

OBJECTS OF THE HOSPITAL.

The Hospital is for the reception, maintenance, treatment, and education of children suffering from tuberculous and non-tuberculous diseases of the bones and joints.

RULES FOR ADMISSION.

Girls and boys are received up to the age of sixteen. A weekly contribution is required.

No child suffering from any infectious disease, or coming from an infected house, can be admitted to the Hospital.

All children should have been vaccinated before admission.

Application for admission should be made to the Secretary at the London Offices, 107 Southampton Row, London, W.C.1, to whom cheques, crossed and to order, should be made payable. Children living in or near London should be brought to be examined on Friday at 1-30 p.m., at the Out-patients' Department, St. Bartholomew's Hospital, London, E.C.1. Patients living in the country, if they cannot come to London for examination, may obtain from the Secretary a form of medical certificate, to be filled in by their Medical Attendant, which, when completed, should be returned to the Secretary.

The collection of Letters of Recommendation for individual patients is not permitted.

OUT-PATIENTS.

By the courtesy of the Treasurer and Almoners, Out-patients are seen on Fridays at 1-30 p.m., at the Out-patients' Department, St. Bartholomew's Hospital, London, E.C.1.

VISITING DAYS.

The Hospital is open to visitors daily, Sundays excepted, from 3-0 to 4-0 p.m., and to friends of patients on the second Saturday and the Sunday following the fourth Saturday in each month, from 2-30 to 4-0 p.m., or at other times by appointment with the Matron.

In order to avoid risk of infection, children under sixteen years are not admitted as visitors.

The Annual Report

The Committee of Management have the pleasure of submitting to the Governors and Subscribers their Seventy-second Annual Report.

The Chairman.

Before reporting upon the work of the Hospital during the past year, the Committee wish to offer their heartiest congratulations to their Chairman, Sir Girling Ball, upon the honour of Knighthood which was recently conferred upon him by His Majesty the King, and they are sure that all friends and supporters of the Hospital will wish to join them in these congratulations, and also in expressing the hope that he may long enjoy the honour thus conferred.

The Vice-Chairman.

The Committee have the pleasure to inform the Governors and Subscribers that Mr. Thomas Hayes, C.B.E., who has been for many years a member of their body, has been appointed Vice-Chairman of the Hospital.

During the past year the work of the Hospital has continued satisfactorily. The number of children under treatment was one hundred and fifty-eight; of these, forty-two were discharged cured, six improved, one with the diagnosis not confirmed, and two in statu quo, eight were transferred to an infectious hospital, and one died; while ninety-eight children remained in the Hospital on the 31st December. The average number of beds occupied was ninety-eight, a slightly lower number than last year owing to the fact that during the international crisis in September beds vacated were not immediately filled. Particulars as to the treatment of the children and the results will be found in the Medical Superintendent's report upon page 14.

The arrangement made in 1927 between the Hospital and the Kent County Council, under an Order of the Charity Commissioners, still continues. Under this arrangement an agreed number of beds is provided for children from the County of Kent, the larger part of which is reserved for patients suffering from tuberculous disease of the bones and joints, and the smaller part for the treatment of non-tuberculous cases. The Kent County Council assumes financial responsibility for its patients. In pursuance of this scheme, outpatient clinics are now established at Ashford, Margate, Sevenoaks, and Sheerness, at which patients are treated by the Hospital staff.

Finance.

Readers of the Report will notice that this year the totals of the Annual Subscription and Donation lists both show a decrease compared with those of last year. The Committee very much regret to have to report this lessening of voluntary assistance, which has occurred largely through the death of old supporters, and they do most earnestly trust that during the coming year the friends of the Hospital will endeavour to enlist the help of others to make good these losses.

The total amount received for the support of named Cots is slightly larger than that received last year. During the year the support of one Cot was withdrawn, and two additional Cots were endowed in perpetuity—one, "The Lady Nancy Lucy" Cot from the bequest of the late Sir Henry Lucy, and the other, "The Robin" Cot from the endowment donation of Mrs. Ronda Hastings. The Committee are very greatly indebted to Mrs. Hastings for this very valuable and generous mark of her recognition of the work of the Hospital.

