

OBJECTS OF THE HOSPITAL.

The Hospital is for the reception, maintenance, treatment, and education of children suffering from tuberculous disease of the bones and joints, and other orthopædic conditions.

RULES FOR ADMISSION.

Girls and boys are received up to the age of sixteen. A weekly contribution is required.

No child suffering from any infectious disease, or coming from an infected house, can be admitted to the Hospital.

All children should have been vaccinated before admission.

Application for admission should be made to the Secretary, to whom cheques, crossed and to order, should be made payable. Children living near the Hospital may be brought to be examined there by appointment with the Medical Superintendent. Patients unable to come to the Hospital for examination may obtain from the Secretary a form of medical certificate, to be filled in by their Medical Attendant, which, when completed, should be returned to the Secretary.

The collection of Letters of Recommendation for individual patients is not permitted.

OUT-PATIENTS.

Out-patients, who were formerly seen at St. Bartholomew's Hospital, by courtesy of the Treasurer and Almoners, are now seen by appointment with the Medical Superintendent, at the Hospital.

VISITING DAYS.

The Hospital is open to visitors daily from 2-0 to 4-0 p.m., and to friends of patients on the second Saturday and the Sunday following the fourth Saturday in each month, from 2-30 to 4-0 p.m., or at other times by appointment with the Matron.

In order to avoid risk of infection, children under sixteen years are not admitted as visitors.

The Annual Report

ALEXANDRA HOSPITAL FOR CHILDREN WITH HIP DISEASE

1942

The Committee of Management have the pleasure of submitting to the Governors and Subscribers their Seventy-Sixth Annual Report, which, for reasons of economy, will this year be as brief

as possible.

The number of children under treatment during the year was 119. The average number of beds occupied daily was seventy-four. Seventy-six children remained in the Hospital on 31st December. Particulars as to the treatment of the children and the results will be found in the Medical Superintendent's report on page 11.

The Income and Expenditure Account will be found on pages 16-19, from which it will be seen that for the first time for many years there was a deficit of income over expenditure during the year. The Committee very greatly regret that this deficit should have been incurred, but the total income was over £700 less than the previous year—due in great part to the smaller amount received for the maintenance of patients. On the other hand the expenditure was only about £300 less than that in 1941. The reduction in the number of patients was too small to cause any appreciable reduction in the total expenditure, overhead charges remaining unchanged. The Committee very much hope that a deficit will not occur again, and while earnestly appealing for more subscriptions and donations, they take the opportunity to assure all contributors that the utmost economy consistent with the welfare of the children. will always be exercised in administering the funds entrusted to them. They are grateful to all the friends of the Hospital who have again contributed so generously to its upkeep, and they trust that they may continue to receive the privilege of their support during the coming year. The people of Luton have again shown much kindness to the Hospital, and have been most generous in all ways. The Committee tender them very grateful thanks.

Special acknowledgments are due to the Committee and Staff of the Luton and Dunstable Hospital, where the children continue to be admitted for operative treatment. The Committee are most grateful for the facilities which have been placed at their disposal, and for the courtesy and consideration which have invariably

been extended to all those connected with the Alexandra.

Once again the Committee had the privilege of receiving a donation of £70 from the Alexandra Day Committee, the Hospital being on H.R.H. the Duchess of Kent's list. The Committee are indeed grateful for this very valuable help.

It is with regret that the Committee have heard of the death of Lady Maurice, the daughter of the late Mrs. Howard Marsh, one of the Founders of the Hospital. Lady Maurice was always very interested in the work begun by her mother, and the Committee feel that they have indeed lost a staunch supporter. It will be noticed on page 40 that a Memorial Fund has been opened by members of the family of Lady Maurice, and in due course this will probably be applied to the endowment of a Cot in her memory. The Committee are most grateful for this very valuable help.

The attention of readers of the Report is drawn to the photograph facing page 12, which shows the children as they appeared in the last scene of a series of Nativity Tableaux, which they presented two days before Christmas to a number of visitors. It was much regretted that owing to lack of space, more friends could not be invited. The Tableaux were produced by Miss Latter, L.R.A.M., one of the school teachers, and were very successful, and

much appreciated.

