



# 120th REPORT

OF THE

# COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT

For the year ending 31st December, 1947

The Committee have pleasure in presenting the 120th Annual Report of the Hospital.

The year 1947 has been a momentous one. It has seen the beginning of the end of the Voluntary Hospital System as we have known it for so many years. With but a few special exceptions all existing Hospitals, Voluntary and otherwise will be taken over by the State on 5th July, 1948. "The old order changeth, yielding place to new." Even the most ardent supporters of the Voluntary System will admit some shortcomings and perhaps the greatest has been that whereas all could avail themselves of its services, none were bound to contribute unless they so desired and, in consequence, Voluntary Hospitals were always short of money. Indeed, had it not been for the effective and timely help of the Contributory Schemes, Voluntary Hospitals would have been in a sorry plight long ago.

The accounts tell a tale of increase of almost every item of expenditure, and a comparison of the cost of maintaining the Hospital in 1939, with the cost in 1947 arrests attention by disclosing an alarming leap from £25,542 to £96,722.

On the Appointed Day the Hospital will become the property of the State which will assume responsibility for maintenance and day to day expenditure through the Liverpool Regional Hospital Board and the Birkenhead Committee of Management. In other words the Hospital will belong to the people of Britain and they will be called upon to foot the bill—a bill which is likely to increase rather than diminish.

Modernisation and improvements are still being carried out as detailed on page 18 and the re-decoration of the interior of our Hospital has called for favourable comment. Departmental reports show an ever increasing amount of work being undertaken. New equipment is being delivered slowly but surely and efficiency increased and maintained. Tables of statistics tell their own story, and we are safe in saying that the Hospital has never reached a higher standard during its 120 years of service to the community.

It is with feelings of sorrow that your Committee record the death on 26th January, 1948, of Dr. Arthur Winfield, Honorary Radiologist to the Hospital since 1928 and to whose untiring efforts our X-ray Department now occupies an honoured place in the Hospitals of Merseyside.

With deep regret your Committee record the loss sustained by the death of Mr. A. McDowell who passed away on 25th March, 1948. The late Mr. McDowell was appointed in 1927 to the General Committee and later to the Nursing Committee. His interest in the Hospital will be remembered with gratitude.

### The Year's Work.

The demands on the Casualty Department have again been particularly heavy and the average of accident and emergency cases weekly has considerably increased beyond all previous figures.

### Finance.

Income.—It is gratifying to be able to report that, excluding the item of State Grant (E.M.S. Nursing Salaries, etc.) there is only a decrease of £389 0s. 0d. in Ordinary Income as compared with 1946 which was a peak year.

Extraordinary Income includes legacies of £785 0s. 0d. as against £3,653 10s. 0d. for the previous year. This reduction occasions no surprise in view of the situation brought about by the impending

implementation of the National Health Service Act, 1946.

Your Committee again desire to place on record its gratitute to the Merseyside Hospitals Council and its Contributors for the sum of £13,411 0s. 0d. received in recognition of services rendered. This sum includes £510 in respect of Hospital Sunday Collections, and the Committee's thanks are due to the Churches for this welcome gift, which is earmarked for the treatment of the necessitous sick.

### Bequests.

### Expenditure.

Ordinary Expenditure has increased from £64,424 9s. 4d. in 1946 to £84,388 14s. 0d. last year, an increase of £19,964 4s. 8d.

Extraordinary Expenditure at £12,333 16s. 1d. for 1947 as against £5,041 12s. 10d. for 1946 shows an increase of £7,292 3s. 3d. mostly accounted for by the purchase of modern X-Ray Equipment and re-decorations.

As was the case last year, rising costs and increases in Salaries and Wages account largely for expenditure reaching the highest figure ever recorded. Our inability to meet expenses out of current income has been a matter of deep concern for the past two or three years, but it must be understood that this condition has been brought about by matters outside our control.

As has been indicated much has been done in the year under review in our scheme of modernisation—referred to more fully later on—and it is the intention of your Committee, not only to continue to do so, but to hand over the Hospital to the Ministry of Health on the 5th July next in a condition capable of providing a service of which all may be justly proud.

I T is with profound regret that the Committee record the death of Mr. William Tough McIvor.

AT his home he was surrounded by the devotion of his family and a host of friends—indeed friendship and the keeping of friends seemed to be the keynote of his life. His warm hand-shake and sincerity of spirit, a handful of roses or a cutting from his garden all combined to radiate his genial spirit. The Patients and Staff of the Hospital remember with gratitude the gifts of fruit and vegetables.

IN the wider sphere of commercial life his untiring zeal and strong sense of public duty singled him out as a leader. His wise counsel was always available to those in need of advice. He was sagacious and withal a model employer.

ON the night of Friday, 17th October, 1947, during his sleep, his life quietly ended at the age of 81 years.

YOUR Committee extend deep sympathy to the members of his family in the irreparable loss they have sustained.

# Honorary Chaplain.

Your Committee extend to the Honorary Chaplain, the Rev. William Slater Sykes, M.A., their sincere appreciation of his untiring work on behalf of patients and staff. Morning Service is held in the Chapel each Sunday at 9-30 a.m. to which patients and staff are cordially invited. Mr. Sykes was appointed in September, 1920, and the Chapel furnishing and appointments were provided without any charge to the Hospital, out of a fund raised by Mr. Sykes and friends of the Hospital.

Mr. Sykes has intimated his desire to be relieved of his Ward Visiting duties after July next, but will continue to carry on his work of conducting the Sunday Services.

The thanks of your Committee are also due to the Rural Dean, the Rev. Canon Smith of St. Pauls, Rock Ferry, and the Clergy of Birkenhead for their generosity in rendering financial assistance towards the cost of maintaining this service to the Hospital.

