Annual Report, 1945.

IT is with great pleasure that the Committee present the 80th Annual Report of the work of the Hospital for the year 1945. The Report is again abbreviated in order to conserve paper.

The Committee have to report with great regret the loss by death of a number of valued supporters during the year, including Her Grace the Dowager Duchess of Beaufort who was President of the Ladies' Auxiliary from its foundation in 1900, and had always been closely associated with the Hospital. During these 45 years she had rarely been absent from their Annual Meetings and threw herself whole-heartedly into the work of the Hospital. Sir Stanley Badock, LL.D., J.P., a member of the Election Committee and one of the Trustees of the Hospital. Mr. L. Newsom Morris, M.B., F.R.C.S., who was on the Medical Staff of the Hospital for 39 years and held posts as Resident Medical Officer, Out-Patient Surgeon, In-Patient Surgeon and Consulting Surgeon. Dr. N. Lloyd Price, M.D., M.R.C.P., was Out-Patient Physician and first Shaw Lecturer at the University of Bristol. The fatal termination of his illness cut short a career of great promise.

The Committee has been strengthened by the addition of Alderman F. C. Williams, Chairman of the Bristol Education Committee, and Mr. T. Norman Whitwill, M.A., F.I.C.S., a member of the family of the Founder.

The work of the Hospital, and its associated Hospital, EASTERN HOUSE E.M.S. CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL, WESTON-SUPER-MARE, has continued uninterruptedly during the year, serving the best interests of sick children.

The number of In-Patients during the year was 1,485.

The number of Out-Patients during the year was 10,182, with 36,580 attendances.

The number of Surgical Operations performed in the Theatre was 1,295.

The Casualty Department attended 4,441 patients.

The Ultra Violet Light Department (including Short Wave treatment) has given 5,116 treatments.

The Asthma Clinic has attended 1,718 patients.

The Ear, Nose and Throat Department has attended 1,416 patients.

The Skin Clinic has treated 2,348 patients.

The Massage and Medical Electricity Department has given 5,598 treatments, including breathing exercises.

The X-Ray Department has taken 2,620 Skiagrams in additions to screenings.

The Speech Clinic has given 371 treatments.

The Almoner's Department has arranged convalescence, transport, appliances, etc., for 791 cases.

Owing to building restrictions it has been impossible as yet to rebuild the portions of the Hospital destroyed by enemy action. Arrangements are being made to construct a TEMPORARY OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT on the site of the original building in Royal Fort Road, and huts to serve as NURSES' DINING ROOMS. This will free wards for patients and will bring the Hospital bed complement nearly to full strength. Future requirements will make it necessary to increase the Hospital accommodation very considerably.

The Committee desire to acknowledge their obligation to Mr. H. Chitty and Mr. H. Elwin Harris for deputising in the absence of Mr. Eyre-Brook and Mr. J. Angell James. They welcome the return of these two gentlemen, also Mr. W. A. Jackman and Dr. St. Leger Myles from service in His Majesty's Forces.

THE PRELIMINARY TRAINING SCHOOL has continued to function satisfactorily

The Committee gratefully acknowledges the support and kindness of its many friends which the Hospital has continued to enjoy throughout the year. Their co-operation and willing help has added materially to the comfort and happiness of the inmates of the Hospital.

THE LADIES' COMMITTEE under the Chairmanship of Mrs. Blandy has rendered most valuable service in superintending the

equipment and maintenance of the nursing and domestic departments of the Hospital. Under existing conditions many difficult problems have presented themselves and have been overcome with great benefit to the work and comfort of the staff. The Committee are indebted to the ladies for their kind help.

The Committee congratulate the LADIES' AUXILIARY under the Chairmanship of Mrs. Blandy upon the success of their FLAG DAY which raised in the one day the sum of £916 6s. 8d. In addition there was collected in the country Districts the sum of £99 18s. 2d. The Committee are very grateful for all the hard work and organisation which made this amount possible, and they thank Mrs. Blandy, the Executive Committee and the members for their great effort in support of the funds of the Hospital. It is a great pleasure to the Committee to know that Her Grace the Duchess of Beaufort has consented to become President of the Ladies' Auxiliary in succession to Her Grace the Dowager Duchess of Beaufort.

