are admitted on payment of a maintenance charge of 10s. 6d., or on production of a Contributory Scheme voucher.

OUT-PATIENTS.

NINETY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT

THE Committee of Management have pleasure in submitting the Ninety-fourth Annual Report of the Hospital, together with the Income and Expenditure Account for the year ended 31st December, 1938.

The following table gives particulars of the past four years' work :

IN-PATIENTS.

There was an increase of 664 in the number of in-patients treated in 1938, as compared with 1937.

The daily average number of in-patients was 62·42 compared with 40·09, and the average stay 11·68 days as against 11·67 days. The large increase in the number of patients treated is due to the fact that on the completion of the extensions there were twenty-one additional beds available. As usual, patients have been received from all parts of the Midlands for special treatment, thus emphasizing the fact that the activities of the Hospital are far-reaching in importance.

RECOVERY HOME.

The number of patients transferred last year from the main Hospital to complete their cure at the Recovery Home was 317, as compared with 243 patients in 1937. The daily average of beds occupied was 13·59, and the average stay of each patient 15·54 days as compared with a daily average of 13·09, and the average stay of each patient was 20·16 days for 1937.

OUT-PATIENTS.

The number of new out-patients registered during 1938 was 8,739, and the attendances 42,792, as compared with 8,373 new cases and 43,511 attendances in 1937. The number of old cases treated during the year was 18,812, as against 19,934 in 1937.

PRIVATE CASES.

The Private Ward Block was opened for the admission of cases on the 17th January, 1938. Since that date 269 patients have been admitted, the daily average of beds occupied being 4·49, and the average stay of each patient 5·92 days.

OFFICIAL OPENING OF THE EXTENSIONS TO THE HOSPITAL.

Dr. Francis Brett Young, the author, performed the opening ceremony of the extension to the Hospital on the 24th June, 1938.

Dr. Francis Brett Young, with the President, the Lord Mayor of Birmingham (Councillor Sir E. R. Canning), the Lady

Mayoress and Mrs. Francis Brett Young, together with a distinguished company, inspected the extensions to the Hospital after the ceremony, and expressed their satisfaction with the improvements.

IMPROVEMENTS.

During the year various improvements have been made to the Hospital, principally to the exterior by means of cleaning and repointing the brick-work and the painting of the wood and iron work.

The X-ray Department corridor has been provided with very necessary ventilation, while further improvements have been made to the Out-Patient Department by the provision of new seating, and the stone floor covered with linoleum, thus giving added comfort to the patients waiting to see their particular doctor.

FINANCE.

Reviewing the Income and Expenditure Account, the ordinary income for the year was £17,297 8s. 3d. and the ordinary expenditure £16,794 7s. 7d. Full particulars of the above figures and of the Income and Expenditure on Special Accounts will be found in the financial statements. The Committee, whilst appreciating the financial support at present received from neighbouring districts, beg to draw the attention of the residents of these places to the fact that this support is far short of the cost of treating the patients from such districts, and they trust their appeal for more generous contributions will not be in vain.

The Committee desire to record their appreciation and thanks for the valuable help rendered to the Hospital by the annual subscribers, donors of money, and gifts in kind. During the year annual subscriptions received amounted to £1,197 18s. 10d., as against £1,055 18s. 9d. in 1937.

A large number of subscribers have availed themselves of adding to the value of their gifts without further cost to themselves by adopting the scheme whereby the Hospital may obtain a refund of Income Tax. It is hoped that this method of helping the Hospital will commend itself to all subscribers, as thereby the income from subscriptions can be increased considerably without any additional expense to the subscriber. BIRMINGHAM HOSPITALS CONTRIBUTORY ASSOCIATION.

The amount received from the Birmingham Hospitals Contributory Association during the year was £11,288. The Committee acknowledge with gratitude this vital contribution to the Hospital's income, and wish all concerned with this splendid organisation every success in their efforts to secure financial support for the voluntary hospitals of Birmingham.

Grateful thanks are due to all those who contribute in no small way to the success of this feature of the Birmingham Hospitals Contributory Association.

BIRMINGHAM HOSPITAL SUNDAY FUND.

The Committee are most grateful to the Hospital Sunday Fund Committee for their grant of £251 8s. 3d. to the funds of the Hospital. Thanks are also tendered to the clergy and ministers and to the church officers and congregations for the excellent response to the annual appeal, and for their continued interest in the well-being of the hospitals in the city.

HOSPITAL COUNCIL SUNDAY ENTERTAINMENTS CHARITABLE FUND.

The Hospital received a welcome addition to the funds by the receipt of a grant from the above fund of £236, and the Committee offer their grateful thanks to all concerned.

MANAGEMENT.

Mr. A. M. Thompson was elected Chairman and Mr. G. C. King Vice-Chairman of the Committee for the year.

HONORARY MEDICAL STAFF.

The Committee again express their appreciation and thanks to the Honorary Medical Staff for their unremitting care of the patients and attention to the interests of the Hospital. This appreciation, the Committee are sure, is shared by the patients and the Governors.

Mr. A. J. Moffett, M.B., Ch.B., F.R.C.S., has been elected an Hon. Assistant Surgeon to the Hospital.

