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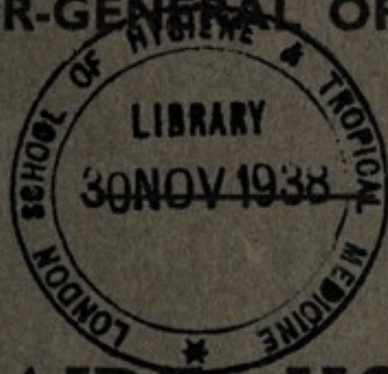

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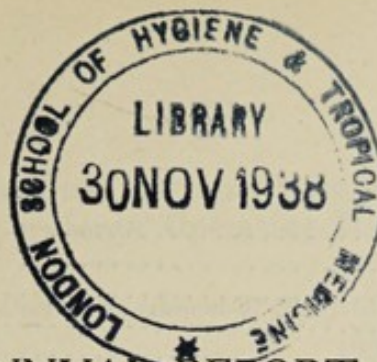
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ANNUAL REPORT, 1937.

The Board of Management of the Adelaide Hospital in accordance with section 31 (1) of the Hospitals Act, 1934, has the honour to submit for the information of the Minister the Sixty-eighth Annual Report on the administration, showing the condition and progress of the Institution for the year ended 31st December, 1937.

The Inspector-General of Hospitals, who is also the Director-General of Medical Services, is the Chairman of the Board, as provided by the Hospitals Act, 1934.

The Board consists of Dr. L. W. Jeffries (Chairman), Sir Wallace Sandford, and Mr. E. R. Dawes. The Secretary to the Board is Mr. C. E. Spiller. The Board held 52 meetings during the year. Quarterly conferences with the Honorary Staff were held, in addition to conferences with the Advisory Committee. The Chairman and the members frequently visited the hospital throughout the year in connection with the administrative work.

All worn out and useless articles are condemned under the personal supervision of a member of the Board.

Sir Wallace Sandford and Mr. E. R. Dawes, whose appointments as members of the Board expired by effluxion of time on 28th February 1937, were reappointed for a further term of three (3) years from 1st March, 1937.

The Board desires to place on record its pleasure at the Knighthood conferred on Sir Wallace Sandford by His Majesty the King.

CASUALTY ROOM.

Patients to the number of 49,730 passed through the Casualty Room. Of that number 13,478 were treated or advised. The remainder were either admitted to the Hospital or sent on to the Out-patients' Department.

Full details of the work of the Chest Clinic for the year 1937, as it now functions under the direction of the Chief Medical Officer for Tuberculosis Services, are published in another section of the report.

REVENUE.

The revenue has been satisfactorily maintained during the year.

The receipts from all sources, including all branches of the Hospital for the year 1937, were £26,121 1s. 3d., as compared with £25,693 12s. for the year 1936, an increase of £427 9s. 3d.

The amount of patients' fees received on account of the Adelaide Hospital (excluding the Dental Branch) showed a satisfactory increase, £20,892 11s. 1d. for the year 1937, as against £19,757 1s. 11d. for the year 1936, an increase of £1,135 9s. 2d.

The revenue from the South Australian Government Laboratory was £561 1s. 6d. less than the previous year—£2,178 6s. 9d. for the year 1937 as compared with £2,739 8s. 3d. for the year 1936. The reduction

in revenue from this Branch is due to the resumed activity of the Laboratory of the Northfield Infectious Diseases Hospital, with a consequent reduction of routine examinations at the Adelaide Hospital Laboratory.

Full details of the revenue for the year 1937 will be found in Appendix No. 2.

A comparison of the revenue for the years 1921-1937 is also shown.

EXPENDITURE.

Details of expenditure will be found in Appendix No. 2.

The total expenditure for all branches of the Hospital for the year 1937 was £140,127 1s. 3d., as compared with £125,723 9s. 5d. for the year 1936, an increase of £14,403 11s. 10d.

The expenditure of the Adelaide Hospital (excluding the Laboratory, Dental Branch, and the Chest Clinic) was £125,926 15s. 7d. for 1937 as against £114,655 4s. 8d. for 1936, an increase of £11,271 10s. 11d.

Classification salary increases and large increases in the number of the Nursing and Domestic Staffs due to the introduction of the 48-hour week for nurses, are the principal reasons for the increased cost of salaries and wages.

Fifty-seven (57) additional nurses were required for the 48-hour week.

The expenditure of the South Australian Government Laboratory was £2,223 19s. 9d. more than the previous year. Salaries and wages accounted for £865 19s. 3d. of this increase.

There was a decrease of £195 7s. 11d. in the expenditure of the Dental Branch.

POPULATION.

The daily average number of in-patients for the year 1937 was 589, as compared with 555 for the previous year, an increase of 34.

Patients treated at the Out-patients' Department numbered 25,267, as compared with 24,720 for the previous year, an increase of 547.

