



119th REPORT

OF THE

COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT

For the year ending 31st December, 1946

The Committee have pleasure in presenting the 119th Annual Report of the Hospital.

The year 1946 has been outstanding in many respects. Modernisation and improvements have been effected on every side, and long cherished schemes have been brought to fruition. Departmental reports show that a considerable amount of new equipment has been installed. Most of this equipment—denied us during the war years—has been in short supply, but no time has been lost in making the Hospital efficient as materials have been released. All this has cost money—a lot of money—as the Accounts bear testimony.

It is with feelings of sorrow that your Committee record the loss sustained by the death on 4th August, 1946, of Ralph Howard Gossage, Vice-President since September, 1945. From 5th February, 1911, until his resignation on 13th June, 1945, he was Honorary Secretary, an office which he filled with conscientious devotion. By his services, so freely given, the Hospital remains as a memorial to his inspiration and foresight.

The Year's Work.

The demands on the Casualty Department have again been particularly heavy and the average of accident and emergency cases weekly has considerably increased beyond all previous figures.

Finance.

Income—It is gratifying to be able to report that the Ordinary Income has reached the highest total ever recorded, £45,861 16s. 1d. as against £41,588 19s. 1d. for 1945. The increase is chiefly due to the payment by the Government of £2,531 for increased Nursing Salaries during the past three years.

Extraordinary income amounted to £5,124 10s. as against £6,349 14s. 4d. for the previous year.

Your Committee again desire to place on record its gratitude to the Merseyside Hospitals Council and its Contributors for the sum of £14,502 received in recognition of services rendered. The sum of £510 was also received through the Merseyside Hospitals Council in respect of Hospital Sunday collections, and the Committee's thanks are due to the Churches for this welcome gift, which is ear-marked for the treatment of the necessitous sick.

Expenditure.

Ordinary Expenditure has increased from £46,518 11s. 10d. in 1945 to £64,424 9s. 4d. last year, an increase of £17,905 17s. 6d.

Extraordinary Expenditure at £5,041 12s. 10d. for 1946 as against £6,575 19s. 6d. for 1945 shows a reduction of £1,534 6s. 8d.

Rising costs and increases in Salaries and Wages account largely for expenditure reaching the highest figure ever recorded. There is still much to be done if our scheme of modernisation is to be carried through and it must be appreciated too, that it will all cost money, but it is the intention of your Committee to continue to make every effort to provide the finest possible service.

that this commendable result is in no small measure due to the enthusiastic work of our Appeals Organiser, Depot Holders and Honorary Collectors, and to these, your Committee accord their warmest thanks.

Lady Collectors of Subscriptions.

Your Committee are happy to report that Subscriptions last year amounted to £277 17s. 1d. There is a slight decrease in the amount of donations, due no doubt, to the difficult times through which we are passing. Our thanks are due to these ladies who, often at great inconvenience, continue year after year to brave the elements and maintain personal contact with their generous friends.

A detailed list of the amounts collected is given on page 43.

It is with profound regret that the Committee record the death of Mrs. Rachel Mary Royden, who for so many years played a personal and intimate part in the welfare of the Hospital. Particularly do we recall her devoted service as President of the Linen Guild from 1926 to 1939. There are many amongst us who still remember the brilliant social functions held at Bidston Court for the benefit of the Hospital. It was in no small measure due to the personality and charm of this Lady that these events were such an outstanding success. Her enthusiasm for a good cause was infectious. The Committee have always been most conscious of the value of Mrs. Royden's services, and in 1929 she was invited to perform the opening ceremony of the Out-Patients' Department. Although latterly, for health reasons, Mrs. Royden has been unable to take an active part in the work of the Hospital, she had retained a keen interest in its welfare.

MRS. ROYDEN came of an old Birkenhead family. Her two grandfathers, Dr. Jerome Smith and Mr. Septimus Ledward were associated with this Hospital. Dr. Jerome Smith at the age of 16 obtained first place in the Matriculation Examinations at Trinity College, Dublin, on 5th May, 1823, and after taking his degree came to Birkenhead in 1837. From 1842 to 1847 he was Honorary Consulting Surgeon to the Birkenhead Hospital and Dispensary.

