

# Annual Report of the BURY INFIRMARY

For the Year 1946

The Board of Management has pleasure in presenting its Annual Report and Statement of Accounts for the year ended December 31st, 1946.

### PERSONAL.

During the year the Bury Infirmary lost one of its most zealous supporters in the death of Mrs. S. J. Schofield, of Radcliffe. Mrs. Schofield had been a member of the Board for a number of years as a representative of the Radcliffe Hospitals and Charities Fund, and, during that time, had given herself wholeheartedly to the work. Always of a cheerful disposition, never weary in welldoing, and with a unique knowledge of the district from which she came, Mrs. Schofield was of inestimable benefit to the Hospital. Her place on the Board was taken by Alderman G. Walton, also of Radcliffe.

Several other changes in the membership of the Board also took place during the year.

Firstly, there was the resignation of Mr. T. Steen who had been a member of the Board for the better part of twenty years. Whilst Mr. Steen had, during this period, been Chairman of a number of important Committees, it was, perhaps, in the direction of the Contributory Scheme that he was best known, for he had been Chairman of this most important Committee for upwards of ten years. The thanks of the Board are recorded for the long period of devoted service which Mr. Steen gave to the Hospital.

Secondly, there were changes in the representation of the Ladies and Children's Fund Committee. Mrs. A. M. Johnson was re-elected as a representative of the Ladies Committee in place of Mrs. L. B. Jones, whilst Mrs. R. Byrom was nominated by the Children's Fund Committee as one of their representatives in place of Mrs. J. Barden.

Lastly, Mr. F. M. Quan was accepted as a representative of the R.A.F. 35 Maintenance Unit in place of Mr. J. I. Ross, Councillor Walker, of Heywood, as the representative of the Heywood Corporation in place of Councillor W. Bentley, and Mr. Herbert Morris to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Mr. H. Thompson. Mr. J. W. Penny was appointed by the Contributory Scheme as one of its representatives, whilst Dr. D. H. D. Young was elected to fill an existing vacancy.

It will be recalled from the last Report that, at the time of presenting it the Board had received the resignation of the Honorary Treasurer. It is with great pleasure that the Board now records, that, after the necessary approaches had been made, Mr. Fred Lofthouse accepted this most important office.

Another vacancy which will be recalled from the last Report was that of Vice-President. After due consideration, and with a high regard for the work which he had put in for the Hospital since he became a member of its Board, Mr. F. C. Mosley was unanimously adopted to fill the post. As is already well known, Mr. Mosley is also Chairman of the House Committee—a position he has occupied with credit for some considerable time.

A vacancy amongst the representatives of the Hospital on the Area Committee of the British Hospitals Association was filled by the appointment to it of Mr. H. Marsden. The representatives on this Committee are Mr. F. C. Mosley, Mr. H. Marsden and the Superintendent.

There have been certain additions to the Visiting Medical Staff during the year. Dr. E. W. Gleeson (who was Resident Surgical Officer for a period) was appointed an Hon. Assistant Surgeon, whilst Dr. D. J. A. Brown, of Bacup, and Mr. F. J. Heap, of Bury, were appointed Anaethesists.

#### THE WORK OF THE YEAR.

Generally speaking, the work performed during 1946, has approximated that for the previous year.

In-patients. The number of In-patients treated was 3231—25 more than in 1945.

Having regard to the waiting lists, which have now stood at a high figure for several years, it was hoped that it would have been possible to treat a greater number of In-patients. Almost at the beginning of the year however, there was considerable sickness amongst the staff, necessitating the closing of a ward for some two or three weeks, and valuable ground was lost. In addition, cleaning down of wards—which was very much overdue—had to be undertaken during the summer, and this, again, was a factor in reducing admissions. It is, of course, generally taken for granted that this cleaning down is an annual affair but, in view of the length of time which had elapsed since it had been possible to undertake such work previously, the process was a longer one. Above all, there were, of course, staff shortages, on which comment has previously been made. As a result of these factors there were, on the average, some five beds less per day available than in 1945, so that the outcome is not, perhaps, as bad as it might have been.

Of the 3231 In-patients treated, 2940 were discharged, 191 died, and 100 remained in Hospital on December 31st. In addition to the In-patients here recorded there were 183 infants born in the General Maternity Ward during the year.

The length of stay per patient was 13.38 days—slightly less than in 1945: whilst the average daily number of beds occupied was 115.

