REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st DECEMBER, 1940.

The Board of Governors has pleasure in presenting the Annual Report and Statement of Accounts for the year ended the 31st December, 1940.

OBITUARY.

It is with deep regret that the death of Mr. William Rhodes is recorded. He was Chairman of the Hospital during 1925-1930 and took a very great interest and played an active part in its management and general welfare.

The death of Mr. W. H. Abberley, who was our Honorary Solicitor, also deprived the Hospital not only of a trusted legal advisor but of a very true friend.

APPOINTMENT OF CHAIRMAN.

Following the regretted resignation of Sir Fred Hayward owing to ill health, Mr. Jos. Cope, J.P., of Tunstall, was unanimously appointed Chairman of the Board of Governors at the last Annual Meeting.

At the time of his appointment Mr. Cope was a patient in the Hospital, but we are glad to say that he completely recovered and was able to take up office during the year. Prior to this he had occupied the position of Vice-Chairman for five years, in which capacity he rendered very valuable service. It is also pleasing to record that during the year Mr. Cope was appointed a Justice of the Peace, and the congratulations of the Board were duly extended to him.

RESIGNATION AND APPOINTMENT.

Mr. T. C. Maynard resigned as a Governor consequent upon his leaving the district, and this resignation was accepted with regret.

It is with very great pleasure that we record the appointment of Mr. James Cadman, D.S.C., D.L., of Walton Hall, Eccleshall, to fill this vacancy. For many years Mr. Cadman, has been a good friend of the Hospital and has helped in many ways; his Presidency of the Nurses' Home Bazaar, when over £11,000 was raised, will be well remembered. The Board looks forward with keenness to having the benefit of his co-operation and advice.

HONORARY STAFF.

Once again the Board desire to express their gratitude for the valuable service which is given by the Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff, and also to Messrs. Abberley & Walker, our Honorary Solicitors.

THE "SENTINEL."

Thanks are due to the Editor and Staff of the "Evening Sentinel" for the support which is so readily and effectively given on all occasions.

GENERAL REVIEW.

In attempting any review of the work of the year, one is immediately conscious of the part played by the war in the life of the Hospital generally. Fortunately, there has been no influx of casualties and we are thankful to record our immunity from the effects of Air Raids, although on one or two occasions bombs have been dropped uncomfortably near and a small number of victims have been treated at the Hospital.

A considerable amount of time and labour has been necessitated, however, in the provision of such things as an adequate blackout, general air-raid shelters and sleeping shelters for the Nursing and Domestic Staffs. A scheme for the structural protection of the Hospital has been carried out in conjunction with the Ministry of Health, and arrangements for fire watching and fighting have been made which have received the approval of the Local Authorities.

It is perhaps invidious to single out names, but one is compelled to acknowledge the very valuable advice and service given by Mr. Arthur Durose, Chairman of the General Purposes Committee, in connection with these matters. Mention should also be made of the volunteer fire watchers who came forward in response to an appeal, and for the last eight months have slept at the Hospital one night per week ready for duty, in addition to taking other turns of watching in the evenings and at week-ends, and attending for stirrup-pump rehearsals, lectures, etc. The Hospital is now covered for the whole 24 hours each day, and sincere gratitude is due to these men and to the members of our day staff who willingly serve in this way.

Food rationing has also presented its problems and credit is due to the Matron for the varied diets and good wholesome food which has been available both for Patients and Staff in spite of this difficulty.

Notwithstanding these additional and troublesome problems created by the war, the work of the Hospital has gone steadily forward and its services have been maintained. As will be seen from the statistics on page 16, there has been no great fluctuation in the number of Patients dealt with and these figures disclose, in a matter of fact way, the useful amount of work done by all sections of the Hospital

during the year. One rather interesting point is that more letters than ever were received from Patients who had left the Hospital expressing appreciation of the skill and care which had been shown to them.

