ANNUAL REPORT, 1946.

THE Governors of the Bolingbroke Hospital Incorporated have much pleasure in submitting for the consideration of the Members, Subscribers and Donors their Report for the year 1946.

VICE-PRESIDENTS.

It is with deep regret that the Governors record the death, on 1st May, of Sir H. Percy Shepherd. Sir Percy joined the Board in 1923 and was elected a Vice-President in 1937. He did much for the Hospital during his early association with it, and it was due to his endeavours that sufficient money was obtained from the Estate of his father, Mr. William Shepherd, to make possible the building of the Ward Block known as the William Shepherd Memorial Wing.

THE BOARD.

It is with a feeling of deep sorrow that the Governors record the passing, on 21st April, of Mr. Stanley Dodd, F.R.C.P., F.R.C.S. Besides being a Member of the Board, which he joined in 1925, Mr. Dodd was the Consulting Gynæcological Surgeon to the Hospital, a position to which he was appointed after retiring from the post of Visiting Gynæcologist several years ago. The Board's heartfelt sympathy is tendered to his widow and family in their bereavement.

Owing to his having left the district, Mr. W. H. P. Gibson, J.P., who had been a Governor since 1925, found he was unable to attend the Meetings and consequently tendered his resignation. This was accepted with sincere regret, and Mr. Gibson was thanked very cordially for his valuable services to the Hospital. The loss of his wise counsel will be greatly felt.

Mr. R. W. Knight, who was elected a co-optive Governor in 1937, found that he, too, could not give sufficient time to the affairs of the Hospital, and accordingly resigned his seat on the Board. The Governors are grateful for the help and advice which Mr. Knight has given them, and regret very much this severance of his association with the management of the Hospital.

Retiring Members.

The following Members are due to retire and are eligible for re-election at the Annual General Meeting which will be held on 24th April, 1947:—

Mr. Guy C. Vaughan-Morgan, Mr. Evan Rees, M.I.G.E., and Mr. Richard C. Hammett.

THE HONORARY MEDICAL STAFF.

An intimation of the death of Mr. Stanley Dodd is given in a previous paragraph.

Sincere thanks are accorded to the Members of the Visiting Staff for their most valuable services during the year.

It is with very real regret that the Governors announce the retirement of Mr. V. Z. Cope—a Surgeon since 1912, and the resignation, owing to the pressure of other claims upon them, of Dr. Purdon Martin—a Physician since 1927, Mr. Gavin Livingstone—an Ear, Nose and Throat Surgeon since 1936, and Dr. Ulysses Williams, Radiologist since 1922.

In recognition of their long and valued services, the Governors have been pleased to appoint Mr. Cope, a Consulting Surgeon, and Dr. Martin, a Consulting Physician.

Dr. Elizabeth Pepper, who held the post of temporary Radiologist during the war years, also tendered her resignation, and this was accepted with

much regret.

WAR DAMAGE

A considerable amount of repair work has now been completed, but much still remains to be done, and it is likely to be several more months before full reinstatement has been effected.

WORK OF THE YEAR.

1. In-Patients.

The average daily number of beds available throughout the year was 118.10, the difference between this figure and the full bed complement figure of 135 being due to the closing of beds owing to lack of accommodation for the necessary nursing staff, and to ward cleaning operations.

The average daily number of patients was 102.86.

The total number of patients admitted was 1743.

The average number of days each patient was resident was 21.70.

Major operations performed totalled 1388.

2. Out-Patients and Casualties.

The number of new cases entered in the Registers was 15,519, and the total number of attendances recorded was 43,784.

Minor operations performed made up a total of 1,861.

More detailed information regarding both In-and-Out Patients is given on subsequent pages.

INCOME AND EXPENDITURE.

1. General Fund.

Ordinary Income and Ordinary Expenditure for the year amounted to £32,553 and £45,582 respectively. Details showing how these figures are made up are given below under main headings. For purposes of comparison, similar information is given in respect of the previous year, and also, as a matter of interest, for the last full working year before the war.

The excess of ordinary expenditure over ordinary income for the year, as shown in the above figures, was £13,029, but this deficit was reduced to £7,550 by a transfer of the whole of the balance of the Legacies Account, viz.—£5,479.