Of the In-patients, some 70% were again members of Contributory Schemes, 974 being members of our own Scheme, and 1308 members of other Schemes.

Out-Patients. The aggregate of Out-patients showed a slight decrease on the previous year, 9696 new patients being recorded against 9735 in 1945. These were made up as follows:—

The X-Ray Department was one in which a considerable increase in the volume of work was recorded. The actual number of patients entered in the books was 6696, this figure being 700 more than in the previous year. Several factors contributed to the making up of this increase, amongst them increased Casualty cases and the fairly large number of Ministry of Pensions and other cases of State responsibility now being sent direct to the Department for examination. Films exposed were 13164 against 11283 in 1945.

Treatments for Artificial Sunlight were slightly up on 1945, the figure being 1178.

Operations. The following is a summary of operations carried out during the year:—

Pathological Department. Much has been said concerning this Department in previous reports and the following figures will serve to show how the work performed is increasing:—

Nursing Home. The number of patients treated in the Nursing Home was 449. Of this figure 183 were Maternity Cases. The number of beds occupied daily averaged nearly 16 or, in other words, almost the full complement fully occupied throughout the year.

Convalescent Treatment, etc. 23 patients received Convalescent Treatment during the year and 54 were supplied with Appliances of varying kinds.

#### FINANCE.

It will be agreed that the most outstanding feature of the Income and Expenditure Account is that, for the year, there was an excess of Expenditure over Income of some £11,000. The Board, naturally, regards this result as a very serious matter, and feels that all who give thought to it will feel the same. Yet, an examination of the Account, together with the few remarks which follow, will serve to show that it could have been very little different.

Turning first to the Income side of the Account, it will be noted that once again, Income created a record by being some £3700 higher than in 1945. Further investigation however, will show that this increased income really came, generally speaking, from sources which, in themselves, are dependent upon a number of other contingencies. For instance, such a figure as that shown in the account against Ministry of Health (Emergency Medical Services) will not be repeated: quite obviously, by now, treatments under this wartime arrangement have so decreased that much smaller sums—if indeed anything—will continue to come our way. Again, it will be noted that the total income this year includes some £660 of "Free" legacies—a sum which might be much more but, on the other hand, might be nothing at all, in the future. Lastly, with the sale of investments (which will be referred to at a later stage) income from that source is likely to be a diminishing amount from now on.

Whilst the Board, once again, records its warmest thanks to all those who have given, in any way, towards the upkeep of the Hospital, it would, at the same time, draw attention to the fact, that the first section of the account —that concerned with Voluntary Income—is down by about £600. The same observation really should be made of the next section also-District Charity Funds—for one of the Funds contains money which belonged to the previous year, and which will not be repeated because of a change in method of payment: this section however, is one of those to which the previous remarks concerning "other contingencies" applies, depending, as it does, on the number of treatments carried out on behalf of these Funds. To revert however, to the first section, special thanks are due to both Annual Subscribers and Donors showing, as they do, improvements. Similar sentiments are due also to all those who made the Christmas Appeal so successful. The regrettable feature of this part of the account is the decrease in the sum received from the Contributory Scheme: moreover, from an examination of the account of the scheme itself, it will be seen that this decrease was not due to any slackening of effort or of support from this source, but purely and simply from an increase in outside commitments. The fact should provide much food for thought-and possibly action-for those responsible for the organisation of the Scheme for, after all, whilst the Scheme commenced with the needs of the contributor in mind, it was also commenced with a view to providing for the Hospital belonging to that contributor, a reliable source of income: and with an expenditure which has increased by no less than 106% since 1938, it is now a very debatable point whether a sum of £10,000 can be so regarded. It is however, gratifying to record that, at the moment of completing this report, the members of the Bury Infirmary Contributory Scheme, in general meeting, have decided to increase, by one penny per week, their contributions under the Scheme. This is indeed a great help.

Turning to Expenditure, it will be noted that, with only a sum of £480 spent on special items, the total figure was £15,000 up on 1945; and this in spite of very careful periodic examination by the Finance Committee.

