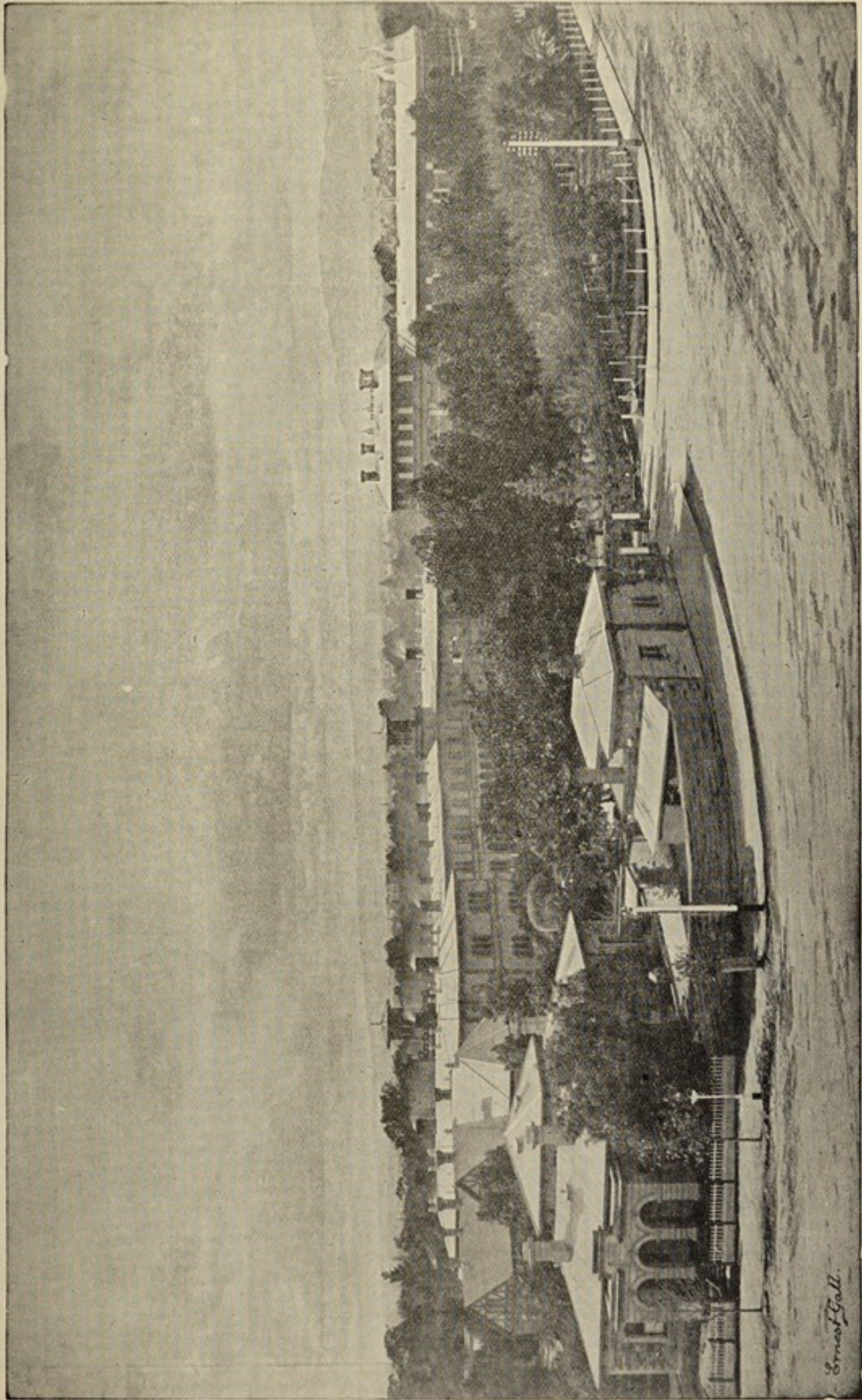

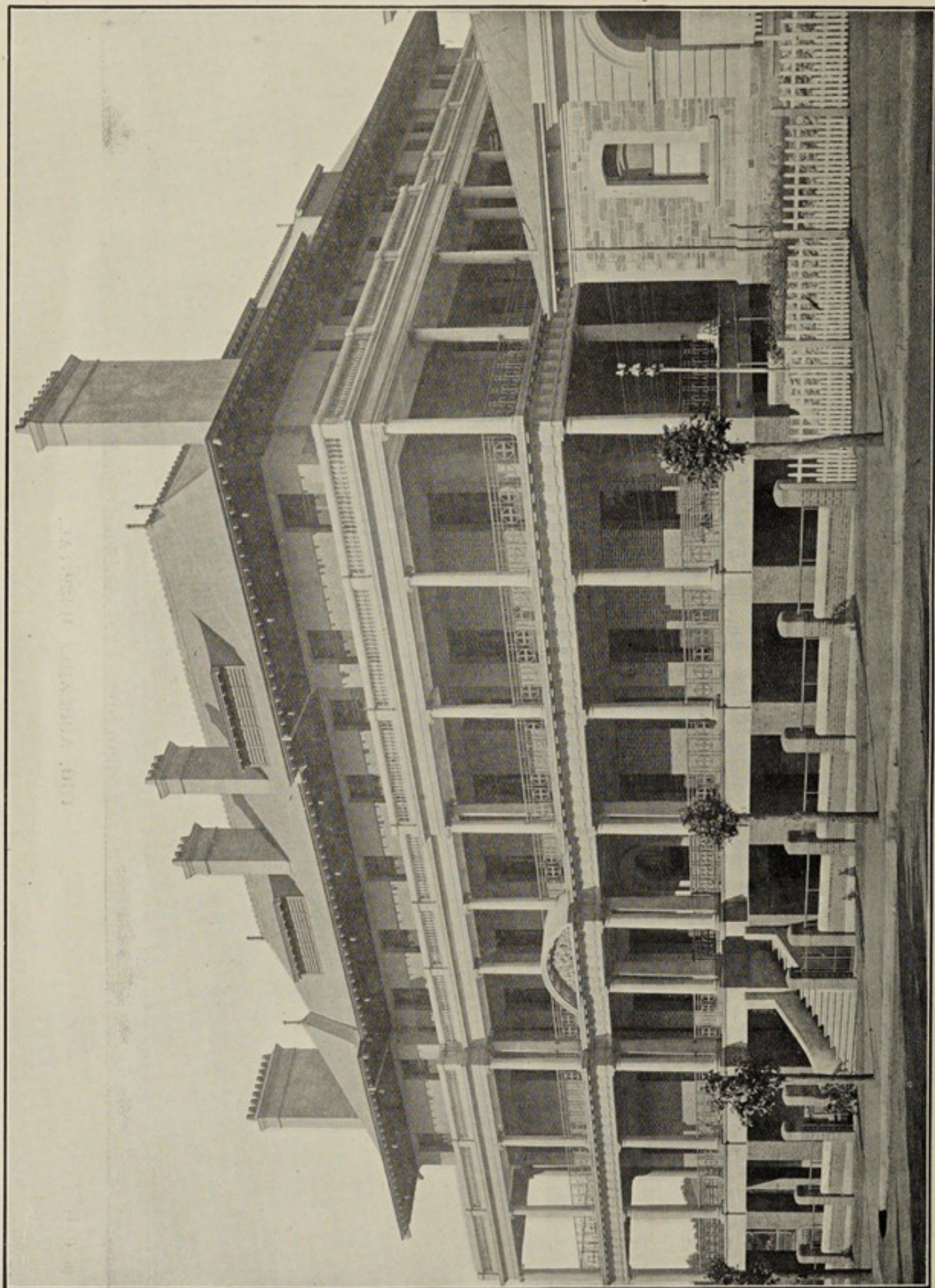

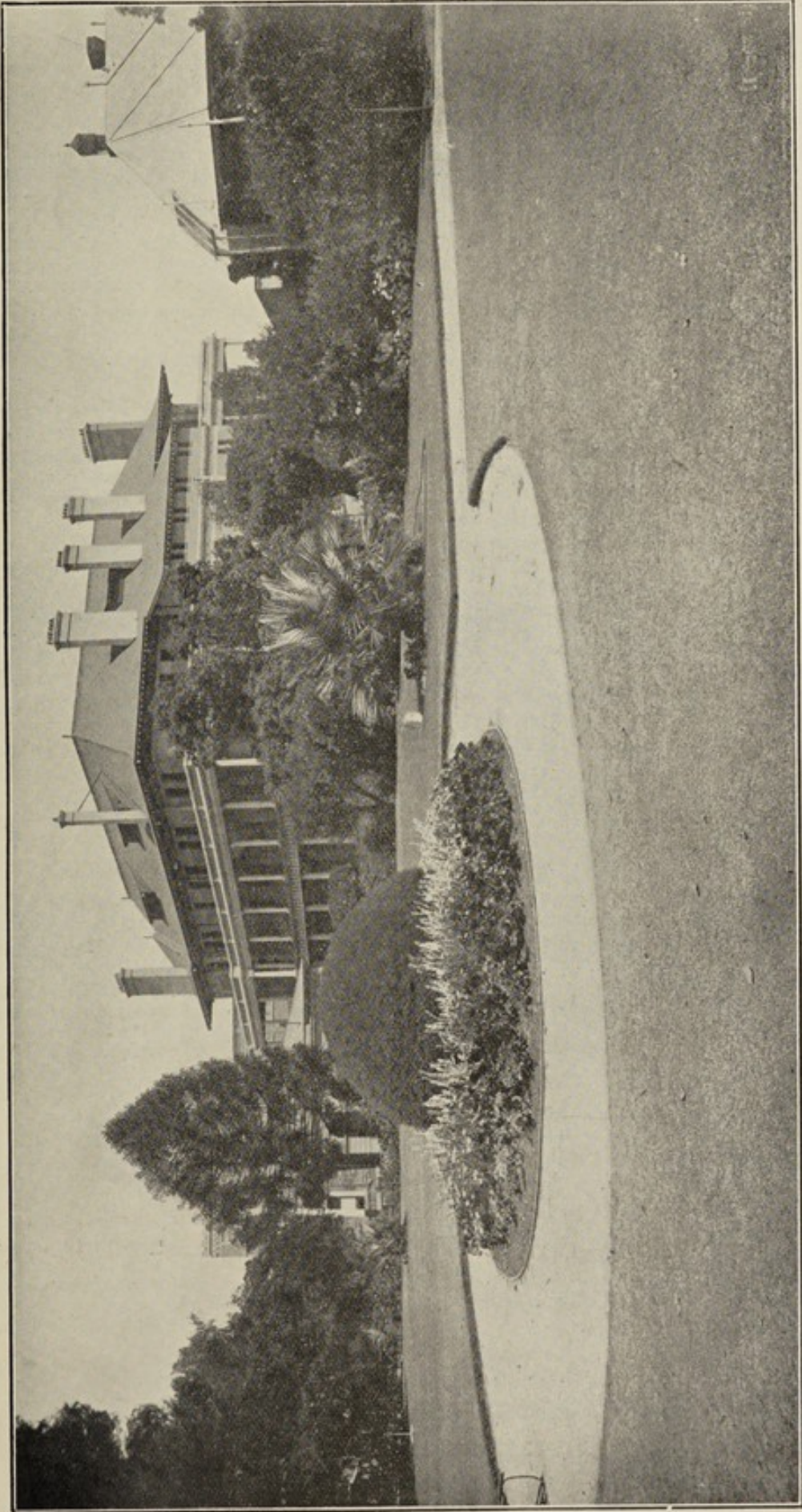

EXTRACTS FROM RULES AND REGULATIONS.

ADMISSION AND DISCHARGE OF PATIENTS.

1. *Admission.*—Every contributor of £2 shall have the privilege of recommending two indoor or 12 outdoor patients within a year of date of such contribution ; and of £5, five indoor or 30 outdoor patients within the year ; of £10 annually, the privilege of having always one patient in the Hospital. A subscriber of £20 or over becomes entitled to Life Membership.
2. It is to be distinctly understood that these recommendations are only to be issued by the contributors to persons who cannot pay for medical treatment elsewhere. Hour of attendance of out-patients at the Out-patients' Department, Adelaide Hospital, 9 a.m.
3. Life contributors to have the same privileges in proportion ; their donations being estimated as annual contributions of one-tenth.
4. It is optional for contributors to have indoor order-forms supplied in lieu of outdoor forms, at the rate of one of the former for six of the latter.
5. It is to be distinctly understood that these recommendations are *only to be given to persons who, on account of their financial position, are proper subjects for Hospital treatment.*
6. Applicants for admission to the Hospital shall, unless possessed of means sufficient to pay for medical advice, make a declaration, on a form printed for that purpose, to the effect that they are unable to pay for medical advice, and stating whether they are entitled to medical attendance from any benefit society or lodge.
7. Every member of the Board of Management and every legally qualified medical practitioner may likewise recommend patients for admission ; severe accidents and cases of real emergency may be admitted at all times by the Resident Medical Officer on duty.
8. No female for the purpose of confinement shall be deemed fit for Hospital treatment ; and no children under 10 years of age or infant shall be admitted on account of the condition of the mother alone, except with the advice of the Honorary Medical Officer. Infectious cases other than typhoid or tuberculosis are admitted to the Infectious Diseases Block. The Boards of Health representing the various municipalities being responsible for the isolation of such cases at a cost of 4s. 4d. per day per patient.