The Committee are most appreciative of all the help rendered to the Hospital by its friends, among whom they would specially thank the following donors for their generous gifts to the General Fund: The Vicar and Churchwardens of St. Paul's, Beckenham, for their twenty-first annual donation of £10; Messrs. Higginson & Company for their thirtieth successive donation of £5 5s.; Mrs. H. G. Tetley for her fourteenth successive donation of £5 in addition to previous donations; the Bernhard Baron Charitable Trust for a further donation of £75; Mr. H. W. Kolle for a further donation of £15 15s.; Miss Strange for a donation of £20; and the Worshipful Company of Leathersellers for a donation of £5 5s. To all these friends the Committee tender their most hearty thanks.

The Committee also wish to thank most sincerely those friends of the Hospital who year after year, many of them for twenty, thirty, even forty years and more, have regularly given annual subscriptions. Such help is indeed appreciated, as annual subscriptions are one of the most valued, because one of the most trustworthy sources of income, and it is very much hoped that during the coming year more friends of the Hospital will find it possible to help in this way.

The Hospital again received a donation of £75 as a share of the collection made on "Alexandra Day."

The Committee have to report that legacies were received during the year as follows: The late Sir Henry Lucy, £3,527 3s. 7d., including £1,000 for the endowment of "The Lady Nancy Lucy" Cot; the late Mrs. E. Bucknell, £1,200; the late Mrs. M. A. Buckley, £277 11s. 7d.; and the late Francis Vincent Eck Ferrier, Esq., a further payment of £5 4s. 2d.

The Income and Expenditure Accounts of the Hospital will be found on pages 18 to 23.

The thanks of the Committee are due to the many ladies and gentlemen who have given gifts in kind during the year, and especially at Christmas time. These gifts have given much pleasure and happiness to the children, and are greatly appreciated, and it is hoped that they may be continued during the present year.

Special mention is made of the members and friends of the Sidcup and Bexley Heath Toc H for their generous support of the Hospital and continued interest in the children, for their weekly Sunday visits, their gifts of Christmas trees, toys and books, their entertainment for the children at Christmas, and for the many other ways in which they have rendered assistance. The Committee also desire to thank most heartily Mr. H. E. McKenzie, the Secretary of the Sidcup Toc H, and Mr. Waters, for the trouble they have taken in providing cinematographic shows in the wards during the winter months.

The Committee also wish to thank the staff and pupils of St. Andrew's House, Eversfield School, Sutton, for their continued interest in the Hospital.

Other gifts in kind have been received as a result of a Pound Day held last May, when one hundred and twenty-six pounds in goods and two pounds in cash were collected, while gifts of flowers, fruit, and vegetables were received after the Harvest Festival Services at Swanley Village Church, Crockenhill Church, the Girl Crusaders, Sidcup, the Congregational Church at Bromley, and Park House School, Sidcup.

Building Programme at Swanley.

The only building which has been done at the Hospital during the past year, apart from ordinary renewals and repairs, is the commencement of a house in the Hospital grounds for the Medical Superintendent. For some time past it has been felt that owing to the continued growth of the Hospital, and the increase of work, with a consequent increase of staff, the accommodation provided in the Hospital for the Medical Staff was unsatisfactory and inadequate. Early last year, therefore, the Committee decided that a house should be built as a residence for the Medical Superintendent. The building was started in September, and at the time of writing is nearing completion.

The Garden Party.

At the end of May last year the Matron held a Garden Party at the Hospital. Unfortunately, the weather conditions were rather unfavourable, and friends and supporters, a large number of whom were present, had to be entertained in the Hospital and Nurses' Home, instead of outside in the gardens. This fact, however, was not allowed to spoil the party, and all the visitors appeared to have a thoroughly enjoyable time. A sale of children's handwork, and home-made cakes and sweets, which were contributed by the Nursing Staff, was held, and the proceeds together with donations amounted to the very substantial total of f38 12s. 10d. The Committee are deeply indebted to the Matron and all the members of the nursing and teaching staff who worked so hard to make the party a success.

