### HISTORY

IN view of the admitted need in South London for increased Hospital accommodation for Children, the Governors of THE BELGRAVE HOSPITAL FOR CHILDREN (founded in Pimlico in 1866) decided to transfer that Institution to the present site situate in the Clapham Road, at the corner of its junction with Prima Road and close to St. Mark's Church, thus placing the Hospital in the midst of a large working population in South London, for whom there was no such accommodation.

The existing accommodation at that time in Hospitals for Children in the Metropolis was represented by one cot for 12,560 head of population on the South side, as compared with one cot for 3,523 head on the North side of the Thames, and this difference was increasing by the migration of occupants of demolished small tenements. The population on the South side is, moreover, poorer than on the North side.


The Select Committee of the House of Lords (1892) urged the provision of further Hospital accommodation in the district, and this has subsequently been emphasized in the public press.

In 1900 the building in Clapham Road was commenced, but owing to lack of funds only the East Wing, the Centre Block, the Out-Patients' Department, and the Ground Floor of the South Wing were erected. This portion of the Hospital was opened by H.R.H. THE PRINCESS BEATRICE for the treatment of patients in 1903. In 1923 the Executors of the late Mr. WILLIAM SHEPHERD, through the kindness of his son, Sir Percy Shepherd, made a grant of £9,000 to complete the South Wing. The work was finished early in 1924, and the Wing, named the "William Shepherd Wing," was opened in February, 1924, by His Royal Highness The PRINCE OF WALES.

At this time the Nursing Staff were housed in three different places, some in the Hospital and the remainder in two houses some distance apart-a most inconvenient and unsatisfactory arrangement. The erection of the South Wing

### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT

### To the Governors

OF THE

### Belgrave Bospital for Children

(INCORPORATED)

In presenting their Eightieth Annual Report on the work of the Hospital for the year 1946, the Committee of Management have pleasure in reporting that, in spite of difficulties, the first year of Peace has seen a substantial increase in its service to the public in all branches of the Hospital's activities.

At the same time the Committee would stress the urgent necessity, in the interests of our public, for developing the resources of the Hospital to their full capacity and thus fulfilling the original intentions of the Governors and the design of the Hospital. This visualised the provision of a separate Nurses' Home, which would permit the opening of two additional Wards and an increase in our bed complement from 66 to 104.

### National Health Service Act.

The introduction of the Act makes it inevitable that the Hospital should sacrifice its independence, though not its individuality, in order to take its proper place in the national scheme. Whatever regrets there may be at the passing of the old order, there is the satisfaction of knowing that the Hospital has much which it can contribute in its new role as the Pædiatric unit of a large Teaching Hospital.

With this in mind, negotiations have been opened for amalgamation with a Teaching Hospital in order to ensure our future and it is probable that the amalgamation will be completed during the year. That more than one of the large Teaching Hospitals should seek our co-operation is, in itself, a tribute to the past and present members of the Staff who have helped to raise the Hospital to its present status. The following figures demonstrate the development of the Hospital since it was rebuilt on its present site, and its steady recovery from the effects of the War:—

### The Year's Work.

In-Patients.—The number of In-Patients has increased by nearly 25 per cent. (1,730 against 1,351 last year), and the average number of beds occupied was 46'8 compared with 42'4 last year. The latter figure is necessarily influenced by infection.

The total admissions are restricted by the average residence of patients, and this, in recent years, tends to decrease. While the average residence was 21'8 days in 1909, 22'7 in 1918, 10'9 in 1931 and 14'05 in 1935, the figures for normal periods during the past ten years fluctuate between 10'6 and 12'3.

Out of a total of 1,730 admissions, 343 were medical and 1,387 were surgical cases.

Out-Patients.—The work of the Out-Patients' Department has increased by 30 per cent. The number of new cases being 11,668 compared with 8,067, and the total attendances being 37,068 compared with 24,254.

Although the O.P. Department dealt with a total attendance of no less than 70,600 in 1928, modern methods of treatment and the time now devoted to each patient will make it impossible to cope with larger numbers without more staff and more accommodation.

Much credit is due to the existing staff for the smooth efficient working of the Department, and steps are being taken to increase the accommodation and improve the comfort of patients. A Canteen has already been provided and the appointment system is in force.

Operations.—The number of operations in the theatre increased to 1,195, compared with 849 in 1945. These comprised 174 major and 1,021 minor operations.

In addition, 391 minor operations were performed in the O.P. Department.