9. The proper hours for patients to present their recommendations for admission to the Hospital are from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., except in cases of emergency or accident.
10. Any case which can be treated at the Out-patients' Department, or which is obviously incurable, cannot be admitted, except by special order of a visiting Medical Officer.
11. No patient shall be discharged from the Hospital without the consent of the visiting Medical Officer, except as provided for under the regulations or in cases of misconduct.

ADMISSION ON PAYMENT OF FEES FOR MAINTENANCE.

1. Persons seeking admission whose means will not enable them in any other way to procure such medical attendance as their cases may require may be admitted into the institution upon payment of maintenance fees at the rate of from 3s. to 6s. per diem, and upon the patient or a responsible person making an agreement with the Secretary guaranteeing the payment during the time the patient remains in the institution.
2. Every person making a declaration or statement in writing when applying for admission to the Hospital that he is unable to pay for medical advice, and that he is not entitled to any benefit from any lodge, shall, nevertheless, be liable to pay to the Board the sum of £2 2s. for each week, and a proportionate sum for any part of a week, during which he receives medical attendance at or from the Hospital.

VISITORS.

1. Friends desirous of visiting patients may, unless prohibited by the Resident Medical Officer, be admitted to the institution (by tickets only, to be procured in the wards) for that purpose on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Sundays, between the hours of 2 and 4 p.m., and shall leave the wards punctually at the latter hour—a bell will be rung five minutes before the time for departure—but no more than two visitors to each patient are allowed on any one day, unless specially authorised. Exceptions to the above rule will only be allowed by special permission of the Resident Medical Officer or Medical Superintendent in favor of near relations, friends of patients in a dangerous state, or to Jews on their Sabbath. Visitors are strictly forbidden, on pain of expulsion from the wards, to introduce food, drink, or refreshment of any kind whatever without the sanction of the Resident Medical Officer in charge of the patient ; and to ensure the perfect observance of this rule all parcels, &c., must be opened in the presence of the nurse on duty in the ward.

