

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT FOR THE YEAR 1946.

The Board of Management has pleasure in submitting the Twenty-eighth Annual Report of the Hospitals, together with the Audited Statement of Accounts for the year ended 31st December, 1946.

The year has been one of expansion and continued progress towards providing a comprehensive obstetrical and gynaecological service for women who need our care; improvement in the facilities for the treatment of the patient and advance in the training of medical and nursing students.

During the year, 13,630 patients were treated in the Hospitals, compared with 12,247 in 1945. InThe Year's patients increased by 594 (Women's Hospital, 255;
Work. Maternity Hospital, 339). The total number of out-patients increased by 789 (Women's Hospital 403; Maternity Hospital, 386) and the out-patient attendances at 23,829 show an increase of 948 over the previous year.

Service—cases attended

Some progress has been made in the planning of the Hospitals on a site at the Hospitals Centre, as future envisaged in the last Annual Report. The development scheme is to provide a combined Hospitals. obstetrical and gynaecological unit in close proximity to the Medical School of the University of Birmingham which it is hoped will become an integral part of the Regional Centre of teaching and research.

The Architects for the scheme have been appointed—Messrs. Martin, Martin and W. H. Ward, of Birmingham—and

much preparatory work has been completed.

Details of the new Hospital, providing accommodation for approximately 500 patients—250 obstetrical and 250 gynaecological beds—which will include a complete professorial unit for the teaching of medical students with lecture theatres, library and research facilities, have been provisionally drafted after consultation between medical and lay members of the Hospitals' Committees.

Much attention is being given to the ideal aspect in planning the Ward units to give the patients the best possible accommodation in the pleasant surroundings.

The new Hospital will provide the most up-to-date internal planning and include special units for the care of infection; for premature babies in a modern air-conditioned and thermostatically-controlled unit; and specially-designed admission departments and accommodation for patients' visitors who have to remain near to the patient for extended periods.

A conference of representatives of Teaching Hospitals in the city, held during the year, at which Sir William Douglas, the Permanent Secretary to the Ministry of Health, was present, indicates the Ministry's interest in the proposals for

the development of the Hospitals Centre site.

It is accordingly hoped that the scheme, when formulated, will receive the support of the Minister of Health to allow the building programme to proceed at the earliest possible

opportunity.

At a further conference of representatives—lay and medical—of all Hospitals concerned in the development scheme and the Faculty of Medicine, plans were formulated for the co-ordination of the work of the Hospitals concerned in teaching. Future building on the Centre site was considered, and it was decided that the completion of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital, the Dental Hospital and the Women's and Maternity Hospital should take first place.

Provisional approval of the sites allocated to the Hospital has been made by the General Purposes Committee of the

City Council.

The need of rebuilding the Hospitals at an early date is particularly emphasised by the passing of the Birmingham Corporation Act, 1946. The Inner Ring Road Scheme, with the widening of Loveday Street, necessitates the demolition of a major section of the present buildings.

A Standing Committee has now been constituted to discuss problems applicable to all Hospitals and to compile a scheme for central services and other common factors in an effort to provide the most economical plan for the whole project.

The National Health Service Act to provide for the establishment of a comprehensive health scheme National became law in November, and it is presumed that Health the Hospitals, as they are at present teaching Hospitals of the University of Birmingham, will Service. be taken over under the jurisdiction of a Board

of Governors appointed by the Minister of Health.

The year ahead is likely to be the last as a voluntary organisation. The "appointed day" for the change-over is

stated to be the 1st April, 1948.

Since the inception of the Hospitals—the Maternity Hospital in 1842 and the Women's Hospital in 1871—the Board and Committees have endeavoured to provide an efficient service for the medical care of patients who have

required our help.

The exertion for the attainment of an economic service employing the most modern methods and technique of the times has been carried out by voluntary effort, often under arduous circumstances, and in the closing stages of our voluntary existence the Board and helpers of the Hospital look back with pride on the achievements and advance in medical science that have been carried out during the years.

