Privileges of Governors and Subscribers

On the payment of $\pounds 1,250$ a Bed may be dedicated to the memory of any person nominated by the Donor.

Donors of $\pounds 25$ or more in one sum shall be Life Governors of the Hospital.

Every Governor has the privilege of attending and voting at General Meetings.

Subscribers can set their subscriptions or donations against the maintenance charges due from patients in whom they are interested and upon notifying the House Governor that, in their opinion, they are suitable for treatment at a Hospital.

In-patients are required to pay a maintenance charge of £3 0s. 0d. a week and Out-patients are required to pay 2s. upon each attendance, unless they are members of a Contributory Scheme which undertakes to pay this.

The Board wish to make it quite clear to the Governors, Subscribers, and to the public generally that this in no way interferes with the entirely free treatment and maintenance which the Hospital has always rendered and will continue to render to the necessitous poor.

Form of Bequest to the Birmingham United Hospital

Those disposed to contribute to the support of this Charity by WILL are requested to do so in the following manner, as from a defect in the form the Hospital may be deprived of the intended bequest.

THE BIRMINGHAM UNITED HOSPITAL.

Report of the Board for the year 1938.

This brief report of the proceedings of the Board and of the more important events of the year covers the period approximately up to the date of the Annual Meeting for 1939, although the records in the general body of the report as a whole refer only to the year 1938.

It is considered desirable to include in the report the important matters occurring in the early part of the new year.

Royal Visit.

Reference must be made at once to the honour bestowed upon the Hospital by the visit of Their Majesties the King and Queen.

This took place at the new hospital on March 1st, when all members of the Board and the Honorary Medical Staff, with the Executive Board of the Hospitals Centre and its Committees, together with representatives of many kindred bodies, numbering in all over 500, assembled in the large hall of the Nurses' Home loyally to greet the Royal visitors.

Her Majesty the Queen chose the occasion to name in person the new hospital "The Queen Elizabeth Hospital."

Their Majesties having inspected portions of the Home and several departments of the Hospital were pleased to make known on their departure their interest and pleasure in the visit.

The Board has directed that a full report of the occasion and all documents relating thereto shall be preserved as a permanent record.

President.

At the Annual Meeting of Governors in April the Right Hon. The Earl of Dudley was elected President of the United Hospital in succession to Sir Charles Hyde, Bart.

During the year the new President has gladly responded on several occasions to the Hospital's call, and has at all times been ready to associate himself with the affairs of the Hospital.





A report by the House Committee of the new Hospital The New —now and in future to be known as "The Queen Hospital. Elizabeth Hospital"—will be found on pages 161–163.

It must, however, be recorded here that the United Hospital first entered upon its active management responsibilities in September, when the Nurses' Home Block was occupied.

In the early part of October it was learned that the building contractors would hand over the main Hospital Block to the Executive Board of the Hospitals Centre on October 24th, and that the United Hospital would take possession on November 1st.

On November 24th the Board issued special invita- "Handingtions to all members of the Executive Board and its over" Committees to meet the Board in the Large Hall of the Ceremony. Nurses' Home.

It was a unique occasion to mark an outstanding event, not only in the short history of the United Hospital as such, but also in the history of voluntary hospital effort in the country.

The President of the Hospital presided, and was supported on the platform by the Lord Mayor, Alderman James Crump; the Chairman, Lord Austin; the Chairman of the Executive Board, Sir Charles Grant Robertson; the Treasurer, Sir Harry Vincent; Alderman W. A. Cadbury; and other members of the two bodies

The following special resolution was moved by the President and carried by the Board of the United Hospital with acclamation :

"This meeting of the President, Vice-Presidents, " the Board of the United Hospital and its Honorary "Staff, specially convened for the purpose, extend "to the Executive Board and Appeal Committee " of the Hospitals Centre a most cordial welcome on "this memorable occasion, and desire to assure " them of the United Hospital Board's great apprecia-"tion of their untiring efforts over the past years "now brought to a successful issue by the handing "over to the United Hospital Board of the first " section of this great Hospitals Centre : the United "Hospital Board desires to include in this expression " of appreciation all those in the City of Birmingham " and throughout the country who so generously " contributed to the Executive Board's funds, and to "enter the whole of this resolution in the permanent " records of the United Hospital."

Sir Charles Grant Robertson responded, and was followed by Sir Harry Vincent, whose words are worthy of permanent record.

In concluding his speech Sir Harry said :

"These great buildings are a memorial to the " generosity of the public, and a visible expression " of its gratitude for the services rendered in the past. " The Hospitals Centre, with its close and intimate " connection with the University, marks a new "era in preventive and curative medicine. The " nation cannot afford to withhold from its people " the fullest measure of hospital and medical service. "It must consider health as one of its greatest " assets ; it must provide all essential facilities, not " only for curing those who are sick, but also for " preventing sickness in future. The Hospitals "Centre provides all these facilities, and it may "justly be claimed as Birmingham's contribution " towards a healthier and a happier nation.

"We may also look upon the Hospitals Centre "from another point of view. It repays an obliga-"tion we owe to the past—an obligation to those "who laboured before us to provide this generation "with hospital and medical services. It expresses "also gratitude to those people for their efforts on our "behalf. We have inherited these services as a "sacred trust. We pass on to posterity our contri-"bution. The Hospitals Centre is something more "than a building. It is an ideal, an ideal which "has required for its successful operation certain "attributes. It required vision to foresee it, faith to "believe in it, initiative to begin it, and courage "and resolution to see it through."

Naming of Hospital Blocks and Nurses' Home. The United Hospital Board, having consulted the Executive Board of the Hospitals Centre and the gentlemen particularly concerned, has named the East and West Blocks of the new Hospital respectively "The Vincent Medical Block" and "The Cadbury Surgical Block."

The Nurses' Home has been named "Nuffield House," and thus posterity will be assured of a constant reminder of the outstanding services of Messrs. Cadbury Brothers, Sir Harry Vincent, and Lord Nuffield towards the realisation of the great Hospitals Centre Scheme.

The Board held its first ordinary meeting in the Board Room of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital on December 13th, 1938, the Chairman, Lord Austin, presiding.

The Governors will already know that for several years the Board has been greatly and constantly concerned with the problems, chiefly of a financial character, inevitably associated with the responsibilities for the maintenance of the new Hospital.

