ANNUAL MEETING.

The Annual Meeting of the Governors of the Birmingham and Midland Hospitals for Women (Incorporated) was held in the Council Chamber at the Council House, Birmingham, on Wednesday, 22nd April, 1942, at 3 p.m.

The President of the Hospitals, Mrs. Neville Chamberlain, occupied the Chair.

The following ladies and gentlemen were present:—

Mrs. Neville Chamberlain, in moving that the Report and Accounts be taken as read, expressed her pleasure at having been able to get into closer touch with the work of the Hospitals.

She had recently visited the two war-time Auxiliary Hospitals at Barnt Green and Hammerwich, and she was deeply impressed with all she saw there. These auxiliaries had entailed additional expenditure, but it would be a calamity if they had to close down owing to lack of funds. Both the Auxiliary Hospitals are situated in delightful positions, and are capable of very rapid extension in case of an acute emergency. She had never seen patients more happy and comfortable, and there was a particularly happy atmosphere both among patients and staff. There was that sense of restfulness which was so important for recovery, and which depends not only upon the skill but upon the personalities of the doctors and nurses. Some of the patients had their husbands away in the Forces, others were very anxious to get back to their war work, others to their home-life, and one felt confident that they would go back strengthened and fortified, both in body and in nerve, and she hoped that all friends of the Hospitals would do everything possible to see the Hospitals through these difficult days.

She had much pleasure in moving that the Report and Accounts be taken as read.

The Lord Mayor, in moving the adoption of the Report and Accounts, said that he wished it could be a more cheerful document as far as the financial situation was concerned.

There were some social services which could not lightly be sacrificed even in war-time, particularly specialised Hospitals of this kind.

Much as one regretted in these days of war budgets, the additional cost of luxuries, we had to retain our sense of proportion and realise that these things were not really more vital to the country than the maintenance of the people's health, and particularly the health of the mothers of the race. It would not be very helpful, if, having won the war, we found we had scrapped many of the essential services vital to any reconstruction period. Naturally, the voluntary gifts for the Hospitals tended to suffer, and it may be that the large re-allocation of the natural income made inevitable by the war, would have to be further extended.

Leaving the somewhat gloomy aspect of the financial state of the Report, it was gratifying to note the great work done by the Surgeons, Matron, Nursing and Domestic Staffs. There was nothing wrong with the spirit of all those who were helping in this magnificent work.

It would be the hope of all, that the efforts of the Committee in its approach to various sources of aid might be successful, so that these Hospitals which were so useful in so many ways, to so many people, might yet have a long and successful period of service ahead.

He had much pleasure in moving the adoption of the Report and Accounts.

Mr. Barrow Cadbury, Chairman of the Management Committee, who seconded the adoption of the Report and Accounts, said that the Report was one of work accomplished during war-time, and he felt that those who had worked towards the production of this Report, and whose efforts were recorded therein, had all been carrying a little extra burden and greater responsibility. In many directions, it had not been possible to obtain all the help that would be available in normal times, and that had meant that others had cheerfully taken on extra work, which in ordinary times would have evolved upon others. This was the spirit that was at work in our Hospitals, and had been the spirit as long as he had had knowledge of the work they were doing.

He said how very grateful they were to Mrs. Neville Chamberlain for the great and personal interest which she had taken in these Hospitals, and the effort she had made to become familiar with the extra war-time work which was being done at "Long Rede" and Hammerwich. When the time came to give up these Hospitals, he was sure there would be a very deep feeling of regret, as the results of the work in these Hospitals was so satisfactory.

He referred to the hopes that they had for the future, of the best Maternity Hospital in England to be built in this city.

He also referred to the extra burdens undertaken by the Lord Mayor and Lady Mayoress, who lent themselves to every good work and helped enormously by the interest they took in these services.

He had great pleasure in seconding the adoption of the Report and Accounts.

MR. C. W. GILLET, Chairman of the Finance Committee, who spoke on the Accounts, said the fund to rebuild the Maternity Hospital stood intact at £67,000, but the Committee had had to realise on investments in order to carry on the work of the present Hospitals, and they did not want to deplete these investments much further.

Owing to the reduction in the number of patients it had been possible to deal with, the income of both the Women's and Maternity Hospitals was down very considerably, and as a result there was a deficit on the year's working of the two Hospitals of over £8,700, as against a loss on the previous year of £3,200, so that the position was causing the Committee very great anxiety. He hoped that the efforts of the Finance Committee in its approach to various sources might be successful.

