ANNUAL REPORT

FOR THE YEAR 1947

HISTORY

IN view of the admitted need in South London for increased Hospital accommodation for Children, the Governors of THE BELGRAVE HOSPITAL FOR CHILDREN (founded in Pimlico in 1866) decided to transfer that Institution to the present site situate in the Clapham Road, at the corner of its junction with Prima Road and close to St. Mark's Church, thus placing the Hospital in the midst of a large working population in South London, for whom there was no such accommodation.

The existing accommodation at that time in Hospitals for Children in the Metropolis was represented by one cot for 12,560 head of population on the South side, as compared with one cot for 3,523 head on the North side of the Thames, and this difference was increasing by the migration of occupants of demolished small tenements. The population on the South side is, moreover, poorer than on the North side.

The Select Committee of the House of Lords (1892) urged the provision of further Hospital accommodation in the district, and this has subsequently been emphasized in the public press.

In 1900 the building in Clapham Road was commenced, but owing to lack of funds only the East Wing, the Centre Block, the Out-Patients' Department, and the Ground Floor of the South Wing were erected. This portion of the Hospital was opened by H.R.H. THE PRINCESS BEATRICE for the treatment of patients in 1903. In 1923 the Executors of the late Mr. WILLIAM SHEPHERD, through the kindness of his son, Sir PERCY SHEPHERD, made a grant of £9,000 to complete the South Wing. The work was finished early in 1924, and the Wing, named the "William Shepherd Wing," was opened in February, 1924, by His Royal Highness The PRINCE OF WALES.

At this time the Nursing Staff were housed in three different places, some in the Hospital and the remainder in two houses some distance apart—a most inconvenient and unsatisfactory arrangement. The erection of the South Wing

