

# Bolingbroke Hospital.

## EXTRACTS FROM THE RULES GOVERNING THE ADMISSION OF PRIVATE PATIENTS.




The Hospital provides accommodation for the reception, treatment, and care of patients suffering from disease, accident or injury, who are able and willing to pay for the same, or to contribute towards the cost thereof; but no patient shall be admitted except on the recommendation of a duly qualified Medical Practitioner

Infectious, Consumptive, Mental, Incurable, and Maternity Cases are ineligible for admission.


The charge is £6/6/0 per week for a Private Room, and £4/4/0 per week for a bed in a Private Ward, which contains five beds. The charges (which include the attendance of the Resident Medical Officer, Nursing, Board and Lodging, Medicine, certain Stimulants, Surgical Dressings, and the use of the Operating Theatre) must be paid weekly in advance. Special Nurses, Laundry, Massage, Pathological and Radiographic Examinations, or any expensive remedies ordered are additional charges.

The question of fees for the services of one of the Visiting Physicians or Surgeons is a matter of arrangement between the patient and the Physician or Surgeon, to whom such fee shall be paid direct. In Surgical Cases the fees for the Anæsthetist shall be paid through the Surgeon.

**NOTE.**—All enquiries should be made of the Resident Medical Officer or the Secretary Superintendent at the Hospital.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE GOVERNORS

For the Year 1928.

---

THE Governors beg to submit to the Members, Subscribers and Donors their Report for the year 1928.

In the first place, the Governors desire to express their profound sorrow at the loss the Hospital has sustained by the death of Sir Edwin Evans—a Vice-President, and Mr. S. G. Warner—a Governor. Sir Edwin had been associated with the Hospital for over seventeen years, and besides being a generous benefactor, he had on numerous occasions rendered most able services. Mr. Warner joined the Board in 1925 and although ill-health somewhat restricted his activities he nevertheless took a keen interest in the affairs of the Hospital. The Governors feel the loss of these gentlemen very deeply and wish to record the high esteem and affection in which they hold their memory.

Portraits of the Rev. Canon Erskine Clarke, M.A.—Founder of the Hospital in 1880 and Chairman from that time until his death in 1920—Everard Godwin Thorne, Esq., Vice-Chairman 1899-1920 and Chairman 1920 until his death in 1924, and William Shepherd, Esq.—a Benefactor of the Hospital, have been hung in the Board Room and these will serve to remind future Governors and others, of the great debt of gratitude the Hospital owes to these gentlemen.

The Battersea War Memorial Committee have embarked upon a scheme to provide an enduring memorial in the Hospital to those of their brave comrades who made the supreme sacrifice in the Great War. It is proposed that the memorial shall take the form of the new Main Entrance of the Hospital; the Hall of which to be known as the "Hall of Remembrance." The memorial when completed will be not only a dignified one, but will also serve a most useful purpose for the Hospital for generations to come. The sum which the Committee have set themselves out to raise for this object is £6,000. The Governors most heartily commend the

scheme, and take this opportunity to appeal for the generous support of all in the great Borough of Battersea.

By reason of the rapid growth of the Hospital and the difficulties of management which would ensue if the privileges prescribed in certain clauses in the Memorandum and Articles of Association were exercised, it was felt that an alteration in such clauses was essential. After most careful deliberation, action was taken in this direction and on page 15 will be seen the proceedings at the Extraordinary General Meetings which caused this to be carried into effect. The Honorary Solicitors for the Hospital very kindly conducted this matter through the Court and for their ready advice as well as for their valuable services, the Governors feel profoundly indebted. The Governors also wish to record their gratitude for the many other acts of kindness which these gentlemen have rendered to the Hospital during the year.

There have been changes on the Honorary Medical Staff. Dr. C. E. Lakin who had been a Physician since 1911 tendered his resignation, which was accepted with deep regret. In recognition of his eminent services Dr. Lakin was appointed a Consulting Physician. Dr. W. Ernest Lloyd has been appointed a Physician to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation.