During the era of voluntary hospital management the organisation has been built up on sound principles, providing unstintedly but economically for the needs of the patients and staff. It is therefore with some satisfaction that the Board will hand over on the "appointed day" the affairs of the Hospitals in a sound financial and material state.

The Board has reason to believe that many intending donors have recently revoked legacies Gifts to Hospitals or refrained from making gifts to the Hospitals because they assumed that under the National Health Service. Hospitals would no longer need their support or they feared that any monies given by them would, on the "appointed day" when the

National Health Service comes into force, be diverted from the particular Hospitals or purpose which they wished to endow. It is, however, important if the vitality and humanity of the Hospital services of this country are to be maintained, that Hospitals should continue to receive financial support

from all charitably-disposed persons.

Intending donors may still make gifts to Hospitals with the assurance that their benefactions will be applied in accordance with their intentions and for the benefit of the particular hospital in which they are interested. This object can be accomplished by taking care that the will, or deed of gift, or directions, make it clear that the gift is to be treated as a capital fund, separate from the general funds of the hospital, or as a fund for some specific object of a capital nature. Such a gift may consist of money or of property. A point to be noted also is whether the gift is made before or after the "appointed day." Appropriate forms of words for use in making gifts to the Women's and Maternity Hospitals may be obtained from the House Governor.

It is therefore desired to emphasise that benefactors who wish to benefit the Hospitals during life or after death may still do so, and the Board trusts that such gifts will continue to

be received by the Hospitals.

The finances of the Hospitals during the year have exceeded expectations. It was anticipated that with finance. the rise in costs of materials and the establishment of new and increased salary scales, the Hospitals would present a substantial deficit at the close of the year. This, however, has not been the case, as every effort has been made, and with some success, to increase the sources of income to meet the additional expenditure.

The ordinary expenditure amounted to £44,052 at the Women's Hospital and £42,909 at the Maternity Hospital, an increase of £5,738 and £5,149 respectively on the previous

vear.

The ordinary income figures of the Women's Hospital are £46,662 and at the Maternity Hospital £42,125, and show an increase of £7,745 and £8,223 compared with 1945.

The following is a summary of the income and expenditure

accounts for the two years, 1945 and 1946:-

(a) Women's Hospital ... Surplus £2,728, against a surplus of £1,003 in the previous year.

(b) Maternity Hospital ... Deficiency £784, against a deficiency of £3,858 in the previous year.

(c) Showell Green Convales- Surplus £240, against a cent Home ... surplus of £194 in the previous year.

(d) Gertrude Myers Convales- Deficiency £381, against a surplus of £25 in the cent Home ... previous year.

The nett surplus of £1,803 on the four accounts compares

with a nett deficiency of £2,636 in the previous year.

The revised system of accounting and monthly detailed statements of income and expenditure have proved helpful in indicating fluctuations and internal control has been thereby facilitated.

The balance sheet includes the assets and liabilities of the Gertrude Myers Convalescent Home, and the income and expenditure account for the Home is included in the

appropriate section of the report.

The Board wishes to convey its warm thanks to the Birmingham Hospitals Contributory Association and the Birmingham Hospitals Saturday Fund, and to the Maternity and Child-welfare Sub-Committee of the Corporation of Birmingham for their substantial financial help and valued co-operation during the year.

The work of the Women's Hospital has been fully

Women's Hospital Gynaecological Service.

maintained. The turn-over of in-patients has reached the highest number on record, the daily average of occupied beds of 124.19 shows an increase over the previous year, but in spite of this the waiting list remains at over 500 for in-patient beds.

To meet the increasing demand on our service the Hospital Committee has approved a scheme of extension of the Ward accommodation, and it is hoped to provide as a temporary measure an additional thirty beds in the building now used as the Out-Patient Department (previously the Showell Green Convalescent Home) and to use Showell Green House as the Out-Patient Department with accommodation for a Preliminary Training School for Nurses and Staff Rooms.

