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

REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31st, 1870.

THE Committee have to report that the Hospital has, contrary to the expectations which were entertained at the beginning of the year, continued through 1870 in unimpaired activity, being still the sole resource for contagious fever in the Metropolis; and the admissions, though falling short of those of the years 1864, 1866, and 1868, have exceeded those of 1869. The numbers in the above years were, respectively, 3,610, 3,577, 3,657, and 3,411; in 1870, the number of patients admitted has been 3,487, being 76 in excess of 1869. Comparing, as has been done in previous reports, the admissions of the past nine years, during which Typhus has largely prevailed (28,707), with those of the previous sixty years (32,250), it will be seen that another year like 1870 would almost bring the total of the ten years, beginning with 1862, up to that of the sixty years from the foundation of the Hospital to that time. It must be repeated, however, that the increase has not been due solely to increased amount of contagious Fever in London, though Relapsing Fever and Scarlatina have been epidemic as well as Typhus, but to the change in policy on the part of the Committee of Management and of the Guardians of the Poor, by which cases of Fever have been at once removed from the Workhouse Infirmaries to the Hospital, while the Hospital, at great expense, has been extended from time to time to meet the public emergencies.

In the following Table the number of patients admitted and treated during 1870, together with the daily average of the year, and certain other particulars, is shown in comparison with corresponding information regarding the previous eight years :----

It will be seen that the daily average number of patients resident in the Hospital through the year was 232, the largest ever known, exceeding that of 1869 by 30, and that of 1868-the highest previously reached—by 23, notwithstanding that in the last named year 170 more cases were admitted. This high daily average is accounted for by the fact that Scarlatina and Enteric Fever have contributed an unusually large proportion of the admissions, and these diseases are under treatment for a longer time than Typhus. The highest monthly average was in January, when it reached 368; this is 18 in excess of that of December, 1869, which was the highest previously known by 71. From January, the average monthly numbers fell, rapidly at first then gradually to June, which had the lowest average, 145, after which a gradual rise again took place to the end of the year, but not to the same degree. The monthly admissions present almost corresponding variations. In January they numbered 459, thus falling short of the unprecedented numbers of November and December, 1869, which were respectively 472 and 511, but exceeding any previously known. A great diminution in the admissions took place in February, and in May they reached the lowest point 207, the subsequent rise culminating in October, instead of going on to the end of the year. The

largest number of patients in the Hospital at one time was 392, on January 1st; the smallest 137, on May 29. Of the 3,487 patients admitted during the year, 3,178 were cases of specific fever, while in 309 the febrile symptoms, when present, were due to local disease, the nature of which was obscure or had been misapprehended. Of the specific fevers there were of

A few particulars respecting each form of Fever are given below.

TVPHUS FEVER, or the Fever which owes its origin and spread to destitution and overcrowding, has during the past year exhibited a marked decline, and happily up to the present moment the fear expressed in the last Report, suggested by the history of previous epidemics of Relapsing Fever, that as this subsided it would be succeeded by a renewed outburst of Typhus, has not been realised. Apparently the prolonged prevalence of Typhus has to some extent exhausted the susceptible and exposed portion of the population of London, so that the predisposing influence of the less deadly Relapsing Fever, or of the conditions giving rise to this fever, has not been manifested. The number of cases of Typhus admitted during the year 1870 is 631, as compared with 1,260 in 1869. It would be premature to pretend to give a history of the epidemic of Typhus which has prevailed in London since 1862, but it will be interesting to give the numbers for each successive year since 1860, just before it set in.

The distribution of the cases through the year is not, however, quite so encouraging as the tall in the numbers. The admissions in January were 45, in February only 26; but instead of the usual diminution with the approach of summer, there was an increase, and in July 84 cases were admitted, the largest number of any month in the year, giving rise to the apprehension that as Relapsing Fever had apparently displaced Typhus in the early part of the year, Typhus was taking the place of Relapsing Fever as the latter declined. Subsequently the monthly admissions fell, but in December they were 78, or 35 more than in December, 1869. During the year the number of females (344) admitted with Typhus has exceeded that of the males (287) by 57, and throughout the epidemic this has been the case, 7,453 females having been admitted and 7,131 males. As usual nearly all the cases of Typhus have been paupers, only 14 out of the 631 cases, or 2.06 per cent. having been admitted by payment, and they have come from the parts of the Metropolis long known to present the conditions tending to produce this disease-the crowded part of the eastern, southern, and central districts (see Table, p. 23).

