



# REPORT

For the Year Ended December 31st, 1934.



The number of patients who have received treatment in both the Wards and in the Out-patient Department have increased, but the daily average number of beds occupied and the average days treatment of each patient are less than during the previous year.

Convalescent Fund.—Forty-five patients have been sent to the Southport Convalescent Hospital, 40 to the Devonshire Royal Hospital, Buxton, and 6 to the Southport Children's Sanatorium, a total of 91, through the kindness of the Governors of the Cotton Districts Convalescent Fund.

The Ordinary Income of the Royal Infirmary for the past year amounts to £32,427 14s. 3d., as compared with £32,310 6s. 6d., being an increase of £117 7s. 9d.

Workpeople's Contributions, the principal item on the Income side of the Statement of Accounts, show an increase of £470 198. 8d. The chief source of this increase is in the grant from the Accrington and District Workpeople's Hospital Fund, and was made possible by the adoption of a contribution of 2d. per week instead of the 1d. per week previously contributed to that Fund. The Board of Management are deeply grateful for the wonderful support which they continue to receive from the various Workpeople's Funds.

Annual Subscriptions, unfortunately, continue to decrease and new subscribers are badly needed. One excellent method of increasing the income from this source is the completion by subscribers of a form of covenant, issued in the complete Report, which enables the Institution to claim a refund of Income Tax on the subscription, and, without extra cost to the subscriber, increases his subscription by the amount of the tax recovered. The Secretary will gladly supply further details of this scheme on application. The Board tender their grateful thanks to all Subscribers, and to the Voluntary Collectors in the Farmers', Butchers' and Grocers' Efforts for their generous assistance.

General Donations ten years ago totalled less than half the splendid sum of £3,263 11s. 8d. received during the past year. This is eloquent proof that all sections of the community are assisting the Infirmary to continue and extend its work. The Board are greatly encouraged by the support which they are receiving from organisations of all kinds and from individual donors.

Hospital Sunday collections realised the welcome sum of £1,076 19s. od., and the Board tender their grateful thanks to the Clergy and Ministers of the various denominations and to the Church Officers and Congregations for this generous response to their appeal.

Motor Accidents.—Patients admitted as the result of road accides in which a motor vehicle was involved cost £544 17s. 6d., and payments by Insurance Companies and donations from those patients to the date of the issue of this Report totalled £166 5s. 6d. Although recent amendments to the Road Traffic Acts have improved the position of Voluntary Hospitals to some extent, there is still a regrettably large proportion of these cases in which no payment can be obtained.

Paying Patients.—For the first time in the history the Infirmary the item "payments by patients" In common with the practice of most Volunappears. tary Hospitals throughout the country, provision has been made for the admission of patients who are able to pay for their treatment but cannot afford Nursing Home fees. From December 1st eight adult beds and two cots for children have been available, and the scheme has already proved successful. The charge fixed by the Board is £4 4s. od. per week, which includes the services of the resident staff of the Institution, the use of the Operating Theatre and cost of all dressings, etc., but extra fees are payable for special X-ray or Pathological Investigations. Patients should make their own arrangements for treatment by a Visiting Physician or Surgeon, who may charge a fee not exceeding fifteen guineas.

Endowment Fund.—The Board wish to record their grateful thanks for the following additions to this Fund:—The Trustees of the late Mr. Henry Harrison, £4,000; Executors of the late Mr. W. H. Moulding, £2,000; the Executors of the late Mr. Thomas Bolton, £1,000; the Executors of the late Mr. John Duckworth, of Southport, £1,000; the Blackburn Amateur Dramatic and Musical Society, £150; the Blackburn Golf Club, £83; the Blackburn Rovers Football Club, £41 17s. 3d.; the Darwen Golf Club, £25; and the Darwen Football Club, £4 4s. od.

The Extensions Fund has been augmented by the receipt of £1,038 5s. 7d. from the Mayor of Blackburn (C. A. Critchley, Esq., J.P.) in response to his appeal; by a gift of £500 from Mrs. Munroe, of Rochdale, formerly of Blackburn; and by £238 2s. od.,—the cost of the furnishing of the Nurses' Recreation Room—from our President, Mrs. R. A. Yerburgh.

Yerburgh Fund.—The Committee of this Fund has expended the sum of £218 4s. od. in making weekly grants to poor persons suffering from incurable diseases, and in the provision of assistance to patients requiring surgical appliances.

Jackson, £585 12s. 11d.; Mr. J. A. Ormerod, J.P., to name a Cot in memory of the late Mrs. Ormerod, £500; Mr. H. Haworth, to name a Cot in memory of his father and mother, £500; the Executors of the late Mr. H. Walmsley, £200; the Trustees of Thos. Radcliffe, deceased, further on account of residue, £125 2s. od.; the Executors of the late Mr. M. A. Thompson, £100; the Executors of the late Mr. H. Partington, £25; the Executors of the late Mr. M. A. Cocker, £20.

The Board wish to record their sincere appreciation of these generous additions to the funds of the Institution.

