R E P O R T

FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31ST, 1871.

THE year 1871 has been characterised by a marked diminution of all forms of contagious Fever admitted into the London Fever Hospital. The great epidemic of Typhus which, beginning in December, 1861, attained its maximum in 1864, has continued to decline, and no revival of this form of Fever has followed the invasion of Relapsing Fever, as has sometimes happened. Relapsing Fever, the first cases of which were admitted in 1868, and which began to spread with unprecedented rapidity towards the end of 1869, sending to the Hospital 769 patients in 1869, 903 in 1870, and 69 in 1871, has apparently entirely disappeared, the fall in numbers having been as rapid as the rise. Scarlatina, again, which in 1870 numbered 912 admissions, in 1871 furnishes only 268, a marked diminution, and Enteric Fever, in consequence of a short and wet summer, has been less prevalent.

The statistical results of the year, thus briefly summarised, are in accordance with the previously known laws (so-called) of epidemics, but there must also be taken into account the prevalence of Small Pox, which has unquestionably attacked many who would otherwise have fallen victims to one or other form of contagious Fever, and allowance must also be made for the fact that since October, 1871, the London Fever Hospital has ceased to be the only institution in the metropolis for the treatment of Fevers, the Pauper Asylum at Homerton having been opened for the reception of Fever cases on that date.

The total number of admissions in 1871 amounted to 1,324,

whereas in 1870 the number was 3,487, more than double. Of these, 588 were males, 736 females. 1,168 were cases of true contagious Fever, 156 examples of other acute diseases certified to be Fever when sent to the Hospital.

TYPHUS FEVER, as has already been stated, has continued to

decline, the number of cases admitted during the year 1871 having been 411, as compared with 631 in 1870, and 1,260 in 1869. It must be remembered, however, that in the last two months of the year the majority of cases of Typhus would be sent to the new Fever Asylum, so that the actual diminution of this disease has not been very marked. It has been sufficient, however, to afford further confirmation of the conclusion stated in the last Report, that the prolonged prevalence of Typhus had so far exhausted the susceptible and exposed portion of the population that the epidemic of Relapsing Fever has not been followed by a renewed outbreak of Typhus.

Of the total number (411) of cases of Typhus Fever treated to their termination in 1871, 68 died, or 16·56 per cent. Deducting 12 cases which died within 24 hours of admission, the mortality is 12·52 per cent., and 10 others in which death occurred within 48 hours of admission, it is 10·32 per cent. The percentage of deaths among the males was 17·85, among the females 15·34.

The characteristic eruption was noted in 400 out of the 411 cases admitted, or in 97.3 per cent. The cases in which the rash was absent were almost all children.

Of RELAPSING FEVER, which in 1869 gave 769, and in 1870, 903 admissions, there have been in 1871 only 69 cases, the last of which was in July. This disease may therefore be considered to have expired, so far as the metropolis is concerned, though it has not entirely left the country. The history of its invasion has been fully given in the two previous Reports, and need not be repeated, but it

may be interesting to put on record the mortality attending this disease during the entire epidemic.

In 1869 there were 769 admissions and 14 deaths.

giving the remarkably small percentage of 1·72. In almost all the fatal cases, also, either the patients were aged or there was some serious organic disease. It has not been considered necessary to tabulate the complications met with in the small number of cases under treatment during the year.

ENTERIC FEVER, which, as has been repeatedly shown in previous Reports, is greatly influenced by the character of the summer, again exhibits the effect of a short and wet season. The number of admissions fell from 595 in 1870, the largest ever known, to 308 in 1871. The males numbered 141, the females 167.

The characteristic eruption of Enteric Fever was observed in 162 out of the 308 admitted, or 52·5 per cent. The number of deaths from Enteric Fever among the cases treated to their termination during the year has been 52, or 15·29 per cent. Among the males the deaths were 15·28 per cent., among the females 15·30 per cent. From the above numbers, however, must be deducted 6 in which death occurred within forty-eight hours after admission, when the mortality becomes 13·52 per cent.

