REPORT.

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER, 1938.

The Board of Governors have pleasure in presenting the Annual Report and Statement of Accounts for the year ended 31st December, 1938, and take this opportunity of conveying to the numerous friends and subscribers of the Hospital their sincere appreciation of, and gratitude for, the splendid and encouraging support which has been received during the year.

OBITUARY.

Since the close of the year, the Hospital has sustained a loss by the passing of Mr. Brittain Adams. Mr. Adams was a member of the Finance Committee and the General Purposes Committee and Chairman of the Nursing Committee and by his death the Hospital has lost a most useful member of the Board of Governors.

Another passing greatly regretted was that of Mrs. Thomas Leicester of Stone. Mrs. Leicester always took a keen interest in the welfare of the Hospital and her support was much appreciated.

To the families of these friends, the Board of Governors extend their regret and sympathy.

RESIGNATIONS AND APPOINTMENTS.

1. MR WILLIAM RHODES.

The resignation of Mr. William Rhodes for reasons of health was received in March with very great regret. Mr. Rhodes was Chairman of the Hospital from 1925 to 1931 and his valuable work during this period is well remembered and much appreciated.

2. ALDERMAN SIR FRED HAYWARD, J.P.

Alderman Sir Fred Hayward, J.P., Chairman of the Board of Governors, was unanimously elected a life Governor in the place of Mr. Rhodes.

3. MR. HAROLD HARTLEY, F.R.C.S.

Mr. Hartley resigned his position on the Hospital Staff in March. He was the Senior Honorary Surgeon and had served the Hospital faithfully and well since 1905. An appreciation of his devoted service has been placed on record and he has been elected an Honorary Consulting Surgeon.

Mr. John Grocott, M.B., F.R.C.S., was elected to succeed Mr. Hartley.

The work of the Ladies' House Committee and of the Burslem and Tunstall Linen Guilds continues unabated and with very great usefulness.

NORTH STAFFS. VOLUNTARY HOSPITALS CONTRIBUTORY ASSOCIATION.

The hope expressed in the last report that the operation of this New Scheme on the 1st January, 1938, would help to improve the finances of the local Voluntary Hospitals has been justified.

Figures relative to the first year's working show that this Hospital's proportion of the total amount collected amounted to £6,847 13 6, which is considered very satisfactory, and we are looking forward to this figure being increased in future years.

PAYMENT OF MEDICAL STAFFS.

During the year, we, along with the other Voluntary Hospitals in the City, received a communication from the Honorary Staffs of the Hospitals relative to the proposals of the British Hospitals Association and the British Medical Association for some payment to be made for the services rendered to the four Local Hospitals and arising therefrom, representatives of the four local Hospitals were appointed to meet and discuss the matter with the Medical Staffs and several meetings have taken place. No final decision has been reached at the time of preparing this report, but it is expected that some agreement will be come to, whereby the Honorary Staffs will receive some recognition of their services but not in the form of direct payment. It is understood that the scheme, if and when approved, would commence to operate from the 1st January, 1940.

NEW NURSES' HOME.

During the year the plans for the proposed new Nurses' Home were approved and the tender of Messrs. H. Brereton & Son of Tunstall for the building of it, accepted, and it is anticipated that by the time this report is issued, the Home will actually be in use. Every care and attention has been given to make this a Home in the true sense of the word and to be of the utmost possible benefit for our Nurses.

With regard to the raising of the estimated cost of £10,000, it was agreed that a Bazaar should be held on March 16th, 17th and 18th, 1939, and it will be readily understood that this has

involved numerous activities, in which all the friends of the Hospital joined enthusiastically. The success of the Bazaar seems to be assured, and the Governors look forward to being able to open the Home free of debt. The Board of Governors much appreciates the valuable help of Mr. James Cadman, D.S.C., D.L., in acting as President of this effort.

NEW NURSES' HOME. STONE LAYING CEREMONY.

The Stone Laying Ceremony for the New Nurses' Home took place on Thursday, June 23rd, when stones were laid by The Rt. Hon. Lord Cadman of Silverdale, G.C.M.G., etc.

The ceremony which was presided over by the Chairman of the Board of Governors, Alderman Sir Fred Hayward, J.P., proved to be very interesting and enjoyable and the Governors are indebted to the Stone Layers for their generous donations.

NEW PRIVATE AND MATERNITY BLOCKS.