Closely linked with this was the question of the precise functions of the General and Queen's Units in the new scheme of working which it appeared would have to be adopted.

As early as January, 1937, the United Hospital Accountant (Mr. B. L. Read-since appointed Clerk to the Governors of Guy's Hospital) and the newlyappointed House Governor of the new Hospital (Mr. G. Hurford) had prepared estimates under all the recognised uniform heads of income and expenditure for the three institutions.

Taking a general view, as far as possible neither too optimistic nor too pessimistic, these estimates indicated that with the three institutions working, the United Hospital in all probability would be faced with an annual deficit in round figures of $\pm 58,000$.

No relief could be looked for from any major adjustments of the expenditure at the new Hospital, where it would certainly be expected that work should commence and proceed forward to full capacity without any undue delays.

The attention of the Board was, therefore, immediately directed to the position of the two older units. Here, again, it was becoming more and more evident that no substantial curtailments could be entertained, although some considerable body of opinion was beginning to feel that if expenditure had to be reduced, as appeared to be inevitable, the Queen's Hospital would be the unit to be closed.

This aspect of the problem and the contemplation of the apparent impossibility of successfully financing three units has received the constant thought of the Board.

It was in these circumstances generally that the Reference to advice of the Hospitals Council was sought.

Hospitals Council.

At the Board meeting in January, 1938, the following resolutions were passed :

"(1) That in view of the large increase in expen-"diture by the United Hospital which will be " necessary for maintenance when the new Hospital "Unit at Edgbaston is ready for occupation, and "the effect of this disbursement upon the funds of "the United Hospital and upon those of other "charitable institutions in Birmingham, the Bir-"mingham Hospitals Council be asked to hold such "enquiry as will enable them to advise the United "Hospital as to what policy should be pursued "by them in this respect and particularly whether "either or both of the existing units should be trans-"ferred to the new Hospital having regard to the "interests of the City of Birmingham as a whole.

" (2) That the Board urges upon the Council the " need for an early decision in this matter and pledges " itself loyally to carry out the policy advised by the " Council."

These resolutions were received by the Hospitals Council in January, and the Council immediately proceeded to the appointment of a Special Committee which has since become known as the Vernon Committee.

The findings of this Committee were received by the Board from the Hospitals Council in May

Its particular references to the questions in the mind of the Board when the matter was submitted to the Council may be summarised as follows:

(1) That the needs of the moment and for the next four or five years will be met by the provision of from 250 to 300 new beds.

(2) That the first 200/250 beds at the new Hospital should be put into commission as rapidly as possible, and that when this had been done further expansion up to 400 beds at the new Hospital should coincide with a corresponding reduction in the number of beds at the Queen's Hospital.

(3) That as the Maternity Hospital's need for increased bed accommodation had been satisfactorily established an exchange of premises might reasonably be arranged—the Queen's Hospital, or, at least the major portion of it, being taken over by the Maternity Hospital, which, in turn, would release its Loveday Street premises for the use of the General Hospital.

This proposed exchange, providing as it did for the continued usefulness of the premises in Bath Row as a hospital, seemed to open the door to as satisfactory a solution of the problems as under the circumstances could be hoped for.

It is, therefore, with regret the Board has to report that it has been found impracticable to bring the negotiations to a successful conclusion, the Maternity Hospital having decided that it is not possible effectively to adapt the Queen's Hospital to serve efficiently as a Maternity Hospital.

The Board understands that it is the intention of the Maternity Hospital to build a new hospital on the Hospitals Centre site.

The new situation thus created was referred to the Hospitals Council, with the result that the United Hospital has been informed that it remains bound by the terms of the Council's report of May last, and when the new hospital expands to 400 beds, another review of the position will be undertaken.

The Board cannot regard the matter as a whole with any great degree of satisfaction, but, nevertheless, will, according to its undertaking, follow the recommendations of the Council despite the obvious difficulties and expense of maintaining two incomplete units.

The Board acknowledges gratefully the help received Birmingham from the Contributory Association and its industrial Hospitals Contributory section, the Hospitals Saturday Fund.

Association.

It has been apparent to the Board for some years now that the voluntary hospitals must depend more and more upon the Association, although they are in no way relaxing their efforts to attract financial aid from all other available sources to which the hospitals are entitled to look for support.

As the Contributory Association, however, has grown from strength to strength, so the field for general appeal has become increasingly restricted.

Private subscriptions and donations, as Alderman Cadbury has recently noted in an important letter in the local press, have not shown any considerable advance for many years.

With many firms contributing to the Contributory allotted proportion Association their of their employees' contributions, the principals and administrative heads in some instances feel less inclined to become, or continue to be, private subscribers.

With such considerations in mind, together with the knowledge that the claims of the Birmingham United Hospital on the Association Funds will be greatly increased by the working of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital entirely at the expense of other participating hospitals, the Board would greatly appreciate the augmentation in any way of the amount of the funds available for hospital service, and trusts that this may be in the power of the Contributory Association to achieve.

University Students' Carnival. The 1938 Carnival realised £3,900 11s. 0d., and three beds will accordingly be dedicated, bringing the total number dedicated as the result of the activities of the University students up to fifty-two. Thirteen commemorative tablets will be placed in position over the beds at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital in Ward East 1A. The others will remain for the present at the General and Queen's units.

The Board is most grateful to the students for their help, and hopes that their activities may continue so that this helpful link between the University and the Teaching Hospitals may remain firmly established.

Bed Dedications. In addition to the Students' Carnival beds, two dedicatory sums have been received of special interest to the public, and particularly gratifying to the Board.

In the early part of the year information was received that the Austin Distributor-Dealer Organisation of Great Britain and Northern Ireland intended to raise a fund for the dedication of a ward at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital to commemorate the Golden Wedding Anniversary of Lord and Lady Austin.

The Board later received a sum of £7,500, and now gratefully records that a four-bedded ward and a twobedded ward bear the name "The Lord and Lady Austin Ward."

It is also recorded with special pleasure that later in the year the Board learned it was the desire of Mr. Frank Barnes, F.R.C.S., and his sister, to dedicate a ward to the memory of their mother, brother and sisters, and that a sum of $\pounds 5,000$ would be generously allocated for this purpose.

