

The Board of Management has pleasure in presenting its Annual Report and Statement of Accounts for the year ended December 31st 1940

PERSONAL.

It is with sincere regret that the Board records the death of Mr. Joseph Theakston, L.D.S. Mr. Theakston held the office of Honorary Dental Surgeon for a considerable number of years, and, at the time of his death, was Honorary Consulting Dental Surgeon.

A little prior to the last Annual Meeting of Governors Mr. Alex. W. Maitland intimated his intention to retire from the position of Honorary Secretary. In accepting this resignation with regret, the Board placed on record its appreciation of the services Mr. Maitland had rendered to the Hospital throughout the period of ten years during which he had held the office.

Another resignation which was received with regret was that of one of the Honorary Auditors—Mr. Wm. Clough, J.P. Mr. Clough had acted in this capacity for a considerable time and his untiring services were duly recorded.

Yet another resignation was that of Mr. Harold Hardman as a member of the Board of Management. Mr. Hardman felt, that in consequence of his indisposition, he could not justify his position as a member of the Board but, in accepting his resignation, the Board expressed a hope that he would, at some future time, feel able to return.

During the year there has been a change in the office of the Resident Surgical Officer. Mr. B. A. Jackson, B.Sc., M.D., L.M.C.C., F.R.C.S.(Edin.) was appointed to the position.

Another change in the staff has been that of Almoner. Miss Phyllis Marsden, B.A., A.I.H.A., was appointed to the position and took up duties on the 1st May.

THE WORK OF THE YEAR.

In-patients.—The number of In-patients treated was 3193, this figure being an increase of 203 on the figure for the previous year.

Of the 3193 patients treated, 2939 were discharged, 158 died, and 96 remained in Hospital on December 31st.

The average number of beds occupied daily was 114.35 and the average number of available beds 141.48. The normal figure of beds available is 143 but certain beds were out of commission at varying times during the cleaning of the wards.

The average length of stay of each patient was 15.23 days as compared with 15.80 days in 1939.

Out-patients.—The work of the Out-patient Department has shown yet a further increase during the year. Whilst the figure for 1939 was itself a record, the number attending has, during 1940, increased by 1434, resulting in 7307 new patients being seen.

The number of minor operations performed in the Casualty Department was 541 this figure being an increase of 135 on the figure for 1939.

The number of daily dressings given in the Casualty Department was 10,498, whilst attendances covering all patients were as follows:

In the X-Ray Department, 4223 patients were seen. The figures of work done were as follows:

In the Light Department there were 48 new patients registered for treatment, and 2254 actual treatments given.

From the figures which have been quoted it will be seen that no fewer! than 14,665 patients were given attention in one or more of the Departments of the Hospital during the year. This fact is quoted in order to emphasise the important part which the Hospital plays in the life and health of the Town and District. It should also be remembered that in addition to carrying out this increased work, the Hospital has, throughout the year, been available for the reception of Air-Raid Casualties—a matter with which the Board has been, and continues to be, greatly concerned.

Pathological Department.—The number of examinations carried out in this department was 3981. In addition, the usual grouping of prospective Blood Donors, and arrangements for Blood Transfusions, were carried out.

Convalescent Treatment.—14 patients, received Convalescent treatment during the year and a number were supplied with Surgical appliances of varying kinds.

Nursing Home.—The number of patients admitted to the Nursing Home was 255, of which 88 were Maternity Cases. The average daily number of beds occupied was 10.83. It is pleasing to note that greater use is now being made of the Home as is shown by the following figures of patients treated:

FINANCE.

For the year under review there was an excess of Expenditure beyond Income of £3,125 6s. 0d.

Income.—It will be noticed that the section containing subscriptions and Donations shows an increase of £1,628. Whilst the Board is gratified to see another increase from the Contributory Scheme, it is also glad to point to the increase in Annual Subscriptions. This figure is £355 greater than in 1939, and is due to the efforts which have so far been made by the Income Committee to increase this amount. The amount now contains no fewer than 105 new and increased subscriptions of varying amounts received during the year. For all these, and for all other Subscriptions the Board is grateful, but would point out that there is still room for improvement, and expresses the hope that there will be many more new Subscribers in the coming year. A further pleasing feature of this section is the increased amounts from both the Christmas Appeal and the Flag Day, which together contributed a sum of over £500.