One of the most important developments during the year was the decision to build a New Private Block containing 21 beds and a New Maternity Block of 8 beds, at an estimated cost of £30,000. A special Sub-Committee was appointed to examine this proposal thoroughly and after very careful discussion and consideration the scheme was recommended for the approval of the Governors which was duly received. It is felt that the provision of these two blocks will meet a long-felt need, and in addition to providing really up-to-date Private Accommodation, an important consideration is that the 12 beds at present being used for Private Patients will be released for the use of the General Public. In view of the fact that the existing wards are taxed to the utmost of their capacity, this will be very valuable.

It is proposed that the capital required for the building and equipment of these blocks shall be raised by means of a loan which will be floated and which would bear interest at the rate of $4\frac{1}{2}\%$. It is felt that it will be appreciated that this is a good investment and it is not anticipated that any great difficulty will be experienced in raising the required amount.

Contracts for the erection of these two blocks have been entered into, and it is expected they will be available for occupation in approximately fifteen months time.

Further particulars will be issued shortly and any information required can be obtained from the Secretary.

AIR RAID PRECAUTIONS.

A General Survey of the existing Hospital facilities of the Country and the possibility of their expansion in the event of a National Emergency was undertaken by the Ministry of Health and a return in relation to this Hospital was submitted.

Also during the crisis a number of provisions were made at the Hospital in case of emergency and the question generally of Air Raid Precautions is being studied by the General Purposes Committee in conjunction with several handbooks which are being issued by the Ministry of Health in relation to this subject.

DISPENSER.

In view of the increasing work of the Hospital it became necessary to appoint a full-time Dispenser for the dispensing of Drugs and also to assist in the registration of Out-Patients.

NURSING STAFF SALARIES.

The Salaries of the Nursing Staff were revised during the year and brought into conformity with the scale laid down by the College of Nursing.

WHIST CHAMPIONSHIP COMMITTEE.

The Whist Championship Committee, under the Chairmanship of Mr. H. Maskrey, continues to do splendid work. At their Annual Meeting the sum of £850 resulting from the efforts of the 1937-38 Season was presented to the Governors, making a total since 1933 of £4175.