The nursing problem is the most critical with which the

Hospital, and for that matter almost every Hospital, is having to contend at the present Staffing— Nurses. time. The recruitment and retention of Nursing Staff has been the subject of the utmost and constant attention throughout the year, and it is gratifying

to report, with satisfactory results.

A scheme of engaging female ward orderlies was embarked upon and has considerably aided the work of the Nursing Staff and at the same time proved a means of recruiting new nurses to the profession. In this scheme some girls slightly younger than the normal age for entering the profession have entered Hospital and assisted in the general duties of the wards, but their aptitude towards the work and general keenness has indicated their ability to take up nursing, and consequently upon reaching the required age they have taken

up a full course of training.

The younger girls interested in nursing also find the primary work as a ward orderly a means of bridging a gap between leaving school and the time when they can train as a nurse. Thus the scheme has become to some extent a nursery for nurses.

The Hospital has accordingly been enabled to continue without the closing of beds or curtailment of the work and to withstand the greater pressure that has been made on its

services.

The Hospital was inspected by an officer of the General Nursing Council during the year, and a satisfactory report on the inspection has been received.

During the year, the Gertrude Myers Convalescent Home at Cleeve Prior has been in full use—a record number of patients has been transferred during the year—considerably relieving beds at the Hospital. Patients sent to the Home, in its pleasant surroundings, have made steady advance to a complete and active state of good health.

The work of the Fertility Clinic, so necessary to the completion of the gynaecological service, is growing. The number of men and women attending this Clinic is shown by the following

Preliminary work in connection with the inauguration of a Physiotherapy Department at the Women's Hospital has begun, and it is hoped that in 1947 this new feature of the Hospital's work will greatly assist in the rehabilitation of the patient. Massage, exercises and special forms of treatment will be the means of achieving the desired results.

A new system of appointments for the attendances of out-patients commenced on 1st January,

Out-Patient 1947. All new patients attend by appointment, and if required to return they are given a further appointment before leaving the Department. Although the system has only been working

for a short period, it is already apparent that there is a considerable saving in the patients' time.

Improvements in the canteen arrangements of this

Department have been made during the year.

The Board desires to express its warmest thanks to the organisers and librarians of the Library Service of the British Red Cross and Order of St. John Library War Organisation for the continuance of their splendid work in providing the patients with books.

The visits of the librarians are eagerly looked forward to by the patients in the Wards, who have derived much pleasure and passed many happy hours reading the books supplied through the Service.

The Hospital's system of wireless for the patients has received overhaul, and every patient bed is now fitted with a new pair of headphones. The facilities afforded in this direction have been greatly appreciated.

Two members of the Staff have retired after many years at the Hospital—Mrs. N. L. Yarwood, Sister-in-charge Out-Patient Department, after twenty-eight and a half years of service, and Mr. M. Pugh, head gardener following twenty-five years' service.

In expressing appreciation of their services to the Hospital the Board extends to them good wishes for a long and happy retirement which they trust will be enjoyed in good health.

A gift of £500 from an anonymous donor for the enclosing of the ward balconies by the erection of glass folding partitions has been received since Accommodation the close of the year. The Board is most grateful for this generous donation, which, when the work is completed, will enable all the beds on the balconies of the Wards to be used in the most severe weather. They deeply appreciate the kind action of the donor and the thought and interest taken in the work of the Hospital.

An impressive ceremony took place at Hammerwich
Parish Church during the summer months,
when a crowded congregation gathered to
witness the dedication by the Bishop of
Stafford (The Right Reverend L. D.

Hammond) of gifts presented to the Church.

On this occasion the Hospital presented a reredos as an expression of gratitude for services received during the war years when patients and staff occupied an annexe of the

Hospital in the village.