The advanced stage of the various Fevers or other acute diseases, of which cases are often sent to the Hospital, and the extreme state of debility of the patients when removed from their homes, has frequently been made the subject of remark and remonstrance; but recklessness in this respect has never been more flagrant than during the past year, although no great epidemic of Fever has been a cause of pressure on those who authorised or recommended the removal of the cases. One patient was dead on arriving at the Hospital; 70 cases died within forty-eight hours of admission; of these, 11 cases died within twelve hours, 27 died within twenty-four hours, and 32 within forty-eight hours.

In Enteric Fever there is no excuse for exposing the sufferers to the danger of a late removal. The duration of the disease is long, its symptoms well understood, and when from any inadvertence the patient has been allowed to remain at home to an advanced period of the Fever, there is less urgency for his removal on the ground of danger to others than in the case of the more highly contagious Fevers. Notwithstanding these considerations, several patients have been sent to the Hospital after the occurrence of hæmorrhage from the bowels, when it ought to have been known to the medical attendant that the shortest journey must almost necessarily be fatal by provoking a return of the loss of blood.

The usual tables giving the complications and the relative mortality of Enteric Fever at different ages are given below.

SCARLATINA has exhibited a more marked decline than either Typhus or Enteric Fever, the admissions having been only 268, as against 912 in 1870, 614 in 1869, and 399 in 1868. In 1870, notwithstanding the unprecedented number of cases admitted, indications of the commencing subsidence of the epidemic had begun to appear, but it was not anticipated that the fall would be so rapid. The diminution of this disease in the metropolis generally has not been so marked as might appear from the returns of the Hospital; it had set in before it became evident in the decreasing number of admissions into the Hospital, and although it has continued, it has not been in the same ratio. The explanation of this is found chiefly in the fact that Scarlatina has in the years during which it has prevailed, invaded different quarters of the metro-

polis in succession, and in 1869 and 1870 attacked the poor districts which supply a great proportion of the inmates of the Fever Hospital.

The number of deaths from Scarlatina among the cases treated to the termination of the disease in 1871 has been 39, giving a mortality of 12·5 per cent. Deducting 10 cases dying within twenty-four hours of admission, and 3 others within forty-eight hours of admission, the percentage becomes 9·29 and 8·33 respectively. A curious discrepancy exists between the mortality among the males and females, it having been 18·80 per cent. among the former and only 8·71 among the latter. This is explained by the fact that while the number of children under ten years of age, when the disease is most fatal, was nearly equal in the two sexes (36 males and 31 females), a much greater number of females than of males above the age of ten was received (65 males and 136 females), women being more exposed than men to the contagion of Scarlatina in the performance of domestic duties.

Of FEBRICULA, or common Continued Fever, 62 cases have been admitted, of whom none died.

No fewer than 33 cases of SMALL POX obtained admission during the year, most of which were at once transferred to the Small Pox Hospital, but some arrived too ill to undergo the fatigue of further removal, and had to be retained. In all the cases in which the patients were admitted the disease had not declared itself, or presented peculiar features.

The number of cases admitted for some form of acute disease other than specific Fever was 156. They will be seen from the accompanying Table (p. 14) to be of the most varied character, and, as usual, the mortality among them has been high, because it is only when symptoms of very serious character arise that they are taken for Fever. During the year, 104 cases were rejected as not proper for admission into the Hospital, a careful register of which is kept; they were mostly pulmonary affections or Small Pox.

Of the total number of patients in the Hospital in 1871, after deducting 30 cases of Small Pox and other diseases transferred to other Hospitals, 1,457 remained under treatment to the termination

of their illness. Of these 224 died, giving a gross mortality of 15·37 per cent. One case arrived at the Hospital dead, and 37 others were moribund, and died within 24 hours after admission ; deducting these, the mortality was 12·76 per cent.

During the year only one patient contracted Fever in the Hospital, a boy aged 16 who was admitted for Enteric Fever and took Scarlatina. This occurred during the alterations, when the Scarlatina patients were for a time in one of the wards usually devoted to Enteric Fever. Stronger evidence in favour of the plan of isolating each form of Fever could not be given. 16 patients, however, took Small Pox, 13 of whom had been admitted with Scarlatina, 2 with Enteric Fever, and 1 with Measles, and of these 4 died. This is explained by the fact that the treatment of the different forms of Fever in separate wards exhausted the capabilities of the Hospital for isolation of different diseases, and when a case of Small Pox was in one of the wards for a few hours before its character was discovered, or when a case arrived too ill to be sent away, the opportunity for transmission of the contagion unavoidably arose. 5 Nurses and 2 Scrubbers contracted Typhus, 1 Nurse suffered from Enteric Fever, Scarlatina, and Febricula, and 2 Scrubbers had Febricula ; these were all who were affected with any form of contagious Fever, out of a total of about 60 exposed by contact with the patients in the service of the Hospital. 4 Nurses and 1 Scrubber affected with Typhus died.

