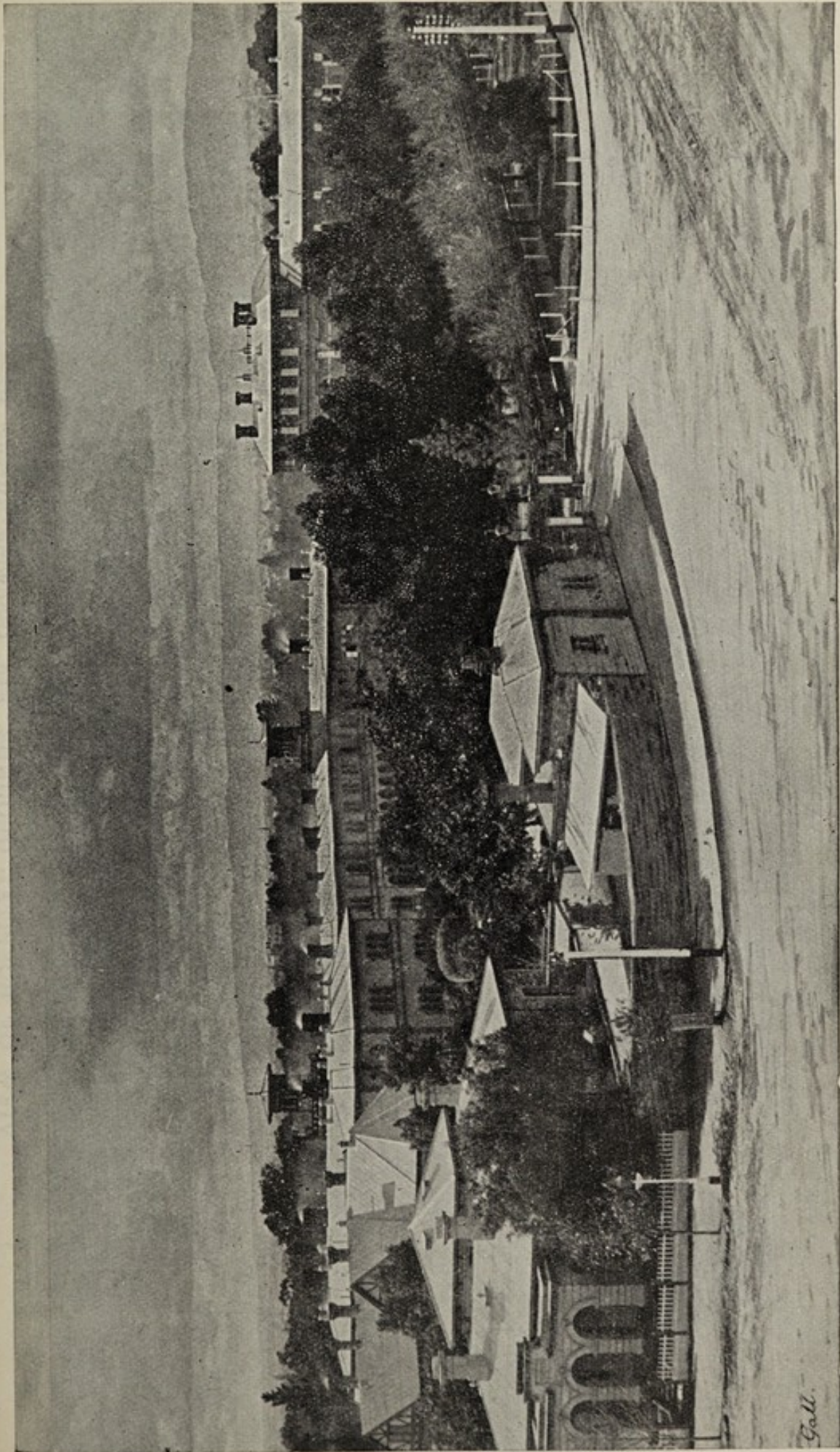

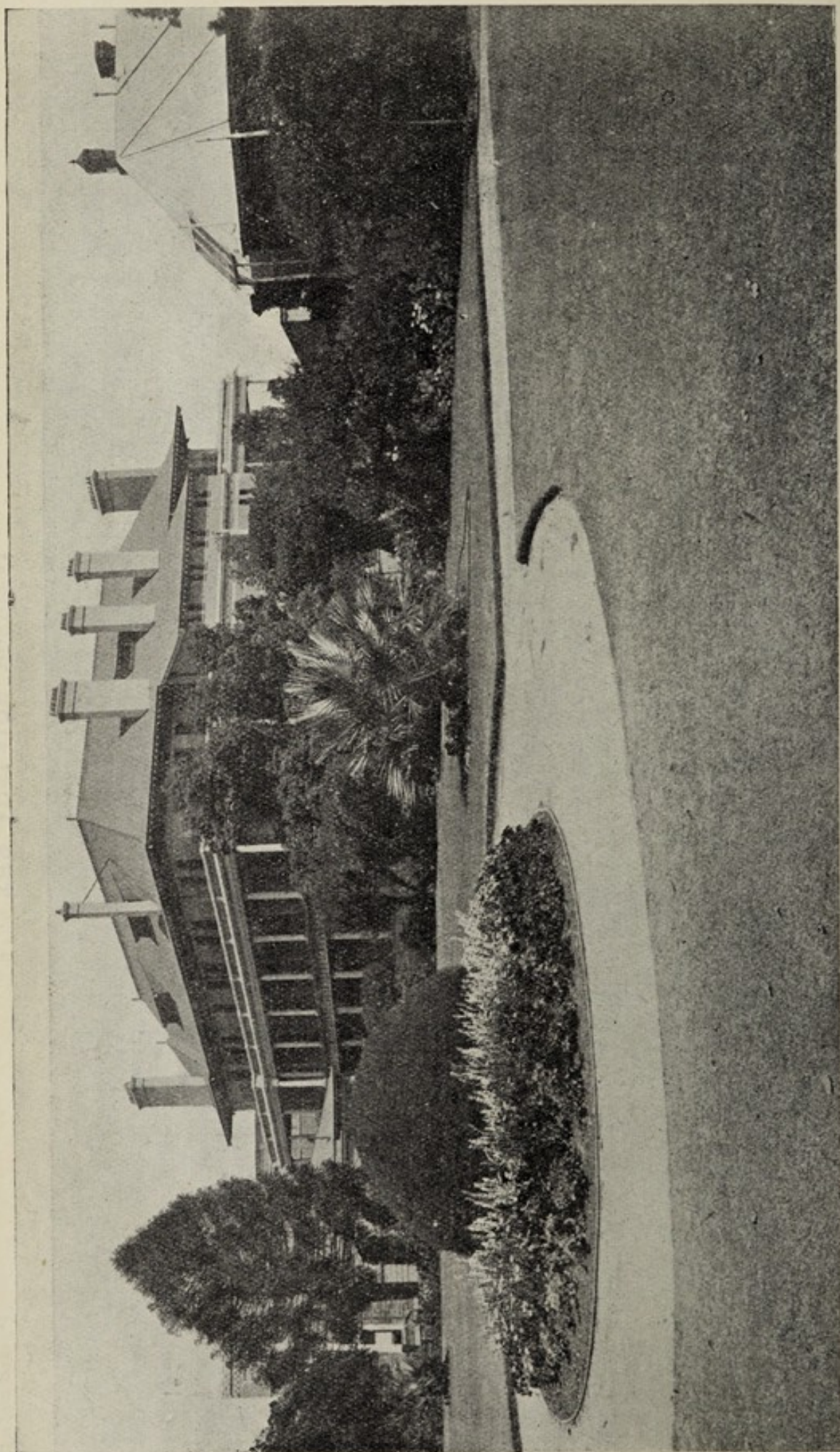

## EXTRACTS FROM RULES AND REGULATIONS.

### PATIENTS.

#### *Privileges of Contributors.*

21. In-patients.—Subject to regulations pertaining to admission of patients, every contributor of £2 annually shall have the privilege of recommending one indoor patient in the year; of £5 annually, three indoor patients in the year; of £10 annually, the privilege of having always one patient in the hospital.

22. Out-patients.—Subject to rules pertaining to out-patients, contributors of £2 annually shall also have the privilege of recommending six outdoor patients for relief from the dispensary; contributors of £5, 12 patients; contributors of £10, 15 patients: Provided that such recommendations shall only be issued by the contributors to persons who cannot pay for medical treatment elsewhere.

23. Life contributors of £20 or more shall have the privileges set out in regulations 21 and 22 estimated as if their annual contribution had been one-tenth of their actual contribution.

24. It shall be optional for contributors to have indoor order forms supplied in lieu of outdoor forms at the rate of one of the former for six of the latter.

25. Recommendations shall only be given to persons who, on account of their straitened circumstances, are proper subjects for hospital treatment.

#### *Admission of Patients.*

26. Responsible relatives of or applicants for admission themselves shall furnish particulars of their financial position and make a declaration, on a form supplied for that purpose, to the effect that they are unable to pay for medical treatment and stating whether the applicant is entitled to medical attendance from any benefit society or lodge: Provided that the Board shall have power to refuse admission to any applicant or to charge the cost of maintenance of the applicant in hospital either to the applicant or his responsible relative or guardian.

28. Notwithstanding the provisions of regulation 26, in cases of severe accidents and of emergency, patients may be admitted at all times by the Resident Medical Officer on duty.

29. No infectious case, or suspected infectious case (other than enteric fever or tuberculosis), or children under 10 years of age, or any infant (on account of the condition of the mother) shall be admitted to the hospital proper except with the consent of the Medical Superintendent, who may admit such patient or child in any case where the life of the patient or of the child would be endangered by his refusal to do so. Cases of infectious diseases, except as provided above, shall be admitted to the Infectious Diseases Block of the Adelaide Hospital.

