Report for the year ended 31st December, 1945.

1945.

1945 will be recorded in history as that momentous year which saw the collapse of Germany and Japan, and ushered in what we hope will prove to be an era of permanent peace. After six long years of war, with its attendant restrictions, difficulties, and dangers we experienced a sense of relief when we found that we were once again at peace. It seems appropriate, therefore, that this Report should start on a note of thankfulness for Victory, with an acknowledgment of many sacrifices made by many people in order to make such Victory possible, including a great number who paid the supreme price, and a special thought of gratitude that this Hospital was spared the ravage and destruction which befell so many others. Many restrictions remain and many difficulties have still to be grappled with, but the great burden has been lifted, the great anxieties have been taken away, and we should be a truly thankful people.

OBITUARY.

The death of Mr. Eric Young, J.P., M.S., F.R.C.S., President of the Royal Infirmary and Chairman of the Contributory Scheme Association is recorded with regret. He was a very familiar figure in Hospital circles and his work on their behalf is well known.

The passing of Mr. Stephen J. Opie, Hospital Organiser, after a long and trying illness, is also mentioned with regret.

The death of Mrs. Knott, Commandant of Burslem Red Cross Staffs 86, deprived the Hospital of a good friend, who was always willing, indeed eager, to place the services of herself and her Detachment, at the disposal of the Hospital.

In considering these figures it should be kept in mind that this splendid record of service has been accomplished despite staffing difficulties of a serious nature in several departments. The fall in the number of massage patients is due to it not being possible to engage a Masseuse for six months. Sincere appreciation, therefore, is due to all sections of the Staff who have made such service possible. To the Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff for much time spent in valuable and skilful work and also for lectures given to Nurses ; to Matron and the Nursing Staff for splendid co-operative service without which the work of the Doctors would be considerably nullified. The operation of the Ministry of Labour Order whereby Nurses, shortly after passing their State Final Examination, are directed to other fields of training has caused serious staff shortages. The effect has been to take away Nurses just after they have completed their training and when their services have become most valuable and useful. Replacement of such personnel has not always been possible, and it is against this background that the work of the Nursing Staff should be assessed. All sections of the Staff have worked loyally and well, and a special word of commendation may also be allowed to the Engineering and Maintenance Staff who, despite the most acute labour difficulties, particularly at one time of the year, kept the plant and machinery turning and maintained "business as usual."

On the whole our finances have maintained a steady keel, and there is much satisfaction to be gained from a study of the financial position. It is encouraging to remember that our income comes from all classes of people, all types and creeds, and never yet has an appeal in the name of the Hospital fallen on deaf ears, or met with anything but a most generous response. In fact, in certain respects, one feels that Voluntary Hospitals generally have not asked enough, or derived full benefit from a Public which in many ways has shown keen interest in the welfare of its Hospitals.

At the time of writing, future financial commitments are an unknown quantity, but one certain factor is that expenditure will increase. We shall be called upon to meet increased national scales of salaries for all classes of Staff ; and the cost of keeping the Hospital abreast of modern developments and of maintaining it in good and efficient condition, are all indications of a rise in costs. A strong, virile financial position, therefore, is essential for the maintenance of our services. Moreover, funds are needed urgently to enable provision to be made, at the earliest possible moment, for that development of our service and accommodation which is so plainly demanded by the needs of the population we serve.

THE FUTURE.

In addition to the many and varied matters connected with the daily domestic administration of a Hospital, the question "what of the future," is always looming in the mind. This is engendered, of course, by the many discussions and pronouncements, official and otherwise, on the subject of a National Health Service.

Whilst awaiting the proposals of the new Minister of Health, Mr. Aneurin Bevan, the following items may be of interest as indicating the views of the Board of Governors of this Hospital regarding its future development.

(a) Hospital Survey.

It may be remembered that in June 1943 Surveyors, appointed on behalf of the Minister of Health, visited this and other local Hospitals as part of the general survey of Hospital Services throughout the country. The Surveyors were Dr. Veitch Clark, ex-Medical Officer of Health for Manchester, Sir Ernest Hart, and Dr. Charles T. Maitland, Principal Regional Medical Officer of the Ministry of Health. The Survey Report for the West Midlands Area was received in October and the following are extracts from the Report relative to this Hospital, viz :—

(i) "The Burslem, Haywood and Tunstall War Memorial Hospital, a voluntary institution, serves as a district hospital the towns of Burslem and Tunstall and the surrounding villages at the northern end of Stoke-on-Trent and part of Newcastle borough, a population of about 100,000. The site is central with ample ground for extensions and the buildings and equipment are modern. There are 20 medical, 20 surgical, 14 children's, 8 maternity and 12 private beds, and a new block with 22 beds will shortly open, making 96. The out-patient department is small for the range and volume of work now undertaken. The Staff in charge of beds and attending out-patient sessions is of consultant status—physicians, general surgeons, orthopaedic, ear and throat and ophthalmic surgeons. There are two resident medical officers."