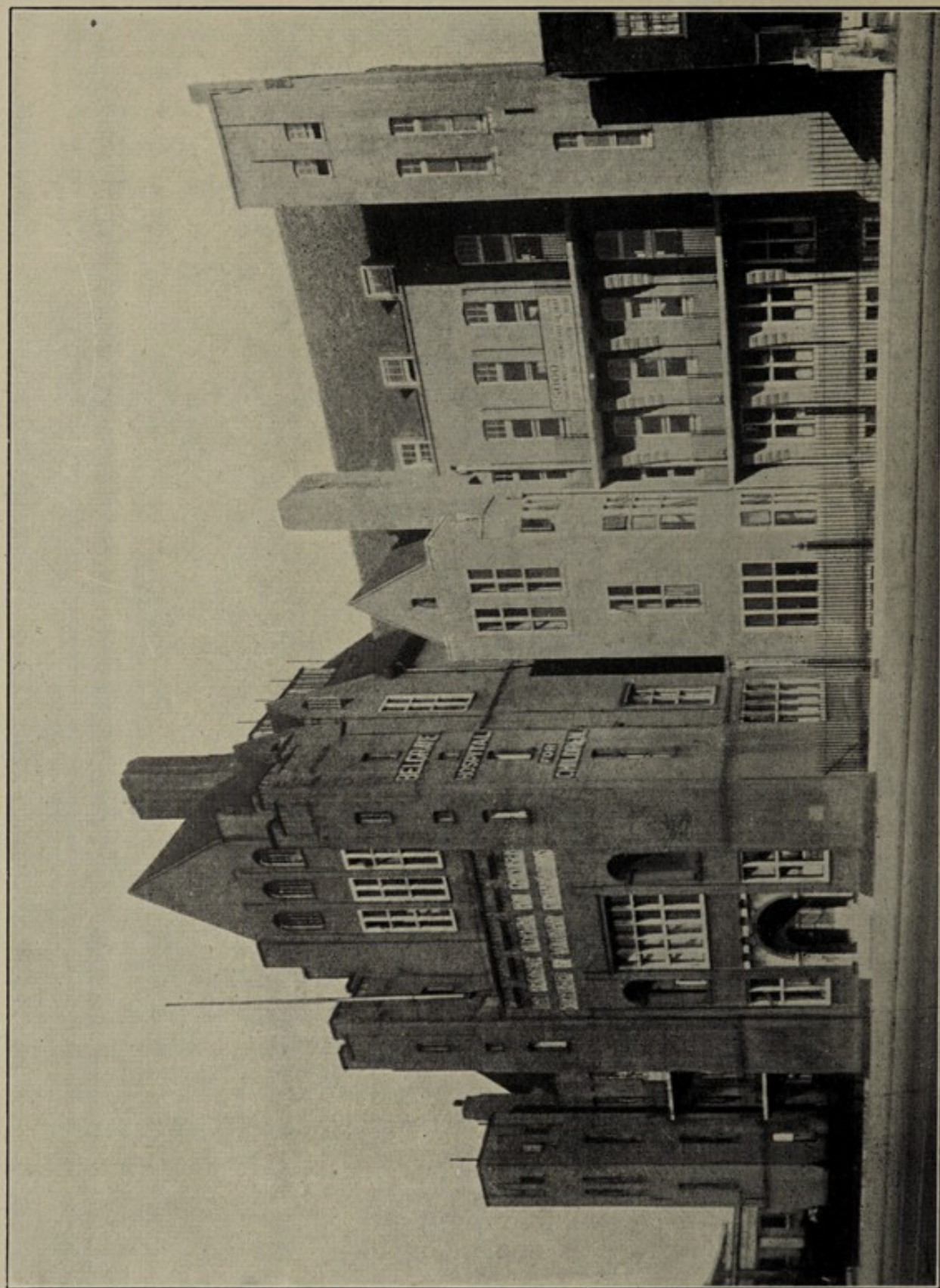

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT

In their Eighty-first Annual Report on the work of the Hospital for the year 1947, the last complete year under the Voluntary system, the Committee of Management have pleasure in placing on record the following statistics which illustrate the growth of the Hospital since it was founded in Pimlico 82 years ago. These, it is felt, are an eloquent tribute to the countless workers and supporters who maintained and developed the Hospital under the Voluntary system and who have laid the foundation for the part which the Hospital will take in the National Health Service :—

National Health Service Act

As was envisaged in the last Report, our amalgamation with King's College Hospital has been approved by the Ministry of Health, and our close association with that Hospital is already an accomplished fact. Reciprocal representation on the Management and Medical Committee has already been effected and steps are being taken, progressively, to interlock points of policy and staff appointments wherever this is necessary. Undergraduate teaching for medical students commenced at the Belgrave Hospital in April, 1948.

We, on our part, welcome this close association with King's College Hospital, and we appreciate the friendly spirit in which the association was negotiated.

Pending the introduction of the National Health Service, it has been necessary to seek financial assistance from the Ministry of Health to meet increased expenditure, and we wish to record our appreciation of the courtesy and despatch with which our applications have been treated. A total of £25,000 was received from the Ministry.

The Year's Work

In-Patients.—There has been a slight decrease in the number of admissions (1,588, compared with 1,729 last year). This was due entirely to infection. The demand for admission is heavy and, if it were not for precautions against infection, the number of admissions would have considerably exceeded the figures for last year.

Out of a total of 1,588 admissions, 329 were medical and 1,259 were surgical cases.

Plans are now in hand for the construction of cubicles in all Wards to minimise the risk of infection, and this should result

in a considerable increase in the average occupation of available beds.

Out-Patients.—The work in the Out-Patient Department has increased by 13 per cent. The number of new cases being 13,720, compared with 11,663, and total attendances being 42,408, compared with 37,065.

Lack of accommodation is making it difficult to cope with the increasing pressure of work, but plans are in hand to construct an annexe to the Department in the basement of Prima Road, and this will accommodate the new Ophthalmic, Dental and Child Guidance Clinics.

We are grateful to members of the W.V.S. who manage the Canteen, and whose work is much appreciated by the patients.

Operations.—In spite of the fact that the Theatre was closed during the Infantile Paralysis epidemic, the number of operations was 1,170, compared with 1,195 last year, and the pressure of work is steadily increasing.

The total comprised 234 major and 936 minor operations.

Pathological Department.—Building restrictions have made it impossible to carry out any major expansion, but minor alterations in the Laboratory have provided improved accommodation to cope with the increased work, which amounted to 5,144 examinations, compared with 4,517 last year :—

The increased work has necessitated the employment of a full-time Pathologist and a second Technician, and this will enable the Department to handle the heavy volume of work which is anticipated when the hospital reaches its full complement of 104 beds.

Radiological Department.—The Department made a total of 1,922 examinations.

A new portable X-Ray Set has been installed, and it is expected that the existing apparatus will shortly be replaced by a complete modern 400 m.a. X-Ray Unit, which has been promised by the Ministry of Health.