30. No patient who can be treated at the Out-Patients' Department, or who is obviously incurable, shall be admitted.

31. It shall be the duty of the honorary medical officer concerned to discharge a patient when his treatment is completed except as provided for under the regulations for the Medical Superintendent.

35. The hours for patients to present their recommendations for admission shall be from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., except in cases of emergency or accident.



*Admission of Patients on Payment of Fees for Maintenance.*

42. Persons seeking admission whose means will not enable them in any other way to procure such medical attendance as their cases may require may be admitted into the institution upon payment of maintenance fees, not exceeding the rate of 10s. per diem, and upon the patient or a responsible person entering into an agreement with the Lay Superintendent undertaking the payment during the time the patient remains in the institution.

43. Every person admitted for treatment at the hospital who has made a declaration or statement in writing that he is unable to pay for medical advice and that he is not entitled to any benefit from any lodge, shall, nevertheless, be liable to pay to the Board a sum not exceeding 10s. for each day during which he receives medical attendance at or from the hospital.

*Visitors to Patients.*

44. Subject to regulations hereinafter contained, relations and friends desirous of visiting patients may be admitted to the institution (by tickets only to be procured in the wards) for that purpose on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Sundays between the hours of 2 p.m. and 4 p.m., and shall leave the wards punctually at the latter hour.

45. Not more than two visitors to each patient shall be allowed on any one day unless with the permission of the medical officer in charge of the case.

46. Exceptions to regulations 44 and 45 shall only be allowed by special permission of the Resident Medical Officer or Medical Superintendent in favor of relations or friends of patients in a dangerous state or to Jews on their Sabbath.

47. Near relatives and visiting members of friendly societies may be permitted to visit a patient in the evening between the hours of 7.30 p.m. and 8.30 p.m., provided they possess a night visitor's card signed by the Medical Superintendent. Such cards of admission shall be issued only to those visitors who, on account of their employment, or some other good cause, are not able to attend during the day time. The cards must be presented for inspection to the gatekeeper and the nurse in charge of the respective wards.