(ii) "The Burslem, Haywood and Tunstall Hospital, which is attended by consultants on the staff of the Royal Infirmary, is well situated to serve the northern end of Stoke-on-Trent as a district hospital, both for general medical and surgical in-patients and as a centre for out-patient clinics including the special departments. The bed accommodation might be increased to 200 beds, and the space for out-patient work needs to be greatly extended."

The Board feels that the "quiet confidence" expressed immediately after the visit as to the outcome of the Survey has been justified by the Report. This Report represents the opinion of three independent persons, possessing considerable experience of Hospital administration and who are unanimous in their view that this Hospital should be developed and extended as a District Hospital to serve the northern end of the City. This has been the view of the Board for a long time, and such confirmation is most encouraging.

(b) Planning Committee.

Prior to the receipt of the Survey Report the Board had decided to appoint a Planning Committee. This decision was influenced by the trend of developments generally and the advisability of having available at the right time, a comprehensive scheme showing the possibilities of the Hospital regarding future extensions, embracing both accommodation and ancillary services; also there were certain more immediate needs such as a larger out-patient department and additional engineering plant and equipment. With these developments in mind, the Board has appointed as its Architects Messrs. Alfred Saxon Snell & Phillips, Chartered Architects, of London. This firm specialises in Hospital Planning and Mr. Rees Phillips, F.R.I.B.A., F.R.San.I., the Principal, has paid two visits to the Hospital. The Board is firmly of opinion that the question of extensions shall not be considered in piecemeal and disjointed fashion but as forming part of a progressive scheme.

(c) North Staffs. Joint Hospital Advisory Committee.

At a Meeting convened by the Lord Mayor (Ald. W. H. Kemp) on the 24th July, this Committee was set up on the following representational basis, viz :—

The Committee, which is consultative in character, is to examine the Hospital position of the area as a whole and to discuss the provision of a better and a more co-related service generally. Mr. Jos. Cope, and Mr. Arthur Durose are this Hospital's representatives, with the Secretary in attendance.

"STAFFING THE HOSPITALS."

The publication of this booklet by the Minister of Health and the Minister of Labour and National Service aroused a great deal of interest. It referred to the urgent need in which the country stands of Nurses, Midwives and Domestic Staff, and advanced certain proposals for relieving the situation. Contained in it was an appendix setting out conditions of service which it was stated formed a reasonable minimum to be aimed at. It was appreciated that certain conditions could not be implemented until better facilities were available. For example, more Nurses before a 96 hour fortnight is possible ; more building before certain accommodation could be provided. The suggestions, however, have recently been examined in detail by the Nursing Committee, and it was gratifying to find that many of the conditions mentioned, and much of the accommodation and facilities suggested, were already operating at this Hospital, and other parts of the proposals were being planned for future adoption.

WATER TOWER.

The varied assortment of problems which present themselves for solution would probably surprise people not intimately acquainted with the administration of a Hospital, and 1945 has certainly provided its quota.

Our inadequate water storage accommodation and water softening apparatus has caused, and still does cause, much concern and thought. This difficulty has been greatly accentuated since the opening of the new Maternity Block. The services of a Consulting Engineer have been engaged in this connection and several consultations have been held between the Consultant, Mr. Buckingham, B.Sc., M.Cons.E., A.M.I.C.E., of Manchester, Mr. Harold Goldstraw, Architect, Mr. Wilkinson, Chief Engineer to the Water Board, and Officials of the Hospital. The present position is that a much larger Water Softening Plant has been ordered, and application has been made to the Ministry of Health for permission to erect a Water Tower capable of housing the plant and also providing water storage capacity not only for our present needs but also keeping in mind future requirements. A piece of land directly opposite the Hospital has been purchased on which to build the Tower. The cost of this scheme is not yet known, but the efficiency of the Hospital's services demands its completion as early as possible. The Board would wish to pay its tribute and thanks to Mr. Wilkinson and his Staff for valuable advice and assistance given so willingly at all times.

OTHER ITEMS.

Other matters which have received, or are receiving consideration are, the better lighting and re-surfacing of Haywood Road, the erection of a 'bus shelter for Patients, the cleaning up and levelling of the grounds, the adoption of a scheme for maintenance staff which puts them on a 48 hour basis, and a better system of lighting for the main Operating Theatre.