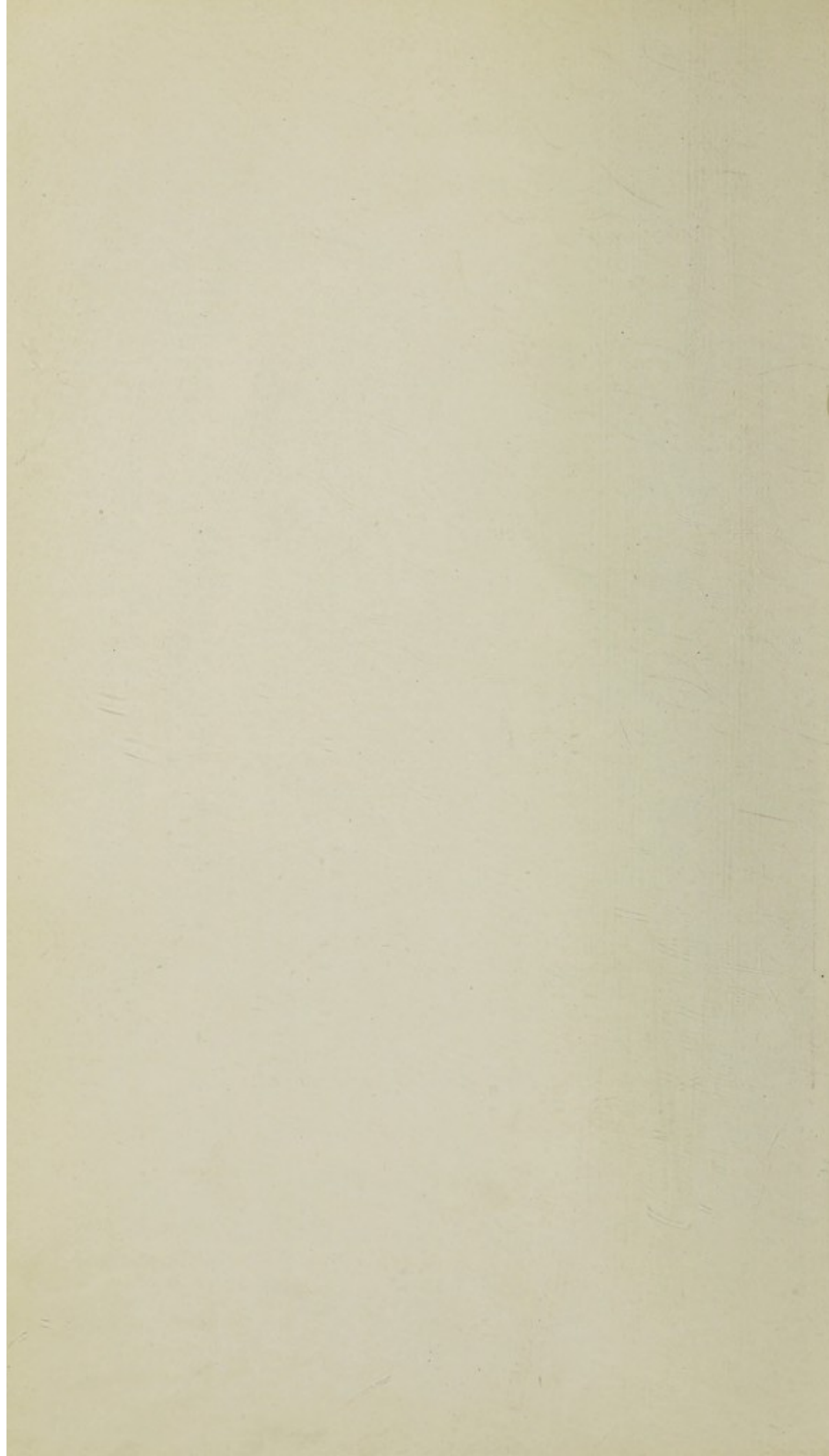

REPORT OF ANNUAL MEETING OF BOARD OF GOVERNORS

HELD IN THE BOARD ROOM ON FRIDAY, MARCH 31st, 1939.

(*vide "Sentinel," 1st April, 1939*).

A satisfactory financial position was reported at the Annual Meeting of the Board of Governors of the Burslem Haywood and Tunstall War Memorial Hospital yesterday.

The hearty thanks of the Governors were accorded to those supporters of the Hospital who worked at the recent bazaar in aid of the new Nurses' Home.

Alderman Sir Fred Hayward (Chairman of the Governors) presided and those present were Mr. Joseph Cope (Vice-Chairman), Mr. T. Aubrey Jones, Prebendary J. G. Hamlet, Mr. G. Keen, Mr. H. J. Crofts, Mr. Arthur Durose, Dr. S. King Alcock, Dr. J. W. Richmond, Mr. G. Dutton, Mr. T. C. Maynard, Alderman G. H. Barber, Mr. G. F. Barber, Alderman Mrs. Henry Wood, Mr. J. Jack, Mrs. W. E. Robinson, Mrs. E. Hodgson Todd, and Mr. C. E. Lowndes, Secretary.

CHEQUE PRESENTED.

Before the meeting, as briefly reported in the *Sentinel* yesterday, Mr. F. T. Chesworth, on behalf of employees of Sneyd Collieries Ltd., presented the Hospital with a cheque for £150, the result of the recent effort arranged by the employees. He was accompanied by Mr. Simpson and Mr. Skane, the Joint Secretaries of the effort.

The cheque was received by Sir Fred Hayward, who thanked the employees of Sneyd Collieries Ltd. for their constant efforts on behalf of the Hospital.

Reference to the death of Mr. Brittain Adams, a life Governor of the Hospital, was made by Sir Fred Hayward, and the members of the Board stood in silence in memory of Mr. Brittain Adams. It was decided to send a message of sympathy to Mr. Brittain Adams' family.

Sir Fred Hayward as Chairman, Mr. Joseph Cope as Vice-Chairman, and Messrs. J. Paterson Brodie and Son as Auditors, were re-elected unanimously.

The following five additional Governors were re-elected :— Mr. H. J. Crofts, Prebendary J. G. Hamlet, Mr. H. Maskrey, Mr. T. C. Maynard and Mr. Percy Owen ; and it was announced that the following representative Governors had been nominated by the Stoke-on-Trent City Council ; Alderman A. Lockett, Alderman H. W. McBrine, Alderman Mrs. Henry Wood, Coun. G. F. Barber and Coun. H. Bancroft.

TRIBUTE TO STAFF.

CONTINUED DEVELOPMENT OF HOSPITAL SERVICES.

Moving the adoption of the Annual Report and Statement of accounts—published in the *Sentinel* yesterday—Sir Fred Hayward said they could congratulate themselves on the satisfactory manner in which the work of the Hospital had been conducted. The staff had worked loyally, and there had not been a solitary complaint against them.

