

REPORT

For the Year Ended December 31st, 1935.

The Board of Management have pleasure in submitting their Seventy-first Annual Report and Statement of Accounts for the year ended 31st December, 1935.

PATIENTS.

The number of beds available for patients has been increased during the year to 244, due to the occupation by the Nursing Staff of their new dining-room in the Nurses' Home and their vacation of the Old Children's Ward. This Ward and a smaller one of four beds has been allocated to the new FRACTURE DEPART-MENT. By the inauguration of this department the Institution forestalled the recommendations of the Committee appointed by the British Medical Association to consider the treatment of fractures. The department—which has both Out-patient and In-patient branches worked by the same Staff—is controlled by two members of the Honorary Surgical Staff, and the consequent co-ordination of the work of the department, and the application of the new methods of Fracture treatment, has resulted in an astonishing reduction of the period of incapacity suffered by patients sustaining fractures.

The total number of patients treated during the year is the largest on record, and, largely due to the shortening of the stay in Hospital of fracture cases, the average days' treatment of each patient has been reduced to 14.0. This has enabled a larger number of patients to be admitted and has kept down to a very low level the number of patients awaiting admission.

A number of wards were unavoidably closed for several periods during the year, due to the admission of patients who subsequently developed infectious diseases, and the average number of beds occupied has consequently been reduced.

Paying Patients.—Whilst very few children e been admitted under the scheme for the reception of paying patients, the constant demand upon the eight adult beds allocated for these patients has afforded ample proof of the need for the provision of private wards. 142 patients were admitted during the year to the pay-beds, and the sum of £1,437 was received in payment for their maintenance and treatment.

The increase in the average cost per bed is chiefly due to the decrease in the average number of beds occupied, and as each patient has had a shorter stay in Hospital the average cost of

each patient per day also shows an increase.

Workpeople's Contributions.—The total sum received from the various Workpeople's Funds is £286 18s. 10d. larger than in 1934, and the Board take this opportunity of conveying their most grateful thanks to all the contributors to these Funds; to the members of the Executive Committee; and to all those persons who are responsible for the collection of these contributions in the mills, works, shops and offices of the district.

Annual Subscriptions.—Annual subscriptions have fallen by £31 10s. 7d., but an encouraging feature is that over 60 subscribers have completed a Deed of Covenant, and when tax on these subscriptions has been recovered from the Inland Revenue Authorities the total receipts from this source will be considerably augmented.

The Board appeal most earnestly for new subscriptions and tender their warm thanks to all subscribers and to the Honorary Secretaries and voluntary collectors who continue to organise with such success the Farmers', Butchers' and Grocers' Efforts.

General Donations which last year reached the record sum of £3,263 11s. 8d. have decreased by £620 12s. 2d. Many things have combined to cause this decrease, and the promoters of some of the events which go to make up the sum of £2,642 19s. 6d. were very disappointed at their results. The Board are very appreciative of the splendid help which they are receiving from all sections of the community by the organisation of many kinds of competitions and events for the benefit of the Royal Infirmary.

Hospital Sunday.—To all who responded to their Hospital Sunday Appeal, which resulted in the sum of £1,026 28. 11d. being raised, the Board tender their grateful thanks.

Endowment Fund.—The Board wish to record their grateful thanks or the following additions to this Fund:—

The Exors. of the late Miss S. A. Pilkington, £2,000 for the endowment of Two Beds; Dr. and Mrs. J. M. Wishart, £500 for the endowment of a Cot in memory of their two children; the Blackburn Amateur Dramatic and Musical Society, £150, being a further donation towards the endowment of a Bed; the Blackburn Golf Club, £76; the Blackburn Rovers Football Club, £30 5s. 3d.; the Darwen Golf Club, £20; and the Darwen Football Club, £3.

Extensions Fund.—Principally due to the untiring enthusiasm of the Mayoress' Committee of Ladies, this Fund received during the year £1,165 3s. 11d., and the amount owing to the Bank on the Extension of the Nurses' Home had been reduced at December 31st to £1,719 8s. 9d.

The Yerburgh Fund continues to be a source of assistance by means of weekly grants to poor patients who are suffering from incurable diseases and in assisting patients in the purchase of surgical appliances. The sum of £201 13s. 6d. was expended by the Committee during the year.

Bequests, &c.—The following gifts and legacies which were not specially earmarked for endowment have been placed to the credit of the Revenue Account: Mrs. T. J. Forrest, £500 for the naming in perpetuity of a Cot in memory of her late husband; the trustees of Frank Mercer, deceased, further on account of residue, £208 19s. 6d.; the Executors of the late Mr. George Barnes, £100; the Executors of the late Miss Mary Fell, £100; the Executors of Mrs. A. R. Walton, deceased, £106 18s. 2d.; the Executors of the late Miss S. A. Pilkington, interest on legacy, £62; the Executors of Mr. A. L. Chadwick, deceased, £52 10s.; the Executors of the late Mr. E. J. Holt, £50; the Executors of Miss A. Cooper, deceased, £25; the Executors of the late Mrs. J. Howson, £21 os. 1d.; the Executors of Mr. J. W. Almond, £10. The Board wish to record their sincere appreciation of these generous additions to the funds of the Institution.

Ladies' Infirmary Guild.—The Presidents, Vice-Presidents, Associates and Members of the Guild are again to be complimented on the splendid assistance which they render to the Institution. During the year the Guild contributed 1,706 articles of clothing, bed linen, etc., together with over £21 in cash, and the Board conveyed to the Ladies through their Honorary Secretaries, Mrs. R. Y. Aitken and Mrs. L. Heyworth, their grateful thanks for this most valuable help.

Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff.—During the year Dr. D. S. Fairweather tendered his resignation to enal, him to undertake further post-graduate work in London, and the Board placed on record their high appreciation of the services rendered by Dr. Fairweather as Honorary Assistant Physician for a period of seven years. Dr. I. D. Grant was appointed Honorary Assistant Physician in succession to Dr. Fairweather. The Board once more tender their very grateful thanks to all members of the Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff for the invaluable services which they continue to render to the patients under their charge.

Board of Management.—The conferment of the Freedom of the Borough of Blackburn upon our President, Mrs. E. A. Yerburgh, was a source of great pleasure to all connected with the Royal Infirmary, and the glowing tributes paid to Mrs. Yerburgh on that occasion indicated in no uncertain manner how highly she is esteemed by the inhabitants of Blackburn and East Lancashire.

During the year our Chairman, Mr. James Kay, completed 21 years' service in that office, and the Board decided to show their sincere appreciation of the splendid services of Mr. Kay by naming a Ward after him. At a special meeting of the Board held on April 15th, 1935, over which Rev. Canon J. E. Samuel, M.A., presided, Mrs. Yerburgh unveiled in Ward B.1. (the ward in which are the two beds endowed by Mr. and Mrs. Kay on the occasion of their Golden Wedding) a tablet bearing the following inscription:—

"THE JAMES KAY WARD."
Named in appreciative commemoration of the completion

JAMES KAY, J.P.,

of twenty-one years' devoted service as Chairman of the Board of Management, 1914—1935.

The Board record with deep regret the death of Mr. J. W. Carter. Mr. Carter had been a member of the Board of Management for twenty years and had rendered very valuable service to the Institution.

At the request of the Chairman the Board decided to appoint a Vice-Chairman, and Mr. W. R. Hargreaves was unanimously elected to that office.

At the Annual Meeting of Governors, Rev. J. M. Miller, M.A., Mr. C. A. Critchley, J.P., Mr. J. Greenwood and Mr. G. Tomlinson were elected members of the Board of Management to fill vacancies.

Grateful Thanks are also tendered by the Board to:-

Rev. Canon J. E. Samuel, M.A., Vicar of All Saints', and to the Clergy and Ministers of the district for their attendance upon the patients.

Miss Eccles and the members of the Flower Guild for weekly gifts of flowers for the Wards.

All those who have given blood during the year to assist in the saving of life. Some of these donors have acted in this capacity for the sixth time.

The members of the Blackburn and Darwen branches of Toc H. for the efficient Library Service—over 5,000 books were issued to patients during the year—and for their excellent work in the collection and repair of wireless headphones.

The Borough and County Police for their invaluable help in supplying details of motor accidents; for conveying messages to the homes of patients, and for the excellence of the Ambulance Service which they provide.

The many kind friends of the Institution who have forwarded gifts of books, magazines, fruit, flowers, vegetables, headphones, toys, linen, silver paper, and other most acceptable and useful presents, both during the year and at Christmas.

The Proprietors, Editors and Staffs of the local newspapers who devote much valuable space to matters relating to the work and welfare of the Royal Infirmary.

And finally, to the members of the Medical, Nursing and Lay Staffs of the Infirmary, whose work in all departments calls for commendation.

MEDICAL REPORT for 1930.

The number of patients who have received the benefits of the Institution during the year amounted to 20,405, namely 5,435 In-patients and 14,970 Out-patients as per tabulated lists which follow.

The number of beds available was 244, and the daily average number occupied during the year was 209.4. The average length of treatment of In-patients was 14 days, as compared with 15.19 days in 1934.

The number of deaths is 375, which shows a death-rate of 6.66 per cent. Deducting 119 of the deaths which occurred within 48 hours of admission, the death-rate is reduced to 4.54 per cent.

3,712 Operations were performed in the three Operating Theatre and 317 in the Out-patients' Operating Rooms—a total of 4,029 Operations; and 326 minor operations were performed in the Out-patients' Department under local anæsthesia, making a grand total of 4,355.

235 Electrocardiographic examinations were made of 225 patients.

The work performed during the year in the Special Departments is described in the reports which follow.

Fracture Department.

The Fracture Department was started on April 17th, 1935, and consists of two wards, a male ward of 9 beds and a female ward of 4 beds, together with an out-patient department. From its inauguration until December 31st, 1935, the department has treated 320 In-Patients and 735 Out-Patients. Every case is treated by the same staff from beginning to end, and thus continuity of treatment is maintained. Before the department was opened the two honorary members of the Staff in charge, and the Sister, took the opportunity of attending the Fracture Department of the Manchester Royal Infirmary and becoming familiar with the organization of such a department and also with the modern methods of fracture treatment.

We would like to acknowledge our indebtedness to Harry Platt, Esq., M.S., F.R.C.S., of Manchester, for allowing us to attend his department, and for his kindness in advising us how to overcome the difficulties which confronted us in the inauguration of the department.

The methods employed in the department are based on those used with such success by Professor Böhler, of Vienna, and up to the present we have had no reason to be dissatisfied with our results.

Two Sessions are held weekly, facilities for treatment between each Session are afforded, and the patients can attend either during the day or in the evening for treatment.

Females.

The V.D. Clinic for Women and Children is held on two evenings a week.

Cases of Syphilis are dealt with once a week by the Medical Officers until treatment is complete. They are then kept under observation at the Clinic for at least two years, during which time the Wassermann Test is made at regular intervals.

As far as possible an attempt is made to equalise the number of patients at each attendance, so that overcrowding is avoided and a personal interest taken in each case.

Cases of Gonorrhœa are treated by the Medical Officers twice a week, and private appointments are made for daily treatment by the Male Attendant and the Nurse in charge.

The success of the Clinic is to a large extent due to the Nurse and the Male Attendant, who have shown themselves tactful and sympathetic in dealing with the patients who so willingly come to them.
