





ANNUAL REPORT for 1936.

THE Committee of Management have the honour to present to the Governors their Annual Report for the year 1936.

THE NEW HOSPITAL.

Throughout the year the Management Committee have been considerably occupied with the New Hospital Scheme. The Building Committee and the Architects have held many meetings in connection with the plans and specifications, and no effort has been spared to ensure that every detail of the various sections should have the fullest consideration so that the Hospital may, when completed, be a model of its type and that it may fulfil the high hopes that are placed in it. Building will commence early in 1937 and there is every likelihood of the New Hospital being opened in the autumn of 1938.

PATIENTS.

The limited accommodation and facilities of the Hospital are taxed to the utmost and the staff work under some difficulties. The work continues to increase and the total number of Patients treated in all departments amounted to 5,116, an increase of 713 over 1935.

798 Patients were admitted to the General Wards, an increase of 13; there were 2,148 X-Ray examinations of Out-Patients, an increase of 511, and 1,989 Patients attended the Casualty Department, an increase of 304.

The number of Patients treated in the Wards as a result of Motor Accidents amounted to 56, a decrease of 12. The total number of accident cases admitted was 174.

FINANCE.

We are happy to be able to report a most satisfactory financial year in that the ordinary Income exceeded the ordinary Expenditure by a sum of £162 18s. 9d. against a deficit, during 1935, of £471 0s. 8d.

The ordinary Income amounted to £8,672 2s. 7d., an increase of £872. The headings showing increases were Subscriptions and Donations, Hospital Saving Association, Hospital Saturday and Sunday Funds, Employers' Contribution Fund, and X-Ray fees.

The late Miss Louisa Lye's legacy of £100 for general purposes was placed to the Maintenance Account, which, with the addition of the year's credit balance now stands at £983 12s. 3d., a most satisfactory feature of the Balance Sheet.

We were pleased to receive a Donation of £60 from the Dunstable Hospital Fund and a further £100 was received just after the end of the year.

The Hospital also received half the proceeds of Alexandra Rose Day, a sum of £156 14s. 7d.

Expenditure amounted to £8,509 3s. 10d., the increase of £237 16s. 9d. being chiefly as a result of increased expenditure on Provisions, Salaries and Wages, X-Ray Department and Establishment, Renewals and Repairs.

Taking into consideration the fact that an appeal for funds for Capital purposes must always be detrimental to ordinary income, the Committee feel quite satisfied with the general Financial position.

PRIVATE WARDS.

During the year, 281 Patients were admitted to the Private Wards, a decrease of 15 on 1935. The average length of stay was only 14.16 days, against 16.12 days, and the average number of Patients resident daily, 10.87, against 13.16. As a result of this the Income, which amounted to £3,264 4s. 0d., shows a reduction of £568.

Expenditure amounted to £3,699 3s. 6d., a decrease of £123 17s. 5d., and the year closed with a deficit of £434 19s. 6d.

LUTON AND DISTRICT HOSPITAL'S CONTRIBUTORY FUND.

Again, the most outstanding item in the Income account for the year is the amount received from the above scheme which is worked in conjunction with the Hospital Saving Association. The total sum received last year was £2,378 15s. 7d., an increase of £765 over 1935. This magnificent help is warmly appreciated by the

Committee who desire to express their gratitude to the Group Secretaries for the enormous amount of work they do on behalf of this scheme.

The membership increased from 14,000 in January to over 17,000 in December.

HOSPITAL SATURDAY FUND.

Another gratifying item is the amount received for the Hospital Saturday Fund, the total of £1,098 13s. 5d., being an increase of £144 10s. 5d. No twelve weeks' collection was held in the factories last year, but the Flag Day realised £570, an increase of nearly £200 over 1935. We record our appreciation of the help so willingly given to this effort by many organisers and collectors.

HOSPITAL SUNDAY FUND.

The Hospital Sunday collections amounted to £126 11s. 4d., an increase of £13. There has now been some re-organisation of this Fund and the Committee look forward to a still more substantial increase during 1937. Grateful thanks are due to the Honorary Secretary, Mr. A. Plummer, and the Committee for their efforts.

POUND DAY AND EGG WEEK.

Matron's Pound Day realised 19,560 pounds of goods and £58 12s. 5d. in cash. This is less than the previous year, but in view of the many other efforts being made in connection with the appeal it must be regarded as most satisfactory and is certainly a great help to the Hospital.

During Egg Week 5,767 eggs were received, a most useful collection. Once again the Committee would like to express their gratitude to Teachers and Scholars in Luton and District who do so much for these efforts.

LINEN LEAGUE.

The Linen League has suffered a great loss during the year by the resignation of Miss Williams, its Secretary, who has been its mainstay for many years. The warm thanks of the Committee are due to Miss Williams for the time and effort she has put in over a long period. We are glad to be able to report that Mrs. H. Crawley Ross Skinner has accepted the Presidency of the Linen League and an Organising Committee, with Miss Redman as Chairman and Miss Pauline Durler as Secretary, has been appointed.