The Committee would take this opportunity to express to the members of the Hospital staff their very grateful thanks for the zeal and loyalty which have been displayed in their work for the Hospital and the children. They would also offer their most grateful thanks to all those who help with the Guides and Scouts, and to those who visit the Hospital for the purpose of amusing the children, taking them for walks, etc., in their out-of-school hours. The children greatly enjoy these visits, and the Committee feel very much indebted to all these friends, who give up so much of their time for their benefit.

The Linen Fund has continued to render most valuable assistance to the Hospital in providing children's clothes, bed linen, etc., and the Committee are deeply grateful to all those who support this

Fund.

An Outline of the History of the Hospital.

About the year 1865 two ladies, Miss Jane Perceval, afterwards Mrs. Howard Marsh, and Miss Caroline Wood, were nurses in a children's hospital. At that time there were no special hospitals in London for the treatment of diseases of the bones and joints, and these two ladies saw with concern that the children admitted to a general children's hospital with such diseases received no lasting benefit. Often they required continued treatment for at least two or three years, but no ordinary hospital could keep children for this length of time owing to the beds being needed for more urgent cases, and consequently they were discharged when the more acute symptoms of their disease had abated, but before any real cure had been accomplished. It seemed to Miss Perceval and Miss Wood that the need of these children was a special hospital which could keep them under treatment not only while their disease was in an acute stage, but also until they were permanently cured, even although their stay in the hospital extended to several years. They decided, if possible, to establish such a hospital, and accordingly they interested in their project a Mrs. Whitehead, the wife of a clergyman, attached to St. Anne's, Soho, and a Miss Delf. These four ladies approached the then leaders of the medical profession in support of their scheme.

As a result of the efforts of Miss Perceval and her friends, No. 19, Queen Square, Bloomsbury, was bought, and a hospital called "The House of Relief for Children with Chronic Diseases of the Joints," containing ten beds, was opened on the 12th March, 1867, by the Right Reverend Dr. Ellicott, Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol. So great was the demand for admission, however, that before the end of the year, the number of beds had to be increased to thirty, and five years later in 1872, No. 18, Queen Square, was acquired, and twenty more beds established. The next year No. 17, Queen Square was bought, and the number of beds was increased to sixty, and then in 1887 the last addition to the original Hospital was made, when No. 1, Queen Square Place was purchased, and a further eight beds and isolation wards provided. A photograph of 17, 18 and 19, Queen Square appears facing this page.

In the meantime, in 1870, Her Royal Highness, the Princess of Wales, afterwards Her Majesty Queen Alexandra, had become Patron of the Hospital, and in 1881 by the gracious permission of Her Royal Highness, the name of the Hospital became "The Alexandra Hospital for Children with Hip Disease."


Just before the end of the century the four old houses, built during the reign of Queen Anne, which formed the Hospital, needed such continual and expensive repairs that it was decided to erect an entirely new building in their place. This was done, and on the 20th July, 1899, a new Hospital, a photograph of which appears opposite this page, was opened by Their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales and Princess Victoria. In these premises the work of the Hospital was carried on for twenty-one years, until the close of 1920, when it was decided that the children would do better in the country. The building in Queen Square was therefore sold, and by an agreement with St. Bartholomew's Hospital, sanctioned by the Charity Commissioners, the Kettlewell Convalescent Home at Swanley, no longer used for its original purpose, was placed at the disposal of the patients of the Alexandra Hospital.

Here the Hospital remained until, as is mentioned on another page, it was transferred in June, 1940, to Stockwood Park, Luton, for the duration of the war.


During the seventy-six years the Hospital has been in existence it has had three convalescent homes. The first one was at Bourne-mouth, which was opened in 1874, and subsequently in 1882 named the Helen Branch by permission of Her Royal Highness the Duchess of Albany. This Branch was closed in 1893, and in the same year another was opened at Painswick, in Gloucestershire, which was continued until 1914, when it had to be closed on account of the outbreak of the war. The third convalescent home of the Hospital was the one at East Clandon, which was opened in 1903, and closed in December, 1936.

MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT FOR 1942

IN-PATIENTS

During 1942 the number of beds available for in-patients at Stockwood remained at 75 (as compared with a 100 at Swanley); occasionally 76 children were accommodated. The number of patients admitted during the year, the figures giving the average number of occupied beds, and the average duration of stay of the patients discharged during the year, will be found in the statistical tables on page 32.

This report deals with patients discharged during the year 1942.

The cases are divided into two main groups: Tuberculous cases and Non-Tuberculous (Orthopædic) cases; of the 43 patients who left the hospital during the year, 16 were admitted under the Tuberculosis Regulations, and 27 were Non-Tuberculous cases.

TUBERCULOUS CASES

The two following tables, which show the duration and immediate results of in-patient treatment, and the results of the observation of doubtful cases admitted for diagnosis, are drawn up in accordance with the regulations of the Minister of Health as to the records kept by Medical Officers of Institutions approved by him for the treatment of tuberculosis. (Mem. 37/T. (revised), 1930.)

NOTES ON THE ABOVE TABLES

In the first of the above tables, it is recorded that one patient left with his tuberculous disease "not quiescent." This patient was, in fact, transferred to a general hospital not long after his admission to the Alexandra Hospital for the treatment of an intercurrent condition, afterwards returning to the Alexandra Hospital. One of the patients recorded as having been discharged with his disease "quiescent or arrested" was that of a boy temporarily transferred elsewhere for surgical operation. This patient also was received back at the Alexandra Hospital.

The patient who died in hospital was a case of long-standing

knee-joint tuberculosis with abdominal tuberculosis.

In the second of the above tables the case admitted for diagnosis, and diagnosed as being Non-Tuberculous, was that of a patient with old cervical tuberculous lymphadenitis and a spinal deformity, who came in as a possible case of spinal tuberculosis. This latter diagnosis was not confirmed.

In the following list the cases of bone and joint tuberculosis treated to a conclusion of their stay in the Alexandra Hospital during the year are classified according to the parts affected. They



Non-Tuberculous ("Orthopædic") Cases

It is mentioned above that there were twenty-seven cases coming under this heading as having been "discharged" during the year. In 11 of these cases, however, the "discharge" was, in fact, transfer elsewhere for operative treatment; and in each of these cases the patient returned to the Alexandra Hospital for continuation of treatment. Sixteen patients, therefore, were discharged to their homes at the conclusion of treatment during

The fatal case was one of very severe and extensive infantile paralysis; the patient died from circulatory and respiratory failure.

OPERATIONS

During 1942 the arrangement continued whereby patients needing surgical operations were temporarily transferred to the Luton and Dunstable Hospital for operation, and received back again at Stockwood afterwards. Ten patients were transferred during the year; and one patient was transferred to Chalkdell Emergency Hospital, Hitchin, similarly.

INFECTIOUS ILLNESS

There was no case of notifiable infectious illness amongst the children in the hospital, nor the staff, during the year. There were, however, a number of cases of chicken pox, occurring during the course of an outbreak which began towards the end of 1941. There were twenty-four cases amongst the children, and two amongst the nursing staff, during the year. There was also an outbreak of mumps during the spring and early summer; there were thirty-four cases in all: twenty-eight children and six members of the Nursing staff.

OUT-PATIENTS

The Hospital's Out-Patients' Department at St. Bartholomew's Hospital, closed at the outbreak of the war, was not reopened during 1942; but a few patients who were able to attend at Stockwood, nine in number (making eleven attendances), were seen. Of the four Kent County Council Orthopædic Clinics formerly operated from Swanley, one only, at Sevenoaks, is now worked by the Alexandra Hospital staff; but the nursing and treatment by massage, etc., at the Ashford and Sittingbourne Clinics remains in the hands of a Sister of the Alexandra Hospital staff. Statistical matter relating to these clinics will be found in the Annual Report of the Kent County Medical Officer.