Physiotherapy Department.—There was a substantial increase in the volume of work, and total attendances amounted to 3,341, compared with 2,621 last year. The treatments comprised :—

The Gymnasium and Ray Therapy room have been redecorated and some new apparatus has been added. It is now possible to undertake all treatments with greater comfort and efficiency.

Almoner's Department.—The work of the Department is still in process of development, and there is a heavy demand on the existing small staff.

A total of 2,918 new Out-patients and 932 In-patients were interviewed. Home visits totalled 203; 88 children were admitted to Convalescent Homes, and 23 children were admitted to other institutions. In addition, arrangements were made for a large number of patients in conjunction with Public Authorities, I.C.A.A. and other voluntary agencies and Hospitals.

Although the next year is likely to bring considerable changes in routine work, the actual social work will tend to increase rather than decrease, and parents will need more help and guidance in making use of the new facilities.

Convalescent Home, Minstead.—There is a keen demand for admission to the Home, and a total of 76 children were admitted during the year.

The Committee feel that the existing 10 beds are insufficient, and the Architect has been instructed to prepare plans for an extension up to 20, and, if possible, 25 beds. Funds to meet the cost of the extensions are being collected by the Ladies' Association who have already raised and earmarked £1,000 for this purpose.

A local Sub-Committee, consisting mainly of local residents, has been appointed to advise the Management Committee on the Home's requirements.

Finance

The Committee wish to express their gratitude to King Edward's Fund for their substantial contribution, and also to the Hospital Sunday Fund, the Hospital Saturday Fund and the Hospital Savings Association for their sustained support.

The steep rise in expenditure, due mainly to increased costs of materials and wages, has been met largely by grants from the Ministry of Health, and the following comparison of finance between 1938 and 1947 shows that it would have been impossible to maintain our normal service without such assistance :—

During the past 43 years our total Income has been approximately £405,000 against a total Expenditure of £468,000, and Expenditure has exceeded Income on thirty occasions.

Committee of Management

We regret to report the death of Sir Mortimer Margesson, who had been a member of the Committee for 37 years. He played an outstanding part in the development of the Hospital and his services, latterly as Vice-Chairman, have been invaluable.

Appointments during the year include Lady Rothermere as Vice-Chairman, and Mr. Gustav Bescky as Treasurer. Mr. W. N. Ritchie and Dr. W. Sheldon joined the Committee.

We welcome Mrs. Anthony Henley and Sir Cecil Wakeley as representatives from King's College Hospital, and under reciprocal arrangements Major L. M. E. Dent and Mr. R. A. Ramsay have been appointed to the Management Committee of King's College Hospital.

Medical Staff

The return of members from the Services and the appointments made last year have enabled the Hospital to resume its pre-war service to the public. In addition, the following new appointments have been made:—

On his retirement, the Committee wish to express their thanks to Dr. J. W. Bennett, who has been Hon. Local Physician to the Convalescent Home for many years. He has been succeeded by Dr. A. M. Cooper.

Mr. R. A. Ramsay and Dr. A. Doyne Bell have been appointed representatives to the Medical Board of King's College Hospital.

Resident Medical Officers

The Committee wish to acknowledge the work of our Resident Medical Officers. During the past year a larger number than usual have been women.

The Government Scheme for the post-graduate training of demobilised officers has been implemented, and three Resident Medical Officers have been appointed under the scheme.

Nursing Staff

A total of 25 Student Nurses entered during 1947, compared with 23 last year; of these four left from the Preliminary Training School and four left during their first year. Ten nurses left on completing their training. Eighteen nurses entered for the State Examination and all were successful.

The Preliminary Training School is well established at Walton-on-Thames, and considerable work has been done on the building to make it more practical, attractive and comfortable for its purpose, and for the Students. A new classroom is under construction and will considerably improve facilities for instruc-

tion. A new bathroom, etc., is also being added, and these readjustments will provide accommodation for 26 Students instead of 20 as at present.

The Hospital has been fortunate in the loyalty and long service of our Senior Sisters, several of whom have served the hospital for more than 20 years. The Committee felt justified in making special provision for pensions for those members of the Nursing Staff who joined the Service before the introduction of the Superannuation Scheme, and this has now been done on an equitable basis.