The future is, of course, unknown, but we are ready and fully prepared to serve the community, and are quietly confident of our ability to deal with any emergency.

FINANCE.

During the year the ordinary Income decreased by £1,014 2s. 8d., and ordinary Expenditure by £397 0s. 11d.

The Income has been chiefly affected by two items—(i) the fall in the amount received from the Whist Championship Committee from £1,000 in 1939 to £575 in 1940. The work of this Committee has been worse hit than any other as a result of the war and the consequent closing of many of its avenues of income. Steps were initiated in 1940 by the Lord Mayor of the City (Ald. W. A. Holdcroft) to reduce this deficit, and we are hoping that the efforts made under his patronage will realise the amount of the deficit. (ii) The amount available from the Contributory Association is less by £492 9s. 0d. after making a deduction of £420, the Hospital's share of the Medical Staff Endowment Fund.

The amount received from the Churches totalling £34 18s. 0d. is rather disappointing. It is felt that if all the Churches in the Northern end of the City were to organise some form of Hospital effort during the year, as is done in most other districts, a considerably larger sum would be available. There is surely, a link between the work of a Church and that of a Hospital, and a move in the direction indicated would probably benefit both.

The reduction in expenditure is pleasing and is due to economical management, and a close watch being kept on all avenues of expense. A continuation of this reduction, however, is not to be expected. As the Chairman of a large Scottish Hospital said recently, "We are doing everything we can to keep costs down but we cannot control prices." The advent of the Purchase Tax is a serious matter. On drugs the least plusage is 16·2/3%, while some carry a tax of 33·1/3%. The prices of foodstuffs are appreciably higher than pre-war when we were able to enter into very advantageous contracts. Meat prices for example are doubled, although, of course, not so much is obtainable by reason of rationing; the price of fuel has advanced and also many other commodities; wage increases have had to be given to certain sections of the Staff to enable them to bear

the effect of rising prices. Moreover, in 1941, an order has already been placed for better sterilizing equipment—a very necessary factor—to the approximate cost of £320, and a certain amount of renovation and cleaning down is very necessary.

While the financial position for 1940, indicating a deficiency of £322 9s. 7d. is not alarming, it is apparent that during the present year strenuous efforts will be necessary in order to maintain the efficient Hospital service which we are now providing without incurring a substantial loss. Increasing costs make an increased income essential, and to this end we solicit the generous support of all sections of the community.

NEW PRIVATE MATERNITY BLOCK.

This block was opened for the reception of Patients in May. Eight single rooms are provided together with all the most modern facilities, the charge for which is £6 6s. 0d. per week. An encouraging start has been made and it is pleasant to hear the appreciation expressed by the visiting Doctors of the amenities, equipment and service provided.

SIR FRED HAYWARD.

On Tuesday, the 10th December, a photograph of Sir Fred Hayward was unveiled in the Boardroom by Mr. Jos. Cope, Chairman of the Hospital, as a tribute to Sir Fred's distinguished service to the Hospital over a period of 24 years, and particularly his Chairmanship during the years 1931–1940.

A representative gathering included the Lord Mayor of the City (Councillor A. E. Hewitt, M.C., J.P.) Lady Hayward, Mr. E. N. Scott (Editor of the "Sentinel"), Dr. S. King Alcock, Chairman of the Medical Board, together with the Governors, Medical Board, the House Committee, and other friends.

All the speakers were unanimous in their appreciation of the foresight and ability which Sir Fred had brought to bear in the discharge of his duties as Hospital Chairman and also in the municipal affairs of the City.

GARDEN.

1940 was the first year in which we tried to grow produce of our own, and just over an acre of land was cultivated for this purpose. It was very useful to be able to obtain greenstuffs of our own, particularly at the prices prevailing, and the tomato plants yielded approximately 200 lbs. of very fine tomatoes. Better results still are anticipated this year as the outcome of the experience gained in our first attempt.

WHIST CHAMPIONSHIP COMMITTEE.

