## ANNUAL MEETING

The Annual Meeting of the Governors of the Birmingham and Midland Hospitals for Women (Incorporated) was held in the Council Chamber at the Council House, Birmingham, on Wednesday, 29th March, 1944, at 3.15 p.m.

The Lord Mayor, Alderman L. G. H. Aldridge, occupied the Chair, accompanied by the Lady Mayoress.

The Secretary read the following letter from the President of the Hospitals :—

DEAR MR. ASTON,

As President of the Hospitals, I want to tell you how grieved I am not to be with you all for the Annual Meeting.

For some time I have been trying to do more than is possible under present war-time conditions. As a result, I am now obliged to take a rest, and for the present my doctor will not permit any public engagements.

Will you be good enough to make these regrets and apologies for absence to the Lord Mayor and the Lady Mayoress and all there present at the Meeting, which I feel is a particularly important one in view of the position of the Voluntary Hospitals under the coming National Scheme.

With all my best wishes for the meeting, of which I know you will send me a report.

#### Various other apologies were received.

The Lord Mayor, in moving that the Report and Accounts be taken as read, said how very pleased he and the Lady Mayoress were to be present, and to be asked to preside at the Meeting that afternoon. The work of the Women's and Maternity Hospitals during the last twelve months had showed quite a considerable increase. Last year, 5,163 In-Patients

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were treated as against 4,484 in 1942, and in the Out-Patient Departments there had been a tremendous increase from 17,171 attendances in 1942 to 20,359. They were very grateful to the Minister of Health for allowing the use of beds at the Burntwood Emergency Hospital, and in 1943 no less than 239 patients were admitted to that Hospital under the care of the Hospital's own staff.

The Lord Mayor referred with very deep regret to the loss the Hospital had sustained in the death of Sir Beckwith Whitehouse.

Sir Patrick Hannon was good enough to help the Hospitals with a Broadcast Appeal during the year, which resulted in the splendid collection of  $\pounds 1,268$ .

The "White Paper" was looming over all the work of the Voluntary Hospitals. It was not at present possible to form any definite idea of what may be the position in a few years time when the "White Paper" became an Act of Parliament. Whatever happened, he felt sure that the Government was going to recognise the wonderful work that had been and was being done, not only in this City but throughout the country. Voluntary Hospital work brought in its train something of the humane touch which was very valuable indeed, and he had confidence that the Government would in its deliberations take into account the work that was being done.

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He had much pleasure in moving the adoption of the Report and Accounts.

Mr. Barrow Cadbury, Chairman of the Management Committee, seconded the adoption of the Report and Accounts so well reviewed by the Lord Mayor in moving the resolution. He said it had been a difficult year in many ways. The increase in the number of patients treated and the shortage of staff in the hospitals had made it difficult to accomplish all that was desired, and he recognised and very fully appreciated the extra work so wonderfully met by the Staff at both the Women's Hospital and the Maternity Hospital. It almost seemed to be that in this wonderful profession those who were taking part in it were not bound by any rules as to time and service, but always seemed to be putting in so much which was not in the contract. Certainly that had been the case during the year which had passed. He would like to voice the thanks which the Committee felt for the wonderful support which had enabled the Hospitals to keep going up to date.

So often on the Minutes of the Committees one read of some new apparatus that had been procured or some improved treatment that had been introduced, and it had been a very great comfort to those who were responsible to be able quickly to respond to those new needs and to keep up the very high record which the Women's Hospital and the Maternity Hospital in Birmingham had had for many years past.

He regretted that so many friends of the Hospital were absent that day. The President, Mrs. Neville Chamberlain, had year by year taken such great interest in the work of the Hospitals, in becoming familiar with what was being done in the Hospitals, and had always shown a great interest in their work, and they were very sorry to miss her that afternoon. The Chairman of the Women's Hospital (Mr. C. Southall) regretted very much his inability to be present, but he had been called away on an engagement in the North which he could not postpone.

He had very great pleasure in seconding the adoption of the Report and Accounts.