The Lord Mayor and Lady Mayoress (Alderman and Mrs. A. F. Bradbeer) visited the Hospital at Christmas-time and took a keen interest in the work of the various Departments. In the cheerfully decorated Wards they spoke encouragingly to each patient individually and added words of praise to members of the Staff.

The Board acknowledges the handsome contribution of £1,250 received from the Executors of the Estate of the late Miss Alice Lea, King's Heath, for the endowment of a bed in memory of her sister, Mrs. Emma Law.

A tablet of dedication has been erected over a bed in Ward 6 of the Hospital.

Seventy-nine medical students have attended the Hospital during the year for practical instruction in gynaecology

Medical gynaecology.

Students. Clinical classes have also been arranged and lectures given on gynaecological pathology.

The facilities now offered to the Medical Students enable them to obtain a much wider knowledge of gynaecology than was previously possible.

The Maternity Hospital has reached a new high record of in-patients admitted during the period of one year. On a number of occasions we have been unable to admit all the cases requiring our services owing to lack of accommodation.

Service. This most regrettable position indicates the urgent need for enlarged premises and addi-

tional Ward accommodation.

The increased work in the Hospital caused by the steep rise in the birth-rate was anticipated and has in part been met by returning suitable patients to their homes as soon as

allowed by the medical staff.

It is worthy of special mention that for a period of over six months extending into 1947 no maternal death occurred at the Hospital. Taking into consideration the fact that practically all of the cases admitted are of an abnormal or complicated nature, and a great proportion of them emergencies, the achievement reflects well on the skill of the medical and nursing staff.

The high standard of training has been maintained. The Hospital remaining an approved training centre for pupil-midwives, midwife teachers, and for the certificate in gas and

air analgesia.

The demand on the services of the Flying Squad continues to increase. The Unit was called out for life emergency maternity cases during the year. This important branch of our work provides a day and night service and is responsible for the saving of many lives. High tribute has been paid to the Staff who have attended these cases.

The new accommodation provided for medical students in the Corner House is an appreciated feature of the facilities afforded them. The students now have their individual rooms, pleasantly furnished, with a common lounge and domestic quarters.

During the year, twenty-seven students were resident in the Hospital for a course in practical midwifery.

The four babies born on Christmas Day were the recipients of silver spoons presented in Christmas Babies. memory of Mrs. Barrow Cadbury. These gifts were much treasured by the parents of the babies.

Reorganisation of the Out-Patient Department has been carried out during the year to improve the Out-Patient efficiency of this section of our work. Much Department. attention has been devoted to the registration of patients and their ease in passing through the various Clinical rooms of the Department.

Structural alterations have been necessary.

The Patients' Canteen in the Department has also been completely reorganised under the auspices of Mrs. Charles W. Gillett.

The thanks of the Board are tendered to Mrs. Gillett and her helpers for their kind assistance in this connection.

The Hospital's need of a fully-equipped X-ray Department is about to be met. Accommodation has been X-ray arranged and preparatory work in readiness Department. for installation has begun.

The generous gift of Mr. Harry H. Payne towards the cost of the equipment has been followed by another substantial sum of £2,500 received from a donor who wishes to remain anonymous, thereby completely covering the cost of the plant. This beneficence has enabled the work of installation to be expedited and will provide an invaluable addition to the diagnostic facilities of the Hospital.

Through the generosity of Mr. and Mrs. Harry H. Payne, electrically-heated food trolleys have been installed in each Department and have proved a much-appreciated addition to the catering section.

A gift of new chairs for the Wards has also been gratefully accepted from Mrs. Payne.

The Board is appreciative of the kindness and generosity of Mrs. Charles W. Gillett in giving fifty new over-bed tables, thus completing the provision of one for each bed in the Hospital. This most useful gift has been much valued.

Mr. W. A. Allen, of Solihull, kindly provided a large refrigerator for use in the main Kitchen, which is an invaluable addition to the equipment of the Department. The Board gratefully acknowledges Mr. Allen's generous action.