Whilst every section of this side of the Account contributed to the increase, it will be seen that, once again, Salaries and Wages showed the most growth, and reached a figure of £33,800. On the other hand, let it be noted that, in every case the Infirmary has faithfully complied with the ruling of the appropriate national joint committee, in seeing that the rates of pay agreed upon have been paid; is it not, in fact, largely due to this policy that the Hospital finds itself in the position it is today? Yet, subject to the financial position being such as to meet it, the Board would not have it otherwise for the sake of the patient. If the Hospital is to be well served, if it wishes to have the staff the patient deserves, and if it has not to be in competition with other such undertakings, it must comply with national and provincial findings. It surely constitutes another reason why those who regard the Bury Infirmary as their Hospital, should give serious consideration to increased support.

Before leaving the subject of Income and Expenditure, attention should be drawn to the Balance Sheet, for a complete picture of the position cannot be obtained from a perusal of the Income and Expenditure Account alone. There was a deficit of £11,000, and an inspection of the Balance Sheet will show how this was met.

Firstly, at December 31st, 1945, there was, for investment, under the heading "General Funds" a sum of £1400. From the Balance Sheet for 1946 it will be seen—again under "General Funds"—that a further £5300 was received. All this money the Infirmary was free to spend as it wished, but it has, in the past, generally been placed on one side, and invested. Whilst some £3000 was so invested in the early part of the year, it was necessary, in view of an increasing bank overdraft, not only to spend the rest, but to

sell investments to the value of over £7000: so that, whilst the Balance sheet may show that, at December 31st, there was, at the Bank for General Purposes, a sum of £2437, this was only achieved by the procedure explained and, moreover, is not in that happy state at the time of preparing this Report.

The plain fact is that the Infirmary has, once again, had to have recourse to living on capital, and can only continue—for the time being at any rate to do so. The Board is not unmindful of the fact that there is now, of course. a National Health Service Act on the Statute Book, and that, in due course, the Hospital will be taken over by the State. That however, as things stand at the moment, is not due to take place until April, 1948, and, in the meantime the duty of maintaining the Hospital still rests directly on the shoulders of the people of Bury and District. There is also the point that, accumulated gifts, for many years held in the form of investments, disbursed now to meet day to day expenditure, will mean just that much less as "pocket-money" for this and other hospitals in Bury and District after the new service comes into effect. Finally there is yet the other point that, as time passes, the Hospital finds itself requiring new or additional apparatus, sometimes of an extremely costly nature: and it is for such things that—failing ordinary revenue to meet them—these "free" monies should be used. The Board is hopeful that, even though great changes are imminent, it will be able to rely, as it has done with such great confidence in the past, on its many-and varied—wonderful supporters.

### SPECIAL ITEMS.

X-Ray Apparatus. It will be recalled from the section of this Report dealing with the work of the Hospital during the year, that there was a substantial increase of work in the X-Ray Department. It has, in fact, been evident for some time, that the existing apparatus was not, of itself, sufficient to cope with the ever increasing demands. It has therefore, been decided to install a second Radiography unit, and an order for this was placed during the year. Whilst the cost will be in the region of £2000, it was felt, when all had been considered, that the continued efficiency of the Department and, as a result, the services to the patient, demanded it.

National Health Service Act. At the time of the issue of the last Report, the subject of Health and Hospital Services was still one of considerable speculation: the last Report did, in fact, record the obscurity in which the matter was hidden.

It was however, not long afterwards that the National Health Service Bill was issued and—taking such Bill as it stood—the worst fears of the Board were confirmed. The Bill however, received the Royal Assent in the Autumn, but only after long and careful study, and after many alterations and amendments had been made. Some of these amendments were such as to meet some of the criticisms of the Voluntary Hospitals, and it can now be said that—subject to the regulations which are to be issued by the Minister and approved by Parliament from time to time—the Act appears to provide a much more workable plan for the hospital service than was at first envisaged.

As the Bill foreshadowed, the Minister of Health will be responsible under the Act for providing the whole of the health services in England and Wales; and, for this purpose, he will be entrusted with the ownership of all existing hospitals—voluntary and otherwise. He will be advised by a central council of experts, and he will delegate many of his powers regarding hospital services to Regional Hospital Boards; and, through them, to management Committees, covering one or more local hospitals according to their size.

It was in regard to the constitution and authority of these Management Committees that a great deal of controversy arose, for, in the Bill, they appeared to be nothing more than the servants of the Regional Boards, with little or no room for showing any initiative themselves. This, it was felt, would be disastrous to the patient, for the link between him and the local people, and the hospital, would have been irretrievably broken. Happily, by amendments made, the management Committees are to have the duty of controlling and managing their individual local hospital or group of hospitals, and they will be composed of local people with local knowledge. As the Minister himself said, at the time the Bill was before the Standing Committee, "the Management Committee is the vital element in the administration." As to the actual formation of these Management Committees, no information is available at present: it is, of course, an immense undertaking, and Regional Boards must first be formed to plan the hospital services from the regional viewpoint.