MORAL AND RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION.

1. Patients are at liberty to receive the visits of ministers of the religious denomination to which they respectively belong.

Two hundred and forty-nine (249) patients have been sent to the Convalescent Hospital, Semaphore, at a cost to this institution of £29 14s. The Da Costa Fund, created by Miss Da Costa, to assist convalescent patients leaving hospital, bore the expense of the greater portion of this number, namely 174, only 46 out of the 249 paid for themselves.

REPORT 1919.

The Board of Management was reappointed with the exception of I. MacGillivray, M.P., and E. Phillips, J.P., whose places were taken by Hon. W. Hannaford, M.L.C., and W. D. Ponder, M.P.

Mr. W. G. Coombs was unanimously reappointed Chairman and Colonel R. S. Rogers as Deputy Chairman.

The Sub-committee (House, Finance, and Medical) were reappointed, with the exception of Mr. Lundie taking the place of Mr. Phillips on the House Committee and Mr. Ponder and Mr. Robinson, *vice* Mr. Moseley and Mr. Phillips, on the Finance Committee; and later in the year, owing to the death of Hon. Alfred Catt, Mr. Moseley filled the vacancy on the Finance Committee and Mr. T. A. Buttery as a member of the Board.

It is with deep regret we have to chronicle the death of the late Hon. Alfred Catt, who was a member of the Board of Management and Chairman of the Finance Committee for many years; also the death of Dr. Archie C. Magarey, who was on our staff as an honorary assistant surgeon; and also the death of Miss Edith Williams, Superintendent of Night Nurses, which post she had held for twenty-two years.

The Storekeeper (Mr. E. T. Pascoe), who had reached the retiring age, left the service of the institution, and was succeeded by Mr. W. S. McAloney.

The following Honorary Officers were reappointed for a further term of three years:—Dr. A. M. Cudmore (Surgeon), Dr. A. W. Hill (Ophthalmic Surgeon), Dr. F. S. Hone (Assistant Physician), Dr. Helen M. Mayo (Vaccine Department), Dr. H. F. Shorney (Ophthalmic Surgeon), Dr. Bronte Smeaton (Assistant Surgeon), and Mr. J. Millikin (Galvanist).

During the year the resignations of Dr. J. A. G. Hamilton and Dr. B. Poulton were received. As both these officers have given most valuable service to the Hospital for very many years as Gynæcologist and Surgeon respectively, the resignations were received with much regret, and as a mark of appreciation the Board unanimously appointed them as Honorary Consulting Surgeons to the Hospital.

The position previously held by the late Dr. C. E. Todd was filled by the appointment of Dr. Cavanagh-Mainwaring as Surgeon, and Dr. Simpson Newland was appointed Surgeon, *vice* Dr. Poulton, resigned.

Dr. G. R. West having resigned the Medical Superintendentship, the position was filled by the appointment of Dr. Charles T. Turner, M.C.

A Pre-Maternity Clinic and Extern Department have been inaugurated in connection with the Hospital. The clinic has as its object the supervision of gravid women during their term, the conduct of labor and puerperium, and in addition the teaching of obstetrics. Dr. T. G. Wilson has been appointed in charge of this department.

The University Council invited Mr. W. G. Coombs, the Chairman of the Board, to a seat on the Council of the Faculty of Medicine, which he accepted.

Mr. Moseley, M.P., member of the Board, was granted six months' leave of absence to enable him to take a trip to England.

Medals for Nurses.—The following Nurses passed first class in the examinations in their probationership, and received each a gold medal:—Eleanor Mabel Playford, Emily Reedman, and Elsa Scott Young.

We again desire to place on record our indebtedness to the surgeon in charge (Dr. Rischbieth) for his valuable services in an honorary capacity; also to the medical students who have assisted from time to time.

SURGEON'S REPORT.

Sir—I have the honor to present the third annual report of the night clinics for treatment of venereal disease, Adelaide Hospital, for the year ended September 30th, 1919.

The total number of cases of syphilis for the year ended September 30th was 213. Of these, 176 were men and 37 were women. Twenty-one men and eight women amongst these had

gonorrhœa as well as syphilis. The number of cases of gonorrhœa was 392, namely, 357 men and 35 women. Twenty-one men and eight women amongst these also had syphilis. There were 11 cases of conditions which were not those of venereal disease. There was no case of chancre due to Ducre's bacillus to my knowledge (I think this is remarkable). The total number of patients for the year was 587. Of these, 523 were men and 64 were women. Of these, 182 men and 21 women passed on from the previous year, and 341 men and 43 women were new. Total number of attendances for the year, 5,036.

Owing to the epidemic of influenza the clinic had to be closed for several weeks in the earlier months of the present year. This affected treatment adversely, but was unavoidable.

Results of Treatment.

As regards syphilis—

(1) In women—These have, on the whole, been satisfactory, and very much as in the last report; but this year there have been—

Two cases of congenital syphilis (one of them infantile general paralysis);

One case of locomotor ataxia; and

Two cases of cerebral-thrombosis of syphilitic origin.

Of these it is too soon to make a statement, partly because they have not been under treatment long enough, and partly because attendance has not been regular. There are one or two others of whom I cannot speak for the same reason, though they were doing well when last seen.

(2) In men—In most cases the results have been good; but the following comments are to be made:—

(a) There have been three cases of general paralysis. One of these developed since coming to the clinic; but his attendance was irregular (he was absent at work in the country for weeks at a time). The other two improved considerably, *clinically*, under treatment; but the Wassermann reaction of the cerebro-spinal fluid remained positive in each case. He relapsed during the influenza epidemic, and afterwards died of his disease in spite of treatment. The other is still under treatment and seems to be stationary.

(b) I consider that in all cases of locomotor ataxia that we have had there has been improvement *clinically*. In two, I think, the disease has been arrested; another one is doubtful, but improvement is possible with further treatment. I think results, as far as they go, are encouraging.

(c) As regards the others, I group "primary," secondary, and tertiary cases together. *Of those that have been through the course prescribed*, all are satisfactory, as far as I can tell, except the following:—

(1) Colored man who came in the primary stage. Had a great deal of treatment (luargol, novarseno-benzol, mercury), but, nevertheless, developed a secondary rash. Had influenza, and relapsed considerably. Still gives a positive reaction in spite of treatment.

(2) Two men who came in the late secondary stage. Had much treatment, as above. Gave negative reactions after it for several months. Have now relapsed to positive again, one after nine months.

(3) Another case like the first, who has, however, now cleared up.

I expect these three cases to clear up under prolonged regular treatment. They illustrate the importance of three points—The necessity of testing the Wassermann reaction at regular intervals for a long time (probably up to three years) after treatment is thought sufficient. That cases are not alike in fact, even though they may superficially appear to be so; of

those apparently alike one may require very much more treatment than another, from the very earliest stages of the disease. Another point is that one ought, as a routine, to test the Wassermann reaction of the cerebro-spinal fluid in all cases. But this cannot be done, as a routine, in any out-patient department, and still less in a night clinic. In order to do it further accommodation is necessary.

As regards gonorrhœa—

In women—In early cases the results have been satisfactory. In long-standing cases very much treatment has been required. Those discharged have been cured. The treatment of the last stages is surgical. There naturally have not been any of those.