Pathological Department.—This Department, which is still in process of development, completed a total of 4,517 examinations, including:—

The work of the Department is increasing rapidly, and plans are in hand for enlarging the Laboratory to cope with the increase in both In-Patients and Out-Patients and the potential increase in our bed complement.

Radiological Department.—The work of the Department increased by 65 per cent. compared with last year. A total of 1,951 radiographic examinations were made representing approximately 5,000 exposures.

The increase necessitated the employment of a whole-time radiographer, and it is anticipated that the total number of cases will exceed 2,500 next year.

With this in mind, it is hoped to replace the existing apparatus with gear of more modern design and higher output, with consequent improvement in the standard and scope of the examinations.

Physiotherapy Department.—The Department handled a substantial increase in work with total attendance amounting to 2,626. The treatments comprised:—

Massage ... ... 1,124 Remedial Exercises ... 1,657 Sunlight and Electrical ... 246 The increase in work necessitated the employment of an Assistant Physiotherapist and it is now possible to cope with all cases requiring treatment. A modern Infra-Red and Radiant Heat Lamp has been installed and also some new gymnastic apparatus.

Almoner's Department.—The employment of a qualified Almoner has resulted in the steady development of the Department in all branches of its activities.

Payments from patients, which are increasing, are based on the most careful enquiries as to the patients' circumstances, and although the sums involved are not large the source of this revenue is now, we feel, being spread with greater justice to the varied means of individual patients.

The social-service activities of this Department have increased considerably during the year. The parent of every patient is, if possible, interviewed at the first attendance with a view to assisting the case and providing any immediate service which may be necessary or, alternatively, putting the parent in touch with the appropriate public service which can advise or assist.

This work, which is much appreciated by the public, forms a very large proportion of the Department's activities and is a valuable and indispensable adjunct to the Hospital's service. It is developing rapidly and will necessitate expansion of the Department in proportion to the increase in patients' attendances.

Much useful work has been done in conjunction with District Nurses, Health Visitors, I.C.A.A., N.S.P.C.C., Education Authorities, and numerous other organisations. The closest co-operation is maintained with these bodies and local workers.

Convalescent Home, Minstead.—The Home is limited to ten beds and the daily average occupied throughout the year was 9.5. There is a keen demand for admission. The value of the work being done at the Home can be seen in the great improvement in the conditions of all patients who are admitted.

There is, at present, a demand for additional convalescent beds and the Committee inspected another vacant Home, but decided against opening the second Home in view of the present temporary difficulty in securing adequate staff and material.

### Finance.

The sharp increase in the cost of maintenance is due to an increase of staff in several Departments as well as to the general increase in salaries and wages and the high cost of all materials.

While reporting the increase in Expenditure, the Committee are glad to note, also, a marked increase in Income, showing an excess of £394 over Expenditure.

For this satisfactory result we are largely indebted to the enthusiasm and energy of Lady Rothermere, whose appeals and entertainments during the year have contributed more than £12,000. The Hospital is indeed fortunate in the substantial and personal interest which Lady Rothermere has taken in our welfare.

In addition, the Committee wish to express their gratitude to King Edward's Hospital Fund for their substantial contributions and to the Hospital Sunday Fund, the Hospital Saturday Fund, and the Hospital Savings Association for their sustained support.

Restrictions on paper make it impossible to name all those Subscribers and Donors who are regular supporters of the Hospital, but we are deeply grateful for their assistance.

### Committee of Management.

The resignation of Mrs. Hardy Young and Mr. J. P. R. Lyell are reported with the greatest regret. Their wise counsel and generous support will be sorely missed and the Committee wish to place on record their deep appreciation of their services to the Hospital.

In accordance with the Articles of Association the following four members retire but are eligible for re-election:—Mr. J. E. C. Eaton, Mrs. Crosthwaite Eyre, Squadron-Leader A. E. R. Gilligan, and Mr. J. P. Ward.

### Medical Staff.

On their retirement, the Committee desire to express their thanks to Mr. M. F. Nicholls and Mr. A. White who, in view of their long and valuable service to the Hospital, have been appointed Consulting Surgeon and Consulting Dental Surgeon, respectively.

Much credit is due to those members of the Staff who bore the weight of the Hospital's work during the War years. The return of members from the Services has eased the strain and the following new appointments have been made:—

The Bye Laws have been amended to permit the appointment of women practitioners to the Medical Staff.

### Resident Medical Officers.

The Committee wish to acknowledge the heavy burden of work which has been borne by the Resident Medical Officers, whose high standard has been reflected in recent successes in the examination for the D.C.H.

### Nursing Staff.

The recruitment of Student Nurses improved during 1946. 23 candidates entered and wastage decreased to one-third as against last year when two-thirds of the entries gave up training during their first year.