Owing to our inability to provide the number of beds stipulated by the General Nursing Council, the Committee has been anxious with regard to our continued status as a Training School. The problem is dependent on our ability to find adequate accommodation for nursing staff. During the year, to meet this need, two houses in Prima Road were opened and furnished as a Nurses Home at a cost of approximately £1,200. We are still in urgent need of more accommodation and, although suitable buildings seem to be unobtainable, the Committee intend to persevere.

The standard of nursing has been maintained at its traditional high level throughout the year.

Other Staff

The Committee convey their appreciation to all members of the lay staff for their loyal service throughout the past year.

Mr. T. Ball, who has served the hospital for 15 years, has the best wishes of all on his retirement.

Honorary Officers

We welcome the Rev. H. Wallace Bird, who has been appointed Honorary Chaplain to the Hospital.

The Committee wish to record their appreciation and gratitude for the services rendered by our Honorary Solicitors and Honorary Auditors, whose help and advice during the present period of transition has been invaluable.

Organizations Associated with the Hospital

The Ladies' Association.—We offer our congratulations to the Association who carried out a successful programme under the Presidency of Lady Dorothy Charteris, with Mrs. Stewart Richardson as Chairman, Mrs. P. Hooper as Vice-Chairman, and Miss J. Rodocanachi as Honorary Secretary.

The success of the Appeals organized by the Association is an eloquent tribute to all those who have devoted so much time and work to the welfare of the hospital.

It is through the efforts of such workers that the hospital is able to provide a full service to the public, and it is hoped that their activities will continue and their membership increase in the post-war years.

Robins.—The depletion of membership during the war has been partly repaired by new recruits during the year, but we still aim at increasing the total.

We are grateful to all Robins for their valuable help during the year, and would like them to know that the results of the Easter Cards and Christmas Stockings were a great success.

The Childer Chaine.—The Committee deeply regret that this energetic organization has decided to close its activities on the appointed day, but sincerely hope that, when their future can be seen more clearly, the Childer Chaine will find it possible to resume its work for the hospital.

The Chaine has been working in support of the hospital for many years, and has contributed over £13,000 to our Funds. We gratefully accept their offer to hand the balance of their funds (approximately), £500, to the hospital, and we desire to record our appreciation of the magnificent work which has been accomplished by Mr. Watts, Mr. Ridley, Mr. Camden Pratt, Miss Gadsby, and all the members of their organization.

Appeals.—We are again indebted to Lady Rothermere who, through the generosity of Mr. Harry Alan Towers, organized "The Voice of London" entertainment at Drury Lane in October. This very successful entertainment, which was broadcast throughout the Empire, realised approximately £4,400 gross. The Appeal was typical of the efficient and attractive organization which we are accustomed to associate with Lady Rothermere's work, and we are indeed fortunate in the interest which she takes in the welfare of the hospital. The success of the Appeal was facilitated by generous assistance and advice from Mr. Stewart Maclean, the "Daily Mail," the "Evening News" and the Northcliffe Press.

We also desire to record our grateful appreciation of numerous local organizations, Clubs, Firms, Boy Scouts, Schools and individual supporters and subscribers who have enabled the hospital to maintain its service to the public. Restrictions on paper make it impossible to name them individually.

In spite of depleted membership and increasing difficulties in the organization of Hospital Appeals, the results have been fairly successful; receipts being £1,218, compared with £1,140 last year.

