### EXTRACTS FROM RULES AND REGULATIONS.

### PATIENTS.

### Privileges of Contributors.

21. In-patients.—Subject to regulations pertaining to admission of patients, every contributor of  $\pounds 2$  annually shall have the privilege of recommending one indoor patient in the year; of  $\pounds 5$  annually, three indoor patients in the year; of  $\pounds 10$  annually, the privilege of having always one patient in the hospital.

22. Out-patients.—Subject to rules pertaining to out-patients, contributors of £2 annually shall also have the privilege of recommending six outdoor patients for relief from the dispensary; contributors of £5, 12 patients; contributors of £10, 15 patients: Provided that such recommendations shall only be issued by the contributors to persons who cannot pay for medical treatment elsewhere.

23. Life contributors of  $\pounds 20$  or more shall have the privileges set out in regulations 21 and 22 estimated as if their annual contribution had been one-tenth of their actual contribution.

24. It shall be optional for contributors to have indoor order forms supplied in lieu of outdoor forms at the rate of one of the former for six of the latter.

25. Recommendations shall only be given to persons who, on account of their straitened circumstances, are proper subjects for hospital treatment.

### Admission of Palients.

26. Responsible relatives of or applicants for admission themselves shall furnish particulars of their financial position and make a declaration, on a form supplied for that purpose, to the effect that they are unable to pay for medical treatment and stating whether the applicant is entitled to medical attendance from any benefit society or lodge: Provided that the Board shall have power to refuse admission to any applicant or to charge the cost of maintenance of the applicant in hospital either to the applicant or his responsible relative or guardian.

28. Notwithstanding the provisions of regulation 26, in cases of severe accidents and of emergency, patients may be admitted at all times by the Resident Medical Officer on duty.

29. No infectious case, or suspected infectious case (other than enteric fever or tuberculosis), or children under 10 years of age, or any infant (on account of the condition of the mother) shall be admitted to the hospital proper except with the consent of the Medical Superintendent, who may admit such patient or child in any case where the life of the patient or of the child would be endangered by his refusal to do so. Cases of infectious diseases, except as provided above, shall be admitted to the Infectious Diseases Block of the Adelaide Hospital.

30. No patient who can be treated at the Out-Patients' Department, or who is obviously incurable, shall be admitted.

31. It shall be the duty of the honorary medical officer concerned to discharge a patient when his treatment is completed except as provided for under the regulations for the Medical Superintendent.

35. The hours for patients to present their recommendations for admission shall be from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., except in cases of emergency or accident.

### Admission of Patients on Payment of Fees for Maintenance.

42. Persons seeking admission whose means will not enable them in any other way to procure such medical attendance as their cases may require may be admitted into the institution upon payment of maintenance fees, not exceeding the rate of 10s. per diem, and upon the patient or a responsible person entering into an agreement with the Lay Superintendent undertaking the payment during the time the patient remains in the institution.

43. Every person admitted for treatment at the hospital who has made a declaration or statement in writing that he is unable to pay for medical advice and that he is not entitled to any benefit from any lodge, shall, nevertheless, be liable to pay to the Board a sum not exceeding 10s. for each day during which he receives medical attendance at or from the hospital.

### Visitors to Patients.

44. Subject to regulations hereinafter contained, relations and friends desirous of visiting patients may be admitted to the institution (by tickets only to be procured in the wards) for that purpose on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Sundays between the hours of 2 p.m. and 4 p.m., and shall leave the wards punctually at the latter hour.

45. Not more than two visitors to each patient shall be allowed on any one day unless with the permission of the medical officer in charge of the case.

46. Exceptions to regulations 44 and 45 shall only be allowed by special permission of the Resident Medical Officer or Medical Superintendent in favor of relations or friends of patients in a dangerous state or to Jews on their Sabbath.

47. Near relatives and visiting members of friendly societies may be permitted to visit a patient in the evening between the hours of 7.30 p.m. and 8.30 p.m., provided they possess a night visitor's card signed by the Medical Superintendent. Such cards of admission shall be issued only to those visitors who, on account of their employment, or some other good cause, are not able to attend during the day time. The cards must be presented for inspection to the gatekeeper and the nurse in charge of the respective wards.