THE name of Septimus Ledward is carved upon the foundation stone of the Hospital and he was one of the trustees of the Hospital built by Mr. William Laird and completed in 1863. Mr. Charles O. Ledward, brother of Septimus, was a member of the Hospital Committee for many years.

THE deepest sympathy of the Committee is extended to our President and his family in the irreparable loss they have sustained.

Hospital Linen Guild.

The Hospital Linen Guild, under its President, Lady Leverhulme, and its Honorary Treasurer and Secretary, Mrs. G. Wetherell, continues to flourish. A full report of their activities will be found on page 23.

Honorary Chaplain.

Your Committee extend to the Honorary Chaplain, the Reverend William Slater Sykes, M.A. their sincere appreciation of his untiring work on behalf of patients and staff. Morning Service is held in the Chapel each Sunday at 9.30 a.m. to which patients and staff are cordially invited. The Honorary Chaplain would be pleased to welcome members of the Committee to these pleasant Sunday services. Mr. Sykes was appointed in September, 1920, and the Chapel furnishing and appointments were provided, without any charge to the Hospital, out of a fund maintained by Mr. Sykes and friends of the Hospital.

Library.

The Library continues to provide a most acceptable service to the patients. Since its inauguration in 1938 by Mrs. Whitaker and the late Mrs. Marsh, over 30,000 books have been loaned to the patients—surely a proof of the popularity of this service. The Hospital has not been called upon to provide one penny towards the cost or maintenance of the books. To Mrs. Whitaker and her two assistants, Mrs. L. R. Kyffin—who incidentally is the Hospital's representative on the Mayoress's Ladies Charity Committee—and Miss Mitchell, the thanks of your Committee are accorded. The efficiency of the Library has been enhanced by a gift of about 300 books by the members of the Rotary Club of Birkenhead. The quality and condition of these books will, we feel sure, afford profit and pleasure to the patients. To Mr. G. A. Woodcock, the President, and the Members of the Rotary Club, many thanks.

Honorary Medical Staff.

Your Committee are privileged to place on record their grateful thanks to members of the Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff for their services during the year under review. It is not generally known to what extent their heavy and varied work has increased, but they have given willingly of their skill and time for the benefit of the patients admitted to the Wards and attending at the Out-Patient Clinics.

During the year the Appointments System has been tried out in the Ear, Nose and Throat Department, and has saved patients a considerable amount of waiting time. To make this system 100 per cent. efficient, it is necessary to have the cooperation of the patients' doctor as well as the patient himself.

The extension of the system to all Clinics has recently been decided upon, and it is hoped that this will prove a great benefit to Out-Patients and the Honorary Staff.

We welcome Dr. R. J. Keating as Assistant Radiologist, after Army Service in the North-African Campaign and in Italy. Major Keating comes to us from the Cambridge Hospital, Aldershot and his appointment will be of considerable assistance to Dr. Winfield. Three important appointments have also been made. We refer to the advent of Dr. A. Thelwall Jones as Assistant Physician, Mr. Frank I. Evans as Assistant Surgeon and Mr. T. E. Lennon as Assistant Gynaecological Surgeon. These additions are long overdue, as the extra work falling upon the Honorary Staff has considerably increased.

Dr. G. Ronald Ellis has been called up for service with the Army, and we shall lose his services for about 2 years, and a temporary appointment will be made to fill the vacancy. We wish Dr. Ellis every success in his new sphere of activities.

Resident Medical Staff.

The year has seen the return to the Hospital under the Government Rehabilitation Scheme of a number of Housemen who have had more experience than is usually associated with these positions. This is coincident with a greatly increased amount of work in the Hospital, the figures being higher than in any previous year.

Your Committee have taken advantage of the Government Rehabilitation Scheme, whereby the salaries of ex-service Medical Officers are in certain circumstances implemented by the Dean of the Faculty of Medicine, Liverpool University.

A Surgical Registrar and an additional two Resident Medical Officers have been appointed. This has been of inestimable benefit to the Hospital, enabling each Member of the Honorary Medical Staff to have a personal resident representative in the Hospital and has resulted in the Resident Doctors ability to give considerably more careful supervision and time to each patient than heretofore.