# Library.

It is pleasing to report that the Library continues to afford relief to our patients, particularly those whose lot it is to remain in Hospital for any lengthy period. Over two thousand nine hundred books have been loaned during the year under the capable management of Mrs. M. S. Whitaker and her two able assistants, Mrs. L. R. Kyffin and Miss Mitchell. Your Committee extends to these ladies sincere thanks. Mrs. Kyffin continues to represent the Hospital on the Mayoress's Ladies Charities Committee.

Gifts of books will be gratefully received and acknowledged by the Secretary-Superintendent.

The efficiency of the Library has been maintained and increased by the gift of a large number of books from the members of the Birkenhead Rotary Club. To Mr. G. Raymond Hill, the President, and the members of the Rotary Club, the cordial thanks of the Committee are due.

### Part-time Visiting Medical Staff.

It has been truly said "that the reputation of a Hospital is acquired and maintained more by the nature and quality of its Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff than by any other factor." In this regard and on this account our Hospital holds a high, honoured and enviable position.

Your Committee are again privileged to place on record their grateful thanks to Members of the Part-time Visiting Medical and Surgical Staff for their services during the year under review.

We welcome Dr. A. Dala on his appointment as Assistant Ophthalmologist, after having served for about two years as Clinical Assistant to the Eye Department.

Dr. G. Ronald Ellis is still in H.M. Forces, but it is anticipated that he will be released during the coming year.

Reference was made last year to the introduction of an Appointments System. It is regretted that, owing to our inability as yet to obtain sanction to carry out necessary alterations, the scheme has had to be postponed for a time.

To the Chairman of the Medical Board, Dr. D. L. Charters, and the Honorary Secretary, Mr. G. A. Moulden, our thanks are due for their co-operation.

### Resident Medical Staff.

The year 1947 has seen many changes in the Resident Medical Staff. A new post of Junior House Physician was created in March, 1947. As well as providing help in the Medical Wards and attending to minor and emergency anaesthetics, this new appointment has been of considerable assistance to the Resident Medical Staff, and has allowed them to give more detailed attention to their own specific responsibilities.

The post of Casualty Officer has again proved an arduous one. During the year 14,500 new patients have received treatment in the Department, this figure being 1,000 more than the peak year of 1946. Our Casualty Department is the only one of its kind on this side of the River, and consequently receives all types of injury, not only from Birkenhead, but from the surrounding districts as well.

The Government Rehabilitation Scheme for ex-servicemen has provided assistance. Your Committee tender thanks for the unstinted service rendered by the Resident Medical Staff.

### Medical and Surgical Registrars.

The Government Rehabilitation Scheme has provided the Hospital with three full-time Registrars. On the recommendation of the Dean of the Faculty of Medicine, University of Liverpool, certain approved Hospitals are given assistance where additional work and conditions call for increase in the Resident Staff.

On the 1st January, 1947, a post of Surgical Registrar was created and Dr. H. Richardson Gray was appointed for a period of 12 months. We were able to call upon his assistance in the surgical work in the Wards, Clinics and Operating Theatres. Dr. H. Richardson Gray resigned in December last, and is now in practice at Gravesend.

By July, 1947, the work had increased to such proportions that it was found necessary to appoint two additional Registrars, and Dr. John Littler was appointed Surgical Registrar and Dr. Donald R. Gunn, Orthopaedic Registrar.

The Visiting Surgeons with their ever-growing Clinics and Operating Lists have expressed satisfaction with this additional help. It has provided for a better supervision in detail of the hitherto rather neglected follow-up treatment of septic conditions of the hand, which forms such a large proportion of the Casualty Department's activities. Early and careful treatment is such an important factor in getting patients back on to full time work in the shortest possible period—so important a factor in the drive towards prosperity. Increasing attention is now being directed towards the systematic follow-up of treatment and consequent results, and in this direction these new appointments have proved of great value.

The Government Rehabilitation Scheme also provides facilities for Registrars to study for higher qualifications and your Committee feel that the introduction of Registrars has been to the mutual advantage of all concerned, and to them sincere thanks are accorded.

# Nursing Staff.

Particulars of the Nursing Staff personnel are contained in the Matron's Report. The efficient and conscientious manner in which the Matron and her Staff have carried out their duties is worthy of the highest praise, and the Committee express great appreciation of their work.

### Almoner's Department.

The Almoner's Department forms the link between the Hospital and the social and industrial background of the patients. It is appreciated that patients must be free from financial and economic worries if they are to co-operate fully in their treatment. The Department is called upon to smooth out all sorts of difficulties, to arrange for the care of children, to give advice on matters of compensation to which patients are entitled, and to work in close co-operation with welfare officers and, not the least, to give the patient confidence in the Hospital. It has been found increasingly difficult to maintain the voluntary income of the Hospital, but it is pleasing to note that no less a sum than £12,159 4s. 2d. has been received through the Department, as against £10,744 13s. 10d. during the previous year.

During the year, 164 patients have been sent to Convalescent Homes in comparison with 138 for the previous year, whilst the number of appliances supplied has increased from 324 in 1946 to 342 this year. 153 patients have been recommended and granted extra nourishment in addition to those who were helped to claim their extra allowances. It is interesting to note that we were able to arrange for 24 persons to be provided with Home Helps—so necessary for sick or infirm patients. Our experiment in the resettlement of certain disabled patients is still receiving the kindly and co-operative consideration of employers.

Altogether 11,259 interviews have been recorded for the year, which is a considerable increase over last year. 747 car journeys were arranged, reports given on 714 cases, and 1,071 enquiries made.