48. No person shall directly give to a patient any food, drinks, or refreshment of any kind whatsoever. All parcels shall be handed to the nurse in charge, who shall inspect them and obtain the approval of the Resident Medical Officer before handing them to the patients.

### RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION.

49. Patients shall be at liberty to receive the visits of ministers of the religious denominations to which they respectively belong, and a card indicating the professed religion of the patient shall be placed over the bed on admission. Ministers, however, shall not be allowed to remain in the wards during the professional visits of the medical officers without permission.

50. Ministers of religion and other persons visiting the hospital shall not interfere with the repose and quiet of patients.

51. Fublic religious services shall not be held in the wards of the hospital.

52. A room in the hospital shall, when practicable, be available for public worship by the convalescent patients of each religious persuasion.

### ANNUAL REPORT, 1924.

The Board of Management of the Adelaide Hospital, in accordance with section 12 (1) of the Hospitals Amendment Act, 1921, has the honor to submit for the information of the Minister the fifty-fifth Annual Report on the condition and progress of the institution for the year ended December 31st, 1924.

The Board held 62 formal meetings, in addition to which frequent visits and inspections were made by the individual members.

### FINANCE ...

*Revenue.*—The total receipts from all sources, and including all branches of the Hospital, for the year 1924 was £19,094 19s. 2d., as compared with £15,548 16s. 2d. for the year 1923, an increase of £3,546 3s.

Details of revenue for 1924 will be found in Appendix No. 2.

The amount of patients' fees for the Adelaide Hospital and the Consumptive Home show a satisfactory increase—the revenue for 1924 from this source being £2,128 1s. 10d. in excess of the amount received for 1923, or an increase of 30 per cent.

The amount received from patients' fees, Adelaide Hospital, during 1924, exceeded the amount received for 1923 by  $\pounds 2,027$  9s. 4d., an increase of 33.9 per cent., whilst the amount received for 1924 exceeded that received for 1921 by  $\pounds 4,376$  2s. 6d., or an increase of 204.4 per cent.

Patients' fees for the Infectious Diseases Block were £464 12s. 8d. in excess of the fees for the previous year.

The Dental Branch shows an increase in revenue of £574 8s. over the previous year. Fifty-nine per cent. of the amount of the total expenditure of the Dental branch was recouped to revenue fees.

Laboratory fees were £373 2s. 9d. more than the amount received during 1923, the total revenue being approximately 66 per cent. of the total expenditure for the year.

In Appendix No. 2 will be found a comparison table showing the revenue received for the years 1921-1924.

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*Expenditure.*—The total expenditure for all branches of the Hospital for the year 1924 was  $\pounds 90,578$  15s. 10d., as against  $\pounds 84,044$  14s. 3d., an increase of  $\pounds 6,534$  1s. 7d. for 1924 over the expenditure for 1923. Of this increase, salaries and wages account for  $\pounds 2,792$  11s. 7d., while contingencies show an increase of  $\pounds 3,741$  10s. The increase in contingencies is principally accounted for as follows:—

- X-ray Department, £1,372 increase; new apparatus installed. Electric supply, £750 increase; electric light installed in place of gas.
- Provisions, &c., £1,168 increase; increase in number of
  patients treated, 729 over previous year; increase in daily average, 25 over last year.

### POPULATION.

The daily average number of indoor patients in the Hospital during the year was 419, as compared with 394 for the previous year.

The total number of patients admitted to the Hospital was 6,792, being 670 more than the number admitted during 1923.

The number of new patients attending the Out-patients' Department was 4,971, and the total number of attendances of out-patients during the year was 21,049.

In the Consumptive Home the daily average resident was 67, and in the Infectious Diseases Block, 24.

### RENOVATIONS AND IMPROVEMENTS.

Extension of Casualty Room.—The present casualty room is totally inadequate for the reception of cases generally, and more particularly for the reception and treatment of a number of emergency cases at one time. The Board has recommended that immediate action be taken for the conversion of the present dispensary into an extension of the present casualty room. Plans are being prepared, and it is anticipated that a start will shortly be made with this work. Accommodation for a dispensary will be provided by the conversion of the present housemaids' kitchen for that purpose.