A special donation of slightly over £160 has been received from the President and members of the Sparkhill and Hall Green Branch of the League to purchase and install stainless steel sinks in the Hospital.

The Board expresses much gratitude for this kind and most useful gift.

Orders have been placed for the following new equipment:—

Bed pan steriliser.

Electric blood suction apparatus.

Electric pneumostat—inhalation apparatus.

Person weighing machine.

Food mixing and mineing machine.

Infant oxygen tent.

Although there is delay in obtaining these items, together with existing equipment of a similar nature, they will greatly

help to improve the efficiency of the Hospital.

Extensions and alteration to the Fire Alarm system in the Nurses' Home, the repair and complete overhaul of the fire escapes of the Hospital and the renewal of plant in the Boiler House have been carried out during the year.

Through a number of personal contacts made in the city, a Knitting and Sewing Party was formed which Ladies' developed into what is known as "The Birmingham Linen Maternity Hospital Ladies' Linen League." The League. organiser of this new venture is Mrs. T. Oliver Lee, J.P., who through connection with the Birmingham Ladies' Hospitals Supply Training Depot and the Lady Mayoress's Depot—wartime organisations which sent articles to the Hospital—has been able to gather together this League of helpers.

An inaugural exhibition of work was held at the Hospital under the patronage of the Lady Mayoress (Mrs. A. S. Giles).

Aptly compared with a "Phoenix rising from the ashes of the wartime organisation," the League, under the leadership of Mrs. T. Oliver Lee, has already carried out excellent work.

In addition to knitting baby garments, which were handed to each patient on Christmas morning, splendid help has been given to the normal internal needs of the Hospital.

The Board is most grateful to this working party for their

valuable services.

In October, a lamp was presented to Toc H. St. Mary's Branch by Mr. Barrow Cadbury, in memory of Branch his wife—the late Mrs. Barrow Cadbury—and of Toc H. also a Branch banner was presented by members of the Hospital's Nursing Staff. A dedication ceremony was conducted in the Chapel by the Hospital's Chaplain, the Reverend J. R. Hassett, at which members of the Branch were present.

The Toc H continue to help at the Hospital whenever

possible, and tribute is paid to their services.

The After-Care Committee has carried out welfare work

and provided the patients with a number of extras in the way of additional foods, etc., and articles of baby clothing. The Board is most grateful to this Committee for their continued

Committee. interest in the patients' needs.

After the close of the year the Committee decided to cease activities owing to the change in the circumstances of their work. A final report appears on page 55. The Board records its deep sense of gratitude to the ladies who have given their services on this Committee for many years.

The retirement is recorded of two members of the Hospital's Staff who have rendered long years of valued service—Sister F. H. Cox, Sister-incharge, Out-Patient Department, twenty-two years, and Miss J. Quinn, head laundress, thirty-eight and a half years of service.

The Board conveys best wishes for their future happiness.

The Board tenders its heartfelt thanks to all the officers and collectors of the various branches of the Women's and League for services so willingly and unmaternity remittingly given during the year. The success of their efforts merits warm praise.

The Board's hearty congratulations were conveyed to Professor Sir Leonard G. Parsons, M.D., Honorary Medical F.R.C.P., F.R.C.O.G., Dean of the Faculty and Surgical Staff. of Medicine and Honorary Consulting Physician to the Maternity Hospital, on

the occasion of the Knighthood conferred upon him.

It is with pleasure that the Board records the return from active service of Dr. W. Carey Smallwood, M.B., F.R.C.P., as Honorary Physician to the Maternity Hospital, and expresses thanks to Dr. A. Brian Taylor, M.D., F.R.C.P., for his willing services generously given during Dr. Carey Smallwood's absence.

The appointment of Mr. Hugh Donovan, M.B., F.R.C.S., as Honorary General Surgeon to both Hospitals follows service of a high order given voluntarily for a number of years.

Miss Dorothy M. Shotton, M.B., C.H.B., M.R.C.O.G., was appointed to the Consulting Staff of the Maternity Hospital to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Mr. A. B. Danby.

