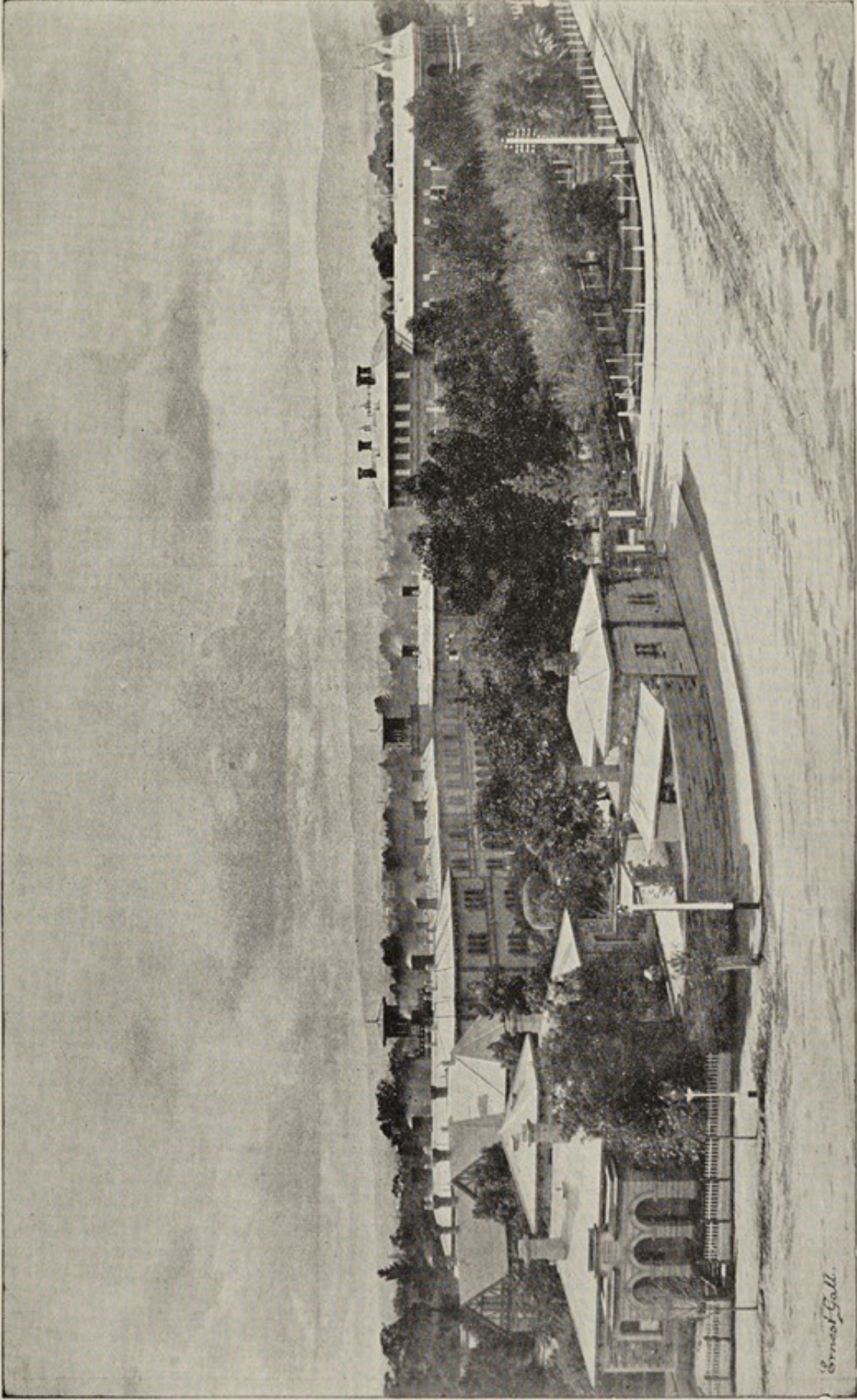

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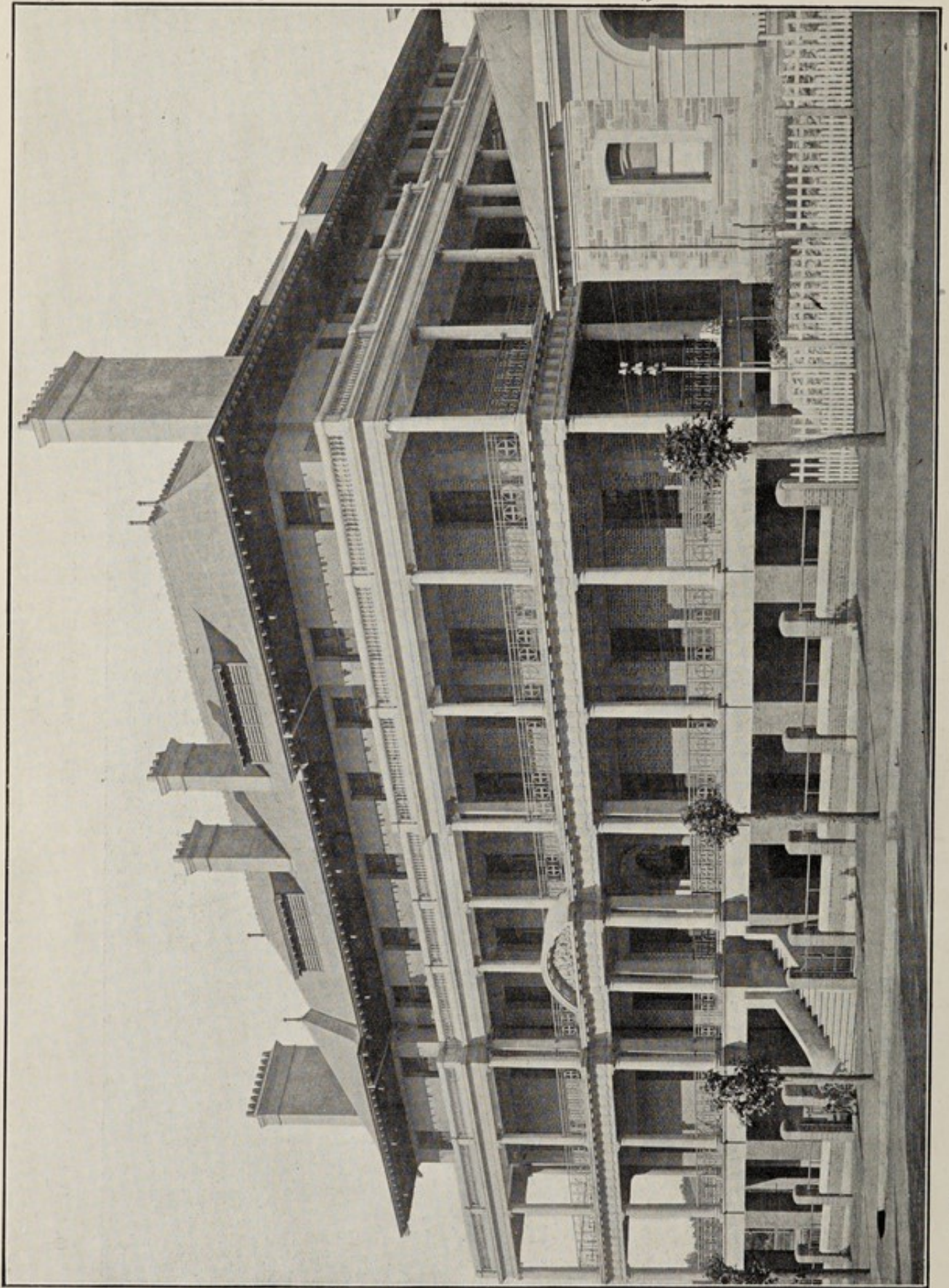
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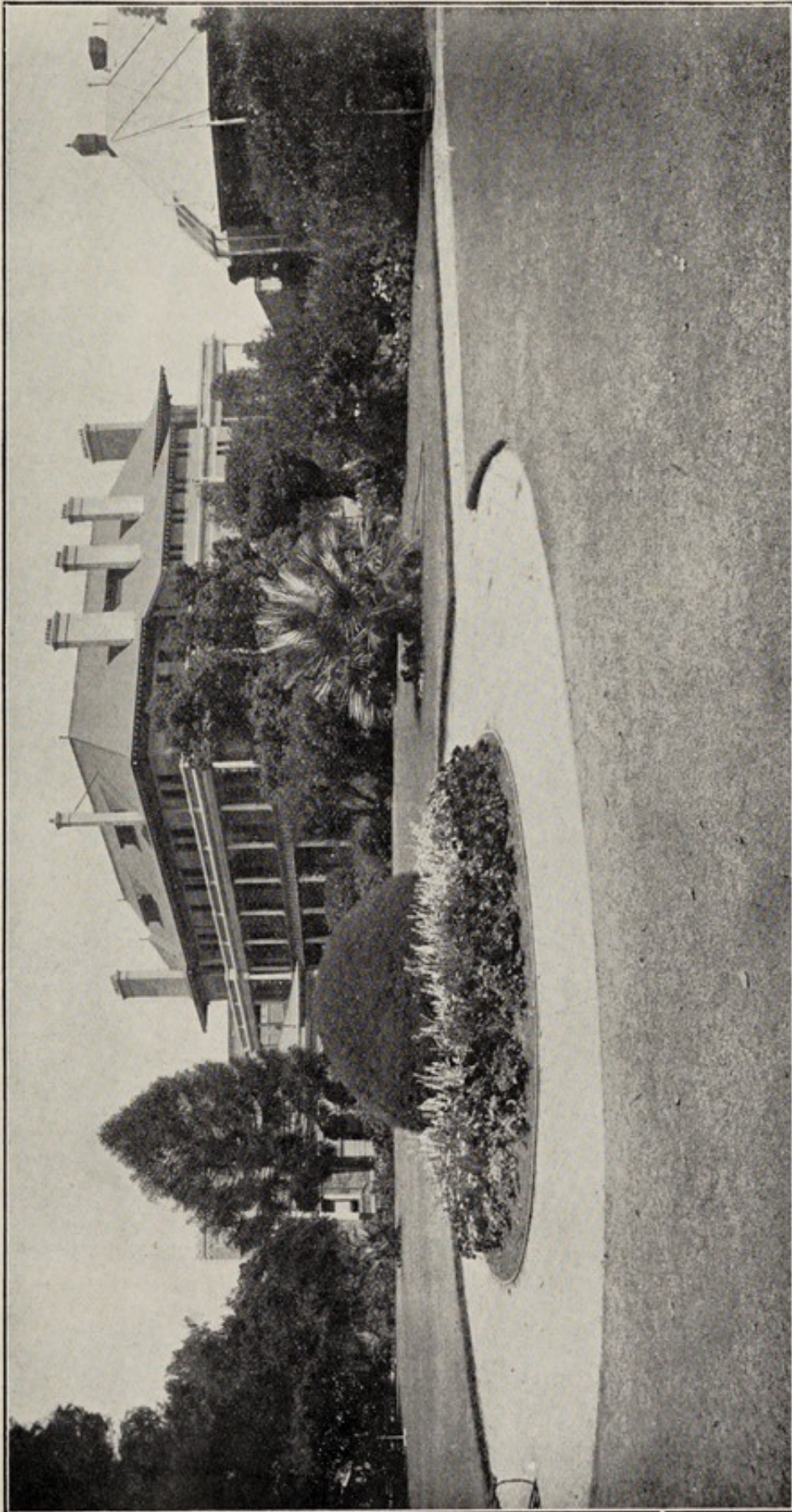