We are pleased to welcome back to the Resident Medical Staff previous Members who have served in His Majesty's Forces; namely, Surgeon Lieut. H. Richardson Gray, Squadron Leader John Littler, and Captain Donald R. Gunn, realising as we do that the experience they have gained will be of great benefit to the patients.

Nursing Staff.

Particulars of the Nursing Staff personnel are contained in the Matron's Report. The efficient and conscientious manner in which the Matron and her Staff have carried out their duties is worthy of the highest praise, and the Committee express great appreciation of their work.

Almoner's Department.

It is pleasing to note that during the past year the work of this Department began to resume its pre-war character, in so far that both statutory and voluntary social agencies were able to assist more generally and more thoroughly with the normal after-care work of the patients, having hitherto concentrated on the acute and immediate war-time problems following the bombing raids and the subsequent distress caused.

138 patients were sent to Convalescent Homes during the year, assistance towards maintenance and fares coming from various local Societies, Contributory Schemes, employees and our own "John Laird Fund." Similarly, 324 appliances were provided for both in-patients and out-patients, with help from the same source. Regarding the provision of Surgical Appliances, it is certain that if left to the patients, there would only be a small percentage who could obtain them by their own efforts. It is gratifying to note in our experiment in the resettlement of certain disabled patients, that with the assistance of kindly and co-operative employers, nearly all patients referred to us for help in this direction were placed in suitable employment.

Our thanks are due to the Invalid Children's Association, Centre of Social Service, Personal Service Society and the Merseyside Hospitals Council for reports on home conditions, and for visiting patients in their homes, also to the Poor Man's Lawyers in various districts who were always ready to help the less fortunate patients with legal problems. Mention should also be made of the help rendered by the Hospital Car Service, and for the courtesy and general assistance of the drivers individually.

The Department has been particularly successful in obtaining financial and other aid for patients who are victims of over-crowding and other bad social conditions, and the help given by the National Society for Cancer Relief has, in no small measure, been the means of bringing comfort to many deserving cases.

Our Almoner is much concerned on account of the "lonely aged." Here is indeed a problem requiring urgent attention. It is not uncommon to discover people over 75 years of age living completely alone and doing everything for themselves, with the result that they are not properly cared for. The outlook seems very gloomy for them and the conditions under which they exist are often appalling.

We feel that the Department is doing its share in the alleviation of the sick and suffering living within the wide area under our influence, and sympathy and time to listen to "the patients side" is being well rewarded. Dispensary Department.

The work of the Department has greatly increased during the past year, and we are happy to record that necessary equipment and apparatus recently installed has added to the efficiency of our work.

The time-honoured bottle of medicine is fast becoming a thing of the past and its place is being taken by more scientific preparations. Much time and energy has been spent in our endeavour to keep abreast with the advancements made in the field of medicine. The preparation for Wards and Theatres of sterile solutions of many kinds for intravenous injection is now taking up a great deal of time, but this work is being speeded up to a great degree by the purchase of a new Manesty Electric Still. Many tablets have been turned out during the year by means of the recently installed Tablet Machine.

The Eye work, temporarily suspended during the war years, has been resumed in full force. During Wednesday mornings between 40 and 50 eye prescriptions are dispensed.

With the release of penicillin to the general public in the early part of the year, a sudden demand for all types of preparations was experienced, and the work has now taken its place in the daily routine. Ointments, creams, sprays, eye drops, etc., are now being prepared in the Department.

Two courses, each of seven lectures, have been given to the Nurses during the year on Materia Medica.

Considerable alterations and extensions to the Department are envisaged in the coming year, and we feel sure that our long cherished ambition of changing the Dispensary into a Pharmaceutical Department is within sight.

Electrocardiographic Department.

In 1946 the number of Electrocardiographs taken was 347. The Department is now equipped with the most modern appliances and every endeavour is being made to keep pace with recent advances in this branch of Medical Science. New methods in diagnosing and confirming cardiac conditions have proved successful, and are of considerable assistance to the Honorary Medical Staff. The work of Mr. E. Caldwell and his department are deserving our highest praise.

Pathological and Bacteriological Department.