Another subject on which there was great controversy was that of hospital endowments. Under the Act all the endowments and investments of non-teaching hospitals will, on the "appointed day," be transferred to the Minister, put into a national pool, and redistributed. These monies will not be taken by the Treasury, nor will they, in any way, be offset against Treasury payments for the cost of the service: they will, in fact, form discretionary funds for the use of Local Management Committees. Moreover, in their redistribution, care will be taken to see that, as far as practicable, the object of the endowment, and the observance of any conditions attached thereto, are not prejudiced. Finally, from the date of the passing of the Act, some gifts, and, after the "appointed day," all gifts will belong to the Management Committee responsible for the hospital to which these gifts were made.

The new service, when it becomes operative, can only work by the united effort of everyone concerned, and not least by those whose object it has been, in the past, to do what they could voluntarily, for the sick and injured: perhaps the changes which were made, during the passage of the Bill through Parliament, will help in achieving this. It is the fervent hope of the Board, along with other Voluntary Hospitals, that this will be so, for, above all else, the Service must be humanitarian in all its aspects, and those who have worked for the "Voluntaries" in the past can provide the best means of seeing that this is so.

#### THANKS.

In conclusion, the Board records, once again, its warm thanks to all who have assisted in the work of the Infirmary during the year. For some, as usual, this has meant a great deal of time and thought; for others it has meant a gift, great or small, or some service: oftentimes at great personal sacrifice. To all, however the help has been given, the gratitude of the Board is here recorded.



# YOUR HOSPITAL and the National Health Service Act


Under the Act, the ownership of the Hospitals (Voluntary and Municipal) will pass to the State. Transfer to the State will not, however, take place until an "appointed day": this, it is expected, will be April 1st, 1948.

Until transfer, ownership and management, and, consequently, the responsibility for maintenance, remains as at present—in the hands of contributors, subscribers and donors. IT IS OF THE GREATEST IMPORTANCE THEREFORE THAT VOLUNTARY GIFTS SHOULD CONTINUE.

GIFTS BY BEQUEST, OR OF A SPECIAL AMOUNT, OR FOR A SPECIAL PURPOSE, ARE ALSO STILL INVITED. Whilst it is true that all invested funds (Endowment or otherwise) will, on the "appointed day," be transferred to a Hospital Endowment Fund, SPECIAL GIFTS AND BEQUESTS MADE NOW CAN, if made in accordance with certain conditions imposed by the Act, BE EXEMPTED FROM THE TRANSFER. Intending benefactors are, therefore, invited to ask for full particulars by completing the reverse side of this page. After the "appointed day" such gifts—for purposes other than general maintenance—can be freely made to the appropriate Local Management Committee.



# Matron's Report for 1946

Throughout the year 1946 we have been trying to get used to the idea of "being taken over by the State" and hoping that realisation will outshine anticipation. The "waiting period," which is always very trying, has nevertheless been a very busy period.

During the year, all our wards were closed, in turn, for cleaning, providing an opportunity for some stock-taking to be done, and for Barlow Ward to be re-decorated. The Nurses' Home was also beautified as well as certain other parts of the Hospital, including my own office, and we are very pleased with the results. The Nursing and Domestic Staffs have expressed their appreciation of the provision of Kitchenettes in the Nurses' and Maids' Homes; the Domestic Staff are also very appreciative of the provision of radiators in their bedrooms.

Several Staff changes have taken place during the year. Miss P. Kenyon, who had been helping in the Home and Housekeeping Departments since December 1945, accepted the appointment of Assistant Sister Tutor in February. Mrs. Saperia, a Bury Infirmary trainee, was appointed nonresident Maternity Sister in January, Sister McMenamin retaining the position of Day Sister-in-Charge of this Department. Sister Murphy replaced Sister McEwen in the Casualty and Outpatients' Departments in February. Miss Boland held the post of Assistant Night Sister for a short time and was subsequently appointed Night Superintendent, Sister Stuttard having relinquished this post, at her own request, in order to replace Sister Hulme as Theatre Sister. Sister Firth was appointed Male Surgical Ward Sister in February in succession to Sister Blake. Sister McTigue, who joined the Staff as Holiday Sister, replaced Sister Hourd as Children's Ward Sister; Sister Sutcliffe replaced Sister Sykes in the General Private Wards. Miss Sullivan rejoined the Staff as Night Sister in September, having previously been Staff Nurse in the Casualty and Outpatients' Departments. Sister Green replaced Sister Hughes in Barlow Ward.