The characteristic eruption of the skin has been observed in 583 out of the 631 cases of Typhus admitted during 1870, that is in 92.4 per cent.

Of 615 cases treated to the termination of their illness during the year, 117 died, or 19 per cent. Among the male patients, the mortality was 19.02 per cent.; among the females, 18.84 per cent. Deducting 11 cases dying within twenty-four hours of admission, and 1 other, in which a patient recovered from Typhus, but died from Phthisis, the mortality is reduced to 17.41 per cent., and deducting other 12 cases which proved fatal within forty-eight hours after admission, the mortality becomes 15.73 per cent.

The next Table shows the relative mortality of typhus during the year at different ages, and the results are in strict conformity with those previously observed. Of 144 cases between 5 and 15 years of age, only one, or '69 per cent., were fatal, while in 52 cases above 50, 32 died, or the mortality was 61.5 per cent.

RELAPSING FEVER.—-The remarkable epidemic of this disease cannot be considered without retracing its history as given by Dr. Murchison in the following extract from the Report for 1868:—

"Not one case of the disease known as Relapsing Fever, whose prevalence is connected with extreme destitution in a more intimate degree than even that of typhus, and which constituted a great part

* This Table refers solely to the patients admitted during 1870, all of whose diseases have now terminated. Patients admitted in 1870 and dying in 1871 are included among the deaths. This accounts for the total numbers of the Table not corresponding to those in the text, in which the calculation is based on the number of patients treated until the termination of their illness in 1869. It is important also to note that among the deaths are included those patients dead on admission, or who died of other diseases than that for which they were admitted.

of the Irish epidemic fever that followed the potato famine of 1846-7, had been admitted into the Hospital for 14 years. But on July 4, 1868, a girl aged 20 was admitted, from 12, Easington's Buildings, Whitechapel,* who presented the usual symptoms of the disease. She was of Irish birth, but had resided for eight years in London, and had not been in a particularly destitute condition. Four days later, a Polish Jewess, aged 32, who could not speak English, and whose length of residence in London could not be ascertained, was received from 8, Inkhouse Court, Whitechapel, with the same disease, and on July 30, a third case was admitted from 9, Inkhouse Court-a girl aged 14, who had resided in London all her life. In addition to these three cases, it may be added that a girl, aged 7, who had lived in London all her life, was admitted on the same day and from the same house as the first case, whose illness was registered as "febricula," and was probably also relapsing fever; and that on July 6, a Polish family, consisting of father, mother, and child, were admitted from 8, Inkhouse Court, in a state of extreme debility and destitution, without any marked febrile symptoms during the seven days that they remained in the Hospital. There is no evidence of the recent existence of relapsing fever in Ireland or elsewhere in the British dominions, but during the past year German physicians have noted the prevalence of relapsing fever in East Prussia and Poland, and have ascribed it to 'the great destitution and want of food,' and since the 1st of September, 1868, a considerable number of Polish Jews, most of whom had been lately residing in Whitechapel, have been admitted into the German Hospital in London, suffering from wellmarked relapsing fever. It is probable, therefore, that in the few instances of relapsing fever observed at the London Fever Hospital, the disease had been contracted from Polish immigrants."

"For nine months after the cases admitted into the London Fever Hospital in July, 1868, no other examples of the disease were observed there; but in May, 1869, it reappeared. In May 4 cases were admitted : the first, on May 2nd, being a charwoman aged 38,

^{*} Easington's Buildings and Inkhouse Court are about a quarter of a mile apart. They are both *culs de sac*, very narrow, and densely populated, the former by Irish, and the latter by foreign Jews—all very poor.