Since the close of the year the Hospitals had been working to nearly full capacity, and with the help of the Contributory Association, for which they were so grateful, he believed that an increased amount would be received for maintenance during the coming year owing to the increased number of patients being treated. He hoped that by the time the Report was issued next year the position would be very considerably improved.

MRS. BERTRAM LLOYD proposed that Mrs. Neville Chamberlain be re-elected President and that the other Officers also be re-elected.

MR. KENNETH McMILLAN seconded the Resolution, which was carried unanimously.

In proposing the re-election of the Honorary Medical Staff, MR. CHRISTOPHER SOUTHALL said how glad he was that Mrs. Neville Chamberlain had given such a true picture of Hammerwich Hospital and "Long Rede," because he felt that if they were compelled to cut down expenses, that was one of the services that would have to be curtailed, and he thought that such an event would be a real tragedy.

He paid tribute to the work of the Honorary Surgeons, and also expressed appreciation of the services of Dr. Pattison, of Hammerwich, who had given his services in any case of emergency at Hammerwich annexe.

He also took this opportunity of expressing thanks to Mr. Francis and his voluntary fire-watchers.

He had much pleasure in proposing the re-election of the Honorary Staffs.

MRS. LESLIE ARTHUR SMITH, in seconding the Resolution, said she would like to endorse all that Mr. Southall had said, and to add her thanks on behalf of the Maternity Hospital to the Honorary Medical Staff. They were most grateful for all the work the Surgeons did for the Hospital.

In contrast to the gloomier side of the picture, she said that there were many things that were encouraging. There had been an increase in the number of nurses who had come forward to do their midwifery training, and it had also been possible to re-open more beds at the Maternity Hospital, so that with "Long Rede" they now had practically the same number of beds in use as before the war.

The need for maternity beds in the City was very great, and it seemed that even more beds would have to be re-opened in order to help the City in this great need. The Medical Officer of Health had asked the Maternity Hospital Committee for their help in this direction, and there was every possibility that the Hospital would be able to give this assistance.

She had much pleasure in seconding the Resolution.

MR. NORMAN C. PLUMMER, in proposing a Vote of Thanks to Mrs. Neville Chamberlain for taking the Chair, and to the Lord Mayor and Lady Mayoress for their presence, said we were always very fortunate in the City of Birmingham in the very real interest shown by those who held high positions in public life, and in Mrs. Neville Chamberlain and the Lord Mayor and Lady Mayoress they had very worthy representatives of those good people.

Mrs. Neville Chamberlain had taken a very personal interest in the work of these Hospitals, and they were very glad that she had been able to come and take the Chair that day.

This was seconded and received with acclamation.

The Lord Mayor replied on behalf of Mrs. Neville Chamberlain, the Lady Mayoress and himself, and said how glad they were to be there.

Report of the Management Committee for the Year 1941.

The Committee of Management have pleasure in submitting their Annual Report on the work of the Women's and Maternity Hospitals for the year ended 31st December, 1941, also the Annual Statements of Account and Balance Sheet as certified by the Auditors.

The year that has just closed has been an extremely difficult one, but the work of the Hospitals has been carried on very successfully.

As stated in last year's Report, it was necessary to obtain an Annexe for each Hospital in a safer area. The Women's opened an Auxiliary Hospital at Hammerwich and the Maternity, one at Barnt Green.

At the two Hospitals 3,030 patients were treated as In-Patients and Home Patients. 4,778 new Out-Patients were treated, and 14,579 attendances were recorded. The decrease in the number of In-Patients at both Hospitals is accounted for by the reduction of the number of beds owing to the national emergency.

Of the Women's Hospital In-Patients, 576 were sent on to Hammerwich and 102 new patients were admitted direct, and from the Maternity Hospital 589 were sent to Barnt Green.

WOMEN'S AND MATERNITY HOSPITALS LEAGUE.

The Committee are most grateful to all the Officers and Collectors of the various Branches for the good work they have done during a very difficult year. The Committee have endeavoured to keep the various Branches together during the war, and they cannot stress too much the importance and value of the help the Women's and Maternity Hospitals receive from the League.

CONVALESCENT HOMES.