Balconies on Western Wing.—The Commissioners of Charitable Funds have agreed to pay interest on a further expenditure of  $\pounds 3,000$ , making a total of  $\pounds 14,000$  on account of improvements to the Adelaide Hospital. The additional expenditure will permit the additions of balconies and verandahs across the northern ends of Wyatt and Leopold Wards, with the necessary ward adjuncts, which had previously been desired, but omitted from the improvement scheme on account of cost of same, and the lesser degree of urgency.

Furnishings and Renovations.—The work in connection with renovation and re-furnishing of the old wards has been continued during the year, and the following wards completed—Adelaide, Allert, Victoria, and Alexandra.

New additional ward pantries with modern fittings and sterilizing facilities have been provided and the old ward pantries renovated and modernised. New sanitary annexes have also been provided with the necessary modern fittings; lavatory basins with hot and cold water installed in the wards. Modern metal and other suitable hospital furnishings have also been installed.

Heating of Meals.—Recommendations have been made for the provision of improved apparatus for heating meals.

### SHORTAGE OF ACCOMMODATION.

Owing to the shortage of accommodation for patients, arrangements were made for the transfer to the Magill Home of chronic cases up to the number of 50, thus, to some extent relieving (temporarily) the pressure on Hospital accommodation.

### BUILDING ADDITIONS.

The Bice Building.—The foundation stone of the Bice Building was laid on August 8th, 1924. The ceremony was performed by the Hon. the Chief Secretary (Hon. J. Jelley, M.L.C.).

The construction of this building is being proceeded with, but better progress will apparently be necessary if the building is to be completed within the specified contract time.

### THE BOILER HOUSE.

The boiler house and installation of boilers, &c., was completed, but not yet put into commission on account of the non-completion of the new laundry, &c., which is now well in hand.

### NEW KITCHEN AND STORES BLOCK.

A new kitchen (temporary) constructed of wood and iron has been erected on vacant land adjoining DaCosta ward. It is anticipated that the building of the new kitchen and stores block, plans for which have been approved, will be commenced during the coming year.

### RADIUM.

Through the efforts of the Lord Mayor of Adelaide (Mr. C. R. J. Glover), the balance of the funds of the Citizens Committee British Naval Visit, viz., £1,370, was set aside for the purchase of radium and accessories.

The addition of radium will be of considerable advantage in the treatment of patients, and the provision of the necessary funds is very much appreciated by the Board.

### MEDICAL RECORDS.

The new system of keeping the medical records of the Hospital as instituted last year is being carried out under the supervision of a medical and surgical registrar. It is pointed out that a complete record system on the lines existing in modern hospitals cannot be fully achieved until the appointment of a second registrar.

The Board trusts that provision will be made for the salary of the second registrar.

The University Council is providing one half the salary of the present registrar, and is willing to provide a similar sum towards the salary of the second registrar.

### FIRE PRECAUTIONS.

The Metropolitan Fire Brigade makes regular inspections of all fire appliances and hydrants. Monthly reports and recommendations are made.

The Board expresses its appreciation of the assistance and advice rendered.

### REGULATIONS.

The new regulations drawn up by the Board for the management of the Hospital and its branches were approved in Executive Council on August 28th, 1924, and have been in operation since that date.

### OFFICIAL VISITORS.

The undermentioned were re-appointed by the Government as official visitors to the institution :-Lady Hackett Moulden, Mesdames M. Wallington and E. A. Wilson, Mr. F. B. H. Vincent.

Mr. T. P. Howard was appointed to the vacancy caused by the retirement of Mr. F. W. Young. Mrs. E. A. Wilson was granted 12 months leave of absence to go abroad.

The Board and the Official Visitors have met together on several occasions and discussed Hospital matters generally, and their assistance is appreciated.

### APPOINTMENTS.

The following Honorary Medical Officers were appointed during the year :---

The undermentioned were re-appointed :-Dr. P. Ray Newling, Messrs. A. P. R. Moore and F. M. Swan. The following honorary Dental Surgeons were also appointed :--Drs. A. S. Randall, H. C. D. Taunton ; Messrs. J. L. Eustace, L. S. Rogers and H. Gill Williams.

### ADVISORY COMMITTEE.

The Board expresses its appreciation of the advice received during the year from the Advisory Committee appointed under section 14 of the Hospitals Amendment Act, 1921.