The Preliminary Training School, which has been moved to Walton-on-Thames, is now well established in its new site and, when all alterations are completed, will be a more efficient training school and provide for better conditions for the students.

In order to continue as a complete Training School application has been made to the G.N.C. for permission to affiliate with Victoria Hospital for Children for training purposes. This would provide the necessary complement of beds. Sanction is still awaited.

The standard of nursing remains at the highest level and we are fortunate in having a Matron and Staff whose devotion and loyalty to the Hospital and its patients is exceptional.

The Nurses have organised and developed their own social club which they manage themselves with the help of Miss Ash-

brook, the Sister Tutor, and they are grateful to those who have sent books for their Library.

In 1945, under the leadership of Nurse Jex, the Nurses opened a Fund with a Target of £1,000 to endow a "Thanksgiving Cot". To collect this amount they undertook all manner of tasks including cleaning shoes, repairing clothes and one Nurse contributed £90 by selling old clothes which she collected. By March, 1947, they had collected £1,197 and the Fund was closed with a final contribution of £351 contributed by the Metropolitan Police as the result of a Boxing Tournament on their behalf. The Cot, which is in Martineau Ward, has already been unveiled by the Bishop of Southwark and will always remain as a tribute to the fine spirit which exists amongst the Nursing Staff of this Hospital.

### Other Staff.

The Committee extend their grateful thanks to Mr. T. Clapham who has retired after over 30 years service as Secretary of the Hospital. Mr. Clapham has served the hospital through the years of its development and the difficult war period, and he has the best wishes of all in his retirement. In recognition of his services to the Hospital he was presented with a silver Cigarette Box by the Committee of Management and Staff.

Miss Korner, who retired after 19 years service as Appeals Secretary, was entertained by the Ladies' Association and presented with a silver Tea Caddy to mark their appreciation of her work.

### Honorary Officers.

The death of the Rev. J. Darlington removed one who has been Honorary Chaplain to the hospital for a great many years. Dr. Darlington had been vicar of this Parish for nearly 50 years and his loss will be keenly felt.

The Committee wish to place on record their appreciation of the valuable services rendered by Messrs. Coward, Chance & Co. (Honorary Solicitors) and Messrs. Morrish, Walters & Co. (Honorary Auditors). The introduction of the National Health Act has considerably extended the scope of their work and we are deeply grateful for their advice and services.

### Organisations associated with the Hospital.

The Ladies' Association.—The association completed a very successful programme during the year with Lady Dorothy Charteris

as President, Mrs. Stewart-Richardson as Chairman, and Mrs. Dent as Hon. Secretary.

Early in the year a Victory Ball at the Officers' Sunday Club realised £420 and thanks are due to Mrs. Corfield, the Dowager Marchioness of Townshend and to Nina, Countess Granville for the success of this function.

Lady Rothermere, to whom we are deeply grateful, organised a series of Appeals the results of which exceeded all previous years. With characteristic enthusiasm she enlisted the assistance of a large number of supporters. Her first Appeal realised £2,080, followed by £12,200 from the Greyhound Meeting and £5,500 from the Film Premiere of "Great Expectations" which was graced by the presence of the Duchess of Kent. These amounts were shared with the Victoria Hospital for Children.

We are indeed grateful to Mr. Gentle for the success of the Greyhound Meeting, to Mr. Rank for the Film Premiere, and to Mr. Forsyth and Mr. Millikin for their generous assistance.

Amongst other events in an eventful year, the Christmas Raffle raised £415, and the Christmas Fair at the Hospital realised £218 through the enthusiasm and energy of our many devoted supporters.

Since the close of the year the Association has made grants of £400 to the Convalescent Home and £150 to provide curtains, cushions, etc., for the new Nurses' Home in Prima Road.

Robins.—We number the Robins amongst our most ardent supporters and congratulate them on contributing £321 to our hospital during the year.

A new generation of Robins is gradually bringing us new recruits and it is hoped to develop the organization.

A Robins' Christmas Party at the Belgian Club was well attended in December and it is hoped to have a Summer Party at the Chessington Zoo shortly.

The Childer Chaine.—During the difficult war period 1939-45 this energetic organisation has raised no less than £1,258, of which £1,200 was paid to the Hospital in support of the eight Cots which they have named. They propose to persevere further until the Chaine has named a whole ward.

Since 1910, the Chaine has contributed £13,150 to the Hospital and we are indeed grateful to Mr. Watts, Mr. Ridley, Mr. Camden-Pratt, Miss Gadsby, and the whole company of members and Associates who have achieved this magnificent result.