Proof of the need of the Hospital in the area at the present time was given in the fact that although there were only 40 beds in the four public adult wards, the average occupation during the year had been 44. That was an indication of the way in which the Hospital had been developed, and showed the confidence of people in the northern end of the City in the Hospital.

Sir Fred paid tribute to the work of Mr. Hartley, one of the honorary surgeons, who had retired during the year, and said that Mr. John Grocott had been appointed to succeed him.

Referring to the financial side, Sir Fred Hayward said that the income had exceeded the expenditure, but it should be kept in mind that they had received a donation of £1,000, which probably would not be repeated in future years.

LADIES' WORK.

Sir Fred paid tribute to the way in which the Hospital had been supported by ladies throughout the district, and mentioned the magnificent result of the bazaar in aid of the new Nurses' Home.

Giving further statistics, Sir Fred said that in the In-patient Department there had been 1,137 admissions, 625 major operations, and the average stay per patient was 18.5 days. In the Out-patient Department the 6,512 patients had made 28,808 attendances. There had been 3,563 patients making 5,003 attendances in the X-Ray Department.

Mr. Cope, seconding the adoption of the report and balance sheet expressed the appreciation of the Governors to all who had helped to achieve the wonderful result at the bazaar. He mentioned that it was hoped the total sum realised would be £11,000.

The report and balance sheet were approved.

DEDICATED BEDS AND COTS

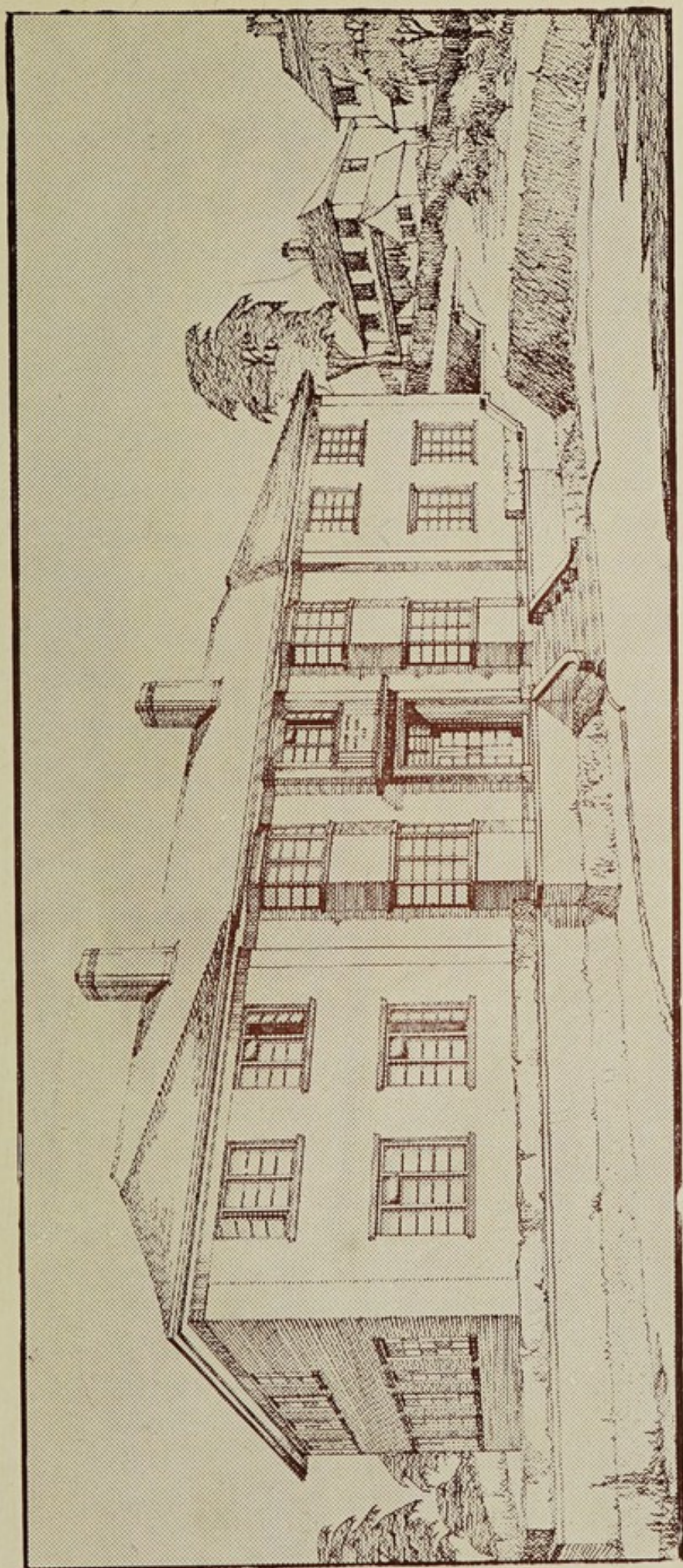
It would be difficult to suggest a better or more fitting memorial than a dedicated bed or cot.