In men—The results have been much the same as last year. Cases are cured fairly soon if they come early and attend regularly and carry out the instructions. The long-standing cases necessarily have to attend for a longer time; but they are cured, in my opinion, in the end—at least as regards gonorrhœal infection. Secondary infections, for the most part, clear up. A good many cases cease attending and go elsewhere. This happens everywhere in such cases.

There has been a considerable improvement in one respect as regards both syphilis and gonorrhœa, and that is that cases now come for treatment in a very much larger proportion of cases in early stage than was the case in the first year. This is probably due to spread of knowledge of these diseases among the general public. If it continues, results of treatment are likely to improve as time goes on.

To revert to the subject of gonorrhœa, I have to point out that our system of treatment involves a compromise. We cannot, under present conditions, employ the most modern methods, with a system of tables, a body of trained assistants carrying out the treatment for the patient, facilities for endoscopy, &c. It would involve having the department at work every night, possibly during the day as well, and would frequently involve finishing during the small hours. A much larger staff, as well as apparatus, would be required. Further, the patients themselves, under conditions of civil life, would, in many cases, not be able to do their part. It is, therefore, necessary, under the present conditions, to employ older methods and let the patients carry out a good deal of their treatment themselves.

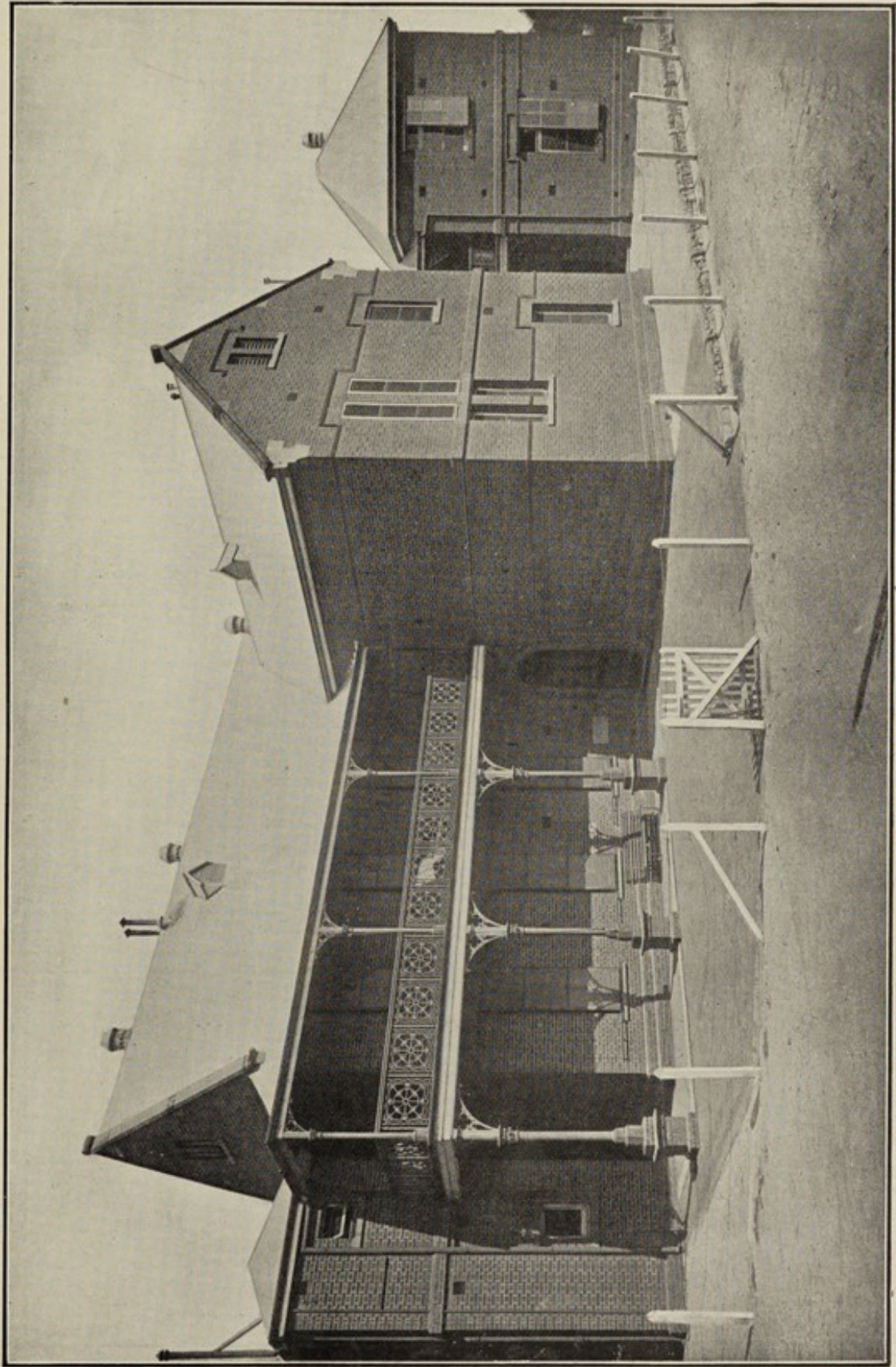

Night Clinics.—Dr. Rischbieth will continue to attend the men patients and Dr. Phoebe Chapple will be in charge of the women patients, Dr. Rischbieth receiving an honorarium of £150 per annum for two evenings per week and Dr. Phoebe Chapple an honorarium of £75 per annum for one evening per week.

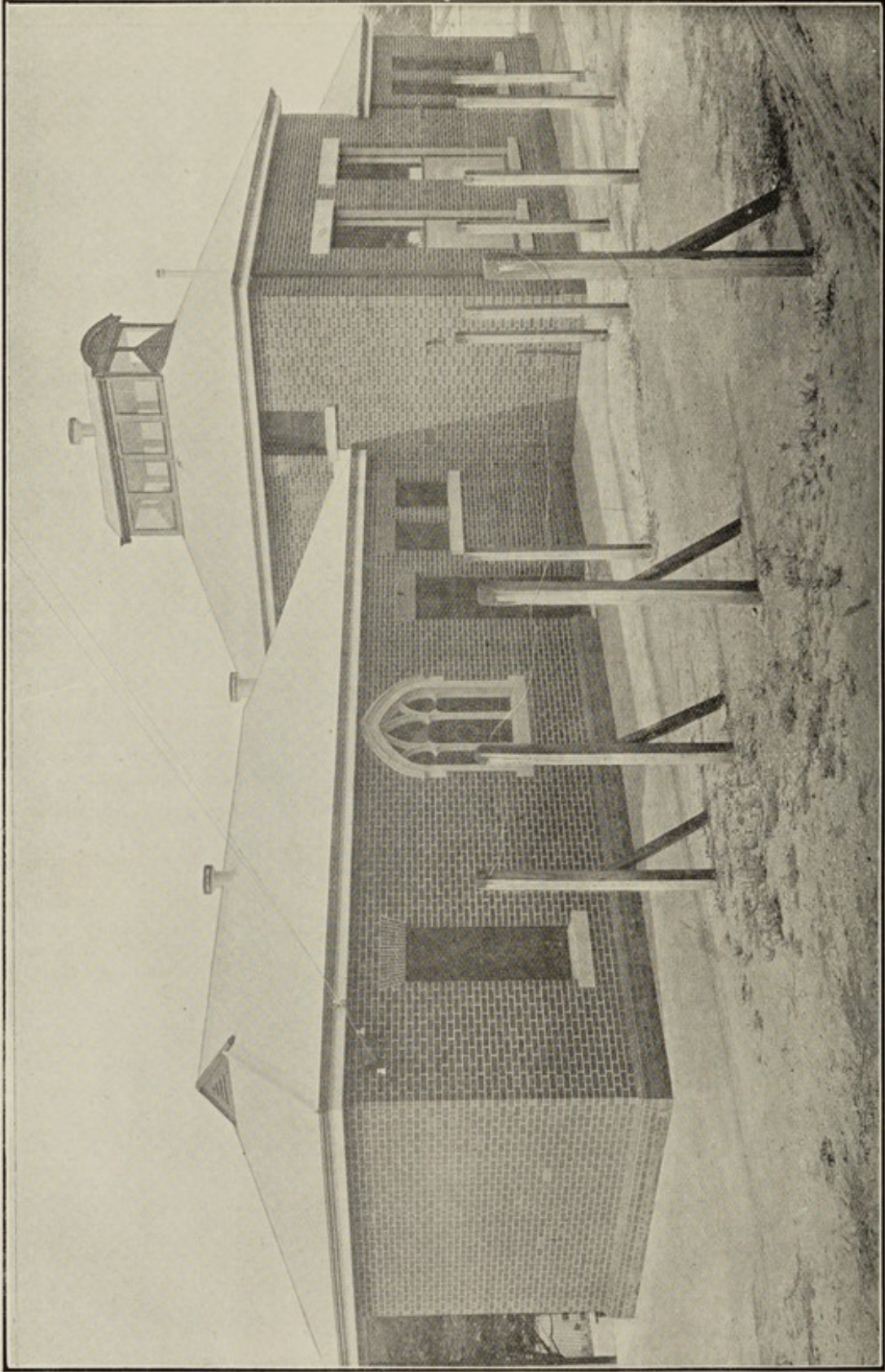
Exhibition Hospital (Influenza).—On June 6th last the Board of Management took over the control and administration of this department from the Central Board of Health. At this time there were 90 patients under treatment, and since that date 498 patients had been received, totalling 588, of whom 520 had been discharged; the remaining 68 had succumbed to influenza. We gave up possession of the Exhibition on December 2nd last.