Miss Illingworth was appointed Physiotherapist in succession to Miss Barnicot, and it is gratifying to be able to report that, by the appointment of Miss Skelton as Physiotherapist at the end of the year, we now have our full complement of Staff in this Department—after a very long waiting period.

In accordance with recommendations made by Dr. Richardson, the Radiologist, certain changes have been made with regard to the Staffing of the X-Ray Department. Mrs. Nuttall was appointed full-time Assistant Radiographer, in a temporary capacity, on 7th December, and Mr. Hemmingway, a Second Year Student Radiographer was also appointed Assistant Radiographer. Staff Nurse Butler has been working in the Department as a Student Radiographer since July.

Thirty-three Student Nurses entered for training during the year, fourteen of whom left during the trial period. This wastage is comparable to that of other training schools. Examination results have been satisfactory. In this connection I wish to thank all members of the Medical Staff who have given lectures and conducted Hospital Examinations. We were able to arrange for the June examination candidates-Final and Preliminary-to have a week's intensive course in the Classroom before taking their examinations, and we hope to be able to continue this modified "Block" System. The Professional Library continues to grow, fifty-three books having been added during the year, making a total of a hundred and twenty-two volumes. We are most grateful to the friends who have presented books to this Libraryincluding members of the Nursing Staff-also to the anonymous donor who sent £10 for this purpose. The Student Nurses continue to take a lively interest in their own Association of the Royal College of Nursing, and they sent two representatives to each of the two College meetings held in London in June and November. The Annual Re-union and Prizegiving was held in

the Rehabilitation Hut in June, when we were delighted to have Mrs. Johnson to make the presentations. The President very kindly took the Chair on this occasion. On behalf of the Nursing Staff I should like to thank the Board of Management for the promised wireless set for the Sick Bay and Medical Wards. Owing to the shortage of accommodation in the Nurses' Home, billets have been provided near the Hospital for a small number of the Nursing Staff. We have been very fortunate in obtaining such good billets and our nurses have been very happily placed.

Catering problems have become more and more acute during the year, and we are indeed most grateful for all the gifts in kind which we have received from various sources, too numerous to mention individually.

Once again I should like to take this opportunity of thanking all voluntary workers for the valuable help given. This includes members of the British Red Cross Society and of the St. John Ambulance Brigade. The Red Cross Library continues to give a great deal of pleasure to patients and Staff.

I should like to thank the members of the Children's Fund Committee for their continued interest and generosity in connection with the Children's Ward. We are very pleased that they have resumed their monthly visit to the Ward, and we are indeed most grateful for the beautiful flannel bed jackets which are so acceptable at Christmas time. We are very grateful to the members of the Ladies' Committee for the lovely knitted matinee jackets and operation stockings, and for other gifts received.

To all those who helped in any way at Christmas time I would say "Thank you." The donations to the Christmas Fund were most generous. We are also most grateful to the members of the Clergy who have come throughout the year to conduct the Services, and to the Rev. D. Carey we are very much indebted for all the trouble taken in connection with the Christmas and Easter Communion Services for patients and Staff.

Once again, to our patients, ex-patients, their relatives and friends who are so appreciative of the Services we provide—often inadequately we feel—we would accord very special thanks.

# Almoner's Report for 1946

I have pleasure in submitting the Almoner's Report for the year 1946.

There have been reorganisations in the department freeing the Almoner of a great deal of routine clerical work, and enabling her to give more time to interviewing and social service. It is the Almoner's duty to see that no problem of home or social condition is impeding the patients' progress, or interfering with his regular visits to hospital, and she must do all in her power to help those who are in difficulties. The problems are very varied, and the assistance which she has been privileged to give has been of many kinds—the provision of extra nourishment, fares to hospital, suitable employment for the disabled, home helps for the bedridden, applications for blind pensions, Service disability pensions, and assistance with housing problems. Much yet remains to be done, not only in contributions to the individual patient, but to the various social problems as a whole, particularly among the old and chronic sick; the Almoner welcomes the co-operation of any local voluntary or statutory bodies whose object is the care of these people.