In gratefully acknowledging this gift, the Board remembers the long years of distinguished service that Mr. Barnes rendered as Honorary Surgeon to the General Hospital. The Hospital received a most welcome grant for the Hospital year of £1,945, and expresses very warm thanks to the Hospital Sunday Fund Committee and to all the places of worship that year by year devote the one special Sunday to the interests of the voluntary hospital work of the city.

With the resignation of Mr. F. W. Walton, the Appeals Maintenance Officer at the Queen's Hospital Unit, on appointment to another hospital, the opportunity was taken to appoint an officer to undertake for the time being similar work for both the Queen's Hospital Unit and the Queen Elizabeth Hospital Unit. Mr. Cornewall-Walker, of Guy's Hospital Appeals Department, was selected, and took up his duties in January.

The Board has approved the setting up of an Appeal Appeal Committee which will devote its activities to pro-Committee moting an interest in the work of the United Hospital, and seek to enlist practical help for the maintenance of the services of the three units in all quarters, not only of the city, but of the surrounding counties.

This Committee may well turn to the interesting extract from the old records of the Queen's Hospital which, for the year 1864, contains these words in the minutes of its House Committee : ". . . though the mind and heart of the public be open to their duty, the public pocket is not so sensitive, and requires an appeal in full and touching tones, loudly raised and firmly sustained."

Notwithstanding the restricted field of appeal to which reference has already been made, the Board feels there is valuable work which, with interest and enthusiasm, can still be undertaken in bringing the services and the financial needs of the Hospital to the constant notice of the public.

The Board is glad to take the opportunity afforded **Blood** in this report to testify to the great value of the work **Transfusion** of the Blood Transfusion Service, and to extend to the Committee and to all blood donors most grateful acknowledgment of the services rendered so efficiently and entirely gratuitously to the three units of the United Hospital.

Towards the end of the year the United Hospital Work for the entered into an agreement whereby sixty-four beds City at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital were placed at the Authorities.

disposal of the Public Health Committee in order to avoid the expense to the public authority of providing temporary accommodation elsewhere pending the completion of new buildings.

Such arrangements between a voluntary hospital and the public authority constitute an innovation of considerable importance, and the Board is glad to report that the agreement is being carried out satisfactorily.

In commenting on this the Board takes the opportunity to congratulate the House Committee and all officers of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital concerned on the admirable arrangements made for the reception of the first thirty cases which were received in one convoy on the last day of the year.

Religious Ministrations for the Hospital.

The General Purposes Committee of the Board has had under consideration for some time the important question of the facilities afforded to religious bodies for their work in the Hospital.

Ministers of religion of all denominations have always been granted ready access to the Hospitals at all times for the purpose of bedside visitation, but the Hospital Chapels have been regarded as for the use of the Anglican Church only.

The Board feels that the time has come for at least a consideration of whether equal facilities should not be available to other denominations.

It is an important matter which demands careful thought, and the Board awaits the result of the deliberations of its General Purposes Committee, and, if it is found necessary to alter or add to existing bye-laws, the Governors will be consulted.

Medical Staff.

The Board acknowledges gratefully the valuable services rendered during the year by the Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff.

Important additions have been made to the staff by the appointment of the University Professors of Anatomy and Physiology as Consulting Officers of the United Hospital. Dr. J. S. Brailsford has become Honorary Radiologist, and Mr. R. H. Astbury Honorary Dental Surgeon during the year, both having rendered distinguished service to the Hospital for many years. The post of Assistant Surgeon, which fell vacant in July, was filled by the appointment of Mr. Fauset

Welsh, F.R.C.S., who, after a period of post-graduate study abroad, has now joined the staff.

With the growing demands upon the staff and the several special departments, it was found necessary to appoint an Assistant Dental Surgeon and an Assistant Bacteriologist, and these posts have been filled by the appointment respectively of Mr. R. O. Walker, L.R.C.P. & S., L.D.S.R.C.S., H.D.D.R.C.S., and Dr. S. T. Crowther, M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P., D.P.H.

The Board feels it should refer specially to the work Re-distribuof its Medical Committee, which, during the year, has tion of Staff. been faced with the many problems associated with the staffing of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital. It will be understood that with the many calls made upon the time of members of the staff, not only by the United Hospital, but by other voluntary institutions, it was with difficulty and not without sacrifice that satisfactory arrangements were eventually reached which provided the new unit with adequate medical, surgical and specialist services without in any way impairing the services rendered to the two older units.

The Medical Committee is to be congratulated on the solution of this difficult problem, and for the working scheme presented to the Board in December which provides not only the initiation of the work at the new unit, but for its expansion to full capacity.

The Board reached an important decision in July Nursing. when a 96-hour fortnight for all nursing staff was adopted throughout the Hospital. It was recognised that this could not come into force at once, but all plans for the future at the three units are being based on the necessary reduction in working hours.

At the same time, careful consideration was given to the question of salaries. The Board is satisfied that having regard to the full facilities for the extensive and specially-organised training and teaching of the probationer or student nurse, which, in recent years, has shown such marked improvement, there is no immediate call for increases in the scale of remuneration for nurses in training. The Board does recognise the need for making the salaries of fully-trained nurses more attractive, and as and when opportunity occurs will do its utmost in this direction, and it should be noted that in many instances the United Hospital has already implemented recommendations contained in the *Lancet* Report of 1932. The Inter-departmental Report on nursing has raised more questions of importance which will receive careful attention.

The Board recognises gratefully the devoted services rendered by the Matrons, Nursing Officers and Staffs throughout the three units, where the nursing services and training are carried out so satisfactorily and at so high a standard of efficiency.

The General The report of the House Committee appears on pages **Hospital Unit**. 79 and 80.

Increasing difficulties are being encountered in maintaining in a satisfactory manner the all-important work of this unit.

The improvement and the increasing of the accommodation for nurses is a pressing problem which the Board feels must be faced.

The conditions under which the casualty work is carried on is also a matter of great concern.

The temporary housing of this great department, although planned originally to allow for considerable expansion, has become quite inadequate.

The whole question of the casualty service of the city is now under review by the Hospitals Council.

At the moment it can be said that in its Casualty Department the General Hospital Unit is successfully performing, in spite of the difficulties under which it is working, an all-important work, the dimensions of which are not sufficiently recognised.