RULES AND TERMS FOR PRIVATE PATIENTS.

1.—ADMISSION.

Private Patients can only be admitted by arrangement with a Member of the Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff of the Hospital and for treatment by such a Member.

Where in exceptional circumstances a patient is admitted without previous arrangements having been made, he or she will be placed under the care of the Honorary Physician or Surgeon on duty, who will charge for professional services.

Mental, Infectious or Maternity cases (unless Cæsarean section is needed) cannot be admitted.

Persons not in touch with Members of the Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff may make application to the Secretary or the Matron regarding admission.

2.—SCALE OF HOSPITAL CHARGES.

Single bedded room	£6	6	0 per week.
Double bedded room	£4	4	0 per week.

ACCOMMODATION AVAILABLE.

- 3 Rooms with single beds.
- 4 Rooms with two beds.

Should a single bed room be desired and is not available at the time, a double bed room may be reserved, if available, as a single bed room at a charge of £7 7 0 per week.

These charges cover maintenance, dressings, ordinary Hospital attendance and nursing, and the use of the Operating Theatre.

Extra charges will be made for :—

- (i) Special Nurses—£2 12 6 weekly.
- (ii) Stimulants and Special Preparations.
- (iii) X-Ray Examinations.
- (iv) Pathological Reports or Treatment.
- (v) Massage Treatment.

RULES AND TERMS FOR PRIVATE PATIENTS—*Continued.*

Weekly accounts will be presented ; cheques should be crossed and made payable to the Hospital.

The day of admission and the day of discharge are reckoned as one day.

3.—PROFESSIONAL FEES.

Patients will make their own arrangements for the payment of all professional fees directly with the Member of the Honorary Medical or Surgical Staff in charge of the case.

Additional fees will be payable for the services of an Anæsthetist or other Member of the Honorary Medical or Surgical Staff.

4.—VISITORS.

Visitors are allowed between the hours of 2 p.m. and 3-30 p.m., and between 6 p.m. and 7-30 p.m., or as arranged with the Matron. Not more than two visitors shall be allowed to each patient at one time and the visiting hours must be strictly kept.

Visitors are requested to obtain the permission of the Nurse in charge before entering the room.

Except in special conditions, children under the age of 12 years will not be allowed to visit.

5.—GENERAL.

Patients are requested to provide a proper change of linen, hair brush and comb, tooth brush and dressing gown.

Personal linen should be plainly marked and patients will make their own arrangements for personal laundry.

Responsibility cannot be accepted for the safe custody of valuables.

RULES.

1. No person shall be eligible for admission as an in-patient or for treatment as an out-patient whose circumstances, in the opinion of the Governors, enable him to pay for such suitable medical treatment as his condition requires.
2. No lunatic and no person suffering from any form of contagious or infectious disease, confirmed consumption, ulcerated legs of long standing, cancer (not admitting of operation), puerperal fever, or any incurable disease, no female far advanced in pregnancy (unless Cæsarean section is needed), may be admitted as an in-patient ; or if inadvertently admitted, be allowed to remain, if removal be practicable without risk to the patient.
3. No patient shall be allowed to remain in the hospital more than two months without the consent of the Governors, which shall only be given in special circumstances.
4. It is absolutely necessary before sending a case for admission to ascertain (stating the sex and nature of the case) if there be a vacancy for the patient.
5. It is requested that subscribers will direct the in-patients to be sent as clean as possible and with a proper change of linen, a hair brush and comb, and a knife, fork and spoon.
6. No one shall be admitted or allowed to remain as an in-patient whose case may be properly relieved as an out-patient.
7. Accidents and cases of great urgency are treated, and, if necessary, admitted without a recommendation, but the needed recommendation must be obtained afterwards. All other cases must be recommended by a subscriber.
8. No recommendation (whether for an in-patient or out-patient) shall be available for more than two months without renewal.
9. Visiting Days.—Thursday and Saturday from 2-30 till 4-0 in the afternoon. Children's Ward, Saturday only 2-30 to 3-30. Children under 14 are not allowed to visit patients.

OUT-PATIENTS' DEPARTMENT

The Out-Patient Department is conducted as a series of Consultative Clinics.

