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





ANNUAL REPORT, 1930



The Board of Management of the Adelaide Hospital, in accordance with section 12 (1) of the Hospitals Act Amendment Act, 1921, has the honor to submit for the information of the Minister, the Sixty-first Annual Report on the administration, showing the condition and progress of the institution, for the year ended December 31st, 1930.

The Board held 54 meetings during the year. In addition, the Chairman and members frequently and continuously throughout the year pay visits to the Hospital in connection with the administrative work. The condemnation of worn-out and useless stores is under their supervision.

FINANCE.

Revenue.—The total receipts from all sources, including all branches of the Hospital, for the year 1930, were £43,443 8s. 7d., as against £43,009 12s. 10d. for the year 1929, an increase of £433 15s. 9d.

The amount of patients' fees on account of the Adelaide Hospital was £11,102 15s. 9d. for the year 1930, as compared with £11,690 2s. 5d. for the year 1929, a decrease of £587 6s. 8d. This result is considered very satisfactory in view of the prevailing financial depression.

Patients' fees to the amount of £9,553 10s. 1d. were written off by the Board during the year. The amount written off during the previous year was £4,357 17s. 6d.

The fees received toward the maintenance of each patient, based on the daily average number of patients, in 1930 were £23 17s. 6 2/5d., as against £25 0s. 7 4/5d. in 1929.

Patients' fees received on account of the Consumptive Home show an increase of £150 15s. 10d. over the previous year, £1,191 11s. 9d. in 1930 as against £1,040 15s. 11d. in 1929.

The fees received for maintenance of patients in the Infectious Diseases Block were £118 9s. less than the previous year, £1,194 7s. 5d. in 1930 as compared with £1,312 16s. 5d. in 1929.

Laboratory fees were £2,542 19s. 1d. for 1930, as compared with £2,604 18s. 5d. for 1929. The revenue from this branch amounts to 51·5 per cent. of the expenditure.

The fees from the Dental Branch were £291 6s. 5d. less than the previous year, £775 16s. in 1930 as compared with £1,067 2s. 5d. in 1929. Increasing numbers of persons, unable to contribute anything towards their treatment, have been dealt with during the year. A large number of patients from other Government institutions is also treated.

Details of revenue for 1930 will be found in Appendix No. 2. A table of comparisons of revenue for the years 1921-1930 is also shown.

Expenditure.—Details of expenditure will be found in Appendix No. 2.

The total expenditure for maintenance on all branches of the Hospital for the year 1930 was £114,769 9s. 10d., as compared with £113,381 5s. 3d. for the previous year, an increase of £1,388 4s. 7d.

Salaries and wages were £4,092 3s. 2d. more than the previous year, whilst there is a reduction on the amount spent for provisions, medicines, etc., of £2,703 18s. 7d.

RATING FOR HOSPITAL PURPOSES ACT, 1919.

An amount of £22,547 10s. 10d. was received during the year from district councils and corporations in the metropolitan area. The rate has now been discontinued by the Government.

POPULATION.

The number of new patients admitted to the Hospital for the year 1930 was 8,858, being 323 less than the number admitted during the year 1929.

The daily average number of indoor patients was 465, as compared with 467 for the previous year.

The total number of in-door patients treated during the year 1930 was 9,258, as compared with 9,616 in 1929.

The number of new patients attending the Out-Patients' Department was 11,718, as compared with 10,258 for the previous year. The total number of out-patient attendances in 1930 was 61,473, as against 53,455 in 1929.

At the T.B. Clinic 192 persons were under treatment during the year as compared with 139 for the previous year.

In the Consumptive Home and Cancer Block the daily average was 73, and in the Infectious Diseases Block 26.

The total number of attendances at the Dental Hospital for all purposes was 41,651, as against 31,964 for the previous year. The admissions for treatment were 6,611, being 1,824 more than the year 1929.

HONORARY STAFF.

Dr. F. H. Beare, Honorary Assistant Physician, Infectious Diseases Block, was granted twelve (12) months' leave of absence to enable him to proceed abroad.

Dr. O. W. Frewin was appointed Temporary Bacteriologist in Charge of the Vaccine Department in the place of Dr. Helen M. Mayo, on three (3) months' leave.

Professor J. B. Cleland, Honorary Pathologist, was granted six (6) months' leave of absence, and Dr. F. R. Hone was appointed as *locum tenens* to supervise the pathological work.