### OPTICAL REQUIREMENTS.

To ensure deserving patients being supplied with spectacles, etc., prescribed by the honoraries, at reasonable cost, tenders were called, and a contract was entered into with Mr. H. Morris, optician, for 12 months.

### GOLD MEDALISTS.

The following, who passed first-class in examinations during probationership, were awarded gold medals:—Nurses M. S. Barry, E. F. Playford, N. G. Donnell.

### OBITUARY.

The late Dr. R. E. Harrold, Honorary Dermatologist. The Board desires to place on record its appreciation of the long and valuable services rendered by Dr. Harrold as an honorary officer.

### MEDICAL STUDENTS IN RESIDENCE.

Satisfactory arrangements were made for two medical students to reside on the premises and to act as dressers under the direction of the Medical Superintendent. Students resident is an innovation as far as the Adelaide Hospital is concerned, but is in accord with the practice in other large hospitals. The Board hopes to be in a position to increase the number resident when accommodation is available.

The News.—Its efforts in connection with Flower Day, which resulted in a profusion of beautiful flowers at the various branches of the Institution, and its activity connected with the Hospital Day Appeal, by which the institution benefited to the extent of £850, largely as a result of the Charity Football Carnival fixture.

### HOSPITAL AUXILIARY.

A Hospital Auxiliary, composed of lady volunteer workers, has been formed in connection with the Adelaide Hospital. Its objects include the provision of additional comforts for patients to those already supplied in a public institution, and the raising of funds (assisted by Government subsidy) for the establishment of a maternity ward as part of the Hospital.

As a result of the labor of the auxiliary workers, the wards are being completely equipped with bed linen, patients' garments, &c., the material for which is purchased from private funds.

The auxiliary has also established a temporary kiosk in the grounds of the Hospital, to enable friends of patients to purchase refreshments and extra comforts for the sick.

The kiosk will prove a boon to both in and out patients, in addition to which any profits made and expended on linen will be subsidised by the Government.

The Board very much appreciates the voluntary efforts of these ladies.

A donation of £2,500 was made by the executors from the estate of the late Miss A. F. Keith-Sheridan towards the cost of the erection of a permanent kiosk on the hospital grounds, the plans and site for which were approved by the Board. The kiosk will be used by the ladies of the Adelaide Hospital Auxiliary in place of the present temporary structure.

### ELECTRICAL CARDIOGRAPH.

A sum of £600 for the purchase of an electrical cardiograph was also received from the executors of the joint estates of Miss A. F. Keith-Sheridan and Mrs. A. M. Simpson.

The Board expresses its sincere appreciation to the donors.

CONSUMPTIVE HOME AND INFECTIOUS DISEASES BLOCK.

The question of removal from its position on North Terrace to a site outside the city boundary has had the serious consideration of the present board since its appointment, and on several occasions recommendations have been made for its removal.


It is considered if a new Consumptive home is not proceeded with at an early date, considerable expenditure will be necessary for improvements to the existing buildings.

### STAFF.

The following additional staff was engaged during 1924 :--

One temporary Dental Surgeon (half time) for four months. One temporary Dental Mechanic for six months.

Senior Dental Mechanic, Mr. C. E. Joyner, resigned, and

M.r. L. A. M. Brougham was appointed as from September 1st.

#### HONORARY OFFICERS.

The number of Honorary Dental Surgeons was increased to ten, as from July 1st, 1924.

New Appointments.—Drs. A. S. Randell and H. C. D. Taunton, A.essrs. H. Gill Williams, L. S. Rogers, and J. L. Eustace.

There were 233 attendances of Honorary Officers, of which 122 were by the Honorary Anæsthetists.

#### LIBRARY AND MUSEUM.

Considerable progress has been made during the year. The Melbourne College of Dentistry and the dentists of Adelaide are to be thanked for the generous contributions of books, periodicals, and specimens. The State Dental Society's Library and Museum is now housed in this Department, and the members of that society have access to the library at all times.

#### STUDENTS.

Students attending the practice of the Department were as follows:—First year, five; second year, nine; third year, two; fourth year, five; unclassified, one for six months and four for two months.

Students, during 1924, did not attend compulsorily during the University vacations as hitherto, and they also ceased to attend during the third term as soon as they had fulfilled the University requirements.