The Convalescent Home at Sparkhill has been closed during the whole year, but the Gertrude Myers Home at Cleeve Prior has been used to the utmost, 329 patients having been sent by the Women's Hospital. This has been of invaluable assistance in relieving the Hospital of cases which, but for the Home, would have to remain some days longer in the Hospital. Those who are fit to be taken to Cleeve Prior show its almost miraculous effect after a few days' stay there, and return home ready to undertake the duties of life again.

AFTER-CARE WORK.

The Women's Hospital Committee decided with very great regret, that owing to financial reasons this work would have to be suspended during the period of the war.

At the Maternity Hospital many patients whose homes had been bombed in the heavy raids, have been assisted. To these were given parcels of clothing for children and babies, and extra nourishment in the way of milk, oatmeal, eggs, marmite, etc., but these extras are now mostly curtailed on account of the rationing. The work of the After-Care Committee is chiefly concerned in providing the wives of Service men—and needy mothers—with maternity outfits, and to assist with the payment of ambulance and taxi fares. Surgical supports and camp belts are provided and assistance given with the payment of these where needed.

Patients needing convalescent treatment have been sent to Pype Hayes.

SPECIAL DEPARTMENTS.

The Radium, Pathological, Bacteriological, X-Ray, Dental and Massage Departments have continued to do very useful work for both Hospitals, although their work has been very much curtailed.

THE WOMEN'S HOSPITAL.

During the year, 1,548 patients have been admitted, a decrease of 847 over last year. The decrease is due to the restriction caused by the national emergency.

Towards the end of the year it was thought advisable to open more beds at Sparkhill, so that the number of beds available is considerably increased.

3,300 new Out-Patients were dealt with at the Out-Patient Department, and the total attendances numbered 8,461.

The Committee, after very careful consideration, decided to remove the Out-Patient Department from the Upper Priory up to Sparkhill, as they did not feel justified in incurring the great expense which would be necessary to repair the damage caused by enemy action.

THE MATERNITY HOSPITAL.

The year has been one full of activity, although the work has been considerably curtailed. 1,144 patients were admitted as compared with 1,463 in 1940, 589 of these patients were sent out to Barnt Green.

6,118 attendances were made at the Ante-Natal Clinic during the year, 751 at the Post-Natal Clinic, 59 at the Dental Clinic, and there were 399 attendances at the Baby Clinic.

The Emergency Maternity Service (The Flying Squad) has been of great value. Eleven calls have been made, and in the majority of cases the life of the patient saved.

Dr. E. Baylis Ash, the Pathologist, realising the serious financial position of the Hospital, kindly resigned his position. The Committee wish to thank Dr. Baylis Ash for his generosity, and wish to place on record their high appreciation of the valuable work carried on by Dr. Ash during the many years he has been connected with the Hospital.

It had been possible for the work of the Pathological Department to be carried on by the Women's Hospital Pathologist.

The X-Ray work is still undertaken at the Women's Hospital, and during the year 30 In-Patients and 148 Out-Patients were treated.

To the Press of the City who evince their interest in numerous ways.

To the members of the Office Staff for the great amount of work they have put in during a specially difficult period.

To the voluntary A.R.P. workers who have given excellent service to each Hospital.

To the following for financial assistance :—The Birmingham Hospitals Contributory Association, The Birmingham Hospital Saturday Fund, The Birmingham Hospital Sunday

Fund, The Sunday Entertainments Act (Charitable Fund) per the Hospitals Council, The Birmingham Local Charities Committee, The Lord Mayor's Benevolent Fund, The Muntz Trust, The Brinsley Bequest, Baron Davenport's Charity Trust, John Avins Trust, and to all subscribers and donors.

FINANCIAL.

The serious financial position of the Hospitals is causing great anxiety to the Committee. Naturally having the overhead charges of two institutions for the Women's Hospital and two for the Maternity Hospital has added greatly to the expenses. The deficiency on the working of the two Hospitals for 1941 amounts to no less than £8,118.

The Committee are approaching the Ministry of Health with a view to obtaining financial assistance, and they are exploring every avenue in the hope of procuring additional funds. The future of the Hospitals is in a very precarious condition and it is difficult to see how the work is to be carried on unless additional financial aid is forthcoming.

Report of the Women's Hospital Committee for the year 1941

The Committee present their Seventy-First Annual Report of the work of the Hospital for the year ended 31st December, 1941, together with Statement of Accounts for the same period.

At the close of 1940 it was found possible to use certain of the Wards on the ground floor at Sparkhill, and on March 4th, 1941, the Auxiliary Hospital at Hammerwich with 33 beds was also opened.