from Lambeth Workhouse, who was a native of Ireland, but had resided in London for ten years ; in June, 3 cases were admitted ; in July, 7; and in August, 15. After this the number rapidly increased, the admissions for the last four months of the year being 37, 129, 259, and 315, and those for the entire year, 769. From the Table at page 23 it will be seen that the patients suffering from relapsing fever were brought from almost every parish in the metropolis; but four of the thirty-six parishes, viz. : Whitechapel (117), St. Giles (117), Camberwell (105), and Bethnal Green (48), furnished alone 387 cases, or more than one-half of the entire number. Of the first 70 cases, one-half were derived from the two parishes-Bethnal Green (18), and Whitechapel (17). Whitechapel was the parish which furnished the few stray cases of relapsing fever to the Fever and German Hospitals in 1868; but in connection with the origin of the present epidemic it ought to be mentioned that not only had the first patient in 1868 resided for eight years in London, but that not one of the first 70 cases admitted into the Fever Hospital in 1869 came from the same houses, or even streets, as the patients admitted into the German and Fever Hospitals in 1868. Moreover none of the relapsing patients admitted in 1869 were natives of Germany or Scotland; few had been born in Ireland, and of these none had recently arrived from that country. There is no evidence, also, of relapsing fever having appeared recently either in Scotland or in Ireland. With rare exceptions the patients admitted with the disease into the Fever Hospital had been in a deplorable state of destitution-far greater than that of the average of typhus patients. Even the nurses of the Hospital were strongly impressed with this fact. A large proportion of the entire number were 'tramps,' who had travelled long distances in search of work, and many of whom appeared to arrive in London with the fever upon them. This remark applied especially to Camberwell, most of the 105 patients furnished by that parish having arrived in the parish only a few days before being brought to the Fever Hospital. Many of the patients admitted during September and October had only just returned from hop-picking in Kent, where they had been sleeping in barns and under hedges, and eating unwholesome food ;

several patients, for instance, stating that they had eaten nothing for weeks except turnips and unripe fruit. Hawkers, costermongers, and charwomen constituted another large proportion of the cases of relapsing fever. The ages of the patients admitted varied from twelve months to upwards of seventy. There was abundant evidence that a previous attack of typhus conferred no immunity from relapsing fever, and that this again gave no exemption from typhus. One remarkable illustration is worth noting. A nurse who had typhus nearly twenty years ago, and has since been daily exposed to it with impunity, was seized with a very severe attack of relapsing fever in July, before a dozen cases of this disease had been admitted."

The further history of the epidemic shows a rapid decline in the number of cases. During the year the total admissions have been 903, or 134 in excess of the admissions in 1869. In January there were 247—more than one-fourth of the total number; in February, 132; and in March, 86; in all 465 cases, or more than one-half in the first three months of the year; the admissions subsequently falling gradually to 30 in September, after which they again rose, but not to any great degree. But while, in London, this fever seems to have spent its force, it has appeared in Edinburgh, Glasgow, Liverpool and Manchester, and other towns; and Liverpool in particular has been visited by it with extraordinary severity. It is worthy of note also that in Liverpool not only have the numbers been greater in proportion to the population, but the mortality has been higher—facts which point to a greater intensity of the conditions which predispose to this disease.

The deaths among the 1,127 cases of Relapsing Fever treated to a termination during the year 1870 have been 15, or 13 per cent. Among the male patients the mortality has been 14 per cent.; among the females, 12 per cent. From the 15 deaths should be deducted the case of a child aged 13 which died of Tubercular Meningitis after recovering from Relapsing Fever, and in all but two of the remaining fourteen there was some serious complication; in one, pregnancy; in the others, antecedent organic disease: the average age was 53. One of the two patients dying without complication was a girl aged 15 who was only two days in the Hospital; the other was a man aged 37.

+ This death, in a boy aged 13, was not due to Relapsing Fever, but to Tubercular Meningitis developed subsequently. ENTERIC FEVER, which is associated with bad drainage and bad drinking water, has, as was to be expected from the prolonged drought and intense heat of the summer of 1870, been unusually prevalent. The number of cases admitted during the year was 595—the largest hitherto known, being 20 more than were admitted in 1865.

The coincidence of a high rate of admissions of Enteric Fever with a hot and dry summer on the one hand, and of a low rate with cold and wet years, was fully pointed out in the Report for 1869; and 1870 furnishes another striking exemplification contrasting with 1869, the summer of which was cold and wet, in which the admissions were only 368.

The number of males admitted with Enteric Fever was 282; of females, 313. The proportion of cases paying an admission fee was 7'73 per cent.

The characteristic eruption of Enteric Fever was noted in 344 of the 595 cases, or about 57.8 per cent. The rate of mortality in Enteric Fever for the year has been 16 per cent., 93 cases having died out of the 581 treated to the termination of the disease. The mortality among the males has been 14.4 per cent.; among the females, 17.43 per cent. Deducting 10 cases in which death occurred within 24 hours after admission, and one in which the patient recovered from Enteric Fever but died of Small Pox, the mortality was 14.38 per cent.; and deducting four others fatal within 48 hours, it is reduced to 13.78 per cent.

Of simple Continued Fever, or Febricula, there have been registered 94 cases, some of which probably were mild examples of Relapsing Fever without relapse. There are no deaths to record from this disease.