Hospital Laboratory.—Dr. C. T. C. de Crespigny, having retired from the positions of Director and Honorary Pathologist, the Board appointed Dr. J. B. Cleland, Professor of Pathology at the Adelaide University, to fill these vacancies.

Overcrowded Hospital.—A deputation waited on the Hon. the Chief Secretary during November last and urged the necessity for immediate alterations for the better accommodation of patients. A request was also made that the funds of the Martin bequest should be made available for that purpose. The Chairman pointed out that the site of the present Hospital was built

upon in 1857, and early in 1858 one of the wings, which provided for 84 beds, was in occupation. Later on the other wing was completed, making a total of about 200 beds. In 1892 the nucleus of a new Hospital was built by the erection of Flinders and Light wards. In 1899 a building was erected for the treatment of infectious cases, but which is now occupied as an Ophthalmic Department. After which the Bacteriological Block was erected. In 1912 the Operating Theatre Block was built. In this year we had an average daily number of 248 patients in hospital, as against 314 patients last year. The experience of the world recognises that what is provided must be of the best; that the erections, sanitation, equipment, and general accommodation must reflect the advanced knowledge of the day. To get the best out of our physicians, surgeons, and nurses, favorable and up-to-date conditions should be present. In very many directions our Hospital is not up to date, and in addition more accommodation is absolutely required. The overcrowding has been unfair to the patients, the medical men, the nurses, and the Board of Management.

The Hon. the Chief Secretary was desired by the Board of Management to respectfully consider the matter of the Martin bequest. It is well known that the late Mr. Martin made a will in reference to his South Australian property, viz., that two-fifths were left direct to the Adelaide Hospital. Not only did he leave it directly to the Hospital, but declared in his will that the receipt of the treasurer of the Hospital for the time being should be considered satisfactory to the trustees of his estate. I think we can safely say that it was never his intention that this money should go into the hands of the Government and be locked up for a term of, say, 30 years, but rather that the Hospital should, when the estate was wound up, take its share and use the proceeds for hospital purposes. Never in its history was money more urgently required than to-day. We do not desire that any of the property should be sold, but we do think that the income from rents, interest, &c., should be devoted to the Hospital, in whose favor the money was bequeathed. The annual income in rents, interest, &c., received from this estate by the Commissioners of Charitable Funds is over £4,000, out of which £2,500 goes into the Endowment Fund. The Commissioners now have to their credit on deposit with the South Australian Government the sum of £24,887, and in a current account with the Treasury over £9,000, and with other investments £1,200, making in all over £35,475, which is earning 4½ per cent. interest, and as time goes on will be growing more and more, and yet the Hospital does not participate.

The Chief Secretary, in reply, said no one could fail to be impressed by the unanimity with which the Board and staff had advocated for many years the necessity for much improved accommodation at the Hospital. In 1913, when the Old People's Home was being discussed, he had a scheme for utilising the funds of the Martin bequest, under certain conditions, for the building of a new hospital. He went out of office, and another Joseph arose who had very large ideas in connection with the matter. The next thing they heard of was a proposal to build a new hospital, right in the middle of the disturbance of the war. However desirable the scheme might have been in other circumstances, it could not be realised at the time. In connection with the proposal of 1913, one of the main points had been the building of an infirmary, which seemed to him a very desirable scheme. He was still desirous of governing the bequest, so that the great increase in value that would accrue might remain for the benefit of the institution. The suggestion discussed in 1913 or 1914 was that the Government should advance the necessary funds to provide the accommodation, and the income from the bequest should be used to pay the interest on the amount. The Government could have no concern in advancing money where the interest was secure in connection with that advance. That course still seemed to him preferable to using the whole of the funds of the bequest to rebuild the hospital. He proposed that with a view of bringing the matter to finality, and arriving at a plan which they could convince the Government was the best one, the Chairman, Dr. Swift, Dr. B. H. Morris, and anyone else suggested by the Board of Management, should meet him as soon as possible after Par-

liament was prorogued to arrange a set of suggestions that he could bring before the Cabinet. After consultations with the Charity Commissioners as to the amount to the credit of the bequest, they could arrive at definite plans, which he could convince his colleagues would be in the interests of the Hospital and conducive to meeting the Board's requirements.

Dental Hospital.—After several meetings of a sub-committee, consisting of members of the Adelaide University, Dental Society, and Adelaide Hospital, the scheme has so far advanced that the Government has approved of the proposal and placed a preliminary amount on the Estimates, and authorised the Superintendent of Public Buildings to prepare plans, &c., for their consideration.

A Neurological Department has been established in connection with the outpatient's department. Dr. Kenneth Fry has been appointed in charge of this clinic, with the status of Honorary Assistant Physician.

Mrs. Ive, who was a member of the Library Committee of the Diocesan Association attending the Hospital, died during the year. Mrs. Ive, who has been a regular attendant at the Hospital for nearly 26 years, greatly assisted with her books and cheery disposition in helping to brighten the lives of many patients, and her decease is a great loss to the splendid work carried out by these ladies.

The Board of Management again place on record their thanks for the valuable services rendered throughout the year by the honorary medical and surgical staff of the Hospital, also to those medical gentlemen who rendered great assistance during the shortage of doctors owing to the great war. Thanks are also due to the ministers of religion, city missionaries, members of the Salvation Army, The Diocesan Association, Library Committee, DaCosta Samaritan Fund, and numerous other kind friends for their services and able assistance rendered throughout the year, also to those who gave concerts and provided comforts and amusements to the inmates of the Consumptive Home.