The statistics given in this Report are in some degree imperfect as an indication of the prevalence of Fever in London, inasmuch as the Fever Asylum at Homerton was opened for the reception of Fever cases in October, from which time a gradually increasing proportion of the pauper patients has been withdrawn from the Fever Hospital.* This contingency was postponed on account of the epidemic of Small Pox, but it had of course been foreseen by your Committee, and various plans had been discussed as to the changes to be made to meet the altered circumstances. The Hospital was originally established for the reception of patients

suffering from Fever who were not paupers, but as a great preponderance of the cases of Fever occurred among those who were either already paupers or who were made paupers by the fact of sickness, and no provision existed in the Metropolis for their seclusion and treatment, the great object of the founders of the Institution, namely, the prevention of the spread of Contagious Fever, demanded that paupers should be admitted. In the course of years, and especially under the pressure of the great epidemic of Typhus which set in in 1862, and which has continued ever since, the various Metropolitan Parishes and Unions became convinced of the necessity of removing cases of Fever from their homes and from the Workhouse Infirmaries, and thus the Hospital became the great Fever House of London. The extent to which the Fever Hospital was made use of by the Parishes will be understood from the fact that out of the 3,487 cases admitted into the Hospital in 1870, 3,059 were by Parish Orders. The withdrawal of the paupers will necessarily leave the Hospital accommodation largely in excess of existing requirements, and the task your Committee has had before it has been to make this available for carrying out the objects of the Institution in some other direction than that of providing for the very lowest classes of the community. It had long been known that the presence of paupers in large numbers prevented others from seeking admission, and a Sub-Committee was appointed in June, 1870, to consider what steps should be taken in order to adapt the Hospital for the new sphere of action upon which it must enter. This Sub-Committee, consisting of Dr. Murchison, Dr. Buchanan, Dr. Broadbent, Dr. Harley, T. H. Hills, Esq., J. A. Bostock, Esq., Dr. Jones, James Taverner, Esq., W. Robinson, Esq., Hugh Owen, Esq., G. B. Allen, Esq., and Dr. Thorne, was reappointed, and recommended to the General Committee that the two wards contained in the block in the front of the Hospital on each side should be divided into two small wards, which should be adapted for the reception of private patients who might require separate accommodation, and who might be in a position to pay for it. Cases of Fever frequently occur in Hotels, Schools, large

business houses, &c., in which the removal of the patient is necessary in consequence of the exposure of great numbers of others to contagion. Many general Hospitals do not admit Fever, or a public Hospital may be objected to by the patient or his friends, and thus sometimes the treatment of these cases has to be carried out in apartments, and under circumstances altogether unfavourable to recovery. It was considered best to provide for cases of this kind first as an experiment, and to wait for indications of other demands before making further alterations. It is proposed to exclude actual paupers, or the Hospital may be made use of for the reception of the overflow of the Fever Asylums during epidemics, which would involve the maintenance of a large establishment for very occasional use. On the other hand, the greatest facilities will be offered for the admission of patients belonging to the working classes who are not receiving Parish relief, and it is hoped that ultimately the Vestries and District Boards will put in operation the provisions of the Sanitary Act of 1870, which empowers them to remove to a Fever Hospital cases of Fever occurring in individuals who are not paupers.