48. No person shall directly give to a patient any food, drinks, or refreshment of any kind whatsoever. All parcels shall be handed to the nurse in charge, who shall inspect them and obtain the approval of the Resident Medical Officer before handing them to the patients.

## RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION.

49. Patients shall be at liberty to receive the visits of ministers of the religious denominations to which they respectively belong, and a card indicating the professed religion of the patient shall be placed over the bed on admission. Ministers, however, shall not be allowed to remain in the wards during the professional visits of the medical officers without permission.

50. Ministers of religion and other persons visiting the hospital shall not interfere with the repose and quiet of patients.

51. Public religious services shall not be held in the wards of the hospital.

52. A room in the hospital shall, when practicable, be available for public worship by the convalescent patients of each religious persuasion.



## ANNUAL REPORT, 1925.

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The Board of Management of the Adelaide Hospital, in accordance with section 12 (1) of the Hospitals Amendment Act, 1921, has the honor to submit for the information of the Hon. the Minister the fifty-sixth annual report on the administration, showing the condition and progress of the institution for the year ended December 31st, 1925.

The Board has held 62 formal meetings, and, in addition, several conferences with the Adelaide Hospital Advisory Committee and official visitors.

In pursuance of section 6 of the Hospitals Amendment Act, 1921, Mr. C. R. J. Glover retired by effluxion of time on February 28th, 1925. The Board desires to place on record its appreciation of Mr. Glover's work in the interest of the Hospital during his term of office. The personnel of the Board appointed for a further term of three years is as follows:—The Inspector-General of Hospitals (Dr. B. H. Morris), Chairman, Mr. J. Wallace Sandford, Mr. F. W. Iundie.

## FINANCE.

*Revenue.*—The total receipts from all sources, and including all branches of the Hospital, for the year 1925, was £20,907 1s. 8d., as compared with £19,094 19s. 2d. for the year 1924, an increase of £1,812 2s. 6d.

Details of revenue for 1925 will be found in Appendix No. 2.

The amount of patients' fees for the Adelaide Hospital again shows a satisfactory increase, the revenue for 1925 from this source being £1,281 19s. 6d. in excess of the amount received for 1924, or an increase of 16 per cent.

The amount of patients' fees for the Adelaide Hospital for year 1925 was £9,288 8s. 8d., as against £2,630 6s. 8d. for the year 1921, an increase of £6,658 2s. or 253 per cent.



The Dental branch shows an increase in revenue of £486 0s. 9d. over the previous year. Sixty-four per cent. of the amount of the total expenditure of the Dental branch was recouped to revenue fees.

There was a small decrease in the amount of laboratory fees received, the amount received for 1925 being £112 17s. 2d. less than the amount received for 1924. This falling off in revenue was due to the fact that fewer examinations were made for private practitioners, owing to the fact that there are now several other laboratories in South Australia performing the same class of work. Notwithstanding the falling off in this section of the work, the work of the laboratory showed an increase, 300 more examinations being made than for the previous year. A greater number of examinations were carried out for the Adelaide Hospital from which no revenue is derived. The total revenue of this branch was approximately 65 per cent. of the expenditure.

In Appendix No. 2 will be found a comparison table showing the revenue received for the years 1921-1925.

*Expenditure.*—The total expenditure for all branches of the Hospital for the year 1925 was £91,356 10s. 7d., as against £90,578 15s. 10d. for the year 1924, an increase of £777 14s. 9d. over the previous year.

Salaries and wages show an increase of £3,652 15s. 10d., whilst there is a decrease in contingencies of £2,875 1s. 1d.

Details of expenditure will be found in Appendix No. 2.

#### POPULATION.

The daily average number of indoor patients in the Hospital during the year was 401, as compared with 419 for the previous year.

The total number of patients admitted to the Hospital was 7,082, being 290 more than the number admitted during 1924.

The number of new patients attending the Outpatients' Department was 5,609, and the total number of attendances of outpatients during the year was 22,694.

In the Consumptive Home the daily average resident was 63 and in the Infectious Diseases Block, 23.

#### OBITUARY.

The late Dr. J. A. G. Hamilton, Honorary Consulting Gynaecologist. The Board desires to place on record its appreciation of



the long and valuable services rendered by Dr. Hamilton as an honorary officer.

Mr. John Millikin, Honorary Consulting Masseur, who had previously held the position of Honorary Galvanist for a number of years.

Mr. C. J. Bellemey, Assistant Dispenser, who had rendered faithful service for several years.

#### MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT.

Dr. Charles T. Turner, after nearly six years of service, tendered his resignation. The Board appreciates the keen interest displayed and the valuable service rendered by Dr. Turner.

Dr. James G. Sleeman, of Melbourne, was appointed as his successor.

#### LAY SUPERINTENDENT.

Mr. R. J. Champion, owing to ill-health, tendered his resignation, which was accepted with regret. Mr. Champion had been in the Civil Service for over 50 years.

Mr. A. E. Botting, formerly Chief Clerk and Steward of the Parkside Mental Hospital, was appointed to the vacancy.

#### MATRON.

Matron Eleanor Harrald was granted nine months' leave of absence, and Miss Lucy C. Daw was appointed Acting Matron during this period.

#### RENOVATIONS AND IMPROVEMENTS.

*Extension of Casualty Room.*—As pointed out in the previous report, the present Casualty Room is totally inadequate for the reception of patients. The Dispensary adjoining has been vacated and accommodated in another part of the building. The old Dispensary will be utilised as an extension of the Casualty Room until such time as the more modern Casualty and Admission Department is provided in the proposed Outpatients' Department, plans for which have been approved.

*Balconies on Western Wing.*—The addition of balconies and verandahs across the northern portion of Wyatt, Leopold, Victoria, and Martin Wards, with ward adjuncts, has been recently commenced.