Our thanks are again due to the Invalid Children's Association, Centre of Social Service, Personal Service Society, the After-care Department of the Merseyside Hospitals Council, the National Society for Cancer Relief and the Hospital Car Service. We should like to make special mention of the assistance given by the Health Visitors attached to the Medical Officer of Health's Department for their reports, and to the part played by the District Nursing Association.

We feel that the Department continues to do its share in helping patients to derive the maximum benefit from treatment and advice given by the Medical Staff.

# Pharmaceutical Department.

The alterations and extensions envisaged in the report for 1946 are now practically completed, and the Department has been modernised and re-decorated. Fluorescent lighting has been installed, and this has done much to enhance the amenities. The extensions have provided extra space to allow the installation of a

continuous All-Glass Water Still, an Aseptic Screen, and other equipment necessary for the ever-increasing demands of work with Penicillin. Intravenous Solutions and other sterile preparations are now produced under better conditions, and all the Penicillin work for the Hospital—in-patients and out-patients—is now undertaken in the Department. With the increase in number of Medical Officers, the general work both for in-patients and out-patients has increased enormously, and during an average week, almost one thousand individual items of work are undertaken, some necessitating lengthy and most skilful preparations.

Some indication of the demands for Penicillin can be realised when it is stated that 101,750,000 units of Penicillin were issued for out-patients alone during the year under review. The increase in expenditure on drugs and chemicals is due to the purchase of Penicillin and other newly introduced drugs, which are, of necessity, expensive, but must be purchased if the Hospital is to keep in the forefront of progress.

Two courses of lectures on Materia Medica have been given to the Final Year Nurses. The Department is approved for the practical training of Student Pharmacists, and in December a registered apprentice of the Pharmaceutical Society of Great Britain joined the Staff for two years' training.

Your Committee feel that the Hospital has been placed under a debt of gratitude for the work carried out by Miss Dobie, the Chief Pharmacist, over a long period of years, and to her assistant Miss Dobson, for so ably contributing towards the orderly and efficient running of this important Department.

# Electrocardiographic Department.

In 1947 the number of Electrocardiographs taken was 489. The Department is now equipped with the most modern appliances, and every endeavour is being made to keep pace with recent advances in this branch of Medical Science. New methods in diagnosing and confirming cardiac conditions have proved successful, and are of considerable assistance to the Medical Staff. The work of Mr. E. Caldwell and his department deserve our highest praise.

# Physiotherapy Department.

This branch of the Hospital's service continues to be of great benefit to the patients. The Department is one of the best equipped on Merseyside, and although the need for additional accommodation is still desperate, many improvements have been introduced during the year. Re-decorations have been carried out, and with the introduction of fluorescent lighting and certain internal re-arrangements, a considerable improvement has been effected.

Treatments have been maintained at their accustomed high standard, and the numbers of attendances show a steady increase. It is hoped that an additional short-wave Diathermy machine will be installed early in 1948, to relieve the present machine which is being sorely taxed. During 1947 the daily attendances averaged over 110 patients, and as 75 per cent of these cases receive two or more treatments, some idea can be formed of the demands upon this Department.

The final test of a man's fitness is of course made at his workbench, but many stages must precede this final test. It is on the work of the Physiotherapy Department that so much depends, and great use of the facilities provided here is being made by the surgical staff.

Your Committee feel that tribute must be paid to Miss M. L. Cooper who has given eighteen years untiring and devoted service to the Hospital.

### Records Department.

During the year the Records Department has been extensively overhauled and new and up-to-date methods introduced. The work of collating patients Medical and Surgical histories and notes into their respective dossiers for the convenience of Consultants, has been carried out efficiently under the direction of the Chief Records Officer, despite the 'growing pains' usually associated with new systems. These modern methods, it is hoped, will facilitate the follow-up and after-care of patients recently treated, and will be an effective means of ensuring that their progress is kept under observation by the Medical Staff.

Re-decorations and the introduction of fluorescent lighting have proved of benefit to the staff.

Credit is due to the Records Department Staff for carrying out their arduous duties so efficiently.

### Domestic Staff.

As a result of negotiations to which the British Hospitals Association was a party, the National Joint Negotiating Committee published scales of wages and working conditions for domestic staffs and porters. Your Committee have adopted the scheme and the additional cost to the Hospital is reflected in the accounts.

The work of the domestic staff is so often overlooked and taken for granted that your Committee consider it fitting to pay tribute to the efficient manner in which their duties have been carried out. Special reference should be made to the long and faithful services of the Head Porter, Mr. E. C. Hancock, the oldest employee on the Hospital's Staff, who was appointed in 1911.

### Christmas Festivities.

Following the established custom, the Mayor and Mayoress of Birkenhead (Councillor and Mrs. W. E. Power), and the Mayor and Mayoress of Bebington (Alderman and Mrs. Henry Smith), paid an official visit to the Hospital on Boxing Day. The Chairman of the Hospital, Secretary-Superintendent and Matron accompanied the official party and a large number of friends around the Wards. Seasonal fare of turkey and Christmas Pudding was a feature of the festivities, Carol parties on Christmas Eve and concerts given by members of the Nursing Staff—which included a well rehearsed Ballet—were appreciated by the patients. The decoration of the Wards was pleasing and artistic, the work entailed in preparation was skilfully undertaken by the Nursing Staff.

### "Beechwood" Nurses' Home.

Your Committee are happy to report considerable progress. Plans prepared by Mr. Leonard Barnish, F.R.I.B.A., have been approved by the Ministry, the necessary licence obtained, building has commenced and the contractors are making satisfactory progress. The furnishing has been put out to tender, and it is hoped that the home will be in commission by mid-summer. The plans provide for the accommodation of about 22 nurses.


