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Report of the Committee of Management

TO THE GOVERNORS OF THE

Birmingham and Midland Eye Hospital

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st DECEMBER, 1945.

THE Committee of Management have pleasure in submitting to the Governors and Subscribers the 122nd Annual Report of the Hospital, together with the Report of the Medical Board and the audited Statement of Accounts for the year ended 31st December, 1945.

The year under review has been notable for the great increase in the work of the In-patient Department, rendered possible by the fact that the number of beds available rose from 85 to 141, with a corresponding increase in the number of admissions, which totalled 2,215.

There was a reduction in the attendances of out-patients and casualties, though these attendances are still much greater than in pre-war years.

Statistical details regarding the admission of in-patients and the attendances of out-patients and casualties will be found in the Medical Report.

INCOME

Finance

The total Ordinary Income for the year amounted to $\pm 33,683$ —an increase of $\pm 5,937$ over the corresponding figure for 1944. The increases and decreases of the major sources of income are summarized below :

It has been very gratifying to note during the year how the income from **Voluntary Gifts** has been maintained. These voluntary gifts comprise annual subscriptions, donations and the grant from the Hospital Sunday Fund, and the income from each of these sources has increased. Many additional annual subscribers have entered into seven-year deeds of covenant, and with income tax at its present figure the benefit to the Hospital has been a very real one.

During the latter part of 1944 the Committee appealed to those industrial firms sending large numbers of casualty cases to the Hospital to make a grant in recognition of the treatment extended to their employees. Many of these grants were not received until 1945, and in consequence the donations show the substantial increase of ± 374 . Our very grateful thanks are due to those firms which responded so generously to our appeal, and it is anticipated that in many cases these grants may become annual.

A considerable number of smaller contributions was received for which the Committee tender their most sincere thanks. It is impossible to acknowledge these donations individually in this report, as the restrictions on the use of paper preclude the publication of the full list of donors.

Once again it is our pleasure to acknowledge our indebtedness to the organisers of the **Hospital Sunday Fund Collections.** The grant made for 1945 was the substantial one of £339 0s. 0d., being an increase of £12 over that made in 1944. **Receipts on account of services rendered** include the income from the Birmingham Hospitals Contributory Association and from other contributory schemes.

It was apparent during the war years that the financial position of the Hospital was seriously affected by the reduction in the number of in-patient beds, as the contributory schemes pay on the basis of the work carried out for their contributors, and the reduction in in-patient work was naturally followed by a corresponding reduction in income from this source. Now that the Hospital has almost the pre-war number of beds available, the income has benefited substantially thereby.

The Committee are pleased to report that the long negotiations with the Birmingham Hospitals Contributory Scheme on the question of increased contribution have reached a satisfactory settlement during the year. From the 1st July, 1945, the contributors to the scheme have increased their contribution from 3d. to 4d. per week, and on their part the hospitals have agreed that no inquiries as to means will be made in the case of "members who are compulsorily insured under the existing provisions of the National Health Insurance Acts or those whose annual income does not exceed $\frac{f}{420}$."

With the reduction in employment consequent upon the cessation of hostilities, the increase in income which could legitimately have been anticipated from the new rate has fallen short of expectations. It is pleasing to report, however, that the Hospital may expect more from this source than it has had in previous years, and, of course, unless the increased rate had come into force, there would have been a considerable reduction.

The **fees** referred to in the summary are for the training of Orthoptic students and vary according to the number of students receiving training at the Hospital in any given year.

Investment income includes interest, dividends, etc., and rents. The Hospital was able, during the year, to assist the General Hospital by making available to the night nurses of that hospital accommodation in our Nurses' Home. The General Hospital have paid an agreed amount for this privilege, which is included n the figure for rents. **Ministry of Health**: The receipts under this heading are for treatment extended to E.M.S. patients during the year. The amount varies with the number of such patients who have received treatment.

EXPENDITURE

The total **Ordinary Expenditure** for the year amounted to $\pm 34,283$ —an increase of $\pm 2,740$ over the expenditure for the previous year.

The opening of the Main Hospital for in-patients increased the average number of in-patients under treatment daily from 77.68 in 1944 to 119.17 in 1945. The treatment of these patients has called for a much larger nursing, domestic and portering staff.

The summary of Expenditure, set out below, shows that the increases are where one would expect to find them from the enlargement of the In-patient Department, namely, in Provisions, Surgery and Dispensary and Salaries and Wages. Other items of expenditure are affected to a very small degree.

It should be noted that the accounts for 1944 included payment to the Blackwell Convalescent Home of $\pm 1,542$ for the maintenance of our patients. There is no corresponding item in 1945, as the beds reserved for our use were closed down in September, 1944, when beds were re-opened at the Main Hospital. As a result of the year's working a deficit of $\pounds 600$ 2s. 11d. has been incurred, compared with a deficiency of $\pounds 3,797$ 3s. 5d. in 1944, showing an improvement of $\pounds 3,197$ 0s. 6d.