SCARLATINA .- The unexampled number of admissions of this disease in 1869 has been largely exceeded in 1870, no fewer than 912 cases having been admitted during the year-373 males and 539 The proportion of admissions by payment is greater than females. in any other contagious fever,-210, or 23.8 per cent. of the total number, having paid the admission fee, or having been admitted by subscribers' letters or as members of the police force. It is to be noted also, that while Typhus and Relapsing Fever attack almost exclusively the destitute or very poor, Scarlatina, like Enteric Fever. affects all classes, so that the number received at the Hospital is indicative of a wide-spread epidemic. The distribution of Scarlatina in the various districts of the metropolis appears on page 23.

In 1868, 1869, and 1870 the numbers have been respectively 399, 614, and 912, showing a progressive advance of the epidemic during the three years ; and in each year there has been an There is reason to believe from the Registrarautumnal rise. General's returns, and from the admissions into the Hospital, that the epidemic has reached its maximum, and is now on the decline; but previous experience favours the expectation that the fall, like the rise, will be gradual.

Of the 918 cases treated to the termination of the disease in 1870, 122 died, or 13.28 per cent. Deducting two dead on admission, six others fatal within 12 hours after admission, it becomes 11'22 per cent.; and 23 others fatal within 48 hours, 8.7 per cent.

The diseases other than fever sent to the Hospital during the year have been of the usual multifarious character, as is shown in the Table on p. 19. The number 309 is again below the average, and apparently greater discrimination has been exercised in certifying that the patients sent were suffering from contagious fever. Sixty-eight cases were rejected during the year as unsuitable for admission, a register being kept of the nature of the disease. Many were pulmonary affections ; but towards the end of the year they were chiefly Small Pox.

The mortality among these cases has been, as usual, very high. It is only when local diseases assume an asthenic type that they are liable to be mistaken for fever, and very commonly they arrive at the Hospital in a condition which renders their admission imperative.

After deducting 19 cases transferred to the parish infirmaries or other hospitals, 285 cases were treated to the end of their illness, of which 101, or 35.43 per cent., were fatal. Deducting one case dead on admission, and 18 cases in which death occurred within 24 hours of admission, the mortality was 30.82 per cent.; and deducting 10 other cases fatal within 48 hours of admission, it was reduced to 28.12 per cent.

Of the total number of patients in the Hospital in 1870, after deducting 26 cases of Small Pox and other diseases which were transferred to other hospitals, 3,649 were under treatment till the termination of their illness, and of this number 451 died, or the mortality was 12.35 per cent. Deducting 59 cases, of which three were dead before reaching the Hospital, and the remainder were moribund, or died within 24 hours of admission, the mortality fell to 10.91 per cent. ; and deducting 51 other cases fatal within 48 hours of admission, the mortality was only 9.63 per cent. of "continued fever," 225, or 9.32 per cent., died. Deducting 23 cases in which death occurred within 24 hours of admission, and three in which the patients recovered from fever, but died of subsequent diseases, the mortality fell to 8.33 per cent.; and deducting 18 others fatal within 48 hours, the mortality was only 7.64 per cent.

Out of a total of 136 persons employed during the year in the wards of the Hospital, 34 took fever. 1 Medical Officer (Mr. J. C. Skinner), the Matron, 10 Nurses, 1 Scrubber, took typhus; 1 Medical Officer, 9 Nurses, 1 Scrubber, took relapsing fever; 1 Medical Officer (Mr. E. W. Minter), 1 Nurse, took scarlet fever; 2 Nurses took enteric fever; 2 Nurses took febricula; 3 Nurses, 1 Scrubber, took small pox.

Of this number 29 recovered; but one Medical Officer and one Nurse died of typhus, and one other Nurse of phthisis after recovering from typhus; one Medical Officer died of the sequelæ of scarlet fever, and one nurse died of small pox.

The large number of attendants on the sick who have contracted fever during the year is accounted for by the fact that, in consequence of the extensive epidemic of relapsing fever, it became necessary, towards the end of 1869, to engage a considerable number of new nurses, and to increase the staff of resident servants generally; and also by the circumstance that the old seasoned nurses were just as liable to take the prevailing fever as the new comers, and that many of them did, in fact, suffer from it. It may be stated also, that when the duties of the resident staff are unusually heavy, which has been the case through a great part of the year, the liability to succumb to contagious influences is increased. It is satisfactory to find that the efforts which have been made to induce seasoned nurses to remain at the Hospital have not been without effect, and that changes among the attendants have not been so frequent.