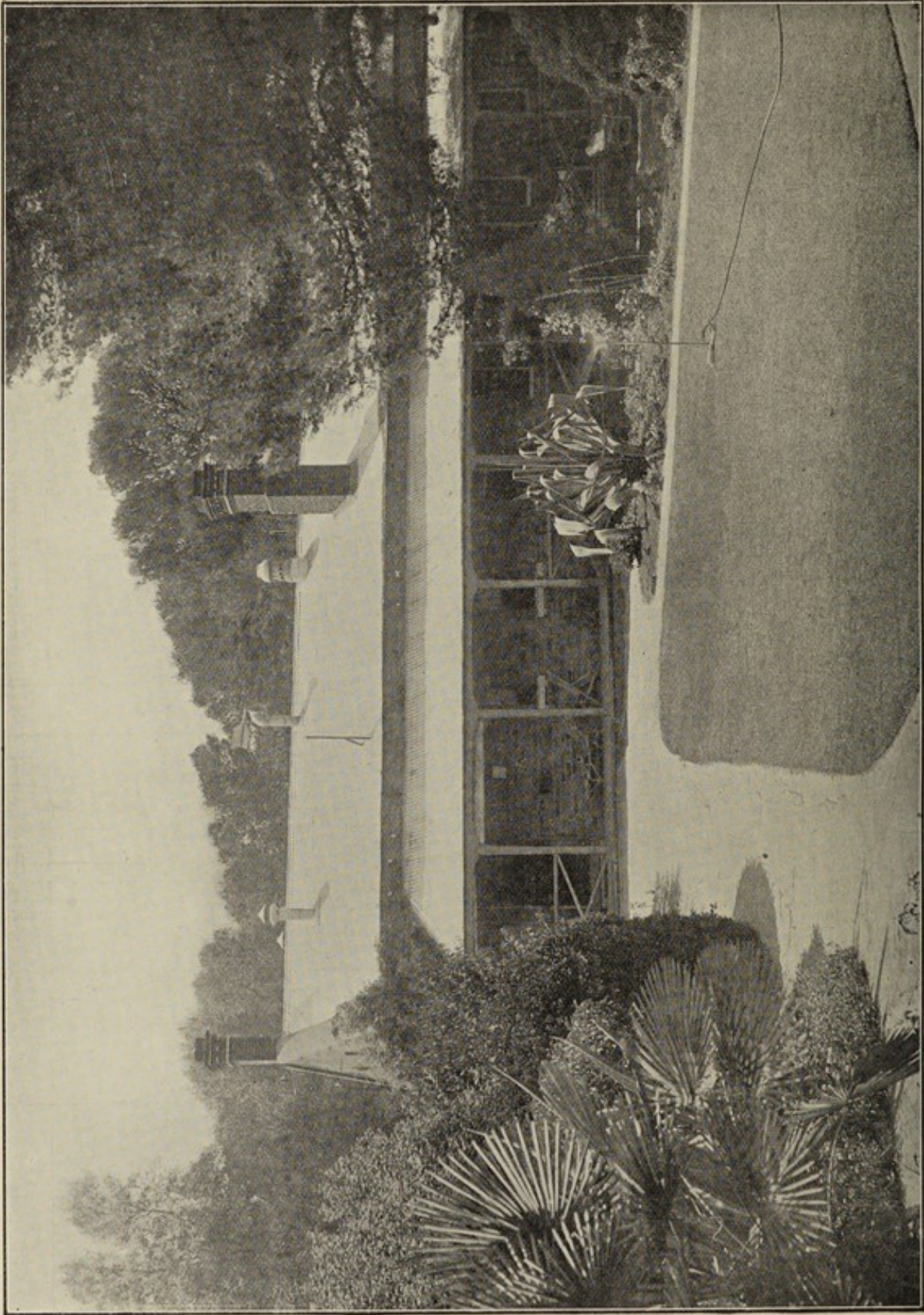

THE CONSUMPTIVES' HOME.

The home is situated on North Terrace; the site is high, dry, screened from dust, and from all prevailing winds, and in addition is sunny and pleasant to the eye, with its green grass, flowering shrubs, and framework of large pine trees.

The inmates are thus placed amid nice surroundings, easily accessible to their friends, and taught such methods of individual and collective cleanliness as to be no longer in any way a menace to the health of the community.

Within the home are rooms set apart for library (with hundreds of books, periodicals, and magazines), smoking, billiards (full sized table), billatelle, and other games. A piano and organ are also provided, in fact everything is done to give the patients all the comforts of a good home, together with the best medical and nursing skill procurable. There are 23 cubicles, three rooms for two patients each, one ward for eight patients, one ward for nine patients, one large bungalow for 12 patients, and four tents for one patient each—giving accommodation for 62 patients.

The buildings have verandahs on both sides, are thoroughly ventilated, the walls and ceilings are varnished and the floors covered with linoleum.

Provision is also made for the treatment of cancer cases, there being 14 single bedrooms devoted to this purpose.

The majority of cases pass through the Consultation room or are transferred from the wards of the General Hospital.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES BLOCK.

The Infectious Diseases Block has had a very busy year, having admitted 708 new cases, and treated in all 755 cases during the year—a record number. The total number of deaths was 18, being a case mortality of 2·3 per cent.

There was a marked increase in the number of cases of scarlet fever, measles, and influenza, compared with the previous year, and a smaller number of cases of diphtheria and erysipelas.

During the past year 340 cases were admitted as diphtheria, of which 262 were found to be undoubted diphtheria by bacteriological tests. The mortality among these 262 was 5·7 per cent. Among the cases of suspected diphtheria it was nil.

Two hundred and eighteen cases of scarlet fever were admitted, of whom two died, a case mortality of ·9 per cent.

There were 97 cases of measles, of whom one died—say 1 per cent.

An unusually large number of children were admitted, mostly from other institutions, who had on admission both diphtheria and scarlet fever or diphtheria and measles. Their proper isolation was in consequence a matter of some difficulty.

Early in the year there was an outbreak of epidemic influenza in the Adelaide Hospital, and the cases, 49 in number, were accommodated for some weeks in the open-air wards of the Infectious Diseases block. None of these cases died, although many were severely affected.

Accommodation for 20 or more cases of influenza has just lately been provided in the Infectious Diseases Block, two bright and cheerful wards having been added to the block by the adaptation of an older building.

The buildings are not of modern design, and a good deal of extra work and general inconvenience to the nursing staff is caused thereby.

At present there are 87 cubicles, also two double rooms, and two dormitories, taking each six beds, and two large sheds for 13 and eight beds respectively, and now two new wards=20 beds, have been fitted up as an influenza block.

More accommodation is especially required for the many convalescent children who must be detained in hospital during the necessary period of isolation.