The Hospital has continued to receive the support of the children through various organisations, Sunday Schools and Children's Services, by personal gifts of money, books and toys. This is most encouraging, and has long been a feature of the Hospital. The co-operation of the children is very welcome.

THE SCHOOLS' COLLECTION.—Again this year the Primary and Secondary Schools of Bristol and District have through their Annual Collection sent a gift of £3,583 in support of the funds. This is a unique effort and the Committee wish to thank Mr. J. G. Fry, the Hon. Secretary, for his untiring enthusiasm and enterprise, the Masters and Mistresses for their work in organising the Collection, and the children themselves for their generous gifts which have made possible this outstanding amount for the year 1945. The total collected by the Primary and Secondary Schools since 1885 is £57,561. 16s. 4d., a truly magnificent record. The Committee appreciate the courtesy of the Bristol Education Committee in giving permission for the collection to be made in their schools.

THE BRISTOL GRAMMAR SCHOOL has achieved another record collection this year. Their contribution to the Hospital funds amounted to £888. 6s. 5d., being an increase of £66. 9s. 2d. on the previous year, which was a record at that time. Their total gift since they commenced their appeal amounts to £11,012. 0s. 0d. and the Ladies' Auxiliary, through which it is paid, wish to thank the Headmaster, Mr. John Garrett, the masters and boys for their splendid gift and for their enthusiasm which made this gift possible.

THE COLSTON GIRLS' SCHOOL, THE CLIFTON HIGH SCHOOL (Juniors), the COLLEGIATE SCHOOL and NORTH-UMBERLAND HOUSE SCHOOL have all supported cots in the Hospital and the Committee are very grateful for this mark of continued interest in the children who are the care of the Committee.

THE BRISTOL EVENING POST, through its Children's Corner, have contributed £310 17s. 9d. in addition to gifts of books and toys sent by "Uncle Bob." The gift is divided to support Cots and a fund for reconditioning the garden and its maintenance. The Committee desire to thank "Uncle Bob" for the inspiration he gives to his "nephews and nieces" and for his personal interest in the Children's Hospital. The Committee would also thank Mrs. Justin of the Olympic Cinema for loaning the theatre for two performances when members of the Children's Corner, *Bristol Evening Post*, were invited, thus stimulating their interest in the Hospital.

THE BRISTOL EVENING WORLD, through its Children's Corner, has continued its gifts to the Hospital. Its members have sent money, books and toys and throughout the year have shown the greatest interest in the Hospital, an interest which has been stimulated by "Uncle Jim" who for many years has been a great friend.

THE TRANSVAAL, SOUTH AFRICA.—The children have again this year sent a gift of £50 through Miss Breedal, and have thus continued their close association with the children of the Home country. The Committee are glad to have this kindly remembrance and thank Miss Breedal and the children of South Africa (Transvaal) for their great and continued kindness.

A gift of £250 was received from the GRAAF REINST WOMEN'S WAR RELIEF AND HOME COMFORTS, JOHANNESBURG, SOUTH AFRICA, per the SOUTH AFRICAN VOLUNTARY SERVICE and the Committee would record their grateful appreciation.

BRITISH SOUTH AFRICAN TRUST FUND FOR AID TO CHILDREN, per their Chairman, Mrs. Keightley-Smith, presented the Hospital with a CONVALESCENT HOME at BURNHAM-ON-SEA. This Home, which is known as Jan Smut's House, stands in two acres of well-stocked garden. It has thirteen rooms and an adjoining building formerly used as a Coach House which it is hoped to convert into a Nurses' Annexe. A gift of £2,000 went with the gift of the property, which is to be used as a Convalescent Home for children between the ages of two and five years. The Committee look forward to the Home becoming an extremely valuable asset to the Hospital. It is close to the sea, yet sheltered

by sand dunes and high trees, forming a wind break, and should prove of the greatest benefit to the patients. The Committee wish to express to Mrs. Keighley-Smith and to the Trustees their very grateful thanks for this generous gift. It forms one more link between South Africa and this country, and will retain its name of "Jan Smut's House," thus forming a memorial to the South African Premier.

