

# ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The Annual General Meeting was held at the Hospital on Thursday, 5th April, 1945. His Worship The Mayor (Councillor John Furness) presided.

The Secretary read the Report for the year 1944.

The Statement of Accounts for the year 1944 (taken as read) was presented by the Hon. Treasurer (Mr. C. E. Hancox), who commented thereon.

His Worship proposed that the Report and Statement of Accounts be adopted and circulated.

Seconded by the President (Mrs. Jackson) and resolved.

Sir Robert Johnson proposed that thanks be given to the General Committee, Executive Officers and Honorary Medical Staff for their services during the year 1944, and that they be re-elected as read; and that Messrs. J. D. Nickels and Peake be re-elected as Honorary Auditors.

Seconded by Mrs. Sharples and resolved.

An Address was given by Professor Lyon Blease.

Mr. Hancox proposed that thanks be given to Professor Lyon Blease for his kindness in addressing the Meeting.

Seconded by Mr. Jackson and resolved.

Mr. Temple proposed that thanks be given to His Worship the Mayor for his kindness in presiding at the Meeting.

Seconded by Mrs. Brancker and resolved.

# ANNUAL REPORT, 1944

Before submitting the report for 1944, reference must be made to the death of Mrs. Beazley, by which the Hospital has lost one of its staunchest friends.

Mrs. Beazley had been a member of the Committee for nearly fifty years and a Vice-President for 40 years, a length of service which has probably created a record; she twice held office as Chairman of the Executive Committee and was always most generous with her time, talents and money: her loss is deeply felt.

The volume of work done in 1944 has exceeded anything in the long history of the Hospital, and has necessitated the provision of more beds on the third floor. The title of Jackson Ward has been given to these quarters as a tribute to the devoted service of the President, Mrs. Jackson and Mr. Jackson over a long period.

INTERN MATERNITY.—There were 622 patients admitted during the year as against 474 in 1943 an increase of 148: of these 270 were first cases and 9 single girls. 8 patients gave birth to twins. The average length of stay was 13 days.

BABY WARD.—Twenty babies were admitted during the year, the average duration of stay being 20.8 days.

EXTERN MATERNITY.—It is satisfactory to be able to announce that the work on the District has considerably inincreased and thereby has removed the difficulty of providing a sufficient number of cases for the training of the pupils. The total number of mothers attended in their own homes was 87 compared with 57 in the previous year; visits paid by the District Sister amounted to 598 and those by pupils 1,460.

## CLINICS-

ANTE-NATAL.—At the 102 sessions held the attendances reached 4,916 of which 750 were first visits; this compares with a total of 3,483 attendances last year.

POST-NATAL.—50 sessions were held during the year at which 371 attendances were made, of which 256 were first visits; this shows an increase of 221 on 1943.

BABY CLINIC.—As a corollary to the increased work in the Hospital and on the District these clinics were largely attended, the total attendances being 4,143 showing an increase of 1,078 on last year; of these, first visits numbered 314 and re-visits 3,829; 51 sessions were held.

TRAINING SCHOOL.—16 Pupils passed the Central Midwives Board's examination, this represents 100 per cent. of the candidates who sat the examination.

NEW EQUIPMENT.—A pleasing little ceremony took place on 28th June, when the Mayor (Alderman Herron) presented two obstetric beds of the latest type for use in the labour wards; he was accompanied by the members of the Mayor's War Fund Committee from whom the gift came. A similar bed was given by the Birkenhead Special Constabulary (Mobile Section). Modern equipment is a tremendous aid to efficient work and the Committee wish to express their deep appreciation of these gifts.

In this connection the Committee are installing an electrically heated steriliser and a new washing machine and hydro-extractor.

GOODWILL FUND.—On 5th October, 150 members, ex-patients of the Hospital were entertained to tea and the occasion proved a very happy one. Thanks are due to the many willing helpers who made it a great success. Wire baskets have been provided for the Baby Clinics from the Fund at a cost of £24 15s.

THANKS.—The Hospital is greatly indebted to the members of the Voluntary Car Pool for constant help in conveying the District Staff to and from cases during the night and for help in other transport.

It is also desired to thank Mrs. Thomas and the members of the Red Cross Depot in Alfred Road for their continued help with sewing for the Hospital.

The Committee are most grateful to the following for their voluntary assistance in various ways:—

Clinics.—Miss Blood, Miss Beazley, Miss Yates, Miss Rawlins, Mrs. Cradock, Mrs. Rhodes, Mrs. Caldwell and Mrs. Corlett.

Hospital.—Mrs. Lea, Mrs. Wood and Mrs. Treasure and the following Red Cross members:—Mrs. Johnson, Miss Williams, Miss Gamon, Miss Lewis and Miss Bottomley.

Mention must also be made of the assistance given by the Civil Nursing Reserve who have lent their nurses to implement the Staff in times of urgency, and of the Birkenhead Association of Boy Scouts who have lent a willing hand whenever called upon.

Collectors.—Once again the Committee desire to express their deepest thanks to the small band of Collectors, who in spite of the present difficult conditions of everyday life continue to find time to give their services in this most valuable way.

GIFTS AND DONATIONS.—The Committee wish to record their gratitude to all who have supported the Hospital by gifts in kind or donations of money, a list of which will be found in the published Report. At the present time when the future of the voluntary system is in jeopardy, any support moral or physical is of great value.

# FINANCE.

A legacy of £20 was received from the estate of the late Mr. Charles Band.

### ENTERTAINMENT.

A Christmas entertainment was much enjoyed by the patients and Staff on 28th December. An excellent programme was provided by the following artistes: Mrs. Darby Contralto), Mr. Writer (Violin) and Mr. J. Edmunds' Concert Party, to all of whom warm thanks are due.

## COMMITTEE.

The resignations of Mrs. Sandeman Allen and Mrs. Thomas have been received and accepted with great regret; the Committee desire to express their thanks to both these members for their services both before and during the difficult years of the War.

# HON. MEDICAL STAFF.

The Committee desire to express their thanks to all the members of the Hon. Medical Staff for their unremitting servies so freely given throughout the year; they much regret losing the services of Dr. Hugh Smith, who has resigned from the Medical Board, and take this opportunity of thanking him.

Dr. J. M. Ritchie has been appointed to the Staff as Hon. Bacteriologist, an appointment which the Committee feel will be of great value to the Hospital.

## HON. CHAPLAIN.

The Hon. Chaplain the Rev. W. H. Jones, and the Choir of St. Mark's Church sang carols at the Hospital on Christmas Eve; for that and Mr. Jones' continuous interest in the Hospital much appreciation is felt.

#### STAFF.

Realising that the work of the Hospital can only be efficiently carried on by a loyal and conscientious staff, the Committee desire to place on record their indebtedness to all sections of the present Staff, Administrative, Nursing and Domestic.