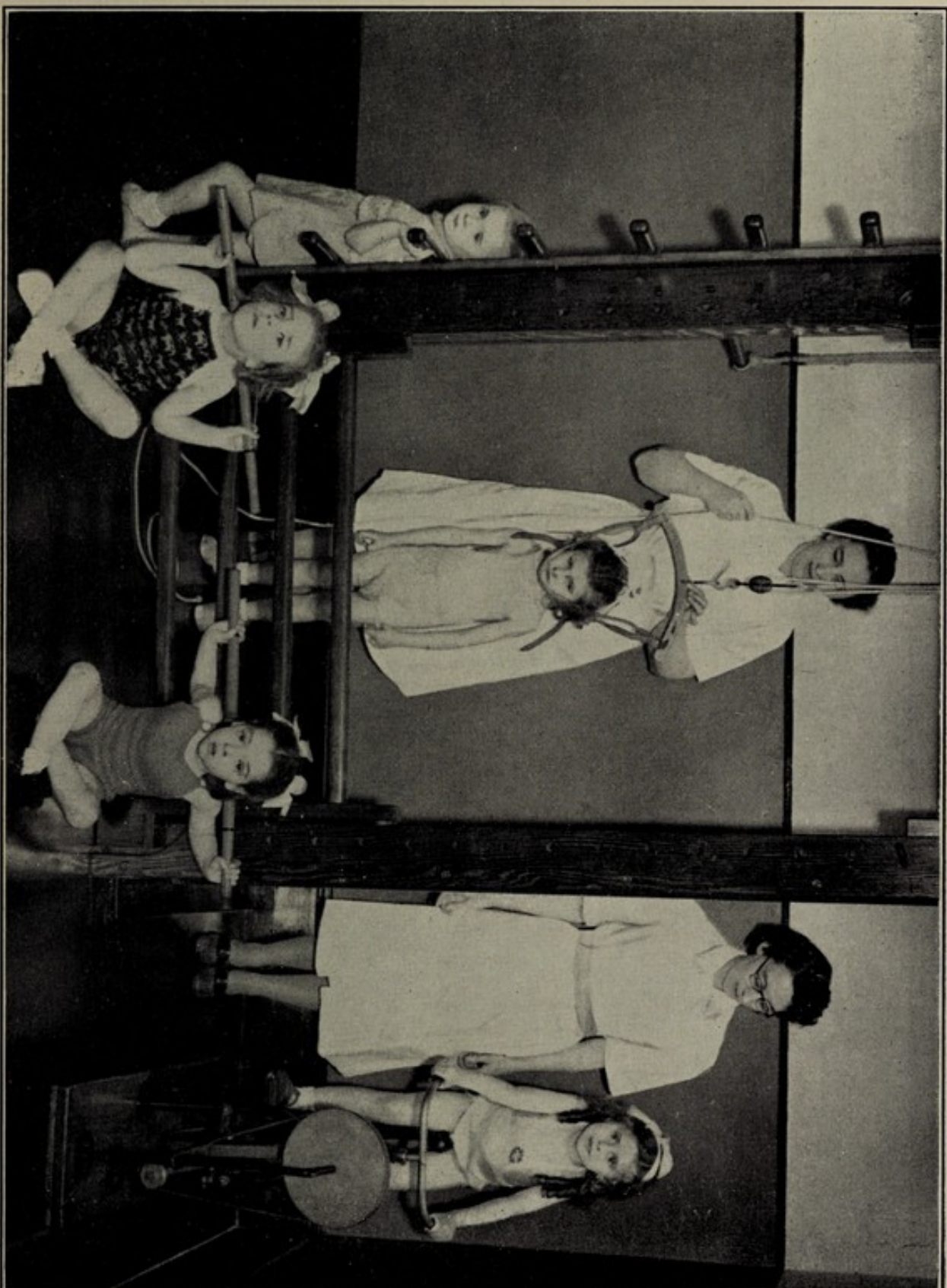

The Annual Christmas Sale realised the record amount of £911, of which £537 was from the Draw, which included 50 valuable prizes contributed by generous members and Firms.

An additional Sale was held during the summer and realised a total of £216. We are deeply grateful to all those who managed stalls, contributed articles and who ensured the success of both these Sales. Much of their success was due, also, to Mr. Valentine Dyall, who opened the Summer Sale, and to Mr. Laidman Brown, who opened the Christmas Sale.

We wish to record our appreciation of the unfailing support which has been given at these Sales by Mrs. McCrae, Mrs. Stewart Richardson, Mrs. Hooper, Mrs. Widdrington Stafford, Mrs. Dent, Lady Georgina Coleridge, Mrs. Ritcher, Miss Rodocanachi, Miss Milne, Miss Smith, Miss Garrett, Miss Jarrett, Mrs. Hostler, Mrs. Levenson, Miss Syckelmoore, and numerous members of the nursing and lay staff.

On Christmas morning the B.B.C. broadcast from Beatrice Ward in the Hospital. This was a feature entitled "Postman's Knock." It described the postman distributing the Christmas post and parcels to patients and the staff, and was much appreciated by all in the Hospital as well as by the parents of patients who were listening to the broadcast in their homes.

Special small Collecting Boxes, suitable for private houses, have been distributed to members, and the Secretary would be glad to provide these for any more members who would undertake to have them.

During the year the Association gave a donation of £300 to the General Funds of the Hospital, and earmarked a further £150 to provide small luxuries in the new Nurses' Home.