2. Endowment Fund.

As will be seen in the Balance Sheet, this Fund was increased by £3,536.

3. Buildings and Equipment Funds.

It was necessary to transfer £135 from the General Fund to meet various items of capital expenditure.

4. Nurses' Library Fund.

The balance in hand is now £223; the increase being due mainly to the efforts of the Matron and the Nursing Staff, who arranged a very successful Sale of Work and a series of Whist Drives in aid of the Fund.

5. Legacies.

A list of the Legacies received is given in the Legacies Accounts.

6. Investments.

On the advice of our Stockbrokers, it was decided, after full consideration, to reorganise the whole of the Hospital's Investments. This resulted in a capital gain of £880 to the Endowment Fund and of £129 to the General Fund.

FINANCIAL POSITION.

The heavy deficit on the Income and Expenditure Account and the fact that costs continue to rise at such an alarming rate give the Governors the greatest concern. There are, of course, the investments in the General Fund which could be drawn on for Maintenance purposes, and such a procedure will unfortunately be inevitable unless very substantially increased support is forthcoming.

SALARIES AND WAGES

The Rushcliffe Scale for Nurses is now in full operation, and the latest recommendations of the British Hospitals Association in respect of the Salaries and Wages and working conditions of other Staff have been adopted.

STAFF PENSIONS

It has been decided to grant to certain members of the Nursing and Administrative Staffs who are due to retire after many years of loyal and devoted work in hospital service and in the Bolingbroke Hospital in particular, gratuitous pensions to augment the annuities which they will receive from the Superannuation Scheme.

FORMER ALMONER.

It is with much regret that the death is announced of Mrs. d'Arcy, whose retirement was intimated in the last report.

POUND DAY.

The result on this occasion was most gratifying, in spite of rationing and scarcity of commodities. £32 was recorded in the accounts as the value of the gifts in kind received, and £50-2s.-6d. as the amount of the cash donations.

PATHOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT.

Dr. Patterson, the Pathologist, who was recalled to the Royal Navy on the outbreak of war, resumed his duties during the month of October.

PHYSIOTHERAPY DEPARTMENT.

This department is now in commission again, and, with the object of extending its usefulness and efficiency, numerous items of additional and expensive apparatus have been purchased.

X-RAY DEPARTMENT.

The installation of an up-to-date plant for the treatment of certain types of skin disease was completed during the year.

FREE CHURCH CHAPLAIN.

The Rev. A. Price Hughes has taken the place of the Rev. Wilfred L. Hannam, who has left the district.

ACKNOWLEDGMENTS.

The tangible manner in which numerous friends and well-wishers have, by their gifts and in other ways, given proof of their keen interest in the work and welfare of the Hospital has been a constant encouragement, and to them all the Governors take this opportunity to convey their heartfelt thanks.

Once again the Members of the Linen League are to be congratulated most heartily on the excellent result of their labours. They have not only met to the full the heavy demands which the Matron has made upon them, but they have continued to maintain for another year one of the cots in the Children's Ward. To each and every member of the League, the Governors take this opportunity to say 'thank you very, very much'.

The Resident Surgical Officer, Mr. Arnold Elton, F.R.C.S., and the other Medical Officers have performed their duties to the entire satisfaction of their chiefs and of the Governors, for which they are thanked most warmly.

The selfless devotion to duty of the Matron and the Nursing Staff is well known to all who have come in contact with them, and the manner in which they have served the hospital throughout another year is beyond all praise. The Governors thank them wholeheartedly.

The Governors desire to pay tribute to the many qualities which the Secretary-Superintendent, Mr. W. S. Randolph Biss, and his staff have displayed in carrying out their duties, and to thank them for their loyal and efficient services.

NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE

The National Health Service Bill received the Royal Assent on November 6th as the National Health Service Act 1946, but the 'appointed day', that is, the day on which the State will take over the task of caring for the sick is still a long way off. In the interregnum the Hospital must be maintained at its maximum state of efficiency. This means that the Governors urgently need the continuance of the most generous financial support of the many friends of the Hospital and they look forward with confidence to receiving a ready response to this appeal.