The income from this source is considerably smaller than the figure of $\pounds 6,734$ 8s. 8d. reported last year. The Committee wish to report, therefore, that in addition to this cash income, a further distribution has been made under the estate of the late Mrs. Clara Fowler, and in satisfaction thereof the Hospital has accepted a Sutton Coldfield $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. Mortgage of the value of $\pounds 1,500$.

ENDOWMENTS.

Mr. Geoffrey Wilkinson, who was for many years closely identified with the work of the Hospital on its various Committees and as Chairman of the Management Committee in 1931 and 1932, intimated that he desired to perpetuate the memory of his father, Colonel Howard Wilkinson, by the endowment of a bed and he has very kindly paid over to the Hospital the sum of $\frac{1}{2}1,000$ to permit this to be done.

EXTENSION AND DEVELOPMENT.

It was stated in the Annual Report for 1944 that the Development Sub-Committee were considering the best means of providing additional in-patient accommodation, a new and enlarged Orthoptic Department, and an Ophthalmic Research unit, by adapting existing buildings. Attention was also to be given to improving the conditions for patients attending the Outpatient Department and to enlarging the Hospital kitchen and improving the equipment of the ward kitchens and patients' a day-rooms.

During 1945 many meetings of the Development Sub-Committee were held and its recommendations were accepted by the Committee of Management. Application for the necessary licence was then made to the Ministry of Works.

Your Committee were much concerned to discover that there was little probability of carrying out more than a very small part of this scheme of development for some time to come. After lengthy negotiations with the Ministry of Health, whose support was sought, it has only been possible to obtain priority for a small portion of the aforesaid scheme.

Tenders have been received and it is anticipated that during 1946 the Main Hospital kitchen will be extended and re-equipped. the Nurses' Dining-room will be re-decorated and additional changing room and lavatory facilities for the nurses will be provided. In addition, the Orthoptic Department will be transferred from a ward which it is at present occupying on the top floor of the Main Hospital building to a new position in the former Nurses' Home, where a much larger and specially designed Department will be established. By removing the Orthoptic Department to its new position a ward and day-room will be freed and twelve additional beds will be provided for in-patients.

Should the labour position in the building trade improve there is still a possibility that permission will be granted for the conversion of the upper floors of the former Nurses' Home into a Research Department. REPORT OF MINISTRY OF HEALTH SURVEYORS— WEST MIDLANDS AREA.

This report, which has been awaited with much interest, was published in October, 1945, and gave a short description of every hospital, voluntary and municipal, in the area. In addition, and where considered necessary, the surveyors made recommendations.

The recommendation with reference to this Hospital was as follows:

"This Hospital is on a built-up site in the business part of the town and should move its In-patient Department further out, preferably towards the Hospitals Centre. The Outpatient Department, with an improved Casualty Department, would remain in town."

The Management Committee have given careful consideration to this proposal and, fully supported by the Medical Board, have resolved that it shall represent the future policy of the Hospital.

As a first step towards carrying out this resolution, the Town Clerk and the Birmingham Hospitals Council have been informed of our desire that a site be reserved at the Hospital Centre for an In-patient Department of from 200-250 beds, with additional space available to permit of the provision of a supplementary out-patient clinic if deemed desirable.

It is the wish of the Committee that everything possible should be done to achieve even closer affiliation with the Medical School, and it is considered that the proposals outlined above will be a valuable step in that direction.

TRAINING OF THE STUDENT NURSE.

Affiliation.—In 1944 the Committee were pleased to report that this Hospital had been approved for affiliated training, and that arrangements had been made with the Walsall General Hospital to accept a certain number of nurses under the scheme. In order to make the benefit of affiliation available to a greater number of our student nurses a similar arrangement has been made with the Birmingham General Hospital and approved by the General Nursing Council on 25th January, 1946. **Preliminary Training School.**—It is a recommendation of the General Nursing Council that hospitals should provide a short period of preliminary training for their student nurses before they commence their nursing duties. In order to render such facilities available to our students approach was made to the Birmingham Accident Hospital in order to ascertain whether our nurses could be permitted to attend the preliminary training school which had been established there.

Permission was granted readily and the first attendances were made in October. The arrangement has worked most satisfactorily and we should like to express our sincere thanks to the Committee of the Birmingham Accident Hospital for their ready co-operation.

NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE.

When the Annual Report for 1944 was issued there was a spirit of optimism as to the part which Voluntary Hospitals would be called upon to perform in the National Health Service, under discussion at the time.