The provision of convalescent treatment and of surgical appliances recommended by the doctor forms a considerable part of the Almoners work.

Twenty-three patients were sent away for convalescent treatment during the year; six of these went to Harrogate or Buxton for Spa treatment. Where patients were unable to contribute the full cost, help was obtained from various voluntary bodies including the hospital's own Convalescent Funds.

Fifty-four surgical appliances, of many different kinds, were provided, at a total cost of £136–11s. 6d. Patients themselves contributed £105–10s. 2d. towards this, and the balance was met by grants from various benevolent funds such as the British Legion, The Royal Naval Benevolent Trust, and The Royal Surgical Aid Society. Many grants were also made by Approved Societies under their additional benefits scheme, by employers and local Medical Charities and by the various Social Welfare Committees.

The contributions made by patients who have had treatment in the wards were £2 6s. 11d. against £2 8s. 0d. in 1945, and £7 5s. 6d. against £6 7s. 11d. for Maternity.

This is a fitting occasion to express my very real thanks to the many people who have co-operated with the working of my department—the various outside voluntary and statutory bodies, too numerous to mention by name, but none the less gratefully acknowledged; the Almoner's Committee for the thought and help given ungrudgingly to the department; the Children's Fund Committee for its assistance with the Almoner's social work; and the Superintendent for his willing help and co-operation. Contacts with the Medical and Nursing Staffs have been very happy and we look forward to another year of progress together.

# Bury Infirmary Contributory Scheme ORGANISING SECRETARY'S REPORT FOR 1946

It is pleasing to report once again an increase in the contributions which exceeded those of the previous year by £709. The increase is not so large as in the past, but it is gratifying to note that despite unsettled conditions in industry and the consequent movement of labour our contributors have remained loyal in their support of the Scheme.

One point which is causing concern, is that the total amount granted to the Bury Infirmary is £1,000 less than in the previous year. The cause is not far to seek. The cost of providing treatment to contributors in other Voluntary Hospitals and Public Authority Hospitals increased to a very large extent and caused your Committee concern as to the reason. The cost of providing Ancillary Benefits, particularly the Ambulance Service, was also increased over 1945; this means that stricter supervision will have to be maintained on the use of the ambulance. We shall have to insist that Medical Certificates are produced before vouchers are issued for this service, otherwise, we shall not accept liability for the amount incurred.

Contributions from factories, mills, workshops, etc. amounted to £12,626, individual contributors through the office to £3,339, Voluntary Collectors to £631, and Employers of Labour to £845; whilst Bury Corporation Grants of £1,500, together with a balance of £262 brought forward from 1945 made a total of £19,228, which constituted a record.

Grants to the Bury Infirmary totalled £10,000, payments to other Voluntary Hospitals £3,348, to Bury Corporation for the County Hospital £2,326, and to other Public Authority Hospitals £200.

The following is a summary of the service provided for the contributors during 1946: it must be borne in mind that these were provided without any additional contribution being paid:—

#### INCOME.

Owing to the high cost of maintaining and providing Hospital services, and bearing in mind the fact that this is due mainly to the improved conditions and salaries of the staffs employed, your Committee has, from time to time, considered the question of increasing the rates of contribution, taking into consideration the fact that the Ancillary Benefits introduced in 1945 were provided without increasing the rate of contribution. The Bury Infirmary

has a very large deficit to meet, and unless some additional income is forth-coming during the current year, it will mean handing over the Infirmary encumbered by debt when the National Health Service Act becomes operative: this means that any deficiency will have to be made up partially from local rates and partially from Exchequer Grants through the Minister of Health. May I point out that an additional penny a week from each contributor would amount to approximately £116 a week, or £6,066 per annum. Your Committee feels however, that with the approach of the National Health Service, the question of raising contributions is a difficult one, and it is for the Workpeoples' Representatives to express an opinion at the Annual General Meeting. We are informed that the National Health Service will operate from the 1st April 1948, when, of course, the contribution for Hospital Services will be collected by means of a stamp. Until that time, Hospitals will still have to rely upon voluntary contributions, donations, etc., and unless loyal support is received the Infirmary will have a greater deficiency than at present.

