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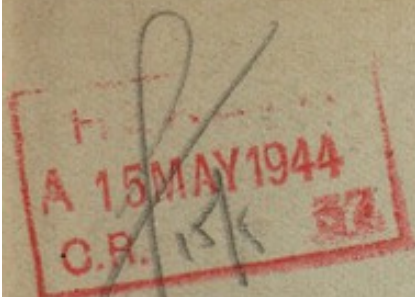
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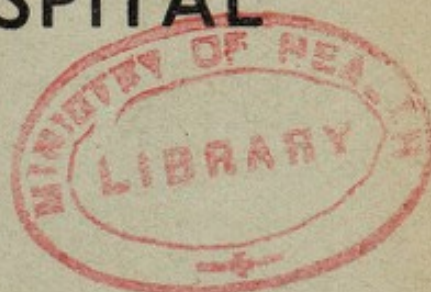

Regulations as to the Admission of Patients.

No letters of recommendation are required, the only qualification for admission necessary being SICKNESS AND CHILDHOOD.

Any suitable case that may come under the notice of Subscribers has only to be brought to the Hospital, when it will be treated as far as the resources of the Institution will admit.

IN-PATIENTS.

In-Patients, with certain exceptions, are required to pay for maintenance, according to a scale fixed by the House Committee.

In-Patients are admitted daily from 11 to 12 o'clock. Applicants must be accompanied by the mother or other adult person. Urgent cases are admitted at any time.

No infectious cases are admissible, nor must be brought to the Hospital on any pretext.

In all cases the applicant for admission should be brought to the Hospital.

OUT-PATIENTS.

Boys up to the age of 12, and Girls up to 14, suffering from any illness not of an infectious character, may be brought to the Hospital for Treatment as Out-Patients any Tuesday or Thursday, at 2-0 o'clock.

The mother or other responsible adult must accompany each child. Children must **NOT** be brought to the Hospital if there is any infectious illness at the home.

Each patient should bring a bottle for medicine, and a small jar for ointment.

EXTRACT FROM RULE 4.

"The Board of Management shall have power to refuse admission to, or discharge a Patient from the Hospital; and to make, when they think fit, a charge for maintenance."

REPORT

for the year ending 31st December, 1943.

Submitted at the Annual Court of Governors, February 18th, 1944.

THE Board of Management begs leave to present to the Governors the Sixty-first Annual Report.

The following figures will be of interest to show the work that has been done in the Hospital during the year under review, together with the figures of the previous year for comparative purposes:—

Of the 2,279 In-patients treated, 2,164 were discharged cured or relieved; and 51 remained in the Hospital at the end of the year.

The amount received from patients and Contributory Schemes for the past year has been £1,160/13/0 compared with £978/11/7.

The amount recovered on account of Income Tax return is £549/9/0, which includes £169/5/6 refund under Deeds of Covenant.

During the year under review, there have been two changes in the Resident Medical Officers. Dr. Eglin was appointed House Physician and House Surgeon, and

on the termination of his appointment, Miss Rosenblum was appointed House Physician, and Miss Bloom, House Surgeon.

The Board desires to express its thanks to all subscribers to the funds of the Hospital, and in doing so would ask that consideration should be given to the useful work for the cure and improvement effected in children's ailments.

It will be seen from the summary that the patients from outside Bradford were in hospital 4,938 days, at a total cost of £3,837/16/2 to the Institution.

The Board of Management also desires to express its hearty thanks to all who have given personal service during the past year; and its special thanks are due to the Hon. Medical Staff for the efficient and loving care that has been shown by them to our suffering little patients.

The Board desires to express its thanks to the Matron and Nurses for their kindly attention to the children, and their work and efforts towards the Hospital services.

Messrs. H. E. Wood, W. G. Johnson and R. Woodhead were elected as our representatives on the Bradford and District Hospital Fund Executive.

This year, the Board has received from the Bradford and District Hospital Fund the handsome sum of £7,689/3/5, and, in expressing its thanks for this donation, feels that too much praise cannot be given to the workers of this organisation and to those who have assisted in the collection of funds.

Rushcliffe Report.