In addition to the above, a further £1,000 has been earmarked to provide an extension to the Convalescent Home. It is hoped that the Home will be enlarged to accommodate 20 or 25 patients instead of only 10 as at present. The Association propose to concentrate its future efforts towards making this worthy project possible.

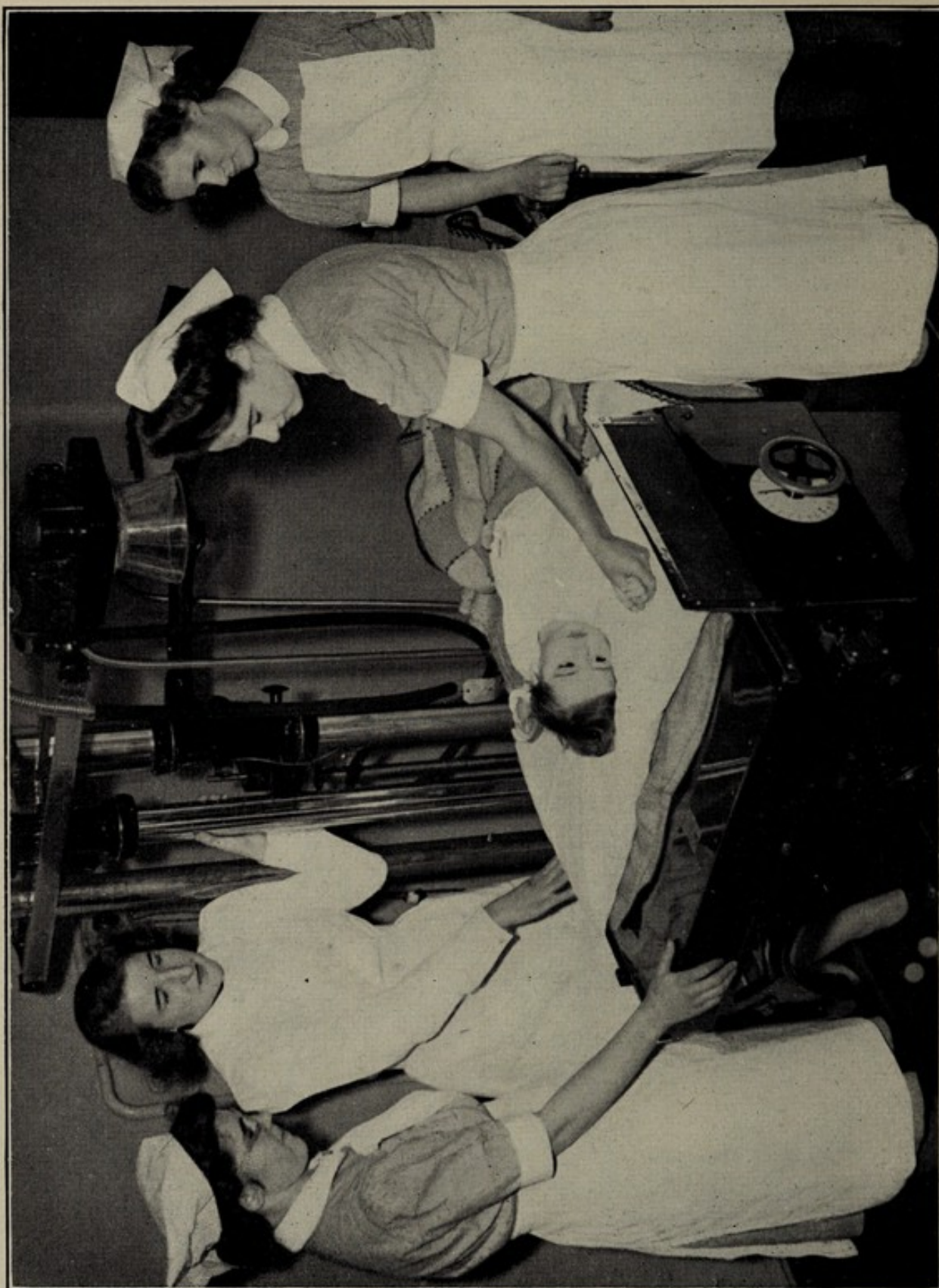

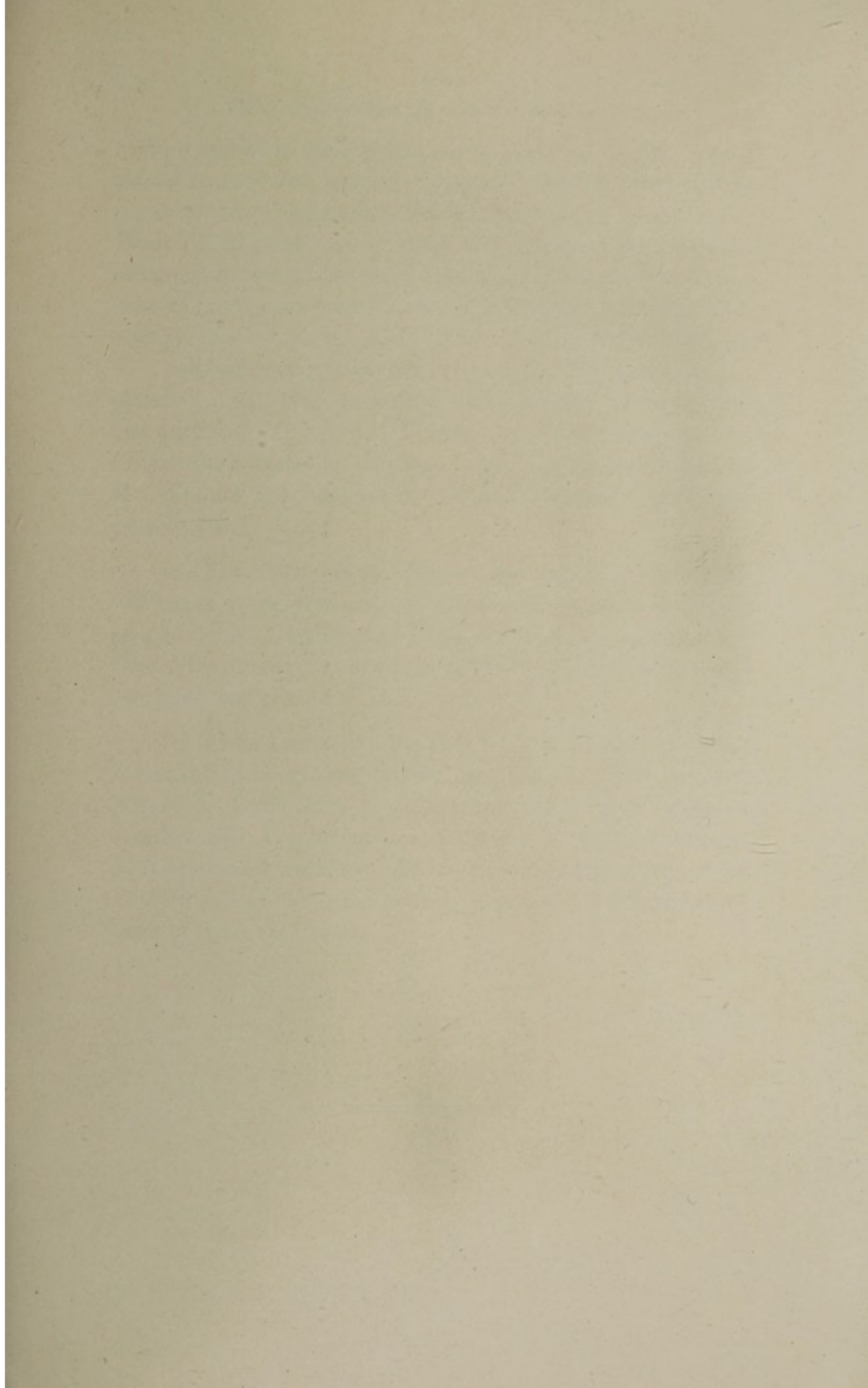

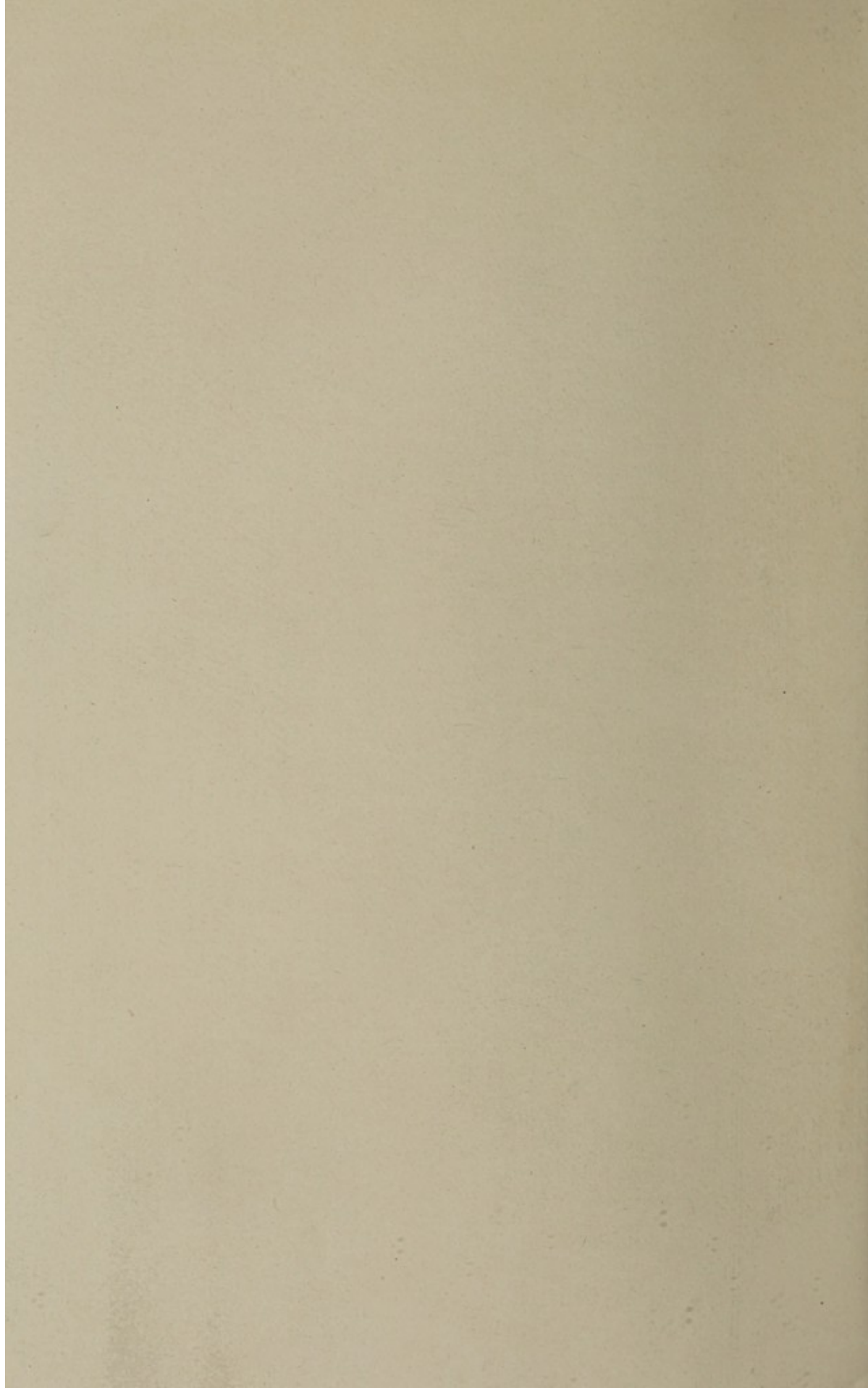

made it necessary that further accommodation for the Nurses should be provided, before both the additional Wards could be put into use. It was, therefore, decided to build the remaining West Wing, and so complete the Hospital as originally designed, to use it temporarily for Nurses' quarters until such time as funds were available to build a proper Nurses' Home, and by this means bring the Nursing Staff under one roof. The building was commenced in January, 1925, and was completed in April, 1926, at a total cost, including the equipment and furniture, of nearly £30,000. In raising this sum the Committee was deeply indebted to the Executors of the late Mr. William Shepherd for a further munificent contribution of £12,000.

In 1936 a site was acquired at the rear of the Hospital, and plans were prepared for a Nurses' Home and a new Out-Patients' Department. The outbreak of war in 1939 caused the Committee to postpone this further extension until hostilities had ceased.

In 1938 a bequest by the late Miss M. P. Eyre provided a Convalescent Home, known as "Tom's Lane Corner," Minstead, Lyndhurst, a delightful house and grounds, together with a substantial endowment for its maintenance. This is a most valuable adjunct to the Hospital, and many children will derive great benefit by a few weeks' stay in the heart of the New Forest.