The Board acknowledges with gratitude the valued services of Miss Sara Field-Richards, M.B., CH.B., and Mr. R. M. Williams, M.B., B.S., D.R.O.G., who acted as Resident

Surgical Officers during the year.

The appointment of a Resident Anaesthetist on the establishment of the Maternity Hospital was approved by the Central Medical War Committee. The appointment was duly made in consideration of the great increase in the emergency work and the need for tuition of the Nursing Staff in analgesia.

It is with great pleasure that the Board records the appointment of Dr. C. W. Taylor, M.B., CH.B., Director of as whole-time Director of Pathology. He has for a number of years served the Hospitals with great ability and efficiency as Pathologist and Bacteriologist.

The valued services of Dr. Taylor and his Technical Staff in this important section of the Hospitals' work are warmly

Dr. Taylor continues to retain liaison with the University as Lecturer in Gynaecological Pathology.

Full facilities for post-graduate study and experience continue to be offered to medical practitioners returning from service in His Majesty's Forces. The scheme inaugurated by the Government, affords these officers an opportunity

of becoming versed in modern obstetrical and gynaecological technique.

### Report of the Medical Board for the year 1946

With the appointment of Professor Hilda N. Lloyd to the full-time Chair of Obstetrics and Gynaecology of the University and the inclusion of beds in the Hospital in the Professorial Unit, the connection with the Medical School has been further strengthened.

The Hospital has continued to participate in the Government Scheme for the further training of demobilised medical officers.

There has been no change in accommodation during the year. The Board welcomes the proposal to restore the old Convalescent Home to take beds for in-patients and to transfer the out-patient department to the buildings formerly occupied by the Taylor Memorial Home.

### IN-PATIENT DEPARTMENT.

The number of patients admitted was 3,267, an increase of 231 on the number for 1945. The total number of deaths was 25 (0.7% of all admissions). During the year 2,736 operations were performed, of which 914 were abdominal. Deaths following operation numbered 15 (0.5%). Table I gives an analysis of the operations performed.

### SEPTIC WARD.

To this ward were admitted 111 patients suffering from some form of infection following pregnancy. Two died. Some details are given in Table II.

### OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT.

The number of new patients was 5,288, an increase of 403 on the previous year. The number of attendances of old patients was 7,872. These figures include 1,645 attendances at the Fertility Clinic.

### RADIUM.

The arrangements for the treatment of cases of malignant disease by radium and their follow-up has continued as in previous years. A cumulative table showing results in carcinoma of the cervix is appended. (Table III.)

### PATHOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT.

The Department, under the direction of Dr. Claude Taylor, continues to do an increasing amount of work. Table IV gives details of the work done in the department. In addition, laboratory assistance in the Fertility Clinic has been given, and has formed a large part of the work of the department during the year.

### X-RAY DEPARTMENT.

The total number of radiographs taken during the year was 1,685, an increase of 523 on the previous year. The number of patients X-rayed was 448, of which 309 were Maternity Hospital patients. The long-standing arrangement whereby patients from Loveday Street are X-rayed at Sparkhill causes inconvenience and needs improvement, and it is hoped that the plans for the provisions of radiography at the Maternity Hospital will soon be implemented.

### Report of the Physiotherapy Department, 1946

The work of the Physiotherapy Department of the Hospital can be divided roughly into ante-natal, post-natal

and special treatments.

In the Out-Patient Department courses have been held for the practice of ante-natal exercises and relaxation, preferably for primigravida from the fourth month of pregnancy. These mothers rehearse their part in labour, and, whenever possible, the physiotherapist is present at the birth to help put the theory into practice.

Of the Ante-natal Ward patients, a large number have received instruction in deep breathing and relaxation, both

before and during their confinement.

Post-natal exercises are held daily in the five lying-in Wards.

The caesarean section cases have individual pre-operative and post-operative breathing exercises before commencing a graduated scheme of rehabilitation.