Out-patient attendances increased from 111,268 to 111,439, an increase of 171.

The admissions for treatment at the Dental Branch were 4,060 in 1937, as compared with 4,176 in 1936, a decrease of 116.

ADELAIDE HOSPITAL LABORATORY ADVISORY COMMITTEE.

The plans for the reorganisation of the Adelaide Hospital Laboratory and for the creation of an Institute of Medical and Veterinary Science progressed during the year. The following persons were reappointed to the Adelaide Hospital Laboratory Advisory Committee for a period of 12 months from 27th March, 1937 :—

Nominated by the Adelaide Hospital Board—Dr. L. W. Jeffries, Mr. E. R. Dawes (during the absence on leave of Sir Wallace Sandford). Nominated by the University of Adelaide—Dr. C. T. Ch. de Crespigny (Chairman of the Committee), Dr. W. Ray. Also the Honorary Pathologist to the Adelaide Hospital, Professor J. B. Cleland.

On the return of Sir Wallace Sandford in November, 1937, approval was received for both him and Mr. Dawes to be members of the Committee.

The Committee, in collaboration with the Director of the Laboratory prepared plans for a new building to be erected in the Adelaide Hospital grounds abutting Frome Road, and on the 23rd August, 1937, the foundation stone of the building was laid by the Hon. the Chief Secretary. It is expected that the new building will be ready for occupation early in 1939. The cost of the building and necessary scientific equipment is to be met partly by the Government, partly from funds provided by three generous donors through the University of Adelaide, and partly by funds made available by the Commissioners of Charitable Funds.

In order to provide proper control of the Institute an Act entitled the "Institute of Medical and Veterinary Science Act, 1937" was passed by the State Parliament on 2nd December, 1937. This Act provides for the establishment of an Institute of Medical and Veterinary

Science and for the appointment of a Council to control the Institute. The Council is to consist of six members, as follows :—

- (a) The person holding the office of Director-General of Medical Services.
- (b) Two other members of the Board of Management of the Adelaide Hospital.
- (c) Two persons nominated by the University of Adelaide, and
- (d) A person whose business includes the raising of stock.

The Act names Dr. E. Weston Hurst as the first Director of the Institute.

Up to the end of the year the Act had not been proclaimed, but it is expected that this will be done early in 1938, and that the Institute will begin on 1st July, 1938.

OFFICIAL VISITORS.

The following official visitors were reappointed for a term of one year, viz. :—Mrs. M. B. Martin and Mr. T. P. Howard.

Mrs. A. M. Lindsay, R.R.C., is also an official visitor.

NURSING STAFF.

The roster of 48-hour per week for the Nursing Staff was put into operation during the year.

The number of additional Nursing Staff appointed for this purpose was as follows :—1 Sister Tutor, 3 Charge Nurses, 3 Staff Nurses, 50 Probationer Nurses.

In order to provide accommodation for the additional Staff it was necessary to lease apartments on North Terrace, opposite the Hospital, viz. :—Chalmers House and six apartment houses.

This additional accommodation was necessary pending the erection of a new Nurses' Home on Frome Road, plans for which have been approved.

In consequence of the overcrowded condition of the Hospital ten (10) additional probationer nurses were appointed.

ELECTRIC CLOCKS.

On account of the unsatisfactory condition of the clocks in the Hospital it was decided to install electric clocks throughout, which were provided from funds held by the Commissioners of Charitable Funds.

CONVALESCENT BED CASES.

Arrangements were made with St. Margaret's Convalescent Hospital, Semaphore, to receive convalescent patients from the Adelaide Hospital, who still require nursing in bed. It was agreed to accommodate at St. Margaret's an average of 20 patients at a rate of £1 6s. 6d. per week.

This arrangement will result in making more beds available at the Adelaide Hospital, and reduce the waiting list. This scheme came into operation at the end of the year.

FIRE APPLIANCES.

Fire appliances are inspected regularly by an officer of the Fire Brigades Board who gives instructions to the male and female staff in their use.

ADELAIDE HOSPITAL AUXILIARY.

The Board appreciates the work of members of the Adelaide Hospital Auxiliary who continue to provide refreshments, &c., at the Kiosk situated on the grounds of the Hospital, and who expend the profits on bed linen, &c., for the wards. The Government continues to subsidise such expenditure in aid of a Women's Hospital, which it is proposed to erect on the Hospital grounds.

GOLD MEDALLISTS.

The following Probationer Nurses having passed first class in the examinations, were presented with a Gold Medal, viz. :—Thelma Lilian Nicol, Veronica Agnes Jane Coghlan, Catherine Annie Thomas, Norah Muriel Coombs, Maisie Doreen Bettess, Ellen Agnes Jane Menzies, Desma Ryan Fairfax, Elizabeth Irene Uren, Jean Florence Kimber.

RADIUM AND DEEP X-RAY THERAPY.