*Balconies on Eastern Wing.*—The Commissioners of Charitable Funds have agreed to pay interest on a further expenditure of



£3,000 for this work, making a total of £17,000 on account of improvements to the Adelaide Hospital. This amount of £3,000 will be expended in providing an extension of the present verandah and balcony of the Flinders and Light Wards, and giving much improved lavatory accommodation for these medical wards.

#### FURNISHINGS AND RENOVATIONS.

The work in connection with renovating and refurnishing of the old wards has proceeded during the year, and the following wards completed:—Alfred, Dorcas; also the wardmaids' dining-room has been thoroughly renovated.

The following is a complete list of wards which have undergone structural alterations, provision of balconies, renovation, and refurnishing since the commencement of the scheme:—“Adelaide,” “Albert,” “Victoria,” “Alexandra,” “Alfred,” “Dorcas.” In addition to above, two lifts have been installed, and many other improvements carried out.

#### PROVISIONAL ACCOMMODATION.

Temporary accommodation for 20 patients has been provided by the erection of a marquee on the south-eastern corner of the grounds fronting North Terrace. This accommodation will be required during the period of erecting balconies, &c., on the north-western wing of the main building, and renovations to wards generally, which will probably extend over a period of 18 months.

Electric fans and other conveniences have been installed, adding comfort to this temporary ward.

#### SHORTAGE OF ACCOMMODATION.

The Board, with the approval of the Minister, entered into negotiations with the Adelaide Children's Hospital, that the age limit at that Institution be raised from under 10 years to under 12 years. For the past 12 months there have been, approximately, 150 children admitted to the Adelaide Hospital between the ages of 10 and 12 years. The negotiations have resulted in a satisfactory arrangement being arrived at with the Children's Hospital by the Board of Management of that Institution agreeing to raise the age limit of children for admission accordingly. On this condition being complied with, the Government has agreed to the granting to the Children's Hospital of an additional subsidy



of £1,000 per annum. This new arrangement, which will operate from August 1st, 1926, will, in addition to slightly relieving the pressure on the accommodation at the Adelaide Hospital, obviate the necessity of the placing of children of such tender years in a hospital for adults.

#### BUILDING ADDITIONS.

*Bice Building.*—The construction of this building was proceeded with during the year, and it is expected that in 1926 it will be completed and in occupation.

*The Boiler House and Laundry.*—The new boiler house completed last year has now been put into commission.

The new laundry was opened on September 14th, 1925. This spacious, well lighted and ventilated building affords ample accommodation for the proper sorting and laundering of staff and patients' wearing apparel, ward linen, &c. Up-to-date machinery has been installed by the Architect-in-Chief, with ample facilities for hot air drying and other labor-saving devices.

*New Kitchen and Stores Block.*—Arrangements have been made for the demolition of the old kitchen and stores blocks early in 1926, on completion of which the new structure will be proceeded with.

The approved plans provide for a modern kitchen with suitable appliances for the proper cooking and storing of foodstuff, &c.

Ample accommodation for all grocery, hardware, &c., stores is to be provided, with suitable offices for the storekeepers.

*Operating Theatre, Alterations and Additions to.*—Plans were approved embodying the recommendations of the Extra Accommodation Committee. It is urged that the necessary funds for proceeding with this work be made available as early as possible.

*No. 2 Theatre, Improvements to.*—Plans for this work have been approved, and the Board hopes that, owing to the urgency of the new improvements planned, this work will be completed as early as possible.

*Gynaecological Theatre.*—Extensive alterations to this theatre have been effected during the year. Major gynaecological operations heretofore performed in the main theatre will now be



carried out in this theatre adjoining the two gynaecological Wards. This will assist in relieving the pressure of work in the principal theatre.

*Laboratory.*—Additions to the laboratory, plans of which were approved some years ago, have not yet been proceeded with. The limited accommodation for staff and equipment warrants the immediate building of additional rooms, which has been urged from time to time.

*Accommodation for Future Staff.*—On the 25th September, 1925, the Board waited upon the Chief Secretary and placed before him the following request for additional accommodation of nurses and domestics:—

(a) Extra nursing staff . . . . .	85
(b) Domestic staff . . . . .	120

The extensions to the Hospital will naturally entail the employment of additional staff, which cannot be accommodated on the premises under existing conditions.

The Bice Building, which it is expected to be completed early in 1926, will necessitate the following additional staff:—Sister, 1; nurses, 8; maids, 6 . . . . . 15

Number of staff required on completion of projected extension of Nose and Throat Clinic—Sister, 1; nurses, 5; maid, 1 . . . . . 7

Two extra theatres to be provided will require:—Sisters, 2; nurses, 2; maid, 1 . . . . . 5

The proposed new Women's Block for Obstetrics and Gynaecology will need a nursing staff of, approximately.. 54

The present shortage of accommodation at Nurses' Home . . . . . 12

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The present position in regard to domestic staff accommodation is very unsatisfactory. The resident domestics are located in various parts of the Hospital, instead of being housed in a separate building; in addition to which, 23 are required to live off the premises owing to insufficient accommodation in the Hospital.

The growth of the Hospital during the past 24 years is as follows:—1900, 3,036 In-patients; 1924, 7,170 In-patients; or an increase of 136 per cent.



The population of Adelaide and the metropolitan area during 1900 was 162,261 ; 1924, 289,914, or an increase of 79 per cent.

#### WOMEN'S BLOCK FOR OBSTETRICS AND GYNAECOLOGY.

The Adelaide Hospital Board, with representatives of the Advisory Committee and University Council, waited upon the Chief Secretary and urged that the land known as the old Exhibition grounds, at the rear of the Hospital, be allocated for hospital purposes, and that a suitable area be set aside for the provision of a Gynaecological and Obstetric Block.