The Committee would take this opportunity of expressing their sincere gratitude to "BUNDLES FOR BRITIAN, INC.," U.S.A., who during the war, and particularly after the Hospital was damaged by enemy action, became close friends, and the Committee would thank them very sincerely for all that they did for some six years to assist the Hospital. Special mention should be made of the WINTER PARK BRANCH, FLORIDA, who made this Hospital their special care, and for whose kindness the Committee will remember them with special gratitude. "BUNDLES FOR BRITAIN, INC.," have closed down, but their work in the cause of humanity will always be remembered, and will live on in the work of this Hospital for which they did so much.

THE AMERICAN RED CROSS have been great friends. They have sent the most useful gifts of clothing, medical appliances, foods, etc., and have assisted the Hospital in every way possible, making available many comforts for the children which would otherwise have been difficult to obtain.

THE CANADIAN RED CROSS through their various Branches sent gifts of jam, etc., and by their kindness allowed the children to enjoy jam in proportions which would otherwise have been impossible. The Committee wish to thank the members of the Canadian Red Cross for their great assistance on the domestic side of the Hospital administration.

THE BRITISH RED CROSS SOCIETY, U.S.A., sent gifts of clothing which have proved extremely useful and much appreciated.

AUSTRALIA.—The LORD MAYOR OF MELBOURNE sent gifts of sweets on behalf of friends in Melbourne per the Lord Mayor of Bristol, giving great pleasure to the children in these days of rationing.

The Committee acknowledge the services of the VOLUNTARY CAR POOL which provided transport for patients and whose generous service has assisted the work of the Hospital.

A cheque for £1,245. 9s. 2d. was received for the endowment of a Cot in perpetuity on behalf of the FIREGUARDS OF BRISTOL,

to bear a tablet expressing appreciation of assistance afforded by the Hospitals during the second world war. The Committee feel that it is a great honour to have this Cot so named in the Hospital and are very grateful to the Fireguards.

In addition to this, gifts made available by allocation from their funds and by sale of equipment have been received from many branches of the Bristol Fireguards and have been warmly appreciated.

A cheque for £1,000 was received from the LORD MAYOR OF BRISTOL'S WAR SERVICE COUNCIL to assist in the purchase and erection of Huts to provide temporary additional accommodation, and the Committee wish to express their grateful appreciation.

The Committee desire to thank Captain Hughes Hallett, D.S.O., R.N., the Officers and ratings of H.M.S. *Jamaica* for continued kindness during the year. They have sent gifts and shown the most friendly interest in the work of the Hospital and its patients. Their visit to the Hospital will always be remembered as a red letter day in its history.

The Committee thank MISS S. K. WEBB for the gift of a piano. The interest of Miss Webb in the Hospital with which she was once associated is very much valued.

The gift of an AMBULANCE presented to the Hospital by the AMERICAN RED CROSS has proved of great assistance in providing transport, and the Committee express their thanks for this valuable addition to the equipment of the Hospital.

A gift of chocolate was received from the OPTIMIST CLUB OF TORONTO, CANADA, and provided an addition to the sweet supply provided for the children.

It was gratifying to the Committee to receive a gift of £271 15s. 10d. voted to the Hospital by the members of the POLICE WAR RESERVE, BRISTOL CONSTABULARY, celebrating the closing of their Service. They desired that some piece of apparatus should be purchased and that a tablet be attached bearing their name. Mr. Gordon Boyd, Hon. Treasurer, received the gift at a meeting of the Police War Reserve on behalf of the Committee, who desire to express their grateful thanks for the honour done this Hospital in making it a memorial to a Service the members of which came from all parts of the country.

THE CHILDREN'S CONVALESCENT HOME AT WESTON-SUPER-MARE continues to be leased to the Waifs and Strays Society.

The Committee wish to express in the highest possible terms their thanks and appreciation for the willing and efficient service which the staff of the Hospital have rendered to them during the past year. Through all the disabilities and discomforts of the war period they have carried out their duties with cheerfulness and good-will—there are no exceptions. Matron, her nursing and domestic staffs, have borne the brunt of the burden, ably seconded by the Pharmacist, the Masseuse, the Almoner, with their staffs. Last, but not least, the Secretary and his staff have had an extremely difficult time, but the work has been well carried out. All these in their several capacities have pulled their weight and done yeoman service and the Committee give them their cordial thanks.