DEDICATION OF BEDS AND COTS.

During the year monies were raised to dedicate either a bed or a cot as follows:—

Employees of the Burslem & District Co-operative Society in memory of Sergeant J. D. Baskeyfield, V.C., who lost his life at Arnhem.

The Burslem Ladies Linen Guild—Victory Thanksgiving.

4th Staffs. (Hanley) Battalion of the Home Guard per Lt.-Col. W. B. Green, D.F.C., and Platoon Officer E. A. Stanway.

We are deeply grateful for the assistance this form of commemoration and celebration has conferred upon the Hospital, and to the persons responsible for the organisation of such memorials. To bring these memorials into permanent association with a great work of healing is most fitting and appropriate, and it is to be hoped that others, having some such memorial in mind, will follow the fine example which has been set. The cost of dedicating a bed is £1,000 ; a Cot £500, and the Secretary will be glad to supply any further information desired.

LADIES COMMITTEES.

The Hospital has been indebted for many years to the untiring effort and unflagging zeal of several Ladies Committees. The Ladies House Committee, which, in addition to doing very valuable work in connection with the domestic side of the Hospital's activities, so important in these days, also by a special effort raised practically £200 for the general funds.

Special mention is also called for by reason of the fact that the Burslem Ladies Linen Guild has now celebrated its 25th birthday, and has to its credit a splendid record of devoted work and effort during this period. During the past year it has raised £1,050 which will help to supply the linen requirements of the Hospital, dedicate a cot in the Children's Ward as a thanksgiving for Victory, and provide a piano for use of the Nursing Staff. Over the whole period its record is a proud one, reflecting credit on its Officers, Acting Vice-president and Members. The Board extends to all concerned its congratulations on a notable achievement, and its thanks for assistance which has been of much benefit to the Hospital.

Whilst specially mentioning Burslem on becoming 25 years old, we are not unmindful of the consistent support which is also received from the Tunstall Ladies Linen Guild. Last year they supplied linen to the value of £95, plus many pounds worth of useful garments and our warmest thanks are conveyed to the Officers and Members for their valuable contribution.

WHIST COMMITTEE AND ROTA COMMITTEE.

These Committees, both of which have been wound up during the year, have rendered loyal service resulting in valuable financial assistance. They have now been amalgamated with a new Committee to be known as the "Efforts Committee," and judging from the interest and enthusiasm shown so far, this Committee should prove a worthy successor.

COMPREHENSIVE ACKNOWLEDGMENT.

Once again, this Report ends with a brief but sincere expression of thanks to all who have supported the Hospital during the year, and enabled further progress to be made. To the Editor and Staff of the "Sentinel" for generous publicity despite stringent restrictions ; to our Honorary Solicitors, Messrs. Abberley & Walker, and also Mr. Harold Moreton of Messrs. Heaton Son & Moreton, for legal aid willingly volunteered ; our Chaplains, the Rev. Alan Bond and Rev. Alan W. Stevens, for a continuation of their valuable services ; the Commandants, Officers and Members of the Burslem Red Cross Staffs 86 and 109, whose co-operation with the Nursing Staff has again been of much value ; to all responsible for such a gratifying response to the "Egg Week" Appeal as a result of which 802 eggs and £64 in cash was received ; to the many kindly people who, either by gifts in cash, or by contributing to the really amazing number of excellent toys received, helped to make Christmas such a happy and joyous time ; and to the many individuals (some of whom prefer to remain anonymous) and organisations, who, in varied ways, take pleasure in contributing to the success of the Hospital. To all who have supported us in large way or small, a very warm "thank you."

GENERAL HOSPITAL RULES.

(a) IN-PATIENTS.

1. No person shall be eligible for admission as an in-patient or for treatment as an out-patient whose circumstances, in the opinion of the Governors, enable him to pay for such suitable medical treatment as his condition requires.
2. No lunatic and no person suffering from any form of contagious or infectious disease, confirmed consumption, ulcerated legs of long standing, cancer (not admitting of operation), puerperal fever, or any incurable disease, no female far advanced in pregnancy (unless Caesarean section is needed), may be admitted as an in-patient ; or if inadvertently admitted, be allowed to remain, if removal be practical without risk to the patient.
3. No patient shall be allowed to remain in the hospital more than two months without the consent of the Governors, which shall only be given in special circumstances.
4. It is absolutely necessary before sending a case for admission to ascertain (stating the sex and nature of the case) if there be a vacancy for the patient.
5. No one shall be admitted or allowed to remain as an in-patient whose case may be properly relieved as an out-patient.
6. Accidents and cases of great urgency are treated, and, if necessary, admitted without a recommendation, but the needed recommendation must be obtained afterwards. All other cases must be recommended by a subscriber.
7. No recommendation (whether for an in-patient or out-patient) shall be available for more than two months without renewal.
8. Visiting Days.—Thursday and Saturday from 2-30 till 4-0 in the afternoon. Children's Ward, Saturday only 2-30 to 3-30. Children under 14 are not allowed to visit patients.