The sum received from District Charity Funds shows an increase of £557, and the thanks of the Board are again expressed. At the same time it is hoped that the various Committees responsible for the Funds will be encouraged in their work, and so progress to greater heights.

It will be noticed that Contributions from patients generally have shown substantial increases—particularly from In-patients. With this the Board is pleased, for it shows that there are many today who are only too glad to contribute towards the cost of their treatment. There are, of course, always those who are unable to do so, and for these the Board will always be ready to provide. In passing the Board would pay tribute to the work carried out by the Almoner's Committee in this direction.

The Board also acknowledges with gratitude the receipt of £1,097 16s. 9d. 3½% War stock from the Executors of the late Mrs. Margaret Hannah Hyslop, for the endowment of a James and Margaret Hyslop Bed.

Expenditure.—The ordinary expenditure showed an increase of £1,676 and reached a total of £29,898 0s. 0d., the highest on record. Special expenditure was £3,436 against £4,570 in the previous year.

A reference to the details of the Income and Expenditure account will show how this record figure of expenditure has been arrived at. The increased cost of all the commodities is being felt and it will be seen that, for instance, the Provisions section is up by £315 in spite of the Hospital, like individuals, being unable to obtain all that it would desire in many lines. Drugs and Dressingsparticularly Dressings-are another instance of this increased outlay,

and there are many others which speak for themselves. Whilst this was something to be expected there are two points requiring emphasis—firstly, that the Hospital continues, as always, to practice the greatest economy commensurate with efficiency, and secondly, that there is an opportunity for all to give their support to the work of the Hospital in these unsettled times.

With regard to the Special Expenditure, it will be seen that the figures include certain new items. It has always been the practice of the Board to try to keep the Hospital up to date and these "new items" do occur and will occur from time to time. The Infirmary like other Institutions must progress and improvements are costly.

SPECIAL ITEMS.

The War.—Reference was made in the last Report to the special problems which had been created as a result of the War.

During the year under review the Emergency Committee has continued its work and has kept in touch with all matters related to Civil Defence and to their application with regard to Hospitals generally.

Arrangements were made early in the year whereby the Hospital would be assured of Stretcher Bearers in the event of receiving a large number of casualties. Some 60 men came forward as volunteers and took up training, and for many months now there has been a nightly rota of 6 to 8 men on duty. These volunteers have also now undertaken the duties of Fire Watching and Fire fighting.

Another outstanding feature of the Emergency arrangements was the decision to make Bury a centre for the storage of Blood Plasma. This was a decision taken by the Regional Blood Transfusion Officer but one in which there would, quite obviously, have to be co-operation, and in this the Emergency Committee agreed. The present position is that Donors are being grouped and arrangements will shortly be made for taking the actual blood. After preparation the blood will be returned in the form of Plasma for storage at the Infirmary and for use as required.

A number of other matters of a more minor nature were also dealt with as were also many other arrangements of a purely internal kind.

Telephone installation.—During the year a new telephone system has been placed throughout the Hospital, and although, owing to the War the equipment is not what was expected and partly temporary, it is already an improvement.

Mr. S. H. Renshaw.—The Board at a meeting early in the year, discussed the question of the erection of a suitable tablet to the memory of the late Mr. S. H. Renshaw who was, as is well known, a generous benefactor to, and a hard worker for the Hospital. As a result, a tablet was erected the Inscription being as follows:

SAMUEL HENRY RENSHAW, ESQ. O.B.E.

A FREEMAN OF THE COUNTY BOROUGH OF BURY.

"Recommends"—A subject on which the Board has spent much time during the year has been that of "recommends" and the question as to whether or not they serve any useful purpose at the present time. It is in comparatively few cases nowadays that the patient is quite unable to make some contribution, however small, towards his treatment. As will have been noted already. from the earlier part of this report, many patients do so contribute. The intention of a "recommend" is to confirm or verify the right of the recipient to the free treatment of the Hospital, so that as soon as the patient is asked to make some contribution, a "recommend" (on which the subscriber is asked to state what amount the patient or his relatives can pay) becomes pointless. Moreover, to complete the "recommend" in the manner prescribed is not an easy task for the subscriber, nor does the information help the patient a great deal when presented at the Infirmary. The Board has, therefore, made a recommendation to the Governors that the system of "recommends" be discontinued.