At the beginning of the year, the Report of the Committee appointed by the Minister of Health, known as the Rushcliffe Committee, issued their first Report on Salaries and Emoluments of Female Nurses in Hospitals. This report not only recommended increased payments and emoluments, but also increased holidays and holiday allowances for the staffs of all hospitals.

Conditionally on the whole of the Report being adopted, with the exception of the adoption at a later date of the 96-hour fortnight, the Ministry of Health are

prepared to make grants towards the cost of the increased expenses.

The Board, having given consideration to the Report, decided that, so far as this Hospital is concerned, the Report shall be put into operation as from the 1st April, 1943. This has meant considerable increases in the salaries of the Nursing Staff.

The Committee also decided that a weekly allowance should be made to the Maids whilst they are away from the Hospital on holiday.

New Hospital for Children.

During the year the Board has given careful consideration to the question of building a new Children's Hospital, which will serve not only Bradford but areas outside the City as well.

This has become necessary owing to the need for further accommodation and in order to keep abreast with the ever-increasing requirements of modern Medical and Surgical treatment. The Board is quite satisfied that this object could not be adequately attained by any alteration or extension of the present buildings, and a much larger site would be required than is available at the present situation.

It has been suggested that the new Hospital should provide for at least 150 patient beds, with facilities for extension up to 250 or 300 if required.

It is further intended that the Administration Block and Nurses' Home should be built large enough to serve any extension to the Hospital which may be found necessary at a later date.

British Legion.

At the beginning of the War it was considered necessary to obtain the services of a number of men to act as Stretcher Bearers to handle Civil Casualties which might be admitted to the Hospital, and also to act as Fire Guards. Volunteers were asked for at the Heaton and Chellow Grange Branch of the British Legion and in the locality, and a ready response obtained.

Some forty men, mostly members of the British Legion, have been enrolled. They are ready for any emergency, and have done much valuable work in

maintaining a nightly reserve at the Hospital, and in the case of alerts have helped in moving the children to and from the Air Raid Shelter. These services have been greatly appreciated by the Hospital Staff.

Legacies.

A number of Legacies have been received during the year, which, in accordance with the decision of the Board, have been put to a Hospital Capital Account instead of being shown as a part of the Income and Expenditure. The Board expresses its appreciation for the great assistance given by such bequests, and are hoping for continued help in years to come.

The Board is extremely sorry to record the serious illness of Mr. Thomas, the Collector, who is at the present time in the Winwick Emergency Hospital, having had an operation on the spine. It is, however, pleased to report signs of improvement, and it is hoped that he will soon be able to take up his duties.

During the past year a considerable amount of extra work on Government reports has been entailed. This has been efficiently dealt with by Mr. Longley and his small staff; special mention may be made of Mrs. Normington, whose work has been particularly helpful.

On Dec. 28th, the Lord Mayor and Lady Mayoress (Ald. W. H. Barraclough, J.P., and Mrs. Barraclough), with the Deputy Lord Mayor, Counc. D. Hellewell, and Mrs. Hellewell, visited the Hospital. The Lady Mayoress distributed the gifts from the Christmas Tree, Mr. J. H. Thomas undertaking the role of 'Father Christmas.' The event gave much pleasure to the children.

Mr. Fattorini, in thanking the Lord Mayor and Lady Mayoress, said how much their visit was appreciated. He also made a short statement on the work and needs of the Hospital.

In reply, the Lord Mayor expressed his and the Lady Mayoress's pleasure at being present, and his appreciation of the appearance of the Hospital, and commended the work done.

Report of the Ladies' Committee, 1943.

THE Ladies' Committee have held meetings quarterly during the year. Owing to so many of the members being engaged on important war work, the attendances have been fewer. The milk restrictions, etc., have prevented the regular visiting of the children in their homes after leaving the Hospital, but this will be resumed at the earliest opportunity.

At Christmas, toys were distributed to each of the children, and the Lord Mayor (Ald. W. H. Barraclough, J.P.) and the Lady Mayoress (Mrs. Barraclough) were present, together with members of the Board and Ladies' Committee, and the Committee are also most grateful to the many friends who in various ways helped to make Christmas a happy time for the children.

