



Annual Report, 1941.

I N presenting the 76th Annual Report of the work of the Bristol Royal Hospital for Sick Children and Women, the Committee record a year of service under most difficult conditions.

Owing to enemy action the damage done to the building and the fear that such action might be repeated it was considered unsafe to use the upper floors of the Hospital, so that patients have only been admitted to the ground floor wards since February, 1941. But even so 497 patients have been received into these wards.

By arrangement with the Bristol Royal Hospital it was agreed to discontinue the admission of women in order to use what accommodation was available for children, but even this proved insufficient for the number requiring treatment. By collaboration with the Emergency Medical Service a large school at Weston-super-Mare, called Eastern House, was requisitioned and fitted for non-operative cases and has proved of the greatest service. No fewer than 146 cases have been treated there during the year, and it is proposed to retain this Hospital annexe for the war period as an auxiliary to the Bristol Children's Hospital.

The out-patient buildings were destroyed completely and this has entailed the out-patient service being carried on in the main building with considerable inconvenience and some congestion, but yet with efficiency.

These conditions have created enormous difficulties for the Matron and staff and the Committee record their gratitude to and their admiration of Miss Ellis, who with conspicuous success has carried out the Herculean task of superintending the organisation and equipment of Eastern House and after it was opened for the reception of patients has managed that Branch in addition to the Hospital in Bristol, where the difficulties of shortage of staff have been almost insurmountable. They wish therefore to record their very sincere appreciation of the Matron's work on their behalf. They also cordially congratulate her on the well-deserved honour conferred upon her by the award of the M.B.E. which she received from His Majesty the King at Buckingham Palace following the attack on the Hospital by the enemy.

The Casualty Department has attended 1,179 cases.

The Ear, Nose and Throat Clinic has attended 856 cases.

The Asthma Clinic gave 544 treatments.

The Massage and Medical Electricity Department treated 5,629 cases.

An increasing use is being made of the X-Ray Department and the number of skiagrams amounted to 1,391 during the year.

The Hon. Medical Staff are still without the services of Mr. W. A. Jackman and during the year Dr. St. Leger Myles and Mr. Eyre-Brook have been called up for military service.

Mr. J. G. Fry is to be congratulated upon the Schools' Collection which, in spite of the war, has again increased its total to the record sum of $\pm 1,735$ 0s. 0d. The Hospital is greatly indebted to Mr. Fry, the masters and mistresses of the schools, as well as to the children themselves who by their enthusiasm and goodwill have rendered such material service to the Hospital.

The Bristol Education Committee, with their usual public spirit, permitted these collections in the schools and their courtesy is hereby acknowledged.

The Bristol Grammar School has been a strong supporter of the Hospital and the Committee acknowledge their contribution and that of other schools which, owing to the restriction of paper it is impossible to specify individually in this abridged Report.

By the courtesy of the City Authorities the Ladies' Auxiliary were allotted a Flag Day in Bristol on August the 16th. Advantage was taken of this permission to replace

the old house-to-house collection with the street collection. That a sum of £981 5s. 7d. gross was realised at the first effort is a great testimony to the organisation of the Chairman, Mrs. Blandy, and the willing co-operation of a band of helpers and nurses. As this proved so successful it is anticipated that it may displace permanently the house-tohouse collection in the City.

The nett amount with the house collections in districts outside the City boundaries, special contributions and dividends on investments made a total of $\pounds 1,628$ 7s. 0d. from the Ladies' Auxiliary.

The Ladies' Auxiliary has been instrumental in furnishing necessary equipment at Eastern House as well as at the Hospital.

The Needlework Guild has, in spite of many difficulties, continued its work under the Presidency of Mrs. Stanley Wills and the Secretaryship of Miss Laura Wills. In providing bedding and material this Guild has rendered valuable service to the Hospital for many years. New members would be welcomed to take the places of those who cannot serve owing to war conditions.

The members of the 6th Glosters Sewing Party carried on by Mrs. Gibaud and Mrs. Jayne have continued their valuable work.

Thanks are due to some members of the Hallen Women's Institute, who have regularly throughout the year helped Miss Glover, both in the sewing room and at their homes with the large amount of making and mending which a hospital requires.

The Children's Convalescent Home at Weston-super-Mare has been handed over for the war period to the London County Council, but the Committee are continuing their interest in the Home and are ready to resume its management as soon as it comes back into their hands.

The Hospital records its thanks to :- The works Funds ; the various Contributory Schemes ; the Bristol Evening Post

and the *Bristol Evening World* through their Children's Corners; the Churches and Chapels; by gifts and visits from the Clergy and Ministers; and the Sunday Schools for their continued interest in the children of the Hospital.

Special mention should be made of the generous help rendered by the charitable American public, who through Bundles for Britain, Inc. have sent gifts of money and clothing; and the "College of the City of New York" and the "New York University Young America Wants to Help" who with the British Red Cross have contributed valuable gifts of apparatus and bed and other linen.

The Hospital records its thanks to the Hon. Medical Staff for their services during a particularly difficult year. With the widely separated Institutions at Bristol and Westonsuper-Mare, they have not allowed the many long journeys involved to interfere with their care and attention to the patients, and have made light of the adverse conditions when the Hospital building was in a damaged state.

It is with pleasure the Committee thank the whole of the staff of the Hospital for their loyal behaviour during the year, for their kindness and devotion to the patients and the way in which they have carried out their duties.

Lectures have been given to the Nurses by Dr. Beryl Corner in Anatomy and Physiology, Dr. N. Lloyd Price in Medicine, Mr. A. L. Eyre-Brook in Surgery and Miss Millar in Cookery. Examinations have been held and prizes awarded. In addition the Nurses received training for the examinations of the General Nursing Council, the Hospital being a recognised Training School.

The scale of nurses' salaries has been increased for the war period. This has been made possible by the agreement of the Government to give an Exchequer grant towards the additional expenditure incurred by hospitals which give effect to the new uniform scale.

During the year, in which the country has been called upon to endure unparalleled conditions and this particular

Hospital has suffered so much damage from enemy action, it is a matter of thankfulness that the work has continued with only a short interruption. The work in Bristol has been limited, but with Eastern House the number of patients received in the wards has not seriously diminished. It is hoped that in the near future more wards will be opened in Bristol to meet the urgent need for accommodation.

The Committee would again make an appeal for more annual subscribers. The Hospital has been fortunate in having retained most of its subscribers, but owing to abnormal conditions there has been a loss of some friends and more regular contributors are required.

The growing cost of running hospitals is causing great concern and only by the increased generosity of the Public will it be possible to retain the Voluntary Institutions.

A very useful way of subscribing is by signing a Covenant Form whereby a promise is made to continue the subscription for seven years if alive. By this method the income tax can be recovered and while the tax is at 10/- in the $\pounds 1$ the gift is thus doubled.

The Children's Hospital was started in 1857 and with the co-operation of those interested in the welfare of children and the Nation it can be maintained, but without such cooperation it must necessarily fail to afford its maximum service.

OBJECTS OF THE INSTITUTION

1.—To provide for the reception, maintenance and medical and surgical treatment of Children under thirteen years of age, in a suitable building, cheerfully and salubriously placed; to furnish with advice and medicine those who cannot or need not be admitted into the Hospital; and also to receive Women suffering from diseases peculiar to their sex.

2.—To promote the advancement of medical science with reference to the diseases of Women and Children, and to provide for the instruction of Students in these essential departments of medical knowledge.

3.—To diffuse among all classes of the community, and particularly among the poor, a better acquaintance with the management of Infants and Children during health and sickness ; and to assist in the education and training of Women in the special duties of Children's Nurses.