THANKS.

Matron's Report for 1940

Except for a few changes in the personnel of the Nursing Staff there is little to report for the year 1940.

Sisters Campbell and McLeod left to take up posts in Scotland Sisters Fayle and Holden left to be married.

Sister Savage who was a member of the Q.A.I.M.N.S. was called up in December and is now at Davyhulme Hospital. Sister Duckworth was appointed Nursing Home Sister; she holds both the C.M.B. and Housekeeping Certificates. Sister Riley is now Maternity Ward Sister; she was promoted on completion of a year as night midwife.

Sister Boyes, a trainee of Leigh Infirmary, has been appointed Assistant Night Sister.

Sister Stringer has been appointed Sister of the Orthopaedic Department; she previously held an Orthopaedic Sister's post.

Staff Nurse K. Burke was successful in passing the M.S.R. examination on completion of one year in the X-Ray Department. She left on being appointed X-Ray Sister at Bolton, and was succeeded by Staff Nurse Hamilton.

It gives me much pleasure to report that the health of the Staff has been exceedingly good during the year. Except for an epidemic of influenza in February there has been little sickness.

Several changes have been made to enable the Staff to have rest during air raids. The Boardroom has been made comparatively safe and has been equipped as a nurses' dormitory. The remaining members of the Nursing Staff sleep on the first floor of the Nurses' Home. We have been assured that this floor is also comparatively safe. The Probationers' Sitting-room has been fitted with bunks and is now a dormitory for the Domestic Staff.

In September we were advised to call in auxiliary nurses and we now have five on full-time duty. They work an eight hours day for six days a week. Having now become familiar with hospital routine they will be of great assistance to us should an emergency arise. We are still giving practical instruction to prospective auxiliary nurses 100 having now completed fifty hours.

Several members of the Red Cross Society have also attended for instruction. We have had many voluntary helpers during the year and I wish to take this opportunity of thanking them for their help. Several have given much time to the Infirmary since the outbreak of war and would be of valuable assistance to us in the event of an emergency.

The war has not interfered in any way with the training of my nurses. They are most fortunate in this respect as so many have been evacuated from their training schools.

I would like to convey my grateful thanks to the members of the Honorary Medical Staff who have given up much of their valuable time in order to give lectures to my Staff.

Out of six nurses who entered for the Final State Examination five were successful.

I also wish to thank all who so generously helped by sending eggs to us in April. It has been extremely difficult to cater during 1940 and the preserved eggs helped us out of difficulties on many occasions.

May I once again thank the Children's Fund Committee and Ladies' Committee for their help during the year.

Almoner's Report for 1940

Most Almoners still begin their Reports with a short explanation of an Almoner's function, because, especially in the provinces, the profession is "young," with all the possibilities of youth. Bury Infirmary has had an Almoner sufficiently long for patients to have some idea of her work, and the origin of the profession was adequately described in last year's Report. However, the word seems still to puzzle many people, such as the patient who asked to see the "Alimonger" pronounced in such a way that it was doubtful whether she was thinking of an alligator or an ironmonger.

Briefly, an Almoner is a specialist in medico-social work, and it is a point of interest that some Hospitals employ an Almoner to do only social work, and leave assessment to a Patients' Payments Officer, while other Hospitals, including Bury Infirmary, require an Almoner both to assess and to deal with social problems. Patients and Almoner have advantages if the Almoner also deals with assessment. It means that this difficult task is performed by somebody who is sympathetic and trained to recognise patient's financial difficulties. It means, also, that the patient is asked questions by only one Hospital Officer, and that, from the start, the Almoner knows a patient's needs.

There are probably three divisions of medical work—prevention, cure, and amelioration—and by describing some part of the work of the Bury Infirmary Almoner's Department from May to December 1940, (I cannot speak for the preceding months), I will try to demonstrate what part the Almoner plays in this service.