Mr. C. W. Gillett, Chairman of the Finance Committee, who spoke on the Accounts, said he would like in the first place to draw attention to the Building Fund of the Maternity Hospital which, he was glad to say, was still intact, and he reported that £61,000 was invested for a new Maternity Hospital and that sum was gradually increasing.

Mr. Gillett quoted extracts from the "White Paper." "I want to emphasise," he said, "that, although our Hospital has not expressed an opinion, it is clearly the Government's plan that there is a place for Voluntary Hospitals and that they have to be largely self-supporting in their finance." It was not desirable people should say that, as they were subscribers to the National Health Service, they would drop their subscriptions to Voluntary Hospitals. If that attitude were adopted generally, it seemed clear to him that the end of the great Voluntary Hospital movement would be in sight.

Mr. Kenneth McMillan, in proposing the re-election of the President and the Officers, said that he feared that those present might be taking part in a kind of preliminary funeral service for the Voluntary Hospital system. They might have to fight with extreme vigour for its full retention in the proposed National Health Service. It was difficult to understand why the Voluntary Hospitals had suddenly become the sport of politicians. It was something like a kind of Pearl Harbour in its unexpectedness and cruelty. The Voluntary

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Hospitals had committed no crimes ; rather, they had every reason to be proud of their record in the cure of disease and in research.

He urged that a united front and a unanimous policy were absolutely necessary to save the Hospitals from a slow death by financial extinction, as hinted at in the "White Paper." That document "appears to hold out a threat that if our subscriptions fall off we shall be absorbed inevitably in a State Medical Service of Hospitals."

He said that the most urgent need of the moment was for rapid extension of the Maternity Hospital to cope with ever-increasing work. It was generally agreed that the present building and the site are unsuitable for further alteration or enlargement and that an entirely new Hospital should be built at Edgbaston, near the Medical School, as originally proposed just before the war. A most interesting revolution was taking place in ideas on modern hospital architecture. It would appear to save great initial cost, to increase efficiency and to benefit the patients. It was the new hut system, in which one-storey rooms or wards were built round certain central buildings, both administrative and technical. This meant a greater number of beds for a given sum of money with easier maintenance.

He had much pleasure in proposing that Mrs. Neville Chamberlain be re-elected President and that the other Officers also be re-elected.

Mrs. Willmott Dobbie seconded the Resolution, which was carried unanimously.

Mr. C. W. Gillett, in proposing the re-election of the Honorary Medical Staff, said that he did so with much pleasure, and this was seconded by Mrs. Arthur Smith, who said how very glad she was to have the opportunity of emphasising their indebtedness to the Honorary Medical Staffs at the two Hospitals. She spoke especially on behalf of the Maternity Hospital, and referred to the pressure of work there which had been increasing for some time, and during this last year the pressure has been greater than ever and had put higher demands on the Honorary Medical Staff. They were very grateful to them for all they did.

The new ward with cubicles to be used as Private Wards was opened in May last year and had proved a great success.

There were 100 beds in use at Loveday Street and Barnt Green together, which is 30 more than before the war. This meant very considerable difficulty in the Hospital because it meant pressure on all the services. A new Hospital was very badly needed. The present Out-Patient Department, Kitchens and Laundry all need enlarging, and it is due to the splendid work of not only the Honorary Medical Staff but of the Nursing Staff in the Hospital that it was possible to carry on such excellent work under such difficulties. She expressed thanks to Miss Meikle, the Matron, and all her Sisters for the excellent way in which they supported the Hospital.

She had very great pleasure in seconding the re-election of the Honorary Staffs.

Mr. H. Mellor, in proposing a vote of thanks to the Lord Mayor for taking the Chair, and to the Lady Mayoress for her presence, said how fortunate the Hospitals were in having the interest of the Lord Mayor. They were extremely grateful to the Lord Mayor for presiding and granting the use of the Council Chamber for the meeting.

This was seconded by Mr. R. L. Lloyd and received with acclamation.

The Lord Mayor replied on behalf of the Lady Mayoress and himself, and said how pleased they were to be there and how interested he had been in the proceedings.

## Report of the Management Committee for the year 1943

The Committee of Management have pleasure in submitting their Annual Report on the work of the Women's and Maternity Hospitals for the year ended 31st December, 1943, together with the Annual Statements of Account and Balance Sheet as certified by the Auditors.