Mr. J. Douglas R. Murray completed his appointment as Resident Medical Officer during the month of September and was succeeded by Mr. J. H. Thompson. Mr. F. D. Morphy is at present the House Surgeon and Mr. A. T. Curnow the House Physician.

The condition of the Mortuary is such that it has been considered desirable to re-condition and extend this section of the Hospital. The necessary work will be commenced early in the New Year and the cost of carrying out the same will amount to a little over £1,000. It has also been thought advisable to modernise the electric lighting arrangements in the Erskine Clarke Wing. The existing wiring in the Wards of this Wing is very faulty and undoubtedly requires replacing. This matter is expected to cost £250.

For some time past the question of providing Radium for the treatment of cancer cases has been very prominent in the minds of the Governors. During the year many such cases have been satisfactorily treated by this method, but the cost of hiring the substance has been, and still is, very great. Urged by the Medical Staff, the Governors decided to inaugurate a special fund, with the object of obtaining a supply of Radium. Thanks to the efforts of Mrs. Hayr and Miss Harper, who respectively raised by means of Whist

Drives sums of £22 5s. and £20 5s., the fund was launched. Other contributions followed, including one of £150 from the Bernhard Baron Charitable Trust and one of £90 from the Stock Exchange Dramatic and Operatic Society "Help Yourself" Charity Fund. By the end of the year the fund totalled £331 - 15 - 3, in addition to which several promises had been received. Encouraged by this, the Governors decided to obtain 55 mgrms. of Radium, thereby committing themselves to an outlay of £750. This is indeed only a very small quantity and as the Medical Staff are pressing for at least 300 mgrms., it will be realised that further donations are urgently needed.

The absence of X-Ray treatment apparatus has for many years past been a source of much inconvenience to the Medical Staff, whose efforts on behalf of the patients have been much hampered thereby. The benefits that can be bestowed on persons by this method of treatment are well known, and it has now been decided to procure the necessary apparatus. Although the cost entailed is heavy it is felt that the action taken will meet with general approval.

It is perhaps necessary to mention that the year 1928 was the first full year of working with the increased accommodation for In-Patients and with the extended Out-Patient Department. That the fullest advantage has been taken of the additional beds and the extra facilities for Out-Patients, the following figures will give striking evidence:—

These details of information are particularly gratifying to the Governors, especially in view of the fact that they feel assured that the highest standard of efficiency has been maintained throughout the Hospital.

It will be a source of much pleasure to all interested in the Hospital to know that the total income has increased by £7,161.

The amount received from Annual Subscriptions exceeded that for the previous year by £24 - 10 - 0. An increase, notwithstanding that £94 was lost under this heading owing to deaths, removals and other causes.

Receipts under the title of Donations have also advanced by £774, but there has been a slight decrease under the sub-headings of Employees' Contributions, Congregational Collections, and Collection Boxes.

The grants made by the King Edward's Hospital Fund; the Hospital Saturday Fund; the Hospital Sunday Fund; and the Alexandra Day Committee were in each instance greater than those allotted in the preceding year, and grateful recognition of this fact is hereby recorded.

Receipts on account of services rendered, as was expected, have increased considerably and more revenue than previously was obtained from invested property.

Legacies yielded £4,135 against £961 in the previous year.

The Governors are pleased to refer with gratitude to the splendid help which Mr. Hawthorne of the "French Horn & Half Moon," East Hill, has rendered during the year and, in

fact, for the past six years. Throughout that time Mr. Hawthorne has, by conducting concerts in his house, contributed to the funds no less a sum than £265—a remarkable achievement—and one deserving especial mention.

On the 23rd June, a bed in the James Carmichael Ward was formally dedicated by the Philharmonic Lodge No. 581 of the Ancient Order of Druids. The Ceremony was performed by the Rev. Max Williams, Chaplain to the Order, in the presence of a large number of friends and supporters, including the Imperial Grand Arch Druid, Brother L. Barnard. The sum subscribed in this connection was £315, and was derived from the Tinfoil Fund of the Order. The Governors hereby tender their heartfelt thanks to the Druids for having extended their assistance to the Hospital by this thoughtful and charitable action.