As a result of this we hope the League will continue to give the Hospital the same support received during past years. Matron's working party continues to be of great service to us, and we record our gratitude to all who support these two organisations.

BLOOD TRANSFUSION PANEL.

The Blood Transfusion Service has again more than justified its inception and 27 transfusions were carried out during the year. The Committee join with the recipients and their relatives in thanking all the members of the Panel. This is a splendid and valuable service.

MANAGEMENT RE-ORGANISATION.

During the year a certain amount of re-organisation of the Management has been achieved. Six additional members have been co-opted on to the Management Committee and a Finance Committee of six members has been formed to deal, under the Management Committee, with the financial affairs of the Hospital. We are satisfied that the steps taken in this direction will prove to be of value and will assist the cause of the Hospital in no small measure.

INDUSTRIAL SAFETY ASSOCIATION.

We are pleased to report that the above Association continues to take an active interest in the work of the Hospital. The Employers' Contribution Fund shows a further increase and the Association is assisting the Appeal Fund in a generous manner.

SERVICES TO THE HOSPITAL.

Once again we are glad to express our deep appreciation of the work of our Honorary Medical and Consulting Staff and the loyal services of Miss M. E. Redman, the Matron, and her Staff.

We are also grateful to the Honorary Solicitor, Mr. Carnley, and the Honorary Auditors, Messrs. Godfrey Laws and Company. The work attached to both these appointments has grown considerably.

Our gratitude is also due to the Local Press for the valuable publicity they give so willingly on many occasions.

ACKNOWLEDGMENTS.

During the past year we have made many demands on the Public and their unfailing generosity is encouraging.

The Library Service, provided by the Central Library, has been continued throughout the year and is a source of pleasure to both Patients and Staff.

Thanks are also due to members of the Clergy and Ministers who have taken services in the Wards regularly during 1936, and to the Luton Rotary Club for continuing the Transport Service.

To all who have assisted the Hospital by way of gifts or personal service, the Committee extend their warmest thanks.



Towards a New Hospital

IT is only a little over three years since, at a meeting of the Management Committee, it was urged that the present site of the Hospital was no longer adequate for further extension and that a new site should be acquired on which to build an up-to-date Hospital capable of serving the needs of this growing Town; by the time this Report is published work will have already commenced on the Hospital visualised at that time.

These three years have seen great activity; side by side with the growing work of the present Hospital, the increasing expenditure and the onerous task of raising income to meet it, Committees have been at work, creating with the Architects the plans for the new Hospital and raising funds with which to build it.

It was only after long and serious consideration that the Committee finally decided to sell the present land and buildings to the County Council and after fifty years, once more find a new site on which to build a Hospital large enough to meet the demands of a rapidly growing population and capable of extension in the future.

Having made this decision a site was purchased at the junction of Lewsey Lane and Dunstable Road, Mr. S. C. Parrott and Mr. P. Dunham were appointed Architects and a Committee appointed to co-operate with them in the preparation of Plans.

After many months work, during which the Architects and the Committee visited new Hospitals up and down the Country, the plans were completed and approved; they incorporate much that is best in modern hospital planning and construction and when it is completed Luton will have a Hospital which is a model of its type and of which it may well be proud.

In its appeal for Funds the Hospital has been fortunate in having splendid leadership.

An appeal for £100,000 was initiated in 1935 by the then Mayor, Alderman J. T. Harrison. It was continued by his successor in office, Alderman C. C. Dillingham, and in 1936 Alderman J. H. Staddon launched his Special Appeal with most generous support from Lady Ludlow, Sir Harold Wernher and Lt.-Col. Harold Green.

Although a great deal more money is still required if the New Hospital is to be opened free of debt, Luton has responded to the Appeal with its traditional generosity.

Many thousand of its weekly wage earners are giving one penny per week for two years.

The Firms in the Industrial Safety Association have organised their own scheme which is expected to yield £16,000.

The Women's Effort, under the Leadership of Lady Keens, has received widespread support and will result in a useful contribution to the Appeal Fund.

Donations from firms and individuals have reached the total of £21,465 5s. 7d., and innumerable people have organised special efforts of all kinds for the benefit of the Appeal.

The Buckingham Charity Fund of Dunstable, under a scheme sanctioned by Act of Parliament, is being placed to the Funds, and the Mayor of Dunstable is to launch a separate appeal in his borough, the population of which will be served by the New Hospital.

For all this support the Committee are profoundly grateful; now that the walls of the New Hospital are rising it is confidently hoped that efforts will be re-doubled, that those who have not given will quickly do so, and that those who have already given will consider whether they can help still further this high enterprise.

Luton is famous for many things, not least its prosperity. The New Hospital will add to the Town's already high prestige, but how much more so if it can be said when the last brick is laid that every penny of its total cost has been met by voluntary support.








The Architects' perspective drawing of the New Hospital.