The year that has just closed has been an extremely difficult one, but the work of the Hospitals has been carried on very successfully.

There has been a considerable increase in the work of both Hospitals. At the two Hospitals 5,163 women were treated as In-Patients and Home Patients, as against 4,484 in 1942. 7,033 new Out-Patients were treated, and 20,359 attendances were recorded.

Of the Women's Hospital patients, 830 were sent on to Hammerwich, and from the Maternity Hospital 628 went on to Barnt Green. Both these auxiliary Hospitals have worked exceedingly well during the year.

During the year, the British Broadcasting Corporation offered the Hospital a date for an Appeal on behalf of its funds. Sir Patrick Hannon kindly undertook to broadcast on behalf of the two Hospitals, and the result of this was just over £1,200.

The Committee specially wish to thank the British Broadcasting Corporation and Sir Patrick Hannon for all the assistance given.

#### WOMEN'S AND MATERNITY HOSPITALS LEAGUE.

The Committee offer their very grateful thanks to all the Officers and Collectors of the various Branches for the very good work they have done during the year, under the greatest difficulty. The Committee have been able to keep the various Branches together, and they urge all the Officers to do their utmost to keep the work of their Branch going during the war.

#### CONVALESCENT HOME.

Every patient, after a serious operation, requires convalescent rest and care before returning to the duties of everyday life. Those who are able to travel to Cleeve Prior show its almost miraculous effect after a few days' stay there, and return home ready to undertake the duties of life again. During the year, 403 patients were received at Cleeve Prior this being a record number for the Home.

#### AFTER-CARE WORK.

The work of the After-Care Committee of the Women's Hospital is still suspended.

At the Maternity Hospital the Committee have found increasing difficulty in obtaining extra nourishment for mothers and babies, owing to rationing restrictions, but they have been able to help by supplying many mothers with baby clothes, oatmeal, Bournvita, etc. It is often found that the wives of men in the Forces are in most need of help, and wherever possible help has been given.

The Committee are specially grateful to "The Birmingham Mail" Christmas Tree Fund for their splendid gift of  $\pounds 100$ , without which the work of the Committee would have been considerably curtailed. They also offer very sincere thanks to all who have so kindly knitted so many matinee coats and vests for the babies.

#### SPECIAL DEPARTMENTS.

The Radium, Pathological, Bacteriological, X-Ray, Dental and Massage Departments have continued to do very useful work, and have added greatly to the efficiency of both Hospitals.

#### THE WOMEN'S HOSPITAL.

During the year, 2,761 patients have been admitted; an increase of 167 over last year.

Owing to the great pressure on the beds at the Hospital, it was decided to move the Out-Patient Department out of the Hospital, and, as the Birmingham Health Committee had decided to close the Day Nursery at the Convalescent Home, it was decided to adapt that Home as an Out-Patient Department. This work was soon carried out, and the Home was opened as an Out-Patient Department early last April, and the whole arrangement has been most successful.

The Committee are very pleased to report that Mr. F. Selby Tait has returned to us after an absence of four years, having been "on service" with the Eastern Expeditionary Force since the outbreak of war.

The Committee are very grateful to the Ministry of Health for allowing them to use beds at the Burntwood Emergency Hospital, and during the year 239 patients were admitted under the care of the Hospital's own staff.

#### THE MATERNITY HOSPITAL.

The year has been full of activity. It was found, by accommodating a number of the staff in the new Hostel, it would be possible to provide extra beds for patients in the Hospital; a small ward for Private Patients has also been provided. The Hospital, including Barnt Green, has now twenty more beds in use.

The number of patients admitted during the year was 2,022, as compared with 1,565 in 1942. 628 of these patients were sent on to Barnt Green.

7,374 attendances were made at the Ante-Natal Clinic during the year, 1,144 at the Post-Natal Clinic, 14 at the Dental Clinic, and there were 443 attendances at the Baby Clinic.

The Emergency Maternity Service (The Flying Squad) has again proved of great value. Fifty-two calls have been made, and in most cases the life of the patient was saved.