It was found that full advantage was taken of these new regulations, and, in consequence, clinical work accomplished per student correspondingly diminished, as compared with the previous year.

#### EQUIPMENT.

Structural alteration to the Conservation Surgery was made in order to accomodate the classes in Operative Technique. New equipment has been installed to the value of £86.

### TREATMENT EXECUTED.

(Details are contained in the Appendices). The outstanding features are—

- 1. Increased treatment executed in all sections.
- 2. Continued inability of the Department to cope with the treatment applied for.
- 3. Establishment of a Library and a Museum.
- 4. Greater number of In-door patients treated.
- 5. Increased revenue, viz., £574 8s.
- 6. Introduction of nitrous oxide and somnoform for the greater number of cases requiring anæsthetics.


Seven hundred and forty-four patients were deferred for periods up to three months.


Six hundred and forty-two persons remained undischarged at December 31st, 1924.

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## THE CONSUMPTIVES' HOME.

Within the home are rooms set apart for library (with hundreds of books, periodicals, and magazines), smoking, billiards (full-sized table), billatelle, and other games. A piano and organ are also provided, in fact everything is done to give the patients all the comforts of a good home, together with the best medical and nursing skill procurable. There are 23 cubicles, three rooms for two patients each, one ward for eight patients, one ward for nine patients, one large bungalow for 12 patients, and four tents for one patient each—giving accommodation for 62 patients.

The buildings have verandahs on both sides, are thoroughly ventilated, the walls and ceilings are varnished and the floors covered with linoleum.

Provision is also made for the treatment of cancer cases, there being 14 single bedrooms devoted to this purpose.

The majority of cases pass through the Consultation room, or are transferred from the wards of the General Hospital.

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## INFECTIOUS DISEASES BLOCK.

The number of new cases admitted to the block (475) shows a falling off of 47 cases as compared with the previous year.

The deaths totalled 24, a mortality rate of 5.05 per cent.

The decrease was mainly shown in the cases of measles; 87 cases treated in 1923, and 24 in 1924.

The diphtheria cases were two less than the previous year; 109 cases treated in 1923, and 107 in 1924. There were six deaths, being a mortality rate of 5.6 per cent.

There were 189 cases of scarlatina treated in 1923, as against 172 in 1924. There were three deaths, the mortality rate being 1.7 per cent.

There is accommodation for 144 patients.

The Pathological Examinations performed for Clinical Adelaide Hospital include :---(1) The histological the diagnosis of pathological tissues, several of which were immediate examinations performed during operations (such examinations are done in order to help the surgeon in determining the extent and nature of the operation necessary); (2) the examination of urine to detect abnormal chemical and morphological elements; (3) the examination of faces to detect the presence of abnormal elements; (4) the examination of cerebro-spinal fluid to detect cellular and chemical change (this examination is extremely useful in detecting syphilis of the central nervous system); (5) the examination of the blood to detect the presence of the various anæmias and leukæmias : (6) the examination of material for the detection of spirochata pallida in the diagnosis of syphilis; (7) the examination of fluids from various cavities and cysts to determine their nature; (8) the examination of blood for the estimation of glucose, urea, proteins, &c.; (9) the examination of gastric contents after a test meal-189 of these tests were made, 162 of them being fractional test meals.

The Bacteriological Examinations performed for the Adelaide Hospital include :--(1) The examination of sputum for the detection of tubercle bacilli and other bacteria, and also for hydatid hooklets; (2) the examination of blood for the Widal reaction (this examination is important in assisting in the diagnosis of typhoid fever); (3) the examination of swabs taken from the throat and nose to detect the presence of diphtheria bacilli; (4) the examination of urine to detect the presence of tubercle bacilli, colon bacilli, and other bacteria; (5) the examination of inflammatory fluids for the detection of bacteria. e.g., pleuritic fluid for tubercle bacilli; (6) the examination of cerebro-spinal fluid to detect the presence of tubercle bacilli, meningococci, and other bacteria; (7) the cultural examination of blood to detect the presence of bacteria in the circulation ; (8) the examination of fæces and urine for the detection of typhoid bacilli and other pathogenic bacteria; (9) the examination of pus for the detection of gonococci, actinomyces, and other bacteria. Bacteria isolated from the various fluids and materials are often used in the preparation of autogenous vaccines.