The scheme of the Sub-Committee was adopted, and has been carried out in a most satisfactory manner by Messrs. New and Cumming, the Architects to the Hospital, with the valuable and energetic co-operation of W. Robinson, Esq., one of the Members of the Sub-Committee, who also superintended the furnishing of the new wards. The alterations were completed, and the new wards were opened on December 22nd, 1871, a large number of medical men, representatives of the press, and others interested in sanitary matters, being present by invitation from the Committee. The new wards form 8 apartments, 4 of which are adapted for a single patient, the other 4 for 1 adult or 2 children; they are of ample size, light and cheerful; they have been fitted up with every requirement for comfort, and great taste has been shown by the Architects in the decorations, and by Mr. Robinson in the selection of the furniture. Both the idea and the execution met with the unanimous approval of those who inspected the wards on the occasion of their opening, and it is hoped they will prove to be a boon to the classes for

whom they were intended. In order to bring their existence under the notice of the public, the following circular was extensively distributed:—

Accommodation for Private Patients suffering from Contagious Fever, now provided in the London Fever Hospital, Liverpool Road, Islington.

THE London Fever Hospital was founded in 1802 for the treatment of patients suffering from Contagious Fever, and from that time up to the opening of the New Pauper Fever Asylums has been the only institution of the kind in the Metropolis. In pursuance of the objects for which it was established, one of the chief of which was to prevent the spread of Contagious Fever, the Hospital has hitherto been under the necessity of opening its doors to paupers, a class that was originally intended to be excluded, and the Committee of Management are able to assert, that, by the erection of temporary buildings to meet the emergencies of great epidemics, not a single case of Contagious Fever has, for many years, been refused admission and sent back to act as a new focus of disease. They are thankful to add that this policy has met with the generous approval and support of the public.

The admission of paupers, however, practically excluded other classes, and more particularly rendered it impossible to provide accommodation for cases of fever occurring in families in good circumstances, or in schools, hotels, among the employes of large commercial houses, &c. ; but the Pauper Fever Asylums having now relieved this Hospital of the responsibility of taking charge of the very poor, the attention of the Committee has been given to the question of rendering the Hospital available for the reception and treatment of the class of cases mentioned, while continuing to offer its benefits to the working classes not receiving parish relief. The arrangements they have adopted for the present are as follow:—(1) Patients will be admitted into the General Wards on the recommendation of a Governor or Annual Subscriber of one guinea, or, as heretofore, on payment of two guineas on admission, or of one guinea weekly. (2) For such patients as require isolation and better accommodation than that offered by the General Wards, eight large Rooms have been prepared and furnished with every requisite for comfort, in which a single patient, or two children of the same family or from the same school, can be received. The payment for each case in one of these Rooms, with the attendance of an experienced nurse, and the care of the resident medical officer and physicians, and including food and medicines, has been fixed at three guineas per week.

The Committee are assured that, in making provision for private patients, they meet an urgent public requirement, and they are prepared to extend the accommodation should the demand for an extension arise. The Hospital will, at the same time, continue to render public services of the highest value, by receiving working men and the members of their families, who might otherwise, through an attack of fever, be compelled to take the first step towards pauperism by seeking parish relief.

In order that those who may need the accommodation offered by the Hospital,

when attacked by Contagious Fever, may be acquainted with the arrangements made for their reception, it is desirable that the existence of these arrangements should be made as generally known as possible, and the Committee seek, for this purpose, the co-operation of all directly or indirectly interested in the public health.

P.S.—A carriage for the conveyance of Fever Patients is kept at the Hospital, and is sent at once for cases requiring admission, the only payment asked being for horse hire.

During the year Dr. Thorne Thorne, having accepted an appointment under the Privy Council, retired from the office of Assistant Physician, and Dr. Harley having been selected to form one of the Staff of the New St. Thomas's Hospital, resigned the office of Physician. The Committee regret that they lose the valuable services of these gentlemen, more especially in the case of Dr. Harley, whose connection with the Hospital has lasted nearly ten years, to the great advantage of the Institution. Dr. Cayley has been appointed Physician in the place of Dr. Harley. It has not been considered necessary in the altered circumstances of the Hospital to fill up the office of Assistant Physician.

The Committee shared in the deep concern of the Nation at the serious attack of Enteric Fever through which His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales has recently passed; and they now participate in the profound thankfulness which is universally felt at his recovery. It is gratifying to the Committee to know that one of the Physicians in attendance on His Royal Highness, Sir William Jenner, was for several years one of the Physicians of this Hospital, where he acquired large experience in the treatment of Fever in its various forms.