The Committee regret to report that during the year the Hospital has lost a member of the Honorary Staff, Sir Beckwith Whitehouse. For many years he has been connected with the Hospitals, and was always willing to do anything he could to advance the reputation of the Hospital.

To the Chaplains of the Hospitals for the willing ministrations they have given during the year, which to staff and patients alike have been a source of considerable help and comfort.

To the ladies of the After-Care Committee.

To the members of the various Branches of the League for their subscriptions and donations and for the useful garments sent to the Hospitals. To the Press of the City who evince their interest in numerous ways.

To the members of the Office Staff for the great amount of work they have put in during a specially difficult period.

To the A.R.P. workers who have given excellent service to each Hospital.

#### FINANCIAL.

The Committee are pleased to report that, taking the two Hospitals together, there is a considerable improvement in the financial position.

The accumulated debit on both Hospitals amounts to  $\pounds 1,940.$ 

Since the close of the year, the Ministry of Health has published a "White Paper" on the proposed National Health Service,

The Minister has made it quite clear that the proposals in the "White Paper" are put out for the consideration of all concerned. Conferences, prolonged discussions and negotiations are taking place, and are providing ample opportunity for the Voluntary Hospitals to make their own suggestions and express their opinions.

The British Hospitals Association is giving its undivided attention to the matter, and is doing all in its power to safeguard the interests of the Voluntary Hospitals.

# Report of the Women's Hospital Committee for the year 1943

The Committee present their Seventy-third Annual Report of the work of the Hospital for the year ended 31st December, 1943, together with Statement of Accounts for the same period.

Early in the year, owing to the great pressure on the beds at the Hospital, it was decided to transfer the Out-Patient Department to the Convalescent Home in Park Road; this having been vacated as a Day Nursery. This was suitably fitted up and makes a very excellent Out-Patient Department. This has meant an increase in the number of beds at the Hospital of 22, bringing our total number of beds to 131.

The number of new cases at the Out-Patient Department during the year has been 4,986, as against 4,156, being an increase of 820 on the previous year. The total number of attendances of new and old patients has been 11,827.

2,761 patients have been admitted to the In-Patient Department, being an increase of 167 on the number in 1942. Of these, 576 made use of the Private Wards. Of the patients admitted, 2,569 required operative treatment, particulars of which will be found in the Medical Report. Of these patients, 830 were sent on to the Auxiliary Hospital at Hammerwich.

The posts of House Surgeon during the year have been held by Dr. Peter Denham, Dr. Jean McDonald, Dr. C. F. Lucas, Dr. Roderick O'Hanlon and Dr. M. Cooke.

The Committee again acknowledge gratefully the valuable services rendered during the year by the members of the Honorary Medical Staff and the great amount of time they devote to the Hospital.

The Committee are very pleased to have Mr. F. Selby Tait with them again, after having been on service with the Eastern Expeditionary Force since the outbreak of war.

The Committee also desire to express to the Matron, Sisters, Nursing and Domestic Staff their appreciation of the devoted service given during the past year.

The X-Ray Department has continued to do most useful work for the Hospital. During the past year, 373 treatments were given, and in addition 864 radiographs were taken. These figures include the treatment of 249 patients from the Maternity Hospital. ## Medical Report, 1943

The Medical Board presents its report for the year 1943.

#### IN-PATIENT DEPARTMENT.

The number of patients admitted to the wards was 2,761, an increase of 167 on the number for 1942; 830 of these patients were transferred to Hammerwich House after operation; 27 cases died (.98%).

In a separate table are figures showing the nature and results of the operations performed ; in all, 2,569—1,318 major and 1,251 minor.

By courtesy of the Ministry of Health, three of the Surgeons visited Burntwood Emergency Hospital regularly to operate upon Women's Hospital patients; 239 operations were performed—211 major and 28 minor—with three deaths.

#### SEPTIC WARD.

151 cases were admitted suffering from some form of infection following pregnancy. Details are given in a separate -table.

#### RADIUM.

The 50-milligram tube is in constant use in the Hospital for non-malignant conditions. As in the two preceding years, the radium treatment of carcinoma has been carried on at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital. Suitable cases also attend the General Hospital for X-ray therapy.

#### OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT.

The number of new patients admitted to the Out-Patient Department was 4,986, an increase of 820 on the number for 1942. The number of attendances of old patients was 6,841, an increase of 865 compared with 1942.

#### PATHOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT.

An indication of the work of the department is given in Table V.

#### X-RAY DEPARTMENT.

The number of radiographs taken was 864, an increase of 132. Details of the work of the department are given in a separate table.

## Report of the Maternity Hospital Committee for the year 1943

The Maternity Hospital Committee have pleasure in presenting their Annual Report for the year 1943. During the year there have been 2,022 admissions, as compared with 1,565 in 1942.

The total number of Out-Patients who have attended during the year is 8,532, and of these 2,047 were new cases.

The Baby Clinic continues to be well attended, and many of the mothers express their appreciation of the advantages they derive from this Clinic.

During the year, 111 mothers who have been In-Patients attended with their babies, and altogether they made 443 attendances; 1,144 patients attended the Post-Natal Clinic. They greatly appreciate the help and advice they obtain at this Clinic after they have been discharged from Hospital.

83 Pupil Midwives have been accepted for Part I. training during the year. Of this number, 39 have taken the Examination and 35 passed. In addition to these, 32 pupils who entered in 1942 completed their training and took their examination and 26 passed, making the total number of passes for the year 61. Of the 83 Pupil Midwives who were accepted for training, four abandoned the course for health and other reasons.

29 Medical Students applied for training and were accepted.

The Emergency Maternity Service has again proved invaluable, and many practitioners have expressed their appreciation of the service. During the year 52 calls have been made, and in the majority of the cases the life of the patient has been saved. There were two patients for which the Flying Squad was called out too late. Twenty-four were admitted to the Birmingham Maternity Hospital, one to the Queen Elizabeth Hospital and one to Dudley Road Hospital.

During the year, Dr. Dorothy M. Shotton held the post of Resident Medical Officer and Registrar.

The posts of House Surgeon were held by Dr. S. C. J. Falkman, Dr. Phyllis Poyner-Wall, Dr. M. R. Fulford and Dr. Bridget Barry.

The Committee acknowledges gratefully the services rendered during the year by the Honorary Medical Staff and the great amount of time they have devoted to the work of the Hospital. As is the case with so many, they have been called upon to undertake many duties apart from their Hospital work in connection with the National Emergency, and they have also been working with a smaller staff.

The Committee have appointed Miss Terry as Clinical Assistant to assist them in some of their work.

The Committee also desire to express to the Matron, Sisters, Nursing and Domestic Staff as a whole its appreciation of the efficient and loyal services given during a very difficult year.

Special thanks are also due to the ladies of the After-Care Committee who give much time in helping needy patients after they are discharged from the Hospital.

They particularly wish to thank Mrs. Haswell Wilson and Mrs. Archdale who gave much of their time to visiting the patients in the Hospital every week. Their interest was very greatly appreciated.

The Committee would also like to express thanks to the Voluntary V.A.D. workers who were a very great help in the wards, and without whose services it would be difficult to carry on the work, as, owing to the war, it was almost impossible to get adequate staff.

In this connection, too, the Committee take this opportunity of expressing most sincere thanks to the "Birmingham Mail" Christmas Tree Fund for their handsome donation of £100. But for this generous contribution the assistance available for needy women would be very much curtailed. The Committee feel that with the increased demands there must necessarily be in these difficult times they are able to continue this work with confidence that any emergency that may arise can be met.

380 cases were attended in their own homes by the district midwives, who had the help of the District House Surgeon in any cases of difficulty. This was of great benefit to the midwives and patients. Until rationing was instituted, needy cases were supplied with milk on the report of the midwife to the Almoner, who was also often able to help with clothing.

74 In-Patients and 175 Out-Patients were sent to the Women's Hospital for X-ray photographs or treatment during the year.

The Physiotherapy Department has continued to do very useful work. During the year, 740 patients received treatment and advice.
During the year a series of lectures and practical demonstration in Gas Air Analgesia were given to trained midwives ; 26 candidates attended and 26 have been awarded Certificates.