It is hoped to hold another Garden Party in the early summer, and invitations will be sent to as many friends of the Hospital as it is considered are within visiting distance of Swanley. Any who did not receive an invitation last year, and who would like to have one in future, are asked kindly to advise the Secretary to this effect, and he will arrange that invitations are sent to them.

Scouts and Guides.

The Scout Troop and Guide Company, with the Cub and Brownie Packs, continue their weekly parades. A Scouts' Own is held on the second Sunday in each month, and a Guide Parade several times during the year. Mr. Roy Shapley, of Kingsdown, has recently become Group Scout Master, and Mr. Douglas Woolsey and Miss Hoare still give their valuable services. The Committee are very sensible of the value of scouting and guiding for the children, and they are most grateful to these friends who make it possible for them to belong to a Scout Troop or Guide Company while they are in the Hospital.

The Hospital School.

During the year 1938 there were some eighty-five to ninety children receiving instruction, the ages ranging from three to over sixteen years. As in previous years, the work was individual. Each child was given his, or her, own supply of books and set work, but in addition belonged to a group, which was taught together when possible, thus stimulating interest.

During the spring and autumn terms school broadcasts were followed with great interest, the children having pamphlets for music and concert lessons, "our parish," biology, and travel talks. While doing handwork, they also listened to the nature talks and to some of the history episodes.

The handwork done included basketry and chair seating, various kinds of embroidery, and knitting. The work was exhibited at the Matron's Garden Party, and the sum of £22 1s. 9d. was realised from its sale.

Dr. Robert Weaver, of the Board of Education, paid a visit of inspection to the School in October, and a letter subsequently received from the Board states that "they are glad to learn that the school continues to do good work. Special reference is made in the report to the high standard attained in drawing and craft work." The Committee are very grateful to all the members of the school staff for their loyal service and keen interest in the welfare of the children, which have made such a report possible.

The Linen Fund.

The friends connected with this Fund have again given the Hospital their valuable support, both by monetary subscriptions and also by contributions of garments, tinfoil, etc. More people have been added to the list of supporters of the Fund during the last year. The Hospital is now privileged to have the help and interest of the members of the Hextable and Swanley Women's Institute as well as that of the members of the Swanley Junction Women's Institute, and of several ladies living in Swanley, Sidcup, and St. Mary Cray.

Mrs. Elmsley, of Shawfield Lodge, Shawfield Street, Chelsea, S.W.3, has kindly consented to become the Honorary Secretary and Treasurer of the Fund in place of Miss Georgia Singleton, and the Committee take this opportunity of giving Mrs. Elmsley a warm welcome, and extend their very grateful thanks to Miss Singleton for her valuable assistance, and to all those connected with the Fund for their untiring support, which is indeed appreciated.

An Outline of the History of the Hospital.


About the year 1865 two ladies, Miss Jane Perceval, afterwards Mrs. Howard Marsh, and Miss Caroline Wood, were nurses in a children's hospital. At that time there were no special hospitals in London for the treatment of diseases of the bones and joints, and these two ladies saw with concern that the children admitted to a general children's hospital with such diseases received no lasting benefit. Often they required continued treatment for at least two or three years, but no ordinary hospital could keep children for this length of time owing to the beds being needed for more urgent cases, and consequently they were discharged when the more acute symptoms of their disease had abated, but before any real cure had been accomplished. It seemed to Miss Perceval and Miss Wood that the need of these children was a special hospital which could keep them under treatment not only while their disease was in an acute stage, but also until they were permanently cured, even although their stay in the hospital extended to several years. They decided, if possible, to establish such a hospital, and accordingly they interested in their project a Mrs. Whitehead, the wife of a clergyman, attached to St. Anne's, Soho, and a Miss Delf. These four ladies approached the then leaders of the medical profession in support of their scheme, and the letters which they received from these gentlemen may be found on pages 68 and 69.