### Modernisations, Improvements and Extensions.

Every effort has been made towards modernisation, and considerable progress can be recorded. During the year under review interior decorations have proceeded apace, and are now nearing completion. The colour scheme has been greatly admired by all, and will, we feel sure, do much towards improving the amenities. Fluorescent lighting has been introduced into most of the departments and wards. Official sanction has been sought, but not yet obtained, to modernise Wards 2 and 5 and Ward 4. It is hoped to rewire and instal fluorescent lighting and re-decorate on similar lines to that already carried out in the other wards. Weightman Ward and Ward 3 have now been entirely re-decorated and modernised.

Electrically heated food trolleys have now been provided for all the wards. This will ensure that the food leaving the kitchen will remain hot until served to the patients in the Wards—a necessary provision to ensure maximum benefit to the patients. Your Committee are indebted to the University of Liverpool Panto Day Committee for two of these trolleys for the Wards, and the Rose and Crown Hotel, Bebington, for providing one for the Doctors' Dining Room.

The Pharmaceutical Department has been considerably extended, relighted and decorated, and valuable additional equipment installed. The twin Operating Theatres have been redecorated and





fluorescent lighting introduced, and here again much new equipment added. The Pathological and Bacteriological Laboratory has also been similarly treated, and its efficiency enhanced by much new equipment. The Physiotherapy Department has been supplied with an additional short-wave diathermy machine, and the new lighting and decorations have received favourable comment.

The change-over from D.C. to A.C. was successfully carried out in November and December by the Birkenhead Corporation, and re-wiring of the old Central Block is almost completed.

The X-Ray Department is in urgent need of extension, and, although every effort has been made to put into effect the scheme submitted by the Architect, official sanction to proceed with the work has yet to be obtained. Considerable new and costly equipment has recently been installed, but the staff are still working under difficulties brought about by lack of accommodation. By the generosity of Mr. W. Southan Morris and his co-directors of the S.M. Super Cinemas Ltd., a new Westinghouse X-Ray Diagnostic Set has been installed. A suitable tablet recording the gift is being placed in the Department.

Included in this scheme is provision for nurses and domestic staff lavatory and locker room accommodation—a need which has been long felt—and it is hoped official sanction to carry out the work will be forthcoming at an early date.

The Hospital Laundry and Kitchen are matters which will need to receive attention shortly. The Laundry has rendered yeoman service for many years, and when opened in 1908, was a most efficient unit, but now requires many replacements which for various reasons we are unable to obtain. The Kitchen is cramped through lack of accommodation, and will need modernising to bring it up to the standard required to meet present and future requirements.

Very little progress can be recorded in our endeavour to secure possession of the premises occupied by the Corporation's V.D. Department, and protracted negotiations between the Corporation and your Committee have produced little or no results. Great hopes are entertained that these premises will provide room for urgently needed extensions.

In last year's Annual Report, reference was made to the plans and scheme drawn up by the Architect for the possible future development of the Hospital. The scheme visualised a long term policy and, while we realise that such a large and comprehensive undertaking must be left over for the time being, it is hoped that when times are more propitious, the Regional Board will regard it as a basis of discussion for the future development of the Hospital.

# Appointments System.

The problem of reducing to a minimum the time spent by patients waiting in the Out-Patient Department clinics has received

considerable attention by a Special Sub-Committee. Plans have been formulated and are ready to put into operation as soon as the necessary accommodation for staff and records are available. A scheme to cover part of the Main Hall in the Out-Patient Department to provide additional floor space, has been approved and now awaits the sanction of the Ministry of Health, and the necessary Licence. Until these are obtained nothing further can be done, but your Committee has reason to believe official sanction will be forthcoming at an early date.

### Gifts in Kind.

To our many friends who, by their gifts of flowers, fruit and vegetables, remember the needs of the Hospital and patients, we pay warm tribute. These gifts have been many and varied, great

and small, and all have been thankfully received.

It is with appreciation that reference is made to the gifts of foodstuffs which have been received from the Dominions and Colonies. The consignments have been of inestimable value in making the diet of both patients and staff more varied than would

have otherwise been possible.

In his capacity as Secretary-Superintendent, Mr. H. Hewitt Cooke has shown himself as possessing a facile grasp of the complexities of Hospital administration. His modest assumption of responsibility engenders an atmosphere of confidence and quiet control which is reflected throughout the Hospital. His ability also to measure up to difficulties which in these changing times so frequently confront the management, has been a matter of favourable comment on all sides.

The Committee thank Mr. Cooke for his unfailing courtesy, the hard work he has put in, and for his loyalty.

### Conclusion.

It is appreciated that with the coming into force in July next of State ownership of the Hospital, changes will take place inevitably affecting voluntary help and effort. That there will still be scope to assist both financially and otherwise is explained on page 69 of this Report. In this connection friends of the Hospital will be interested to know that the John Laird Memorial Convalescent Fund, which has existed since 1898 for the purpose of sending patients of this Hospital to Convalescent Homes, has been pronounced as being outside the scope of the National Health Service Act. Consequently this Fund will not pass to the Minister of Health, but will continue as a separate Trust Fund available at all times for augmentation by legacies, donations and subscriptions; in other words, this Convalescent Fund offers a live and very useful avenue for continued munificence to the Hospital in the way of voluntary support.

Your Committee cannot help but feel keenly, and with some regret, the passing of the voluntary system of management, a service which, through the years, has built up the close personal touch in the day-to-day management of the Hospital. In wishing the new service success, they appeal to all the friends and supporters of the Hospital to continue their interest in its future. The welfare of the patients is of paramount importance, and if local interest is not forthcoming, the patient will suffer in the long run. Parliament has already recognised this, and under the Act, financial support can still be given to provide comforts and gifts so essential to maintain and continue that personal touch, which for so many years has been the concern of charitably disposed persons.