Owing to travelling difficulties, a one-day Intensive Course of Lectures for Teachers of Midwifery was not organised during 1943. It is hoped that it will be possible to organise another Course in 1944.

The Hospital has suffered a great loss in the death of Sir Beckwith Whitehouse. For many years he had been on the Honorary Staff, and always took a great interest in the work of the Hospital.

During the year that he was Chairman of the Medical Board, he invited Mrs. Stanley Baldwin to visit the Hospital, and at a luncheon held in honour of her visit he suggested a scheme for obtaining Life Governors of the Hospital, and the sum of  $\pounds 4,111$  was realised.

His loss has been greatly felt by all who were privileged to work with him and many thousands are the poorer by his passing.

The Committee are again very grateful to the workers who have undertaken the A.R.P. duties at the Hospital, and wish to express their appreciation of the splendid work they are doing by giving their services night after night for the benefit of the Hospital.

The Maternity Hospital at "Long Rede" has continued to be of great assistance to the Hospital, no less than 628 patients having been sent on there during the year. It is the means of providing safe convalescence for the patients, and relieves the pressure on the beds in Loveday Street.

By using some of the rooms in the new Hostel for members of the Staff living in the Hospital, it has been possible to provide twenty additional beds. The Committee have also provided a small ward for paying patients.

The total cost of equipping the Private Ward has been kindly met by Mrs. H. H. Payne, and the Committee tender to her their very sincere thanks for this very useful gift.

The Committee acknowledge with many thanks gifts of garments from the following :---

With over 1,600 babies in the Nurseries during the year, it has been an exceedingly busy one and much good work has been done.

The Committee has been able to assist greatly in providing extra comfort for mothers and babies both at the Hospital and Barnt Green. An interesting case is the help the Committee has been able to give in providing special baby food for twins who have been in the Hospital for over three months. This is the mother's second twin pregnancy. Horlicks Milk, Oxo and Soups, Bourn-vita and Cocoa are amongst the extra nourishment given.

Wool has been bought and knitted up for the babies. Rugs and cushions sent to Barnt Green have greatly added to the comfort of the mothers. Parcels of clothing and blankets have been sent to needy patients. Surgical supports have been paid for when necessary. Ambulance and taxi fares have been paid and assistance given with train and 'bus fares where needed.

The Committee are specially grateful to "The Birmingham Mail" Christmas Tree Fund for their splendid donation of £100.

The Committee would like to thank and congratulate the staff on the charming articles of clothing they made up for the mothers and babies from pieces of silk and wool collected by them from their friends. These garments with tins of soup from the Committee were given to each mother in the Hospital at Christmas, and were very much appreciated.

### OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT.

During the year, 2,047 new cases attended the Ante-Natal Clinics of the Out-Patient Department, the total number of attendances being 7.374, an average of 3.6 visits per patient.

At the Baby Clinic 111 mothers attended with their babies after delivery in the Hospital or on the District, their total attendances numbering 443.

At the Post-Natal Clinic there were 1,144 attendances,

### EXTERN MIDWIFERY DEPARTMENT.

Two districts were administered. During the year the District Midwives attended 380 patients in their own homes. The number of babies born was 355. There were 3 still-births.

The work of the Physiotherapy Department has increased during 1943. Four hundred more exercise treatments were given to mothers in bed after delivery. Rehabilitation is much to the fore; it is very satisfactory that we have been practising it for several years. We aim at sending the mothers home with a good posture and figure, and so in a better state of health. They are supplied with instructions how to carry on with their exercises at home.

Special cases of weakness after prolonged period in bed also received daily massage treatment.

Infra-Red treatment has been given very much more extensively; 200 more treatments were given in 1943. This treatment is given to lacerated perineums which are not healing very quickly; also to any other wounds or pains that need heat treatment.

Nine babies received treatment during the year. In most cases very few treatments were needed for slight Talipes or weak arms. One baby had daily massage for six weeks for facial paralysis, which was cured when the baby left the Hospital.

A new class for Post-Natal exercises was started in March, on Monday afternoons. The exercises were given to special cases of retroverted uterus, and were much appreciated by the patients.