The Queen's The uncertainty of the future use of the Queen's Hospital Unit. Hospital has inevitably resulted in many difficulties which have been encountered during the past several years.

Departments needing renovation or alteration have been carried on under grave handicaps, and what under ordinary circumstances would have been considered urgently necessary has had to be relegated to the background.

It is to the credit of the House Committee that notwithstanding these difficulties the work of the Queen's Hospital has been so satisfactorily maintained.

The nursing problem, foreseen by a good many when it became known that a gradual diminution of the Queen's Hospital services had been decided upon, has now become acute, and it is becoming more and more difficult to find sufficient student nurses to maintain the standard of nursing service within the Hospital.

The system of admission of patients has attracted Admission of considerable attention in the past few months. Patients.

The Board does not wish to make any special pronouncement on this. Its one anxiety is to ensure that patients requiring the services of the Hospital can obtain them without undue delay, and any well-planned system which will help in this direction will receive the sympathetic support of the Board.

Beds are being specially set aside at all three units of the United Hospital and used solely for the purpose of admissions from the general waiting lists. All patients who are seen in the Out-patient Departments, whose conditions, whilst needing in-patient treatment, are not of any specially urgent character, are placed on these waiting lists. Such patients are admitted strictly in the order in which they are entered on the lists.

The ready co-operation of the Medical Staff in these arrangements is appreciated by the Board.

It should be noted, however, that not only the United Hospital but all the great voluntary hospitals throughout the country, have, particularly in view of the strides made by the municipal hospitals in the treatment of the acute sick, developed to a very large degree a specialised service of a definite and distinct character.

General physicians and surgeons are tending more and more to concentrate their studies and work in some specialised direction, and the more advanced opinion in the medical profession freely acknowledges that it is necessary for them to do so.

Modern methods of medical and surgical treatment are becoming increasingly exacting, and any one individual can no longer deal with the whole range of conditions in the way demanded by advancing knowledge and technique

Reasonable discrimination, subject always to the immediately urgent needs of the patient, must be employed to ensure that the services of the right man are available at the moment he is most wanted.

With this general comment it is only necessary to repeat that the Board will gladly co-operate in any properly devised scheme that will give access to the Hospital with the utmost despatch to those requiring institutional treatment of the character which the Hospital is best able to afford.

In concluding its report, the Board pleads for that continued and increasing public support without which it cannot hope to meet its onerous responsibilities.

Since the two old-established institutions were brought together as the United Hospital the process of co-ordination has been continued, and all units are working in complete harmony and co-operation.

The new Hospital, now proudly bearing the name of Queen Elizabeth, opens up new pathways of public service.

The Board is sensible of its great responsibilities, and will do all in its power so to manage the affairs of the United Hospital as a whole that the most efficient and modern treatment of the sick—its paramount duty —shall go hand in hand with the other services of medical education and research, and the training of nurses to the great and lasting benefit of mankind.

By a resolution of the Board an appropriation has been made from free legacies to meet the year's working deficit of $\pounds 20,718$ shown above.

Income.

The slight all-round drop in income may be traced to a variety of causes, not all within the control of the Committee. If, however, as the figures seem to suggest, $\pounds 160,000$ is the limit of the normal earning power of the General and Queen's Units, it is obvious that the addition of the third unit at Edgbaston will soon create a position of serious difficulty, unless new sources of income can be tapped—a matter which is receiving the earnest consideration of the Committee.

Expenditure.

The Committee gratefully recognises the assistance of the Spending Committees in keeping ordinary expenditure as a whole within the budget, and if the story could end there the year's result would be satisfactory, especially as certain "extraordinary" income is still being received in the form of covenanted subscriptions of a special nature.

Details of extraordinary expenditure will be found at the end of the Income and Expenditure Account, and it will be observed that these include expenditure at the Queen Elizabeth Unit since the date of taking over, even though the hospital was not available for the reception of patients until the last day of the year. This expenditure consists mainly of items which would normally be included under the headings "Domestic " and " Salaries and Wages."

Dedication of Beds.

The total amount received as Capital for Dedication of Beds now stands at $\pounds 263,334$, an increase of nearly $\pounds 20,000$ during the year. Reference is made in the report of the Board to three items which account for a large part of this increase, and the Finance Committee gratefully acknowledges the generosity of both present and past supporters of the hospital expressed in this form.

Free Legacies.

The hospital finances have again received substantial and welcome help by the receipt of free legacies amounting to $\pounds 29,995$. Details of these are shown elsewhere in this report, and, while the total is somewhat below the average of the past few years, it is still a remarkable figure, and is a tribute both to the generosity of those unfortunately no longer with us and to their regard for the voluntary hospital system.

As already mentioned, an appropriation of £20,718 has been made out of Legacies Account to meet the deficit on the year's working. In addition to this, a sum of £30,000 has, by resolution of the Board, been allocated to Contingencies Reserve, bringing the latter up to £50,000. Substantial extensions to the Nurses' Home at the General Hospital, as well as other special matters, have become urgent, and this reserve is intended to provide a fund out of which this special expenditure may be met.

Free Capital.

There is a tendency in some directions to accuse voluntary hospitals of building up capital reserves by not spending legacy income during the years in which it is received. Had the United Hospital not been able to do this to some extent hitherto the present position would have been sufficiently serious, as is clearly indicated by the allocations from legacies mentioned in the previous paragraph.

With the immediate prospect of heavy commitments at the new hospital, and little if any opportunity to curtail expenses at the older units, the position would be impossible but for the temporary relief provided by such reserves as we have in the past been able to accumulate.

REPORT OF THE HOUSE COMMITTEE

The development of the Hospital has continued during Improvements the year. in the

The special Children's Ward, mentioned in last year's Hospital report, was opened for use in June.

A new automatic telephone system enables enquiries as to the condition of patients to be made to the wards direct.

It has been arranged for patients to have visitors on a **Patients** third day in the week, and Wednesday evening, from 6-30 to 7-30, is now set apart for this purpose.

The patients' meals have been improved by giving them supper and a cooked breakfast at a considerably later time than hitherto.

The Toc H, Moseley Branch, continues to be Patients' responsible for the patients' library, and this service Library is of great benefit to the patients.

The chief problem which the Hospital has now to Accommodameet is the very pressing need for a considerable tion for the addition to the accommodation for the nursing staff. Nursing Staff Plans are being prepared for the provision of at least one hundred additional bedrooms.