The Committee believe that among the poor who are not paupers, the artisan classes, domestic servants, and employés of various kinds, a field of usefulness lies before the Hospital, as important if not as wide as ever; they consider also that by providing accommodation

for patients of other classes affected with Fever, they have supplied an urgent public need, and they look with confidence to the public for a continuation of the support which has made the Hospital one of the most useful among the Charitable Institutions of the Metropolis.

It was resolved at the Annual General Meeting, held in February, 1872, that the following correspondence should be printed and published with the Report :—

INDIA MUSEUM,
24th January, 1872.

SIR,

I have the honour to hand over to you the enclosed order on the Bank of England for two hundred pounds sterling [£200] from Mr. Cowasjee Jehanghier Readymoney, C.S.I., the well-known Parsee merchant of Bombay. In his letter of December 14th to me he says :—"This gift I make as a freewill offering in token of my heartfelt joy at the recovery of the Prince of Wales from his severe and distressing illness."

Mr. Readymoney's direction to me was, "in conjunction with a member of the India Council, to devote the amount amongst the most deserving institutions in London for the amelioration of the poor." I therefore went to Sir Bartle Frere, the late governor of Bombay, and begged him to refer to His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales as to the institutions amongst which His Royal Highness might wish the money to be divided. In reply the private secretary writes :—"His Royal Highness finds himself placed in a position of some delicacy. London abounds in so many excellent charities that he thinks it would be an invidious and a most difficult task for him to make a selection. . . . If, however, he might be allowed to make a selection, he would propose that a portion of the sum in question should be forwarded to the LONDON FEVER HOSPITAL, in consideration of the illness from which, by the mercy of God and the skill of his physicians, his Royal Highness has just happily recovered."

The suggestion is so good that I have made the whole amount of the order payable to your treasurer. It were a pity to divide it. Sir Bartle approves of my determination, and I know that Mr. Readymoney will—with all his heart and mind.

LAWS AND REGULATIONS.

Objects of the Institution.

1. ALL poor persons (not being parochial paupers) and domestic servants of subscribers, labouring under contagious fever, and residing in the metropolis or its neighbourhood, shall be considered proper objects for this charity, and shall be admitted gratuitously, according to the next regulation. Parochial paupers, domestic servants, of non-subscribers, and all inmates of other public charities (except medical hospitals), shall be admitted on the payment of such sum for each patient as the Committee shall from time to time determine.

2. On application for the admission of any patient to the Hospital, notice shall be immediately given to the resident medical officer, and the person after inspection may be admitted by an order signed by him, or on a certificate signed by any physician, surgeon, or apothecary, stating the disease to be *fever of a contagious nature*, or likely to become such. The order or certificate shall entitle the patient to admission, subject to the provisions contained in Rule No. 1, unless the case shall be deemed an improper one by the resident medical officer, or unless the Hospital shall be full.

Governors.

3. All subscribers of one guinea annually, or of ten guineas in one donation, shall be governors of this Hospital.

General Meeting and Election of the Committee.

4. A general meeting of the governors, of which ten days' previous notice must be given in three morning newspapers, shall be held every year, on the second Friday in February, or as near thereto as may be convenient, for the purpose of approving or rescinding the proceedings of the Committee for the preceding year; for receiving an annual report of the state of the funds; and for electing a president, vice-presidents, treasurer, honorary secretary, and other members of the Committee for the ensuing year. At all meetings connected with the affairs of the Hospital, a simple majority of the governors present and voting shall bind the minority; and in case of equality of votes, the chairman shall have an additional vote or casting vote.

5. A special general meeting of the governors may at any time be called by direction of the president or of the Committee; or on the requisition of any twelve governors, provided the requisition be made in writing to the secretary, and the purpose for which the same is summoned be published in three morning newspapers at least ten days prior to the next meeting; but the proceedings of such special general meeting, though acted upon *pro tempore*, shall not be deemed final, until confirmed by another general meeting.

6. No new rule or law shall be made, nor shall any existing rule or law be repealed or altered, until determined upon at a general meeting by a majority of governors present and voting, and until confirmed at a subsequent general or special meeting.

7. The presence of seven governors shall be necessary to constitute a quorum at general meetings, and without that number no business shall be transacted.