### The Future.

The projected amalgamation with a Teaching Hospital opens a new stage in the development of the Hospital. For the next year, therefore, the policy of the Committee must be to repair the ravages of the war years, to modernise our equipment, to increase our Bed complement and generally prepare the hospital for its role as part of a teaching unit.

With this in mind the Committee have already commenced the redecoration of the interior of the hospital, have ordered the installation of new boilers to improve heating, an additional Consulting Room in the O.P. Dept., and have furnished and opened 2 houses in Prima Road to accommodate Nurses. All at a cost exceeding £4,000.

In addition, during the current year, the Committee are considering the expansion of the Pathological Department and the renewal of our X-Ray equipment which would cost a further £4,000. Efforts are also being made to find further accommodation for our Nurses which would enable more Wards to be equipped and opened.

While the introduction of the National Health Act will relieve us of financial anxiety for all normal expenditure the Committee feel that the hospital will always need private funds to maintain our service at its traditional high level, and they therefore rely on the generosity of our old supporters to help the hospital through its next and greater stage of development.

The Executive Committee have the honour to present their Forty-third Annual Report on the work of the year 1946.

With the introduction of the National Health Service Act a natural reluctance on the part of the Public to make private contributions to Voluntary Hospitals, has increased the difficulties of the Committee. In spite of these difficulties the Ladies' Association has had a successful year; receipts being £1,346 compared with £1,479 last year.

For this we are indebted to the energy and enthusiasm of those members who have generously continued their support and who, we hope, will uphold the Association through the present year which is likely to be the most difficult period in the history of the Hospital.

Early in the year a Victory Ball at the Officers' Sunday Club realised £420 and our thanks are due to Mrs. Corfield, the Dowager Marchioness of Townshend and to Nina, Countess Granville for the success of this function.

We are deeply grateful to Lady Rothermere whose series of Appeals and Entertainments during 1946 have brought the Hospital the highest income throughout its history and enabled the Hospital to cover its expenditure. This is probably unique at the present stage of national developments and we extend our congratulations, as well as gratitude, to Lady Rothermere for this achievement. Although the proceeds of her Appeals have not passed through the accounts of the Ladies' Association we feel that, as one of our Members, her activities should be recorded in our Report.

The Christmas Fair at the Hospital realised £227 together with £429 from the Competition. Amongst the stallholders who contributed to this result were Lady Georgina Coleridge, Mrs. Hooper, Mrs. McCrae, Mrs. Reynolds, Miss Milne, Miss McCormick, Miss Pearson, Miss Smith, Miss Jarrett, Nurse Maltby and Nurse Lewis.

During 1946 the Association gave £495 to the General Funds of the Hospital and, since the close of the year, a further £400 has been given to the Convalescent Home and £150 has been earmarked to provide curtains and cushions for the new Nurses' Home.

We regret to record the resignation of Lady Granville from whom, as Chairman of the Association, the Hospital has always received such generous support. She has been succeeded by Mrs. Stewart-Richardson.

Membership of the Association has been considerably depleted during the War and the Committee hope that the remaining members will do their utmost to introduce new Members. The Hospital will always be in need of private funds in order to maintain the high standard of service which has become a tradition at the Hospital, and it is only through organisations such as the Ladies' Association that it will be possible to maintain this standard and to continue the small extra services which make all the difference in the medical treatment of sick children.





made it necessary that further accommodation for the Nurses should be provided, before both the additional Wards could be put into use. It was, therefore, decided to build the remaining West Wing, and so complete the Hospital as originally designed, to use it temporarily for Nurses' quarters until such time as funds were available to build a proper Nurses' Home, and by this means bring the Nursing Staff under one roof. The building was commenced in January, 1925, and was completed in April, 1926, at a total cost, including the equipment and furniture, of nearly £30,000. In raising this sum the Committee was deeply indebted to the Executors of the late Mr. William Shepherd for a further munificent contribution of £12,000.

In 1936 a site was acquired at the rear of the Hospital, and plans were prepared for a Nurses' Home and a new Out-Patients' Department. The outbreak of war in 1939 caused the Committee to postpone this further extension until hostilities had ceased.

In 1938 a bequest by the late Miss M. P. Eyre provided a Convalescent Home, known as "Tom's Lane Corner," Minstead, Lyndhurst, a delightful house and grounds, together with a substantial endowment for its maintenance. This is a most valuable adjunct to the Hospital, and many children will derive great benefit by a few weeks' stay in the heart of the New Forest.