The following committee has been appointed by the Minister to report as to requisite accommodation :—The Architect-in-Chief (Mr. A. E. Simpson) ; Chairman, Adelaide Hospital Board (Dr. B. H. Morris), Representative of Advisory Committee (Dr. F. S. Hone), Representative of Honorary Staff (Dr. T. G. Wilson), Dr. J. B. Dawson.

#### MEDICAL RECORDS.

With the appointment of a second registrar (surgical) it is now possible to introduce an efficient system of medical records, as exist in modern hospitals..

The University Council is providing one-half salary of both registrars.

#### X-RAY.

The Board recommended the purchase of a portable X-ray plant for use in the wards, &c., in cases where it is inadvisable to move patients, and also to relieve the strain on the already overtaxed main plant. It is hoped that funds will be made available for this purpose in next year's Estimates.

#### FIRE PRECAUTIONS.

The Board appreciates the assistance rendered by the Metropolitan Fire Brigade in making regular inspection of all fire appliances and hydrants. Monthly reports are regularly forwarded, and recommendations are made from time to time.

#### OFFICIAL VISITORS.

The following official visitors were re-appointed by the Government for a further term of 12 months :—Lady Hackett Moulden, Mesdames M. Wallington, E. A. Wilson, Messrs. F. B. H. Vincent, T. P. Howard.



Lady Moulden was granted eight months' leave of absence to go abroad.

The Board has discussed hospital matters with the official visitors in conference, and their assistance and co-operation is appreciated.

#### ADVISORY COMMITTEE.

The following were re-appointed members of the Advisory Committee for a term of three years, under section 14 of the Hospitals Amendment Act, 1921 :—Dr. F. S. Hone, Dr. H. Swift, Sir Joseph Verco, Mr. W. T. McCoy, Dr. E. Angas Johnson, Dr. C. T. C. de Crespigny, Dr. H. S. Newland.

The Board has met the Advisory Committee in conference on several occasions, and appreciates the valuable advice received from the committee during the year.

#### HOSPITAL AUXILIARY.

The Hospital Auxiliary, consisting of lady voluntary workers, has continued its good work during the year. The wards are being completely equipped with bed linen, patients' garments, etc. ; material for which is purchased out of funds raised by the Hospital Day Appeal Committee. The Board very much appreciates the voluntary work done by these ladies.

#### SHERIDAN KIOSK.

Constructed by the Architect-in-Chief from funds provided by the executors of the estate of the late Miss A. F. Keith Sheridan, a permanent kiosk has been erected on the Hospital grounds fronting North Terrace, and was officially opened by Mr. A. Allan Simpson, C.M.G., on November 18th, 1925. This handsomely designed structure is conveniently situated, and well lighted and ventilated within.

The kiosk is used by the lady voluntary workers of the Adelaide Hospital Auxiliary for the purpose of providing patients and their friends with refreshments and extra comforts at a nominal cost.

All profits made and expended on linen will be subsidised by the Government for the establishment of a Women's Hospital.

The kiosk is being well patronised by in and out patients and their friends, and has proved a distinct advantage to them.



## ELECTRICAL CARDIAGRAPH.

After careful consideration and inquiry, action has been taken for the purchase, through the Agent-General in London, of an electrical cardiograph, with accessories, which the Board has been enabled to procure through a donation of £600 received from the executors of the joint estates of the late Miss A. F. Keith Sheridan and Mrs. A. M. Simpson.

This modern apparatus should prove a valuable addition to the scientific appliances used in the Hospital. The Board very much appreciates the action of the executors of the above-mentioned estates in making funds available for this purpose.

## LEGACIES.

A legacy of £350 (approximately) was bequeathed to the Adelaide Hospital by the late Mr. J. M. Richman, late of Prospect.

The Board appreciates the generosity of the late Mr. J. M. Richman, who had also been an annual subscriber to the institution for many years.

From the estate of the late B. R. Harrip, late of Wistow, an amount of £309 13s. 2d. was received with grateful thanks.

## DONATIONS.

The Board has much pleasure in recording the receipt of a further donation of £100 from Mr. MacRobertson, confectioner, of Melbourne, received through the proprietors of the *S.A. Register*. The Board thanks Mr. MacRobertson.

## CONTRIBUTIONS.

A complete list of contributors who have subscribed to the Hospital during the year will be found on page 62, also a list of life subscribers on page 58. To all these contributors the Board extends grateful thanks for their generosity.

## WIRELESS.

Through the efforts of the Christian Ministering League, a wireless receiving set was installed at the Consumptive Home, North Terrace, for the benefit of the inmates.

## HOSPITAL DAY APPEAL.

As a result of the efforts of Hospital Day Appeal Committee, with its many voluntary helpers, the sum of £1,400 was received for the benefit of the Hospital.



A large portion of this sum was raised by the Charity Football Carnival Committee.

#### CONSUMPTIVE HOME.

The question of the removal of the Consumptive Home from its present position on North Terrace to a site outside the city boundary has had the serious consideration of the Board since its appointment, and on several occasions recommendations have been made for its removal.

The following committee has now been appointed by the Government for the purpose of formulating a scheme for the



provision of suitable accommodation for the treatment of consumptives elsewhere:—Inspector-General of Hospitals (Dr. B. H. Morris), the Architect-in-Chief (Mr. A. E. Simpson), the Medical Superintendent of Bedford Park Sanatorium (Dr. C. H. G. Ramsbottom), Dr. C. T. C. de Crespigny, Dr. Wm. Ray (representing the British Medical Association).

The committee has recommended that separate institutions be provided for the treatment of early and advanced cases. A suitable site at Bedford Park has been selected for early cases, and accommodation for advanced cases will be provided on a suitable site at Northfield. The Board sincerely trusts that the new accommodation will be available at an early date in order that the present Consumptive Home may be vacated. The conditions as to accommodation, &c., at the home are unsatisfactory, but the Board has so far refrained from recommending expenditure for alterations, &c., in anticipation of the new home being soon available.