### EMPLOYERS' SCHEME.

Once again, we have to thank those Employers of Labour who have so generously maintained their contributions. The amount received was less than in previous years; and I would appeal again to those Employers who have not, as yet, contributed to give this matter their serious consideration, having in mind the financial position of the Infirmary.

#### VOLUNTARY COLLECTORS.

On behalf of the Committee I desire to express gratitude and thanks to the collectors who devote so much of their leisure to this work. Their collections during the year are again a record, totalling £631. This is the spirit which has made our Voluntary Hospitals the great service they are to-day. We are proud of them and of the work they do on behalf of their fellow men.

### RECIPROCAL ARRANGEMENTS.

These arrangements, have, as usual, played an important part in our work, providing Hospital Treatment to contributors in many parts of the country. The many letters of appreciation which we have received from contributors illustrate the usefulness and need for such arrangements. We would place on record our appreciation of the staffs at these Hospitals for the splendid service they have rendered, and for the spirit of co-operation which eminates from this service. We would also thank the Committee and Staffs of the various Public Authority Hospitals who have provided treatment to our contributors. We are very grateful for their services.

#### NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE.

It would appear that with the advent of the National Health Service, our days as a Voluntary Organisation are numbered. We feel sure that some Voluntary Service will still be required, though what form this will take cannot be foreseen. One thing, however, is certain, and it is that many of the extra comforts for patients which are provided at the present time, will be missing under a National Service, and it is for you, the people of Bury and District, to say whether or not we can perform any useful service under the new regime.

In conclusion, the spirit of friendly co-operation has again been in evidence among all the people with whom I have come into contact in administering the Scheme, and I would express the Committee's grateful thanks to the Contributors for their continued support, to Employers of Labour and to Secretaries and Cashiers for their kind co-operation and their arrangements for the collection of contributions.

To the Medical, Surgical, Nursing and Administrative Staffs of all Hospitals for their devoted service, to the Queen's Institute of District Nursing, to Ambulance Services and to Convalescent Homes for their valuable services, and to all those who, in any way, have assisted in furthering the cause of the Scheme, we extend our sincere gratitude and thanks.

During the year Mr. T. Steen, who had been connected with the Voluntary Hospital Movement for a number of years and who was Chairman of the Contributory Scheme Committee for a period of 8 years, found it necessary to resign his office. We would place on record our sincere thanks and appreciation for the services he has rendered to the Voluntary Hospitals Organisation.

To my Chairman, Mr. H. Marsden and to my Committee, for their continued loyalty and support, and for the efficient manner with which they dealt with Committee matters, I tender my grateful thanks.

The persons to occupy such bed shall be nominated in writing by the Honorary Secretary or other Executive Officer of the Bury Infirmary, who, however, shall not nominate any patient unless the case is recommended in writing by the Medical man in attendance on the patient and by some member of the Medical Staff of the Bury Infirmary.

# THE CHRISTIE CANCER HOSPITAL AND HOLT RADIUM INSTITUTE, WITHINGTON, MANCHESTER.

The Board of Management of the Bury Infirmary has an Agreement with the Institute, whereby patients requiring treatment shall be entitled to receive same.



There are ten rooms available at a charge of £8 18s. 6d. per week, and one room to accommodate two patients at a charge of £7 7s. 0d. each per week. There are also four rooms for Maternity Cases at a charge of £8 18s. 6d. per week. This charge includes accommodation, food and the services of the nursing staff.

If the services of a special Nurse are required they must be paid for by the patient.

Stimulants and any special medicines or dressings must be provided at the cost of the Patient.

These Private Nursing Rooms are a complete unit, quite apart from the General Wards. The Home has its own Theatre.

Any Medical Practitioner in practice in the area served by the Bury Infirmary, or any Specialist, at the expense and desire of the Patient, shall have the right to attend Patients in the Nursing Home. Such patients, however, shall also be resident in the area served by the Bury Infirmary The area served by the Bury Infirmary is the County Borough of Bury, the Boroughs of Heywood, Radcliffe, Haslingden, Rawtenstall, and Bacup, and the Urban Districts of Ramsbottom, Tottington and Whitefield.

A Medical Practitioner attending a Private Patient must take full responsibility for such patient. He must also obtain the consent of the Board of Management to the retention of a patient for longer than a period of six weeks by making application to the Superintendent.

Infectious or mentally deranged cases are not admitted.

Applications for Rooms should be made to the Matron, Bury Infirmary, Telephone No. 2444 (three lines).