As mentioned elsewhere, the activities of this Committee have been affected more seriously than that of any other as a result of the War. The spirit of the Committee is excellent and it only needs better times for its full value to be evidenced once again. The Governors are grateful to Mr. Maskery, the Chairman, and to all members for their splendid efforts under difficult conditions.

LADIES' COMMITTEES.

The very valuable work performed so consistently by the Ladies' House Committee and the Burslem and Tunstall Linen Guilds is much appreciated by the Governors. Egg Week resulted in the collection of 10,500 eggs and £13 16s. 2d. in cash, whilst Pound Day realised over £40 in value. The amount of goods supplied by the respective Linen Guilds was as follows:—

Burslem	£171
Tunstall	£60

In addition mention should be made of a special gift by the Tunstall Section of sheeting and blankets to the approximate value of £100. Burslem also came along with some "extras" and the devoted service of the ladies of our Linen Guilds is a valuable asset to the Hospital.

THE NORTH STAFFS. VOLUNTARY HOSPITALS CONTRIBUTORY ASSOCIATION.

The amount received from the Scheme in 1940 was £7,977 11s., out of which £420 has to be paid for the Hospital's quota towards the Honorary Medical Staffs. Endowment Fund, which leaves a net figure of £7,557 11s. 0d. as compared with £8,050 in 1939.

The total amount distributed to the four associated Hospitals was £69,370 as against £70,000 in 1939.

The continued success of the scheme is very gratifying as is also the fact that the cost of administration was only 1.78%.

HOSPITAL CHAPLAINS.

The Governors would like to express their appreciation of the services rendered by the Rev. Harry Baylis, M.A., of St. Werburgh's Church, Burslem, and the Ministers of the Free Churches. Services are held at the Hospital each week and are much appreciated both by Patients and Staff.

ROTA COMMITTEE.

The Rota Committee continues its valuable service to the Hospital by sending representatives to attend on each visiting day and in addition organising a number of efforts to raise funds. The box collections have shown an appreciable improvement since this system was inaugurated, and the Governors are very grateful.

GIFTS AND VOLUNTARY SERVICES.

Owing to the need for economy particularly in the use of paper, it is not possible to include all the detailed list of gifts which have appeared previously, nor to acknowledge the large amount of voluntary service which has been so willingly rendered. The Governors wish to assure all their friends, however, that their gratitude is none the less sincere and they hope that this general expression of appreciation will be accepted.

Report of Annual Meeting of Board of Governors

HELD IN THE BOARD ROOM ON TUESDAY, MARCH 11TH, 1941.

(vide *Sentinel*, 12th March, 1941).

Mr. Cope was unanimously re-elected Chairman of the Governors, on the proposition of Alderman Sir Fred Hayward, J.P., Chairman of the Finance Committee.

Moving the adoption of the Hospital's Annual Report and Statement of Accounts, Mr. Cope said that the past year had been a very difficult period for the Hospital. The difficulties had resulted mainly from wartime conditions. Measures had to be taken for meeting any emergency conditions for safeguarding the Hospital and its staff and patients, and also for meeting food rationing regulations. As a contribution to the war effort, a dig-for-victory scheme was started last year, and a useful supply of vegetables was provided for the Hospital.

FINANCIAL POSITION.

Summarising the accounts, Mr. Cope said that income was down by slightly more than £1,000, and expenditure was also reduced by over £400. Two main items contributed to the reduced income—a reduction of £425 on the Whist Championship effort, and £492 less from the Contributory Association. The Governors had carefully watched expenditure, and, while the utmost possible economy had been observed, the efficiency of the Hospital's services had not been impaired. It would be generally agreed that it would be false economy to reduce expenditure at the expense of efficiency.

The cost of foodstuffs and materials, however, was increasing, and the Purchase Tax on drugs also had to be borne by the Hospital.

PURCHASE TAX.