Ladies' Infirmary Guild.—Once again the ladies of the Guild have increased the splendid support which they have rendered for so many years. The total number of articles supplied by the Guild during the year was 1,676, and the Board tender to the Honorary Secretaries, Mrs. R. Y. Aitken and Mrs. L. Heyworth, and to all the Ladies of the Guild their most grateful thanks.

Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff.—There have been no changes in the Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff during the year, and the Board once more place on record their sincere appreciation of the invaluable services they perform, and extend their warm thanks also to the members of the Resident Medical Staff.

Board of Management.—At the Annual Meeting of Governors Rev. Canon J. E. Samuel, M.A., was elected a Vice-President of the Institution as a token of appreciation of valuable services rendered as a member of the Board for the long period of thirty-three years.

The Board record with deep regret the death of Mr. T. J. Forrest and Mr. Jonathan Ashworth, both of whom served the Institution faithfully and well.

Vacancies on the Board occurred during the year due to the resignations of the Right Rev. Bishop Hanlon, Rev. R. R. Parry, Mr. J. K. Bailey and Mr. Walter Thomson, each of whom resigned on leaving the district; and the Board welcomed to their number Rev. Canon Bousfield, Mr. H. Bradley, Mr. W. Cooper, Mr. J. H. A. Swindlehurst, Mr. J. Wilcock Holgate and Mr. G. Whiteside.

At the meeting of the Board held in the month of April, the Chairman unveiled a tablet, which had been placed in the entrance hall of the War Memorial Wing as a memorial to the faithful and devoted services rendered to the Institution by the late Mr. Nathan A. Smith during his thirty-nine years as General Superintendent and Secretary.

Blood Transfusions.—A most efficient Blood Transfusion service has been organised in Darwen by a number of enthusiastic volunteers with Mr. J. C. Jepson as Honorary Secretary. Some of the members of this organisation have acted as donors of blood on four occasions during the past few years, and the Board place on record their very high appreciation of the noble spirit of service which has actuated this desire to assist in saving lives and restoring health. The Board also extend their grateful thanks to the donors, who are not members of this organisation, who have volunteered their assistance.

Toc H Library Service.—After much preliminary work in the collection and classification of books, the first volume was issued to a patient in the month of April. That this new service is highly appreciated is evidenced by the fact that at December 31st over 5,000 books had been loaned to the patients, and the Board extend their grateful thanks to the members of the Blackburn Branch of Toc H for the very efficient organisation of this excellent work.

The Board have again the pleasing duty of acknowledging their sense of obligation to the Rev. Canon J. E. Samuel, M.A., Vicar of All Saints', and to the Clergy and Ministers for their attendance upon the patients; to Miss Eccles and the members of the Flower Guild for weekly gifts of flowers for the Wards; to the many kind friends who have forwarded gifts of books, magazines, fruit, flowers, vegetables, toys, linen, silver paper, and other most acceptable and useful presents, both during the year and at Christmas.

Grateful thanks are also tendered to the Borough and County Police for their invaluable assistance in supplying details of motor accidents and in conveying messages to the homes of patients; and for the splendid ambulance work which they perform.

Press.—Once again the Board acknowledge their indebtedness to the members of the local Press for their generous assistance.

In conclusion, the Board are appreciative of the increasing interest in the work of the Infirmary, which is amply evidenced by the support which they are receiving from all sections of the community in every district. They are thankful that the balance at December 31st was not an adverse one, and they appeal for the continued interest and generous assistance of every person in the large area which the Institution endeavours to serve.



# MEDICAL REPORT for 193

The number of patients who have received the benefits of the Institution during the year amounted to 20,309, namely 5,162 In-patients and 15,147 Out-patients as per tabulated lists which follow.

The number of beds available was 235, and the daily average number occupied during the year was 214.8. The average length of treatment of In-patients was 15.19 days, as compared with 15.84 days in 1933.

The number of deaths is 287, which shows a death-rate of 5.73 per cent. Deducting 77 of the deaths which occurred within 48 hours of admission, the death-rate is reduced to 4.07 per cent.

3831 Operations were performed in the three Operating Theatres and 315 in the Out-patients' Operating Rooms—a total of 4,146 Operations; and 274 minor operations were performed in the Out-patients' Department under local anæsthesia, making a grand total of 4,420.

The work performed during the year in the Pathological Department, the Venereal Diseases Department, the Radium Department, and the X-Ray, Massage and Light Departments is described in the reports which follow.

Two Sessions are held weekly, facilities for treatment between each Session are afforded, and the patients can attend either during the day or in the evening for treatment. Females.

The V.D. Clinic for Women and Children is held on two

evenings a week.

Cases of Syphilis are dealt with once a week by the Medical Officers until treatment is complete. They are then kept under observation at the Clinic for at least two years, during which time the Wassermann Test is made at regular intervals.

As far as possible an attempt is made to equalise the number of patients at each attendance, so that overcrowding is avoided

and a personal interest taken in each case.

Cases of Gonorrhœa are treated by the Medical Officers twice a week, and private appointments are made for daily treatment by

the Male Attendant and the Nurse in charge.

The success of the Clinic is to a large extent due to the Nurse and the Male Attendant, who have shown themselves tactful and sympathetic in dealing with the patients who so willingly come to them.