The instances of patients contracting fever in the Hospital were few. One case admitted with Enteric Fever took Typhus, two patients took Relapsing Fever, and one Measles: three patients (two of whom had nothing the matter with them, and the third Herpes) sent to the Hospital certified to have Scarlatina, and placed in the scarlet-fever wards, took this fever—the only examples during the year. On the other hand, a large number of patients admitted for Enteric (11) and Scarlet Fever (7) and two suffering from other diseases (in all 20) contracted Small Pox. This arose from the fact that on the outbreak of the existing epidemic a number of cases of this disease obtained admission in the early stage of the affection, when it is not readily distinguishable from various forms of fever; and on the nature of the case becoming apparent, the Small Pox Hospital being full, the patients could not be sent away. The resources of the Hospital for the separation of different fevers were already taxed to the utmost; and when the few small separate wards reserved for Small Pox were full, it was impossible to carry out the isolation of these cases, and the disease spread.

As was stated in the last Report, two spacious and convenient temporary iron wards, capable of containing 64 beds, were erected at the expense of the Asylum Board in the Hospital grounds, to meet the extraordinary requirements of Relapsing Fever. These were opened December 4th, 1869, and were occupied first by cases of this fever; later, on the subsidence of the epidemic, when Scarlatina and Enteric Fever became prevalent, one of them was appropriated to Enteric Fever. In November, however, when Small Pox began to appear in formidable numbers in London, the building, which was no longer demanded at the Fever Hospital, was removed to Hampstead for the reception of cases of this disease. The expectation, however, that by the erection of the Fever Asylums at Homerton and Stockwell, paupers would cease to be sent to the London Fever Hospital before the close of 1870, has not been realised, and the one at Homerton, when opened in February, 1871, was immediately appropriated to the reception of Small Pox. The contingency of the complete withdrawal of the pauper class from the London Fever Hospital has nevertheless to be provided for, and your Committee has been engaged in the consideration of the question how the Hospital, under the altered circumstances, can best carry out the design for which it was established.

In June a Sub-Committee was appointed for this purpose, and, although no definite plans have been formed, certain conclusions have been reached, which may be briefly explained. The experience of the London Fever Hospital enables your Committee to foresee that the accommodation provided in the permanent asylums will be inadequate in the presence of any great epidemic of contagious Fever, as is indeed exemplified by the existing outbreak of Small

It would be quite inconsistent with any arrangements for the Pox. accommodation of other classes of the population, and would necessitate the continuous maintenance of a large and expensive establishment for occasional and exceptional use, if the London Fever Hospital were permitted to receive the overflow of the pauper asylums. It is proposed, therefore, that when these are open, paupers should be excluded from this Hospital, as they are from the general Hospitals of London. With a view, however, to make the resources of the Hospital available to the greatest possible extent, a circular was issued to the Vestries and District Boards, inquiring whether they were willing to take advantage of the provisions of the Sanitary Act, of 1870, which empowers them to send to a Fever Hospital cases of Fever occurring in persons intermediate between the pauper class and people able to pay for medical attendance; but no response was obtained, and it does not appear that these bodies are prepared to put in force the Act. Until, therefore, the public sanitary authorities are aroused to a sense of their duty in this matter, some provision will be required in order to facilitate the admission into the Hospital of cases of fever occurring in these large and important masses of the community, so as to check the spread of contagious disease among them. It is hoped that a more enlightened policy will ultimately be adopted, as has been the case with the parochial authorities; but in the meantime it is probable that the demand on the Hospital will be very heavy, rendering necessary renewed appeals to public benevolence. But there are also other classes hitherto practically excluded from the London Fever Hospital by the presence of the pauper element, for whom provision will be required. A want has long been felt of some accommodation for cases of fever occurring in families of the better classes, among the employés of large commercial houses, in schools, hotels, &c. And now that the importance of isolation in preventing the extension of contagious diseases is becoming more generally recognised, such accommodation is more than ever demanded. The liability to be mixed up with paupers of the very lowest type, hitherto inevitable, has almost entirely prevented these cases from seeking admission into the London Fever Hospital, and the arrangements of the Hospital have not been adapted to their requirements. One of the express objects of the Institution at its foundation was to prevent the spread of contagious fever among all

classes; and the lowest class being now otherwise provided for, the Committee conceive it to be their duty to make such changes as will fit the Hospital for the reception of persons in good circumstances, including the formation of small wards for the separate treatment of individual cases, a well-considered scale of payment being decided upon. And they believe that in this course they will be conferring a benefit on the community not less than those the Institution has conferred in former years. The question is one of great complexity and difficulty; and as the plans have not yet been matured, and as the necessity for action is postponed by the continued reception of pauper cases while the epidemic of small pox lasts, no particulars respecting them need be given. In connection with this subject, the thanks of the Committee are due to Mr. T. H. Hills, who provided a room for the meetings of the Sub-Committee, and to Mr. W. Robinson, to whose zeal for the Hospital, and forethought in this matter, the Institution has been greatly indebted during the past as in previous years.