8. At the annual general meeting, a Committee for the management of the Institution shall be elected, consisting of the president, the vice-presidents, the treasurer, honorary secretary, and twenty-four other governors; four of which governors shall not have been members of the preceding Committee. They shall meet on the last Friday, or on such other day of every month as the Committee may appoint; and three members shall be necessary to constitute a meeting, and to transact business. A special meeting of the Committee may be called by the direction of the treasurer, or by any three members of the Committee, on giving at least three days' notice of the same, and specifying the business for which it is called.

9. The Committee shall have authority to appoint sub-committees, whose reports shall be submitted to their consideration; they shall elect all the officers, except the physicians of the Hospital and the honorary secretary, who shall be elected by the governors at large; and, with the assistance of the medical officers, shall form regulations and bye-laws for the internal management of the Hospital.

10. The resolutions of one meeting of the Committee shall not be rescinded by another, unless it be specially summoned for that purpose. All accounts, except such small sums as may be comprised under the item of petty cash, shall be submitted to the Committee at the monthly meetings, after having been duly examined by the secretary, the resident medical officer, and the house-directors; and such accounts, if approved, shall be paid by cheques payable to order, signed in Committee by the chairman and one other member, or, in case a Committee cannot be formed, by two of the house-directors, and in all cases countersigned by the secretary. All the larger articles of supply, when practicable, shall be furnished by contract made after public tender. No expenditure for repairs of premises or any machinery shall be incurred, without a written order from the Committee or house-directors.

11. The Committee shall yearly publish a report of the state of the Hospital.

12. No person being a member of the Committee shall furnish for profit any goods, provisions, or other articles, for the use of, or on account of, the Hospital, or be concerned in any contract for supplying the same, or be employed for hire, or wages, or profit, in any office or employment under the charity.

Treasurer.

13. The treasurer, if present, shall take the chair at all meetings of the Committee, in the absence of the president or vice-presidents. He shall keep an account at the bankers, and all moneys received for the use of the Hospital shall be paid to such account; he shall honour all cheques signed, as provided in Rule 10; and the signature of the secretary shall be a sufficient warranty that the

cheques purporting to be so signed are properly signed, and shall be an indemnity to the treasurer against risk.

Auditors.

14. Three gentlemen shall be appointed annually at the meeting of the Committee in November, who shall audit the accounts of the Institution for the current year, and approve an abstract of all receipts and disbursements to be prepared by the secretary, and laid before the annual general meeting in February.

Monthly Directors.

15. The Committee shall at their first meeting, in the month of February, elect three members of their own body to be directors of the Hospital, in addition to the trustees and two senior physicians, who shall be *ex officio* directors. And the Committee may appoint one of such directors to be the chairman, who shall retain his office for the ensuing twelve months, the Committee appointing the other directors, excepting the *ex officio* directors, monthly. Two of the directors to form a quorum.

16. They shall from time to time cause the beds, clothes, and apparel belonging to the Hospital to be examined, and shall report thereon, if necessary, to the Committee. They shall inspect the tradesmen's bills, and take care that the provisions, bedding, clothing, furniture, and every article for the use of the Hospital, be supplied on the most reasonable terms; they shall order in writing all permanent stores.

17. They shall be authorised in all respects to enforce the observance of the regulations of the Hospital; they shall notice and report to the Committee any irregularity or misconduct on the part of the officers, servants, or patients of the charity, and shall, at every meeting of the Committee, cause a statement of the house expenditure to be produced for the preceding month. They shall appoint the porters, nurses, and other menial servants of the Hospital, and dismiss them for misconduct.

17A. The chairman of the directors shall, during the intervals between their meetings, be authorised to exercise the functions of the directors in any matter of urgency, he reporting, at their next meeting, what he shall have done under this authority.

Physicians.

18. There shall be two physicians and two assistant physicians, who shall be Fellows or Members (formerly called Licentiates) of the Royal College of Physicians of London; and also a consulting surgeon, who shall be a Fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons.

19. The physicians and assistant physicians shall be elected by the governors at large; and no governor shall be qualified to vote, unless he shall have become a governor three months before a vacancy is declared.