Like many Departments of the Hospital, the Pathological Laboratory has extended in the last few years. It became necessary to re-organise it and an up-to-date Laboratory was established in the centre of the Hospital. The investigations carried out in the last decade have increased from 4,550 specimens per annum to approximately 11,000 specimens. This work entails the investiga-

tion of many tumours removed by the Surgeons; and bacteriological and bio-chemical investigation of materials collected from patients in the Wards and from the Out-Patients attending this Hospital.

The Laboratory has made every effort to keep pace with modern requirements, and in this connection many advances in bio-chemical investigations have been made. It is now recognised that the work carried out in the Laboratory constitutes an important help to the various Clinicians who are Members of the Honorary Medical Staff. Some indication of the work being carried on will be seen in the table of statistics on page 25.

Your Committee would like to place on record its gratitude to Dr. Hugh Smith and his staff for their part in keeping the work of this very important Department in the forefront of the relentless battle against disease.

Physiotherapy Department.

The Physiotherapy Department is now one of the best equipped on Merseyside. During the war years in spite of shortages and other difficulties, much new electrical and gymnastic apparatus was installed. Most of the radiant heat baths were replaced by modern infra-red lamps; a small but none the less up-to-date Sunlight Department was opened and is now doing most of the Sunlight work in Wirral.

A new Ultratherm shortwave machine recently acquired has superseded the old longwave Diathermy machine and is working 6 hours daily treating patients from all Clinics.

During 1946 the attendances maintained the average of just over 100 patients daily, and as 75 per cent of these cases receive two or more treatments it can be seen that the apparatus of all kind undergoes a great deal of wear and tear.


We hope to open up a Rehabilitation Department during 1947. Much of the apparatus has been acquired and we are now looking round for a suitable site. This Department will be a great help as it will relieve congestion in an already overcrowded room and give more scope to the Staff.


X-Ray Department.

The number of patients x-rayed in 1946 was 13,171, consisting of 11,225 out-patients and 1,946 in-patients. These compare very favourably with last year, and the war-time increase in the volume of work done by the Department has been maintained. The Committee has long been aware that the large number of attendances was straining the capacity of the Department to its limits, and has now decided to increase the facilities for x-ray examination. Extensive improvements are of course being carried out, and the comfort and convenience of the patients is being catered for in every way.

A mobile set for use in x-raying patients in the Wards and Operating Theatres, was installed during the year, and the need for this apparatus has been fully demonstrated by its extensive use. X-Ray pictures can now be made in the Wards without the inconvenience of moving the patients to the Department.

A modern machine for the x-ray treatment of skin diseases has been obtained and will shortly be in commission.

More plans for modernising the Department are at present being considered, and subject to being able to obtain possession of certain premises within the Hospital at present occupied by the Corporation, obtaining licences, materials and equipment, further improvements will be made during the coming year. Plans have already been passed to improve the Dressing Room facilities for patients awaiting x-ray examination.

Orders have been given for two of the most modern X-Ray machines now manufactured and early delivery has been promised. When these are installed, not only will the Department have the finest equipment on Merseyside, but our patients will have at their disposal the convenience and treatment we have long been anxious to give them.

The recent appointment of Dr. R. J. Keating as Dr. Winfield's Assistant has already given us every reason to believe that the Department is taking its place in the forefront of service to the community.

Christmas.

Following the established custom, the Mayor and Mayoress of Birkenhead (Councillor and Mrs. Guy Williams) and the Mayor and Mayoress of Bebington (Alderman and Mrs. Henry Wilkinson), paid an official visit to the Hospital on Boxing Day. The Chairman of the Hospital, Secretary-Superintendent and Matron accompanied the official party and a large number of friends around the Wards. Seasonal fare of turkey and Christmas Pudding was a feature of the festivities, Carol parties on Christmas Eve and concerts given by Members of the Nursing Staff—which included a well rehearsed Ballet—were appreciated by the patients. The decoration of the Wards was pleasing and artistic, the work entailed in preparation was skilfully undertaken by the Nursing Staff.

"Beechwood"-Nurses Home.