This tax (continued Mr. Cope) ranges from 16 $\frac{2}{3}$ per cent to 33 $\frac{1}{3}$ per cent. It seems to me to be rather iniquitous, in times like the present, to impose such a tax. If the object is to raise revenue, it is a rather deplorable method to use; and if it is aimed at curtailing the use of essential healing commodities, it is even worse. If it applied only to imported drugs one could see some justification for the tax, but to impose it on home-produced drugs, essential to hospital services, is an unwarrantable additional burden on hospital administration.

VOLUNTARY HELP.

FULLEST MEASURE OF SUPPORT NEEDED.

Mr Cope said that the expenses in the present year were likely to be heavier than in 1940, and he appealed for help from the Hospital's many supporters in maintaining the existing services.

It was estimated that a sum of £15,000 would be required to meet this year's ordinary expenditure—twice the amount which was likely to be received from the Contributory Scheme. As had previously been emphasised, the Contributory Scheme by no means solved the Haywood Hospital's financial problems, and the fact that twice as much was needed as was received from that source clearly illustrated the position. It was essential that the fullest possible measure of voluntary support and effort should be forthcoming to bridge the financial gap.

YEAR'S WORK.

Mr. Cope said that the Haywood had been able to maintain its full services to the local public, despite the provisions made for meeting emergency conditions.

Over 8,000 cases had been dealt with in the casualty department, and over 20,000 attendances had been made by out-patients during the past year. The Hospital had also dealt with 1,188 in-patients, and a total of 1,000 major and minor operations had been performed. In addition, there was the work of the X-ray and Pathological departments.

These figures illustrated the valued work which the Haywood Hospital was performing in the northern end of the City, and the necessity for maintaining its services.

STAFF AND HELPERS.

After thanking the great body of the Hospital's supporters for their continued loyal service and co-operation, Mr. Cope paid a tribute to the work of the Medical and Nursing Staffs, and the Matron (Miss B. Midgley).

He further thanked the Ladies' House Committee, the Burslem and Tunstall Linen Guilds, members of the Whist Championship Committee, and Volunteer Fire-watchers—the latter performing a highly-important, if not spectacular service. He mentioned that the Whist Championship Committee were making special efforts to make good their reduced contribution for last year, and had already raised £300 of the amount concerned.

Thanking the Editor and staff of the *Sentinel* for their "unstinted help and co-operation," Mr. Cope added: "Even in these times, when newsprint is restricted, we find the *Sentinel* as ready and willing as ever to give this Hospital every support and help. That help is greatly appreciated."

SIR FRED HAYWARD.

THE CAUSE OF THE LOCAL HOSPITALS.

Seconding the adoption of the report and accounts, Alderman Sir Fred Hayward said the accounts were far better than he had expected to find them to be. He urged the fullest possible support of the Hospital, as it was now performing a great service, and there would be equal need for its services when the war was over. It was hoped, therefore, that the desired increased measure of support would be forthcoming, as the needs of the Hospital remained constant, and a balance on the wrong side only accentuated the general difficulties of wartime.

Many other calls and appeals were bound to be made for war-time objects, but it was important that the public should not overlook the cause of the local hospitals. Without such hospital services the City would indeed be much the poorer.

The report and accounts were adopted unanimously.

RULES AND TERMS FOR PRIVATE PATIENTS

1.—ADMISSION.

Private Patients can only be admitted by arrangement with a Member of the Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff of the Hospital and for treatment by such a Member.

Where in exceptional circumstances a patient is admitted without previous arrangements having been made, he or she will be placed under the care of the Honorary Physician or Surgeon on duty, who will charge for professional services.

Mental or Infectious cases cannot be admitted.

Persons not in touch with Members of the Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff may make application to the Secretary or the Matron regarding admission.

2.—SCALE OF HOSPITAL CHARGES.

Single bedded room	£6	6	0	per week.
Double bedded room	£4	4	0	per week.

ACCOMMODATION AVAILABLE.