The Anti-Cancer Campaign General Committee continues to provide funds towards the cost of the work of this branch of the Hospital.

There has been no alteration in accommodation for this Department during the year, but plans for a new clinic room in the old dispensary, a new waiting room for deep X-ray patients and two waiting rooms for clinic patients, as well as alterations in present accommodation, have been prepared by the Architect-in-Chief's Department, and have been passed by the Hospital Board.

While the supply of radon was satisfactory this means of treatment was adopted as far as possible to prevent congestion in the wards, but since November, 1937, when supplies became erratic and inadequate, full use had to be made of the accommodation afforded this Department in the wards.

Towards the end of the year the physicist to the Anti-Cancer Campaign Committee, Mr. E. S. H. Gibson, M.Sc., resigned from the position. The resignation was accepted and the Department is now without the services of a physicist.

In December Mr. McLennan resigned from the staff of the laboratory after 10 years valuable service as Veterinary Pathologist ; a successor will be appointed shortly. Dr. J. B. Thiersch was appointed to the new post of Neale Research Pathologist, and will take up his duties early in the new year. Miss Barbara Cooke was appointed Research Assistant.

The plans for the main building of the Institute of Medical and Veterinary Science are now nearly complete, and it is expected that construction will begin early in 1938. A new and up-to-date house for normal and experimental laboratory animals has already been erected and provides for the first time adequate facilities for the experimental investigation of human and of animal diseases.

In consequence of the resumed activity of the laboratory of the Northfield Infectious Diseases Hospital, the number of routine investigations performed during the year has fallen to the previous average level of about 23,000 ; the annual revenue has fallen correspondingly.

Under the new sub-division of "special investigations" are included more or less complicated experimental researches into the causation of obscure conditions. As a result of one of these it has been shown for the first time that the disease psittacosis occurs in South Australia. During the last year the Ascheim-Zondek test for pregnancy has been performed at the hospital laboratory instead of at the University as previously. The cramped accommodation and general lack of facilities have prevented any considerable amount of research during the period under review.

It is not possible to convey an altogether accurate impression of the activities of the laboratory staff, and of the work done, by giving the actual number of examinations made, for one examination may involve perhaps 10 times the amount of time that another does. The gradual but definite tendency noted in previous years, to increase of those tests needing much time and attention at the expense of comparatively simple tests, has resulted in greater effort being necessary by members of the staff even though the total number of investigations remains the same. Thus the number of test meals doubled during last year, that of urea clearance tests trebled, and that of full blood counts increased at the expense of partial counts. Other similar examples may be discovered by a comparison of the two sets of figures. While it is gratifying that the hospital is thus obtaining a much more efficient laboratory service, if this tendency persists an augmented staff solely for routine work will be needed in the not-far distant future. VENEREAL DISEASES.—NIGHT CLINICS.

REPORT FOR YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER, 1937.

Improved accommodation for the treatment of venereal diseases is urgently necessary.

The Venereal Diseases Act, passed by Parliament in 1920, has not yet been proclaimed. The provisions of this Act could not be effectively carried out until accommodation for the treatment of both in-door and out-door patients is provided. It is considered that the Act should be proclaimed as soon as possible.

Report of the Medical Officer.

The main feature of interest this year in the working of the clinic has been the introduction of sulphanilamide for the treatment of urethritis, gonococcal and non-specific.

Though it may still be considered to be more or less experimental, yet there is no doubt that it has cleared up many cases of chronic lower urinary tract infection, and shortened the treatment of many cases of acute urethritis.

Eight patients were seen suffering from primary syphilis, five of whom contracted their disease in Adelaide.

Report of the Medical Officer.

In last year's report emphasis was laid on the large decrease in new patients. This year we have to report a large increase in new patients, from 66 to 118.

I am at a loss to account for this. However, total attendances are lower, and the efficiency of our methods of treatment is being improved, as shown by the satisfactory results.

This is due, of course, largely to the excellent work of the nursing staff, and to them great praise is due.

The Da Costa Samaritan Fund was inaugurated in 1898, through the munificence of the late Miss Louisa Da Costa, who left portion of her estate to be held in Trust, the income therefrom to be used for the benefit of convalescent patients of the Adelaide Hospital.

In accordance with the Trust Deed, the estate is vested in three (3) Trustees. The appointment of any Trustee is subject to the approval of His Excellency the Governor.

During the year 1937, four hundred and ninety-seven (497) convalescent patients, who were in needy circumstances, were assisted by the Trustees. Of this number, 247 were sent to St. Margaret's Convalescent Home, Semaphore, and 250 were supplied with surgical appliances, &c. The amount disbursed in this manner during the year was £769 6s. 2d.

In order to be eligible for assistance from the Fund, patients must be certified as convalescent by the Medical and Lay Superintendents of the Adelaide Hospital.

The Trustees desire to place on record their appreciation of a bequest during the year of £88 10s. from the Miss J. A. Stuckey Estate.