In a brief note to the Report for 1869 is mentioned the resignation of Dr. Murchison, (which was announced at the Annual Meeting of Governors in February, 1870,) together with his election to the office of Consulting Physician, and his appointment as Vice-President to the Hospital. The Committee have recorded in the following minute their sense of the value of his services to the Institution, extending over fourteen years, during eight of which the number of patients treated in the Hospital has been larger than in any period of its existence.

"In accepting the resignation of Chas. Murchison, Esq., M.D., F.R.S., &c., the Committee desire to record their appreciation of the eminent services which he has rendered to the Institution during the period of fourteen years."

"Those services have ever been marked by high professional skill, and by a regular and conscientious discharge of every duty. The

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treatment of the patients has received at all times his anxious care, and it has been his constant aim to secure for them good and efficient nursing. The administration of the Hospital in its several departments has also derived substantial advantages from his experience and tact.

"By his advice and that of his late able colleague, Dr. Buchanan, the Committee, instead of rejecting patients when the wards had become full, have extended the Hospital from time to time as fever has increased in prevalence; so that for many years no patients suffering from contagious fever have been refused admission. This altered policy has entailed upon the physicians a large amount of additional work, but it has also raised the Hospital greatly in public estimation.

"He was also mainly instrumental in introducing the system of classification of patients suffering from the various forms of contagious fever, a system now followed by kindred institutions.

"He was, moreover, the author of seven of the valuable Annual Reports of the Hospital which have appeared during the last nine years. These Reports are of considerable scientific importance, and the able analysis of the statistical data supplied by them has assisted in no small degree in the advancement of sanitary science, and has thus contributed in an indirect manner to arrest the progress of those diseases, for the treatment and prevention of which the London Fever Hospital is maintained."

By Dr. Murchison's retirement, Dr. John Harley succeeded to the office of Physician (the duties of which he had for some time previously discharged). During the year the Hospital has lost, by death, two of its Vice-Presidents, the Bishop of Winchester and Charles Dickens, Esq., both of whom had taken great interest in the success of the Institution, while the latter had rendered it important service by his advocacy of its claims.

Recalling to mind once more the facts stated in previons years that the Fever Hospital receives within its walls from year to year numbers of patients equal to those of the great Endowed Hospitals of London, that it not only benefits the sufferer himself, but the family and neighbourhood from among whom he is removed, the Committee claim for it a place in the first rank of usefulness among the Charitable Institutions of the Metropolis, and appeal with confidence to the public for renewed and increased support.

LAWS AND REGULATIONS.

Objects of the Institution.

I. ALL poor persons (not being parochial paupers) and domestic servants of subscribers, labouring under contagious fever, and residing in the metropolis or its neighbourhood, shall be considered proper objects for this charity, and shall be admitted gratuitously, according to the next regulation. Parochial paupers, domestic servants, of non-subscribers, and all inmates of other public charities (except medical hospitals), shall be admitted on the payment of such sum for each patient as the Committee shall from time to time determine.

2. On application for the admission of any patient to the Hospital, notice shall be immediately given to the resident medical officer, and the person after inspection may be admitted by an order signed by him, or on a certificate signed by any physician, surgeon, or apothecary, stating the disease to be *fever of a contagious nature*, or likely to become such. The order or certificate shall entitle the patient to admission, subject to the provisions contained in Rule No. I, unless the case shall be deemed an improper one by the resident medical officer, or unless the Hospital shall be full.

Governors.

3. All subscribers of one guinea annually, or of ten guineas in one donation, shall be governors of this Hospital.

General Meeting and Election of the Committee.

4. A general meeting of the governors, of which ten days' previous notice must be given in three morning newspapers, shall be held every year, on the second Friday in February, or as near thereto as may be convenient, for the purpose of approving or rescinding the proceedings of the Committee for the preceding year; for receiving an annual report of the state of the funds; and for electing a president, vice-presidents, treasurer, honorary secretary, and other members of the Committee for the ensuing year. At all meetings connected with the affairs of the Hospital, a simple majority of the governors present and voting shall bind the minority; and in case of equality of votes, the chairman shall have an additional vote or casting vote.