- 3 Rooms with single beds.
- 4 Rooms with two beds.

Should a single bed room be desired and is not available at the time, a double bed room may be reserved, if available, as a single bed room at a charge of £7 7 0 per week.

These charges cover maintenance, dressings, ordinary Hospital attendance and nursing, and the use of the Operating Theatre. Extra charges will be made for :—

- (i) Special Nurses—£2 12 6 weekly.
- (ii) Stimulants and Special Preparations.
- (iii) X-Ray Examinations.
- (iv) Pathological Reports or Treatment.
- (v) Massage Treatment.

All charges are now subject to a plusage of 10%

RULES AND TERMS FOR PRIVATE PATIENTS—*continued.*

Weekly accounts will be presented; cheques should be crossed and made payable to the Hospital.

The day of admission and the day of discharge are reckoned as one day.

3.—PROFESSIONAL FEES.

Patients will make their own arrangements for the payment of all professional fees directly with the Member of the Honorary Medical or Surgical Staff in charge of the case.

Additional fees will be payable for the services of an Anæsthetist or other Member of the Honorary Medical or Surgical Staff.

4.—VISITORS.

Visitors are allowed between the hours of 2 p.m. and 3-30 p.m., and between 6 p.m. and 7-30 p.m., or as arranged with the Matron. Not more than two visitors shall be allowed to each patient at one time and the visiting hours must be strictly kept.

Visitors are requested to obtain the permission of the Nurse in charge before entering the room.

Except in special conditions, children under the age of 12 years will not be allowed to visit.

5.—GENERAL.

Patients are requested to provide a proper change of linen, hair brush and comb, tooth brush and dressing gown.

Personal linen should be plainly marked and patients will make their own arrangements for personal laundry.

Responsibility cannot be accepted for the safe custody of valuables.

GENERAL

HOSPITAL RULES

1. No person shall be eligible for admission as an in-patient or for treatment as an out-patient whose circumstances, in the opinion of the Governors, enable him to pay for such suitable medical treatment as his condition requires.
2. No lunatic and no person suffering from any form of contagious or infectious disease, confirmed consumption, ulcerated legs of long standing, cancer (not admitting of operation), puerperal fever, or any incurable disease, no female far advanced in pregnancy (unless Cæsarean section is needed), may be admitted as an in-patient; or if inadvertently admitted, be allowed to remain, if removal be practical without risk to the patient.
3. No patient shall be allowed to remain in the hospital more than two months without the consent of the Governors, which shall only be given in special circumstances.
4. It is absolutely necessary before sending a case for admission to ascertain (stating the sex and nature of the case) if there be a vacancy for the patient.
5. No one shall be admitted or allowed to remain as an in-patient whose case may be properly relieved as an out-patient.
6. Accidents and cases of great urgency are treated, and, if necessary, admitted without a recommendation, but the needed recommendation must be obtained afterwards. All other cases must be recommended by a subscriber.
7. No recommendation (whether for an in-patient or out-patient) shall be available for more than two months without renewal.
8. Visiting Days.—Thursday and Saturday from 2-30 till 4-0 in the afternoon. Children's Ward, Saturday only 2-30 to 3-30. Children under 14 are not allowed to visit patients.

OUT-PATIENTS' DEPARTMENT

The Out-Patient Department is conducted as a series of Consultative Clinics.

Patients on admission will be required to produce the usual recommendation, together with a letter from their own doctor stating the nature of the case and their requirements, addressed to the appropriate department.

The patients will return to their own doctors for treatment where possible. Should hospital treatment, either in-patient or out-patient be required, this will be carried on after consultation with their own doctor, who will be communicated with by the Honorary in charge of all cases.

All fracture cases may be sent direct to the X-Ray Department any morning other than Sunday at 9 a.m.

Other cases such as :—

must be sent to the appropriate out-patient department, either medical or surgical, at the times stated for those Clinics.