Only if this spirit can be preserved will the Hospital system of the future achieve new standards of efficiency and service to the community.

During the year under review 65 applications for training were received, 26 students entered for training and 19 left, having completed their training.

There have been a number of changes in the personnel during 1947. The Assistant Matron, Sister M. E. Edge, left in June to be married and is now resident in Glasgow. Sister Doris Davies, who will be remembered by many of our present and old staff, retired from the X-Ray Department for health reasons. Sister Davies' 21 years of service were suitably recognised by her colleagues and she was presented with a portable wireless set. Sister Bateman, who for the past seven years had been Tutor, resigned in April, 1947, to take up the appointment of Assistant Matron at the Dudley Guest Hospital, Wolverhampton.

In June, 1947, Sister Eglin was appointed Assistant Matron. Sister Eglin was from October, 1937, to April, 1941, a Ward Sister at this Hospital and her return—after gaining additional experience in other hospitals—is welcomed.

Sister Barnett was appointed Tutor in July, 1947, coming to us from the Dewsbury and District General Infirmary.

Sister Beryl Owen returned in April, 1947, from H.M. Forces, after serving three years in the Queen Alexandra Military Nursing Service, first in Europe and later in the Far East. Sister Cunningham another trainee of this Hospital, has returned as third Theatre Sister.

As in previous years, the Ward and Departmental Sisters have faced their duties with unflinching courage and devotion, and have succeeded in maintaining a high standard of nursing. The installation of modern sluice room equipment is well in hand and when completed will do much towards relieving the arduous duties of the Nurses.

I would like to thank the Visiting Medical Staff and Miss E. Glen Dobie for valuable and interesting lectures given to the Nursing Staff.

I would also like to thank the following:-

The Rev. W. S. Sykes, M.A., for the Sunday morning services to patients and Nursing Staff; the kind friends of the Hospital who

have sent gifts of flowers to brighten the Wards; the many expatients who have written letters of appreciation of Nursing Staff during their stay in Hospital; Messrs. Walter and George Trace for their kindness in loaning six wireless sets during the Christmas and New Year Festivities; and to the General Committee of Management for their kindness in permitting the Out-Patient Department to be used for Nursing Staff Dances.

The national, in fact the world-wide shortage of nurses is of most serious import. In an industrial area such as Birkenhead, it is difficult to recruit locally student nurses when the opportunities for lucrative employment in business houses is an ever-present counter attraction to prospective candidates for the Nursing profession. May I appeal to parents and school mistresses for their help in influencing suitable girls to give serious consideration to the profession of nursing.


The Birkenhead General Hospital became a Training School for Nurses in 1908 and is recognised as such by the General Nursing Council for England and Wales. Apart from a Children's Ward, the Hospital provides a complete training for Nurses. In order to provide "childrens" experience, arrangements have been made for candidates to attend at Alder Hey Children's Hospital, Liverpool, for a period of three months.

After application has been made by prospective candidates, those selected as being best fitted enter the Preliminary Training School for ten weeks. If this course is successfully concluded the Student Nurse is transferred to the Wards as one of the staff for a further two months' trial period. A four year contract is then signed, dating from her entry into the Preliminary Training School.

The Student Nurse may take Part 1 of the Preliminary Examinations at the end of six months, or Parts 1 and 2 together at the conclusion of 12 months. The Final State Examination takes place at the end of three years and the last year is served as a Staff Nurse. A qualified Sister Tutor is always present in the Class Room and a series of Lectures are provided by the Visiting Medical and Surgical Staff and the Pharmacist.

Uniform is provided and the hours of duty are approximately 48 per week. There is one whole day free weekly, and 28 days annual holiday with salary and allowance.

The Student Nurses have their own Social Club and their representative body is the Students Nurses' Association. They become members of the College of Nursing when attaining State Registration. Nurses are resident throughout their training and few rules exist in the Nurses' Homes. What rules and regulations there are have been introduced after careful thought to ensure the maximum freedom of the Nurse and the minimum restrictions to safeguard the ideals for which the profession stands.

It is gratifying to record that notwithstanding the many difficulties which have been encountered, the activities of the Linen Guild have been well maintained. The work of the Collectors has been very difficult during the past year. Many subscribers are already anticipating the day when the State will assume responsibility for the maintenance of Voluntary Hospitals. As will be seen from the Memorandum on page 69 published by the British Hospitals Association, there will be ample scope for voluntary service in the work of the Ladies' Linen Guilds in the care and maintenance of linen, etc.

Although the actual numbers of subscribers dropped by 59, the total amount collected was £89 17s., this being an increase of £17 3s. 6d. on last year, due to the generosity of the few. Donations at £9 11s. show a decrease of £3 1s. 6d.

The annual "Bring and Buy" Sale, held in July, realised the highly satisfactory total of £169 11s. 10d., not up to the total reached last year, as we did not receive any large individual donations. Mention should be made of the outstanding efforts of Mrs. Hilton Moore and Mrs. Swift of Childer Thornton. The total received under "Special Efforts" during the year reached £204 17s. 4d. The Receipts and Payments Accounts will be found on page 66.

Since the last Annual Meeting, the Linen Guild has supplied the Hospital with:—176 blankets, 50 flannelette sheets, 516 pillow-cases, 18 down quilts, 8 dozen dusters, 100 pairs sheets, 104 yards tea towelling, 114 towels, to the value of £700. Most of these articles have been bought locally.

It is of more than passing interest to note that since Lady Leverhulme and the present Committee have been in office, the Linen Guild has raised no less a sum than £2,412 14s. 11d. This record is truly a credit to all concerned, and during this time the money has provided the Hospital with the following: 2,402 pillow-cases, 931 sheets, 622 blankets, 1,052 yards draw sheeting, 18 quilts, 112 counterpanes, 24 mattress covers, 24 tray cloths, 156 dusters, 75 locker cloths, 30 lbs. wool, 36 table napkins, 376 towels and 127 tea towels.