EXTRACTS FROM RULES AND REGULATIONS.

ADMISSION AND DISCHARGE OF PATIENTS.

1. *Admission.*—Every contributor of £2 shall have the privilege of recommending two indoor or 12 outdoor patients within a year of date of such contribution; and of £5, five indoor or 30 outdoor patients within the year; of £10 annually, the privilege of having always one patient in the Hospital. A subscriber of £20 or over becomes entitled to Life Membership.
2. It is to be distinctly understood that these recommendations are only to be issued by the contributors to persons who cannot pay for medical treatment elsewhere. Hour of attendance of out-patients at the Out-patients' Department, Adelaide Hospital, 9 a.m.
3. Life contributors to have the same privileges in proportion; their donations being estimated as annual contributions of one-tenth.
4. It is optional for contributors to have indoor order-forms supplied in lieu of outdoor forms, at the rate of one of the former for six of the latter.
5. It is to be distinctly understood that these recommendations are *only to be given to persons who, on account of their financial position, are proper subjects for Hospital treatment.*
6. Applicants for admission to the Hospital shall, unless possessed of means sufficient to pay for medical advice, make a declaration, on a form printed for that purpose, to the effect that they are unable to pay for medical advice, and stating whether they are entitled to medical attendance from any benefit society or lodge.
7. Every member of the Board of Management and every legally qualified medical practitioner may likewise recommend patients for admission; severe accidents and cases of real emergency may be admitted at all times by the Resident Medical Officer on duty.
8. No female for the purpose of confinement shall be deemed fit for Hospital treatment; and no children under 10 years of age or infant shall be admitted on account of the condition of the mother alone, except with the advice of the Honorary Medical Officer. Infectious cases other than typhoid or tuberculosis are admitted to the Infectious Diseases Block. The Boards of Health representing the various municipalities being responsible for the isolation of such cases at a cost of 4s. 4d. per day per patient.
9. The proper hours for patients to present their recommendations for admission to the Hospital are from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., except in cases of emergency or accident.
10. Any case which can be treated at the Out-patients' Department, or which is obviously incurable, cannot be admitted, except by special order of a visiting Medical Officer.
11. No patient shall be discharged from the Hospital without the consent of the visiting Medical Officer, except as provided for under the regulations or in cases of misconduct.

ADMISSION ON PAYMENT OF FEES FOR MAINTENANCE.

1. Persons seeking admission whose means will not enable them in any other way to procure such medical attendance as their cases may require may be admitted into the institution upon payment of maintenance fees at the rate of from 3s. to 6s. per diem, and upon the patient or a responsible person making an agreement with the Secretary guaranteeing the payment during the time the patient remains in the institution.
2. Every person making a declaration or statement in writing when applying for admission to the Hospital that he is unable to pay for medical advice, and that he is not entitled to any benefit from any lodge, shall, nevertheless, be liable to pay to the Board the sum of £2 2s. for each week, and a proportionate sum for any part of a week, during which he receives medical attendance at or from the Hospital.

VISITORS.

1. Friends desirous of visiting patients may, unless prohibited by the Resident Medical Officer, be admitted to the institution (by tickets only, to be procured in the wards) for that purpose on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Sundays, between the hours of 2 and 4 p.m., and shall leave the wards punctually at the latter hour—a bell will be rung five minutes before the time for departure—but no more than two visitors to each patient are allowed on any one day, unless specially authorised. Exceptions to the above rule will only be allowed by special permission of the Resident Medical Officer or Medical Superintendent in favor of near relations, friends of patients in a dangerous state, or to Jews on their Sabbath. Visitors are strictly forbidden, on pain of expulsion from the wards, to introduce food, drink, or refreshment of any kind whatever without the sanction of the Resident Medical Officer in charge of the patient; and to ensure the perfect observance of this rule all parcels, &c., must be opened in the presence of the nurse on duty in the ward.

VISITING PATIENTS BY NIGHT.

In order to obviate certain difficulties to relatives of the patients in the Adelaide Hospital who cannot for business reasons visit by day, the Hospital authorities have inaugurated a scheme which will, it is hoped, be satisfactory both to the public and the Hospital.

A special night visitors' card, signed by the Medical Superintendent, will be issued to eligible persons within 24 hours of the admission of a patient to the Hospital. This card, on presentation at the Hospital, will enable the person to visit his or her sick relative at the times stated thereon.

Special permission without cards will be given to relatives of patients who are dangerously ill.

MORAL AND RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION.

1. Patients are at liberty to receive the visits of ministers of the religious denomination to which they respectively belong.

The statistics for the year as compared with those of 1919, show the following:—Increases—Number of admissions, 215; number of deaths, 11; average daily number of in-patients, 35; attendances of out-patients, 1,221; annual cost of each in-patient, £23 1s. 2d.; expenditure, £12,123 2s.; patients fees, &c., £136 0s. 2d. Decrease—Contributions, £101 2s. 4d.

Two hundred and fifty-three (253) patients have been sent to the Convalescent Hospital, Semaphore, at a cost to this institution of £27 12s. The Da Costa Fund, created by Miss Da Costa, to assist convalescent patients leaving hospital, bore the expense of the greater portion of this number.

REPORT, 1920.

The Board of Management was reappointed, with the exception of the Hon. W. Hannaford, M.L.C., whose place was taken by the Hon. W. Morrow, M.L.C.