A few weeks ago the Labour Government issued their proposals for a National Health Service. By these proposals the Voluntary Hospitals would become State Hospitals and, with the exception of the teaching hospitals, which would retain a limited freedom, would lose completely their assets and independence.

In the minds of those who view hospitals with the patients' welfare as the first consideration, the proposals of the National Health Service Bill are harsh.

This Hospital was founded by voluntary effort 123 years ago, and voluntary effort has raised it from a very small beginning to its present position as the largest Ophthalmic Hospital in the Midlands and the third largest in the country. It is in a strong financial position and has, during a period of years, built up a fund for extension purposes which now exceeds $\frac{1}{60,000}$.

It has pioneered many advances in ophthalmic medicine and surgery and is conducting research work of importance. There appears to be no case for expropriating the assets of the Hospital and dispensing with the great benefits it obtains from large numbers of voluntary workers and voluntary donors. A system which would have placed the Voluntary Hospitals in friendly competition with the State Hospitals would have brought the best results. The possibility now is of a system of bureaucratic control, which will repress the initiative and result in mediocrity. The Committee hope that wiser counsels will yet prevail.

COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT.

It is with sincere regret that we have to report the loss we have sustained through the deaths of Mr. J. C. Hudson and Mr. G. J. Edwards.

Mr. Hudson joined the Committee in 1937 and was elected to the House Committee in 1939. Later he became Honorary Treasurer, which office he held until he died. His fortitude during a long and painful illness was extraordinary, and he maintained his interest in the affairs of the Hospital to the end.

Mr. Edwards was elected to the Committee in 1937 and later joined the House Committee. His guidance on the many difficult matters which arose during the war was of particular value and he took a special interest in all matters pertaining to the welfare of the staff.

Opportunity has been taken to strengthen the Committee of Management during the year by the election of new members. The following gentlemen were elected and have been serving on the Committee :

> Mr. C. V. Hancock Mr. Dennis Byrne Mr. A. J. Morrison

and an additional representative of the Medical Board.

We are confident, from the great interest shown by these new members since their election, that their help and advice will be invaluable in the future.

RETIREMENT OF MR. A. J. WELCH SMITH.

Many patients of the Hospital will hear with regret of the retirement of Mr. A. J. Welch Smith, who had been Enquiry Officer since 1929. His cheerful personality and his helpful attitude to all who came to seek his assistance have caused him to be regarded as a friend by large numbers who have been visiting the Out-patient Department over long periods. The Committee are pleased to say that he has gone into well-earned retirement in the South of England.

GENERAL.

The Committee, in conclusion, wish to acknowledge with grateful thanks the considerable amount of voluntary assistance they have received during the year, of which they are deeply appreciative.

Sister Alton has attended regularly to render invaluable service in the Dispensary; Miss Dunn acted as relief telephone operator for over six months; and members of the Hospital Car Service have been most helpful in arranging the transport of patients between the Hospital and Burcot Grange.

We should like to take this opportunity of extending our thanks to Mr. Alan Priestley, who has so kindly made available to the staff tickets for the concerts sponsored by him at the Town Hall.

In conclusion, the Committee wishes to record its appreciation of the valued services of the Honorary Medical and Surgical staff, both in the care of the patients and in the conduct of the affairs of the Hospital and gladly takes this opportunity of expressing its thanks to the House Governor (Mr. F. M. Haughton), the Matron (Miss C. M. McDonald) and to all the members of the Nursing, Domestic and Administrative staffs for their efforts to maintain the highest standard of efficiency.

Annual Medical Report

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st DECEMBER, 1945.

The Medical Board have pleasure in presenting their Report on the work of the Hospital for the year ended 31st December, 1945.

IN-PATIENT DÉPARTMENT.

During practically the whole of 1945, 109 beds have been available at the Main Hospital and thirty-two at the Treatment Annexe at Burcot Grange.

The Medical Board are pleased to report that at the end of the year the waiting list had been reduced to 175. A considerable proportion of this list is composed of female cataract cases and, in order to increase the accommodation for such cases as quickly as possible, it has been decided that the adult beds at Burcot Grange shall revert to female use. It is hoped by this means to bring relief very shortly to many aged people who are at present condemned to almost total blindness.

The admissions of in-patients totalled 2,215, being a considerable increase over those of 1944, which numbered 1,798. The comparison is more favourable than the above figures disclose, as the admissions in 1944 included 113 patients transferred to the E.M.S. beds reserved for our use at Learnington, where they were not under the direct care of our medical and nursing staffs.

OUT-PATIENT AND CASUALTY DEPARTMENTS.

The decline in the number of attendances has continued, though the numbers in 1945 remain higher than those of the immediate pre-war years.