The number of new cases at the Out-Patient Department during the year has been 3,300, as against 3,179, being an increase of 121 on the previous year. The total number of attendances of new and old patients has been 8,461.

1,548 patients have been admitted to the In-Patient Department, being a decrease of 467 on the number in 1940. Of these, 311 made use of the Private Wards. Of the patients admitted, 1,230 required operative treatment, particulars of which will be found in the Medical Report.

The decrease in the number of patients is due to war emergency conditions.

The posts of House Surgeon during the year have been held by Dr. Phillips, Dr. McNamara, Dr. Audrey Freeth, Dr. Dowds and Dr. Derek Freeth.

The Committee again acknowledge gratefully the valuable services rendered during the year by the members of the Honorary Medical Staff and the great amount of time they devote to the Hospital.

The Committee also desire to express to the Matron, Sisters, Nursing and Domestic Staff as a whole, their appreciation of the devoted service given during the past year, and for their unremitting care and attention to their duties.

The X-Ray Department has continued to do most useful work for the Hospital. During the past year, 265 treatments were given, and in addition 584 radiographs were taken. These figures include the treatment of 178 patients from the Maternity Hospital.

The Committee wish to offer their sincere thanks to Mr. Francis and his 17 auxiliary firemen. At least eight firemen have been on duty each night throughout the year. They have rendered excellent service to the Hospital, and have been a great help in putting into effect all the requirements with regard to the air raid precautions.

The amount received from the Birmingham Hospitals Contributory Association during the year was £9,813, which is a decrease of £5,375 over last year, due to the fall in the number of patients treated. The Committee tender their very grateful thanks to the Committee of the Association and also to the Hospital Saturday Fund Committee for the great interest that is shown by them in the Voluntary Hospitals of the City and the splendid work they are doing.

The Committee regret to report that again this year there is a decrease in the amount received from annual subscriptions. A great number of patients still have to be treated absolutely free, being too poor to contribute to any Contributory Scheme, and the Committee appeal urgently to friends of the Hospital to help them in obtaining new subscriptions during the coming year.

The Committee are feeling great concern with regard to the financial position of the Hospital. The cost of maintaining the Hospital and the Annexe at Hammerwich is very high, as there are two separate sets of overhead charges to be met, with no increase in the number of beds available as compared with pre-war numbers.

The Committee are of the opinion that they were right in making provision for the evacuation of patients to a safe area in case of serious emergency, but the cost has added greatly to the financial burden of the Hospital. The deficiency for the year on the Hospital and Hammerwich House was £5,187, and the Committee have explored every known source from which financial help might have been forthcoming without success.

Medical Report, 1941.

The Medical Board presents its report for the year 1941.

IN-PATIENT DEPARTMENT.

The number of patients admitted to the wards was 1,548, a decrease of 467 on the number for 1940. 576 of these patients were transferred to Hammerwich House after operation. 17 cases died (1.1%).

In a separate table are figures showing the nature and results of the operations performed ; in all, 1,230—686 major and 544 minor.

In addition to these, 102 patients were admitted direct to Hammerwich House, and 102 operations were performed there. These operations are included in the table.

SEPTIC WARD.

94 cases were admitted suffering from some form of infection following pregnancy. Details are given in a separate table, which shows that only two of these patients died.

RADIUM WARD.

Throughout the year the radium has been in regular use at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital, where the help of the physicist in prescribing doses has been especially valuable. 49 cases of malignant disease were treated.

The work of the Follow-Up Clinic has continued as usual, and several cases of six-year "cures," treated shortly after the Clinic was instituted, are attending.

OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT.

The number of new patients admitted to the Out-Patient Department was 3,300, an increase of 121 on the number for 1940. The number of attendances of old patients was 5,161, a decrease of 489 compared with 1940.

PATHOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT.

An indication of the work of the department is given by the figure in Table VI.

X-RAY DEPARTMENT.

The total number of radiographs taken was 584, a decrease of 288 compared with the previous year. Details of the work of the department are given in a separate table.

“ Pathological examination ” refers to tissues removed at operations.

“ Bacteriological examination ” includes urine, blood, faeces, pus, sputum, cerebro-spinal fluid, throat swabs, eye swabs, urethral, vaginal and cervical swabs.

“ Biochemical examination ” refers to chemical investigations of urine, blood, body fluids and faeces.

“ Haematological examination ” refers to blood counts, blood groupings and compatibility tests for transfusions.