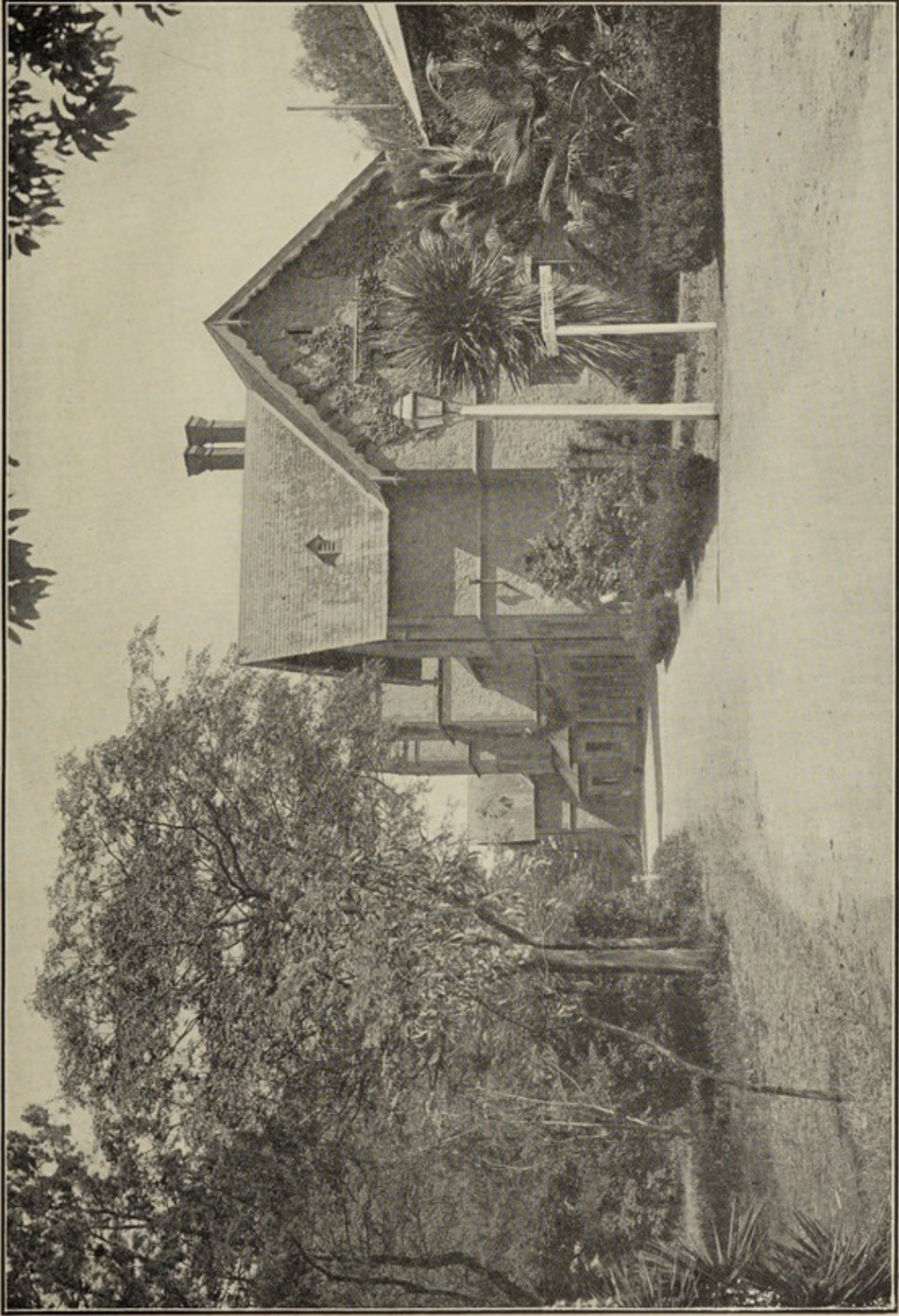

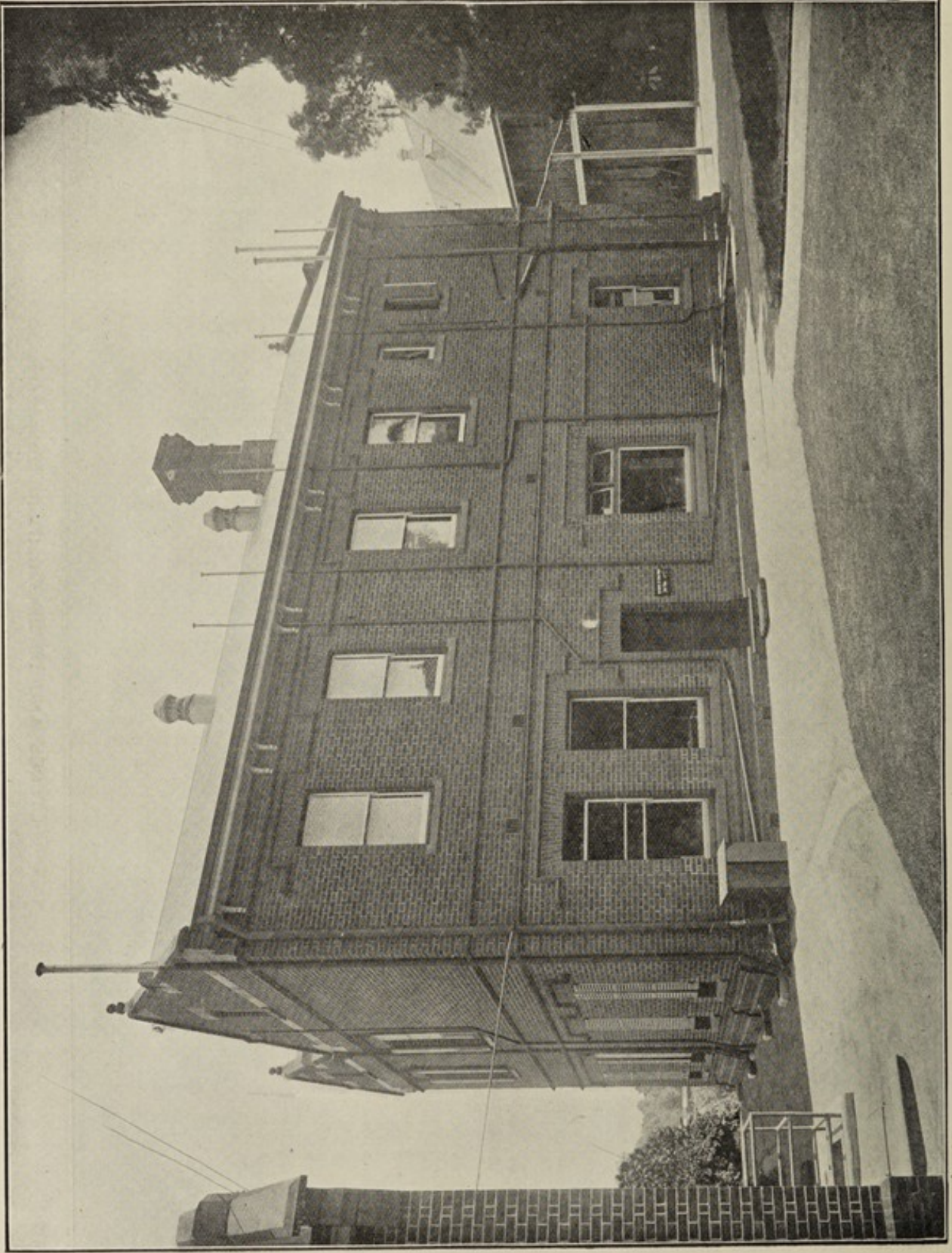

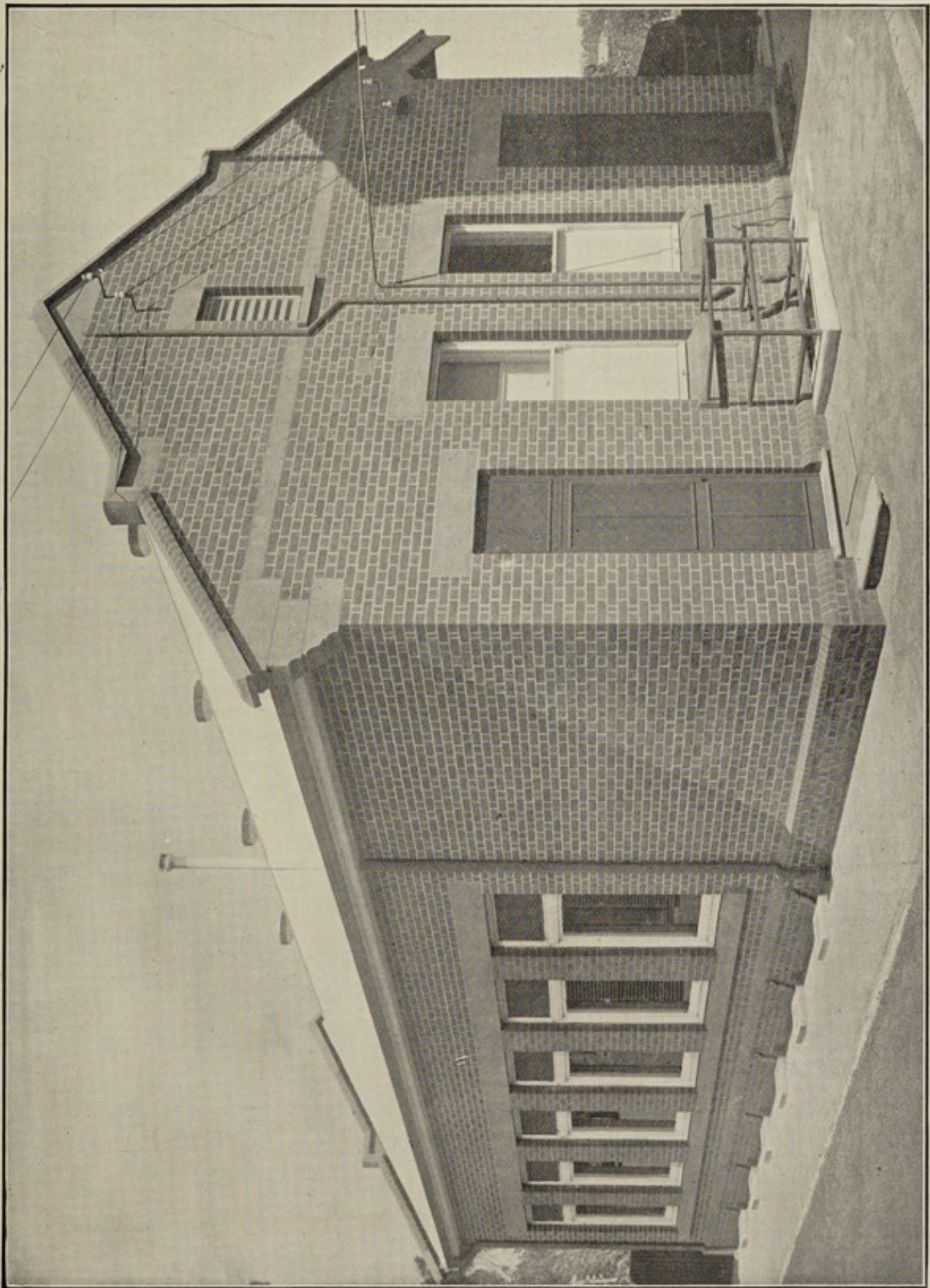

The laboratory consists of a two-storied building, in which are situated the main working laboratory, inoculating rooms, director's laboratory, first assistant's laboratory, museum, library, &c. Adjacent to the main building is a large students' laboratory and lecture hall, with a basement beneath, in which are ice chests and a photomicrographic room.

The accommodation for laboratory animals is very convenient, and the animals are healthy and well cared for.

A large veterinary experimental block, with loose boxes, pens, and an operating room, is situated about 100yds. away, near the north boundary of the hospital grounds. In this, horses, sheep, &c., can be kept under observation.

The Clinical Pathological Examinations performed for the Adelaide Hospital include:—(1) The histological diagnosis of pathological tissues, several of which were immediate examinations performed during operation (such examinations are done in order to help the surgeon in determining the extent and nature of the operation necessary); (2) The examination of urine to detect abnormal chemical and morphological elements; (3) The examination of faeces to detect the presence of abnormal elements; (4) The examination of cerebro-spinal fluid to detect cellular and chemical change (this examination is extremely useful in detecting syphilis of the central nervous system); (5) The examination of blood to detect the presence of the various anemias and leukemias; (6) The examination of material for the detection of spirochæta pallida in the diagnosis of syphilis; (7) The examination of fluids from various cavities and cysts to determine their nature.

The Bacteriological Examinations performed for the Adelaide Hospital include:—(1) The examination of sputum for the detection of tubercle bacilli and other bacteria, and also for hydatid hooklets; (2) The examination of blood for the Widal reaction (this examination is important in assisting in the diagnosis of typhoid fever); (3) The examination of swabs taken from the throat and nose to detect the presence of diphtheria bacilli; (4) The examination of urine to detect the presence of tubercle bacilli, colon bacilli, and other bacteria; (5) The examination of inflammatory fluids for the detection of bacteria, e.g., pleuritic fluid for tubercle bacilli; (6) The examination of cerebro-spinal fluid to detect the presence of tubercle bacilli, meningococci, and other bacteria; (7) The cultural examination of blood to detect the presence of bacteria in the circulation; (8) The examination of faeces and urine for the detection of typhoid bacilli and other pathogenic bacteria; (9) The examination of pus for the detection of gonococci, actinomyces, and other bacteria. Bacteria, isolated from the various fluids and materials, are often used in the preparation of autogenous vaccines.