(b) OUT-PATIENTS.

The Out-Patient Department is conducted as a series of Consultative Clinics.

Patients on admission will be required to produce the usual recommendation, together with a letter from their own doctor stating the nature of the case and their requirements, addressed to the appropriate department.

The patients will return to their own doctors for treatment where possible. Should hospital treatment, either in-patient or out-patient be required, this will be carried on after consultation with their own doctor, who will be communicated with by the Honorary in charge of all cases.

All fracture cases may be sent direct to the X-Ray Department any morning other than Sunday at 9 a.m.

Other cases such as :—

Chest

Kidney,

Gall Bladder and

Stomach Cases, etc.

must be sent to the appropriate out-patient department, either medical or surgical, at the times stated for those Clinics.

(c) PRIVATE PATIENTS.

1.—ADMISSION.

Private patients can only be admitted by arrangement with a Member of the Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff of the Hospital and for treatment by such a Member.

Where in exceptional circumstances a patient is admitted without previous arrangements having been made, he or she will be placed under the care of the Honorary Physician or Surgeon on duty, who will charge for professional services.

Mental or Infectious cases cannot be admitted.

Persons not in touch with Members of the Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff may make application to the Secretary or the Matron regarding admission.

2.—SCALE OF HOSPITAL CHARGES.

Single bedded room £7 7 0 per week.

Double bedded room £6 6 0 per week.

Children under eight as Private

Patients in Children's Ward £3 13 6 per week.

Should a single bed room be desired and is not available at the time, a double bed room may be reserved, if available, as a single bed room at a charge of £10 10 0 per week.

These charges cover maintenance, dressings, ordinary Hospital attendance and nursing, and the use of the Operating Theatre. Extra charges will be made for such services as stimulants and special preparations, X-Ray Examinations, Pathological Reports or Treatment, Massage Treatment.

Weekly accounts will be presented ; cheques should be crossed and made payable to the Hospital.

The day of admission and the day of discharge are reckoned as one day.

3.—PROFESSIONAL FEES.

Patients will make their own arrangements for the payment of all professional fees directly with the Member of the Honorary Medical or Surgical Staff in charge of the case.

Additional fees will be payable for the services of an Anaesthetist or other Member of the Honorary Medical or Surgical Staff.

4.—VISITORS.

Visitors are allowed between the hours of 2 p.m. and 3-30 p.m., and between 6 p.m. and 7-30 p.m., or as arranged with the Matron. Not more than two visitors shall be allowed to each patient at one time and the visiting hours must be strictly kept.

Visitors are requested to obtain the permission of the Nurse in charge before entering the room.

Except in special conditions, children under the age of 12 years will not be allowed to visit.

5.—GENERAL.

Patients are requested to provide a proper change of linen, toilet necessities, towels, and dressing gown.

Personal linen should be plainly marked and patients will make their own arrangements for personal laundry.

Responsibility cannot be accepted for the safe custody of valuables.

DEDICATED BEDS AND COTS

It would be difficult to suggest a better or more fitting memorial than a dedicated bed or cot.

In this way the memory of a relative or friend and the generous act of the benefactor are brought into permanent association with a great work of healing.

A bed may be dedicated by a donation or legacy of £1000 and a cot by a donation or legacy of £500.

A tablet, appropriately worded, is affixed to each dedicated bed or cot. See list on page .

The Secretary would be glad to hear from anyone desiring to help the hospital in this manner.

RECOVERY OF INCOME TAX ON ANNUAL SUBSCRIPTIONS.

TO OLD AND NEW SUBSCRIBERS.

HOW TO INCREASE YOUR SUBSCRIPTIONS WITHOUT EXTRA COST TO YOU.

By virtue of the Income Tax Act, 1918, and subsequent Finance Acts it is possible for the Hospital to recover from the Inland Revenue Department the Income Tax that has been paid by subscribers in respect of their subscriptions.

To enable the Hospital to do this it is necessary that each subscriber should enter into a contract to pay to the Hospital an annual subscription of a definite amount during a period of not less than seven years, or during his life-time, whichever is the shorter.