The decrease in the number of specimens examined was due to the fewer patients in Hospital in the earlier part of the year. During the later months of the year the number of specimens received in the laboratory has equalled that of pre-war days. The department has carried on without a junior technician during the whole of the year.

Report of the Maternity Hospital Committee for the year 1941

The Maternity Hospital Committee have pleasure in presenting their Annual Report for the year 1941. During the year there have been 1,144 admissions, as compared with 1,463 in 1940. The decrease is due to the number of abnormal and long cases.

The total number of Out-Patients who have attended during the year is 6,118, and of these 1,478 were new cases.

During the year 59 attendances have been made by patients at the Dental Clinic as part of their ante-natal treatment. Since the outbreak of war, the Clinic has been held fortnightly instead of once a week.

The Baby Clinic continues to be well attended, and many of the mothers express their appreciation of the advantages they derive from this Clinic.

During the year 64 mothers who have been In-Patients attended with their babies, and altogether they made 399 attendances. 751 patients attended the Post-Natal Clinic. They greatly appreciate the help and advice they obtain at this Clinic after they have been discharged from Hospital.

39 Pupil Midwives have been accepted for training during the year. Of this number, 24 have taken the Part I Examination and 23 passed. In addition to these, 33 pupils who entered in 1940 completed their training and took their examination and 29 passed, making the total number of passes for the year 52. Of the 39 Pupil Midwives who were accepted for training, one abandoned the course for health and other reasons.

35 Medical Students applied for training and were accepted.

The Emergency Maternity Service has again proved invaluable, and many practitioners have expressed their appreciation of the service. During the year, 11 calls have been made, and in the majority of the cases the life of the patient has been saved. There was one patient for which the Flying Squad was called out too late.

During the year Dr. Constance Grey was appointed as Resident Medical Officer and Registrar in succession to Dr. Audrey Freeth.

The posts of House Surgeon were held by Dr. B. Phillips, Dr. J. R. Greenwood, Dr. C. M. Sutherland and Dr. A. F. Upton.

The Committee acknowledges gratefully the services rendered during the year by the Honorary Medical Staff and the great amount of time they devoted to the work of the Hospital.

The Committee also desire to express to the Matron, Sisters, Nursing and Domestic Staff as a whole its appreciation of the efficient and loyal services given during a very difficult year.

The Committee would very much like to take this opportunity of extending their most grateful thanks to Mrs. H. H. Payne for her splendid gift of Baby Baths, which have proved to be a real boon.

Special thanks are also due to the ladies of the After-Care Committee who give much time in helping needy patients after they are discharged from the Hospital.

They particularly wish to thank Mrs. Haswell Wilson and Mrs. Archdale who gave much of their time to visiting the patients in the Hospital every week. Their interest was very greatly appreciated.

The Committee would also like to express thanks to the Voluntary V.A.D. workers who were a very great help in the wards, and without whose services it would be difficult to carry on the work, as, owing to the war, it was almost impossible to get adequate staff.

In this connection, too, the Committee take this opportunity of expressing most sincere thanks to the "Birmingham Mail" Christmas Tree Fund for their handsome donation of £100. But for this generous contribution the assistance available for needy women would be very much curtailed. The Committee feel that with the increased demands there must necessarily be in these difficult times they are able to continue this work with confidence that any emergency that may arise can be met.

338 cases were attended in their own homes by the district midwives, who had the help of the District House Surgeon in any cases of difficulty. This was of great benefit to the midwives and patients. Until rationing was instituted needy cases were supplied with milk on the report of the midwife to the Almoner, who was also often able to help with clothing.

30 In-Patients and 148 Out-Patients were sent to the Women's Hospital for X-Ray photographs or treatment during the year.

The Massage Department has continued to do very useful work. During the year 631 patients received treatment and advice.

During the year a series of lectures and practical demonstration in Gas Air Analgesia were given to trained midwives. 26 candidates attended and 25 have been awarded Certificates.

It was found impossible to hold the University Course for Teachers of Midwifery on account of war-time difficulties with regard to lectures, but 11 candidates are receiving instruction in a weekly Tutorial Class held by the Sister Tutors. 16 entered for Part I Examination and 8 were successful; 12 entered for Part II and 5 were successful.

It is hoped that it will be possible to arrange a University Course for October, 1942.