Mr. W. G. Coombs was unanimously re-elected Chairman, and Col. R. S. Rogers as Deputy Chairman.

The subcommittees (house, finance, medical, &c.) were reappointed.

The following honorary officers were appointed:—

Honorary Gynaecologist.—Dr. Arthur F. Lynch resigned his position as Honorary Gynaecologist, and was succeeded by Dr. W. A. Verco. As a mark of appreciation for the many years of service rendered by Dr. Lynch, the Board appointed him as an Honorary Consulting Surgeon to the Hospital.

Honorary to Ear, Nose, and Throat Department.—Dr. G. A. Fischer, after many years of service, resigned his position as Aural Surgeon, and was appointed Honorary Consulting Aural Surgeon. Dr. Hubert M. Jay was appointed *vice* Dr. Fischer.

Honorary Consulting Bacteriologist.—Dr. Thomas Berthwick.

Dr. Burston after a long absence on active service abroad resumed duty as physician to the Infectious Diseases Block.

Positions of Honorary Assistant Gynaecologists were filled by the appointment of Drs. R. E. Magarey and H. A. Powell.

Laboratory.—Prof. J. B. Cleland was appointed Director of the Laboratory, *vice* Dr. deCrespigny.

Mrs. Nicholls, member of Board of Management, was granted leave of absence to enable her to visit England.

GOLD MEDALS.

The following nurses passed first class in the examinations during their probationership, and were each awarded a gold medal:—Eleanor Mabel Playford, Emily Reedman, Kathl. S. Scrymgour.

FIRE.

As a protection against fire, an arrangement has been made with the Fire Brigades Board to overhaul the fire extinguishers every three months.

OVERCROWDING AT HOSPITAL.

Overcrowding at Hospital still exists, and although a new ward has been built to accommodate about 45 patients, more accommodation is absolutely necessary.

Practically all the beds in the Hospital are constantly filled, and only cases of sufficient urgency are admitted into the Hospital. This condition involves the staff in constant and intense attention to meet the frequent changes, and in order to maintain a high standard of efficiency. It can safely be said that a fair proportion of the increased number of attendances at the Out-Patients Department during 1920, viz., 1,221, consisted of patients who were treated at the Casualty Room and sent to Out-Patients Department, but who, if there were sufficient room indoor, would have been admitted into the Hospital. Further, there were 35 more patients daily occupying beds during the past year than in the previous year, and it is certain that this number will be further increased during the present year. The position is so serious that the Government have appointed a subcommittee to consider the matter, and submit proposals for rebuilding or enlargement of the Hospital.

CHRONICS.

We have a daily average of about 35 to 40 patients whose ages range from 30 to 70 years, the majority of whom are over 50 years of age. These invalids certainly need attention, but do not require Hospital treatment with all its attendant expense. They could be well cared for in an infirmary at a cost of about £1 each weekly, whereas a hospital bed costs double as much. These patients occupy beds that should be reserved for people suffering from more serious maladies than those under review.

B

NIGHT CLINICS.

This department is still being carried on, Dr. Rischbieth attending the men, and Dr. Phœbe Chapple the women patients. The details of attendances are, males from previous year 179, and new patients 475, in all 654. Women patients from previous year 65, and new patients 56, in all 121. The results of treatment are considered fairly satisfactory. The costs in connection with this department for the year approximate upon £1,000.

REDUCTION OF NURSES' HOURS.

Reduction of nurses' hours has been, and is still being, considered by the Board, with the result that, as soon as living accommodation is provided for the extra number of nurses required, the Government are agreeable to give the staff one full day off weekly in lieu of one day fortnightly as now exists. The Architect-in-Chief and the Chairman of the Board have been asked by the Government to prepare a scheme to submit to the Board and Government.

INVESTIGATIONS INTO THE GASTRO-ENTERITIS OF INFANTS.

During the year a private committee representative of the University and of bodies connected with the care of infants and the control of disease was formed to undertake the direction of investigation into this disease of infants. The Hospital was represented on this committee by the Chairman, the Medical Superintendent, and the Director and Deputy Director of the Laboratory. The importance of the subject was such that it was decided that every reasonable facility should be given by the Laboratory and those in charge of it to enable this work to be carried out. In December Dr. Frank Beare was appointed by the committee as Research Fellow in this subject, and the assistance rendered by the Laboratory has proved exceedingly valuable in the research work already carried out.

DENTAL HOSPITAL.

On February 6th, 1920, a letter was received by the South Australian division of the Red Cross Society from the Secretary of the Australian Red Cross Society in Melbourne stating that the British Red Cross Society had set aside £150,000 to be allotted at the discretion of the Governor-General of Australia. The Council of the Australian Red Cross Society advised that this sum should be equally divided among the six Australian States, and each State was asked to suggest to the Governor-General in what way it should be spent. The Governor-General granted an interview with Sir Joseph Verco *re* the South Australian suggestions, the outcome of which was that we received £15,000 towards building a Dental Hospital on Hospital grounds, the Government also giving £10,000. The functions of the Dental Hospital will be—

- (a) Treatment of the poor who are unable to pay fees.
- (b) Soldiers and sailors and their dependants.
- (c) People who cannot pay outside fees will be treated at very much reduced prices to those charged by the dentists outside.
- (d) Where dental students can learn their profession and do their work.

The Dental Hospital will be worked under the management of our Board of Management. A subcommittee has been appointed, consisting of Sir Joseph Verco (to whom the Hospital is much indebted for the large amount of work he has put into the scheme), Drs. Counter and A. G. Trott, Messrs. H. Gill Williams and Alexr. Swann, Cols. Hayward, Hill, and Rogers, and the Chairman of the Board of Management.

THE PRE-MATERNITY CLINIC AND EXTERN MIDWIFERY DEPARTMENT.

The general tendency of medicine is more and more to be preventive, and the subject of preventive medicine is gradually being more and more insisted on by the public health authorities. The work of the pre-maternity department is really the ideals of preventive medicine as applied to midwifery. This department was started at the Hospital a year ago, and has provided the opportunity for

pregnant women to be examined and advised as to treatment during the period of their pregnancy. One of the greatest advances in the practice of midwifery has been the more general recognition that most of the serious complications of childbirth are preventable if the premonitory symptoms are recognised and treated during pregnancy. As the utility of this department becomes more generally known, more patients will avail themselves of it, and probably more publicity in regard to the existence of this department is required. Dr. Wilson, the Senior Honorary Gynaecologist, attends these cases, thus insuring the best of skilled attention and advice.

The clinics are held every Friday at 12 noon.

TORRENS WARD.

During the year a new ward has been erected north of the Pathological Block. This ward has a capacity of about 45 beds. It has been excellently equipped and is well ventilated. It is being used for male skin and ear cases, and enables us, in addition, to admit overflow surgical cases.

RE INCREASE IN COST.

A word of explanation is necessary in reference to the increase in expenditure during the year 1920. Generally speaking, the extra cost is due to—

1. Increase in prices of equipment and food.
2. Greater number of patients handled both indoor and at Out-patients' Department, and the increase in quantities required for this increase.

In 1919 the total admissions were 4,765; in 1920 the total was 4,980—an increase of 215.

There was an increase in the average daily number of patients in hospital of 35.

In 1919, 16,370 patients attended Out-patients' Department; in 1920 there were 17,591 attendances—an increase of 1,221.

In reference to items for medicines, surgical instruments, &c., we purchased new X-ray outfit at a cost of about £300. Cotton wool in 1919 cost 2s. 3d. per pound; in 1920, 4s. 6d. per pound. In 1919 we used 3,000lbs., and in 1920, 3,500lbs.—an increase in cost of £450. Other dressings and bandage materials were proportionately increased both in use and cost.

Item for Drapery.—A sum of about £1,900 was spent in the latter months of the year in equipping Torrens Ward and in the purchase of much needed new linen for the hospital.

Food, &c.—The price of meat in 1920 was 50 per cent. higher than in 1919. Other items of food were increased in price. In addition, greater quantities were used to accommodate the increase in patients handled.

Salaries.—This item showed an approximate increase of £2,000. This was due to—

1. Increase of wages to porters, nurses, wardmaid's and laundresses.
2. Reclassification by Public Service Commissioner.

The increase of patients admitted to hospital will necessitate an increase in the nursing staff. It is being found increasingly difficult for the present staff to cope with the growing capacity of the hospital.

Further, it is proposed to establish a one day weekly leave instead of fortnightly as at present. This will necessitate a further increase in the nursing staff as soon as additional accommodation can be provided.

MATRON.