The work of these departments rose to a peak in 1942 and 1943, due to the great increase in the number of employed, to the effect of working by artificial light during blackout restrictions, and to the casualties caused by the use of unskilled labour. In the early months of 1945 the output of munitions was slackening, to be followed shortly after VE day by a gradual change over to the production of goods for civilian use, so that for a time there was a measure of unemployment in the city. In consequence, it was to be expected that the attendances would fall, as has proved to be the case.

By arrangement with the Association of Industrial Medical Officers we have continued to provide training in ophthalmic casualty work to nurses from the large industrial establishments of the city and from the Birmingham Accident Hospital. It is confidently anticipated that by reason of this training, which has been highly appreciated by those attending, the standard of first aid ophthalmic treatment in the city will be much improved, and that serious eye injuries will be recognized without delay and referred for expert attention.

The figures given above are evidence of the considerable increase in major ophthalmic surgery which has been rendered possible by the re-opening of the Main Hospital for in-patients.

The ring magnet and the Haab giant magnet were used for the extraction of foreign bodies from the interior of the eye in seventy-four cases, with forty-two positive and thirty-two negative results.

SPECTACLE PRESCRIPTIONS.

During the year 12,750 pairs of spectacles were prescribed, the corresponding figure in 1944 being 13,341.

RESEARCH DEPARTMENT.

The Medical Board report with regret that the work of this department, which was established last year, has been seriously affected by the lack of suitable accommodation. The alterations proposed in the former Nurses' Home adjoining the Main Hospital included extensive Bio-chemical and Bacteriological Laboratories for the Research Department, together with beds for patients admitted for investigation. Unfortunately, on making application for the necessary building licence, the Ministry of Health have replied that though these alterations are desirable, they are not essential at the present time and can only be given a low priority.

Every effort will be made to obtain a more favourable decision, as there is much valuable research work required at the presenttime, particularly on industrial problems.

MEDICAL STAFF.

The Medical Board were very pleased to welcome back Mr. R. D. Weeden Butler from military service in May, 1945. Mr. Weeden Butler was called up on the outbreak of war and served continuously, both at home and overseas, for over five years. His return has helped in no small degree to overcome the serious congestion in the Out-patient Department on Wednesday and Saturday mornings and to deal with the heavy waiting list at the commencement of the year.

The continued absence of Mr. R. H. Hucknall on military service is much regretted, as his assistance is greatly needed at the Hospital. It is hoped that he will return to duty about the middle of 1946. The Board were also glad to learn of the return of Mr. F. A. R. Stammers, Consulting General Surgeon, Dr. B. C. Tate, Honorary Dermatologist, and of Dr. T. Clyde McKenzie, Physico-Therapist to the Hospital and Panel Doctor to the Nursing and Domestic Staffs. Sincere thanks are expressed to Dr. T. Astley Cooper, who has deputized for Dr. McKenzie as Panel Doctor to the staff during his absence.

OPHTHALMIA NEONATORUM.

The arrangements for the treatment of cases of ophthalmia neonatorum existing between the Hospital and the Public Health Departments of Birmingham and the surrounding counties and county boroughs have worked very smoothly throughout the year.

The Medical Board desire to tender their sincere thanks to Dr. H. P. Newsholme, the Medical Officer of Health, to Dr. Matthew Burn, the Deputy Medical Officer of Health, and to their assistants, for their ready co-operation in dealing with cases of difficulty.

The Externe Nursing Department has continued to demonstrate its value during the year and the staff of this department has made 4,520 visits to the homes of patients who were, for various reasons, unable to attend the Out-patient Clinics at the Hospital. No fewer than 2,363 of these visits were for the treatment of cases of ophthalmia neonatorum.

PENICILLIN.

Penicillin has become available to the Hospital during the year and has been of material benefit in the treatment of many difficult cases.

BIRMINGHAM EAR AND THROAT HOSPITAL.

Cordial thanks are expressed to the Honorary Staff of the above Hospital for their ready assistance in the treatment of cases referred to them from this Hospital, pending the appointment of an Honorary Rhinologist.

REPORTS OF ANCILLARY DEPARTMENTS.

The reports of the Dental, Orthoptic, Pathological and X-ray Departments are appended.

The members of the Honorary Medical Staff wish to take this opportunity of thanking sincerely the Officers-in-charge of these various departments for the help and advice they have so freely given during the year.

RICHARD MIDDLEMORE LECTURE.

The 57th Richard Middlemore lecture was delivered on the 5th October, 1945, by Mr. F. A. Anderson, his subject being : "Some Observations on Medical Ophthalmology and Ophthalmic Therapeutics."

Arrangements are being made for the publication of this lecture in accordance with the conditions of the Trust.

The British Orthoptic Board have under consideration the possibility of extending the course of training to two years.