The following members of the Honorary Staff who retired by effluxion of time on June 30th, 1930, were re-appointed for a further term of three (3) years, viz. :—

The Board records with regret the death of Dr. John Corbin, who rendered many years of valuable service in the Surgical Section of the Hospital.

The large increase in the number of 8½ x 6½ films used in 1930, compared with the previous three years, represents another large saving, which it is impossible to estimate.

The X-Ray treatment plant has been re-created, and since starting work on September 9th, 1930, seventeen treatments have been given to eight patients.

Since the establishment of the Radium Department the photographic work has very largely increased, 180 photographs being taken in 1930.

**REPORT ON THE ACTIVITIES OF THE RADIO-THERAPEUTIC
DEPARTMENT FOR 1930.**

The work of this Department has continued along the lines adopted in 1929, new cases coming up each Tuesday afternoon for examination and discussion by a Committee of Honorary Medical Officers, while cases already treated present themselves for examination and progress report. The meetings have been held with great regularity, and have been uniformly well attended. We have had the misfortune, however, to lose the services of our Honorary Director of Treatment, Dr. A. A. Lendon, owing to an illness which we sincerely hope to be of a temporary nature only. In his absence Dr. F. S. Hone has carried out the duties of Acting Chairman.

The treating of cases in this Department has been expedited by the loan of four beds for male patients in Leopold Ward. The nominal control of the Incurable Cancer Block has also been vested in the Cancer Treatment Committee, thus giving them increased facilities for the observation of patients who have had treatment at a previous date. A Registrar for the Department, Dr. B. S. Hanson, commenced his duties on January 1st, 1930.

RADIUM DEPARTMENT (DR. H. A. McCoy).

The year was signalised by the acquisition of increased equipment in the form of a further grant of radium from Canberra, and the installation of a special lead-lined radium safe set in barium concrete. Although further radium in relatively large pieces would be of great value at times, with the normal influx of patients sufficient of the element has now been received to carry out most of the treatments desired.

Together with various other small pieces of equipment, we have added a lead carrier for the transportation of needles to and from the Theatre.

Success in treatments with radium has been not inconsiderably aided by the prompt and complete co-operation of members of the Honorary Staff with the Radium Department.

DEEP THERAPY DEPARTMENT (DR. J. STANLEY VERO).

The installation of a deep-therapy plant was a much needed addition to the armamentarium of the Hospital for the treatment of Cancer and allied conditions, and was carried out at the end of March of this year. It usurped the place of the superficial therapy machine, which has since been erected in new quarters. The period of usefulness of the new machine has been somewhat curtailed by mechanical trouble and a difficulty in the supply of new tubes towards the end of the year, but it is hoped that these troubles will be overcome in the near future.

A large amount of experimental and standardising work, essential for the successful operation of a new unit such as this, has been carried out by Dr. Verco during the year. Several rather expensive specialised instruments would help him in this work, and it is hoped to obtain these—possibly with the aid of the Cancer Research Committee at the University.

STUDENTS.

Students attending the practice of the Hospital were as follows :—First year, nil ; second year, 6 ; third year, 5 ; fourth year, 4 ; total, 15.

In the final examinations four students graduated for the Degree of Bachelor of Dental Surgery, University of Adelaide.

GENERAL REMARKS.

The accompanying appendices show that the demand for treatment continues to increase over that of previous years. The applications for treatment and admissions to the clinic are considerably higher. As a result, the Department has been quite unable to keep pace with the conservation and artificial denture work on hand. This congestion is augmented not only by the increased demand for treatment, but also owing to the necessity of more time being devoted to immediate relief work, such as extractions and treatment of septic conditions.

Recommendations for relieving the stress of work of the Hospital have been forwarded to the Government.

Returns show a still further decrease in revenue, a feature which is largely due to the fact that over 70 per cent. of the patients admitted are in receipt of rations, pensions, and Government relief, or are inmates or wards of Government and charitable institutions.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES BLOCK.

The number of new cases admitted during the year (570) was 95 more than the previous year.

The deaths total 36, a mortality rate of 6·06 per cent. on the number treated for the year.

The diphtheria cases were six more than the previous year, 157 cases in 1930 and 151 in 1929. There was one (1) death.

There were 19 cases of Scarlatina treated in 1930, as against 23 in 1929. There were no deaths.

The number of cases of measles treated was 13 less than the previous year, 74 in 1930 and 87 in 1929. There were four deaths, being a mortality rate of 5·4 per cent.

The number of cases of Erysipelas was 88, as compared with 57 for the previous year, an increase of 31. There were six deaths, a mortality rate of 6·81 per cent.