Miss Graham, R.R.C., resigned her position after serving very many years to the satisfaction of the Board of Management.

ADVANCEMENT OF SCIENCE.

The Deputy Director of the Laboratory (Dr. L. B. Bull) attended the fifteenth meeting of the Australasian Association for the Advancement of Science which was held at Melbourne, January 10th to 15th, 1921. His main attention was given to the meetings of section L. Veterinary Science, where papers of considerable interest and importance were delivered. Joint discussions were also held with sections dealing with sanitary science and hygiene, biology, and agriculture. Some of the papers dealt with diseases which are at

present under investigation in the laboratory for the Stock Department. Other papers and discussions dealt with subjects of wider interest such as immunity and heredity, which subjects are of fundamental importance in the study of pathology and bacteriology. Not the least important part of such a congress is the meeting together from all the States of those engaged in scientific work, and the unofficial discussion among themselves of subjects of common interest.

ICELESS REFRIGERATING PLANT.

In connection with the kitchen equipment of the Adelaide Hospital, an insulated refrigerator room, with 360 cub. ft. of air space, has been recently constructed. The temperature of this room is controlled by an electrically operated machine which will automatically maintain a uniform temperature regardless of any natural temperature variations.

The temperature maintenance is controlled by a thermostat in the cooling room, which starts or stops the machine according to the temperature desired. In this way, the room will always be kept at a uniform temperature for proper refrigeration of its contents. The machine works quietly and smoothly.

VICE-REGAL.

We have been honored by visits from His Excellency the Governor and Lady Weigall, and desire to place on record the valuable assistance received from Lady Weigall in regard to gifts to Consumptive Home personally and through her influence with the Red Cross Society.

The Board of Management again place on record their thanks for the valuable services rendered throughout the year by the honorary medical and surgical staff of the Hospital. Thanks are also due to the ministers of religion, city missionaries, members of the Salvation Army, The Diocesan Association, Library Committee, DeCosta Samaritan Fund, and numerous other kind friends for their services and able assistance rendered throughout the year, also to those who gave concerts and provided comforts and amusements to the inmates of the Consumptive Home.