The Governors are happy to report that the Annual "Pound Day" which took place on July 14th, was an even greater success than the one held in the previous year. Cash gifts amounted to £66 - 12 - 6 and 4,250 lbs. of general stores were received. Local school children again contributed largely to the very satisfactory result of the event and the continued help of these ardent little supporters, as well as of other good friends is gratefully acknowledged.

It affords much gratification to be able to state that the undermentioned substantial donations have been received for the General Fund, in addition to those already referred to:—

The Governors are indeed most thankful for these gifts.

The total expenditure was less by £387 than that in the previous year. Although there was a tremendous increase in the work, it should not be overlooked that during 1927 some exceptionally heavy expenses were incurred, by way of Establishment Charges and Finance (Appeals).

The individual items of expenditure in comparison with those for last year are not given here, as in view of the large extension of the Hospital generally, such a course might be misleading. Working costs are a better indication of economies and these have already been stated.

The Income and Expenditure Account is given on pages 20-21, the Balance Sheet on pages 22-25; Lists of Investments on pages 26-27, and the several subsidiary accounts on pages 30-33.

Notwithstanding that the state of the Finances of the Hospital, as revealed in the accounts, cannot be regarded as anything but thoroughly satisfactory—there being an excess of income over expenditure—the progressive work of the Hospital is still retarded by lack of funds for further expansion and development, and supporters are urged not to relax their efforts on this showing. Most of this surplus, it should be borne in mind, was derived from legacies and will not therefore recur. Moreover, practically the whole of the cash in hand has been ear-marked for the following purposes, reference to which has already been made:

1. Extension of the Mortuary Block.
2. Renewing the electrical wiring in Erskine Clarke Wing.
3. Obtaining X-Ray Treatment Apparatus.

The Governors are mindful always of the tremendous debt of gratitude they owe to all those associated with the Linen League for the generous help which they have received from them from time to time; but this year their obligations in that direction have grown to even greater proportions. The League has not only supported two cots by subscribing £120, as well as making their customary gift of Linen—this year to the value of £256-14-4—but they have actually given a donation of £500 for the purpose of endowing in their name a cot in the Children's Ward. This latter sum has been duly invested and added to the Endowment Fund (see page 32). The Governors are extremely appreciative of all that the League does for the Hospital and they feel it their duty to place on record once again their thanks for this splendid assistance.

A full account of the work of the League is given on pages 59-66.

The retirement of Mrs. E. J. Pritchard from the Honorary Treasurership of the League was very much regretted. Mrs. Pritchard has acted in that capacity most strenuously and successfully for many years and the Governors wish to pay the highest possible tribute to the great work which she has rendered to the League and to the Hospital. Before relinquishing her position, Mrs. Pritchard was able to hand over to the Hospital the cheque in respect of the League's Cot Endowment: thus satisfying a desire she had for so long cherished.

A sale of work arranged by the Matron and the Nursing Staff with the object of assisting their fund for endowing a cot in the Annie Carmichael (Children's) Ward was held

during the afternoon of November 10th, and realized the splendid sum of £275 - 6 - 6. Lady Ebbisham, who was accompanied by Lord Ebbisham, opened the sale, and in performing this ceremony expressed her pleasure in assisting in that day's worthy effort. She said she knew the great work the Hospital was doing and that she was always only too willing to help in its interests. She eulogised the work of the Matron and the Nursing Staff and added that it was amazing that they, at all times so busy in their noble work, should take upon themselves the additional task of raising funds for their Hospital. On behalf of all connected with the endeavour Sir James Carmichael (Chairman) supported by Mr. V. Zachary Cope (Senior Surgeon), thanked Lord and Lady Ebbisham for their great kindness in helping the effort and proceeded to say how much encouragement it gave the Governors to know that the Hospital had the deep practical interest of such distinguished and popular personages. Sir Percy and Lady Shepherd also were present at the sale, which they supported in their customary generous manner.