Very little progress can be reported. Plans have been submitted to the Ministry of Health for recommendation, and approval is awaited before progress can be made. When in commission the Home will provide accommodation for about 22 Nurses. This accommodation is desperately required and every effort is being made to secure the sanction of the Ministry to proceed.

Modernisation and Improvements.

Your Committee are pleased to report considerable progress during the year under review. Re-decorations—long overdue have been effected to the exterior of the Hospital. The Nurses Home, Royden House and Ashville House, have been re-decorated both inside and outside. The Private Patients Block has been redecorated and new furniture and equipment ordered for the Nurses Dining Room where fluorescent lighting is now installed. Old Boardroom has been converted into a modern Dining Room for the use of the Domestic Staff and, by making use of existing space, new Linen and Storerooms, an Assistant Matron's Office and a Porters Room have been added to the amenities. Hardware Store has been erected in the Kitchen Yard and an efficient system of ventilation installed in the Laundry, where a new washing machine has been added. Ward I has been completely modernised and is one of the most up-to-date Wards on Merseyside. New wiring and fluorescent lighting, plugs for radiant heat, X-ray and wireless, and a separate light, have been fitted for each of the 27 beds. A new and efficient Fire Alarm System has been installed. The problem of congestion in the Out-Patient Records Department and the Almoner's Office has been solved by the erection of an Army Hut in the Hospital grounds. A contract has been given for extensions to the Dispensary Department and considerable improvements are about to be effected to the X-Ray Department. It appears certain that if what has actually been accomplished here during the last year had been set down as a programme, it would have been considered almost an impossibility.

Extensions.

Very little progress can be recorded in our endeavour to secure possession of the premises occupied by the Corporation's V.D. Department. Negotiations are still proceeding between the Town Clerk and your Committee. It is understood that the Corporation have secured new premises, and sanction to carry out the necessary work of re-construction was being sought, when this report was in course of preparation. When these premises are vacated your Committee will be able to put into effect the recommendations of the Architect to provide:—

Nurses Lavatory and Locker Accommodation.

Domestic Lavatory and Locker Accommodation.

New Linen Room.

X-Ray Extensions

The Hospital which is to survive, must be ready to incorporate new ideas and in every way keep abreast of the times and, in order to crystallize a plan for the future—to explore the possibilities of extensions and rebuilding—a very important step forward was taken by your Committee in March, 1946, when "It was agreed that Mr. Leonard Barnish, F.R.I.B.A., be instructed to prepare a report, together with a survey and draft scheme showing the possible future development of the Hospital." As a result a general outlined scheme to indicate "the sort of way and sort of building" that could satisfy the needs of the Hospital, emerged. These plans show the new building to be designed structurally so that every part of it could be fitted and furnished as Wards or Nurses Home, or for general, medical or secretarial requirements.

The Scheme visualises the improvement and enlargement of the Hospital as a large 4-storey block running the entire length of the Livingstone Street frontage of the site, linking up with the female Wards 2 and 4 at the South end and with the Out-Patient Department at the North end. The existing Nurses Home, V.D. (Jubilee) Block, Mortuary, Fuel Store and small projecting Block of the X-Ray Lavoraties, would be demolished. Only minor structural alterations would be necessary to the Out-Patient Buildings. Accommodation would be ample for all requirements and the Scheme visualised would provide for between 300 and 400 beds.

These plans and a detailed list of our present difficulties were laid before the Ministry of Health, Manchester. Owing to the acute need for housing it was suggested that such a large and comprehensive scheme should be left over for the time being, but the opinion was expressed that the Scheme was good and we feel certain it would form the basis of discussions regarding the future development of the Hospital at some future date.

Committee.

It is of more than passing interest to record that the Chairman of the House Committee, Mr. Charles S. Edgar has completed 25 years in the service of the Hospital. He has proved himself a wise counsellor and a kind friend, and the efficiency of the Committee over which he presides with so much tact and understanding of the day to day needs of the Hospital, owe much to his inspiration and ability.

Our thanks are due to Mr. Lockhart E. Holmes, O.B.E., who has so ably represented this Hospital on the Committee of the Merseyside Hospitals Council. Mr. Lockhart E. Holmes has been re-appointed to the Council for 1947-48.