In May, 1941, a one-day Intensive Course of Lectures for Teachers of Midwifery was organised and was enthusiastically supported by Teachers from all over England and Wales, there being 100 attendances. It is hoped that it will be possible to organise another Course in May, 1942.

The Committee are again very grateful to the voluntary workers who have undertaken the A.R.P. duties at the Hospital and wish to express their appreciation of the splendid work they are doing by giving their services night after night for the benefit of the Hospital.

The Maternity Hospital at "Long Rede" has been a great acquisition to the Hospital, no less than 589 patients having been sent on there during the year. It continues to be an excellent means of providing safe convalescence for the patients, and relieves the pressure on the beds in Loveday Street.

The extension to the Nurses' Hostel in Loveday Street has now been completed, and as this will not be required by the Hospital while "Long Rede" is being used, the Committee are endeavouring to obtain tenants for the duration of the war.

The Committee have pleasure in reporting that they have received a contribution from the Birmingham Hospitals Contributory Association of £7,115. This is a decrease of £1,417 on the previous year, which is due to the fall in the number of patients treated.

They again wish to express their grateful thanks for this grant, both to the Birmingham Hospitals Contributory Association and the Birmingham Hospital Saturday Fund and, through them, to the workers of the City who contribute so splendidly to these organisations.

The Committee are greatly concerned with regard to the financial position. Owing to running the Hospital and "Long Rede" Annexe the overhead costs are very considerable, and for the year just ended there has been a deficiency on the working of the two units of £3,687 11s. 3d.

The Committee have endeavoured in many ways to obtain donations to wipe out this deficit but, so far, have been unsuccessful.

The Committee regret to report a further decrease in the amount of subscriptions. They realise that the public has endless calls upon its generosity, but new subscriptions for this

Hospital are needed more than ever, as the Hospital continues to do a great amount of free work.

During the year the Honorary Treasurer appealed to the subscribers to not only increase their subscriptions but to enter into a form of covenant to pay these for seven years. This should mean an increase of £40 or £50 a year to the Hospital income, and is particularly acceptable as it helps to replace the many subscriptions that have been lost through deaths.

The Committee therefore urge friends of the Hospital to do all they can to interest their friends in the Hospital work and to obtain new subscriptions during the coming year.

Patients needing convalescent treatment have been sent to Pype Hayes.

With the opening of the new Baby Ward our responsibilities will be increased, and additional help needed. The fine support given to this most vital work by the "Birmingham Mail" Christmas Tree Fund has the Committee's most grateful thanks.

Our aim is to give our little ones the right start in life, that they may become healthy members of society, fit to carry on the great traditions of the land we love. Can we afford to ignore this appeal?

The Committee wish to thank Messrs. Cadbury Bros. for again kindly sending us a consignment of Bourn-Vita for distribution which is much appreciated.

During the year 1941, 631 mothers were treated by massage and exercises. The decrease in numbers is due principally to the fact that as the majority of normal cases are transferred to Barnt Green at the commencement of the lying-in period the time of the masseuse must be divided between the two sections of the Hospital, and it is therefore impossible to provide daily treatment for all patients.

Normal lying-in mothers have exercises to tone them up and to help the circulation, and so that they will know how to use their muscles properly when they get up. They are all urged to continue doing exercises for at least a month after they leave the Hospital; a paper of exercises is given to each before discharge.

General massage has been given to patients who had to spend a prolonged period in bed, and to patients whose muscles, owing to illness, were abnormally weak.

It will be observed that 17 radiant heat treatments have been given this year. The treatment was given to patients suffering from severe pain in back or chest.

Nine babies received treatment during the year, of whom five were born with varying degrees of Talipes and were treated with massage, manipulation, strapping and splinting. On leaving here they were transferred to other Hospitals for continued treatment. Two babies who had Erbs palsy were treated with massage and splinting and showed great improvement before discharge. The two remaining cases were a facial paralysis and a paralysed foot, both of which had massage.

- 6.—Patients may see their friends between the hours of Two and Four o'clock any afternoon.
- 7.—Only fruit, flowers and eggs are allowed to be brought to patients.
- 8.—It is particularly requested that only one small box be brought.
- 9.—Patients are not allowed to offer presents to nurses or servants.

Notice as to admission of In-Patients.

In-patients are required to pay maintenance charges according to their means, unless they are members of a Contributory Scheme which undertakes to pay these. Out-Patients who are not members of a Contributory Scheme are required to pay 2/6, which covers cost of treatment for one month.