The department for radiation therapy, for the Radiation efficiency of which the Chairman of the Board (Lord Therapy Austin) is so largely responsible, continues its important Department work and the number of patients is increasing rapidly.

An agreement has been made with the Board of the Women's Hospital for the treatment of their patients needing radiation therapy.

The House Committee records with the greatest **Personal** regret the death on February 14th, 1939, of Dr. W. J. McCardie who, for forty years, was a member of the medical staff of the Hospital, and had a very high reputation in the country for pioneer work in the administration of anæsthetics.

The Committee is very much gratified that His Majesty the King has conferred upon Miss E. M. Musson, C.B.E., R.R.C., LL.D., Matron of the Hospital from 1908 to 1922, the honour of Dame Commander of the Order of the British Empire.

The Committee very much regret the loss by resignation of their colleague, Mr. C. H. Saunders, who served on the House Committee for twenty years. He held the office of Chairman of the Committee from 1926 to 1931, and was Chairman of the Board in 1920, an office held by his father fifty-five years ago.

The Committee would like to record their grateful thanks to Dr. T. L. Hardy for his valuable help as a medical representative on the House Committee; and also for much assistance given by Mr. R. Beatson Hird during the past two years as Chairman of the Medical Sub-Committee.

Medical Staff It was with general regret that Mr. G. Percival Mills, M.B., B.S., F.R.C.S., resigned the office of Honorary Surgeon as from June 30th, 1938, after twenty-five years' service. The Committee presented him with an illuminated address and his portrait will be painted by Mr. J. Bernard Munns and hung in the Hospital.

Christmas

The Committee again most cordially thanks Lord and Lady Austin for their generous gifts at Christmas, when every patient received a 10/- note and every member of the nursing, domestic and other staffs received a box of chocolates.

The Linen League continues to grow in numbers of helpers and garments supplied to the Hospital, and the Committee once again expresses its high appreciation to those responsible. The mending parties from Carrs Lane still give their valuable help in repairing bed linen, thus effecting considerable economy and much assisting the nursing staff.

Samaritan Committee The Samaritan Committee has carried on its important work during the year, and the members have regularly visited the wards with great advantage to the patients.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE NURSING SCHOOL

The work of the School has made steady progress. Fifty-two students entered and nine left after the trial period; four entered as second-year probationers. Although there were fewer entries there were also less who failed after the trial period, so our numbers are still up to strength.

Six students have entered for the radiography course, and six students have taken the housekeeping course.

It has been impossible, owing to lack of accommodation, to reduce the nurses' hours.

The Glover Trust Almshouses were given up last September as they became unsuitable; at present thirty night nurses sleep at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital.

The prize-giving was held in April and we were glad to have Prof. Thomas Wilson with us to distribute the prizes.

For five years the nurses have been raising money in different ways, and now have sufficient to buy an epidiascope for use in the School and at lectures.

ALMONER'S REPORT.

The work of the Department has shown a steady increase. There has been an increased demand for our services in securing convalescence, extra nourishment, and appliances for the patients. By seeing every patient on admission we have been able to help them with many small problems, such as advice about obtaining their National Health Insurance money and explaining to some of the wives how to obtain financial help while their husbands are incapacitated.

During the year we have been able to send more diabetic patients away. I was fortunately able to persuade the Matron of a convalescent home in Warwickshire to undertake the special diets and injections. The experiment has proved of great benefit to the patients, who have found the rest and change a mental encouragement as well as giving a physical improvement. We have used the Diabetic Association Home at Birchington for women recommended sea air, and the convalescent hospital at Southport for men. Several children have been recommended for prolonged convalescence for periods varying from two to six months. More children have been sent to the seaside this year. My grateful thanks are due to the kind friends who acted as escorts to the various groups of children sent away. This work often means a long and tiring day, but all those who have undertaken it find it well worth while.

There has been a considerable increase in the number of cases referred from the Casualty Department. The work has been very varied, and, owing to the special nature of the department, it has called for speedy action and close co-operation with various public authorities and social organizations in the city. In this connection I would like to pay tribute to the never-failing help given to us by the women police. When my clothing cupboard has failed to produce just the right garment for a patient an appeal to them has always been speedily answered.

A record number of appliances has been supplied, and from the statistics at the end of this report it will be seen that help has been obtained from a wide variety of sources.

There is an increasing need for help with fares. So many of our out-patients live in the new housing areas and some need to attend hospital two or three times a week. This frequently involves a weekly expenditure of half a crown, which can be ill-spared when the family budget is much reduced owing to illness. The Public Assistance Committee and the Birmingham Citizens' Society have helped every case which we have referred to them, but the Samaritan Fund has been called upon to help many cases whilst waiting for the results of applications to these bodies and also in helping patients who live beyond the city boundary.

We are grateful for the usual grant from the British Empire Cancer Campaign Funds. It has been of great assistance in helping the patients attending the deep X-ray departments. Many are not able to stand the strain of the daily journeys, and have had to be boarded within easy distance of the Hospital. In the country places there are not many local funds and after the patients have paid all they can the Samaritan Fund has had to provide the balance.

I particularly wish to thank Miss Greening for her splendid services in visiting our patients in their homes. I want to thank all those who have sent clothing for my cupboard, which seems to empty itself with surprising rapidity. I would also like to thank the kind friends who have collected silver paper. Lastly, I thank all the members of the Samaritan Guild for their continued efforts to raise money for the Samaritan Fund.

THE GENERAL HOSPITAL CHAPLAIN'S REPORT

The Chapel Services have recently been well attended by patients from the wards. A few are regular churchgoers elsewhere, but many have not been to a place of worship for some time. Our simple services often awaken them to a new interest in religious worship.

We are much indebted to the Rev. C. H. Williams for allowing the choir boys of Bishop Ryder's Church to lead the singing on Sunday mornings. They are improving under the persevering tuition of our organist, Mr. L. H. Tongue.

The monthly relay services from the chapel to the wards have been continued and improved. At these the local clergy have kindly given addresses and brought members of their choirs.

Festival services at Easter and Christmas were very well attended; the collections at the latter, amounting to ± 10 , were forwarded to Lord Baldwin's Fund for Refugees.

As in former years additional services were held in Lent. One or two nurses and ward maids were confirmed in 1938, while several nurses are to be presented in May of this year.