#### INFECTIOUS DISEASES BLOCK.

The Board has found it necessary to have electric light installed throughout in place of the obsolete and inefficient gas lighting, and further extensive alterations will be required unless the removal of the Infectious Diseases Block from its present site—as previously urged by the Board—is given effect to.

### STAFF.

The following additional staff was engaged during 1925 :—

Temporary Dental Mechanic, made permanent as from April 1st, 1925.

One female clerk, as from July 21st, 1925.

The appointment of Dr. A. I. Chapman as Superintendent terminated on the 31st December, 1925, and Dr. T. D. Campbell was appointed to this position.

### HONORARY OFFICERS.

Mr. H. Gill Williams was granted twelve (12) months' leave of absence, and his place was filled by Dr. R. Godson.

The resignation of Dr. G. R. West as Honorary Anæsthetist was accepted.

The total attendance of Honorary Officers during 1925 were 245, of which 81 were by Honorary Anæsthetists.

### LIBRARY AND MUSEUM.

During the year many additions were made to the Library and Museum, and good progress was made with the systematic cataloguing of the contents.

### STUDENTS.

Students attending the practice of the Hospital were as follows :—First year, eleven; second year, two; third year, seven; fourth year, three. In the final examination two students graduated for the Degree of Bachelor of Dental Surgery, University of Adelaide.

### GENERAL REMARKS.

During the year the State Dental Society was granted permission to hold its monthly meetings at the Dental Hospital. In November the Society was granted permission to hold a "Hospital Day" at the institution, when clinics were given by interstate visitors, and State members were afforded an opportunity of seeing the Dental Hospital under working conditions.



Increased treatment was shown over the previous year in practically all sections of the Department, with a concomitant increase in revenue.

Throughout the year fresh applications were presented at such a rate that the Department could not adequately cope with the work, thus showing the necessity for an increase of staff to deal with this growing appreciation of the Department's activities by the public.

The progressive increase in the number of patients referred to this Department by the Out-door Departments of the Adelaide and the Children's Hospitals shows the recognition by the Medical Officers of these institutions of the value of dental attention.