As a result of the efforts of Miss Perceval and her friends, No. 19, Queen Square, Bloomsbury, was bought, and a hospital called "The House of Relief for Children with Chronic Diseases of the Joints," containing ten beds, was opened on the 12th March, 1867, by the Right Reverend Dr. Ellicott, Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol. So great was the demand for admission, however, that before the end of the year, the number of beds had to be increased to thirty, and five years later in 1872, No. 18, Queen Square, was acquired, and twenty more beds established. The next year No. 17, Queen Square was bought, and the number of beds was increased to sixty, and then in 1887 the last addition to the original Hospital was made, when No. 1, Queen Square Place was purchased, and a further eight beds and isolation wards provided. A photograph of 17, 18 and 19, Queen Square appears facing this page.


In the meantime, in 1870, Her Royal Highness, the Princess of Wales, afterwards Her Majesty Queen Alexandra, had become Patron of the Hospital, and in 1881 by the gracious permission of Her Royal Highness, the name of the Hospital became "The Alexandra Hospital for Children with Hip Disease."

Just before the end of the century the four old houses, built during the reign of Queen Anne, which formed the Hospital, needed such continual and expensive repairs that it was decided to erect an entirely new building in their place. This was done, and on the 20th July, 1899, a new Hospital, a photograph of which appears facing page 12, was opened by Their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales and Princess Victoria. In these premises the work of the Hospital was carried on for twenty-one years, until the close of 1920, when it was decided that the children would do better in the country. The building in Queen Square was therefore sold, and by an agreement with St. Bartholomew's Hospital, sanctioned by the Charity Commissioners, the Kettlewell Convalescent Home, no longer used for its original purpose, was placed at the disposal of the patients of the Alexandra Hospital.

During the past eighteen years the Committee have expended some thousands of pounds in making extensive alterations and additions to the Hospital, including the provision of accommodation for more patients, bringing the total number of beds up to one hundred, balconies for the children, an X-ray department, electric light, an electric lift, a new heating and hot water system, an isolation block, and finally, a Nurses' Home, which has been in occupation since May, 1935.

During the seventy-two years the Hospital has been in existence it has had three convalescent homes. The first one was at Bourne-mouth, which was opened in 1874, and subsequently in 1882 named the Helen Branch by permission of Her Royal Highness the Duchess of Albany. This Branch was closed in 1893, and in the same year another was opened at Painswick, in Gloucestershire, which was continued until 1914, when it had to be closed on account of the outbreak of the war. The third convalescent home of the Hospital was the one at East Clandon, which was opened in 1903, and closed in December, 1936.

MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT FOR 1938.

IN-PATIENTS.

The number of beds available for in-patients at Swanley remained at one hundred throughout the year 1938. The number of patients admitted during the year, the figures showing the average number of occupied beds, and the average duration of stay of the patients discharged during the year, will be found in the statistical tables on pages 33 and 34.

This Report deals with patients discharged during the year 1938. The cases are divided into two main groups, Tuberculous Cases and Non-Tuberculous ("Orthopaedic") Cases; of the 60 patients who left the Hospital during the year, 26 were cases admitted under the Tuberculosis Regulations, and 34 were non-tuberculous cases.

TUBERCULOUS CASES.

The following tables, which show the duration and immediate results of in-patient treatment, and the results of the observation of doubtful cases admitted for diagnosis, are drawn up in accordance with the regulations of the Minister of Health as to the records kept by medical officers of institutions approved by the Minister of Health for the treatment of tuberculosis. (Mem. 37/T. (revised) 1930.)

Notes on the Above Tables

In the first of the above tables it is recorded that one patient died in hospital during the year. This case was that of a boy with very long-standing tuberculous disease of the spine and hip-joint; he died from the effects of prolonged suppuration at the spinal lesion. Six patients are recorded as having left the hospital with their tuberculous disease "not quiescent." In each of these cases, the patient's "discharge" was, in fact, transfer to an isolation hospital because of an intercurrent acute infectious fever. In each case the patient was afterwards received back at Swanley for continuation of treatment.