The Wassermann Reaction was performed on Thursday in each week. This reaction is of great value in the diagnosis and treatment of syphilis. The Griffith and Scott technique is employed throughout.

The examinations performed and classified under the head *Private Work* include in the main such examinations as described under clinical pathological examinations and bacteriological examinations. Much work was done for the Board of Health. Included in the examinations are also :—(1) Examination of various foodstuffs for the detection of bacterial contamination; (2) examination of drinking water to determine its suitability for drinking purposes. Included under this head is a special investigation carried out for the Adelaide Local Board of Health. The object of this investigation is to determine at regular intervals the bacterial content of the water as delivered from the Adelaide waterworks main. This investigation is being continued. (3) The examination of disinfectants to determine their germicidal power.

The routine examinations for the Stock Departme t include :— (1) Bacteriological examination of cow's milk for the detection of tubercle bacilli and other bacteria; (2) examination of fæces for the detection of helminth and protozoan infection; (3) bloods for the agglutination test against *B. abortus*; (4) morbid tissues for histopathological examination; (5) material for the detection of anthrax bacilli, actinomyces, and *B. abortus*; (6) specimens removed *post-mortem* from animals dying from various causes, &c.

Investigations were carried out in connection with diarrhoea in lambs and other sheep diseases of unknown origin. Outbreaks of forage poisoning in horses were investigated, and toxin-forming bacteria of the botulinus group were demonstrated.

The Vaccine Department, as well as preparing 330 separate vaccines, also administered inoculations of vaccine to hospital patients. During the year 227 hospital patients were under The majority of these patients visited treatment. the laboratory twice a week during their course of treatment, when they received their injections. In all, 2,525 doses of vaccine were administered. Also 773 doses of tuberculin were given to 38 patients. Vaccines were prepared for 220 patients under the care of private practitioners, and 2,417 doses (including 31 doses of tuberculin and 100 doses of T.A.B.) were supplied for these patients. In addition to this, 248cc. of vaccine were supplied in bulk to private practitioners, and 3.049 cc. of typhoid vaccine were supplied to a public institution for use as an antityphoid inoculation.

The work of the *Bio-Chemical Branch* has increased very much. During the year 1922 there were 207 bio-chemical examinations made. These increased to 821 in 1923 and further to 1,535 in 1924. The increase is mainly due to the larger number of examinations made for hospital patients; those done for private practitioners remaining at the same figure as for 1923. Summary.—The figures show, approximately, the same number of examinations made as during 1923. There is a general increase of 860 examinations. This is mainly due to the increase in the number of bio-chemical examinations made for hospital patients. It is remarkable that the figures should be so closely approximate during the last three years. It probably indicates that under present conditions these figures can be taken as normal.

## VENEREAL DISEASES .- NIGHT CLINICS.

### EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT FOR YEAR ENDING SEPTEMBER 30rH, 1924.

Improved accommodation for the treatment of venereal diseases is urgently necessary.

The Venereal Diseases Act, passed by Parliament in 1920, has not yet been proclaimed. The provisions of the Act could not be effectively carried out until accommodation for the treatment of both indoor and outdoor patients is provided.

It is considered that this Act should be proclaimed as soon as possible, but failing such action in the near future, improved accommodation and facilities for treating patients are necessary at the existing clinic.

# REPORT OF OPERATIONS FOR THE YEAR ENDING SEPTEMBER 30TH, 1924.

#### Male Section.

### Surgeon-DR. G. H. BURNELL, B.S., M.D.

The total number of patients for the year was 350, and the total number of attendances was 6,763. There were 106 cases of syphilis and 221 cases of gonorrhœa treated. Included in the above were 11 persons who had both gonorrhœa and syphilis, and 12 patients attended on account of diseases which were shown to be other than venereal.

#### Female Section.

#### Surgeon-DR. H. RISCHBIETH, M.D., F.R.C.S.

Dr. Rischbieth was granted 12 months' leave of absence from July 1st, 1924, and was succeeded by Dr. G. H. Burnell.

The total number of patients for the year was 83, and the number of attendances was 902. There were 52 cases of syphilis, and 22 of gonorrhœa treated.

Included in the above were four patients who had both gonorrhœa and syphilis, and thirteen patients attended for diseases which on examination were found to be non-venereal.