5. A special general meeting of the governors may at any time be called by direction of the president or of the Committee; or on the requisition of any twelve governors, provided the requisition be made in writing to the secretary, and the purpose for which the same is summoned be published in three morning newspapers at least ten days prior to the next meeting; but the proceedings of such special general meeting, though acted upon *pro tempore*, shall not be deemed final, until confirmed by another general meeting.

6. No new rule or law shall be made, nor shall any existing rule or law be repealed or altered, until determined upon at a general meeting by a majority of governors present and voting, and until confirmed at a subsequent general or special meeting.

7. The presence of seven governors shall be necessary to constitute a quorum at general meetings, and without that number no business shall be transacted.

8. At the annual general meeting, a Committee for the management of the Institution shall be elected, consisting of the president, the vice-presidents, the treasurer, honorary secretary, and twenty-four other governors; four of which governors shall not have been members of the preceding Committee. They shall meet on the last Friday, or on such other day of every month as the Committee may appoint; and three members shall be necessary to constitute a meeting, and to transact business. A special meeting of the Committee may be called by the direction of the treasurer, or by any three members of the Committee, on giving at least three days' notice of the same, and specifying the business for which it is called.

9. The Committee shall have authority to appoint sub-committees, whose reports shall be submitted to their consideration; they shall elect all the officers, except the physicians of the Hospital and the honorary secretary, who shall be elected by the governors at large; and, with the assistance of the medical officers, shall form regulations and bye-laws for the internal management of the Hospital.

10. The resolutions of one meeting of the Committee shall not be rescinded by another, unless it be specially summoned for that purpose. All accounts, except such small sums as may be comprised under the item of petty cash, shall be submitted to the Committee at the monthly meetings, after having been duly examined by the secretary, the resident medical officer, and the house-directors; and such accounts, if approved, shall be paid by cheques payable to order, signed in Committee by the chairman and one other member, or, in case a Committee cannot be formed, by two of the house-directors, and in all cases countersigned by the secretary. All the larger articles of supply, when practicable, shall be furnished by contract made after public tender. No expenditure for repairs of premises or any machinery shall be incurred, without a written order from the Committee or house-directors.

11. The Committee shall yearly publish a report of the state of the Hospital.

12. No person being a member of the Committee shall furnish for profit any goods, provisions, or other articles, for the use of, or on account of, the Hospital, or be concerned in any contract for supplying the same, or be employed for hire, or wages, or profit, in any office or employment under the charity.

Treasurer,

13. The treasurer, if present, shall take the chair at all meetings of the Committee, in the absence of the president or vice-presidents. He shall keep an account at the bankers, and all moneys received for the use of the Hospital shall be paid to such account; he shall honour all cheques signed, as provided in Rule 10; and the signature of the secretary shall be a sufficient warranty that the cheques purporting to be so signed are properly signed, and shall be an indemnity to the treasurer against risk.

Auditors.

14. Three gentlemen shall be appointed annually at the meeting of the Committee in November, who shall audit the accounts of the Institution for the current year, and approve an abstract of all receipts and disbursements to be prepared by the secretary, and laid before the annual general meeting in February.

Monthly Directors.

15. The Committee shall at each monthly meeting appoint three members of their own body as directors of the Hospital, of whom two shall be a quorum, and who shall continue in office until the next monthly meeting of the Committee. The trustees and the two senior physicians shall be *ex officio* directors of the Hospital, in addition to three members to be appointed at each monthly meeting, as provided by this rule.

16. They shall from time to time cause the beds, clothes, and apparel belonging to the Hospital to be examined, and shall report thereon, if necessary, to the Committee. They shall inspect the tradesmen's bills, and take care that the provisions, bedding, clothing, furniture, and every article for the use of the Hospital, be supplied on the most reasonable terms; they shall order in writing all permanent stores.

17. They shall be authorised in all respects to enforce the observance of the regulations of the Hospital; they shall notice and report to the Committee any irregularity or misconduct on the part of the officers, servants, or patients of the charity, and shall, at every meeting of the Committee, cause a statement of the house expenditure to be produced for the preceding month. They shall appoint the porters, nurses, and other menial servants of the Hospital, and dismiss them for misconduct.

Physicians.

18. There shall be two physicians and two assistant physicians, who shall be Fellows or Members (formerly called Licentiates) of the Royal College of Physicians of London; and also a consulting surgeon, who shall be a Fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons.