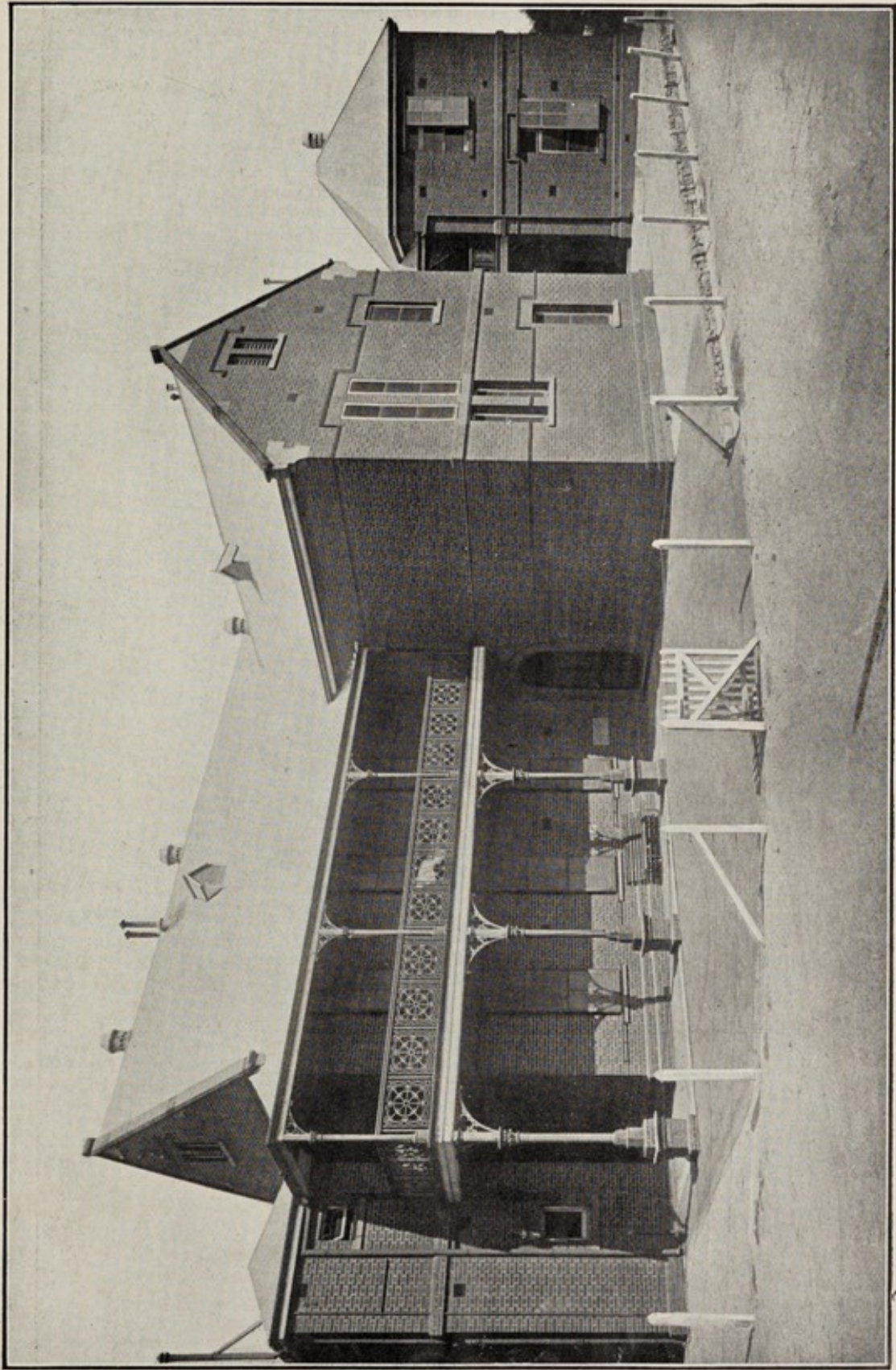

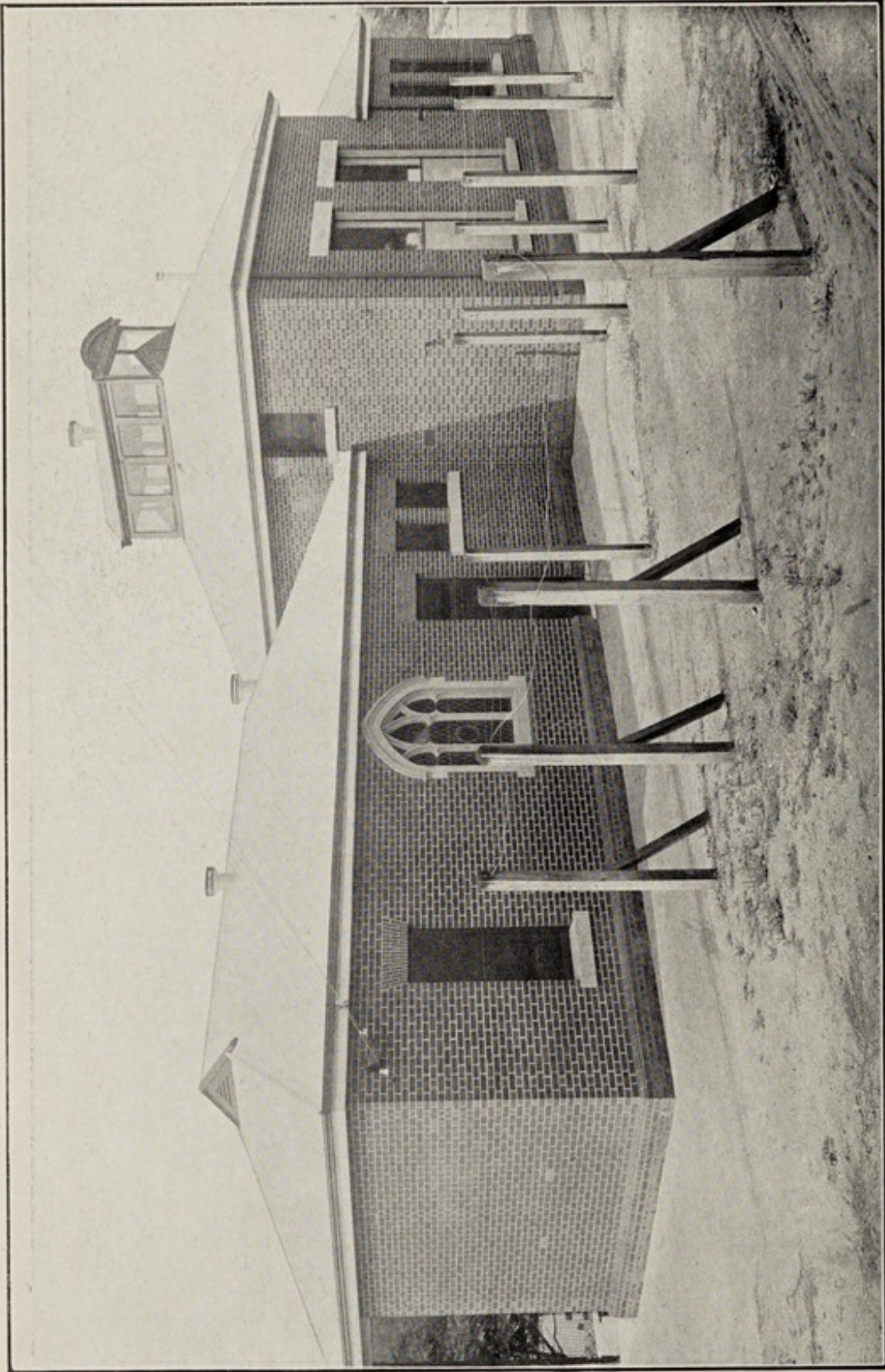

X-RAY DEPARTMENT.

This department has necessitated during the year more powerful and up-to-date apparatus, which has been installed and is giving every satisfaction. The amount of work performed has increased to the degree that the X-Ray operator has been engaged as a full time position.

The growing importance of the X-Ray department of a general hospital can be well gauged from the number of radiographs taken in this department in the following years:—1900, 50; 1910, 401; 1920, 2,291.

The work of the past year can be summarised as follows:—Radiographs, 2,291; bismuth meals, 92; treatment exposures, 2,452.

The department has been made use of by all parts of the Hospital, the numbers of radiographs from the various parts of the Hospital being—Out-patient department, 449; Adelaide ward, 245; Albert ward, 235; Light ward, 108; Faith ward, 170; Beatrice ward, 10; Martin ward, 200; Victoria ward, 273; Dorcas ward, 136; Alfred ward, 37; Flinders ward, 72; Ophthalmic ward, 42; Theatre ward, 5; Alexander ward, 80; Hope ward, 15; daCosta ward, 2; Leopold ward, 8; Wyatt ward, 6; sick room, 1.

Arrangements have been made to do the radiographic work of the Military and Repatriation Departments. So far 41 radiographs have been taken under this heading.

THE CONSUMPTIVES' HOME.

The home is situated on North Terrace; the site is high, dry, screened from dust, and from all prevailing winds, and in addition is sunny and pleasant to the eye, with its green grass, flowering shrubs, and framework of large pine trees.

The inmates are thus placed amid nice surroundings, easily accessible to their friends, and taught such methods of individual and collective cleanliness as to be no longer in any way a menace to the health of the community.

Within the home are rooms set apart for library (with hundreds of books, periodicals, and magazines), smoking, billiards (full sized table), billatelle, and other games. A piano and organ are also provided, in fact everything is done to give the patients all the comforts of a good home, together with the best medical and nursing skill procurable. There are 23 cubicles, three rooms for two patients each, one ward for eight patients, one ward for nine patients, one large bungalow for 12 patients, and four tents for one patient each—giving accommodation for 62 patients.

The buildings have verandahs on both sides, are thoroughly ventilated, the walls and ceilings are varnished and the floors covered with linoleum.

Provision is also made for the treatment of cancer cases, there being 14 single bedrooms devoted to this purpose.

The majority of cases pass through the Consultation room or are transferred from the wards of the General Hospital.