The devoted efforts of all concerned with the Linen Guild—
(and I write with the personal knowledge of many individual efforts)
—and their endeavours to ensure that, so far as lies within their power, the efficiency of the work of the Hospital will not be impaired by lack of funds, has lightened the work of our Committee, and to them is due the gratitude of all concerned with the welfare of the Hospital.

# PATHOLOGICAL AND BACTERIOGICAL DEPARTMENT.

Report of the Work during the year ended 31st Dec. 1947.

The work carried out in the Pathological Laboratory continues to show an annual increase of patients and specimens for investigation. The major increase in specialised work is shown by biochemical and hæmatological investigations. New and up-to-date tests are now included in general laboratory routine.

These account for an extra 300 biochemical tests carried out during the year under review in comparison with previous years. It is interesting to note that general blood examinations have increased from 405 tests made in 1939 to 1,669 tests made in 1947, the increase in each year being approximately 200 investigations over the previous year. All other specilised blood tests have gone up in a similar manner. A comparison of the work during the five years shown in the table of statistics, indicates that the investigations have been almost doubled and that the individual patient, whether residing in Hospital or attending as an out-patient, has had the advantage of full laboratory help.

The Department has been successful in keeping pace with modern requirements and continues to render valuable assistance to the Clinicians and members of the Visiting Medical Staff. The table of statistics on the next page gives some indication of the work being carried on.

Re-decoration and fluorescent lighting have made a considerable improvement in the working conditions of the staff, and have greatly increased the facilities for routine hospital pathology.

Your Committee would like to place on record its gratitude to Dr. Hugh Smith and his staff for their part in helping to keep the Hospital abreast of the times.

The Department was opened in April, 1928, and the following tables indicate how the work has increased:—

#### X-RAY DEPARTMENT.

The number of patients X-rayed in 1947 was 13,308 consisting of 11,302 out-patients and 2,006 in-patients. These figures show that the increasing trend of previous years is being continued, and with the advent of the new Health Service Scheme, it may be anticipated that still further demands will be made on the X-ray Department.

During 1947, the equipment of the Department was replaced by two modern X-ray machines capable of a wide range of work, and the result has been an all-round improvement in the efficiency of the Department.

Badly needed extensions to the present accommodation have been planned by Mr. Leonard Barnish, F.R.I.B.A., and subject to a licence being obtained, it is hoped alterations will begin early in 1948. When completed, this reconstruction will enable improvements to be effected in every aspect of the work of the Department.

In order to provide a continuous X-ray service, and to conform to the regulation affecting hours of work, it has been necessary to increase the staff. This now consists of three qualified radiographers and four student radiographers. In enrolling student radiographers the Hospital has made an innovation which performs two useful purposes. There is a country-wide shortage of qualified radiographers, and thus a contribution is being made to a solution of future staffing problems, while the presence of the students in the Department enables the trained staff to devote themselves to more important duties.

To Dr. Keating, Radiologist, has fallen a great deal of the work of maintaining the Department in its high state of efficiency, and the thanks of your Committee are accorded to him and his staff.

#### VENEREAL DISEASES DEPARTMENT.

Venereal Diseases should be regarded as a special group of the communicable diseases against which Health Services of the country are constantly fighting, a task not rendered any easier by the moral questions involved. The conspiracy of silence which in the past has hampered this work is rapidly being overcome, and the social implications of a disease spread by sexual intercourse can be lessened by a wise education.

Statistics show that the efforts of venereologists and workers in public health were very successful between the two wars; for instance the number of cases of early syphilis dealt with at treatment centres in 1939 was only 45 per cent. of those in 1931. With the war, however, came an inevitable rise in the incidence, showing slightly in 1940 and rising to a maximum in 1945/46 and now beginning to fall off again.

New remedies have undoubtedly caused a revolution in the treatment of venereal disease, although they have accompanying dangers and drawbacks. For instance, the rapid disappearance following the treatment of gonorrhoea with Sulphonamides has led to the discontinuance of attendances in many cases before a complete cure was effected, and under treatment has led to the emergence of Sulphonamide resistant strains. On the other hand, the remarkably reduced incidence of impaired vision following the introduction of Sulphonamides for the treatment of Ophthalmia-Neonatorum, must be regarded as a solid gain. The later discovered remedy—Penicillin—at last seems to be a remedy for gonorrhoea which when properly used can avoid to a great extent one of the drawbacks to the use of Sulphonamides—the creation of resistance strains—as a large proportion of the cases can be cured in a single day, although this again in some cases has led to discontinuance of attendance before being certified cured.

Control of venereal diseases has been assisted by certain general measures of which public education, contact tracing and follow-up of defaulters have played no little part. Further recommendations by the Joint Committee on Venereal Diseases are (1) Routine blood testing in the case of every pregnant woman. (2) The compulsion of parents or guardians of congenital syphillitic infants to secure for such children continued treatment until the risk of late effects are eliminated. (3) The Minister of Health should undertake a thorough investigation into the problem of prostitution with a view to putting the public in possession of all the facts and securing its support in measures designed to reduce the spread of venereal diseases by prostitution.

#### VISITING.

Visiting is allowed on THURSDAY and SUNDAY, from 2-30 p.m. to 4 p.m., entrance through the Out-Patient Department, Beckwith Street. TUESDAY and FRIDAY from 7-15 p.m. to 7-45 p.m., entrance by way of the door on the right of Main Entrance. In cases of "dangerous illness," special permission for visiting is, of course, given. Visiting to the Private Block is under the supervision of the Sister in charge. Not more than two visitors will be allowed at one time to visit a patient. Four visitors only are permitted on any Thursday and Sunday, and two on Tuesday and Friday. No children under 14 years of age will be admitted as visitors to the Wards or the Private Block.