The cleaning of the chapel windows and walls, together with the painting of the ceiling, considerably brightened the building. The carpeting of the floor is a great improvement and has reduced the echo.

Regular visiting of patients as well as ward services have been continued in both the General and Jaffray Hospitals throughout the year.

A small portable radio set has been given to be used by any patient unable to wear head phones. The Jaffray Hospital is now equipped with a new radiogramophone for ward services.

The kindly help and co-operation of members of the staff at all times is very much appreciated.

REPORT OF THE HOUSE COMMITTEE, 1938

In spite of many difficulties during the year the work of the Hospital has been carried on at a satisfactory level of efficiency.

Staff.

It was only the willing co-operation of the Honorary Medical and Surgical Staffs, Matron and the Nursing Staff and the staffs in all departments of the Hospital, that made it possible. The Committee takes this opportunity of expressing its warm appreciation of their work.

Permanent Medical Staff.

On the completion of three years' service Dr. E. Baylis Ash, M.B., Ch.B., M.R.C.S., M.R.C.P., and Dr. William Carey Smallwood, M.B., Ch.B., M.R.C.S., M.R.C.P., were appointed to the permanent Medical Staff in accordance with Bye-law 47.

Plastic Surgery Department.

The Plastic Surgery Department which was established just before the publication of last year's report, already plays an important part in the surgical work of the Hospital.

Mr. T. Pomfret Kilner, F.R.C.S., the Honorary Surgeon, attends for a full day each month. In the morning he has a long operating session, and in the afternoon a large clinic in the Out-Patient Department. The continually increasing numbers prove how greatly this branch of surgery is appreciated by those who are unfortunate enough to need its treatment.

Mr. J. N. Sankey continues as Assistant Surgeon in charge of this Department, under the direction of Mr. Pomfret Kilner.

Dental Department.

Mr. R. O. Walker, L.R.C.P., L.R.C.S., H.D.D., L.D.S., has been appointed Assistant Dental Surgeon. The Committee welcomes Mr. Walker to the Staff, and wishes him all success in his hospital work.

Diets.

The diet for patients has received particular attention during the year. In order to come into line with the other units of the Hospital, patients are no longer asked to provide for themselves certain articles of food. In addition, a more liberal and varied diet is now provided for the breakfast of such patients as are able to take advantage of it. The Sampson Gamgee Prize for the year 1938 was Sampson won by Mr. Wilfred G. Mills; an engrossed scroll and a Gamgee prize.

Owing to pressure of work in the Casualty Depart- Casualty ment a second Casualty House Surgeon has been Department. appointed, and a rearrangement of duties now ensures that at all times patients in this Department will receive prompt attention.

The Rev. Douglas H. Barton, M.A., after serving Resignation the Hospital for eight years, resigned the Chaplaincy of Chaplain. on his appointment as Vicar of the Parish of Coleshill. The Committee regrets the loss of his very valuable ministrations, and most sincerely wishes him success and happiness in his new parish.

In the National Emergency which arose in September National preparation was made throughout the Hospital for Crisis. protection against air raids. All necessary work, such as screening, curtaining and protection of glass roofs, was satisfactorily carried out without disturbing the regular services of the Hospital. It was also necessary to make extra large purchases of provisions and stores.

On Christmas morning the Lord Mayor and Lady Christmas. Mayoress, accompanied by the Chairman, the Deputy Chairman and members of the Board, visited the Wards. All were impressed with the happiness of the patients.

An acknowledgment of the gifts in money and kind appears elsewhere, but the Committee wishes to record its deep gratitude to Lord and Lady Austin, who again gave a 10/- note to every in-patient and a box of chocolates to each member of the Staff, and also to Mr. and Mrs. Eric Vincent for their gift of a casket of toffee to each person in the Hospital, whether patient or a member of the Staff.

Since the building in 1927 of the new Theatre unit Davenport Messrs. Davenport "C.B." Ltd. have given f_{200} Theatre yearly towards the cost of its maintenance. The Committee records with gratitude the continuance of this welcome contribution.

The School and the Massage and Electrical Depart- School of ment have been fully occupied during the year. There Massage. are now seventy students on the register and there is a list of candidates awaiting admission. Pre-Convalescent Beds at Blackwell. With the co-operation of the Birmingham Hospitals Contributory Association the arrangement for forty pre-convalescent beds at Blackwell Convalescent Home has been continued.

The Committee would like to thank all those who have kindly presented Blackwell tickets to the Hospital. These have proved most acceptable.

The Committee records its deep appreciation of the efforts of the Queen's Hospital Aid Society and Queen's Hospital Clothing Guild. These two organisations have given devoted services to the Hospital for many years past.

The Blood Transfusion Service, which has for some years rendered most valuable assistance, continues as an important part of the Hospital work. Grateful thanks are offered to the Donors, the Committee and Officers of the service for their most willing help.

The Night Emergency Motor Service has continued under the Hospital Saturday Fund. The organisation has given help in conveying blood donors and patients' friends to and from their homes at night time when no ordinary transport is available. This service is greatly appreciated.

Speech Clinic. The classes for speech training have worked with keen enthusiasm during the year, and have been well attended. Two clinics are held each week—one for juniors and one for seniors. The types of cases undertaken include cleft palates, stammering and delayed speech.

The treatment requires patience and co-operation on the part of the patient for the treatment may be lengthy. The reward comes, however, in the excellent results that are being obtained. The staff would like to record here its sincere appreciation of the valuable work being done by Miss Freda Parsons as head of this department.

THE QUEEN'S HOSPITAL

REPORT OF THE NURSING SCHOOL, 1938.

Twenty-four candidates have entered the School; six have left for various reasons.

Owing to the uncertainty as to the future of Queen's Hospital the number of entrants is considerably below that of previous years.

For the Preliminary State Examination, twenty-four nurses entered; twenty-one passed.

For the Final State Examination twenty-three nurses entered; twentyone passed, one re-entered, and passed.

The Gold Medal for the highest marks in the Hospital Final Examination was awarded to Miss Edna Margaret Birch, who gained 75 per cent marks.

The Silver Medal was awarded to Miss Jessie Hill, who gained 70 per cent marks.