The work of the laboratory is clearly separated into two main divisions, viz., work done for patients admitted to the Adelaide Hospital for treatment and that done for private medical practitioners, boards of health, Stock Department, and other public institutions. All the work in these two main divisions is more or less of a routine character, but wherever possible, research or investigational work is carried out on diseases of man and animals, and also on the improvement of laboratory methods used in the diagnosis of disease. As far as possible this work is summarised in the following table, but this summary does not represent all the activities of the staff, which, in addition, concerns itself in the care and maintenance of apparatus; the preparation of staining solutions, culture, media, &c., for use by students both in the Hospital and at the University; assistance to the Honorary Pathologist in the building up and maintenance of a museum and pathological and bacteriological examinations in connection with the *post mortem* room; the maintenance of a library of current scientific publications on pathology, bacteriology, bio-chemistry, and related subjects.

It is not possible to give a very accurate picture of the activities of the laboratory staff and the work done by giving the actual number of examinations made, for one examination may involve, for example, 10 times the amount of time that another does. For the most part, however, such a summary does convey, particularly to those familiar with laboratory work, some idea of the main activities of the staff.

The *Clinical Pathological* examinations performed for the Adelaide Hospital include—(1) The histological diagnosis of pathological tissues, several of which were immediate examinations performed during operations (such examinations are done in order to help the surgeon in determining the extent and nature of the operation necessary); (2) the examination of urine to detect abnormal chemical and morphological elements; (3) the examination of faeces to detect the presence of abnormal elements; (4) the examination of cerebro-spinal fluid to detect cellular and chemical change (this examination is extremely useful in detecting syphilis of the central nervous system); (5) the examination of the blood to detect the presence of the various anaemias and leukaemias; (6) the examination of material for the detection of *spirochoeta pallida* in the diagnosis of syphilis; (7) the examination of fluids from various cavities and cysts to determine their nature.

The bio-chemical examinations performed for the Adelaide Hospital include—(1) The estimation of the amount of sugar in the blood (this examination is made as an aid to the diagnosis of diabetes, and is made either after a fasting period or after the administration of glucose when several examinations are made to trace the rise and fall in the blood sugar); (2) the estimation of the urea nitrogen in the blood; (3) the examination of the gastric contents after a test meal, either one sample at the end of one hour or smaller samples at more frequent intervals over a period of two and a half hours; (4) colloidal gold curves on cerebro-spinal fluids; (5) chemical examinations of various body fluids.

The *Bacteriological Examinations* performed for the Adelaide Hospital include—(1) The examination of sputum for the detection of tubercle bacilli and other bacteria, and also for hydatid hooklets; (2) the examination of blood for the Widal reaction (this examination is important in assisting in the diagnosis of typhoid fever); (3) the examination of swabs taken from the throat and nose to detect the presence of diphtheria bacilli; (4) the examination of urine to detect the presence of tubercle bacilli, colon bacilli, and other bacteria; (5) the examination of inflammatory fluids, for the detection of bacteria, e.g., pleuritic

fluid for tubercle bacilli ; (6) examination of cerebral-spinal fluid to detect the presence of tubercle bacilli, meningococci, and other bacteria ; (7) the cultural examination of blood to detect the presence of bacteria in the circulation ; (8) the examination of faeces and urine for the detection of typhoid bacilli and other pathogenic bacteria ; (9) the examination of pus for the detection of gonococci, actinomyces, and other bacteria. Bacteria isolated from the various fluids and materials are often used in the preparation of autogenous vaccines.

The *Wassermann Reaction* was performed on Thursday in each week. This reaction is of great value in the diagnosis and treatment of syphilis. The Griffith & Scott technique is employed throughout.

The examinations performed and classified under the head *Private Work* include in the main such examinations as described under clinical pathological, bio-chemical, and bacteriological examinations. Much work was done for the Board of Health. Included in the examinations are also :—Examinations of various foodstuffs for the detection of bacterial contamination ; (2) examination of drinking water to determine its suitability for drinking purposes. Included under this head are regular examinations for the Hydraulic Engineer's Department and for the Adelaide Local Board of Health ; (3) the examination of disinfectants to determine their germicidal power ; and (4) medico-legal examinations.

The routine examinations for the *Stock Department* include—(1) Bacteriological examinations of cow's milk for the detection of tubercle bacilli and other bacteria ; (2) morbid tissues for histopathological examination ; (3) examination of faeces to determine the presence of parasitism ; (4) examination of cow's blood for the diagnosis of contagious abortion by the agglutination test ; (5) specimens removed *post mortem* from animals dying from various causes, &c.

