers of the Institution, with the practices usually adopted for their election; which specification shall be read out to every individual before his appointment, and referred to on all occasions of doubt.