The Wassermann Reaction was performed on Thursday in each week. This reaction is of great value in the diagnosis and treatment of syphilis. There is an increase in the number of examinations made, particularly in those for private practitioners, over those made during 1918.

The examinations performed and classified under the head *Private Work* include in the main such examinations as described under clinical pathological examinations and bacteriological examinations. Much work was done for the various Boards of Health. Included in the examinations are also:—(1) Examination of various foodstuffs for the detection

of bacterial contamination; (2) Examination of drinking water to determine its suitability for drinking purposes. Included under this head is a special investigation carried out for the Adelaide Local Board of Health. The object of this investigation is to determine at regular intervals the bacterial content of the water as delivered from the Adelaide waterworks main. This investigation is being continued. (3) The examination of disinfectants to determine their germicidal power; (4) The examination of rats for the Adelaide Local Board of Health.

During the epidemic of influenza, 396 examinations were made of throat swabs and sputa. As the cause of the disease is still unknown, these examinations are useful only in a general way, but not in helping in the diagnosis.

The examinations made for the *Stock Department* include—(1) bacteriological examination of milk; (2) histopathological examinations of diseased tissues, including several malignant new growths.

The investigation into the nature and cause of a braxy-like disease of lambs was continued, and valuable information and material was collected. The investigation into the nature and cause of "forage poisoning" in horses was continued.

The *Vaccine Department*, as well as preparing 192 separate vaccines, also administered inoculations of vaccines to hospital patients.

During the year 79 hospital patients were under treatment; the majority of these patients visited the laboratory twice a week during their course of treatment, when they received their injections. In all 1,076 doses of vaccine were administered. Also 394 doses of tuberculin were given to 16 patients. Vaccine was prepared for 110 patients under the care of private practitioners and 1,840 doses were supplied to these patients.

The staff assisted in the preparation of specimens and demonstrations for the University classes in pathology and bacteriology.

The figures show a slight increase in the number of examinations made, compared with those of 1918. There were 1,078 fewer throat swabs examined than in 1918, so that the increase in the general work is more than appears at first sight, for this number is more than made up by the increase in the number of other examinations. The most notable increases are shown in the vaccines prepared, Wassermann tests, and examination of diseased tissues for private practitioners, and examination of diseased tissues for the hospital.

This increase in the work demonstrates that the laboratory continues to prove its usefulness.