By the end of the year the Matron and the Nursing Staff had raised the £500 necessary to endow a cot—a most creditable achievement—and this money has been transferred to the Endowment Fund (see page 32).

Sincere thanks are accorded to the Executors of the late Mr. Frank Lewington who, in the exercise of the authority vested in them and in addition to allocating a large sum of money to the General Fund, have assigned to the Hospital a valuable freehold property in order that a bed may be considered to be endowed thereby and identified as the "Mr. and Mrs. Frank Lewington" Bed (see page 33).

Another receipt to the advantage of the Endowment Fund was that of £219 - 8 - 4 from the Executors of the late Miss Ann Eliza Godwin. This money has been duly invested, (see page 33) and in anticipation of a further sum of £780 - 11 - 8 being received from the same source, a bed has been named after the deceased lady, in compliance with a wish expressed in her will.

Receipts to the New Buildings and Equipment Fund totalled £467 - 19 - 7. This sum included Bank Interest; Interest on Treasury Bonds and a further handsome donation of £328 - 3 - 2 from Sir James and Lady Carmichael, to whom the Governors beg to accord their heartfelt thanks for their never diminishing generosity and interest.

The response made to the Matron's Christmas Appeal was most gratifying and the money obtained was the means of providing the patients with the usual seasonable fare, gifts and entertainments. Hearty thanks are now tendered to the kindly donors.

Mr. F. C. Potter has again rendered valuable assistance in the capacity of Honorary Auditor and best thanks are due to him for his services.

The Committee of Archer House (Convalescent Home for Nurses), Ramsgate, were good enough to continue their hospitality to members of the Nursing Staff, and the Governors are gratefully appreciative of their kindness.

It is desired very warmly to thank:—

Lady Carmichael, Lady Jackson, and Miss Thorne for their many kindly visits to the Hospital;

Miss Elsie Campbell for continuing to supervise the upkeep of the garden and for her many visitations, and

Miss Keevil for carrying on her work as Honorary Librarian—also the many other friends and supporters—including the Press—not individually mentioned in this Report, for all their most helpful and welcome assistance.

Year by year the Governors enjoy the privilege, through their Annual Report, of paying a tribute to the Honorary and Resident Medical Staffs, the Nursing and the Administrative Staffs, and although each year they express the same appreciation of their devotion, efficiency and enthusiasm, they trust such sentiments lose nothing in sincerity by annual repetition. They therefore wish once again to place on record their recognition of the loyalty and skill with which all those concerned have co-operated in bringing about the exceedingly favourable results of the year.

### CONCLUSION.

To so great an extent has the work of the Hospital increased, with correspondingly heavier maintenance charges, that in spite of the splendid assistance given continuously by generous friends, an even greater measure of support is vitally necessary to enable the Hospital to pursue its noble duty with unimpaired efficiency. The Governors therefore earnestly hope that a knowledge of the great work done at the Hospital will appeal to the generosity of all who read these lines, and they pray that the necessary additional support will be forthcoming in abundance—not only in the next, but in the years to come.

At an EXTRAORDINARY GENERAL MEETING of the Members of BOLINGBROKE HOSPITAL INCORPORATED, duly convened and held at the HOSPITAL, WANDSWORTH COMMON, on the 19TH day of APRIL, 1928, the following EXTRAORDINARY RESOLUTION was duly passed; and at a subsequent EXTRAORDINARY GENERAL MEETING of the Members of BOLINGBROKE HOSPITAL INCORPORATED, also duly convened and held at the same place on the 17TH day of MAY, 1928, the following RESOLUTION was duly confirmed as a SPECIAL RESOLUTION:—

**RESOLUTION.**

That the provisions of Clause 3 of the Memorandum of Association of the Association with respect to its objects be altered by substituting for the existing Sub-clauses (a), (b) and (c) thereof the following new Sub-clauses, namely:—

- (a) To accommodate and provide for the reception, treatment and care of persons suffering from disease or injury and to provide or secure medical and surgical assistance for such persons either gratuitously, or, in the case of persons able to do so, on the terms of their paying for or contributing towards the cost of the accommodation and/or treatment provided, but so that no such persons shall be admitted except on the recommendation of a duly qualified medical practitioner.
- (b) To attend to and do what may be necessary for persons suffering from injuries received through accident or casualty and to receive them either as out-patients or as in-patients.

and that the remaining Sub-clauses be re-lettered accordingly.