OBITUARY.

It is with deep regret that the Committee have to place on record the death of Dr. C. B. Dale, who held the appointment of Anæsthetist to the Hospital from 1906 to 1934, and when he retired from that post was appointed Honorary Anæsthetist. Dr. Dale rendered invaluable service to the Hospital.

LADIES' LINEN LEAGUE.

Special mention must be made of the Ladies' Linen League, which materially assists the work of the Hospital by supplying bed and other linen. The League is a most valuable asset to the Hospital, and the efforts of the members are much appreciated.

LADY VISITORS.

Thanks are due to the lady visitors for their personal interest in the Hospital. Their kind help and suggestions are much valued by the Committee.

APPOINTMENTS.

The appointments of House Surgeons during the year have been filled by Dr. D. B. French, Dr. H. C. Saksena, Dr. J. H. Hofmeyr, Dr. L. C. Gunn, Dr. E. Kaplan, Dr. D. K. Roa, and Dr. E. J. Fitzpatrick, who have performed their duties to the satisfaction of the Medical Staff and the Committee.

The Committee desire to extend to all generous friends who have from time to time contributed gifts, for the comfort of the patients, their sincere appreciation and thanks. (See page 35 for list.)

In conclusion, the Committee desire to record their appreciation of the services rendered throughout the year by the Matron, Secretary, and the Nursing and Office Staffs of the Hospital, and for their assiduous attention in carrying out their duties.

REPORT OF THE MEDICAL COMMITTEE FOR 1938.

The Medical Committee beg to submit the following report to the Governors for the year 1938.

During the greater part of the year the number of beds available has been ninety-eight, making the Hospital the largest of its kind outside London. The extra beds acquired through our extension scheme were needed to enable the Hospital to cope with emergency operations, but at the same time the waiting list has been steadily reduced. Although our Casualty and Out-Patient Department is a very large one, we have been able, with occasional exceptions, to admit any out-patients requiring urgent treatment.

An appointment system for seeing old out-patients has been in operation for over a year and works smoothly and is greatly appreciated by the patients.

The Hay Fever Clinic is being continued and the formation of a Hearing Aid Clinic to give advice to the severely deaf is under consideration.

The Hospital has been fortunate for several years in possessing an adequate supply of radium, which continues to be of great value in the treatment of cancer of the nose and throat.

The Private Wards are fully occupied and have been of great assistance to patients and the Medical Staff.

BIRMINGHAM AND MIDLAND EAR AND THROAT HOSPITAL.

Extracts from the Laws.

I. This Hospital shall be called "The Birmingham and Midland Ear and Throat Hospital."

III. The object of the Hospital shall be the treatment of those suffering from diseases of the Ear, Throat, Nose and adjacent parts, who are unable to pay for the necessary medical treatment.

IV. The Hospital shall be supported by voluntary contributions and subscriptions.

V. The Governors of the Hospital shall be the following : Donors of £25 and upwards in one sum to the funds of the Hospital shall be Governors for Life : Annual Subscribers of One Guinea or more ; Representatives nominated by Firms, Companies, Clubs, and Societies, subscribing not less than One Guinea per annum—one Representative for each body. Persons elected by an Annual or Special General Meeting in consideration of any important services rendered to the Hospital.

VII. All Subscriptions shall be paid in advance for the current year, and shall become due either on the 1st January or 1st July in each year.

IN-PATIENT DEPARTMENT.

I. Patients who are subscribers to a Contributory Scheme making a grant to the Hospital and their dependants will be exempt from any maintenance or other charge at the Hospital. Other patients will be admitted on payment of a maintenance charge of 9s. per day, with a minimum charge of 36s. This minimum charge to be paid on or before admission.

II. Patients are requested to bring Soap, two Towels, Brush and Comb, Slippers, and two Nightgowns or Pyjamas.

III. Every patient on admission shall have a bath.

IV. Neither food nor stimulants of any kind are permitted to be brought into the Hospital by the patients or their friends.

V. No food of any kind to be kept in the Wards.

VI. No talking allowed in the Wards before 6-30 a.m., or after 8-30 p.m.

VII. All patients allowed to leave their beds shall do so at 7 a.m. in Summer and 8 a.m. in Winter.

VIII. Any patient who is able is allowed to go out by permission of the House Surgeon between the hours of 1-30 p.m. and 3-30 p.m.

IX. All patients who are able will be expected to assist in the work of the Wards.

X. No clothes are allowed to be kept in the Wards. Patients' clothes will be taken care of during their stay in the Hospital.

XI. Patients are allowed to see friends every Sunday, from 1-30 to 3-30 o'clock p.m., not more than two being admitted at one time and not more than four on one day.

XII. Patients are not allowed to have Visitors on any other than the Visiting Day, without permission from the Matron or the House Surgeon.

XIII. Strict obedience to these Rules is required, under a penalty of dismissal.

OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT.

I. Out-patients are admitted on payment of a Registration Fee of 5s., and are entitled therefor to four weeks' treatment.

II. Subscribers to a Contributory Scheme making a grant to the Hospital will be exempt from payment