During the year investigations were continued on "swelled head" in rams, and a prophylactic vaccine was prepared and administered to animals in the field. Investigations were also made into diseases of unknown etiology in sheep, poultry, and pigs.

The Vaccine Department, as well as preparing 262 separate vaccines, also administered inoculations of vaccine to hospital patients. During the year 290 hospital patients were under treatment. The majority of these patients visited the laboratory twice a week during their course of treatment, when they received their injections. In all, 1,862 doses of vaccine were administered ; also 301 doses of tuberculin were given to 12 patients. Vaccines were prepared for 102 patients under the care of private practitioners, and 1,008 doses (including 141 doses of tuberculin and 176 doses of T.A.B. and B.C.C.), and 382 c.c., were supplied in bulk to private practitioners.

The Vaccine Department continued to undertake the work of testing asthma and hay fever patients for sensitization against various extraneous substances, and to carry out the appropriate treatment. During the year 90 patients were tested against the various pollen, protein, and epithelial extracts. Nine patients were treated and received 109 doses; three patients received 73 doses of peptone, and two patients received 24 doses of adrenalin.

During the year arrangements were made whereby the sterilization and preparation of catgut for surgical use in the hospital was undertaken in the laboratory.

Summary and Comments.—The figures show that there has been an increase of 1,413 examinations over those made during the previous year. The increase is due to the larger number of examinations made for patients in the Adelaide Hospital. The increase in the number of histopathological examinations made is partly due to the number of these examinations required by the Radium Department, 131 examinations being made during the year.

Under the head of private work 402 fewer examinations were made, which represents a fall of approximately 7 per cent. This is a small decrease considering the depression in trade.

VENEREAL DISEASES.—NIGHT CLINICS.

REPORT FOR YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31ST, 1930.

Improved accommodation for the treatment of venereal diseases is urgently necessary.

The Venereal Diseases Act, passed by Parliament in 1920, has not yet been proclaimed. The provisions of this Act could not be effectively carried out until accommodation for the treatment of both in-door and out-door patients is provided. It is considered that the Act should be proclaimed as soon as possible.

REPORT OF OPERATIONS FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31ST, 1930.

Male Section.

Surgeon.—Dr. G. H. Burnell, B.S., M.D.

Honorary Clinical Assistant—Dr. H. R. Pomroy, M.B., B.S., F.R.C.S.

During the year under review the work has been carried on in the new temporary building. With the new facilities at hand the treatment of increasing number of patients has been more satisfactory and considerably more expeditious. The maximum number of patients treated in one evening is 180, and the average about 140-150. Permission has been given for the purchase of up-to-date instruments and equipment, and when these arrive the conditions under which the patients are treated should be satisfactory.

As will be seen from the subjoined table, a large number of patients not suffering from venereal disease were seen, and it is an encouraging fact that use is made of the clinic by such people to detect the probable outbreak of venereal trouble in its earliest stages, because the whole outlook in venereal disease depends on the stage the patients have reached before they seek treatment.

The total number of patients for the year was 919, and the total number of attendances 15,143. There were 233 cases of syphilis and 476 cases of gonorrhoea treated. Not included in the above were 55 persons who had both gonorrhoea and syphilis, and 140 persons attended on account of diseases which were shown to be other than venereal.

Female Section.

Surgeon—Dr. R. F. Matters, M.B., Ch.M., F.R.C.S.

A review of the work of the Female Night Clinic for 1930 is most satisfactory.

There were many cases of tertiary syphilis who had been under treatment for years, and most of these have been discharged during the year.

Some cerebrospinal treatment of syphilis has been undertaken with very good results, but there is some difficulty regarding these cases owing to the time that each one requires.

It would accelerate the treatment of some cases of syphilis if one or two beds were available for treatment on pyrexial lines plus arsenical compounds.

The installation of the diathermy apparatus has made a wonderful difference in the treatment of gonorrhœa and the average time of treatment has been reduced by as much as four months.

The Sisters and Nurses have co-operated magnificently in carrying out the work. This is the best report which has been given from the Female Night Clinic for some years.

The total number of patients for the year was 280, and the number of attendances 4,928. There were 128 cases of syphilis and 109 of gonorrhœa treated. Not included in the above were 24 patients who had both gonorrhœa and syphilis, whilst nine (9) patients attended for diseases which on examination were found to be non-venereal.