Visitors must not give food or drink direct to any patient, but may deposit gifts of food or delicacies with the Sister in charge of the Ward, for a patient's consumption, subject to the Doctor's approval.

Visitors coming from a house in which there is infectious disease are strictly forbidden to visit the Hospital.

Clergymen and Ministers of all denominations may visit the Hospital at any time consistent with the condition and wishes of the Patients, and the proper and convenient state of the Wards.

### A RECORD OF SERVICE.

The Birkenhead General Hospital was founded over 120 years ago with the ideal of service for the sick and injured. In the year 1828 big-hearted and far-seeing men took a small house at the corner of Oliver Street and Hampton Street—given by John Laird—and fitted it up as Birkenhead's first hospital,

with four beds and a dispensary.

Birkenhead was then only a hamlet, closely nestling around the old Priory, but even in those far-off pioneer days hazardous work was being carried on by the river. Shipbuilding had commenced in the little yard rented by John Laird, and at Storeton and outlying districts stone-quarrying was carried on in addition to a number of other industries, and people became casualties and

wanted urgent attention.

There were no streamlined motor ambulances gliding their swift and silent ways to the Birkenhead General Hospital, but over the green fields surrounding the hamlet, down the rough roads, leafy lanes and tracks from distant parts of Wirral, the sick, lame and injured could be seen making their way to the little hospital which one day was to become the largest voluntary hospital serving the Wirral peninsula. They came on foot, in carts and on rude litters or improvised stretchers. Farm labourers from Eastham and Greasby, fishermen from Hoylake and Parkgate, they were drawn by the magnet. Doctors gave their services free—as they have done for over a hundred years, and other friends gave their money to buy drugs and dressings and pay the nurses.

Although more than one hundred and twenty years have passed, the same spirit inspires the hospital, and in spite of bad times and financial depressions, unemployment and wars, the hospital has always paid its way,

and has never refused help to a needy soul.

To come to more recent times, the years 1939-1945 found the Hospital working at full pressure, night and day, completely blacked-out at night. Boy scouts on the roof on the lookout for falling incendiary bombs (and finding them, too!), air-raid casualties—often in embarrassing numbers—soldiers, sailors and airmen of many nations within its walls being treated by loving hands and sympathetic hearts, doctors and nurses—oblivious of falling bombs—just carrying on the traditions of a hundred years. The story of these hectic days at the hospital would read like an epic in the history of the town, but we desire no limelight as we were only a unit with you in the front line of the homeland.

The work of the hospital cannot continue without the good-will and practical help of the community. You are part of the community. Our job is to combine the spirit and task of the Good Samaritan—even to providing the donkey if necessary in the form of a motor ambulance. We look to you

to help us to find the where-withal.

The war is over, reconstruction and modernisation are in the minds of us all, and we know you, too, have many problems and worries. There is, we fear, every excuse for you to go into a brown study while crossing Hamilton Street! What happens? You will probably find your name starring in the local press, followed by the words, "he was conveyed to the Birkenhead General Hospital." Accident cases come here at an alarming rate.

Our idea is to treat every patient as a guest whatever his station in life, to give him hospitality, to restore him to his family as quickly as possible, to

make him a happy and useful citizen, and a friend for life.

Today the Birkenhead General Hospital has 181 beds, nearly twenty special departments, four resident medical officers and over 90 nurses; beside Secretaries, X-Ray and Laboratory technicians, pharmacists, plus almoners, clerks, statisticians and typists, porters, boilermen and engineers.

almoners, clerks, statisticians and typists, porters, boilermen and engineers. In 1856 our food bill was £210 18s. 2d.; last year it was £6,991 4s. 2d. The salaries and wages of staff in 1856 amounted to £145 17s. 10d.—and this year £38,431 8s. 6d. Our total expenditure in 1856 was £1,031 3s., and last year it reached the enormous sum of £96,722 10s. 1d.

### PERSONAL SUPPORT FOR HOSPITALS IN THE NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE.

### IS IT NEEDED? WHAT FORM SHOULD IT TAKE?

1.—Present supporters of hospitals are asking whether their help will be needed (and if so, in what form) after the 5th July next—the "appointed day" when the National Health Service comes into operation. Hospital Managements in their turn are seeking guidance of the British Hospitals Association.

It is generally known that in the National Health Service the hospitals will be transferred to the Crown, and the full maintenance costs of the hospitals will be met from the Exchequer. Does this mean that all those who in the past by gift of money or service have interested themselves in the work of hospitals and their patients should say to themselves next July: "The State has taken over: there is nothing more for us to do?"

- 2.—The National Health Service Acts lay on the Minister of Health and the Secretary of State for Scotland the duty of providing a hospital service which is comprehensive: that is, a service which is available to all, and whose purpose is to meet in full the needs of those who use it. It is therefore clear that hospitals, which in the past have relied so much on voluntary financial support for their day to day maintenance, will no longer be dependent on it in that way. It has however, been made equally clear that there will still be need in the hospital service for local interest, local initiative and local support; and that those generous helpers who have in the past done so much to meet human needs, to foster interest and to stimulate progress in our hospitals will continue to find in them a field in which very valuable service can be rendered to the community.
- 3.—Until actual experience has been gained of the operation of the new service it is not possible to forecast precisely or exhaustively the kinds of voluntary help that will be most needed. But it is possible to give a general indication of ways in which interest and support will obviously be helpful and welcome. These may take the form of personal service or of financial help.