The only case in the second of the above tables was that of a boy admitted with an abscess of the thigh, thought to be due to hip disease. It was, in fact, a case of subacute streptococcal abscess of the thigh with no demonstrable connection with bone or joint.

In the following list the cases of bone and joint tuberculosis treated to a conclusion of their stay in the Alexandra Hospital during the year are classified according to the parts affected. All the cases were discharged as "Quiescent or Arrested," except the first one on the list to which reference has been made above. It does not include the patients transferred to an isolation hospital, also mentioned above, who were afterwards received back at the Alexandra Hospital:—



INFECTIOUS ILLNESS

During the year two cases of diphtheria, four cases of scarlet fever, one case of chicken-pox and three cases of German measles occurred amongst the children in the Hospital. The diphtheria and scarlet fever patients were transferred to an isolation hospital, but the chicken-pox and German measles patients were treated in the Hospital's Isolation Department.

OUT-PATIENTS

There were 181 attendances at the Hospital's Out-Patients' Department at St. Bartholomew's Hospital. The work of this department continues to be confined almost entirely to the supervision and after-care of former in-patients living in, or within a reasonable distance of, London. Nine patients were seen for the first time in the department; seven of these were former in-patients of the Hospital who attended for after-care, and two were new cases.

Four of the Kent County Council's orthopædic clinics, namely, those at Ashford, Margate, Sevenoaks, and Sheerness, are operated from Swanley, as hitherto. Statistical matter relating to these clinics will be found in the Annual Report of the Kent County Medical Officer.

Extracts from Letters in favour of the Alexandra Hospital received at the time of its foundation from distinguished Members of the Medical Profession.

SIR WILLIAM JENNER, BART., M.D., F.R.S., late President of the Royal College of Physicians, &c., &c.

An Institution for the Reception and Treatment of Poor Children suffering from Diseases of Joints would, in my opinion, be a valuable addition to the charitable Medical Institutions of London.

From the length of time this class of cases have to remain under treatment, they are necessarily, with comparatively few exceptions, refused beds in the present institutions into which sick children are received.

SIR PRESCOTT HEWETT, BART., F.R.C.S., Consulting Surgeon to St. George's Hospital, &c., &c.

Chronic affections of joints form a very large proportion of the surgical diseases of childhood among the poor, and many such cases are constantly to be found in the wards of all our large hospitals; but, unfortunately, these cases cannot be kept in our hospitals long enough for the benefit which they have derived to become permanent, and especially is this the case with hip-joint disease. After a few months at the utmost, when all active symptoms have subsided, it becomes absolutely necessary that the little patients should be discharged from the hospital, in order to make room for others. The unfavourable circumstances in which they are placed when they leave the hospital soon bring about a relapse; they may be re-admitted, and after awhile again discharged; then comes another relapse, and so matters go on, until a cure becomes an impossibility.

SIR JAMES PAGET, BART., F.R.S., Late Consulting Surgeon to St. Bartholomew's Hospital, &c., &c.

The general hospitals cannot admit nearly all the patients of this class, and many of them need for their recovery skilful and long-continued nursing, under good surgical guidance, and with good food, such as your House of Relief may provide, but such as cannot be had in the homes of the poor.

TIMOTHY HOLMES, Esq., F.R.C.S., late Vice-President of the Royal College of Surgeons, England, Surgeon to St. George's Hospital, &c., &c.


I think it is the greatest want, on the surgical side, of all our medical charities.

It appears incurable only because the means of cure cannot often be obtained by poor children; but it is in reality curable in the great majority of cases, by prolonged rest, care, and good diet. The frequency with which these complaints occur, and the very long duration of their course, even under the most favourable circumstances, make it impossible that all, or nearly all, the children thus afflicted can obtain accommodation at the great general hospitals.

There are very few maladies of which this can be said; and while many of them, for the treatment of which small special hospitals are so often instituted, are amply and most efficiently provided for at the general hospitals, this class of affections deserves a larger space for patients than is at present available. Hence I believe the Institution to deserve, in a high degree, the support of the charitable.