The preventive side of medicine is probably the most important, and, unfortunately the smallest part of Hospital Work. "What has health to do with care?" says Chesterton, "Health has to do with carelessness." That is what we are aiming at, a carefree population, well fed, well housed, well clothed, protected against accident on the streets and in the factories. Doctors can help in preventive work by injections against disease and by instruction, but the greatest work can be done by using the provisions made by law for the health of the Public. An Almoner must act as a pivot and as interpretor. An example of this is the new law which provides expectant and nursing mothers and children under five with cheap or free milk. It is the Almoner's privilege to urge expectant mothers attending the Ante-Natal Clinic to take advantage of this Scheme, and to explain it to those patients who, strange as it may seem, appear to be unaware of the provision. That is

a "general" example of preventive work, but a special example can be found in the little girl who was attending for sunlight treatment, and, although not seriously ill in any way, was generally debilitated owing to the fact that she was growing quickly, and that her mother, who was ill and a widow was not earning sufficient money. The school Authorities were first approached, and they agreed to provide free milk and extra nourishment. The Manchester Royal Infirmary then agreed to give the mother an early vacancy for a necessary operation and the child was sent to the Renshaw Cot at a Southport Convalescent Home for two months. The final joy was that the Children's Committee gave an adequate allowance to supply extra winter clothes for the convalescent treatment. This child, is still attending for Sunlight Treatment, and the mother knows that she can always come to the Almoner when she is in difficulty.

Curative work probably plays the greatest part in Hospital life. A patient needs a surgical instrument to complete the cure, or convalescent treatment, or extra nourishment, or the removal of worries at home which are causing her to refuse to come into Hospital for operative treatment. The numbers of instruments supplied, and Convalescent Treatments arranged will figure in another section of the Annual Report. These include small things like insulin syringes, and larger ones such as Surgical Belts and Artificial Limbs. Fortunately, the purchase tax has not been placed on surgical instruments, and Approved Societies, Education Authorities, Public Assistance, Tuberculosis Authorities, the Charity Organisation Society, the Almoner's Samaritan Fund and patients themselves have made it comparatively easy to finance them.

The ameliorative work is perhaps the saddest, but is very necessary to prevent excessive physical or mental pain. A retired nurse had been attending Bury Infirmary for a few years with little hope of complete cure, and with failing sight. The Almoner was able to obtain two separate grants of £3 0s.0d. from the Nation's Fund for Nurses to provide her with extra clothing, and the Nurses Insurance Society covered the cost of three weeks convalescent treatment at Southport which helped her physically, and gave her new hope. Now she knows that the Almoner is in touch with the Welfare Worker for the Blind, and the Nation's Fund for Nurses, and that all are co-operating to be ready to help in any need which she may have.

The War has made work a little more difficult in some ways. For instance, there are fewer Convalescent Homes available, and there is an increased need for social work in connection with evacuees and with people who have lost their homes. The Almoner's Depart-

ment has added to its work the Emergency Medical Service work of the Hospital, and hopes to be ready for any eventuality. Contact has been made with the Assistance Board and co-operation started in small matters which might prove invaluable should Bury be unfortunate enough to suffer an extensive raid.

While I am on the subject of co-operation, I must express my thanks and amazement at the extent of the co-operation which I have found inside and outside Bury Infirmary. Superintendent, Doctors, Nurses, Massage and Administrative Staff and particularly my own staff, the Almoner's Committee and the Children's Committee have helped to make work a joy. Outside, I have had unstinted support from Mr. Ormerod and the other Secretaries of Local Hospital Funds, from The Charity Organisation, Miss Hargreaves at St. Mary's Home, from Mrs. Rainey, from the excellent Local Ambulance Services, and from the surrounding Education Authorities, Public Health Officials including the Official of Jericho-Municipal Hospital and Public Assistance Officials. It is, I think, true to say of those who are working for Bury Infirmary that "The moment we are rooted in a place, the place vanishes. We live like a tree with the whole strength of the universe," and I am privileged to be one of these people.

Contributory Scheme

REPORT FOR 1940

Twelve months ago in my first Report for the Bury Infirmary Contributory Scheme I had the pleasure of informing you that all previous records set up by the Fund had quite easily been passed and though I was most hopeful in my wishes for an even better result in 1940, I confess that my hopes belied my feelings. We were in the throes of a monstrous war and on the surface it appeared that the year for our Scheme would be frought with setbacks. I have experienced those difficulties—for difficulties only come to test us—yet I am pleased to report that those record figures of 1939 have been surpassed.