19. The physicians and assistant physicians shall be elected by the governors at large; and no governor shall be qualified to vote, unless he shall have become a governor three months before a vacancy is declared.

20. One of the physicians shall visit the Hospital at least once every day, and at such times as they may deem necessary. They shall have the power of dismissing any patient or convalescent for refractory conduct or disobedience of orders.

Assistant Physicians.

21. In case of the illness or necessary absence of either of the physicians, one of the assistant physicians shall attend regularly in his stead. Such attendances are to be reported to the Committee.

Hospital Pupils.

22. No medical student shall be permitted to visit the Hospital unless in company with one of the physicians, and unless he is regularly entered or registered as a pupil.

Resident Medical Officer.

23. The resident medical officer shall reside constantly at the Hospital, and shall devote himself entirely to the duties of his office; and, previously to his election, he shall be required to produce satisfactory testimonials to the Committee.

24. He shall superintend the patients between the visits of the physicians, and the dispensary shall be exclusively under his control. In the absence of the Committee and house-directors, he shall be recognised as the head of the establishment.

25. Accurate registers of the patients admitted, as well as of the remedies employed for their recovery, shall be kept, which registers shall be the property of the Hospital; he shall produce a special report every month, to be laid before the Committee.

26. When the number of patients shall be great, a medical assistant shall be appointed by the house-directors, subject to the confirmation of the Committee, and he shall receive such remuneration as the Committee shall from time to time determine.

Honorary Secretary.

27. There shall be an honorary secretary, who shall also be a member of the Committee, and chosen annually with them. He shall be at liberty to attend all deputations to public bodies and private persons. He shall communicate with persons concerning the affairs of the Hospital during the intervals between the monthly meetings of the Committee, and shall report to the Committee, at their next meeting, all special or important events that shall have occurred within his knowledge during the month. He shall also assist the treasurer in the discharge of his duties when necessary.

Secretary and House Steward.

28. The duties of this officer shall be to reside in the Hospital, if required by the Committee, and, in the absence of the house-directors, to have the management of the domestic affairs of the Hospital, under the general superintendence of the resident medical officer. He shall be required to enter into a bond, with sufficient sureties, for the due and faithful performance of his duties. He shall also perform the several duties specified in the bye-laws.

Matron.

29. The duties of the matron shall principally relate to the wards, the kitchen, and the laundry. She shall exercise a strict superintendence over the nurses; shall have the charge of linen, bedding, glass, crockery, and ordinary kitchen and scullery stores, subject to the general supervision of the house-steward; and shall visit every ward of the Hospital at least three times in the day. She shall also perform the several duties specified in the bye-laws.

Collector.

30. The duties of this officer shall be-

To call on subscribers and collect all donations and subscriptions of the Hospital; to give only authorised printed receipts for the same; to attend all meetings, when required; to keep correct lists and duplicate lists of all donations and subscriptions, with the residences of the donors and subscribers made up from day to day; to pay weekly all moneys he may receive to the bankers; to deliver weekly to the secretary reports in writing of all moneys received and paid, with the balance at the bankers; to keep the accounts regularly entered in the collector's cash book; to deliver a copy of the annual report to each subscriber; and to give such security, with sureties, for the due and faithful performance of his duties, as may be required.

Nurses.

31. The head nurse in each ward shall attend principally to the patients, and to the keeping of the wards clean and quiet.

32. The under nurses shall be under the direction of the head nurses, and shall perform the more menial offices of the Hospital.

Porter and Engineer.

33. The porter and the engineer shall be employed as the Committee or directors may think proper. They shall not absent themselves without the permission of the house directors or resident medical officer.

Trustees.

34. The legal estate in the lands, buildings, and premises of the Hospital shall be vested in three trustees, new trustees being appointed when vacancies occur at a general meeting of the governors.

35. All legacies of \pounds 100 and upwards, unless otherwise directed by the testators, shall be invested for the benefit of the Hospital, in the names of the three trustees.

36. No variation in the usual gratuities and fixed salaries shall be made, unless the Committee be specially summoned for that purpose, and unless the proposed addition or diminution be confirmed by a subsequent Committee.

Bye-laws.

37. The bye-laws which shall from time to time be made by the Committee shall be open to the inspection of any subscriber, and shall contain, among other things, a full specification of the duties of the resident medical officer, the matron, and other officers of the Institution, with the practices usually adopted for their election; which specification shall be read out to every individual before his appointment, and referred to on all occasions of doubt.