Book prizes were awarded to Miss J. Eyre and Miss D. M. Haynes on obtaining the highest number of marks in the Hospital Intermediate Examination, and to Miss M. Johnstone and Miss C. Kinman for the highest marks in the Hospital First Year Examination.

We have been pleased to congratulate many of our nurses on their success in gaining the Certificate of the Central Midwives Board and on appointments to positions of responsibility.

The members of the League continue to give generously to the Needlework Guild and maintain a keen interest in the Hospital.

REPORT OF THE MASSAGE SCHOOL, 1938.

The Massage and Electrical School continues to increase in numbers. At present there are fifty-nine students and with the March entrants there will be seventy. The temporary acquisition of Detached Ward as a cloakroom with the previous cloakroom as an extra classroom has provided the necessary extra accommodation and has added greatly to the comfort of the students and facilitated the arrangement of classes.

There is an increasing demand for training in physio-therapy to mee^t the corresponding demand for trained workers.

It is satisfactory to report good examination results.

Enquiries for masseuses trained in this school are constantly being made. At present the number available for meeting this demand is inadequate.

WE, the Queen's Hospital, at Birmingham, hereby declare that we will hold the sum of Three Thousand Pounds bequeathed to the Hospital by the Will of Francis Corder Clayton upon the following trust, namely:

OF THE

QUEEN'S HOSPITAL AID SOCIETY

From January 1st, 1938, to December 31st, 1938.

The Committee has pleasure in presenting its Report for 1938.

A year ago we were uncertain whether or not we should, at this date, still be in existence as a society, since it seemed likely that, in the interval, our beloved Queen's Hospital building would no longer carry the old familiar name. Yet here we still are, having survived the opening of the new Centre Hospital, repeated rumours of the impending sale of our building, and the crisis itself.

May we hope that, having come through all these things, we dare have confidence that we shall preserve our identity indefinitely?

On these lines, at any rate, we have "carried on" during the past difficult year, and we have the comforting assurance that our funds—scanty as they are, alas, in comparison with the need for them—have been put to wise and helpful use.

Milk, butter, eggs and fruit have been given in many cases, while in others more tangible assistance has been given in the shape of surgical belts, caliper splints, back supports, spectacles, dentures, etc., thus enabling the recipients to face life again less handicapped than they would otherwise be. Several out-patients attending the Massage Department have had their bus fares paid, as these soon mount up when coming two or three times a week from a little distance.

Our funds have suffered from the fact that potential new subscribers are unlikely to feel moved to contribute to a Society whose continued existence is still uncertain, but, while beds and patients remain in the hospital, we shall try to meet the needs of those who, set on the road to recovery through the skill and care received there, might lose the benefit of these without the further aid that gives a helping hand, even after they have left the hospital walls.

In this endeavour we beg for the continued help of those who have subscribed to our Society in the past, and the kind interest of possible new subscribers.

Only those of us who see the recipients in person can realise their gratitude for the help given in so many varying ways by our Society. They cannot always write letters or even put their thanks into words, but a quavering smile or the grasp of a weak hand can say much, and these are familiar things to your Ward Visitors.

We are particularly struck by the amazement of many patients that people "outside the hospital should be interested enough to visit them, and still more that an even wider circle behind the Ward Visitors, should send help in money or in kind to people whom they have never seen." Our thanks are due to Messrs. Sharp, Parsons and Co. for so kindly auditing the accounts.

The sum collected towards the dedication of a bed in the name of this Society now amounts to ± 837 2s. 6d. Further donations for this purpose would be gladly welcomed.

BIRMINGHAM UNITED HOSPITAL

The Queen Elizabeth Hospital

REPORT OF THE HOUSE COMMITTEE.

The House Committee of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital appointed by the Board on October 17th held its first meeting on November 3rd, and has since that date met regularly on the first and third Wednesdays each month.

The Nurses' Home was handed over to the United Hospital on September 1st but the Main Hospital block did not become available until November 1st.

The first patients were admitted on December 31st, but some reference must be made to the work undertaken in preparation for their reception.

It is surely a rare if not a unique experience to open entirely new buildings of the size and character of the United Hospital's new unit.

With the exception of a very few officers from the two older units, all staff had to be freshly recruited, and the selection and interviewing of candidates for the important key positions was a task of great responsibility.

It early became an urgent duty to commence the Nurses' Preliminary Training School, so that the first contingent of student nurses should be prepared to enter the wards of the Hospital immediately patients were received, and on the opening date forty student nurses were ready.

The organisation of the Kitchen Department was also taken in hand at an early date.

From the early days of July furniture and equipment Equipment. of the greatest variety began to arrive, and the careful sorting out of this and its distribution to the various departments became a daily task of considerable difficulty and complexity.

Order gradually emerged from the chaos of the first few weeks—the staff became acquainted with the vast new quarters in the Home and Hospital and in the first week in September the Home was actually occupied.

In the early days of December, certain wards and departments of the Hospital were becoming ready for occupation, although still lacking a considerable number of the smaller items of equipment, essential for the satisfactory beginning of Hospital work. The House Committee, however, is glad to report that wards actually came into use twenty-four hours in advance of the scheduled time, and the care of patients was undertaken without mishap of any kind, and has since been carried on to the satisfaction of all concerned.

The various difficulties inevitably associated with the opening up of an entirely new hospital, including the establishment of officers and staff in their manifold duties, have been surmounted.

Until the complete building scheme of the Hospitals Centre Executive Board respecting the Queen Elizabeth Hospital is carried out, it will be necessary to adopt a number of temporary measures to carry on the work.

In consultation with the members of the Honorary Staff concerned, the House Committee has approved the use of the ward examining rooms for out-patient work, and these arrangements will, the House Committee feels sure, prove reasonably satisfactory. In expressing the hope that the full scheme will be completed as early as possible it wishes to record its great appreciation of the excellent facilities for treatment and the splendid accommodation for patients which has been provided in the completed sections of the Hospital.

Hospital Brochure, and Visits to the Hospital. The House Committee has appointed a sub-committee composed of Mr. G. D. Collins, Mr. E. Marston Rudland, Mr. A. Simmons, and Mr. Eric Vincent to prepare an illustrated brochure of the unit.

At the same time, this sub-committee will consider the best arrangements that can be made during the summer months for the large number of people and organisations that wish to visit the Hospital. It is hoped to set up a rota of guides who will undertake the duties of conducting parties through the several departments, and explain the many interesting features of the buildings.