### PERSONAL SERVICE

### In Hospital Management

4.—The hospitals in the new service will be administered not from the centre but by local committees of management<sup>1</sup> composed of public-spirited men and women giving voluntary service. This is the first and most obviously necessary form of personal service—to take part in the running of the hospitals, whether as a member

of a committee of management<sup>1</sup> of a hospital or group, or of a House Committee of a hospital within a group. In this way local knowledge and experience can contribute to the mangement of the new service no less than in the past, and the channel is still provided through which local people generally can take a personal interest in the hospital's affairs. It will still be of the greatest advantage to the hospitals, and to those actually charged with their management, if there is a large body of persons taking an interest in the work of each hospital, thus providing a stimulus to greater efficiency and a source of help in promoting the welfare of patients and staff.

### In Hospital Work

5.—Particularly at the present time when shortages of staff are acute, there will be ample scope for voluntary service in helping to carry out some of the work of the hospital itself. Examples may be found in the work of the Ladies' Linen Guilds in the care and maintenance of linen; or in the running of hospital libraries, or hospital canteens. No form of voluntary support could be more beneficial than to give time and energy to practical tasks of this nature. As Mr. John Edwards, Parliamentary Secretary to the Ministry of Health, has recently said: "I can see no diminution in the multifarious activities which are now undertaken by voluntary workers. It is vital that the spirit of voluntary work should be kept alive and that thereby the hospitals, which are now your hospitals, should remain your hospitals in the future."

### In Welfare of Patients

6.—The patient in hospital will need just the same personal interest and sympathetic care under the new service as at the present time; and there will be many ways in which his physical and mental well-being can best be promoted by voluntary effort. The visiting of patients—particularly those who have no friends or relations in the immediate neighbourhood—and bringing them into touch with other contacts from the outside world, suggest themselves as fields in which there is considerable room for continued service. In other familiar ways the patient's stay in hospital can be cheered and progress encouraged by personal help.

### FINANCIAL SUPPORT

7.—Although the full maintenance costs of the hospitals will be a public charge, provision has been expressly made by the National Health Service Acts for the new committees of management of hospitals to enjoy the use of "free monies" to be spent as they think fit on hospital purposes. The hospitals will have at their

disposal income<sup>2</sup> from past endowments and they will be able to receive and hold future voluntary gifts.

None of these gifts (including annual subscriptions and donations) will be transferable to the State, nor used to meet the cost of the hospital's maintenance<sup>3</sup> On the contrary, committees of management will be free to apply them (subject to any express wish of the donor) in providing additional amenities for patients or staff, in undertaking experimental work of various kinds, or in supplementing in other appropriate ways the resources of the service.

It will be of the greatest benefit to committees of management, to patients and to staff alike if each hospital has at its disposal funds which can be used at discretion to meet the infinite variety of special circumstances and peculiar needs, which are bound to arise and which may not be easily or appropriately met through the expenditure of public funds.

### Gifts to Individual Hospitals

8.—It may not be generally appreciated that, under the new administrative arrangements where hospitals may be grouped together for management purposes, it will still be possible for those who cherish an intimate association with a particular hospital to ensure that their financial support goes to benefit that hospital and no other.

Gifts or legacies may be accompanied by an express wish for their application for particular purposes or at individual hospitals, and in that case the committees of management receiving the gifts will hold them in trust and apply them accordingly. In this way there will be every encouragement to maintain close ties with the individual hospital and to continue to support it. Such gifts or legacies could conveniently be made in the form(s) suggested on page 56.

### From the Viewpoint of the Patient

9.—The first and most obvious object to which funds can be devoted is the promotion of the welfare of the patient. Though in a hospital everything is ultimately directed to the welfare of the in-

dividual patient, there are some things which are intimate and personal to the patient in his daily life in the hospital, with particular reference to his physical and mental comfort. Many such amenities, at one time regarded as "extras" or luxuries which were not strictly essential to the well-being of the patient, are now looked upon as necessary factors in his effective treatment, and as such will be provided as an essential part of the hospital service. There will, however, be additional comforts and amenities which the hospital for one reason or another is not in a position to provide from its budget, and which can be provided for by gifts of money. By the use of their "free" funds committees of management will be able to experiment and to develop new welfare activities, and thus constantly to assist in raising the standards of hospital care.

### From the Viewpoint of the Staff

10.—A great proportion of the staff of any hospital is necessarily resident. A corporate community life has many advantages; but it

has also defects, many of which can be remedied.

In this respect the requirements of different hospitals will vary very considerably, and the scope for public support and interest is perhaps widest in the case of the isolated hospital. The encouragement of clubs and facilities for recreation in the hospitals is a common need, and there is much that can be done from outside the hospitals to ensure that nursing and other resident staffs are not cut off from the rest of the community, but maintain social and cultural contacts with the life of their district.

### From the Viewpoint of Research

11.—To many, research means the laboratory and scientific study of the problems of specific diseases like cancer or rheumatism. Hospital committees of management will be able to use their "free" funds in promoting medical research of all kinds; but the field of experiment in hospitals is by no means exclusively medical, and there will be scope for new work also in every sphere of hospital administration. The existence of "free monies" is an essential element in ensuring the exercise of individual initative in research projects, and in reaching out for progress along new lines. It will, for example, be possible to apply them in seeking new solutions to problems of departmental organisation such as catering services, testing new forms of records or new methods of filing and analysis, and in promoting in every way the continuous increase in knowledge of the most effective practice of the different branches of hospital management.

### CONCLUSION

12.—These notes are issued after consultation with the Ministry of Health and the Department of Health for Scotland and will, it is hoped, prove sufficiently indicative to enable the governing bodies of teaching hospitals and all other hospitals to explain the position as it will be to their present supporters and so retain their interest and goodwill in the future when the National Health Service comes into operation.