Special treatments chiefly consist of massage to limbs and infra-red ray therapy to wounds, and a number of babies have

required daily manipulation and splintage.

Lectures and practical demonstrations have been given to the nursing staff and medical students during the year.

Three visits were also made to the Women's Hospital, where two patients received instruction in both pre- and post-operative breathing exercises.

The After-Care Committee have pleasure in presenting

their report for 1946.

Many parcels of baby clothes, Horlicks, cocoa and soups have been given to the wives of service men, mothers of twins and a mother of triplets. Wool provided by this Committee has been knitted into baby garments by the Guild of Ladies. Where needed help has been given with the payment of surgical supports and 'bus and tram fares.

Owing to the re-organisation of the Hospital and the changing circumstances the Committee feel, with regret, that their work is no longer necessary, as the after-care of patients will now pass into the new Government Health scheme. Members will, however, continue to visit the Hospital

and to serve teas, etc., at the Ante-natal clinics.

The Committee wish to express grateful thanks to Messrs. Cadbury Brothers for their generous gift of Bournvita, which

is much appreciated during this time of shortage.

The After-Care Committee have a proud record of unbroken service since their inauguration as the "Infant Health Committee" in 1913. In February of that year, Mrs. Sydney Walker called a meeting of Edgbaston ladies at which it was resolved to form an Infant Health Committee in connection with the Maternity Hospital. Mrs. L. M. Maschwitz was elected Chairman, Mrs. C. E. Keep, Honorary Secretary, and Mrs. Ralph Heaton, Honorary Treasurer. A rota of ladies was formed to visit the Hospital one morning a week and to visit once a fortnight at its home, every baby born at Loveday Street. A written record of the baby's progress was kept and reported to the monthly meetings of the Committee. This work was carried on for some years until superseded by the Infant Welfare Centres and Health Visitors. This is a very brief outline of the beginning of one of the Women's Voluntary Organisations for which Birmingham is famous.

### Gertrude Myers (Convalescent) Home REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT

FOR THE YEAR 1946.

The Committee have pleasure in presenting their Thirty-fourth Annual Report for the year ended 31st December, 1946.

The record number of 432 patients were admitted to the Home during the year, maintaining a daily average of 14.97

The Income and Expenditure account shows a deficit of £381 on the year's working. This is chiefly due to the payments made for the structural additions and alterations in connection with the Domestic Staff accommodation.

Income to meet the growing expenditure of the Home

will be warmly welcomed.

The work and management of the Home has continued mostly ably guided by the Sister-in-charge, Miss B. Browning, upon whom much additional work has rested, as for the most part of the year the Domestic Staff has been depleted in number. In these tasks she has been well assisted by Nurse D. Shoebridge. The Home is recognised for its happy and homely atmosphere and the Committee desire to express their warm thanks to the staff for their devoted service.

The extension of the Domestic Staff quarters has been completed and is a source of much satisfaction. This charming annexe to the Home has been tastefully decorated and furnished, due in the main to the generosity and kind help

of Mrs. Harry H. Pavne.

Since the close of the year the resident domestic staff has been implemented with the enrolment of two European volunteer workers who are comfortably and happily engaged in their new tasks.

The work of the garden of the Home has progressed and the production of fruit and vegetables improved. Accordingly the patients of the Home, and of the Women's Hospital, have benefitted by the varied diet it has been possible to provide.

The Committee gratefully acknowledges the gift of electric

clocks given by Mr. Edward S. Jacobs.

The recently inaugurated Library Service by the Evesham Branch of the British Red Cross Society is a much appreciated addition to the facilities afforded to patients. The Committee express their gratitude to the organisers of this service.

The Committee wish to convey their warm thanks to Dr. M. V. Murray for his willing help in connection with the medical requirements of the patients; to the subscribers and donors grateful thanks are tendered and also to the friends, helpers and those who have assisted in any way.