Although the Committee realises at present, owing to various restrictions, that it is not so easy to collect tinfoil, they sincerely trust that well-wishers of the Hospital will collect all they can as this is a valuable source of revenue.

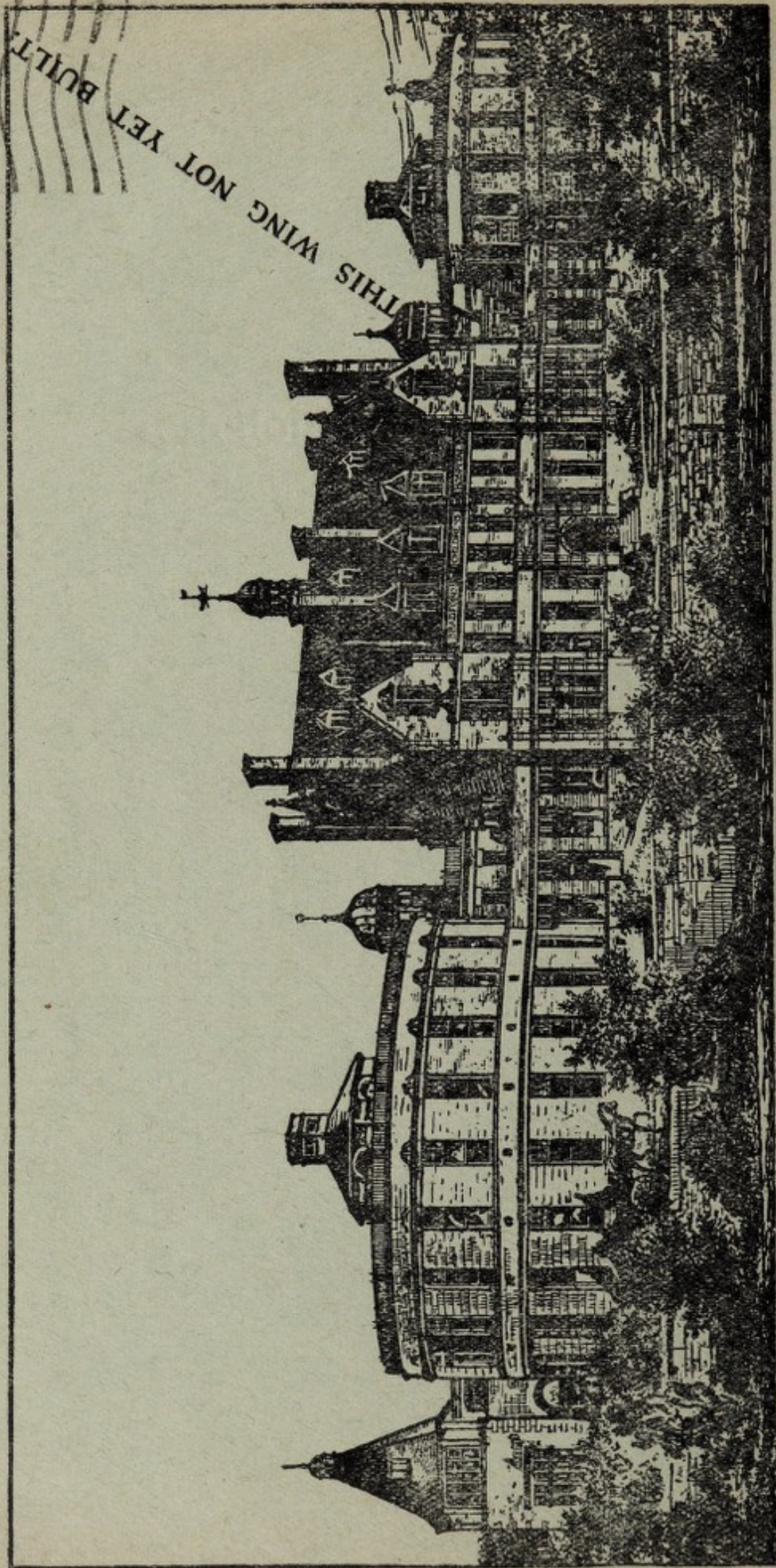