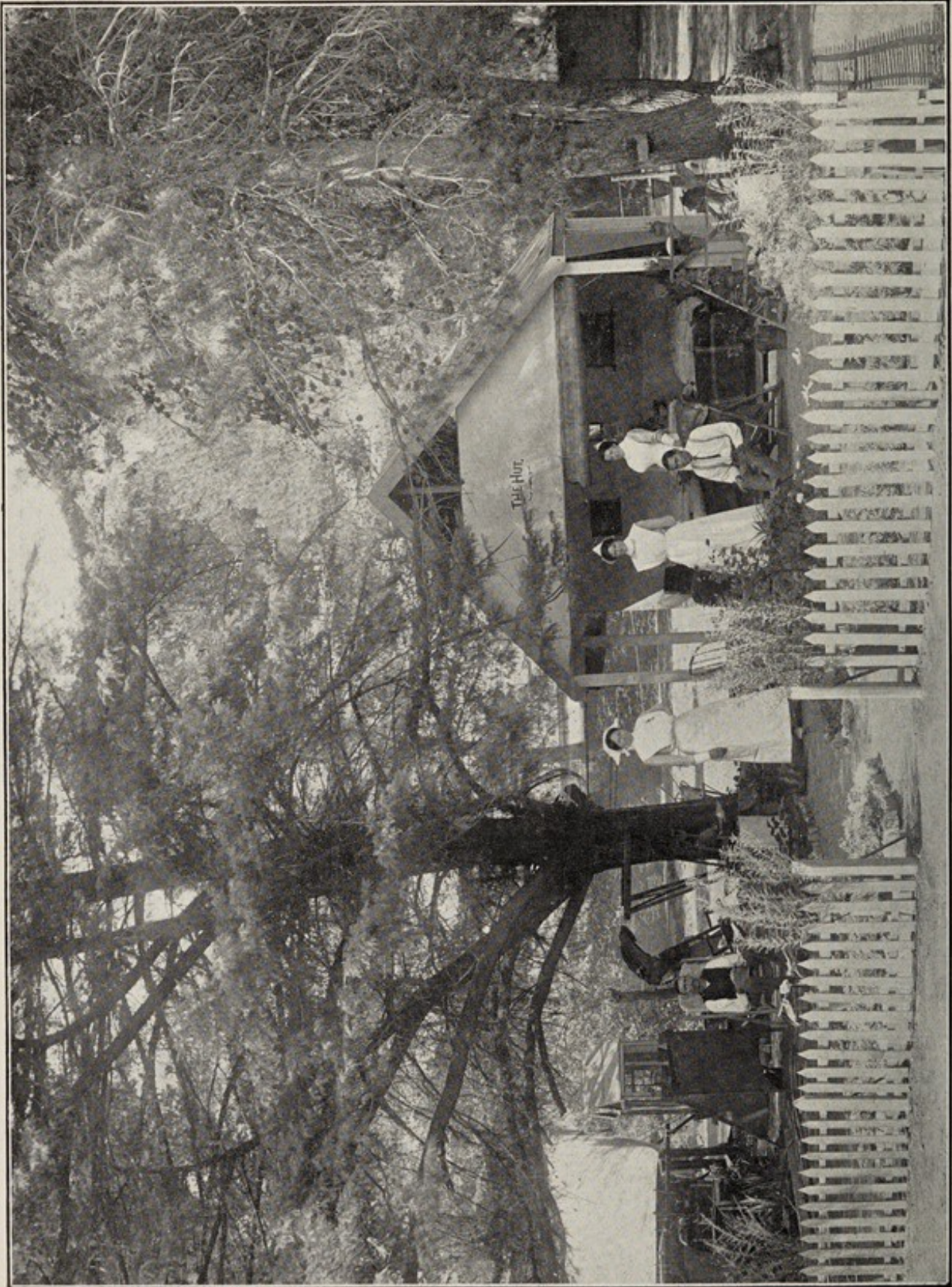

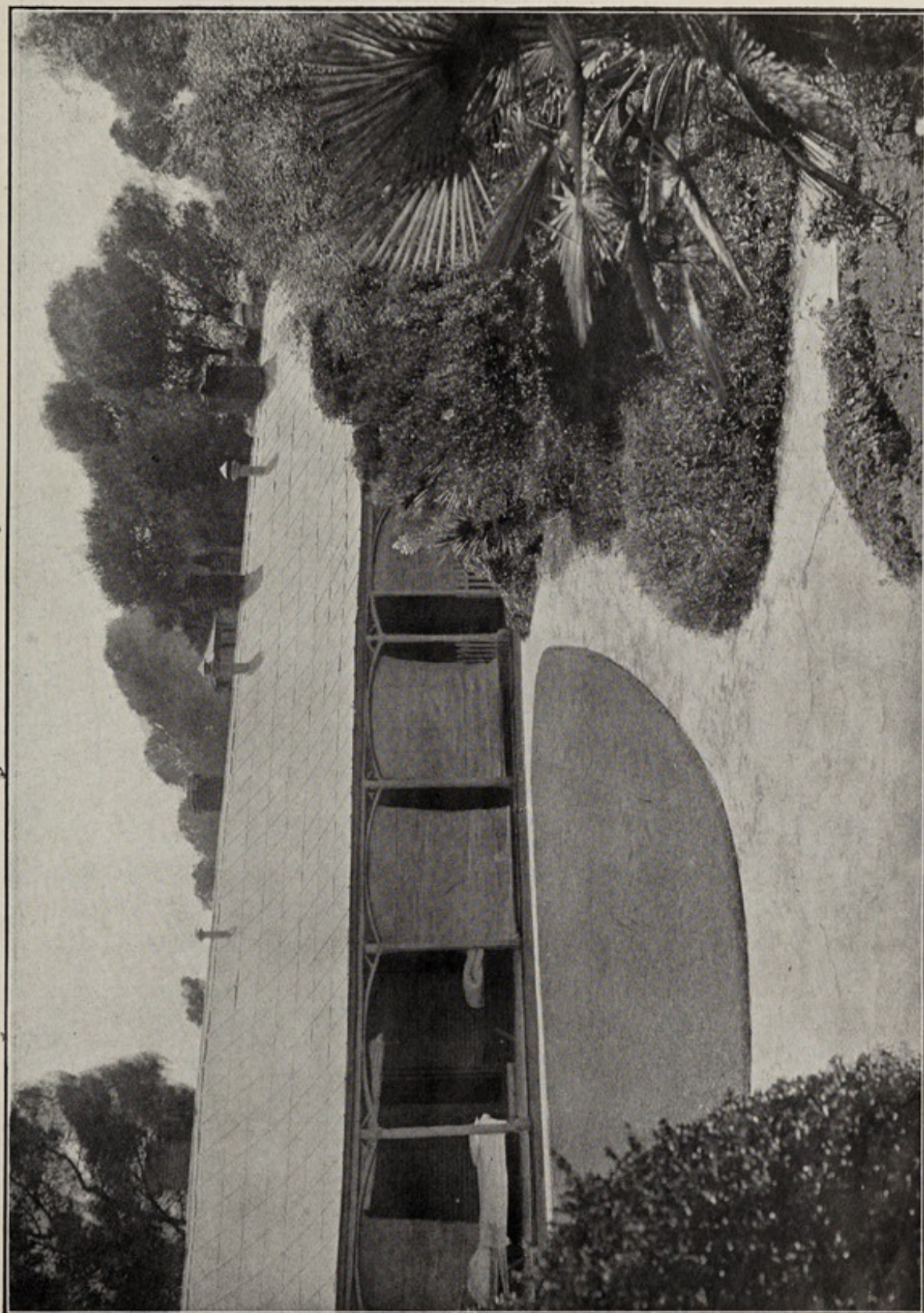

CONSUMPTIVES' HOME (In the Garden).

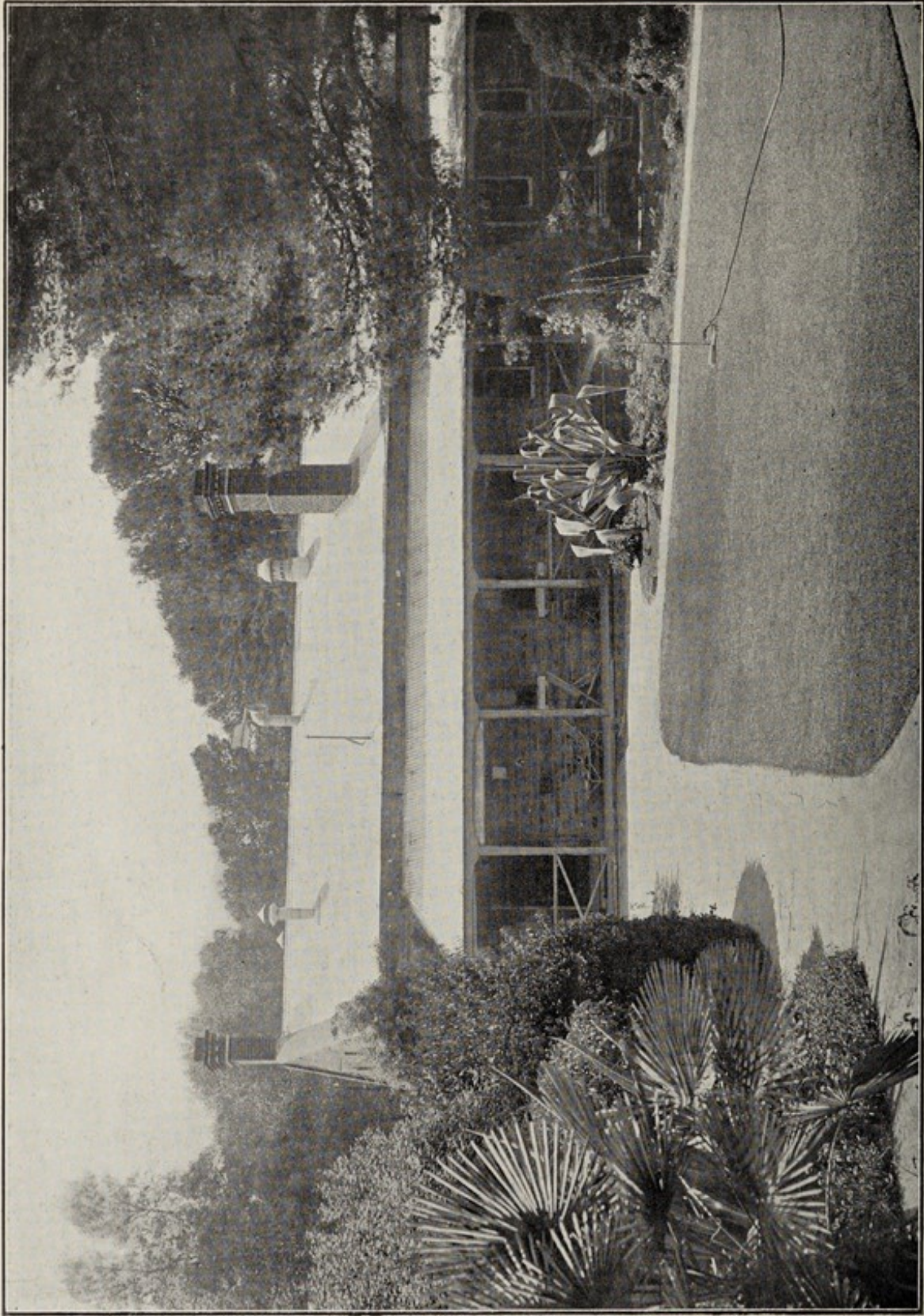


CONSUMPTIVES' HOME (In the Garden).

INFECTIOUS DISEASES BLOCK.

The Infectious Diseases Block has had another very busy year, having admitted 732 new cases, and treated 777 cases during the year—a record number. The total number of deaths was 32, or a case mortality of 4.1 per cent.

The number of scarlet fever and measles cases has been about the same as last year, but there has been a great falling off in the number of influenza cases treated in the Infectious Diseases Block.

The number of diphtheria cases is about the same as last year, viz., 226 cases, with 9 deaths, a case mortality of 4.0 per cent.

Two hundred and fifteen cases of scarlet fever were admitted, of which 10 died, a case mortality of 4.6 per cent.

Thirty-six cases of whooping cough were admitted, practically all of them being complicated, by bronchitis or pneumonia. Of these six died, a mortality of 15.9 per cent.

Sixty-seven cases of measles were admitted, two of which died, approximately 3 per cent.

During the year a new shed to accommodate 18 patients was opened, but all the buildings are very old and out of date, and are most unsuitable for an infectious diseases hospital.

The unsuitability of the buildings entails a great deal of extra work for the staff of the hospital and greatly increases the danger of cross infections occurring amongst the patients.

The buildings are not of modern design, and a good deal of extra work and general inconvenience to the nursing staff is caused thereby.

At present there are 87 cubicles, also two double rooms, and two dormitories, taking each six beds, and two large sheds for 13 and eight beds respectively, and now two new wards=20 beds, have been fitted up as an influenza block.

More accommodation is especially required for the many convalescent children who must be detained in hospital during the necessary period of isolation.