The cost of running the Hospital has considerably increased as the result of the adoption of Government recommendations for salaries, the increased cost of food, drugs and equipment, and the Committee would ask the continued and increased support of all those who feel that the care of children is a first claim and will gladly welcome the co-operation of the citizens in the work of the Bristol Children's Hospital.

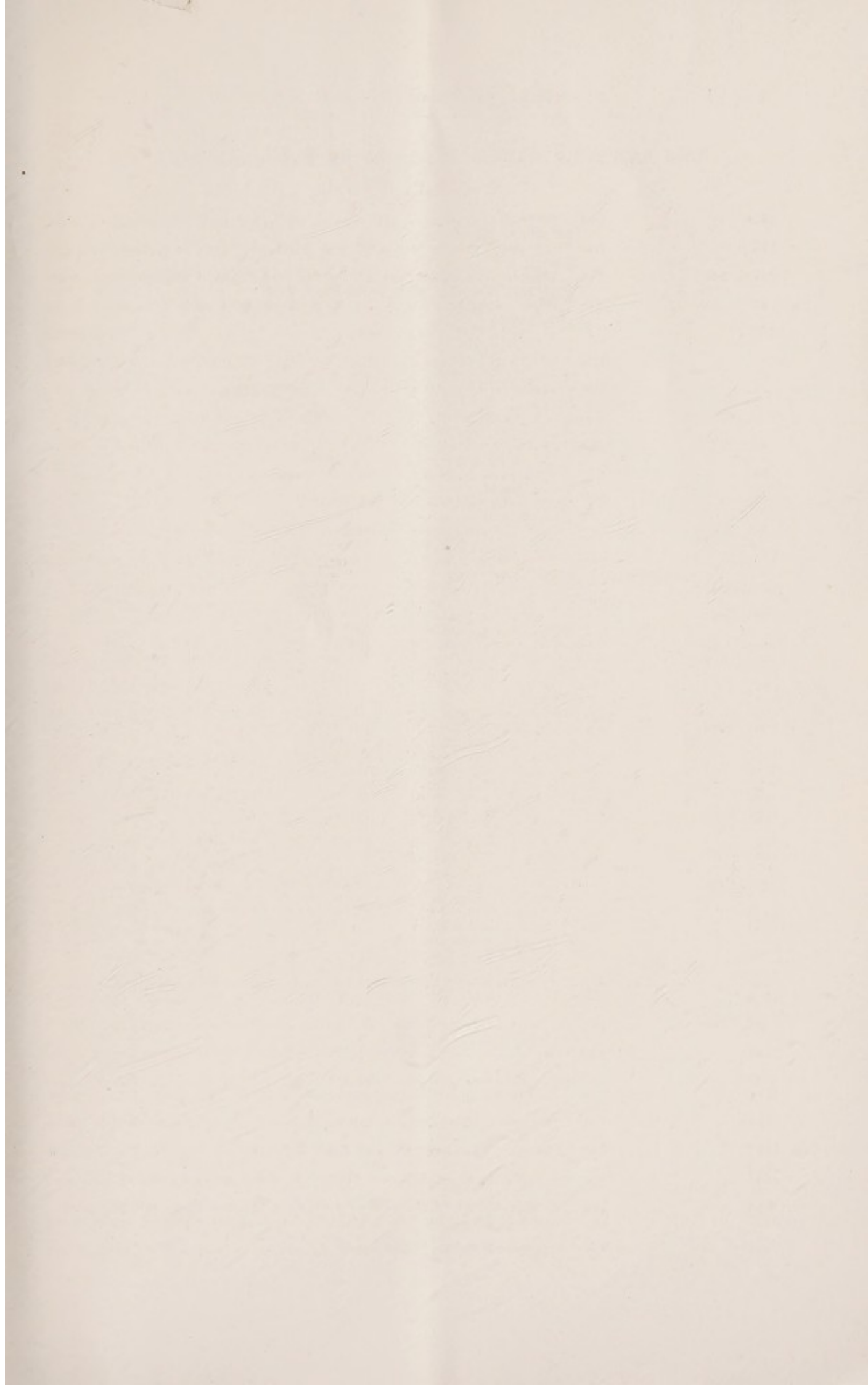

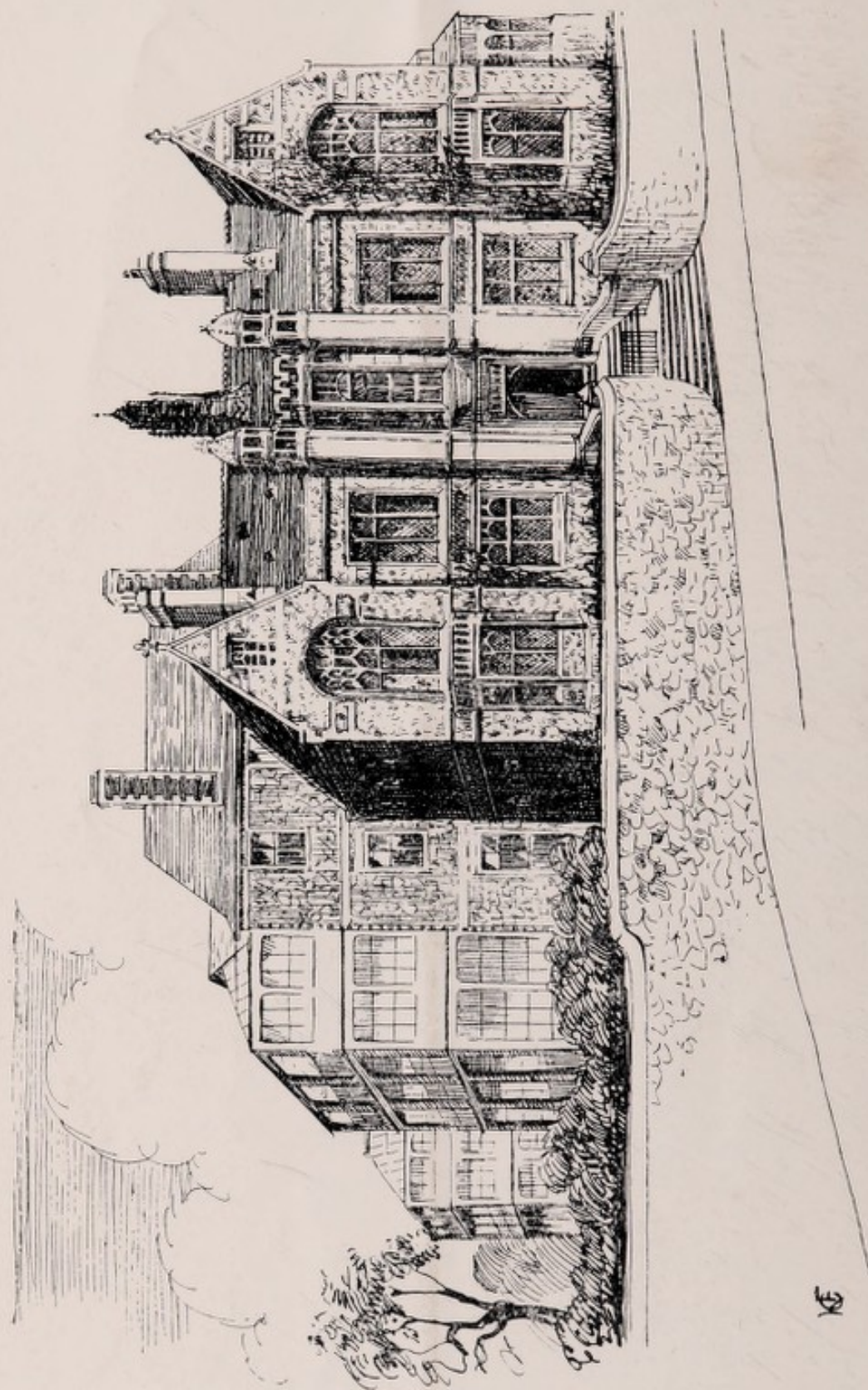