## Bolingbroke Hospital Linen League.

The League is formed for the following purposes:—

- (a) To provide house linen, garments, etc., for the use of the patients of the Hospital.
- (b) To take up for the benefit of the Hospital any other work which may be agreed upon by the Executive Committee in consultation with the Vice-Presidents.

### RULES.

1.—Vice-Presidents to subscribe not less than 5/- annually. To find at least four Members. To send any work contributed by Members to the Hon. Secretary, at the Hospital, not later than October 31st, enclosing their own names and a list of the work. The White Forms to be sent to the Hon. Secretary.

2.—Members to subscribe not less than 2/6 annually.

3.—Working Members to make at least two garments annually. The materials will be supplied by the Linen League through the Vice-Presidents, who will forward the work to the Hon. Work Secretary, not later than October 31st, with their white forms. If there are no Working Members, white forms to be sent to the Hon. Secretary.

4.—All Subscriptions must be sent to the Hon. Treasurer by **October 31st, with Receipt Book and a completed Blue Form.**

5.—All work to be exhibited at the Hospital once a year, at the General Meeting in November.

6.—Vice-Presidents and Members to pre-pay carriage of parcels.

7.—The President, Hon. Treasurer, Hon. Secretaries, the Members of the Buying Committee, four Vice-Presidents, and two Members shall together form an Executive Committee, and shall be elected at the General Meeting in November. The wife of the Chairman of the Hospital shall be an Ex-officio Member of the Executive Committee. Two Vice-Presidents and one Member shall retire each year in rotation, and shall not be eligible for re-election for two years.

## Bolingbroke Hospital Linen League.

REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDING OCTOBER 31ST, 1928.

---

The twenty--third Annual Report shows a year of steady and progressive work. The membership has increased to over 1,100 and although no new Vice-Presidents have been elected during the year, every new member is a potential Vice-President, and it is hoped that more new Vice-Presidents may be elected in the near future, since each Vice-President is a focus of growth and extended interest.

Just over 500 articles have been contributed by the members, in addition to over 130 from the Knitting Section.

It will be noticed that a slight change has been made in the wording of the constitution of the League, in order to make it possible for the Executive Committee together with the Vice-Presidents to come to any important decisions without waiting for a General Meeting of the League.

The financial position for the last year has probably been unique. An unusually large subscription list, two special efforts to raise money in 1927, and a small list of requirements owing to the complete equipment of the New Wing, have all combined to bring about a condition of affairs which is never likely to be equalled. With nearly £700 in the Bank after the Annual Meeting in November 1927, and a subscription list of £540 - 13 - 4 for 1928, the financial year has ended with £875 - 15 - 0 in hand. It was decided at the Annual Meeting that £500 should be sent as soon as possible to the Hospital for the endowment in perpetuity of a cot in the Children's Ward. This will be in addition to the Annual Maintenance of the original Linen League Cot.

Once more a word of thanks is due to our Honorary Auditor, Mr. Frank Potter, for his valuable services.

It is sad to have to end the Report with a note of real regret. The Hon. Treasurer, Mrs. Pritchard, has very regretfully been compelled for reasons of

health to resign her position. It is difficult to estimate all that she has meant to the League and her loss will be keenly felt; but she will not sever her connection with the League as she will continue her valuable services as a Vice-President.

Mrs. Ruthven Cope has kindly consented to succeed her as Honorary Treasurer and a hearty welcome is accorded to her.