Patients on admission will be required to produce the usual recommendation, together with a letter from their own doctor stating the nature of the case and their requirements, addressed to the appropriate department.

The patients will return to their own doctors for treatment where possible. Should hospital treatment, either in- or out-patient be required, this will be carried on after consultation with their own doctor, who will be communicated with by the Honorary in charge of all cases.

All fracture cases may be sent direct to the X-Ray Department any morning other than Sunday at 9 a.m.

must be sent to the appropriate out-patient department, either medical or surgical, at the times stated for those Clinics.

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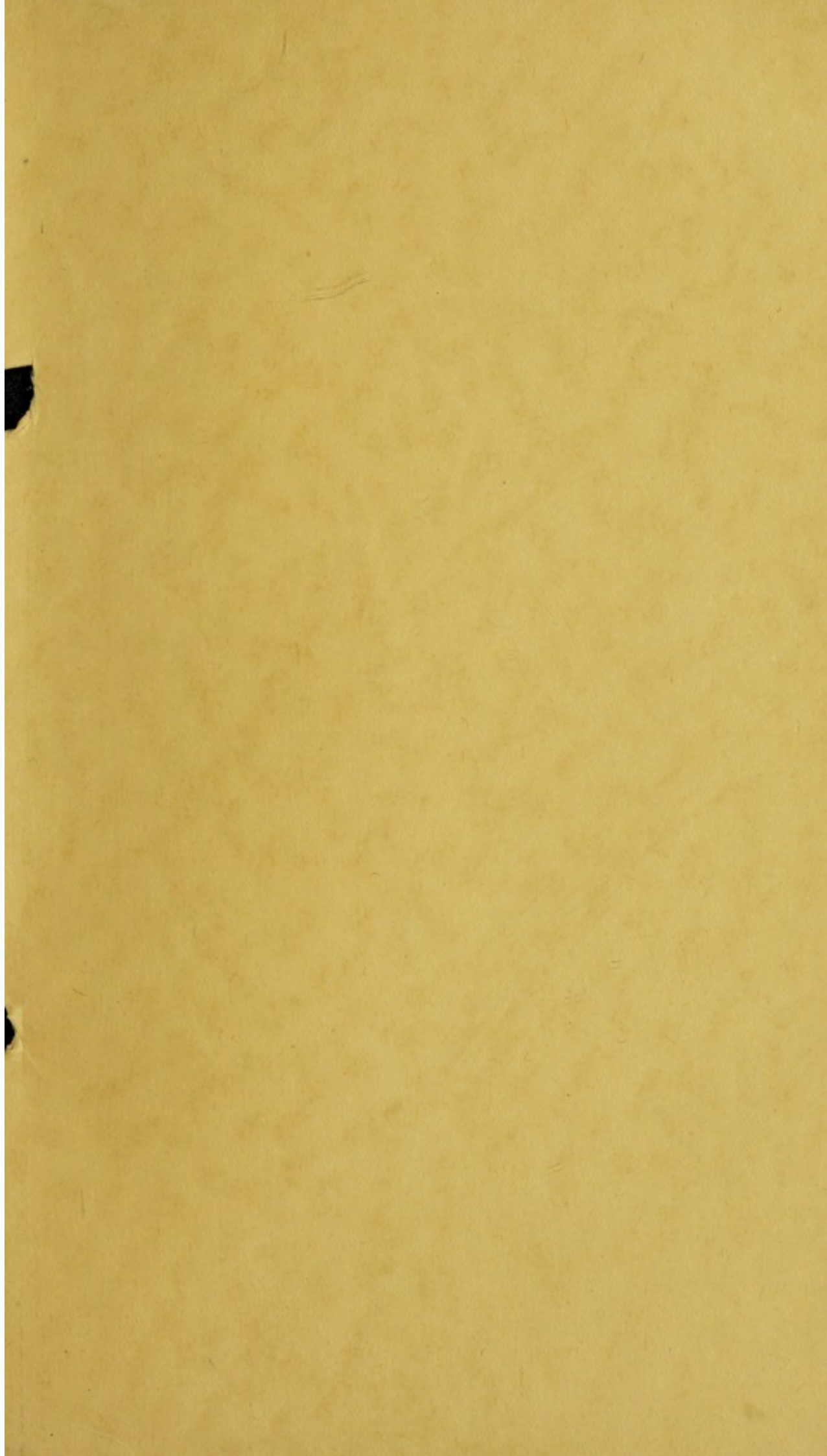
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