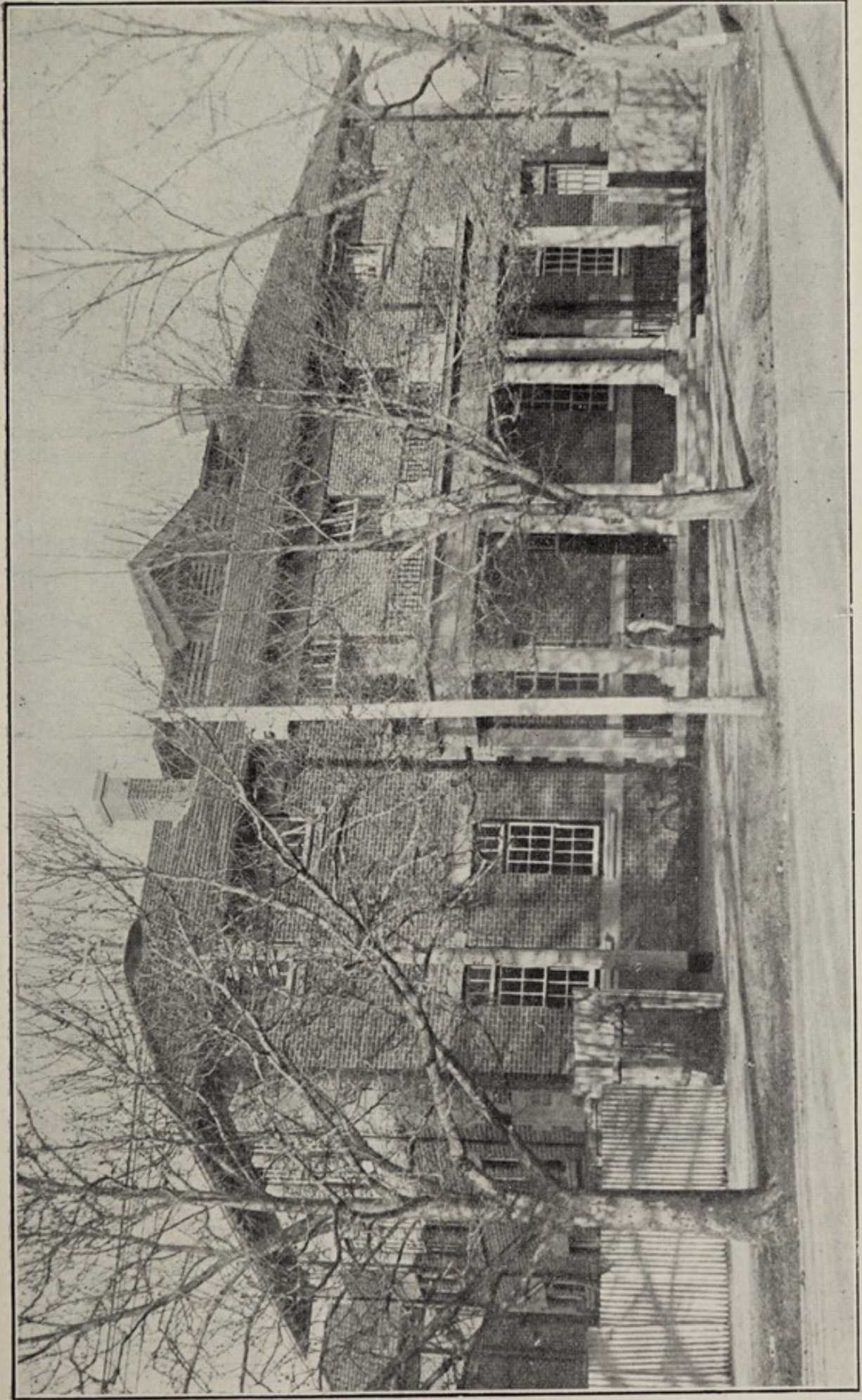

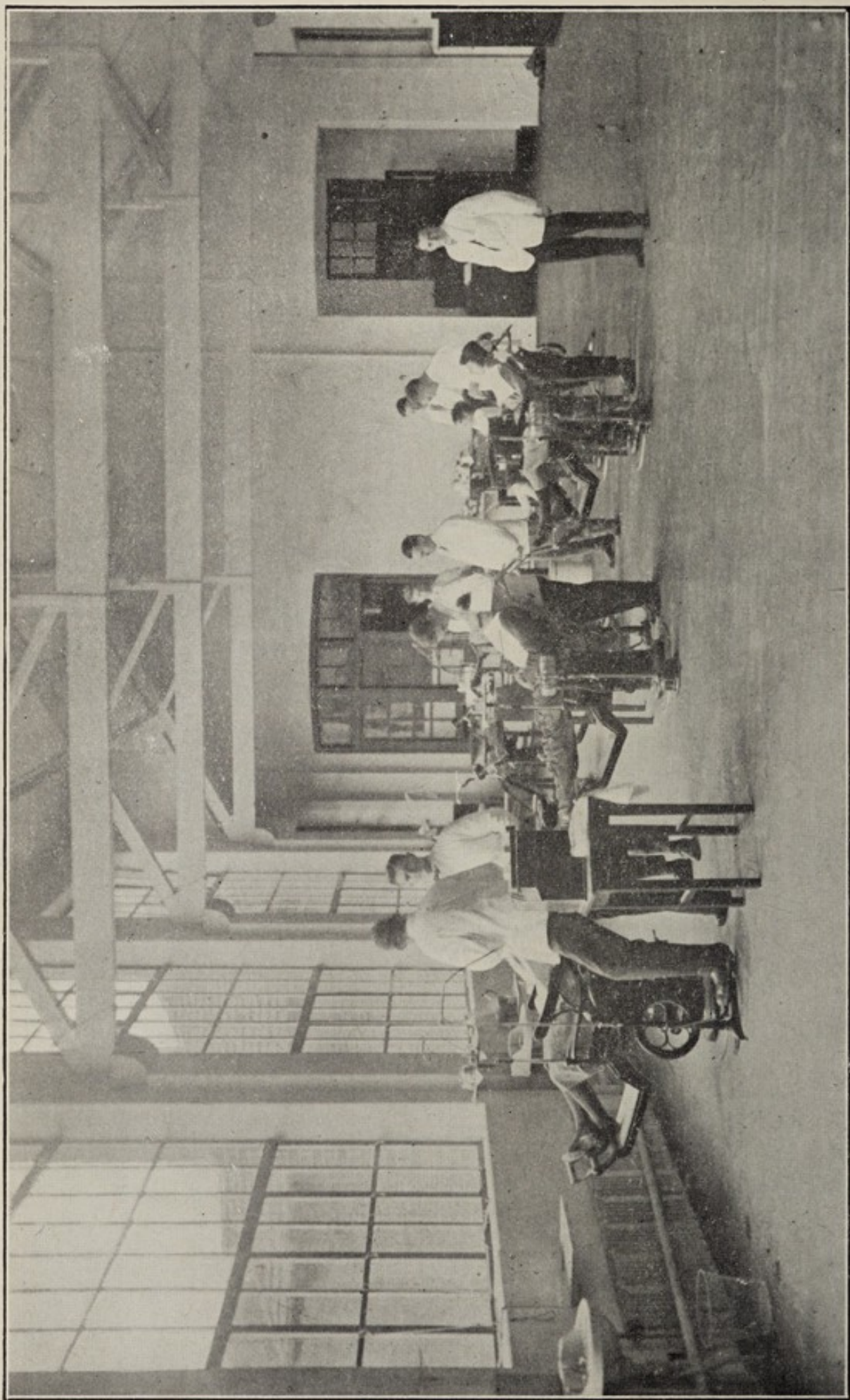




THE NEW DENTAL HOSPITAL (Front View of the Building).

## THE CONSUMPTIVES' HOME.

Within the home are rooms set apart for library (with hundreds of books, periodicals, and magazines), smoking, billiards (full-sized table), billatelle, and other games. A piano and organ are also provided, in fact everything is done to give the patient all the comforts of a good home, together with the best medical and nursing skill procurable. There are 23 cubicles, three rooms for two patients each, one ward for eight patients, one ward for nine patients, one large bungalow for 12 patients, and four tents for one patient each—giving accommodation for 62 patients.

The buildings have verandahs on both sides, are thoroughly ventilated, the walls and ceilings are varnished and the floors covered with linoleum.

Provision is also made for the treatment of cancer cases, there being 14 single bedrooms devoted to this purpose.

The majority of cases pass through the Consultation room, or are transferred from the wards of the General Hospital.

## INFECTIOUS DISEASES BLOCK.

The number of new cases admitted to the Block (502) shows an increase of 27 cases as compared with the previous year.

The deaths totalled 13, a mortality rate of 2.5 per cent. There was a large increase in the number of cases of measles treated—282 in 1925 as compared with 24 in 1924.

The number of cases of erysipelas treated also showed an increase—60 in 1925, 27 in 1924.

The Diphtheria cases were 66 less than the previous year—41 cases treated in 1925, 107 in 1924. There were three deaths, being a mortality rate of 7.3 per cent.

There were 53 cases of scarlatina treated in 1925 as against 172 in 1924, a decrease of 119. There was one death, the mortality rate being 1.9 per cent.

There is accommodation for 144 patients.

The *Clinical Pathological* examinations performed for the Adelaide Hospital include:—(1) The histological diagnosis of pathological tissues, several of which were immediate examinations performed during operations (such examinations are done in order to help the surgeon in determining the extent and nature of the operation necessary); (2) the examination of urine to detect abnormal chemical and morphological elements; (3) the examination of fæces to detect the presence of abnormal elements; (4) the examination of cerebro-spinal fluid to detect cellular and chemical change (this examination is extremely useful in detecting syphilis of the central nervous system; (5) the examination of the blood to detect the presence of the various anæmias and leukæmias; (6) the examination of material for the detection of *spirochæta pallida* in the diagnosis of syphilis; (7) the examination of fluids from various cavities and cysts to determine their nature; (8) the examination of blood for the estimation of glucose, urea, proteins, &c.; (9) the examination of gastric contents after a test meal.