The following members are due to retire by rotation, but are eligible for re-election:—

Philip A. Allery, Esq., J.P. Miss Annes W. Owen. Chas. S. Edgar, Esq. T. Thornton Crane, Esq. E. Bernard Jones, Esq. T. W. Harley, Esq., M.B.E., M.C.

Mr. W. Y. Hodgson has, for business reasons, found it necessary to resign and will not seek re-election. He has been a Member of the Committee since 1936 and we record our appreciation of his services.

Reference was made in last year's Report to the appointment of Mr. H. Hewitt Cooke as Secretary-Superintendent of the Hospital. Already Mr. Cooke has proved himself a most able holder of that important office. He has displayed a clear grasp of the many problems that have presented themselves in these times of transition and has maintained an efficiency in every sphere of his administration that has evoked general commendation. The Committee accordingly desire to record their thanks to the Secretary-Superintendent for his services during the past year.

Gifts in Kind.

These have been many and varied, great and small, and we offer thanks to all our kind friends, recognising that the gift of a few new laid eggs from a poor man—a gift that means sacrifice—weighs evenly in the balance with a consignment of goods from a wealthy friend. Mr. Stewart McIvor has placed us in his debt for the large amount of vegetables and fruit left at the Hospital over a long period. Particular mention should be made of the generosity of our Canadian and American friends, for gifts sent to this Hospital during 1946.

Appreciation and Thanks.

The work that the Hospital can accomplish depends upon the financial assistance which is forthcoming. Your Committee, therefore, desire to place on record its grateful thanks to the many Subscribers, Donors and friends of the Hospital, who by their generous support and services, have made possible the increased work carried on last year.

The thanks of your Committee are due to the Proprietors and Editors of the local Press, who so often render ready and willing assistance by publishing reports of the Hospital's activities, and giving publicity to our needs.

The British Red Cross and St. John War Organisation and Canadian Red Cross have sent a large quantity of Hospital stores, etc. and the Committee expresses grateful thanks for these welcome and acceptable gifts. Our thanks are also due to Mrs. H. Greaves, organiser of the Hospital Car Service, for her untiring efforts and services rendered to the Hospital.

Although the event did not take place during the year under review, your Committee feel that thanks should be given here to Mr. W. Southan Morris and his co-directors of the S.M. Super Cinemas Ltd. for their great kindness in donating the proceeds of the Ritz Hospital Premiere on 13th January, 1947. The gift of brochures, which were sold at the performance solely for the benefit of the Hospital, resulted in an addition of over £300. The total benefit to the Hospital was £1,584 19s. 1d. This money has been ear-marked for the purchase of a Diagnostic Unit for the X-Ray Department.

During the year under review 68 applications for training were received, 28 students entered for training, and 20 left, having completed their training.

Three trainees of the Hospital are still serving with H.M. Forces in the Middle East. Sister Beryl Owen after serving for three years in the Queen Alexandra's Military Nursing Service, first in Europe and later in the Far East, has recently been demobliised.

Owing to war-time restrictions, the Hospital was compelled to issue metal badges to the Nurses on completion of their training, but by a generous gesture of the Committee of Management these badges have been replaced, without cost to the recipients, by the usual silver badges. This has been greatly appreciated by the Nurses, and I am asked to record their thanks.

As in previous years, the Ward and Departmental Sisters have faced their numerous difficulties with unflinching courage and determination, and, in spite of all obstacles, have succeeded in maintaining a high standard of nursing. During and since the war, when great difficulty was experienced in obtaining domestic staff, a considerable amount of extra work fell on the Nursing Staff, but in view of the new scales of wages for domestic help, I am pleased to report a marked improvement in this connection. The installation of equipment for the modernisation of the Sluice Rooms etc. will do a lot to relieve the unfair load which the Nurses have had to bear during the past.

I would like to thank the Honorary Medical Staff and Miss E. Dobie for valuable and interesting lectures given to the Nursing Staff.

It is with deep regret I have to report that the Linen Guild has lost—by the death of Mrs. E. B. Royden—a very enthusiastic supporter. Mrs. Royden was President of the Guild for a number of years and always took a deep interest in its work. We shall miss her support very much.