The development of the Contributory Scheme may more readily be appreciated by considering the following figures:—

Payments to Bury Infirmary £3175 £3820 £4750 £4200 £4050 £5850 £7150

The total amount donated in grants and payments for 1940 reached the magnificent total of £8,809 7s. 6d. as against £7,881 0s. 4d. in 1939. These figures I have given you, will, without any decorations whatever, prove that the people of Bury and District are Contributory Scheme minded and in addition, clearly reveals what the pennies of the many can do.

Every member of the Scheme has every reason to be grateful with the successful result of the past year's working and are justified in looking forward to further increases. Increased grants for the Bury Infirmary will be necessary if our Voluntary Hospital is both to maintain its existing services to the district and keep abreast of all new developments in medical and surgical science. The Bury Infirmary has once again sent out an appeal for increased financial aid in view of the fact that on the past year's working there is a large debit balance. I wonder what part the working men and women of Bury are going to take to put an end to this annual embarrassing position?

That the people of Bury are not slow in responding to any call which is made upon them for the Hospital has been demonsstrated time after time, but a new indication of the realisation of the needs of the Hospital is the increasing numbers of people who have fallen in line, in common with many others, and joined the Contributory Scheme.

Since the outbreak of war the claims on public generosity have increased tremendously and while most of the new appeals merit and receive a ready response, their newness should not make us forget the deserving cause we supported in times of peace. For the first time in our history our Hospitals are in the firing line and their work, their example and their courage have been and will continue to be an inspiration. Therefore no matter how many demands are made upon the family budget, will you please remember that in giving your help to us, you are also helping yourself. A moment's hesitation in crossing the road in the black-out, a moment's forgetfulness at a machine, these and a thousand and one other contingencies may mean a call for the specialised services of the Hospital and it must be satisfying to know that you can qualify for the right to obtain a Hospital Voucher.

May I stress the position of married women. So many more married women have joined the ranks of the wage earners during the past twelve months that it is important to emphasise one of the Rules of the Contributory Scheme, that a married woman in employment cannot claim benefit through her husband's contributions, but must become a contributor on her own account if she wishes to have the privileges of the Scheme extended to her at any time she may be in need of them.

I wish to express my sincere thanks to my Chairman, (Mr. T. Steen) for his wise counsel and assistance, the Contributory Scheme Committee, the Bury Times Company Limited for publishing from time to time the activities and progress of the Scheme, to the collectors, office staffs, and others who are responsible for the collection of contributions. We cannot afford to remain stagnant, so let us go forward believing that, "the best is yet to be."

The persons to occupy such bed shall be nominated in writing by the Honorary Secretary or other Executive Officer of the Bury Infirmary, who, however, shall not nominate any patient unless the case is recommended in writing by the Medical man in attendance on the patient and by some member of the Medical Staff of the Bury Infirmary.

The Board of Management of the Bury Infirmary has an Agreement with the Institute, whereby patients requiring treatment shall be entitled to receive same.





Maternity Ward

This Ward comprises 10 beds, together with Labour Room and Nursery.

Patients are expected to contribute towards the cost of their maintenance, according to their circumstances. Arrangements for admission are to be made through the Almoner.

Private Nursing Home



There are ten rooms available at a charge of £5 5s. 0d. per week, and one room to accommodate two patients at a charge of £4 4s. 0d. each per week. There are also four rooms for Maternity Cases at a charge of £5 5s. 0d. per week. This charge includes accommodation, food and the services of the nursing staff.

If the services of a special Nurse are required they must be paid for by the patient.

Stimulants and any special medicines or dressings must be provided at the cost of the Patient.

These Private Nursing Rooms are a complete unit, quite apart from the General Wards. The Home has its own Theatre.

Any Medical Practitioner in practice in the area served by the Bury Infirmary, or any Specialist, at the expense and desire of the Patient, shall have the right to attend Patients in the Nursing Home.

A Medical Practitioner attending a Private Patient must take full responsibility for such patient.


Infectious or mentally deranged cases are not admitted.