The laboratory consists of a two-storied building, in which are situated the main working laboratory, inoculating rooms, director's laboratory, assistant's laboratory, museum, library, &c. Adjacent to the main building is a large students' laboratory and lecture hall, with a basement beneath, in which are ice chests and a photomicrographic room.

The accommodation for laboratory animals is very convenient, and the animals are healthy and well cared for.

A large veterinary experimental block, with loose boxes, pens, and an operating room, is situated about 100 yds. away, near the north boundary of the hospital grounds. In this, horses, sheep, &c., can be kept under observation.

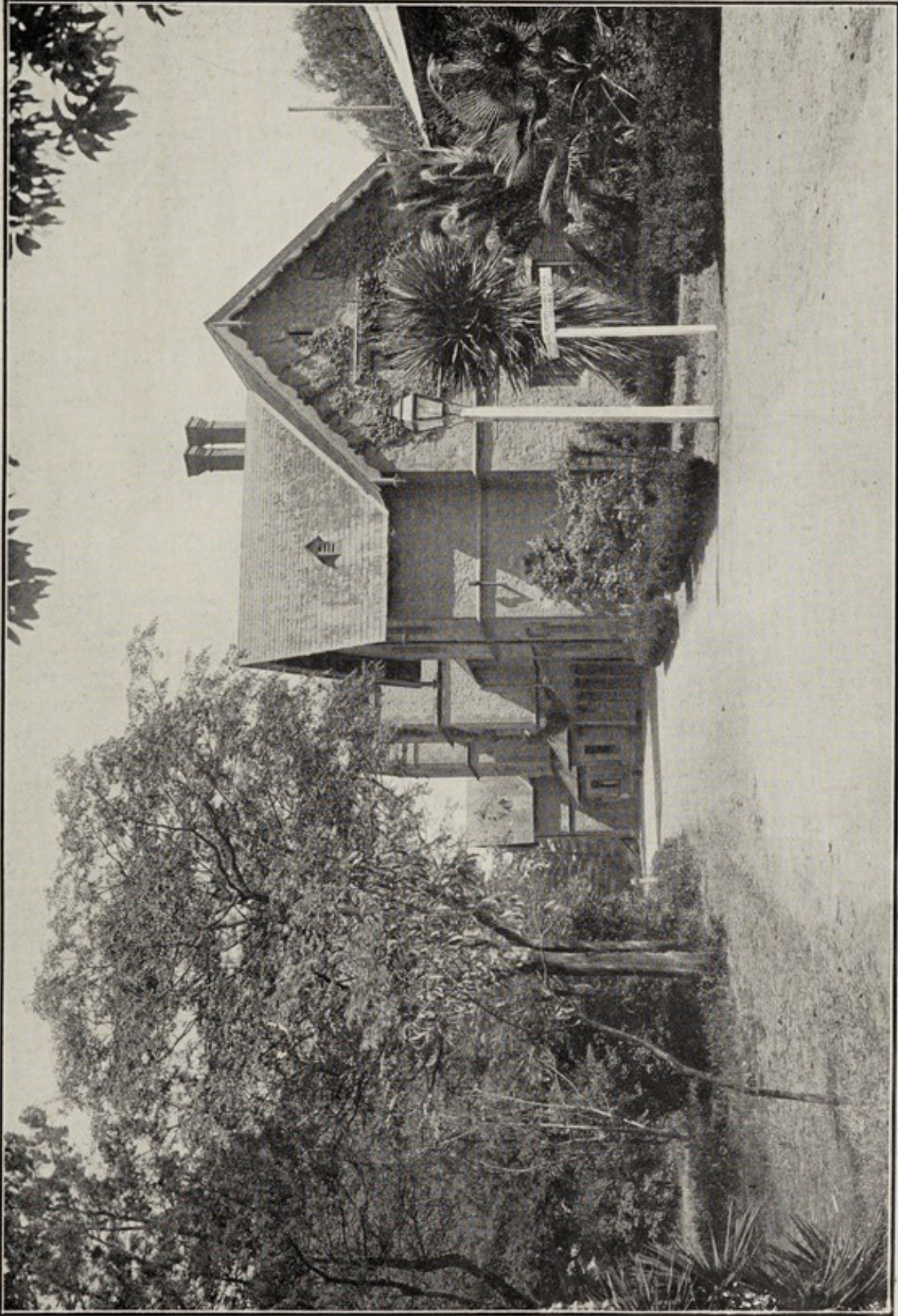

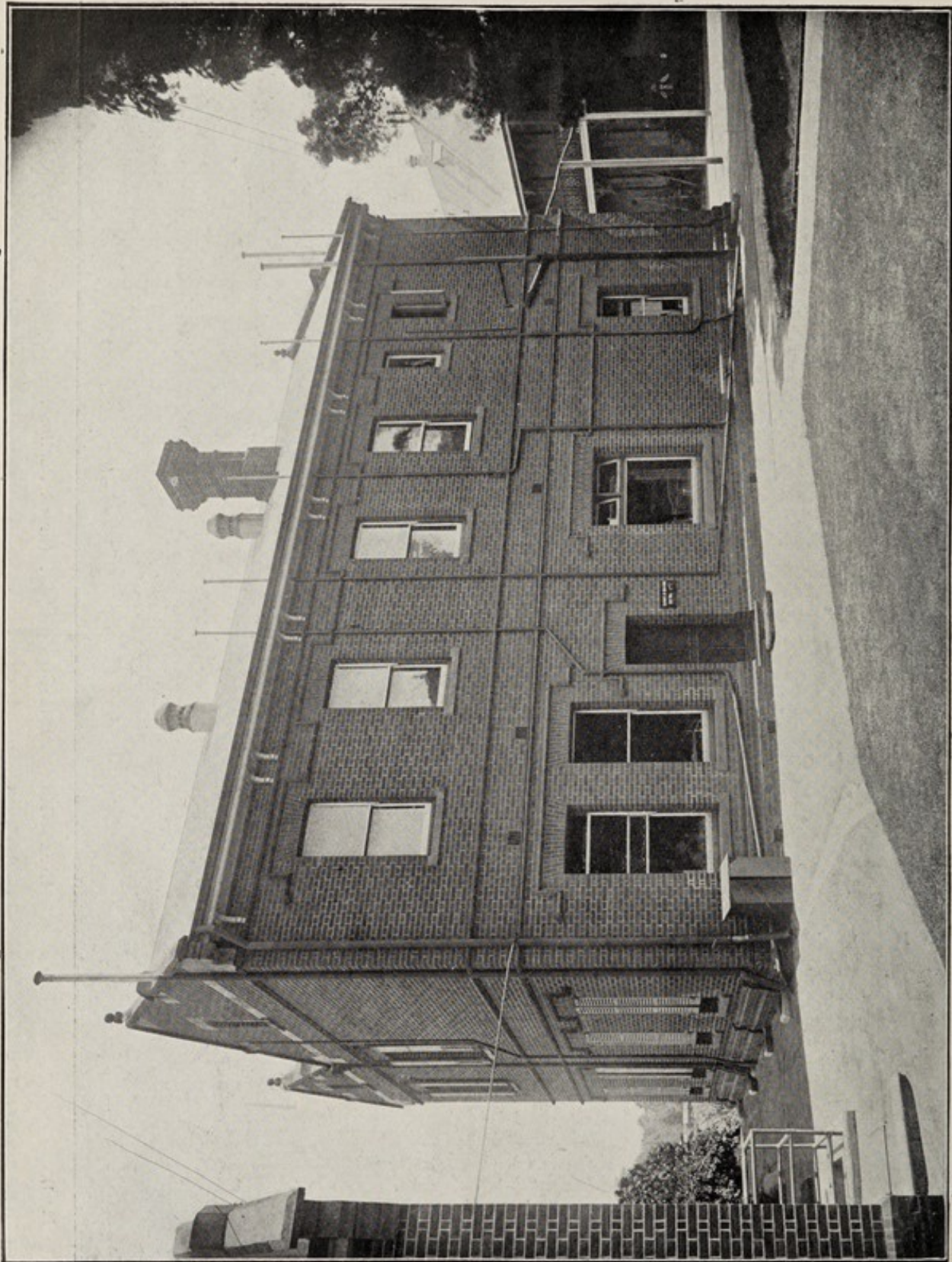

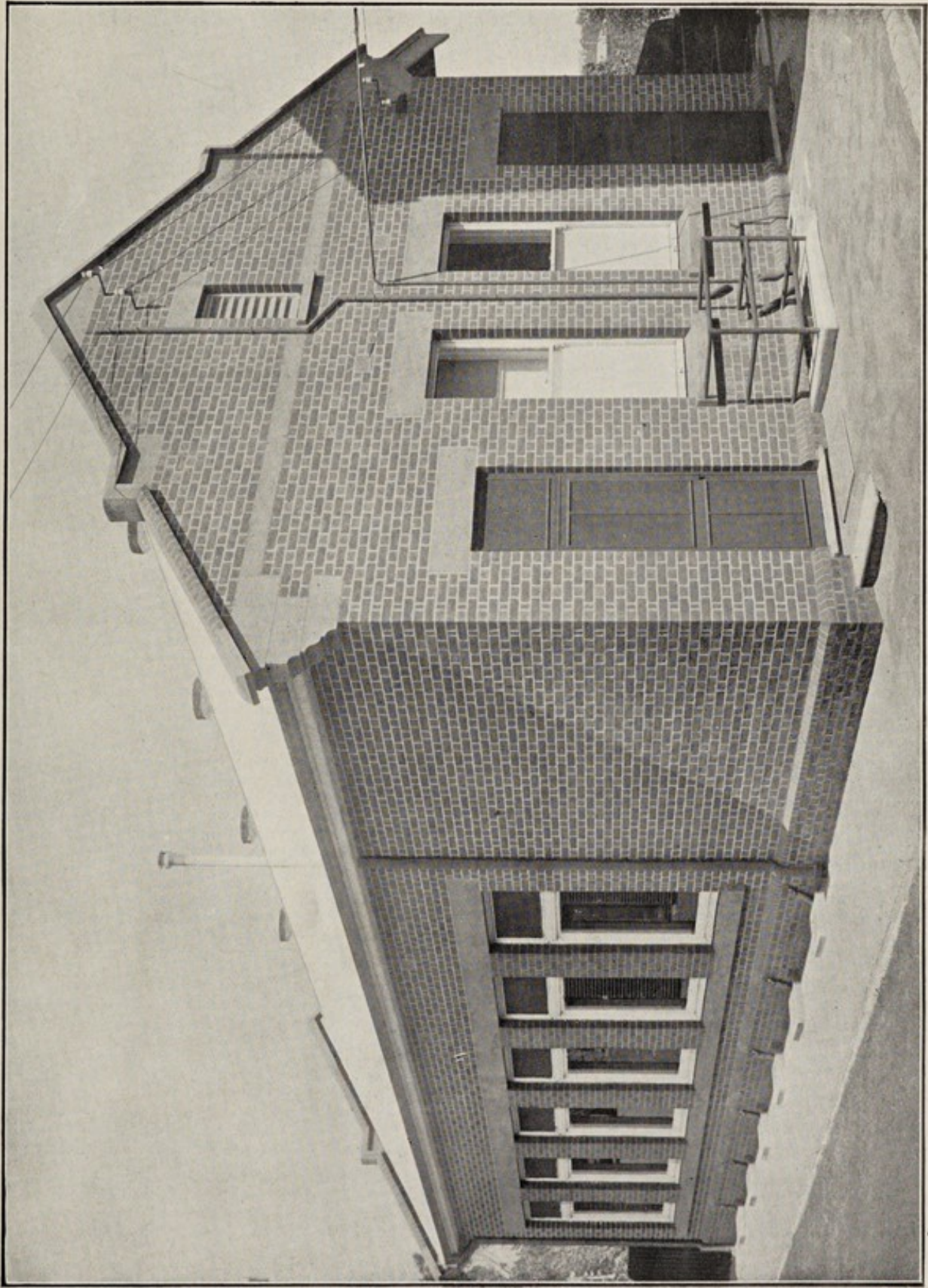

The Clinical Pathological Examinations performed for the Adelaide Hospital include:—(1) The histological diagnosis of pathological tissues, several of which were immediate examinations performed during operation (such examinations are done in order to help the surgeon in determining the extent and nature of the operation necessary); (2) The examination of urine to detect abnormal chemical and morphological elements; (3) The examination of faeces to detect the presence of abnormal elements; (4) The examination of cerebro-spinal fluid to detect cellular and chemical change (this examination is extremely useful in detecting syphilis of the central nervous system); (5) The examination of blood to detect the presence of the various anemias and leukæmias; (6) The examination of material for the detection of *Spirochaeta pallida* in the diagnosis of syphilis; (7) The examination of fluids from various cavities and cysts to determine their nature; (8) The examination of blood for the estimation of glucose, urea, proteins, &c. (These examinations are conducted by the Honorary Biochemist and the Assistant Biochemist.)

The Bacteriological Examinations performed for the Adelaide Hospital include:—(1) The examination of sputum for the detection of tubercle bacilli and other bacteria, and also for hydatid hooklets; (2) The examination of blood for the Widal reaction (this examination is important in assisting in the diagnosis of typhoid fever); (3) The examination of swabs taken from the throat and nose to detect the presence of diphtheria bacilli; (4) The examination of urine to detect the presence of tubercle bacilli, colon bacilli, and other bacteria; (5) The examination of inflammatory fluids for the detection of bacteria, e.g., pleuritic fluid for tubercle bacilli; (6) The examination of cerebro-spinal fluid to detect the presence of tubercle bacilli, meningococci, and other bacteria; (7) The cultural examination of blood to detect the presence of bacteria in the circulation; (8) The examination of faeces and urine for the detection of typhoid bacilli and other pathogenic bacteria; (9) The examination of pus for the detection of gonococci, actinomyces, and other bacteria. Bacteria, isolated from the various fluids and materials, are often used in the preparation of autogenous vaccines.

The Wassermann Reaction was performed on Thursday in each week. This reaction is of great value in the diagnosis and treatment of syphilis. There is a general increase in the number of examinations made over those made during 1919. More than twice the number of tests were made for private practitioners than in the previous year.