With regard to the year's work, it is rather remarkable to record that, in spite of the fact that many people dropped their subscriptions last year—probably in anticipation of the time when the State will take over our Hospital—we still raised more money than ever before.

The numbers of Subscribers dropped by 30 and though we gained a few new members, we still require more helpers to bring up our total of last year. Donations fell considerably too. We have received donations from Lady Leverhulme, the Mayoress of Birkenhead, Mr. and Mrs. McIvor, Mrs. Kolb, Mrs. Harper, Alex Bickett, Esq., Miss Egan, Miss H. Thompson and T. S. Heywood, Esq. Our thanks are due to these kind friends.

During the year we have bought 35 pairs sheets, 12 dozen pillowslips, 96 towels, 64 counterpanes, 24 mattress covers, 33 covers, 12 pairs flannelette sheets and 70 all wool blankets. The following are now on order:—80 wool blankets, 25 pairs flannelette sheets, 50 pairs cotton sheets and 20 dozen pillow cases. Although our balance at the end of the year was about £300 the goods on order have yet to be paid for.

Our Committee decided last year to concentrate on re-equipping "Beechwood" Nurses Home with blankets, sheets, mattress covers, towels etc; and "special" efforts to raise money were successfully undertaken by Lady Leverhulme, Mrs. McNaught, Mrs. Swift, Mrs. Fred Willmer, Matron and Sisters, and myself. The Annual "Bring and Buy" Sale realised the sum of £168 19s. 6d. and to this was added a further £100 by a grateful patient who wished to remain anonymous.

We started the year with a balance of £88 14s. 5d. During the year Donations have brought in £12 12s. 6d. Subscriptions, in large and small amounts, have reached £72 13s. 6d. and Special Efforts, £467 6s. 9d., thus making a total of £641 7s. 2d. for the year. A Balance Sheet is shown on pages 60 & 61.

I should like to thank the Collectors and everyone who has contributed towards such a successful year.

MUNICIPAL VENEREAL DISEASES CLINIC.

This Clinic by arrangement between the Hospital Committee and the Birkenhead Corporation, is held in the hospital each day of the week except Sunday. The cost of the Clinic is borne by the Corporation and by the Ministry of Health.

A rise in the number of new patients attending the Venereal Disease Clinic during 1946 has been registered, making a record total in the history of the Clinic. It is noticeable that Syphilis cases are almost equal to half of the Gonorrhoea cases, this being much greater than the pre-war ratio which was 9 to 1.

The treatment of Syphilis with penicillin is still in its experimental stage, and many years must elapse before its true curative value is known. Its rapid elimination of the obvious signs of primary Syphilis and Gonorrhoea may tend to make patients default before finally discharged as cured, and some may cease to attend when they are still harbouring Gonococci or the Treponema of Syphilis, but it is gratifying to note that the defaulter rate at this Clinic is low, and that patients are tending more and more to obey instructions given to them, by attending until such time as they are pronounced cured. The defaulting patients will be seen again after the lapse of years suffering from the tertiarty manifestations of Syphilis, such as heart disease, locomotor ataxia, etc., or again their children may be born with the stigmata of congenital Syphilis.




VISITING.


Visiting is allowed on THURSDAY and SUNDAY, from 2-30 p.m. to 4 p.m., entrance through the Out-Patient Department, Beckwith Street. TUESDAY and FRIDAY from 7-15 p.m. to 7-45 p.m., entrance by way of the door on the right of Main Entrance. In cases of "dangerous illness," special permission for visiting is, of course, given. Visiting to the Private Block is under the supervision of the Sister in charge. Not more than two visitors will be allowed at one time to visit a patient. Four visitors only are permitted on any Thursday and Sunday, and two on Tuesday and Friday. No children under 14 years of age will be admitted as visitors to the Wards or the Private Block.

Visitors must not give food or drink direct to any patient, but may deposit gifts of food or delicacies with the Sister in charge of the Ward, for a patient's consumption, subject to the Doctor's approval.

Visitors coming from a house in which there is infectious disease are strictly forbidden to visit the Hospital.

Clergymen and Ministers of all denominations may visit the Hospital at any time consistent with the condition and wishes of the Patients, and the proper and convenient state of the Wards.