20. One of the physicians shall visit the Hospital at least once every day, and at such times as they may deem necessary. They shall have the power of dismissing any patient or convalescent for refractory conduct or disobedience of orders.

Assistant Physicians.

21. In case of the illness or necessary absence of either of the physicians, one of the assistant physicians shall attend regularly in his stead. Such attendances are to be reported to the Committee.

Hospital Pupils.

22. No medical student shall be permitted to visit the Hospital unless in company with one of the physicians, and unless he is regularly entered or registered as a pupil.

Resident Medical Officer.

23. The resident medical officer shall reside constantly at the Hospital, and shall devote himself entirely to the duties of his office; and, previously to his election, he shall be required to produce satisfactory testimonials to the Committee.

24. He shall superintend the patients between the visits of the physicians, and the dispensary shall be exclusively under his control. In the absence of the Committee and house-directors, he shall be recognised as the head of the establishment.

25. Accurate registers of the patients admitted, as well as of the remedies employed for their recovery, shall be kept, which registers shall be the property of the Hospital; he shall produce a special report every month, to be laid before the Committee.

26. When the number of patients shall be great, a medical assistant shall be appointed by the house-directors, subject to the confirmation of the Committee, and he shall receive such remuneration as the Committee shall from time to time determine.

Honorary Secretary.

27. There shall be an honorary secretary, who shall also be a member of the Committee, and chosen annually with them. He shall be at liberty to attend all deputations to public bodies and private persons. He shall communicate with persons concerning the affairs of the Hospital during the intervals between the monthly meetings of the Committee, and shall report to the Committee, at their next meeting, all special or important events that shall have occurred within his knowledge during the month. He shall also assist the treasurer in the discharge of his duties when necessary.

Secretary and House Steward.

28. The duties of this officer shall be to reside in the Hospital, if required by the Committee, and, in the absence of the house-directors, to have the management of the domestic affairs of the Hospital, under the general superintendence of the resident medical officer. He shall be required to enter into a bond, with sufficient sureties, for the due and faithful performance of his duties. He shall also perform the several duties specified in the bye-laws.

Matron.

29. The duties of the matron shall principally relate to the wards, the kitchen, and the laundry. She shall exercise a strict superintendence over the nurses;

shall have the charge of linen, bedding, glass, crockery, and ordinary kitchen and scullery stores subject to the general supervision of the house-steward; and shall visit every ward of the Hospital at least three times in the day. She shall also perform the several duties specified in the bye-laws.

Collector.

30. The duties of this officer shall be—

To call on subscribers and collect all donations and subscriptions of the Hospital; to give only authorised printed receipts for the same; to attend all meetings, when required; to keep correct lists and duplicate lists of all donations and subscriptions, with the residences of the donors and subscribers made up from day to day; to pay weekly all moneys he may receive to the bankers; to deliver weekly to the secretary reports in writing of all moneys received and paid, with the balance at the bankers; to keep the accounts regularly entered in the collector's cash book; to deliver a copy of the annual report to each subscriber; and to give such security, with sureties, for the due and faithful performance of his duties, as may be required.

Nurses.

31. The head nurse in each ward shall attend principally to the patients, and to the keeping of the wards clean and quiet.

32. The under nurses shall be under the direction of the head nurses, and shall perform the more menial offices of the Hospital.

Porter and Engineer.

33. The porter and the engineer shall be employed as the Committee or directors may think proper. They shall not absent themselves without the permission of the house directors or resident medical officer.

Trustees.

34. The legal estate in the lands, buildings, and premises of the Hospital shall be vested in three trustees, new trustees being appointed when vacancies occur at a general meeting of the governors.

35. All legacies of £100 and upwards, unless otherwise directed by the testators, shall be invested for the benefit of the Hospital, in the names of the three trustees.

36. No variation in the usual gratuities and fixed salaries shall be made, unless the Committee be specially summoned for that purpose, and unless the proposed addition or diminution be confirmed by a subsequent Committee.

Bye-laws.

37. The bye-laws which shall from time to time be made by the Committee shall be open to the inspection of any subscriber, and shall contain, among other things, a full specification of the duties of the resident medical officer, the matron, and other officers of the Institution, with the practices usually adopted for their election; which specification shall be read out to every individual before his appointment, and referred to on all occasions of doubt.