General Maintenance. It has been generally recognised that the maintenance cost of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital cannot be directly compared with the two older units owing to the more comprehensive nature of the equipment and the provision of such highly desirable features as smaller wards and numerous side wards.

The whole question of running expenses will receive the regular and close attention of the House Committee, but until the Hospital is working at its full capacity, it must be understood that satisfactory economy in working cannot be achieved. The question of the accommodation for staff is likely Accommodato arise in the near future. It will be remembered that the Nurses' Home is to be supplemented by two further blocks, one for the night nursing staff and the other for maids, and this additional accommodation will be urgently required in the near future.

The House Committee takes much pleasure in referring Linen to the very valuable work of the Ladies' Committee League. which, under the Chairmanship of Mrs. Bernard Ward, has already accomplished so much for the Queen Elizabeth Hospital.

Mrs. M. E. Kenchington and Mrs. R. Hill have undertaken the Honorary Secretaryship and Honorary Treasurership respectively.

Work is being done in a great many districts both by efforts for raising funds with which to buy material, and also by sewing parties who are making garments, bandages, tray-cloths, scarves, helmets, etc. During the three months the league has been in existence it has been able to meet several urgent needs, e.g., 150 pillow covers in one week. Many garments, such as pyjamas, nightdresses, etc., have been made and are now ready for use.

The enthusiasm and keenness shown by all members has been most encouraging and gratifying.

A subscription list is being built up, but more subscribers are urgently needed, in order to supply the demands of the working parties for more material.

The report of the Board deals fully with the great work accomplished by the Executive Board of the Hospitals Centre in providing this magnificent new hospital.

It is only necessary, therefore, to add here that the Board's reference to this outstanding service represents in a special degree the feelings of the House Committee.

In concluding this brief report of the first activities of the new unit—henceforth to bear the name "The Queen Elizabeth Hospital "—the House Committee wishes to report its great appreciation of the untiring efforts of all concerned in the arduous work of opening up the Hospital and in particular of the work of those officers who from the early days of 1938 onwards have devoted all their time and energies to the setting up of an organisation which has now been proved equal to the occasion.

THE QUEEN ELIZABETH HOSPITAL.

REPORT OF THE NURSING SCHOOL.

The first entry in this the first report on the nursing services of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital is an expression of appreciation of the unstinted service given by those members of the nursing staff who undertook the work of preparation.

There can be no question that it was owing to their courage and determination—their willingness to undertake any task allotted to them, however arduous, that the admission of patients on the 31st December, 1938, was made possible.

The building up of an adequate and efficient nursing service within a limited period, the establishment of a school of nursing, the equipment and organisation of the work of each department have presented interesting and very special problems, which are slowly solving themselves into the smooth running of the hospital as a whole.

A comparatively high proportion of nurses to patients is found to be necessary in order to give adequate nursing care to patients treated in the many side wards of the units, and for the present, owing to the fact that the nursing school is still in its infancy, the staff includes an unusually high percentage of State registered nurses.

Excellent equipment has been provided for the lecture hall and classrooms, and the first group of thirty-six students completed a three months' preliminary course of instruction and were in readiness for admission to the wards immediately their services were required.

Twenty students were enrolled for the second course beginning early in January, and the number of applications received indicate that no difficulty is likely to be experienced in making a selection of suitable candidates for admission to the school later in the year. The recruitment of a sufficient number of staff nurses to maintain and to increase the present staff in readiness for the opening of the remaining beds, at a time when it is universally recognised that throughout the country the supply falls far short of the demand, cannot fail to give rise to some anxiety. Every effort is being made to ensure that delay in the expansion of the hospital's work shall not occur as a result of shortage of staff. Nevertheless, in spite of satisfactory results up to date the possibility of such being the case cannot be altogether disregarded, together with the problem of bedroom accommodation in the nurses' home and for the domestic staff, which is likely to arise.

Owing to the distance from the city and difficulties in transport, the facilities for recreation already provided in Nuffield House are more than ordinarily appreciated by the staff. Efforts are being made to establish a fiction library and to extend the possibilities for both indoor and outdoor games.

The improved working conditions, the satisfactory living accommodation and the healthy surroundings of the hospital are undoubtedly reflected in the exceptionally good health record of the staff.

The Hospital has continued during the year its important function of relieving the General Hospital of long cases still requiring active treatment and taking over patients who are likely to derive special benefit from treatment away from the centre of a large city, many patients being able to spend much of their time in the spacious gardens.

The Committee shares the view strongly held by members of the medical staff of the General Hospital as to the great value of the work of this Hospital, particularly bearing in mind that owing to its part endowment the hospital is run at a very small net cost.

Unfortunately, owing to temporary shortage of nursing staff, two wards had to be closed for two months. During the greater part of the year three of the four wards have been allotted to women patients to meet the greater pressure upon women's beds at the parent hospital.

The Committee are very glad to record that, after experiments carried out by Matron, it has been found possible permanently to arouse patients an hour later in the mornings, and a full breakfast is now given by the hospital at a more popular time.

The Christmas festivities were again much enjoyed by the patients and staff. The President (Mrs. Albert Cay) very kindly gave every patient a shilling; Lord and Lady Austin again gave them a 10/- note and every member of the nursing and domestic staffs a box of chocolates; and the Midland Counties Dairy Company were good enough to send chocolate ices for all in the hospital. In addition, members of the Committee visited the hospital on Christmas morning and gave gifts to the patients. The Committee are very glad to record that the Toc H, Yenton Branch, have undertaken to organise a patients' library on the lines of that provided at the General Hospital, and Boots (Chemists), Ltd., have kindly presented a number of books.

The Committee would like to express their special thanks to the Medical Officer (Dr. James Fairley) and the Matron for the highly efficient and conscientious manner in which they continue to carry out their duties.

The Laundry continues to be run in an efficient and economical manner, as the above figures will show, the management giving special satisfaction.

The Factory Act, 1937, has necessitated many alterations in the arrangement of machinery and in the conditions of employment of the workpeople.

As mentioned in last year's report, the wages of the staff have been brought into line with the Laundry Trade Board rates, increasing the total wages by $\pounds 7$ a week, and owing to this increase and the difficulty in obtaining juvenile labour the cost per thousand articles washed continues to be high.