The examinations performed and classified under the head *Private Work* include in the main such examinations as described under clinical pathological examinations and bacteriological examinations. Much work was done for the various Boards of Health. Included in the examinations are also:—(1) Examination of various foodstuffs for the detection of bacterial contamination; (2) Examination of drinking water to determine its suitability for drinking purposes. Included under this head is a

special investigation carried out for the Adelaide Local Board of Health. The object of this investigation is to determine at regular intervals the bacterial content of the water as delivered from the Adelaide waterworks main. This investigation is being continued. (3) The examination of disinfectants to determine their germicidal power. During the year 632 examinations of all kinds were made for the No. 7, A.G.H., Keswick. By special arrangement this work was undertaken for the Defence Department free of cost, this department receiving the services of Miss Dunn.

The routine examinations made for the *Stock Department* include—(1) bacteriological examination of cow's milk, particularly for the detection of tubercle bacilli; (2) ear from horse for the detection of anthrax bacilli; and (3) morbid tissues for histopathological examination.

The investigation into a braxy-like disease of lambs was continued, and on one farm 33 lambs out of a lot of 72 were given a prophylactic inoculation of a bacillus isolated from cases the previous year.

An investigation was made on a case of "swelled head" in a stud ram, but no conclusions were reached.

The investigation into the cause of "forage poisoning" in horses was continued, and cultural examinations made of the fodder and intestinal contents without any positive results.

An investigation was made into the nature and cause of so-called "coast disease" in sheep from Kangaroo Island. It was definitely shown that the animals were suffering from malnutrition due to the lack of nutritious food and parasitism. One animal placed on nutritious food gradually recovered and returned to a normal condition.

Material from cases of bovine pleuro-pneumonia was collected and cultivations of the filterable virus made. The work in relation to this disease is being continued.

The *Vaccine Department*, as well as preparing 235 separate vaccines, also administered inoculations of vaccines to hospital patients. During the year 100 hospital patients were under treatment. The majority of these patients visited the laboratory twice a week during their course of treatment, when they received their injections. In all 1,037 doses of vaccine were administered. Also 489 doses of tuberculin were given to 20 patients. Vaccines were prepared for 118 patients under the care of private practitioners, and 1,840 doses were supplied for these patients.

The figures show a decided increase in the number of examinations made, compared with those of 1919. This increase is shown in all departments of the work performed. That the work is progressively increasing is shown by comparing the total number of examinations made during the years 1913 and 1920, viz., 5,960 and 11,901 respectively. The manipulations required in conducting the work are becoming from year to year more complex. Extra qualified assistance is called for to meet this increase in the quantity and complexity of the work.

During the year accommodation was provided for the Pathology Department, Adelaide University.