The *Bacteriological Examinations* performed for the Adelaide Hospital include:—(1) The examination of sputum for the detection of tubercle bacilli and other bacteria, and also for hydatid hooklets; (2) the examination of blood for the Widal reaction (this examination is important in assisting in the diagnosis of typhoid fever); (3) the examination of swabs taken from the throat and nose to detect the presence of diphtheria bacilli; (4) the examination of urine to detect the presence of tubercle bacilli, colon bacilli, and other bacteria; (5) the examination of inflammatory fluids for the detection of bacteria, *e.g.*, pleuritic fluid, for tubercle bacilli; (6) the examination of cerebro-spinal fluid to detect the presence of tubercle bacilli, meningococci, and other bacteria; (7) the cultural examination of blood to detect the presence of bacteria in the circulation; (8) the examination of fæces and urine for the detection of typhoid bacilli and other pathogenic bacteria; (9) the examination of pus for the detection of gonococci, actinomyces, and other bacteria. Bacteria isolated from the various fluids and materials are often used in the preparation of autogenous vaccines.



The *Wassermann Reaction* was performed on Thursday in each week. This reaction is of great value in the diagnosis and treatment of syphilis. The Griffith and Scott technique is employed throughout.

The examinations performed and classified under the head *Private Work* include in the main such examinations as described under clinical pathological examinations and bacteriological examinations. Much work was done for the Board of Health. Included in the examinations are also:—(1) Examination of various foodstuffs for the detection of bacterial contamination; (2) examination of drinking water to determine its suitability for drinking purposes. Included under this head is a special investigation carried out for the Adelaide Local Board of Health. The object of this investigation is to determine at regular intervals the bacterial content of the water as delivered from the Adelaide waterworks main. This investigation is being continued. (3) The examination of disinfectants to determine their germicidal power

The routine examinations for the *Stock Department* include:—(1) Bacteriological examination of cow's milk for the detection of tubercle bacilli and other bacteria; (2) morbid tissues for histopathological examination; (3) examination of waters to determine whether they contained harmful substances; (4) bacteriological examinations of pleuro-pneumonia virus; (5) dead bees to determine the presence of any infection; (6) specimens removed *post-mortem* from animals dying from various causes, &c.

Investigations were carried out in connection with arsenical dermatitis in rams, forage poisoning in horses, phosphorus poisoning in sheep, photo-sensitization in sheep, red-water in cattle, and arthritis in sheep.

The *Vaccine Department*, as well as preparing 274 separate vaccines, also administered inoculations of vaccine to hospital patients. During the year 240 hospital patients were under treatment. The majority of these patients visited the laboratory twice a week during their course of treatment, when they received their injections. In all 2,021 doses of vaccine were administered; also 495 doses of tuberculin were given to 33 patients. Vaccines were prepared for 163 patients under the care of private practitioners, and 1,942 doses (including 97 doses of tuberculin and 224 doses of T.A.B.) were supplied for these patients. In addition to this, 425cc. of vaccine were supplied in bulk to private practitioners and 140cc. of typhoid vaccine were supplied to a public institution for use as an anti-typhoid inoculation.

The work of the *Bio-Chemical Branch* has increased somewhat in the number of examinations made, but more particularly with regard to the variety of examinations undertaken.



*Summary.*—The figures show approximately the same number of examinations made as during 1924. There is a general increase of, approximately, 300 examinations. This is very satisfactory, particularly when considered in the light of the fact that many of the examinations previously made by the laboratory staff are now made by the house surgeons, and further, that there are now several other laboratories in South Australia undertaking the same class of work as this laboratory.

But more important than the total number of examinations made is the nature of the work undertaken. There have been a large number of new procedures introduced during the year. There has been no lagging behind in the application of the newer methods introduced, but methods of doubtful value have received little or no attention.



## VENEREAL DISEASES.—NIGHT CLINICS.

### NINTH ANNUAL REPORT FOR YEAR ENDING SEPTEMBER 30TH, 1925.

Improved accommodation for the treatment of venereal diseases is urgently necessary.

The Venereal Diseases Act, passed by Parliament in 1920, has not yet been proclaimed. The provisions of the Act could not be effectively carried out until accommodation for the treatment of both indoor and outdoor patients is provided.

It is considered that this Act should be proclaimed as soon as possible, but failing such action in the near future, improved accommodation and facilities for treating patients are necessary at the existing clinic.

#### REPORT OF OPERATIONS FOR THE YEAR ENDING SEPTEMBER 30TH, 1925.

##### *Male Section.*

*Surgeon*—DR. G. H. BURNELL, B.S., M.D.

The total number of patients for the year was 555, and the total number of attendances was 7,052. There were 88 cases of syphilis and 410 cases of gonorrhœa treated. Included in the above were 4 persons who had both gonorrhœa and syphilis, and 53 patients attended on account of diseases which were shown to be other than venereal.

##### *Female Section.*

*Surgeon*—DR. H. RISCHBIETH, M.D., F.R.C.S., succeeded by  
DR. R. F. MATTERS, M.B., Ch.M., F.R.C.S.

Dr. Rischbieth, who was granted 12 months' leave of absence from July 1st, 1924, resigned on the expiration of the leave.

Dr. G. H. Burnell carried out this work until the appointment of Dr. R. F. Matters.

The total number of patients for the year was 96, and the number of attendances was 1,097. There were 47 cases of syphilis, and 38 of gonorrhœa treated.

Included in the above were four patients who had both gonorrhœa and syphilis, and seven patients attended for diseases which on examination were found to be non-venereal.
